
# **Shots Echoing Round the Mountain**

# **Critical Commentary**

# **HST notes:**

In the Professional Papers series:

Sung and played on guitar by Luther Royce, age 28, White Lake, 1941.

According to the singer, this song of a Tennessee feud originated in Kentucky. He learned it from his grandmother's "collection on old pieces of paper in handwritin'."

The power of parental guidance is expressed most vividly in the lines "Dan was a hot blooded youngster, His dad raised sturdy and right. He had him sworn from the day he was born, To shoot every Terney on sight." Surely Seth Terney's daughter must have had a strange feeling as she road away with the hero and left all her kinfolk lying bleeding and dying.

#### **Editor's notes:**

Different sources within the Helene Stratman-Thomas Collection refer to the character in this song either as "Seth Terney" and "Zeb Turney." I found no other source that used the former name. A citation at end of the web page below reads: "From Traditional American Folk Songs, Anne and Frank Warner Collected from Frank Proffitt, 1941 note: A song by this title was copyrighted in 1925 by Carson Robison, Shapiro, Bernstein."
