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MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING of the BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

Green Bay, Wisconsin

Held in Room 213, Socio-Ecology Bldg., UW-Green Bay Friday, September 6, 1974, 9:02 A.M.

President Pelisek presiding.

PRESENT: Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Dixon, Fish, Hales, Kopp, Lavine,

ABSENT: None.

Upon motion by Regent Lavine, seconded by Regent Kopp, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on July 12, 1974, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

President Pelisek introduced Mr. M. R. Lackore, General Manager of the Wisconsin Dells Regional Chamber of Commerce, representing Hospitality Industry, Inc., a federation of Wisconsin restaurants, innkeepers, campground attractions, and regional travel associations. Mr. Lackore's remarks are attached as EXHIBIT B.

In response to questions by the Regents, Mr. Lackore indicated that the employment season begins approximately June 1; that there is no problem at

the beginning of the summer tourist season, but that there is a problem when school resumes prior to Labor Day; and that, in the Dells area, approximately 1,600 University students are employed out of a total of 1,900 employees.

President Pelisek introduced Mr. Buck Martin, Education Coordinator, Great Lakes Inter-tribal Council, Inc. Mr. Martin's remarks are attached as EXHIBIT C.

Regent DeBardeleben requested that the above statement be referred to the Education Committee for such action as it sees fit to take, with respect to inviting response from the Administration.

President Pelisek welcomed Regent Arthur DeBardeleben to the Board, and stated for the record that Regent DeBardeleben had been appointed a member of the Business and Finance Committee.

President Pelisek noted that the Regent representatives on the Higher Educational Aids Board had reported the actions of that Board at their meeting held on August 23, 1974 in a memorandum dated August 27, 1974.

President Pelisek stated that all Regents had received a memo from him indicating he had referred to the Central Administration a proposal from the United Council of Student Governments relating to interpretation of Section 39.06(5)--Student Rights and Responsibilities, a section of the Merger Bill; and that it had been anticipated, at that time, the statement would be the subject of action today. He stated the response from Central Administration and the Chancellors and various other interested constituencies within the University is not in a form for presentation and discussion; and therefore, the matter will come before the Board during his report at the October meeting.

President Pelisek cautioned the Chancellors that he was certain the Board anticipates the formation of joint student-faculty committees and other committees involving student affairs during the forthcoming school year, many of which will be formed within the next month. He continued the Board anticipates our administrative personnel with comply with both the letter and the spirit of Section 39.06(5); and that any deviation from the spirit of that provision, regardless of our action on the proposed guidelines under that section, will be looked upon with substantial displeasure by the members of the Board, because compliance is expected with the provisions of the Statutes.

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President Pelisek stated that, at the last meeting, an amendment to the By-Laws of the Board of Regents offered by Regent Hales, renaming the office of President and Vice President, was deferred pending an opinion from the Attorney General. The opinion has been received and indicates quite clearly that the Wisconsin Statutes indicate that the officers of the Board shall be President, Vice President, and Secretary; and that, accordingly, Regent Hales has withdrawn his motion.

President Pelisek called the Board's attention to the fact that our By-Laws do refer to our committee leadership as "Chairman", and it might well be appropriate for the Board to consider altering these designations to either "Chair" or "Chairperson", as suggested by a very articulate memorandum from one of our staff people.

Regent Barkla requested that the above referred to memorandum, by Ms. Carolyn Sylvander, be made a part of the record (EXHIBIT D attached). President Pelisek stated that the proper notice will be included in the notice of the next meeting to provide for an amendment to the By-Laws to change the committee leadership from "Chairman" to either "Chairperson" or "Chair".

President Pelisek stated that he would furnish a written policy for determining individual presentations to the Committees and the Board.

President Pelisek reported that the Special Regent Committee on Medical Affairs had met and unanimously approved the resolutions relating to the affiliation of the UW-Madison Center for Health Sciences with the Waukesha Memorial Hospital, and the authorization for UW-Milwaukee and UW-Madison to join the Medical Center of Southeastern Wisconsin as a community member and an affiliate member, respectively.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Renk:

Resolution 824: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System and the Chancellor of the UW-Madison, the Center for Health Sciences at UW-Madison be authorized to begin affiliation negotiations with Waukesha Memorial Hospital.

President Pelisek stated this action will be subject to the guidelines for the financing of affiliation arrangements which will be a part of the report by the Education Committee, and will also be subject to the approval of the Medical Education Review Council, the formation of which was authorized by the mini-budget.

The question was put on Resolution 824, and it was voted.

Regent McNamara moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 825: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System and the respective Chancellors of the UW-Milwaukee and the UW-Madison, the UW-Milwaukee and the UW-Madison be authorized to join the Medical Center of Southeastern Wisconsin as a Community Member and an Affiliate Member, respectively; and the President of the Board of Regents be authorized to designate a member of the Board to serve on the Medical Center Council as provided in the Constitution and By-Laws of that organization.

President Pelisek stated the Medical Affairs Committee heard a presentation from the Health Sciences staff regarding the Clinical Practice Plan. He noted the medical faculty has had under consideration for some time substantial modifications in the plan, and the plan has been submitted to the faculty in modified form. He noted it had been adopted; and within the next month, a memorandum detailing the current provisions of the revised plan and indicating the variances between the revised plan and the present consultation practice plan will be distributed to members of the Board. We will be asked to act upon the revised plan at the next meeting.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

President Weaver presented the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record.

Regent Kopp moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 826: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record (EXHIBIT A attached), be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

A slide-tape presentation relating to the mission and progress of the UW-Green Bay campus was presented.

President Weaver stated that our Senior Chancellor, Bjarne Ullsvik, has requested that he be relieved of his duties as Chancellor effective at the end of the 1975 summer session. He stated he was sure everyone shared with him

the desire to recognize the long and loyal service that Chancellor Ullsvik has given to his campus and to the System.

Regent Kopp moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 827: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the request of Chancellor Ullsvik of UW-Platteville to be relieved of his Chancellor duties effective at the end of the 1975 summer session be accepted, and the President of the System authorized to initiate the process of selecting a successor.

President Weaver stated that, with the authorization of the Board, he will ask Senior Vice President Smith to proceed promptly to seek appropriate nominees in the usual way for membership on a Search and Screen Committee, and he requested the President of the Board to appoint from Board membership the appropriate Regent Committee that would be ultimately involved in the final stages of that search.

President Weaver called to the attention of the Regents the action of the Executive Committee on August 13 appointing Dr. Edward B. Fort as Vice Provost and Chancellor for the Center System. President Weaver pointed out that Dr. Fort is presently the Superintendent of the Unified School District of Sacramento, California, a major school system with an annual operating budget of \$65 million, which indicates that Dr. Fort is obviously a man of substantial administrative experience and budget management capabilities.

He pointed out that Dr. Fort holds Bachelors and Masters degrees from Wayne State University of Detroit and his Doctorate from the University of California at Berkeley and has had broad experience in the public school system of Detroit. President Weaver stated he shared with the Search and Screen Committee and the Regents Committee the belief that Dr. Fort will bring vigorous and imaginative vitality to the future development of our System.

President Weaver expressed the appreciation of the Administration and the members of the Board for the loyal and effective service of John Meggers as Acting Chancellor of the Center System for the past year.

President Weaver reported that he had, in the past year, been meeting with the members of the Intercampus Faculty Consultative Council on an average of about once per month; and that he proposed to continue the meetings during the coming year. President Weaver emphasized the fact that participation by any campus or individual is entirely voluntary, and that the IFCC will not act as an agency of faculty governance. No votes will be taken, and the program is designed

simply to give regularity to communication efforts between the faculties and officers of Central Administration.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

President Pelisek reported that the Executive Committee met on August 13, 1974 to consider Resolutions 828, 829, and 830 included in <u>EXHIBIT E</u> attached.

Regent Kopp moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 831: That the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on August 13, 1974, including the actions taken therein (EXHIBIT E attached), be ratified and confirmed.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Dixon, and it was voted:

Resolution 832: That the personnel actions taken by the President of the University of Wisconsin System under Resolution \$556, since those approved by the Regents on July 12, 1974, be approved.

Regent Lavine stated the next item on the Committee agenda had been a report on the activities during the last two years of the Green Bay Campus Committee on the Status of Minorities, a committee having representation of teaching faculty, non-teaching academic staff, and classified personnel. Regent Lavine stated that he had expressed the hope that other Chancellors and faculties could be apprised of the Committee's activities and programs, and that a report was requested on what has happened as a result of the development of the program. A report is to be made to the Regents approximately one year hence. He noted the program on The Roots of Prejudice is the first in the nation. The manual developed by the Committee entitled, The Roots of Prejudice, may be obtained from the Office of the Secretary.

Regent Lavine reported the Committee reviewed the operational procedures proposed for the conduct of Education Committee meetings, with particular

reference to the manner of receiving presentations made by persons appearing before the Committee. He noted that presentations should be made in writing, rather than orally; that, if they are lengthy, they should be covered by no more than a three-page, double-spaced summary; and that Committee members who read the material sent to them could ask questions when the Committee meets, rather than listening to reports presented orally which have already been documented on paper.

Regent Lavine reported the Committee next considered the document entitled, Guidelines for Tenured Personnel Actions for Terminal Leaves and Professional Development Leaves (copy on file with the papers of this meeting).

Regent Lavine stated the Committee next reviewed a statement of "Financial Guidelines for Affiliation" proposed by the Center for Health Sciences, UW-Madison Campus, stating that use of the guidelines should permit orderly development of affiliations with proper accountability for the use of State funds. (A copy of the document is on file with the papers of this meeting.)

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 833: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of the UW-Madison, the document entitled, "Financial Guidelines for Affiliation", proposed by the Center for Health Sciences and the UW-Madison Campus, be approved.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 834: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor of the UW-Milwaukee and the President of the UW System, the Regents receive and approve the report from the UW-Milwaukee on plans for cross registration for graduate studies between UW-Milwaukee and the Medical College of Wisconsin. This approval assumes a report from UW-Milwaukee at the April, 1975 meeting of the Board on the results of the operation of the current cross registration agreement, together with proposals for continuing or modifying the agreement.

Regent Lavine reported the next two/resolutions had been unanimously approved by the members of the Committee.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolutions, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 835: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, the July 19, 1974 report of the UW-VTAE Joint Administrative Committee on Academic Programs entitled, "Guidelines Defining 'Occupation' Programs*, be accepted.

Resolution 836: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellors of UW-Eau Claire, UW-Oshkosh, and the University Center System, the following footnote be added to pages 9, 10, 13, and 23 of the publication entitled, Mission, University of Wisconsin System, 1974:



"The term occupational as used in this mission statement connotes programs/degrees designed as professional or non-specialized curricular units which are not intended to lead to terminal two-year degrees in semiskilled, skilled, or semiprofessional areas."

Regent Lavine reported that the Education Committee had next considered the report of the UW System Engineering Task Force (copy on file with the papers of this meeting).

Regent Lavine reported that, in stating the Committee's appreciation to the Task Force for its excellent report, he had expressed the hope that, at an appropriate time, the Deans would report to the Committee through Senior Vice President Smith as to what has happened as a result of the Task Force recommendations. He noted that, at the time when new programs in Technology and Engineering are presented to the Education Committee for consideration, one of the criteria asked for by the Committee will be an indication of the head count, as well as FTE enrollments, of present engineering and/or technology courses in process.

Regent Lavine reported the Committee had next considered the draft statement, dated August 26, 1974, of a proposed system policy on Student Evaluation of Instruction. He noted that, after discussion by the Committee, the draft statement is to be available for discussion on the various campuses, including faculty and student organizations, prior to September 20. A final policy statement, based on the processes of the consultation will be brought to the Regents for action at the October meeting of the Board.



Regent Lavine reported the Committee next considered a report on the UW-Stout Vocational Rehabilitation Program to Train Counselors for Alcoholics. It was suggested that Chancellor Swanson confer with Senior Vice President Smith regarding the inclusion of the program in the budget recommendations to come to the Regents in the subsequent months.

Regent Lavine reported that, in the Committee meeting on the previous day, there had been extensive discussion of the Analysis Paper--Recommendations on Veterinary Medicine Program for Wisconsin. Regent Renk had expressed disappointment that the Committee was not making a definite recommendation and indicated his support of the establishment of a new school of Veterinary Medicine at UW-Madison with satellite facilities at UW-River Falls. Dr. William J. O'Rourke, Executive Secretary, Wisconsin Veterinary Medicine Association, spoke in support of Regent Renk's position.

Regent Lavine stated that presentations were also made by Regent Dixon, Senior Vice President Smith, President Weaver, Regent Kopp, and Professor B. C. Easterday of the Department of Veterinary Science. The proposed resolution was amended by adding the words "and that a final decision be made on the two alternatives no later than January 1975," at the end of the resolution. In the Committee meeting, the proposed resolution, as revised above, was approved, with Regent Kopp voting "No".

Regent Lavine moved adoption of Resolution 837, relating to Veterinary Medicine (EXHIBIT F attached), and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin.

Regent Solberg stated that he was aware of the fact that there are several valid reasons for delaying making the decision on whether or not we have a Veterinary School of our own or whether we pursue other alternatives. He noted there has been a very in-depth study of the problem. He continued he was aware of the fact that there are legislative candidates who are making the question of a veterinary college in the State of Wisconsin part of their campaign. If they are going to come out and say they are for it, it is now time that we make our decision and make some sort of recommendation to them. He continued he recognized that the final decision is going to be made in the Legislature; that this is now a part of the issues in the legislative campaign; and that he did not feel we are doing our job if we wait until January to make our recommendation.

Regent Solberg moved that the resolution be amended as shown in $\overline{\text{EXHIBIT G}}$ attached, and the motion was seconded by Regent Kopp.

Regent Kopp stated that he approved wholeheartedly the concept that ordinarily the Board pays great respect to the recommendations of its committees; and normally he prescribes to the theory that, if the matter has already been covered in great length in the Committee, then he can approve it. He stated he felt there are occasions when we feel keenly about some of the matters before us that we have a duty to express a contrary opinion at such times. He noted that, in a great majority of cases, he supported the recommendations of Central

Administration. Regent Kopp stated that there has been hardly a day when he has not had a telephone call, a letter, or a plea as to when the Board was going to take a stand about the veterinary medicine school. He stated the Board of Regents has one responsibility and the Legislature must then assume their responsibility in this matter. He noted the legislators are becoming critical of the Board because we have not given them any advice on how we feel about this subject. He stated that many persons are concerned about what would happen between the period of our recommending a college of veterinary medicine and the time the Legislature would approve a college for this System. He stated it was his understanding that arrangements can be made with Minnesota or other states to cover the interim period.

He stated this is a long-term program; and if we do not start the ball rolling now, he feared we would never have a college of veterinary medicine. He stated that is unthinkable in an agricultural state and for the farmers of Wisconsin. He continued that he did not want to do anything that would interfere in any way with our ordinary budget request, and believed it had been made clear that, if the Legislature goes along with the college of veterinary medicine, the appropriation would have to be entirely separate from and disconnected in every way from our general budget. He stated he was pleading with the Board to take a first step, which is simply saying to the Legislature, "We feel that we need, whenever you can give us the money, in your wisdom, a college of veterinary medicine at Madison with satellite facilities at River Falls; and we want to tell you that now, so that when you assemble in January you can be thinking about it."

Regent Kopp stated some of us have lived for years through discussions, studies, petitions, and votes on this problem. He noted the State Universities' Board considered it when he served on that Board, the Coordinating Council considered it, and the University of Wisconsin Board has considered it. Still, we come up with nothing but more study and more time.

Regent Sandin pointed out that, at the present time, there is no January meeting scheduled; and it was thought by the Education Committee and President Pelisek that this meeting would be scheduled to be devoted to the veterinary medicine subject. Regent Sandin stated we have studied this topic to the point of satiation; and that she would be more comfortable with the proposed amendment if there was some mention of continuing the situation so that our students who are presently being educated through Minnesota and other states would not be cut off, which she feared the proposed amendment does. Regent Sandin suggested it might be better to simply amend the original motion by saying and instead of or contracting on an interim basis for an enlarged number, etc., and cutting out long term.

Senior Vice President Smith stated we would have to change a lot of other words--that Regent Sandin was suggesting that we endorse paragraph (a) at this time and endorse continuing discussion under paragraph (b), pursuant to a substitute. He continued he felt it would be more appropriate to continue discussion either in the context of interim solutions or in the context of an alternative solution. He continued that it was his concern that he did not believe we have reached the completion of the details of a contractual relationship. He stated it may be a less attractive and much more difficult kind of

a solution from a technical standpoint to achieve, but it is a viable solution which has certain merits and which he feels ought to be pursued, considered and discussed. He stated that he believed that, by passing the resolution as proposed, the Board in effect has endorsed the problem, and has endorsed a separate school as a viable solution to that problem. He continued it seemed to him this is sufficient grounds for those people who believe in developing the school to proceed at the legislative level as to how they might go along.

He continued the resolution says, in addition, however, that there is another viable solution; and that we ought to come back to the Board and look at both of these in some detail to see whether or not both are acceptable to the Board, only the first is acceptable to the Board, or both are acceptable with one being the preferred solution and the other an alternative solution which might be considered. He stated, in effect, we are not taking action in the sense of identifying specific alternatives.

Regent Lavine stated that, due to unsettled conditions at the University of Minnesota, it has been difficult to get clear signals going both ways as to what we are talking about. Regent Lavine stated that we were talking about alternatives, and that there was the possibility of a contract with Minnesotanot just the second-rate alternative, but one that could be effective as an alternative. He noted that, if we could work out with them the possibility of having the large animal clinic site at River Falls and get the right kinds of incentives built in to insure that students that went to Minnesota would return to Wisconsin, that was an attractive alternative.

He agreed that it was necessary to furnish more veterinarians for the state, and that we have to look at any kind of contract which might provide the number of veterinarians that Wisconsin needs at a cost less than that of setting up our own school. He noted he was not endorsing that, but that we must explore it. To ask for 60 or 90 days to study the matter was not only reasonable but irresponsible not to do. He continued we could not afford the luxury at this point of arbitrarily saying that the only thing we support is a school at Madison. Regent Lavine stated our job is to get veterinarians for Wisconsin and to utilize resources as conservatively as possible. Regent Lavine stated that, if Minnesota, in the next couple of months, comes up with their side of the contract that is unacceptable, we will be the first one to say, "Let's strike option 2 and not even consider it"; but we must explore it, and in the meantime people that want to push a Wisconsin school can go ahead.

Regent Fish stated that he concurred with the hope that a determination can be made quickly, because we have discussed the matter to death; but he would hope that the conclusion would not be made in the atmosphere we are now in. He would like to have a full Board participation in a Committee session running at least a half day on this very important subject. He continued he was not prepared to say how he would vote on the alternatives as they now appear, because he needs more information that would be brought out in debate. Regent Fish stated that the suggestion that we approve the school and show it to the Legislature separate from the budget of the University is a completely unrealistic and fallacious method of handling the matter--that the Legislature will bind

them together when they discuss them. He continued this is University expense, it is a costly item, and it is going to have an effect on the balance of the University budget.

Regent McNamara stated the amendment, as he understood it, gives a strong endorsement to alternative (a) and then says we should, at the same time, pursue some discussions with Minnesota. He continued, if you endorse (a), your discussions with Minnesota are moot—there would be no point to prolong the resolution. He continued that it was his judgment that we are not delaying action by considering the problem in greater detail, because the Legislature cannot act on it earlier than the forepart of 1975.

Regent McNamara continued he was persuaded by the sentence in paragraph 3 of the resolution which says, "the investment needed to support either alternative (a) or (b) stated above should be a matter for public policy determination by state government, taken as a particular decision separate from consideration of the biennial budget request." Regent McNamara granted that, when the Legislature does act, they will take our entire budget into consideration; but the decision to establish a veterinary school or to cooperate with the University of Minnesota is a very substantial one; and that it is our responsibility to assist the Legislature by brining the matter in clear and unmistakable terms to them so that they can discharge their legislative duties, not have the thing lost as part of the larger budget. Regent McNamara stated he was supporting the resolution because he felt it was better than the proposed amendment.

Regent Renk stated that, in May, we passed a resolution that said Regent action is anticipated in September 1974--now we are going to take action in 1975. He stated this thing has been studied to death for years--we have had prestigious committees, the top people in the profession, the top people in agriculture in the state, asking for a veterinary school in the State of Wisconsin, and now we are going to study and we are going to discuss it some more. He continued he imagined the administration will come back with the same proposition we now have.

Regent Renk pointed out the appropriation for this building will not be a lump sum, but rather will be spread over two or three biennia; the same is true of the operating expenses. Regent Renk stated he agreed with Regent Sandin that it is important that we take care of the veterinary medicine students in the interim, and that Dr. Easterday has told us that efforts would be made to take care of these young people. Regent Renk pointed out that the tuition in Minnesota is \$10,000, in Illinois it is \$12,384, and in Pennsylvania and New Jersey over \$12,000, which will be spent out of state.

Regent Dixon stated that, having heard all sides of the discussion, he could definitely live with the resolution as we have it providing we have a deadline, at which time we will say one or the other is our preference.

Regent Williams stated that she did not feel our only concern should be that we have a place for our students to go. She noted that is one of our concerns, but that we should look at the source of people who are asking for such facilities. She continued they are people who are in the food industries, who are raising animals for human consumption and are therefore very interested in having facilities in the state because they need the things that such a facility would provide. She continued they need additional diagnostic services, continuing education for veterinarians, and the newest medicines and research on animal diseases disseminated to the people of the state. Regent Williams stated we need to be able to grow larger amounts of food for the population, and that is certainly in line with the types of research which have gone on in our day, and is one of the things that the people of Wisconsin have grown to expect from state services.

Regent Williams continued we should look at the possibility of beefing up our current research, our Extension efforts, in extending the membership of the faculty in that area, without taking this tremendously large step of building an entire school, if there are some possibilities of providing service to the people who are going to need it to conduct additional research to make breakthroughs and discovering causes of some of these diseases. Regent Williams stated that she would prefer to put money and effort into a cooperative venture with Minnesota rather than seeking the tremendous amount of money needed for more buildings.

Regent Solberg stated he felt we are being naive if we assume the Legislature is going to accept our recommendation for constructing a veterinary school. He continued the Legislature will look at alternatives, and we can give them other viable alternatives at any time they ask for them. Regent Solberg stated that, if the members of the Board feel that, if we were to recommend the establishment of a school of veterinary medicine at this time to the Legislature, and the Legislature went along with it, and as a result this would dilute our present standard of education by taking monies from what we are now using to form our present level of education, then we should probably all decide as to whether or not we should go against a veterinary school.

Regent Solberg stated that he felt that is the basic decision we have to make, whether it be made in October, November, January, or two years from now. He emphasized that the final decision as to whether there will or will not be a veterinary school will be made in the legislative halls.

Regent Neshek inquired if Central Administration is asking more time to refine and develop alternative (b) because it is not ready at this stage to give a positive recommendation.

Senior Vice President Smith responded that we have an exhibit on the alternatives. He continued that we have laid out all of the facts of what we have been assured by Minnesota at the Vice Presidential level could be made available. He stated that it is reasonable to say there are many details that the Board ought to have available before they endorse this as a viable alternative, even if they say it is a second alternative. Senior Vice President Smith stated some of those have to do with whether or not there could be agreement on the location of the large animal site in Wisconsin, rather than Minnesota, and whether or not we can define more precisely the methodology for calculating perpupil costs. He stated they are responsive at this time to the proposal that this can be done on the basis of separation of direct instructional costs from

continuing education and research costs, which would be a significant change in the per capital charge made for our students. He continued those kinds of commitments have to be made by the President and the Board in more definitive terms before we can say we have a viable contract. He noted that part of the solution of the problem has to be the strengthening of beginning education in clinical referral services within the State of Wisconsin. He continued our discussions about utilization of faculty from Minnesota, as well as from Wisconsin, for this purpose has been fruitful and encouraging, but we need to define precisely what this would mean in terms of investment for this side of the border, and be sure we have a fully-operating development in Wisconsin.

President Weaver stated there is a completely new administration at Minnesota with which we have not had an opportunity to negotiate, and called attention to the joint meeting with the Board of Regents of Minnesota and Wisconsin. He stated it would be peculiar for us to come to that joint meeting and say we have already made up our minds on that subject. He continued that President Anderson, of the Minnesota Board, is very much interested in seeing whether this plan can be made to work--we don't know whether it can and that is the problem. He stated that this is not indecision, but merely a request to the Board not to cut off options until we know whether it is an option or not.

Regent Neshek stated that he felt it would be an irresponsibility of this Board to vote to approve the amendment while Central Administration is asking for time to negotiate and formulate viable alternatives. He continued we want a quick decision, but not a wrong decision, and that we are not in a position to make that decision when Central Administration tells us they haven't been able to complete negotiations; and on this basis, he would urge the Board to support the original resolution recommended by the Administration and the Education Committee.

Regent Solberg offered the following amendment to his motion: "Be It Further Resolved That, if hereafter this Board finds viable alternatives for consideration by the Legislature, we shall consider these alternatives and make our recommendations thereon to the Legislature." The motion failed for want of a second.

The proposed amendment failed on a roll call vote, with Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Dixon, Fish, Hales, Lavine, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Thompson, and Zancanaro voting "No" (12), and with Regents Kopp, Renk, Solberg, and Williams voting "Aye" (4).

President Pelisek stated that this issue was of such magnitude to this Board and to the State of Wisconsin that it would be worthy of considering, as a sole item for discussion and action, at the January meeting. He contemplated that, as President of the Board, if the proposed resolution as revised is approved, the item will be scheduled as a sole item, unless there are other necessary actions to be taken in January. It was also contemplated that the issue can be debated from the morning until conclusion, with the hope that not only will the interested groups appear, but also with the hope that interested representatives of State Government will appear, as well as Legislaturs and others, so that the full Board may have every opportunity to debate, weigh, and consider this very, very vital and important issue to the citizens of this state.

The question was put on Resolution 837, and it was voted, with Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Dixon, Fish, Hales, Kopp, Lavine, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Thompson, Williams, and Zancanaro voting "Aye" (14), and with Regents Renk and Solberg voting "No" (2).

Regent Kopp stated for the record that he was voting "Yes" only because that was the only alternative to doing nothing, and also that he felt the discussions highlighted the problems.

Regent Renk stated that he voted "No", not because he was opposed to Veterinary Medicine, but because he opposed the delay.

Regent Lavine reported that, in Executive Session of the Committee meeting, authorization was granted to recruit a Professor of Pathology in the Medical School at the UW-Madison who will also have the title of Department Chairman, and to recruit for Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences at the UW-Eau Claire.

(The meeting recessed at 11:55 A.M., and reconvened at 12:12 P.M., with all Regents present.)

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Neshek.

Regent Neshek reported the Business and Finance Committee met on the previous day, with all Regents present except Regents Thompson and Zancanaro. The purpose of the joint session was to consider a series of six biennial budget policy papers (copies filed with the papers of the meeting). Regent Neshek reported that all of the resolutions had been approved by the Regents at that meeting.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolutions, the motion was seconded by Regent Renk, and it was voted:

- Resolution 838: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the Statement of Major Biennial Policy Issues and Contributing Problems, as outlined in Biennial Budget Policy Paper #2.0, be adopted and approved.
- Resolution 839: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System,
 Central Administration prepare the 1975-77 biennial budget
 recommendations for Regent consideration guided by the
 priorities outlined in 1975-77 Biennial Operating Budget
 Policy Paper #3.0, dated September 1974

(MORE)

- Resolution 840: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the Regents direct Central Administration to prepare for its consideration in October:
 - 1. A detailed rationale and arguments in support of Alternative D.1, of 1975-77 Biennial Operating Budget Policy Paper #4.0, dated September 1974, including a fiscal note; and
 - 2. A similar analysis of the implications of the other Alternatives under D.
- Resolution 841: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the Central Administration be asked to prepare for Board consideration in October a two-step approach for base and formulary funding for 1975-77:
 - 1. A refinement of the existing formula methodology, correcting some of the existing defects to serve as an interim procedure.
 - 2. A major modification along the lines outlined in C.2 in 1975-77 Biennial Budget Policy Paper #5.0, dated September 1974, including an example of how it would operate on a campus, and plan to facilitate this major pilot testing at two or more campuses within the University System during 1975-77.
- Resolution 842: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System,

 Central Administration be directed to return to the October meeting of the Board with a decision item identifying the budget supplement necessary to offset past and projected inflation through 1976-77 based on the methodology outlined in 1975-77 Biennial Operating Budget Policy Paper #6.0, dated September 1974.
- Resolution 843: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System,

 Central Administration include 1975-77 Biennial Operating

 Budget Policy Paper #7.0, dated September 1974, as the narrative System response to the Governor's 1975-77 productivity
 guidelines.

Regent Neshek reported the total gifts, grants, and U.S. Government Contracts are slightly behind the total for a comparable period a year ago to the extent of \$1.7 million, all of which is in the student aid category. He stated it is anticipated that, for the year, student aid will be off approximately \$1 million, all in the area of the work/study program.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 844: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts and grants listed in the Statement of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting), be accepted, and the appropriate officers of the University be authorized to sign the agreements; and that the federal contracts listed therein be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

Regent Neshek reported the next resolution, relating to the Robert Beyer Professorship, provides for expanding the original terms. The account previously was a Professorship in Accounting; now it would be a Professorship in Managerial Accounting and Control. The first agreement had a \$500,000 goal; the new agreement has a minimum of \$400,000 with a goal of \$1 million. Under the previous agreement the principal could not be used; now the principal can be used after reaching the \$1 million goal. Previously, the Professor's teaching was limited to two seminars or classes; now it is three seminars or classes.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 845: That, upon recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor, the Revised Memorandum of Agreement between the University of Wisconsin Foundation and the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, relating to the Robert Beyer Professorship in Managerial Accounting and Control in the Graduate School of Business of the UW-Madison, and to the solicitation of funds therefore, be approved; and that the President and the Secretary be authorized to sign the Memorandum of Agreement.

Regent Neshek reported the late Martin C. Olson left the residue of his estate, astimated at \$50,000, to the University of Wisconsin to be used for the support of scholarships on the Madison Campus.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Renk, and it was voted:

Resolution 846: That the bequest of the late Martin C. Ofson, Schenectady, New York, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Martin C. Olson, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Neshek stated that, during his lifetime, Mr. Garvin Williams contributed \$7,000 to the UW-Madison for research in McArdle Memorial Laboratory and in his Will directed that an additional \$3,000 be made available to the University to bring his total contribution to \$10,000.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 847: That the bequest of the late Garvin D. Williams, Randolph, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Garvin D. Williams, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Fish.

Regent Fish reported that, in the Committee meeting on the previous day, the Committee considered the request for Regent reaction to facility needs at the UW Center-Waukesha County. It was agreed the community should proceed with the planning under the previous guidelines and then submit a request for consideration by the Regents.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 848: That, upon recommendation of the UW-Green Bay Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report be approved and authority be granted to prepare final plans, bid and construct the University Union Building at UW-Green Bay at a total estimated project cost of \$1,321,305, which is to be financed from self-amortizing funds--\$421,305 from accumulated surpluses and \$900,000 from self-amortizing supported bonding authority.



Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 849: That, upon recommendation of the UW-River Falls Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report for the Physical Science Building at UW-River Falls be approved and authority be granted for the preparation of final plans, bidding and construction at a total project cost not to exceed \$3,000,000.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 850: That, upon recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report be approved and authority be granted to prepare final plans, bid and construct the Bascom Hall-Commerce Building Remodeling project at a total estimated project cost of \$1,679,000, to be financed from building trust funds.

Regent Fish reported the Committee next considered the report on budget needs for maintenance/stores buildings at UW-Green Bay, UW-Oshkosh, and UW-River Falls. He noted the Board had authorized the sum of \$2.6 million for the project, but the Building Commission cut the appropriation back to \$2 million for all three projects. He reported the work will proceed on the development of the budget and concept reports for all three structures; and if the estimates then exceed the previously authorized \$2.6 million, the situation will be reviewed and a decision made whether to proceed with two projects or to request supplemental funds from the Building Commission.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 851: That, upon recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to lease the following property:

Approximately 1,100 square feet of space at 805 South Fifth Street, Milwaukee

L. H. Jay Co., Lessor, 523 W. National Avenue, Milwaukee, Wisconsin

Property at 805 S. 5th St. would be leased on a month-to-month basis beginning September 1, 1974, with cancellation by either party on 90 days written notice.

Regent Fish stated the Committee will meet sometime prior to the next Regent meeting for a full day as was done previously, to thoroughly review the capital budget requests from the campuses. He stated he hoped all the Regents will be able to attend that meeting so that a priority list can be established which will stand up through the Board of Regents and the legislative process. He advised that the date of the special meeting had not yet been selected.

UNFINISHED AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 855: That the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System expresses its appreciation to Justice Roland Day for his dedicated and effective service as a former member of this Board; that the Secretary of the Board be directed to send a letter to Justice Day expressing our appreciation for his contributions to higher education in the State of Wisconsin; and that he be granted Regent Emeritus Status.

Regent DeBardeleben requested that further consideration be given by the Education Committee to the request by the representative of the tourist industry for a change in the starting dates of the academic year. Regent Lavine

assured him that the matter would be considered when the subject is next brought before the Education Committee.

The meeting adjourned at 12:40 P.M.

Contract for Materials and Services, dated July 3, 1974, for the period July 1, 1974 through June 30, 1975, between the State Department of Administration and the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, covering delivery by the Wisconsin State Testing Program of the University to the DOA of 'materials and services required for processing of state applicant and employe data". (Agreement signed by Vice President Lorenz.)
- B. Memorandum Agreement dated June 26, 1974, renewable automatically each year, between the University of Wisconsin center Marathon County, the North Central Technical Institute, and Marathon County, covering management of the Marathon County Center Dormitory. (Agreement signed by Vice President Lorenz.)
- C. A memorandum of agreement between St. Bede's Priory and UW Eau Claire for the use of 53 beds in the Priory Residence Hall has been signed.

 UW Eau Claire will pay \$100 per semester for every contract student living at the Priory. The agreement is in effect for the first and second semesters of the 1974-75 academic year.
- D. Agreement, dated June 26, 1974, between the University of Wisconsin Extension and the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation, concerning Camp Upham Woods food service operation. (Agreement signed by Chancellor Ahlgren.)
- E. Marketing Agreement dated August 1, 1974, effective for a term of five years, between the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System through the University of Wisconsin Extension and Advanced Systems, Incorporated, granting to ASI the sole and exclusive right to market, distribute, and otherwise commercialize four videotaped instructional courses and related course materials throughout the world, for which exclusive license ASI agrees to pay royalties to UW Extension. - H. Station Users Agreement, effective August 5, 1974, for one year, unless sooner terminated, between Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) and Station WHA-TV (licensed to the University of Wisconsin Madison) covering distribution by PBS for broadcast by WHA of certain programs produced by production organizations through a station program cooperative (SPC) administered by PBS. (Agreement signed by Acting Chancellor Strother.)
- I. Agreement dated May 1, 1974, between the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System (Wisconsin Research and Development Center for Cognitive Learning, Madison Campus) and Xerox Corporation, granting Xerox the nonexlusive right to market certain curriculum materials, for which Xerox will pay to the University a royalty of 10% of the net cash receipts from sales of the covered specified items. - M. A memorandum of agreement for use of the Senn Parking Lot, Eleventh Avenue, Menomonie by UW Stout through August 31, 1975, has been signed. The annual cost is \$600.00.

- N. An agreement between the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System and the Presbyterian Student Center Foundation for the use of a 36-stall parking lot by the UW Madison campus has been signed. Located contiguous to the Elvehjem Art Center and the Extension Buildings, the rate for use of this area will be \$4,000 per year plus property tax payment, with funding from parking receipts. The agreement contains a one-year renewal option.

PRESENTATION TO THE BOARD OF REGENTS BY M. R. LACKORE, GENERAL MANAGER, WISCONSIN DELLS REGIONAL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE September 6, 1974

Good morning:

My name is M. R. Lackore. I am General Manager of the Wisconsin Dells Regional Chamber of Commerce, and I am here representing Hospitality Industry, Inc., a federation of Wisconsin Restaurants, Innkeepers, Campgrounds, Attractions, and Regional Travel Associations.

Our two billion dollar industry (2nd largest in Wisconsin) asks your help and cooperation in following Governor Lucey's guidelines for Productivity (better use of our investments without strain on our resources). We ask you not to start the U.W. System until the Monday following Labor Day!!! Our industry together with the Wisconsin Canning Industry use approximately 50,000 college students, teachers, and professors - approximately half of the U.W. enrollment.

We are in the people business and feel we make an excellent partnership with our University. We provide students with on the job practical training of being able to relate to people, to match the University's academic excellence.

Recent news stories emphasize record high costs for fewer students. The present semester system minimizes summer student work periods. And, reduces therefore their needed increased earnings by as much as 10%.

Here are a few specific examples:

1. Stonemanor Supper Club at Lake Geneva has only been open about four months - couldn't serve Jeff Wimmer's party of eight last week, because their student help had left for college.

2. A major gift operation in Fort Dells closed two weeks ago, for lack of help. This gift store was enjoying its greatest season

of volume when it closed.

3. C & C in Fish Creek, a major Supper Club in Door County closed a week before Labor Day week because they could not get help. (Many business locations are so remote, only students will accept employment.)

Your establishing a semester schedule of starting school after Labor Day will enable us to utilize our productivity through Labor Day Week - with a possible 8% - 10% increase in productivity. Students and teachers will be able to maximize their earnings and professors will enjoy a maximum summer vacation season.

And, there are several suggested alternatives by the U.W.'s Professor Fine to accommodate our request for increased productivity!. Thank you for your time and I will be happy to answer any questions.

PRESENTATION TO THE BOARD OF REGENTS BY BUCK MARTIN, EDUCATION COORDINATOR, GREAT LAKES INTER-TRIBAL COUNCIL, INC. September 6, 1974

I would like to thank President Pelisek for the opportunity to address the full Board this morning. As most of you may recall, I spoke briefly with the Board at its October meeting in 1973. At that time, I expressed the desire of Wisconsin's Indian community to open communication with you, so that together we might move forward. In moving forward together we envision for our community two major goals:

- 1. The development of a sound academic program based on the history and culture of the eastern Algonquin, Iroquoin, and Siouan tribes:
- 2. Professional training for our young emerging leadership.

Moving forward together, we envision for the UW System further recognition of its existing integrity and excellence in a wide range of categories.

As I address myself to the previously mentioned goals, objectives, and concerns, I shall reflect on existing efforts—both positive and negative. As I discuss the perceived shortcomings of the existing efforts, I do so in the hopes that, out of frank discussion, some positive, constructive changes occur. As I prepared my comments, I had been cautioned that such open discussion could have a negative effect on our efforts. It is my firm conviction that the integrity of this Board is reflected throughout the UW System and that such warnings will be inconsequential.

Much of the turmoil, social unrest, and violence that has racked this country during the last decade and a half has been the result of gross inequity for many in the educational system. Furthermore, fear of the unknown, misconceptions of people different from yourselves, and a general ignorance of how to approach social problems with sensitivity, added fuel to an already raging inferno.

Observing these conditions, the Indian community here in Wisconsin understands not only the necessity for, but the desirability of, open communication with the general non-Indian community and its state and federal agencies. As we have determined our needs and established our priorities, education has emerged as our number one concern. We see education as the key solution to the many social and economic problems which we face and, therefore, are most encouraged by the commitment of this Board to listen to, and hopefully respond to, the concerns of our community.

The Wisconsin Indian community has as a major goal the establishment of a scholarly academic program within the UW System. As I stated earlier, such a program should emphasize the historical and cultural background of the eastern Algonquin, Iroquoin, and Siouan tribes. So many efforts to develop Indian Studies programs across the nation seem to emphasize the western tribes, totally disregarding the contributions and impact of the eastern tribes. It is only natural that the development of such a program should

reflect our own community's heritage. Furthermore, it is our feeling that the institution of such a program would be the basis for creating mutual understanding among Wisconsin citizenry. We feel that it is generally understood that respect among individuals cannot grow where there is ignorance, and that ignorance cannot be overcome without knowledge. Because the educational systems in Wisconsin obviously are the most important in disseminating knowledge, the burden which they bear while attempting to achieve that mutual understanding and respect is great and awesome. We will share that burden with you.

In addition to developing an academic program, we look to the UW System for professional training for the young. As I stated earlier, such training for our community is essential to the solution of many of the social problems which we face. Essential and most important in meeting this end is the kind of special student supportive services offered to the individual who may be socially, economically, or educationally disadvantaged. I am happy to say that, in this area, the UW System has responded well. We presently have contact with counsellors/advisers of Indian ancestry at the Universities of Wisconsin at Milwaukee, Madison, Oshkosh, Stevens Point, River Falls, Eau Claire, and Green Bay. The dedication with which these Indian counsellors have attacked their responsibilities is the primary reason for tripling the number of Indian students attending post-secondary schools in our state. I think that the rationale for hiring Indian people on the campuses is obvious.

First of all, he is more likely to be able to relate to that particular student. He is going to be much better able to understand the problems of the student. His knowledge of the System will allow him to mold the University around the student as opposed to the student being molded around the University, and perhaps eventual loss of identity and individualism. He also assists in making his educational environment more comfortable for the Indian student when he comes on campus.

The counselor's responsibilities are varied and many. They first must recruit the student, and because of the fine efforts of the Wisconsin Indian Community and the public schools, the Department of Public Instruction, we have been able to increase the number of Indian students in the high schools and keeping them in schools, and eventually sending them on to the University System. We have in the public schools Indian counselors, referred to as home school coordinators, and a close contact between the Indian counselors on campus, the home school coordinators, back in the student's home environment, his family, his community, is very important in keeping the Indian student in the school system. This counselor knows and understands the system thoroughly, including the admissions process, the financial aids process, and he is also advised in the academic advising.

One of the critical concerns for an entering native American student in the UW System is his financial status, and his ability to attend school because he needs the money to go to school. In reading the paper, I believe it was the Milwaukee Journal a couple of days ago, I saw a headline that indicated the concerns of the Board of Regents in the decline in the number of students attending the University, and I believe part of the reason for that was put on the Vocational System. If you were to think of maintaining or increasing the number of Indian students in the UW System, you would have to consider

financial aids. It is our feeling that the Financial Aids Director must be fully sensitive to the needs of the student. Traveling around the state, I have gotten the impression that, over the last year, perhaps our Financial Aids Directors are beginning to put undue burdens on our Indian students — they are giving them loans, when grant monies are available. Of course, many of you are aware of the implications of a person coming from a poor economic background trying to saddle himself with loans over a four-year period. It is unrealistic, it is going to tend to keep these students out of the school system. I think this is one area that we might look at seriously and try to make sure that effort in securing financial aid for the Indian students is maintained at levels previous to this last year.

Unfortunately, two major program efforts at two of the largest schools in the system have been unsuccessful in reaching out and assisting our communities. I speak of the Experimental Program in Higher Education at UW-Milwaukee and the special 5-year program at UW-Madison. Few Indian students are presently benefiting from these programs. Our understanding of these programs has led us to believe that their existence is to aid those students who might be labeled "risk" or "high risk" students. Again, based on our understanding, these kinds of students would be educationally disadvantaged for social, economic, or perhaps cultural reasons, thereby making them eligible for supportive services offered by these programs. These services take the form of tutorial assistance, personal counseling, and academic advising.

After discussion with students in these programs, discussions held with personnel both within the programs and outside of the programs, and finally personal observations from actual experience working in one of the programs, I have come to the following conclusion: these programs are victims of the funding syndrome. In order to continue their existence, the funding source must be convinced of the success of the program. In order to achieve a high success ratio, the high risk student tends not to make it into the program. Instead, students rejected by the University for reasons such as not having had algebra in high school are referred and then accepted into the programs. This type of student has a much higher success rate than the "risk" students. If we are truly dedicated to the philosophy of helping the educationally disadvantaged, it would seem that a low success ratio with "risk" students is much more desirable than a high success ratio with students who in all probability would make it without the assistance of the program.

The importance of student supportive services is obvious when looking for academic success in individuals. With a little personal attention and individual instruction on a tutorial basis, many students will gain the confidence necessary to achieve. This achievement should not, however, be accomplished with the loss of personal identity. Here again the Indian counselors on campus plan an extremely important role. As Indian parents and grandparents watch their youth leave home for university life, feelings of joy and pride are soon replaced with feelings of fear and doubt. This is a critical time in any young persons life. Being away from a familiar environment could possibly lead to students dropping out of school or perhaps lead to a loss of Indianess, a great fear among the more traditional elders. An effective counselor on campus can and frequently has been responsible for assisting the Indian student in maintaining his or her cultural identity.

In addition to hiring Indian counselors on campus, we must look at some additional measures necessary for the future development of our goals. In order to influence and develop change within the system, we legitimately expect the implementation of affirmative action hiring in key positions of policy making, and that such action be conducted with the vigor with which it was conducted for other minorities in this state. We do not see one Indian person on this Board of Regents; we do not see Indian people in Central Administration. Quite frankly, I am unaware of any Indian person in this system above the level of program coordinator or program Director. It is our feeling that Indian people in these kinds of positions could greatly enhance efforts to develop reasonable, sound change. In addition, they could provide badly needed sansitivity in the system for our concerns. I cite the following example as evidence for such a need:

ITEM: There is not one Indian Ph.D. in the UW System.

ITEM: We frequently are told that we must bring qualified candidates for job opportunities.

Keeping these two items in mind, I relate to you the following incident. Several months ago a high position, assistant to the chancellor, became available in the UW System at the UW-Oshkosh. The Indian counselor on campus successfully sought a qualified Indian candidate to apply for that position. The process of selection for this position was duly followed, with the search and screening committee conducting several interviews. We were greatly pleased when that committee chose as its number one selection a Sioux Indian from Minnesota.

The obvious need for sensitivity became evident even before the search and screening committee adjourned after making its decision. Remarks were made, apparently by dissatisfied committee members, that their decision meant nothing in as much as a decision had already been made regarding this position, contrary to their recommendation. Before a final decision by the chancellor was announced, a meeting was held with the chancellor and three members of the Indian community. The purpose of that meeting was to sit down in a calm atmosphere and situation and discuss the individual concerns of the Indian community and how much the position meant to our community.

We discussed the fact that this individual was an extremely rare individual in that there are not many Indian Ph.D.'s in the country nationally. We expressed the concern that if this particular situation was not handled well it could make it extremely difficult for the UW System to attract other qualified native Americans to its doors. There is a very simple reason for that, one that perhaps is not fully understood by the non-Indian community. The fact of the matter is that the moccasin telegraph is probably one of the miracles of this age. Perhaps even outdoing the computer systems. This individual, this highly qualified individual has only to make a few statements to a few of his colleagues and the word spreads throughout Indian country nationally that the UW System is not responsive to our qualified Indian people.

That doesn't say much for our system, if that is the case. Indeed, we are very much concerned about that and the lack of sensitivity in that particular case was further followed up with a meeting approximately a month later.

Because of the financial situation of several students at the UW-Oshkosh, I was requested by some of these students to come down and meet with the Director of Financial Aids for students and an Assistant Chancellor in charge of student affairs. I was very much disappointed in that meeting. We met for two hours, and my feeling was that people in these positions could not, with any degree of sensitivity, handle the concerns of four Indian students and one adult. I was very much concerned with that lack of sensitivity, especially since the previous few weeks had seen a qualified Indian candidate rejected from that campus. It is an extremely bad situation, and has created a feeling perhaps of a lack of confidence within the Indian community of the UW System.

There are other areas in the University System where much is being done. One of the more exciting and positive approaches that the UW System is addressing itself to in the Indian community is at the UW-Milwaukee, where there is a staff and where we presently have subcontracted with the UW-Milwaukee for the establishment of a Wisconsin Native American Language Program. The purpose of this program is to develop materials in Indian languages to be instituted in the public schools on or near Indian reservations in order to allow Indian students to learn their own language. We are very much concerned with one aspect of that program, and it is a program of certification of approximately fourteen participants in this project.

Certification is a very difficult and perhaps touchy situation at the present time. The fourteen consultant participants are receiving academic training in the whole science of linguistics. They are receiving academic training in teaching methodology and educational courses. These people tend to be older people and speakers of their own language. We had hoped that these people could be recognized for their experiences, their expertise, and also recognized for the special training which they are receiving. Unfortunately, the state statutes have made it very difficult for us to certify these people. It is inconceivable to me that the resources available and at the demand of the UW System, that the resources available on demand of other state agencies through the Department of Public Instruction, cannot collectively address this problem and come up with a key solution, or a possible solution to this problem. In any event, I think this kind of a problem again points out the necessity for getting Indian people into the UW System in key and important positions. I shall conclude by reiterating some of our desires and some of our concerns.

- 1. We would like to see established in the UW System a sound scholarly academic program.
- 2. We feel that the University System has responded well in the supportive services area, and we are very happy to have that kind of support from the System, but we cannot rest on our laurels and we must strengthen those systems and make them even more responsive.
- 3. We feel that right now, immediately, by Administrative action, a vigorous campaign for affirmative action hiring within the Central Administration is and can be accomplished now, within the next few months.

I would like to request that each of you as Board members, personally too, if you believe and are firmly committed to the idea, to make your wishes

known to the appropriate people, the Governor of the State, to see to itto request that an Indian be placed on the Board of Regents--the flow of
communication and information will come much more naturally and be much more
effective if that were to happen. I would request that personally. I know
that, as Board members, perhaps you are unable to do that sort of thing; but
as individuals I feel you can. I hope that our efforts to establish cooperative efforts with you will not go unheeded. It is essential that constructive
response from you emerge from your deliberations. The pent up frustration of
energetic youth is easily exploited by non-constructive forces. If you choose
not to respond or for some reason are unable to, I ask your assistance.
Assist me in formulating an answer to our young students for the following
question, "To whom or what do we turn if the system cannot or will not
respond to our concerns."

As an Intern in Central Administration over the last several months, it has been one of my privileges to attend the monthly meetings of the Board of Regents. I have learned a great deal from your meetings, as I have from the entire intern experience. I have found that your decisions are not made in icy isolation from pressures and thought from many sides, and conversely, that you are neither programmed nor predictable. I have gained courage from watching you make difficult decisions, and have come to think that expression of my opinion could make a difference in a small action which may come up again at your September meeting. Whether or not my letter does make a difference to your action, I think you should be complimented by my thinking it might.

Within the developing pattern of firm commitment to affirmative action for women and minorities that I have seen in majority Board action and attitude, and which has pleased and encouraged me tremendously, I was disappointed on 12 July at the variation, the throwback presented by the scorn and laughter which greeted the proposed change of "Chairman" to "Chairperson" and "Vice-Chairman" to "Vice-Chairperson" within Regent Hales' suggestion of terminology change for the officers of the Board.

You may think me over-sensitive, but those of us who began speaking of the inequalities in treatment of women in the University five years ago--in pay, in promotion, in appointments, in expectations--were greeted then with laughter sounding much like that which I heard on Friday, July 12, and while the laughter now reminds me that we have indeed come a long way, it also suggests that we have a way yet to go.

Changes in language which reflect and affect changes in attitude, in thinking, in action, are still needed, I believe, and are not silly. Language is inherently symbolic, and its effect upon our thinking is so basic as to be beyond challenge or full analysis. A change such as that from "Chairman" to "Chairperson" looks slight only when the symbolic and subtle impact of language upon us is ignored or forgotten.

I am fond of drawing parallels between the Black movement which we have seen make enormous, positive changes in our society in ten years, and the women's movement, which is beginning to show positive results. A major source and symbol of positive achievement for Blacks has been, I think, the transformation of a term of historical denigration--"black"--into a term of pride

and positive self-image, through such simple and profound means as promotion of phrases like "Black is Beautiful" and "Black Power." No-one has been more positively educated in this transformation process than whites, who are now aware that terms and principles developed and promoted by a minority group itself have a value for that group not achieved by accepting the labels and principles "laid on" from the majority culture. Whites didn't decide "Negro" would become "Afro-American" or "Black"--Blacks decided they preferred their own choices, and whites are now aware, for the most part, that Blacks are not manipulated objects who can be labeled and forgotten, but full human beings with the same self-pride and need for self-determination as whites have historically prided themselves in.

I am suggesting that what appear to be slight changes in language can have profound symbolic and connotative meaning, that language subtleties can display and affect our true concerns. The change from "Chairman" to "Chairperson," or "Chair" is a small change, but "Chairman" is of course just one of the many male words that English uses to stand for all of humankind, and our consciousness of that one-sided designation of humanity is a step toward eliminating habits of thought which exclude women from consideration and from recorded history.

Even if my arguments as to the importance of this language change do not convince or sway you, I hope you will consider that there are many women, and probably some men, who are sensitive to this question, and that your serious action on it would show an awareness of their sensitivity. It is my conviction that when I can do something which pleases someone else and which does not hurt anyone, including myself, there is no reason, except perhaps stubbornness, or fear of scorn, or ignorance, for my not doing it. A change in language from "Chairman" to "Chairperson" or "Chair," as I prefer, would hurt no-one, and would please and encourage many. I would naturally prefer to see members of the Board laughed at by some who are insensitive, if that were to be the temporary result of your action, than to see members of the Board laughing at those of us who have become sensitive to the cumulative effects of such "small" language habits upon our lives.

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

MEETING OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN BOARD OF REGENTS

The Executive Committee of the University of Wisconsin Board of Regents met on Tuesday, August 13, 1974, at 10:30 A.M. in the conference room of Michael, Best and Friedrich, at 250 E. Wisconsin Avenue, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

The Meeting was called to order by the President of the Board, Frank J. Pelisek. Present: Regent Pelisek, Regent Renk, Regent Fish, Regent LaVine, and Regent Neshek. The President appointed Regent Neshek to serve as Secretary Pro Tem.

The following Resolution was moved by Regent LaVine and seconded by Regent Fish:

Res. "THAT, upon recommendation of the President of the 828: University of Wisconsin System, and the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, the Master of Science in Nursing at UW-Oshkosh is approved for implementation in the fall of 1974 and Resolution 760 of May 10, 1974 is rescinded."

The foregoing Resolution was voted upon and unanimously passed.

The following Resolution was moved by Regent Fish and seconded by Regent LaVine:

- Resol. "THAT, upon the recommendation of the President of the 829: System and the Chancellor of UW-Superior, the program for cross-registration of students among UW-Superior, UM-Duluth, and the College of St. Scholastica, as approved by the Board of Regents on June 9, 1972, be approved for continuation, with the following provisions:
 - (a) That enrollments in any course be dependent upon an available opening in the course, and upon permission of the departmental chairman;
 - (b) That such other procedures and regulations on enrollments and crediting as are consistent with UW-Superior policy and Board policy be observed;
 - (c) That subject to official confirmation by Northland College, this institution shall be included in the cross-registration program;

- (d) That UW-Superior report annually to the Office of Academic Affairs on utilization of the program; and
- (e) That any further changes proposed in procedures resulting use of the program be brought to Central Administration and the Regents for approval prior to implementation."

The foregoing Resolution was voted upon and unanimously passed.

President Pelisek informed the Executive Committee that the next item for consideration was a personnel item, and he recessed the regular meeting to go into closed session.

In closed session, the following Resolution was moved by Regent LaVine and seconded by Regent Renk:

Resol. "THAT, upon recommendation of the President of the Univ-830: ersity of Wisconsin System, Edward B. Fort be appointed Chancellor and Vice Provost of the University of Wisconsin Center System effective October 1, 1974 at an annual salary of \$39,300

The foregoing Resolution was voted upon and unanimously passed.

The Executive Committee then went into open session, and President Pelisek announced to the public that was present that Edward B. Fort was appointed Chancellor and Vice Provost of the University of Wisconsin Center System effective October 1, 1974 at an annual salary of \$39,300.

It was moved by Regent LaVine that the Executive Committee Meeting be adjourned, and the motion was seconded by Regent Renk and unanimously carried.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Resolution 837:

That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Regents affirm the following position concerning education in veterinary Medicine:

- 1. That the state of Wisconsin currently faces (a) a deficit in opportunity for qualified Wisconsin residents seeking education for the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree, and (b) a deficit in veterinary services to the state of Wisconsin, including the availability of practitioners, the availability of continuing education for practitioners, and the availability of diagnostic and clinical referral services.
- 2. That a full response to this current problem will require a major initiative on the part of the state of Wisconsin, involving major investment in one of two viable approaches to the problem:
 - (a) The establishment of a new School of Veterinary Medicine at UW-Madison, with satellite facilities at UW-River Falls, either operating independently or operating as part of a regional plan for strengthening veterinary medical education and service involving at the outset the University of Wisconsin System and the University of Minnesota, or
 - (b) Contracting on a long-term basis for an enlarged number of placement opportunities for qualified Wisconsin residents in an expanded School of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Minnesota, with a concomitant development of expanded programs of continuing education and clinical and referral services in Wisconsin. Such a long-term contract would require an appropriate per student payment by Wisconsin to the University of Minnesota for the educational services provided.
- 3. That the first priority of the University of Wisconsin System is that of maintaining the quality of its present institutions and academic programs. These institutions and programs, serving approximately 135,000 on-campus students, and more than 1,000,000 residents of the state each year, necessarily should have first claim upon state resources available for their maintenance. In this sense, decision to make the investment needed to support either alternative (a) or (b) stated above should be a matter for public policy determination by state government, taken as a particular decision separate from consideration of the biennial budget request of the University of Wisconsin System, and involving possible consideration of identifiable sources of funding.

The Regents further direct that the Central Administration continue discussions with the University of Minnesota pursuant to refinement of the conception of a new School of Veterinary Medicine in Wisconsin as part of a regional development of veterinary medical education, and to further refinement of the contract provisions and the concomitant Wisconsin services needed to make effective long-term contract for educational services in veterinary medicine with the University of Minnesota. Reports on the progress of such discussions should be provided to the Education Committee and the Board at the October and November meetings, and that a final decision be made on the two alternatives no later than January of 1975.

REGENT SOLBERG'S AMENDMENT TO PROPOSED RESOLUTION

Whereas, A full response to this current problem will require a major initiative on the part of the State of Wisconsin, involving major investment in one viable approach to the problem; and

Whereas, The first priority of the University of Wisconsin System is that of maintaining the quality of its present institutions and academic programs. These institutions and programs, serving approximately 135,000 on-campus students, and more than 1,000,000 residents of the state each year, necessarily should have first claim upon state resources available for their maintenance. In this sense, decision to make the investment needed to support the establishment of a School of Veterinary Medicine should be a matter for public policy determination by state government, taken as a particular decision separate from consideration of the biennial budget request of the University of Wisconsin System, and involving possible consideration of identifiable sources of funding;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the Board of Regents recommend the establishment of a new School of Veterinary Medicine at UW-Madison, with satellite facilities at UW-River Falls, either operating independently or operating as part of a regional plan for strengthening veterinary medical education and service involving at the outset the University of Wisconsin System and the University of Minnesota, to be funded in accordance with the above stated funding recommendations.

PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE
Resolution 854:

That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor at UW-Stevens Point and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the President or Vice President and the Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Regents be authorized to grant an easement for street purposes to the City of Stevens Point over the following described lands:

A strip of land located in the NW 1/4 of Section 28, Township 24 North, Range 8 East, Portage County, Wisconsin, being 33 feet on each side of the perpendicular to the following described center-line:

Commencing at the SE corner of the SW 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of said Section 28; Thence NO°00'00" E. 110.56 feet to a point of curvature; Thence northwesterly 660.00 feet along the arc of a curve (radius=1,145.92', central angle = 33°00'00") the chord of which bears N16°30'00"W. to a point of tangency; Thence N33°00'00W. 50.71 feet to a point of curvature; Thence northwesterly 610.00 feet along the arc of a curve (radius = 1,145.92', central angle = 30°30'00") the chord of which bears N17°45'00"W. to a point of tangency; Thence N2°30'00"W. 135.21 feet to a point of curvature; Thence northwesterly 778.32 feet along the arc of a curve (radius = 1,432.39', central angel = 31°07'58") the chord of which bears N18°03'59"W. to a point of tangency; Thence N.33°37'58"W. 453.55 feet the south right-of-way line of Northpoint Drive and there terminating.

The sides of said strip shall extend and shorten as required to ensure continuity.

The granting of such easement is contingent upon an agreement between the University and the City of Stevens Point that upon completion of the new roadway, the City will vacate the existing segment of Reserve Street between Maria Drive and Northpoint Drive which will permit the University to obtain that land for its purposes.

Held in Room 213, Socio-Ecology Bldg., UW-Green Bay Friday, September 6, 1974, 9:02 A.M.

President Pelisek presiding.

PRESENT: Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Dixon, Fish, Hales, Kopp, Lavine, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Renk, Sandin, Solberg, Thompson, Williams, and Zancanaro.

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ABSENT: None.

Upon motion my Regent Lavine, seconded by Regent Kopp, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on July 12, 1974, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

A. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

1. President Pelisek introduced Mr. M. R. Lackore, General Manager of the Wisconsin Dells Regional Chamber of Commerce, representing Hospitality Industry Inc., a federation of Wisconsin restaurants, innkeepers, campground attractions, and regional travel associations. Mr. Lackore's remarks are attached as <u>EXHIBIT B</u>.

2. President Pelisek introduced Mr. Buck Martin, Education Coordinator, Great Lakes Inter-tribal Council, Inc., Mr. Martin's remarks are attached as EXHIBIT C.

Regent DeBardeleben requested that the above statement be referred to the Education Committee for such action as it sees fit to take, with respect to inviting response from the Administration.

- 3. President Pelisek welcomed Regent Arthur DeBardeleben to the Board, and stated for the record that Regent DeBardeleben had been appointed a member of the Business and Finance Committee.
- 4. President Pelisek noted that the Regent representatives on the Higher Educational Aids Board had reported the actions of that Board at their meeting held on August 23, 1974 in a memorandum dated August 27, 1974.
- 5. President Pelisek stated that all Regents had received a memo from him indicating he had referred to the Central Administration a proposal from the United Council of Student Governments relating to interpretation of Section 39.06(5)--Student Rights and Responsibilities, a section of the Merger Bill; and that it had been anticipated, at that time, the statement would be the subject of action today. He stated the response from Central Administration and the Chancellors and various other interested constituencies within the University is not in a form for presentation and discussion; and therefore, the matter will come before the Board during his report at the October meeting.

President Pelisek cautioned the Chancellors that he was certain the Board anticipates the formation of joint student-faculty committees and other committees involving student affairs during the forthcoming school year, many of which will be formed within the next month. He continued the Board anticipates our administrative personnel will comply with both the letter and the spirit of Section 39.06(5); and that any deviation from the spirit of that provision, regardless of our action on the proposed guidelines under that section, will be looked upon with substantial displeasure by the members of the Board, because compliance is expected with the provisions of the Statutes.

6. President Pelisek stated that, at the last meeting, an amendment to the By-Laws of the Board of Regents offered by Regent Hales, renaming the office of President and Vice President, was deferred pending an opinion from the Attorney General. The opinion has been received and indicates quite clearly that the Wisconsin Statutes indicate that the officers of the Board shall be President, Vice President, and Secretary; and that, accordingly, Regent Hales has withdrawn his motion.

President Pelisek called the Board's attention to the fact that our By-Laws do refer to our committee leadership as "Chairman", and it might well be appropriate for the Board to consider altering these designations to either "Chair" or "Chairperson", as suggested by a very articulate memorandum from one of our staff people.

Regent Barkla requested that the above referred to memorandum, by Ms. Carolyn Sylvander, be made a part of the record (<u>EXHIBIT D</u> attached). President Pelisek stated that the proper notice will be included in the notice of the next meeting to provide for an amendment to the By-Laws to change the committee leadership from "Chairman" to either "Chairperson" or "Chair."

- 7. President Pelisek stated that he would furnish a written policy for determining individual presentations to the Committees and the Board.
- 8. President Pelisek reported that the Special Regent Committee on Medical Affairs had met and unanimously approved the resolutions relating to the affiliation of the UW-Madison Center for Health Sciences with the Waukesha Memorial Hospital, and the authorization for UW-Milwaukee and UW-Madison to join the Medical Center of Southeastern Wisconsin as a community member and an affiliate member, respectively.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Renk, and it was voted:

Resolution 824: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System and the Chancellor of the UW-Madison, the Center for Health Sciences at UW-Madison be authorized to begin affiliation negotiations with Waukesha Memorial Hospital.

Regent McNamara moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

- Resolution 825: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System and the respective Chancellors of the UW-Milwaukee and the UW-Madison, the UW-Milwaukee and the UW-Madison be authorized to join the Medical Center of Southeastern Wisconsin as a Community Member and an Affiliate Member, respectively; and the President of the Board of Regents be authorized to designate a member of the Board to serve on the Medical Center Council as provided in the Constitution and By-Laws of that organization.
- 9. President Pelisek stated the Medical Affairs Committee heard a presentation from the Health Sciences staff regarding the Clinical Practice Plan. He noted the medical faculty has had under consideration for some time substantial modifications in the plan, and the plan has been submitted to the faculty in modified form. He noted it had been adopted; and within the next month, a memorandum detailing the current provisions of the revised plan and indicating the variances between the revised plan and the present consultation practice plan will be distributed to members of the Board. We will be asked to act upon the revised plan at the next meeting.
- B. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM
- 1. President Weaver presented the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record.

Regent Kopp moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

- Resolution 826: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record (EXHIBIT A on file), be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed.
- 2. A slide-tape presentation relating to the mission and progress of the UW-Green Bay campus was presented.
- 3. Regent Kopp moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 827: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the request of Chancellor Ullsvik of UW-Platteville to be relieved of his Chancellor duties effective at the end of the 1975 summer session be accepted, and the President of the System authorized to initiate the process of selecting a successor.

President Weaver stated that, with the authorization of the Board, he will ask Senior Vice President Smith to proceed promptly to seek appropriate nominees in the usual way for membership on a Search and Screen Committee, and he requested the President of the Board to appoint from Board membership the appropriate Regent Committee that would be ultimately involved in the final stages of that search.

- 4. President Weaver expressed the appreciation of the Administration and the members of the Board for the loyal and effective service of John Meggers as Acting Chancellor of the Center System for the past year.
- 5. President Weaver reported that he had in the past year been meeting with the members of the Intercampus Faculty Consultative Council on an average of about once per month, and that he proposed to continue the meetings during the coming year. President Weaver emphasized the fact that participation by any campus or individual is entirely voluntary, and that the IFCC will not act as an agency of faculty governance. No votes will be taken, and the program is designed simply to give regularity to communication efforts between the faculties and officers of Central Administration.

C. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

1. President Pelisek reported that the Executive Committee met on August 13, 1974 to consider Resolutions 828, 829, and 830 included in EXHIBIT E attached.

Regent Kopp moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 831: That the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on August 13, 1974, including the actions taken therein (EXHIBIT E attached), be ratified and confirmed.

D. REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

- 1. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Dixon, and it was voted:
- Resolution 832: That the personnel actions taken by the President of the University of Wisconsin System under Resolution #556, since those approved by the Regents on July 12, 1974, be approved.
- 2. Regent Lavine stated the next item on the committee agenda had been a report on the activities on the UW-Green Bay campus of the Campus Committee on the Status of Minorities, a committee having representation by teaching faculty, non-teaching academic staff, and classified personnel.

Regent Lavine reported that the Committee had next reviewed the operational procedures proposed for the conduct of Education Committee meetings, with particular reference to the manner of receiving presentations made by persons appearing before the Committee.

Regent Lavine stated the Committee next considered <u>Guidelines for Professional Improvement and Terminal Leave</u>, which had been distributed prior to the meeting.

- 3. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:
- Resolution 833: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of the UW-Madison, the document entitled, "Financial Guidelines for Affiliation", proposed by the Center for Health Sciences and the UW-Madison Campus, be approved.
- 4. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

- Resolution 834: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor of the UW-Milwaukee and the President of the UW System, the Regents receive and approve the report from the UW-Milwaukee on plans for cross registration for graduate studies between UW-Milwaukee and the Medical College of Wisconsin. This approval assumes a report from UW-Milwaukee at the April, 1975 meeting of the Board on the results of the operation of the current cross registration agreement, together with proposals for continuing or modifying the agreement.
- 5. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolutions, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:
- Resolution 835: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, the July 19, 1974 report of the UW-VTAE Joint Administrative Committee on Academic Programs entitled, "Guidelines Defining Occupational' Programs", be accepted.
- Resolution 836: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellors of UW-Eau Claire, UW-Oshkosh, and the University Center System, the following footnote be added to pages 9, 10, 13, and 23 of the publication entitled, Mission, University of Wisconsin System, 1974:

"The term occupational as used in this mission statement connotes programs/degrees designed as professional or nonspecialized curricular units which are not intended to lead to terminal two-year degrees in semiskilled, skilled, or semiprofessional areas."

- 6. Regent Lavine reported that the Education Committee had next considered the report of the UW System Engineering Task Force, copies of which had been sent all members of the Committee in advance of the meeting.
- 7. Regent Lavine reported the Committee had next considered the draft statement, dated August 26, 1974, of a proposed system policy on Student Evaluation of Instruction. He noted that, after discussion by the Committee, the draft statement is to be available for discussion on the various campuses, including faculty and student organizations, prior to September 20. A final policy statement, based on the processes of the consultation

will be brought to the Regents for action at the October meeting of the Board.

- 8. Regent Lavine reported the Committee next considered a report on the UW-Stout Vocational Rehabilitation Program to Train Counselors for Alcoholics. It was suggested that Chancellor Swanson confer with Senior Vice President Smith regarding the inclusion of the program in the budget recommendations to come to the Regents in the subsequent months.
- 9. Regent Lavine reported that, in the Committee meeting on the previous day, there had been extensive discussion of the Analysis Paper--Recommendations on Veterinary Medicine Program for Wisconsin. Regent Renk had expressed disappointment that the Committee was not making a definite recommendation and indicated his support of the establishment of a new school of Veterinary Medicine at UW-Madison with satellite facilities at UW-River Falls. Dr. William J. O'Rourke, Executive Secretary, Wisconsin Veterinary Medicine Association, spoke in support of Regent Renk's position.

Presentations were also made by Regent Dixon, Senior Vice President Smith, President Weaver, Regent Kopp, and Professor B. C. Easterday of the Department of Veterinary Science. The proposed agreement was amended by adding to the end of the proposed resolution the words "and that a final decision be made on the two alternatives no later than January 1975." In the Committee meeting, the proposed resolution, as revised above, was approved, with Regent Kopp voting "No".

Regent Dixon moved adoption of Resolution 837, relating to Veterinary Medicine (EXHIBIT F attached), and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin.

Regent Solberg moved that the resolution be amended as shown in $\underline{\text{EXHIBIT}}$ $\underline{\text{G}}$ attached, and the motion was seconded by Regent Kopp.

After extended discussion, the proposed amendment failed on a roll call vote, with Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Dixon, Fish, Hales, Lavine, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Thompson, and Zancanaro voting "No" (12), and with Regents Kopp, Renk, Solberg, and Williams voting "Aye" (4).

President Pelisek stated that this issue was of such magnitude to this Board and to the State of Wisconsin that it would be worthy of considering, as a sole item for discussion and action, at the January meeting. He contemplated that, as President of the Board, if the proposed resolution as revised is approved, the item will be scheduled as a sole item, unless there are other necessary actions to be taken in January. It was also contemplated that the issue can be debated from the morning until conclusion, with the hope that not only will the interested groups appear, but

also with the hope that interested representatives of State Government will appear, as well as Legislators and others, so that the full Board may have every opportunity to debate, weigh, and consider this very, very vital and important issue to the citizens of this state.

The question was put on Resolution 837, and it was voted, with Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Dixon, Fish, Hales, Kopp, Lavine, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Thompson, Williams, and Zancanaro voting "Aye" (14), and with Regents Renk and Solberg voting "No"(2).

Regent Kopp stated for the record that he was voting "Yes" only because that was the only alternative to doing nothing, and also that he felt the discussions highlighted the problems.

Regent Renk stated that he voted "No", not because he was opposed to Veterinary Medicine, but because he opposed the delay.

10. Regent Lavine reported that, in Executive Session of the Committee meeting, authorization was granted to recruit a Professor of Pathology in the Medical School at the UW-Madison who will also have the title of Department Chairman, and to recruit for Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences at the UW-Eau Claire.

(The meeting recessed at 11:55 A.M., and reconvened at 12:12 P.M., with all Regents present.)

E. REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Neshek.

1. Regent Neshek reported the Business and Finance Committee met on the previous day, with all Regents present except Regents Thompson and Zancanaro. The purpose of the joint session was to consider a series of six biennial budget policy papers. He noted that the resolutions had been approved by all Regents on the previous day.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolutions, the motion was seconded by Regent Renk, and it was voted:

Resolution 838: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the Statement of Major Biennial Policy Issues and Contributing Problems, as outlined in Biennial Budget Policy Paper 2.0, be adopted and approved.

(MORE)

- Resolution 839: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, Central Administration prepare the 1975-77 biennial budget recommendations for Regent consideration guided by the priorities outlined in 1975-77 Biennial Operating Budget Policy Paper #3.0, dated September 1974.
- Resolution 840: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the Regents direct Central Administration to prepare for its consideration in October:
 - 1. A detailed rationale and arguments in support of Alternative D.1, of 1975-77 Biennial Operating Budget Policy Paper #4.0, dated September 1974, including a fiscal note; and
 - 2. A similar analysis of the implications of the other Alternatives under D.
- Resolution 841: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the Central Administration be asked to prepare for Board consideration in October a two-step approach for base and formulary funding for 1975-77:
 - 1. A refinement of the existing formula methodology, correcting some of the existing defects to serve as an interim procedure.
 - 2. A major modification along the lines outlined in C.2 in 1975-77 Biennial Budget Policy Paper #5.0, dated September 1974, including an example of how it would operate on a campus, and plan to facilitate this major pilot testing at two or more campuses within the University System during 1975-77.
- Resolution 842: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, Central Administration be directed to return to the October meeting of the Board with a decision item identifying the budget supplement necessary to offset past and projected inflation through 1976-77 based on the methodology outlined in 1975-77 Biennial Operating Budget Policy Paper #6.0, dated September 1974.
- Resolution 843: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, Central Administration include 1975-77 Biennial Operating Budget Policy Paper #7.0, dated September 1974, as the narrative System response to the Governor's 1975-77 productivity guidelines.

- 2. Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:
- Resolution 844: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts and grants listed in the Statement of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting), be accepted, and the appropriate officers of the University be authorized to sign the agreements; and that the federal contracts listed therein be approved, ratified, and confirmed.
- 3. Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:
- Resolution 845: That, upon recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor, the Revised Memorandum of Agreement between the University of Wisconsin Foundation and the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, relating to the Robert Beyer Professorship in Managerial Accounting and Control in the Graduate School of Business of the UW-Madison, and to the solicitation of funds therefore, be approved; and that the President and the Secretary be authorized to sign the Memorandum of Agreement.
- 4. Regent Neshek reported the late Martin C. Olson left the residue of his estate, estimated at \$50,000, to the University of Wisconsin to be used for the support of scholarships on the Madison Campus.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Renk, and it was voted:

Resolution 846: That the bequest of the late Martin C. Olson, Schenectady, New York, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Martin C. Olson, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Neshek stated that, during his lifetime, Mr. Garvin Williams contributed \$7,000 to the UW-Madison for research in McArdle Memorial Laboratory and in his Will directed that an additional \$3,000 be made available to the University to bring his total contribution to \$10,000.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 847: That the bequest of the late Garvin D. Williams, Randolph, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Garvin D. Williams, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

F. REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Fish.

- 1. Regent Fish reported that, in the Committee meeting on the previous day, the Committee considered the request for Regent reaction to facility needs at the UW Center-Waukesha County. It was agreed the community should proceed with the planning under the previous guidelines and then submit a request for consideration by the Regents.
- 2. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:
- Resolution 848: That, upon recommendation of the UW-Green Bay Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report be approved and authority be granted to prepare final plans, bid and construct the University Union Building at UW-Green, Bay at a total estimated project cost of \$1,321,305, which is to be financed from self-amortizing funds-\$421,305 from accumulated surpluses and \$900,000 from self-amortizing supported bonding authority.

- 3. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:
- Resolution 849: That, upon recommendation of the UW-River Falls Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report for the Physical Science Building at UW-River Falls be approved and authority be granted for the preparation of final plans, bidding and construction at a total project cost not to exceed \$3,000,000.
- 4. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:
- Resolution 850: That, upon recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report be approved and authority be granted to prepare final plans, bid and construct the Bascom Hall-Commerce Building Remodeling project at a total estimated project cost of \$1,679,000, to be financed from building trust funds.
- 5. Regent Fish reported the Committee next considered the report on budget needs for maintenance/stores buildings at UW-Green Bay, UW-Oshkosh, and UW-River Falls. He noted the Board had authorized the sum of \$2.6 million for the project, but the Building Commission cut the appropriation back to \$2 million for all three projects. He reported the work will proceed on the development of the budget and concept reports for all three structures; and if the estimates then exceed the previously authorized \$2.6 million, the situation will be reviewed and a decision made whether to proceed with two projects or to request supplemental funds from the Building Commission.
- 6. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:
- Resolution 851: That, upon recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to lease the following property:

Approximately 1,100 square feet of space at 805 South Fifth Street, Milwaukee

(MORE)

L. H. Jay Co., Lessor, 523 W. National Avenue, Milwaukee, Wisconsin

Property at 805 S. 5th St. would be leased on a monthto-month basis beginning September 1, 1974, with cancellation by either party on 90 days written notice.

This property will be used primarily for counseling and administrative services. The proposed lease represents a reduction from 1,735 square feet to 1,100 square feet and a reduction in the least cost from \$325 per month to \$200 per month. The reduction is due to a shift in the classroom space from this location to St. Anthony's Congregation at 1747 S. 9th St. Rent payments will be from General Purpose Revenue funds.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 852: That, upon recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to lease the following property:

Approximately 3,502 square feet of space at St. Anthony's School, 1747 S. Ninth Street, Milwaukee

St. Anthony's Congregation, Lessor, St. Anthony's Rectory, 1711 S. Ninth St., Milwaukee, Wis. 53204

Property at 1747 S. 9th St. would be leased from September 1, 1974 through May 31, 1975, with four annual renewal options. The total cost of the lease is \$4,554 or a per square foot rate of \$1.30 for the nine-month period of the lease.

(This space will be used as the classroom area for the southside Spanish-Speaking Outreach Institute. It represents an increase from 2,700 to 3,502 square feet of space. In January 1974, the Board initially entered into a lease of the 2,700 square feet for the period January 14, 1974 through May 18, 1974 at a total cost of \$1,170.)

7. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 853: That, upon recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to lease the following property:

3,592 square feet of space in a building at 2243 North Prospect Avenue, Milwaukee, Wisconsin

Ivanhoe Medical Center, Lessor, 2243 North Prospect Avenue, Milwaukee, Wisconsin

October 1, 1974 through June 30, 1975 - \$18,704 per annum. No renewal options

(Space to be used by the Department of Family Medicine and Practice, UW Medical School, for its Family Practice Program--Model Family Practice Unit. Rent payments from a federal grant and clinic practice funds.)

- 8. Regent Fish moved adoption of Resolution 854, relating to an easement for street purposes at the UW-Stevens Point (EXHIBIT H attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted.
- 9. Regent Fish stated the Committee will meet sometime prior to the next Regent meeting for a full day as was done previously, to thoroughly review the capital budget requests from the campuses. He stated he hoped all the Regents will be able to attend that meeting so that a priority list can be established which will stand up through the Board of Regents and the legislative process. He advised that the date of the special meeting had not yet been selected.
- G. UNFINISHED AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS
- 1. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:
- Resolution 855: That the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System expresses its appreciation to Justice Roland Day for his dedicated and effective service as a former member of this Board; that the Secretary of the Board

be directed to send a letter to Justice Day expressing our appreciation for his contributions to higher education in the State of Wisconsin; and that he be granted Regent Emeritus status.

2. Regent DeBardeleben requested that further consideration be given by the Education Committee to the request by the representative of the tourist industry for a change in the starting dates of the academic year. Regent Lavine assured him that the matter would be considered when the subject is next brought before the Education Committee.
