REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

Madison, Wisconsin

Held in the President's Office

Saturday, March 12, 1955, 10 A.M.

President Werner presiding

PRESENT: Regents Gelatt, Jones, Laird, Renk, Rennebohm, Wanvig, Watson, Werner. (Regent Rennebohm was present beginning at 10:25 A.M.)

ABSENT: Regents Arveson, Steiger.

Regent Steiger was present for committee meetings on March 11.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on February 12, 1955, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

Vice President Peterson presented the report of the Vice President of Business and Finance.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the Reports of Actions Taken numbered I and II listed under the Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT D attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the Report of Actions Taken numbered III listed under the Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT D attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

The Vice President of Business and Finance presented the report of b

transfers for February, 1955, for the information of the Regents. (See Exhibit C appended to EXHIBIT D, attached)

Regent Gelatt presented the report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be adopted:

- 1. That the resignation of Walter F. Naumann, associate professor of German, be accepted; to take effect February 25, 1955.
- 2. That Walter E. Sullivan, professor of anatomy, be granted leave of absence for the fiscal year 1955-56, without pay.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Laird, it was VOTED, That George L. Mosse be appointed associate professor of history, beginning with the academic year 1955-56; salary \$7,250 on the academic basis; charge to the 1955-56 budget.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Laird, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Administrative Committee, the stipends for graduate teaching assistants, research assistants, fellows and scholars be increased beginning in 1955-56 on the basis of the equivalent full time rates as listed below:

(Most graduate assistants are appointed for half-time or less, and consequently will receive one-half or less of the above noted equivalent full-time rates.)

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Director of the Summer Session, the High School Summer Music Clinic fee be increased from \$20.00 to \$30.00, beginning with the Summer of 1955.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Laird, it was VOTED, That the bequest by the late Professor Emeritus Richard Fischer of Madison, Wisconsin, to establish a scholarship fund, the income from which is to be used to provide a scholarship in Chemistry, be accepted by The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Richard Fischer, Deceased; and that the Secretary be authorized to accept and sign receipts for this bequest in the name of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, and do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Dean of the College of Agriculture, the Fresident of the University be authorized to sign a memorandum of understanding between the University of Wisconsin and the United States Department of Agriculture on Cooperative Extension Work in Agriculture and Home Economics to replace the memorandum of understanding executed on July 17, 1914.

Regent Jones presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, and subject to the approval of the State Chief Engineer and of the State Architect, the final plans and specifications for the Birge Hall Addition be approved, and authority be granted to advertise for bids.

Regent Jones presented the recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee to the Regents for the adoption of resolutions relating to the construction, financing, schedules of costs, and award of contracts for two Modest Rental Dormitories (See EXHIBIT E attached). Vice President Peterson explained the content and the purpose of these resolutions. He reported that the cost per student housed for each of these units was approximately \$2400 for the men's unit, and approximately

\$3500 for the women's unit; and that it was estimated that for the men's unit, in which dining facilities are not provided, the students would be charged a rental of \$5.00 per week, and that the charge in the women's unit would be \$500 per student per school year for room and board. Regent Jones moved the adoption of the recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee covering the adoption of resolutions relating to the construction, financing, schedules of costs, and award of contracts for two Modest Rental Dormitories (EXHIBIT E attached). The motion was seconded by Regent Renk and it was voted unanimously.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the following schedule of costs for the construction of the Soils Greenhouses be approved:

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That, subject to the approval of the State Chief Engineer and the Governor, a contract in the amount of \$25,861 be awarded to Sam Thut, Madison, Wisconsin, for constructing the Charter Street Sewers; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contract.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the State Chief Engineer, and the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, and subject to the approval of the Governor, a contract for waterproofing and restoration of various sections of the exterior walls of the Memorial Union Building be awarded to the A. C. Horn Corporation, Minneapolis, Minnesota, in the amount of \$5,649.00, and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contract. (Chargeable to the 5-D Memorial Union Revolving Fund)

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That, subject to the approval of the Governor and the State Chief Engineer, the contract for remodelling the Superintendent's residence at the Spooner Branch Experiment Station be awarded to the Spooner Concrete Products, Gilbert Durand, Proprietor, Spooner, Wisconsin, for the sum of \$4671.89 and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contract; and that the following schedule of costs be approved:

chargeable to the allotment of \$8400 for the Spooner Station from the appropriation of \$75,000 made by the State Building Commission on July 27, 1954.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the Regents of the University of Wisconsin go on record as favoring legislation providing for the payment of elementary and high school tuition by the State of every person of school age residing at State institutions or upon tax-exempt lands belonging to the State similar to the proposed legislation embodied in Bill No. 323,S introduced in the 1949 session of the Wisconsin Legislature, and legislation providing for payment by the State for debt services for elementary and high school purposes on account of such persons, and that this view-

point of the Regents be communicated to the appropriate Committees of the 1955 Legislature, and also that the Regents request the Legislative Council to study the several problems relating to tax-free lands and bring a solution to the 1957 Legislature for consideration at that time.

With reference to the above action, Regent Jones stated that this subject had been before the Board a number of times and relates to the question of who should pay the cost of educating boys and girls who reside on state-owned property. He stated that this action embodied, in substance, a similar action voted by the Regents in 1949.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS under his will, Howard L. Smith, Deceased, created a trust during the lifetime of his widow, Josephine Smith, and on her death gave the residue of his estate to The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, after paying or providing for certain annuities to Genevieve Mayer and Dorothy Jones and

WHEREAS Josephine Smith is now deceased and it is the desire of the undersigned, The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, to have such trust terminated and the trust estate delivered to them and

WHEREAS The First National Bank of Madison, Trustee under the will of Howard L. Smith, has not received a final clearance on account of its Federal and State Income Tax Returns and the said Trustee desires that it be saved harmless on account of any deficiency which may hereafter be assessed on account of either of the said taxes.

COMES NOW the undersigned and undertakes and agrees that if the Trust Estate is now terminated and the residue thereof delivered to the undersigned before final releases are obtained on account of such taxes, it will save The First National Bank of Madison, individually and as such Trustee, harmless of any liability on account of any deficiency which may be assessed or levied; the undersigned to be advised and consulted with before any deficiency which may be assessed or levied is paid,

The Secretary reported that the Regents were to have dinner with the members of the Board of Visitors at the time of the April Regent meeting, which is scheduled for April 9, 1955, and that, because April 8 is Good Friday, a better attendance of both Regents and members of the Board of Visitors might be obtained if the April Regent meeting was postponed to April 16. Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Laird, it was

VOTED, That the by-laws be suspended, and that the next meeting of the Re-

gents, scheduled for April 9, 1955, be postponed to April 16, 1955.

President Werner extended an invitation to the Regents to hold their July meeting at Sheboygan. Upon motion of Regent Wanvig, seconded by Regent Watson, it was

VOTED, That the by-laws be suspended, and that the place of the Regent meeting, scheduled for July 9, 1955, be changed from Madison to Sheboygan.

The Secretary reported that the Governor has appointed Mr. S. E. Ogle, of Milwaukee, as a member of the Board of Visitors for the term ending July 1, 1958.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 36.34(4), Wisconsin Statutes of 1953, the Secretary reported, for filing as a matter of record in the minutes of this meeting, the formal Action No. 1 of the Regents in executive session on February 11, 1955, relating to the purchase of agricultural lands (EXHIBIT F attached).

The Secretary read, as a matter of interest to the Regents, a copy of a resolution relating to Dr. William S. Middleton, which had been unanimously adopted by the Council of the State Medical Society of Wisconsin, and which had been presented to the Council by Dr. R. G. Arveson, Chairman of the Council. Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Jones, it was

VOTED, That the resolution relating to Dr. William S. Middleton, adopted by the Council of the State Medical Society of Wisconsin, be made a matter of record in the minutes of this meeting (EXHIBIT G attached).

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Renk, recommendation No. 1 listed under Degrees was adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the gifts and grants listed in <u>EXHIBIT A</u>, attached, be accepted; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreements.

ACTIONS BY THE PRESIDENT Since the February 12, 1955, Meeting of the Board of Regents (EXHIBIT B attached)

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That resignations and terminations on pages 1 to 3, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That appointments on pages 3 to 10, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Wanvig, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That increases in salary or appointment and decreases in salary or appointment on pages 10 and 11, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That changes in title and resignations to accept other U.W. appointments on pages 11 and 12, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

The above actions by the President, taken since the February 12, 1955, meeting of the Board and approved by the Regents in the foregoing resolutions, are made a part of the records of this meeting.

President Fred announced a generous and unusual gift from the American Jewish Tercentenary Committee of Wisconsin and the Milwaukee Chapter of the American Jewish Committee, through the University of Wisconsin Foundation, for the establishment of a Chair in Hebrew Studies at the University of Wisconsin. He introduced Mr. Norman S. Abrahams, Mr. Oscar A. Rozoff and Rabbi Joseph L. Baron, representing the donors. Rabbi Baron read a statement, addressed to the Regents, describing the purpose and terms of the gift of \$75,000 for the support of a Chair in Hebrew Studies for a period of five years; and Rabbi Baron presented to the Honorable Oscar Rennebohm, representing the University of Wisconsin Foundation, a check for the initial contribution to this fund.

Regent Rennebohm accepted the gift on behalf of the University of Wisconsin Foundation, expressed the gratitude of the Foundation, and moved the adoption of the following resolution by the Regents:

That the gift, presented by Rabbi Baron for the American Jewish Tercentenary Committee of Wisconsin and the Milwaukee Chapter of the American Jewish Committee, be accepted from the University of Wisconsin Foundation; and that this Board go on record with a vote of thanks to those who have contributed to the fund, the organizations which sponsor it, and to those who here present it.

Regent Gelatt stated that he was very happy and honored to second the motion for the acceptance of this generous gift; and the resolution was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

President Werner accepted, on behalf of the Regents, the check of the University of Wisconsin Foundation presented by the Honorable Oscar Rennebohm, and expressed the appreciation of the Regents for the gift from the American Jewish Tercentenary Committee of Wisconsin and the Milwaukee Chapter of the American Jewish Committee. (Copies of the statements by President Fred, Rabbi Baron, Regent Rennebohm and President Werner are filed with the records of this meeting.)

Regent Watson reported that there was continued activity and progress being made by the Special Regent Committee on the Education Deanship.

Regent Renk, on behalf of the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Lands, reported that the required formal actions by the Regents and the State Building Commission for the purchase of 468 acres of land in the Arlington area have been completed, and that negotiations were almost completed for the purchase of an additional 457 acres. He expressed displeasure at the news report of a suggestion to utilize \$2,000,000 of the proceeds from the sale of the University Hill Farms for other state purposes; and pointed out that there was no certainty as to the amount that would be realized from the sale of the Hill Farms; that a long time would be required for the sale of all of the Hill Farm area as well as for the purchase of additional farm land from time to time until the total of approximately 2500 acres is acquired. He also suggested that any funds from the sale of the University Hill Farms, in excess of those required for the purchase of new agricultural lands and the construction of buildings on them, should be used for building and research purposes on the agricultural campus.

President Werner, on behalf of the Special Regent Committee appointed by the Board to work with the Governor and members of the Legislature in the consideration of any proposed legislation relating to problems of public higher education, reported that the Special Regent Committee had met on February 17, 1955, with the Governor, the chairmen and some of the members of the Education Committees of the Legislature, and members of the University staff, for the purpose of discussing the provision of the proposed bill by the Governor for the coordination of public higher education in Wisconsin. He reported that, following the meeting with the Governor, this Special Regent Committee adopted a statement, which was also approved by Regents Rennebohm and Renk who were also present, for release upon introduction in the Legislature of the Governor's proposed bill on coordination of higher education (See statement "Position of the University on Coordination of Public Higher Education in Wisconsin" dated February 18, 1955, attached as EXHIBIT H). Regent Gelatt, on behalf of the Special Regent Committee, moved approval of the statement "Position of the University on Coordination of Public Higher Education in Wisconsin" dated February 18, 1955. The motion was seconded by Regent Renk.

Regent Wanvig stated that the Regents were aware that he appeared at the public hearing on Bill 279,S and had stated that he was in complete disagreement with the statement dated February 18, 1955, and that he would have to vote against the motion.

A called vote was taken - Regents Gelatt, Jones, Laird, Renk, Rennebohm, Werner voting "Aye"; Regents Wanvig and Watson voting "No". The motion was declared carried. The Secretary reported that Regent Steiger had requested that the records show that he was in favor of the approval of the statement dated February 18, 1955.

Regent Renk moved the adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regents Jones and Rennebohm:

That the Regents go on record as favoring Substitute Amendment 1,S to Bill 279,S, which incorporates the substance of the intent expressed in the statement of the Regents dated February 18, 1955, on the "Position of the University on Coordination of Public Higher Education in Wisconsin".

Regent Watson expressed his opposition to the motion, pointing out that, under the substitute amendment, no board was finally responsible for anything, and that either board could veto the actions of the other, with the resulting impasse preventing appropriations by the Legislature for buildings and operations for the University and the State Colleges. He also pointed out that the substitute amendment unrealistically provides for far-reaching decisions of great importance to be reached between the passage of the substitute amendment and January 1, 1956. He stated that he did not believe that the intent of the substitute amendment would be accomplished. He also pointed out the ambiguity, with reference to the courses of study to be provided by the proposed, merged Milwaukee institution, as between the provisions in Bill 279,S, in the Regent statement dated February 18, 1955, and in the Substitute Amendment 1,S to Bill 279,S.

Regent Wanvig said that he had stated his position at the public hearing on Bill 279,S, and that he was opposed to Substitute Amendment 1,S. He indicated that, although some minor changes might be desirable in Bill 279,S, he was completely in accord with that bill, and entirely opposed to the substitute amendment, and would have to vote against it.

Regent Renk indicated that he favored the substitute amendment, because it would solve the Milwaukee situation on the basis of a specific determination by the Legislature rather than leaving the possibility of three alternative solutions for the Milwaukee situation as would be possible under Bill 279,S.

Regent Werner stated that he believed that the action of the University faculty in unanimously opposing Bill 279,S was the greatest single reason for opposing the bill, because of the sincerity of the spirit and interest of the faculty in working for the good of the University.

A called vote was taken on the motion to approve Substitute Amendment 1,S to Bill 279,S - Regents Gelatt, Jones, Laird, Renk, Rennebohm, Werner voting "Aye"; Regents Wanvig and Watson voting "No". The motion was declared carried. The Secretary reported that Regent Steiger had requested that the records show that he was in favor of Substitute Amendment 1,S to Bill 279,S.

Upon motion of Regent Rennebohm, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

The meeting adjourned at 11:25 A.M.

Resolutions Relating to Modest Rental Dormitories Meeting of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin March 12, 1955

That the following resolutions, relating to the construction, financing, schedules of costs, and award of contracts for two Modest Rental Dormitories, be approved:

- That, subject to the approval of the Governor and the State Chief Engineer, authority be granted for the President and the Secretary to sign a lease, which is hereby authorized and approved by the Regents, to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation for a term of fifty years for the rent of \$1.00, of the premises, and all buildings and improvements thereon, located at and known as 121-23 North Orchard Street and 915 West Johnson Street in the City of Madison, for the purpose of construction by the Corporation of a Men's Modest Rental Dormitory at 121-23 North Orchard Street and a Women's Modest Rental Dormitory at 915 West Johnson Street, at an estimated cost of \$284,000, of which \$159,000 (or the balance, more or less, remaining in the appropriation of \$184,000 from the State Building Commission for the construction of two dormitories, after deducting the cost of land purchases estimated at \$25,000) is to be furnished to the Corporation by the Regents or disbursed directly by the Regents in payment of part of the cost of said dormitories; and that said lease shall include such other terms, conditions and provisions as are set forth in the draft of said lease which is filed with the records of this meeting.
- That, subject to the approval of the Governor and the State Chief b. Engineer, authority be granted for the President and the Secretary to sign a sublease covering the Men's and Women's Modest Rental Dormitories, and the sites on which they are to be located, at 121-23 North Orchard Street and 915 West Johnson Street, from the Wisconsin University Building Corporation to The Regents of The University of Wisconsin for a term of fifty years at semi-annual rentals (estimated at \$3,175) payable to the Corporation sufficient to amortize the principal and to pay the interest, over a term of not to exceed thirty years, on not to exceed \$125,000 to be borrowed by the Corporation to pay part of the cost of said dormitories, subject to the availability of appropriations; and that said sublease shall contain such other terms, conditions and provisions as are set forth in the draft of said sublease which is filed with the records of this meeting.
- c. That the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be authorized to borrow not more than \$125,000, for a term of not to exceed thirty years, to pay part of the cost of the Men's and Women's Modest Rental Dormitories at 121-23 North Orchard Street and 915 West Johnson Street, under terms as set forth in the drafts of a note and a loan agreement which are filed with the records of this meeting.
- d. That the rents and revenues provided in the sublease referred to in

paragraph (b) above may be assigned and pledged by the Wisconsin University Building Corporation as additional security to the lenders of the funds borrowed by the Corporation to pay part of the cost of the Men's and Women's Modest Rental Dormitories, in accordance with the terms set forth in a draft of a pledge agreement which is filed with the records of this meeting.

e. That the following schedules of costs be approved for the Modest Rental Dormitories project:

Formal Action No. 1 of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin in Executive Session on February 11, 1955, Under Section 36.34 (Wisconsin Statutes 1953)

Present: Regents Gelatt, Jones, Renk, Rennebohm, Steiger and Werner.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk,

it was

VOTED, That, subject to the approval of the State Building Commission and to the allocation of the necessary funds, Regent Renk, Dean Froker, and Vice President Peterson, with the advice of legal counsel, be authorized to complete the purchase of the following agricultural lands for the use of the College of Agriculture, in accordance with the terms of the options:

- (1) 215 acres, more or less, in the Township of Vienna, Dane County, to be purchased from Edmund Hadsor and Henrietta Halsor, his wife, and Arthur Halsor and Doris Halsor, his wife, for a consideration of \$250 per acre. Total estimated purchase price \$53,750.
- (2) 173.64 acres, more or less, in Columbia County, to be purchased from the above named Halsors, for a consideration of \$310 per acre. Total estimated purchase price \$53,828.
- The option on the two parcels described above expires on March 15, 1955, and provides for a down payment of \$50,000 with the balance of \$57,578 to be paid, without interest, on April 1, 1956, which is the date of possession. (However, the University is to have possession of 30 acres of land on April 1, 1955.)
- (3) 80 acres, more or less, in Columbia County, to be purchased from Otto A. Wendt and Anna Wendt, his wife, for a consideration of \$325 per acre. Total estimated purchase price \$26,000.

The option on this property expires on April 1, 1955, and provides for a down payment of \$5,000, with the balance of \$21,000 to be paid, without interest, on April 1, 1956, which is the date of possession. The option provides, further, that at the time of purchase, the University will reconvey to Mr. and Mrs. Wendt one-half acre of land on which the house is located, for and during their life times. On the death of both Mr. and Mrs. Wendt, or if they do not use the house for a period of six months, title reverts to the University.

(Unanimously adopted by the Council of the State Medical Society of Wisconsin, at its February, 1955 meeting.)

William Shainline Middleton, M.D.

- WHEREAS, Doctor William Shainline Middleton, will, on March 1, 1955, retire as Dean of the University of Wisconsin Medical School, to become Chief Medical Director of the Veterans Administration, and
- WHEREAS, Doctor Middleton, the Physician, is a distinguished clinician, one of the most popular and best loved doctors to serve the patients of the University Hospitals, a true servant of humanity, an advocate of the State Medical Society of Wisconsin, to which he contributed so generously through the creation of the Council on Scientific Work and leadership to the Student Loan Fund, and Section on Medical History, and
- WHEREAS, Doctor Middleton, the Dean, an able administrator and noted authority on blood and cardio vascular disease, has earned the everlasting gratitude of his students, and the people of Wisconsin as the architect of a great medical school, welding the art and science of medicine to the minds of men so that they may be known as physicians, and
- WHEREAS, Doctor Middleton, the Officer, having already served his country above and beyond the call of duty in two world wars, and taking a leading role in the establishment of an eminently successful program for the care of the Disabled Veterans, now takes up the reins of the world's largest medical administrative position,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,

That Doctor Middleton, the Man, beloved by his patients and students, honored by educators and praised by Governments, receive the heartfelt thanks and appreciation of the Council of the State Medical Society of Wisconsin, for his outstanding contributions to medicine and public health in Wisconsin, and its sincerest best wishes for a most successful future.

POSITION OF THE UNIVERSITY ON COORDINATION OF PUBLIC HIGHER EDUCATION IN WISCONSIN

(This statement was approved unanimously on February 17, 1955 by all Regents present at a meeting of the special Regents' committee appointed by the Board to work with the Governor and members of the Legislature in the consideration of any proposed legislation relating to problems of public higher education. Members of the special committee are Regents Werner, Jones, Gelatt, and Steiger. The meeting was attended also by Regents Rennebohm and Renk. This statement was developed cooperatively by the special Regents' committee, the chairman of the faculty committee on coordination, the chairman of the University Committee of the faculty, and the administrative officers of the University.)

- I. The education of youth is the most important single function of government if this country is to remain strong and free. Educational opportunities must be made available to all of our people, and the quality of that education must be kept at the highest possible level. Diversity in education both private and public is characteristic of this country and has played an important part in making the United States a great nation.
- II. The University believes that the interests of higher education in Wisconsin will be served best by the maintenance of a board of regents serving only the University of Wisconsin. We know of no example in any other state in which a great university has been built under an integrated system. The State cannot afford to take any action which might lower the effectiveness, the quality, or the reputation of the University of Wisconsin. The University of Wisconsin is generally acknowledged to be one of the great universities of the nation. A smooth-running organization, and great traditions, have served to attract strong men to the Board of Regents, to the administration, and to the faculty. Any changes in the organizational patterns of higher education in this State should be taken slowly, one step at a time, and not abruptly in a single all-inclusive step. Any sudden and pronounced changes in this organization might be disastrous to the University and to the State.

It is clear that each member of the Board of Regents of the University should be selected as representative of the entire State, whereas for a board governing a large number of similar and coordinate colleges, many are convinced that local representation is both appropriate and of value. This indicates the advisability of separate boards for the University and for the State Colleges.

III. The University believes that cooperation in planning the future programs and facilities for higher education in Wisconsin is needed. With the coming large increase in numbers of college-age young people, the State faces the necessity of considerable expansion in facilities for higher education. The development of the most effective program for the least expenditure of funds makes necessary the formation of a comprehensive plan for higher education in Wisconsin. The University believes that future planning can best be achieved if the University of Wisconsin and the State College Boards now intimately familiar with these institutions, are directed to develop a cooperative plan. The Legislature can insure the development of a comprehensive plan by expressing its intent to provide funds for expansion of programs and facilities only on the basis of such a plan.

IV. The most pressing need for expansion of facilities at the present time is in the Milwaukee area. The University believes that its program in Milwaukee should be expanded to include the third and fourth years of undergraduate work in the fields of liberal arts and commerce.

If the Legislature desires to combine the State College in Milwaukee and the University Extension Division in Milwaukee, the University believes that the Legislature should direct such a combination as a part of the University of Wisconsin.
