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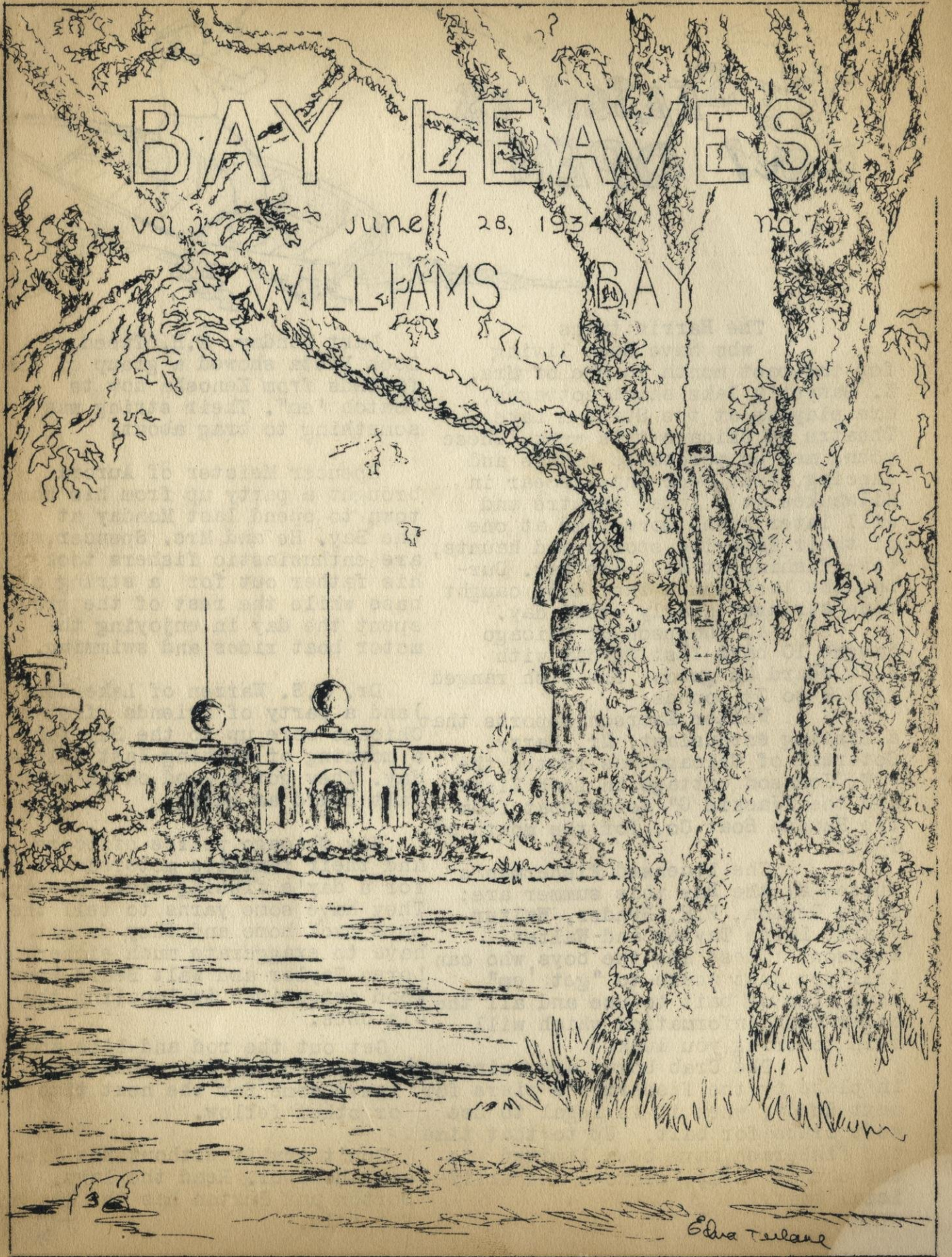

## WHO WAS FIRST IN WALWORTH COUNTY?

The first officers in Walworth County.

The first election of County Officers was held in the fall of 1838, and consisted of three Commissioners, the candidates elected were: Benjamin Ball, Nathaniel Bell and William Bowman. They then organized the board at the house of Daniel E. Bradley, in Elkhorn, on the seventh day of January, 1839 and appointed the following officers: Volney A. McCracken, Clerk; General S. Walling, Sheriff; Le Grand Rockwell, Register of Deeds and Clerk of the District Court. In the following winter, C.M. Baker was appointed District Attorney and Joseph Griffin, Judge of Probate and at the next election, William Hollingshead was elected Treasurer and Hollis Latham, Coroner and Edward Norris, Surveyor.

The above items are gleaned in the search for material for the "Tales of Walworth County" by F.M. Van Epps, Williams Bay. He appreciates the interest taken by the readers of the "Firsts" as evidenced by letters and calls. The information this week was secured from The New COMBINATION ATLAS Of WALWORTH COUNTY published in 1873 which was presented to the editor by L.J. Knaub of Sharon.

The State Superintendent of Fire Prevention has asked our Fire Chief to do everything possible to see that we have a SAFE and SANE FOURTH.

Bay Leaves would like to print the whole circular which has been sent out as it is all worth your careful reading, but can only give a summary.

Fireworks can be sold at retail July 3rd and 4th.

Fire-crackers not over two in. long and 3/8 in. in diameter. Uncolored Sparklers not over 10 in. long; Colored Fire, torches, Fountains and flower pots, are permissible without restriction.

There is a long list of fireworks that cannot be sold at all without a permit. Be careful what you buy as you are liable for any damages and a fine also.

In case of burns from fireworks, call your doctor. Take no chances.

CONGRESS CLUB 35 YEARS OLD

GENEVA THEATRE  
Lake Geneva, Wis.

Congress Club on Geneva Lake was an outgrowth of a social and dancing society formed in 1876 on the West Side in Chicago, called Congress Club as most of the members lived on Congress St.

The members looked about for a place to continue their social activities during the summer, and decided upon the present location in 1881 and by July 1st 1882, everything was in readiness for the Club to have its reception in the handsome and imposing Club House. The tract had ten acres, a club house 100 x 33 ft. with a twelve foot veranda and ten cottages arranged to face the lake.

The original officers in 1882 were Harvey T. Weeks, Pres., Frank L. Eastman, 1st Vice Pres., Joseph G. Hill, 2nd Vice Pres., Charles N. Post, Secretary, George G. Parker Treasurer and Junius N. Love, Auditor., who were also the Directors. Other members of the Corporation were George W. Lyon and P.J. Healy.

With additions the property stands practically as when built. The original residents and those during the half century as well as at present, have contributed by their expenditures and personalities, much to Williams Bays' development.

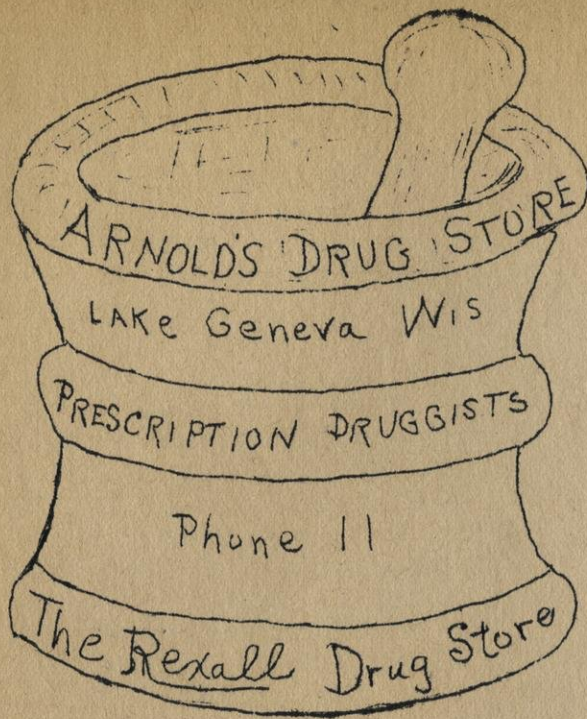

Dr. Jenkins is recognized as one of the leading authorities and writers on fire-arms in the United States. He is advisor to the Milwaukee public museum on the Nunnemacher Fire-Arms Collection and was an instructor in the use of the army rifle at Plattsburg, N.Y. the largest United States Barracks, in 1916.

He was Chaplain of Base Hospital 22 in France during the World War when the editor of Bay Leaves was a patient in an adjoining hospital at Base 114 and was with the First Division at St. Mihiel.

Dr. Jenkins has inspected all the principal Arms collections in Europe and America and answers nearly six hundred letters every year for the American Rifleman, a publication. He also receives inquiries on fire-arms from all over the world.

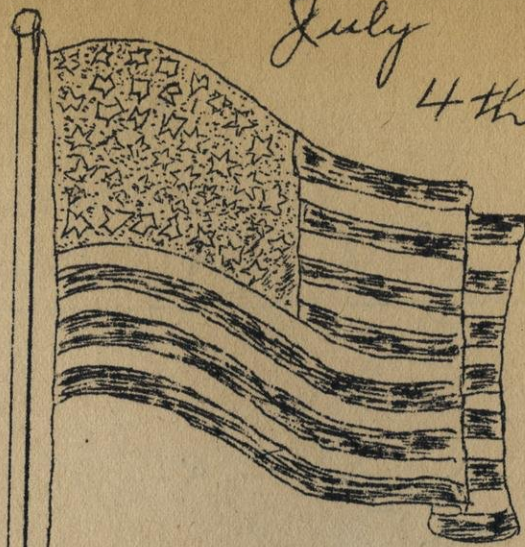
