### Biographical Statement

Allison Davis is the John Dewey Distinguished Service Professor of Education in the University of Chicago, and a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the first elected from the field of education. He is a member of the interdepartmental Committee on Human Development. He has been a member of the faculty there since 1939.

A social anthropologist and psychologist, he has delivered the Alexander Inglis Memorial Lecture at Harvard University, the Billings Lecture at Smith College, the Horace Mann Lecture at the University of Pittsburgh, and the DuPont Lecture at the University of Delaware. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Xi.

He has been visiting professor of sociology at Columbia University and the University of Michigan, and visiting professor of psychology at the University of California (Berkeley).

At the "Mid-Century White House Conference on Children and Adolescents", he was the only other speaker at the session addressed by the President of the United States.

Mr. Davis is author of the following books: <u>Children of Bondage</u> (with John Dollard), 1940; <u>Deep South</u> (with B. B. and M. R. Gardner), 1941; <u>Father of the Man</u> (with R. J. Havighurst), 1947; <u>Social-Class</u> <u>Influences upon Learning</u>, 1948; <u>Intelligence and Cultural Differences</u> (with K. Eells), 1951; <u>Davis-Eells Test of General Intelligence</u> (with K. Eells), 1953; <u>Psychology of the Child in the Middle Class</u>, The Horace Mann Lecture, 1960; <u>Achievement in Adolescence and Young Adulthood</u> (with Robert D. Hess), 1963; and <u>Compensatory Education for Cultural</u> <u>Deprivation</u> (with B. Bloom and R. Hess), 1965.

Mr. Davis is well-known for his contributions to the development of culturally fair intelligence tests, and for his studies of the attitudes, motivations, values, and intellectual development of children from different social classes, and has also studied the relationships between academic achievement in late adolescence, college, and young adulthood. He is completing a book on ego-conflict and ego-strength, and another on ego-development in adolescence.

Virgil Herrick, who died in 1963, was a Vilas Professor of Education at the University of Wisconsin in Madison. He was a national leader in the field of education and particularly in the area of curriculum theory. His books and articles are still widely read today.

After Professor Herrick's death, friends and colleagues contributed to a fund in his memory. This fund has been used to support the annual Virgil Herrick Memorial Convocation, the highlight of which is a lecture by a leading scholar. The past lecturers have included Dean John Goodlad of UCLA, Ralph Tyler, Director of the Center for Advanced Study in Behavioral Sciences in Palo Alto, Carl Rogers, James Macdonald, John Holt, and Bruno Bettelheim.

The School of Education of the University of Wisconsin-Madison has also established a distinguished research professorship in Virgil Herrick's honor. Professor Edward Krug is the Virgil Herrick Distinguished Professor. Professor Krug is the country's leading expert on the history of the American high school and a nationally-recognized scholar in the history of American education generally.

Mrs. Virgil Herrick still resides in Madison. The public is invited to attend this free lecture.

He will speak at 10:30 a.m. in Great Hall of Memorial Union on "Curriculum and Human Interests."

A former member of the University of Wisconsin faculties in both Madison and Milwaukee, Prof. Macdonald holds three UW degrees.

Prof. Herrick, who died in 1963, was an oft-cited authority on teacher education, particularly as it applied to teaching the skills of reading and writing and to teaching of handicapped children. He joined the UW faculty in 1948.

MADISON--A controversial figure in education, Dr. Harold Taylor, who 15 years ago taught at the University of Wisconsin, will be the sixth annual Virgil E. Herrick Memorial guest lecturer.

The special School of Education convocation, open to the public, is scheduled for 10 a.m. Tuesday in Great Hall of the UW Memorial Union.

"Students Without Teachers: The Crisis in the University," his most noted book, caused him to be described by "Phi Delta Kappan," a leading educator's journal as "...the leading advocate of the student cause in the current world-wide student rebellion."

A prolific writer on topics in the arts, philosophy, social change, and education, Dr. Taylor first gained national prominence in 1945 when he became president of Sarah Lawrence College at the age of 30. In his 14-year term his ideas for experiment in education in the creative arts, in student democracy, and in the reform of the university curriculum drew wide attention.

For six years he taught philosophy at Wisconsin, serving also as a clarinetist with the UW symphony and tennis coach.

His topic for the Herrick Memorial Lecture will be "Art and the Mass Culture," and will be based on material from a book he is presently writing.

Prof. Herrick taught at Wisconsin for 15 years before his death in 1963. He was appointed one of the first Vilas research professors, with his special work in the areas of basic learning skills of reading and writing for children.

MADISON--John Holt, educational consultant and author of "How Children Learn" and "How Children Fail," will give the fourth annual Virgil E. Herrick lecture at the University on Tuesday, July 30, at 10:30 a.m.

Named for the late Wisconsin educator widely known for his research in basic learning, the lecture in Great Hall of the Union on "How Children Learn" is open to the public.

Since 1967 consultant at Fayerweather Street School in Cambridge, Mass., Holt is a native New Yorker who was educated at the Le Rosey School in Switzerland, Phillips Exeter Academy, Andover, Mass., and Yale University. He has taught in elementary schools since 1953, specializing in such fields as mathematics curriculum development and beginning reading. In addition to his two popular books he has written for Harpers and Parents magazines, the New York Times, Book Week, and the Grade Teacher.

Prof. Herrick died in 1963 after 15 years of teaching at Wisconsin. Named one of the first Vilas research professors as a result of his extensive study of methods of teaching the three R's, he was consultant to many U.S. and European school systems. His final project was a program to provide more teachers for handicapped children.

MADISON, Wis.--The late Prof. Virgil E. Herrick, who for 15 years at the University of Wisconsin worked to find better ways of teaching children to develop the vital skills of reading and writing, will be honored at a School of Education convocation Tuesday (July 27).

The first annual Virgil Herrick Memorial Lecture will be given by Dr. John I. Goodlad at 10:30 a.m. in room 230 Social Science on the Madison campus.

Dr. Goodlad, an authority on teacher education, is coordinator of the Teacher Education Program and director of the University Elementary School at the University of California at Los Angeles. His convocation topic will be "The Functions of Childhood Schooling."

At the convocation Dr. John Guy Fowlkes of the School of Education will speak on Prof. Herrick's contributions to the University and his profession. Prof. James Macdonald (cq) will preside.

Prof. Herrick, who died in July, 1963, at the age of 57, joined the Wisconsin faculty in 1948 after teaching at Berlin, Wis., Milwaukee, and the universities of Syracuse and Chicago. A native of Whitehall, Wis., he attended Stevens Point High School and Stevens Point Teachers College, then went on to the University of Wisconsin where he obtained his B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees.

In the final months before his death, Prof. Herrick spent much of his time working on a new Wisconsin program to provide more teachers for handicapped children. The program is helping to meet the heavy demand for teachers of children who suffer from mental retardation, or physical, neurological, emotional, and social handicaps.

#### Add one--Herrick

Prof. Herrick's basic educational interests lay in designing school programs for better teaching the basic skills such as reading and writing. He was chairman of the Laboratory for Basic Learning Skills at the School of Education.

His leadership in this area took him to Germany, France, Belgium, England, and Scotland in 1962 to serve as a consultant. In the same year the Wisconsin regents appointed him to one of the first Vilas research professorships established at the University.

Prof. Herrick headed the most extensive study of handwriting ever conducted. The seven-year project brought him the Handwriting Foundation's Annual Award in 1959.

The author of many articles and books, Prof. Herrick co-authored "The Elementary School" and "Children and the Language Arts," both cited as among the outstanding books on education during the years they were published.
