## 'If only we could have warned them some way'

The James Ryan farm lies 4 miles southwest of Barneveld. It is believed their farm was the second place hit by Friday's tornado, except for two rural non-farm residences, further south on County Highway H, which lost roofs.

A little after midnight, when the weather began looking really bad, Ryan, his wife and two sons took refuge in the basement. Then the telephone rang and they went back upstairs.

It was their 19-year-old daughter Marita calling to say that she would stay in Barneveld that night with her boyfriend's family. The weather just looked too bad to travel.

"We said, 'fine, stay there,'" her mother remembers.

Meanwhile, the tornado had most likely already left the Ryan farm and was on its deadly way to the village of Barneveld.

Five minutes later, the house Marita was staying in was totally demolished.

"If only we could have warned those people in some way," Marlene Ryan said today.

Ironically, the tornado had probably already hit their farm — destroying the barn, garage, and sheds

and tearing off part of the roof of their home — without the Ryans having been aware of it. Mrs. Ryan said it's possible, though, that the tornado did not strike until after returning to the basement after the telephone call.

"The wind came and we went down. Glass was breaking and then the phone rang. It was her. It blew terrible again and we went down again."

Moments later, the Ryans went to the devastation of Barneveld looking for her and she had come home to the farm looking for them. They found each other at 5 o'clock that morning.

"She said (later) her ears were popping," Marlene Ryan said. "Some instinct made them go to the basement. Her boyfriend's sister was taken to the hospital but the rest of them were OK. They heard a roaring.

"We're very thankful. Buildings you can replace, human lives you can't."

LaVerne Draves, county agricultural Extension agent in Iowa County, is due to retire in July. He expected to be tying up a few loose ends in the weeks remaining but now he's got too many farms to help rebuild.

"This is an emergency. It's got to be done. If it takes extra time, it takes extra time."

Agricultural damage in Iowa County alone is being estimated at

\$4.3 million after the Iowa County Agriculture Emergency Board flew over devastated areas Friday. Relatively few farm homes were destroyed and relatively little livestock was lost. Damage mostly was to crops, machinery and farm buildings.

Draves talked to a lot of farmers since the tornado. "They think back how uneasy some of the animals were" that day, he said. "They were sensing something in the air. You don't think of those things at that time so you fail to use them as a warning. We are so thankful there were not more deaths at that time of night with no warning."

Part of the damage no one has been reporting is the soil loss. About 6½ inches of rain fell Friday and Saturday in the Barneveld area, inundating young crops and causing erosion.

At Hamre Feed Service, rural DeForest, where only two grain bins survived and 20 were damaged or destroyed, grain was being moved to new storage in other locations Monday. Storage capacity is 2.5 million bushels.

Manager Cardie Schmitt estimated damage at \$3 million to \$4 million.

"We are still in business," he emphasized. "We will be buying grain as usual" albeit, using the facilities of other grain warehouses. He praised competitors for stepping forward to offer their facilities.

All told, 60 farms in Iowa, Dane, Columbia and Dodge counties were visited by the Friday morning tornado, according to Peter Senn, chairman of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's State Emergency Board.

## Lacke defends tornado response

Dane County Sheriff Jerome Lacke — under fire for communications problems during the June 8 tornado in Barneveld and Black Earth — has released a report that concludes his department "functioned quite well."

Despite that conclusion, the report — given to members of the County Board's Public Protection/Judiciary Committee — includes a number of recommendations aimed at improving disaster response. The report evaluates response to the tornado in three areas: communications, equipment and personnel.

Communication, it states, is "certainly one of the most open areas for criticism of the department."

One problem that arose were batteries that didn't last and radios carried by deputies that "frequently didn't have the power necessary to carry on the most basic communications," the report states.

It also states that inadequate lighting in the field led tired deputies to "stumble over downed trees, buildings and high power lines."

Earlier this month, Dr. Marvin Birnbaum, medical director of the Madison paramedics, blasted Lacke for ongoing communications problems Birnbaum said culminated with the June 8 storms.

Birnbaum and others complained that outdated communications equipment wasn't able to handle the demand.

And, Birnbaum charged, department dispatchers have relegated emergency medical service calls to "last place."

Lacke denied Birnbaum's charges about personnel, adding that he doubted Birnbaum was speaking for EMTs "out on the street."

He also pointed to a letter written by Mt. Horeb Fire Chief Chuck Himsel, a critic of the outdated equipment, saying he believes the majority of county EMS coordinators and fire chiefs are pleased with the dispatchers' performance.

## Losses may be deductible

The Internal Revenue Service reminds victims of the tornado that they may be able to deduct part of their losses on their federal income tax forms, provided the proper records are kept.

The records are needed to prove the amount of loss.

The IRS has two free publications available that explain how to calculate deductible losses. Publication 547 explains the law, and Publication 584 is a workbook designed to help figure the amount of loss on a house and its contents.

The publications are available at the temporary Barneveld post office or by calling the IRS toll-free publications number at 1-800-242-9699. Also, IRS workers are available from Monday through Friday to answer questions at 1-800-424-1040.

## WPL offers inspection service

Wisconsin Power & Light is offering to inspect electrical appliances damaged by the tornado.

A spokesman said a community services representative will be in the village to determine if the appliance is safe for use or if it can be repaired.

In addition, the company is offering free labor on repairs and a discount on parts.

Residents can contact the representative through the work crews in the village.

## Housing available for victims

The Madison Apartment Association is offering donated or reduced-rent housing to victims of the Barneveld tornado.

Interested persons should call the association office at 257-5104. Several association members have registered with the office that they have housing available for various periods of time.

### Counselors to meet with kids

The United Counseling Service of Iowa County will meet with parents and children to discuss reactions to the destructive tornado at 7 tonight at Schlimgen's barn at Barneveld.

The meeting will focus on the reaction of young people to the destruction and disruption of lives, what parents can expect and future responses. Joining the discussion of storm aftermath concerns will be a psychiatrist, a pediatrician, and USC staff members.

### Victims can still apply for aid

Disaster assistance centers which were open last week in Barneveld and Black Earth have been closed, but tornado victims can still apply for federal and state aid.

During the week the centers were open, 241 people applied for various forms of state and federal aid. Federal officials said there could be others who qualify but have not applied for aid yet.

Applications for all of the disaster assistance programs, from temporary housing aid to loans and legal services, are still being taken at the Disaster Field Office in the former Wesner Furniture store on Highway 18 at the west edge of Verona. The Verona center will be open from 1 to 6 p.m. daily through Friday.

### Unemployed eligible for benefits

People who have lost their jobs as a direct result of the June 8 tornado may be eligible for unemployment benefits and should apply at the Red Cross center in Barneveld if they have not done so already.

Representatives of the state unemployment compensation division will be available at the center to process claims between 9 and 11 a.m. Thursday, June 21 and again on each of the next three Tuesdays — June 26, July 3 and July 10, also from 9 to 11 a.m. Those who cannot make it to the center should contact Madison Job Service at 266-5850.

### Loans available for ravaged farms

Farmers in areas adjoining Iowa and Dane counties may be eligible for low-interest loans to help them recover from tornado-related losses. Federal Emergency Management Officials said that since Iowa and Dane counties have been declared disaster areas, farmers in surrounding counties can also qualify for Farmers Home Administration assistance.

The available loans can run as long as 30 years at 5 percent interest. Farmers in Dodge, Columbia, Jefferson, Rock, Green, Lafayette, Grant, Richland and Sauk counties may be eligible. Information on applying is available from the Farmers Home Administration state office, telephone (715) 341-5900, or from FmHA county and district offices.

## Building permits may be waived

Dane County Executive Jonathan Barry has asked the county's Agriculture-Zoning Committee and Board of Adjustment to waive all building permit requirements on construction related to tornado damage. Barry said he will also ask that zoning variances be granted from setback and non-conforming use regulations for buildings too close to roads.

In addition, he said the Federal Emergency Management Authority should foot the bill for the county's clearing of debris from roads in tornado damage zones, rather than billing local towns for the work.

## Disaster fund reaches \$133,750

A \$45,000 contribution from employees of Suby, Von Haden & Associates, a Madison accounting firm, has upped a disaster fund to aid Iowa and Dane County residents who suffered tornado damage to almost \$133,750. Other major contributions included \$2,500 from the Bolz Family Foundation. The fund is being administered by the Randall Bank.

### Dodgeville medical clinic available

A mobile medical clinic to serve Barneveld tornado victims has been established by Dodgeville Memorial Hospital. The clinic, a small bus, will remain in Barneveld at least through Friday, village officials said. Its hours are 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

### Mobile meals to end this week

The American Red Cross will end its mobile meals service in Barneveld after this week, but will continue to provide meals at the Red Cross Center there. The meals and casework services will continue until June 30, Red Cross representatives said.

### Benefit dance-fish fry slated

A dance and fish fry to benefit Barneveld tornado victims will be held June 29 in Marshall, at the American Legion Post. Dinner will be served from 5 to 8 p.m., with 60 cents per plate donated to a Barneveld fund. Live disco music by Tom Schultz and the Jukebox Bandstand will follow. There will be a charge of \$3 at the door for the dance, which also will go to the Barneveld fund.

### Mobile homes OK'd for 18 months

The Barneveld village board has voted to allow mobile homes in the village for at least 18 months, and the Federal Emergency Management Agency is preparing to move mobile homes into the village this week as temporary shelter for residents.

FEMA will determine who is eligible to live in the homes after reviewing applications for temporary shelter filed with the agency.

### Return of applications sought

The Disaster Assistance Centers in Barneveld and Black Earth have distributed 131 loan applications, but so far only 90 people have made appointments with the Small Business Administration. Most

aid efforts are at a standstill until the other 41 applications are returned, program manager Donald DeWeerd said.

Those applications must be processed before other programs such as individual and family grants can be considered, he said. People who do not have appointments should call the SBA at 845-5314 between the hours of 1 and 6 p.m.

The administration has set up an Applicant Service Center in the former Wesmer furniture store on Highway 18, at the west end of Verona. Anyone needing an application may obtain it there.

### Debris removal bills due by Friday

The Iowa County Highway Department is asking all municipalities and private individuals or contractors who worked at removing debris at the Barneveld disaster to submit their bills to the highway department in Dodgeville no later than Friday.

### School contract goes to Kraemer

The school board has awarded the contract for reconstruction of the Barneveld School to the Kraemer Bros. Construction Co. of Plain, one of five firms interviewed for the project.

Work on the building, which houses kindergarten through grade 12, is expected to start Monday. The building was severely damaged in the June 8 tornado. The majority of the project is expected to be completed in time for classes in the fall.

Damage has not been completely assessed but it is expected to run in excess of \$750,000, according to District Administrator Dan Woll. The district has \$1.9 million in insurance coverage on the building.

The contract went to the Kraemer firm, a non-union contractor, on a cost-for-time-and-materials basis, plus a fee. The firm will change its offer to a lump sum bid for the entire project within one month, a provision sought by the school board, according to Woll.

## Gimbels offers 20% discount to victims

Victims of Friday morning's tornadoes can receive a special credit card from Gimbels Midwest that will entitle them to a 20 percent discount on purchases of clothing, furniture and household goods, according to Thomas G. Grimes, chairman of the Board.

## Barneveld seeks volunteers

The estimated 40 persons attending the annual school meeting Monday night heard an appeal to "render some tender loving care" to the school by joining work crews to clean, sweep, wash and sand locker rooms and classrooms throughout the building.

Workmen rebuilding and refurbishing the building completed roofing and enclosing the building last week. The tornado tore off portions of the roof, damaging structural members, and successive storms doused the interior of the school.

It will take much work to clean walls and rooms, sand lockers and floors and prepare the school for carpeting and floor coverings, according to business manager Douglas Melliot. "We hope to have crews of volunteers assisting so we can have school open on time this fall."

The start of classes, originally scheduled for Aug. 23, has been moved back to Sept. 4, the day after Labor Day, to lengthen the reconstruction period. Teachers will report Aug. 22, as previously planned, because of rescheduling work caused by the storm.

District electors were informed that tentative figures for the 1984-85 school year indicate a drop in both the tax rate and levy.

They are expected to be \$18 per \$1,000 equalized valuation and \$898,290, as compared to \$19.16 and \$956,175 for the past school year. The budget has increased to \$1,360,182, from last year's \$1,344,324.

The annual meeting was recessed, because many facts and figures were not available for Monday's session due to the tornado damage. It will be reconvened later.

## Barneveld Will Sparkle Again

The latest in numerous examples of the courage and sturdiness of the human spirit is occurring daily in Barneveld, since a massive and sudden tornado swept through the village early last Friday morning and leveled it.

The tornado took the lives of nine villagers when it hit at about 12:50 a.m. last Friday. There were about 60 injured and between 500 and 600 villagers homeless. The tornado roared right through the center of Barneveld and destroyed more than 90 per cent of the homes and businesses in the village.

Still, for all the sorrow it caused, there is a bright side. And that is easy to find in the outpouring of aid and assistance from individuals, institutions and businesses in southwest Wisconsin.

There are surely more benefactors in this corner of the state than we can name here. Indeed, the outpouring has been so great that it would be well-nigh impossible to list all those persons and agencies and businesses that assisted or are assisting Barneveld at this time of need.

Certainly, we ought to be thankful for the efforts of the county police from Iowa, Dane, Sauk and other counties who were immediately on the job and have stayed with it. One Sauk County deputy sheriff died when his helicopter crashed while on an emergency flight to Barneveld. The Iowa County and Dane County Red Cross units, as well as other medical and rescue personnel, were on the scene and helping soon after tornado struck.

The Dodgeville High School provided its facilities for the homeless, Rock's Motel, of Dodgeville, invited homeless to stay there temporarily and Radio Station WDMP kept listeners up to date on the situation in Barneveld and on the needs of the villagers.

General Telephone and Wisconsin Power and Light soon began to try to restore utility services. Lands' End of Dodgeville opened its warehouses for the disaster victims last weekend, so they could select clothing items needed, provide warehouse space for victims' personal belongings and offered \$20,000 for rebuilding Barneveld.

Churches throughout the area raised funds for Barneveld, churches in Mineral Point, Dodgeville and many smaller villages in Iowa County. Volunteers in the hundreds turned out to help in the cleanup operation.

Lutheran Brotherhood and Aid Association for Lutherans offered monetary and volunteer help.

Best of all, the people of Barneveld have begun to rebuild their fine village. The bank is now open in temporary quarters, as is the U.S. Post Office.

Sen. Robert Kasten is working on federal disaster relief to boost the rebuilding effort.

The village board is beginning discussions on restoration of the village. Already there is talk of a new high school.

It will take many more weeks and months, perhaps years, before the scars of the tornado of June, 1984, have healed. But the healing process has already begun in the work of wiping away the estimated \$10 million in damage caused by the tornado. It is a tribute to the spirit of the people of Barneveld and to the entire volunteer effort that the village will someday again sparkle in the sun.

## Straw Poll Gives Barneveld Village Board Some Direction

Barneveld's Village Board will consider the results of a straw poll taken Tuesday night and use it to begin planning for reconstructing the village ravaged by a tornado June 8.

The meeting ended rather abruptly when a village resident entered the meeting and announced the area was under a tornado warning and that sitings were rumored. But, the direction, though not binding, was already given the board.

The meeting was moderated by Dave Hinds of UW-Extension. There were presentations by the UW-Madison Landscape Architect Department and by the Regional Planning Commission.

The presentation by the landscapers was by slides. "Symbols are needed," one said, "for the human spirit to recover." He then showed scenes from the community, such as the church bell tower remaining, to illustrate his point.

The motto which is on the school wall was also shown on a slide. It reads:

"Our gym floor has buckled  
Our roof is gone,  
Our building is flooded,  
But we still live on."

The landscapers said there are five elements to be considered. They include, an increased tax base for growth, land use plan-

ning, open space, architectural and site quality, and the DNR bike trail.

The landscapers suggested promoting the retail district and the residential district. "Let people know you exist and are seeking to attract business and people to your community." They suggested establishing a subdivision and land use plan to establish control and direction so the community can grow the direction the residents want it to.

Hinds told the gathering he was glad to see the energy everyone has. "You are getting going at rebuilding your community," he said. "It is important that you think of the entire business community. As you travel pick up all the ideas you can and see how they relate to here."

Hinds added, "You are not selling the same things Madison is. You are selling what Barneveld has to offer and no other place can do that."

Don Rosenbrook of Southwest Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission showed three alternatives developed by his planning staff. The DNR bike trail showed up often in discussion as did the alternative of leaving the boulevard or not.

It was suggested the village will offer land north of the present proposed trail at a 25 foot

width to the DNR. The land on the present proposed trail will then become available for retail business use.

The boulevard was heavily favored and the straw vote gave the board "Alternative B" to work with.

The vote was suggested after Mrs. Thane Myers said, "We came tonight for some answers. We have to decide if we are staying or pulling out. We need answers now."

Hinds also announced that the timetable is up to how fast the village board can act. He said to establish a zoning committee, administrator, and appeals board along with an ordinance would take longer because legal publications are required.

Hinds also announced that the board is studying texts of various zoning ordinances. He also said Tom Hirsch, who has experience with working with state agencies through his involvement in the Soldiers Grove project, has been assigned to Barneveld by the Lieutenant Governor. He will be available to meet with residents the next month or so.

Village Board President Steve Eveland indicated the board would meet Wednesday morning to begin working on the results of the meeting.

## Mobile Response Clinic Opens At Barneveld

The Memorial Hospital of Iowa County has opened a Mobile Response Clinic this past week in Barneveld to provide follow-up care for the village's residents.

Hospital spokesperson Phyllis Fritsch said that the trailer will be staffed continuously by a registered nurse that with local physicians will alternate in providing service at the clinic.

Fritsch said that the clinic, which is in response to the current needs of the Barneveld people, will be a permanent service. The clinic has been opened to provide follow-up care for the residents of Barneveld and to meet any of their medical needs in the future.

Establishing a clinic in Barneveld had been in the planning stages by the hospital, but Fritsch said that the tornado disaster accelerated the hospital's response.

Fritsch added that the hospital has been involved in recruiting a doctor for the Village of Barneveld and that "hopefully the clinic will lead to this eventually."

### Mobile clinic aids Barneveld

Dodgeville Memorial Hospital set up a mobile clinic in a small bus in Barneveld Tuesday to serve tornado victims.

The clinic is open from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. and will remain in Barneveld until at least Friday, according to village officials.

### Mobile homes due in Barneveld

The Federal Emergency Management Agency is set to move mobile homes into Barneveld later this week for use of residents in need of temporary shelter.

The village board agreed Tuesday to allow mobile homes in the village for at least 18 months.

FEMA will determine who is eligible to live in the homes by reviewing applications for temporary shelter filed with the agency.

### Disaster aid applications slow

Of 131 loan applications distributed at the Disaster Assistance Centers in Barneveld and Black Earth, only 90 people have made appointments with the Small Business Administration.

Donald DeWeerd, program manager, said that until the remaining 41 applications are returned, most aid efforts are at a standstill.

In addition, the applications require processing before other programs like individual and family grants can be considered.

People who don't have appointments should call the administration at 845-5314 between 1 and 6 p.m. daily until Friday.

The administration has established an Applicant Service Center in the former Wesmer furniture store on Highway 18 at the west end of Verona. People who don't have applications can get one there.

### Red Cross mobile meals to end

The American Red Cross will end its mobile meal operation in Barneveld by the end of this week, but will continue to provide meals at the Red Cross Center there.

Representatives from Red Cross will continue providing meals and casework services until June 30.

### Barneveld water tower intact

Barneveld's water tower — 80 tons of sheet steel — stood in stark relief Friday, hovering over the rubble in the center of the village.

The 150-foot tower, which had been painted white just last week, was scarred with dents from flying debris nearly to the top. The rust-colored undercoating was evident in many spots. Yet the 100,000-gallon tower, constructed in 1976 at a cost of \$150,000, somehow withstood the tornado.

### Doctor lauds EMS personnel

Dr. Marvin Birnbaum, an emergency medicine specialist at University Hospital, relaxed for a few moments in the hospital emergency room after spending several hours treating injured victims of the tornado in Barneveld.

"It was really strange to see — everything was stripped down; it looked as if the town had been bombed," Birnbaum said.

Shortly after learning of the tornado, Birnbaum and a crew of three nurses and two paramedics took the hospital's Mobile Intensive Care Unit, a bus that has been converted into a mobile emergency room, to Barneveld to help treat the injured.

Emergency Medical Service units from Madison and most volunteer EMS organizations in the area also arrived to help, Birnbaum said.

"The EMS people did an absolutely superb job. The people who were injured were treated appropriately and there is no question in my mind that several lives were saved because of the treatment they received," Birnbaum said.

He said more than 60 persons were treated by EMS personnel.

A couple of weeks ago a Robert Garnett, of Belvidere, IL made his fourth trip to Barneveld. On his previous trips he had brought clothing, food, furniture and other items of need for our people. On his fourth trip he also brought 20 or 25 envelopes with cash to be distributed to individuals. The money was raised in a scrap drive in Belvidere, which he and his wife, who has terminal cancer, conducted. He also brought some home-made quilts and other bedding made by Carrol Paul, 615 Baker St., Belvidere, IL 61008. ## Unemployment benefits available

Special unemployment benefits will be available to workers in Dane and Iowa counties who lost wages or jobs because of the June 8 tornado. Disaster Unemployment Assistance became available when the two counties were declared a major disaster area by President Reagan, according to John Whalen of the State Job Service Division.

Workers have until July 14 to apply for the special assistance, Whalen said. To be eligible, workers must have been unable to work full time during the week beginning June 10 because of storm damage.

Whalen said that even workers who are ineligible for regular state unemployment compensation may be eligible for DUA. He said claims may be filed at the Black Earth Fire Station or at the Barneveld Assistance Center.

## FDIC waives withdrawal penalties

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation has decided to grant exemptions from early withdrawal penalties to bank depositors in Wisconsin who suffered losses in the recent outbreak of tornadoes in Dane and Iowa counties.

The waiver covers only depositors in those two counties, according to FDIC regional director James Kielczewski, and is retroactive to June 8. The waiver will be in effect for six months.

Insured state-chartered banks that are not members of the Federal Reserve System may allow those depositors who can show they need the funds for temporary housing to withdraw part or all of their time deposits — such as certificates of deposit — before maturity dates without paying penalties.

The Arena dance will be held June 29 at the Arena VFW club. Entertainment will be donated by the Oak Park Band. Tickets are \$2.50 in advance, \$3 at the door and are available at the Peoples State Bank.

## Lutheran group plans cleanup

The Aid Association for Lutherans is planning a cleanup effort in Barneveld from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, and needs more volunteers. Members willing to help should identify themselves as AAL members at the entrance to Barneveld and ask directions to the site of Barneveld Lutheran Church, which was destroyed in last Friday's tornado.

## Artesian water headed for village

Buffalo Don Thompson of Mishicot was on his way to Barneveld this morning with a semi-truck loaded with pure artesian water for the residents of Barneveld, whose drinking water is believed to have been contaminated as a result of the tornado.

Thompson, who gained recognition for his philanthropy last year when he provided free water to Stoughton-area residents whose wells were contaminated by chemicals from a waste dump, is bringing in 6,000 gallons in one-gallon jugs. He runs a business, DonLou Artesian Wells, in Mishicot near Green Bay. He is known as Buffalo Don because he also raises buffaloes on his farm.

## Agency reinspects storm damage

EAGLE RIVER (AP) — A government agency which denied storm-damage loans and grants to several northeastern counties in April has agreed to take another look, state Rep. James C. Holperin says.

State officials have been told that the Federal Emergency Management Agency will send inspectors for another survey of damage in the Lake Tomahawk and St. Germain areas, he said.

Three persons died April 27 when wind storms lashed Oneida and Vilas counties, and several counties downstate.

After tornadoes took nine lives and caused about \$21 million damage June 8 in Iowa and Dane counties, Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., had said requests to FEMA might be denied because of the agency's reluctance to approve emergency aid for the April 27 victims.

FEMA approved a recommendation for grants and loans for the June 8 victims.

### Amish get ready for barn-raising

BLACK EARTH — When Amish neighbors from central Wisconsin visited the Phil Skalet farm near Black Earth Tuesday, they brought along their hammers.

By the end of the day, the bearded carpenters had completed work on a new horse barn and almost finished a new, larger garage.

Those were among several buildings destroyed on the Skalet farm — on County JJ southwest of Black Earth — by the same twister that leveled most of Barneveld June 8, and cut a swath through rural portions of Dane and Columbia counties.

Even so, the Tuesday projects were just a workout, a preview of a day-long barn-raising that is expected to bring as many as 80 Amish and Mennonites to assist.

The barn-raising, or "frolic" as it is referred to, is still more than a week away, since Phil Skalet says considerable preparation work remains before volunteers descend on the farm in the morning, and leave a completed barn by day's end.

"Luckily, no one in our family was hurt by the storm," said the jovial, round-faced Skalet, who is a road patrolman for the Town of Vermont. "But almost all of the farm buildings were destroyed, the roofs were damaged, and windows blown out of two houses."

The only building left untouched was the metal-sided recreation building, from which Phil Skalet and his wife Ethel offer hayrides during the summer and sleigh-riding parties during the winter.

Now, nearly seven weeks after the tornado struck, the downed trees have been burned, the rubble trucked away, the roofs have been replaced by Paul Keller and Greg Paprocki, and work has started on rebuilding the barn and outbuildings.

The lumber for the reconstruction projects came from the storm —

from the many trees on the farm that were blown down or ripped out by the wind. "We cut 23,000 board feet of lumber out of the woods, using a hydraulically operated portable sawmill, thanks to operator Harland Rueland of Plain," said the farm owner.

Most of the cleanup work has been done with the assistance of literally hundreds of neighbors, volunteers, and, added 13-year-old Ingrid Skalet, "50 or 60 young people from church and 4-H groups, and friends."

"I can't begin to tell you how much the work of all the volunteers has meant to us," said Skalet. "It has been tremendous. We couldn't have done it without them."

"And the Amish," he added, "gesturing toward the crews working on the barn and garage, "they do great work. They know what they are doing."

Skalet was busy supervising work on the 84 by 30 horse barn, where neighbors Bill and Steve Boldt had completed the concrete block foundation.

It was the first trip down from the Amherst area for tornado assistance for Levi Borntater and Dan Schrock, who were shoveling cement for station posts. But the crew was carefully coached by Obie Borntater, a professional carpenter who "has built lots of barns with 60-men crews. We are just being goodneighbors," he added.

On this day, there were more than 20 Amish working on the barn and garage projects. They spanned a wide age range, from 14-year-old Joel Yoder from Loyal, to 74-year-old Rudy Summers from the Spencer area.

The white-bearded Summers admitted, "I'm not much of a carpenter," but his Amish colleagues kept him busy swinging a hammer on a variety of tasks. As he reinforced side studs, four others were completing the roof trusses, and another four-some was already attaching the siding.

Joel accompanied his dad, William Yoder, in the long van-ride from the central part of the state, to learn what his father had learned before him.

The Yoders signed up for the tornado recovery work Sunday at their home church where members have been asked to join crews coming down weekly to help out.

Among injured persons in the Black Earth area was Mrs. Donna Dybdal, who suffered minor cuts to her leg caused by flying glass. She and her husband, David, of 4200 Blue Mounds Trail, lost their home to the tornado.

Dave Olson suffered numerous bruises when the tornado lifted him from his bedroom in Black Earth and deposited him about 40 feet outside the house.

Cindy Hacker received shoulder and leg bruises when she was thrown from her Black Earth home, and John Schultz received hand and arm cuts when the tornado blasted a window from his home.

# Neighborly spirit of volunteers quickly raises barn

**BLACK EARTH** — With more than a little help from his friends, Philip Skalet has a spanking new horse barn to replace one blown away by a tornado that devastated nearby Barneveld two months ago.

Some of the folks who made the barn-raising possible said if Americans would practice the kind of old-fashioned cooperation and neighborliness that built Skalet's barn in a day, a lot of the country's ills would disappear.

"This is the way America should be," said Wesley Heddings of Muscoda, one of the Mennonites who helped organize the barn-raising.

Thursday morning, there was nothing but a concrete block foundation and a deck where Skalet's horse barn used to be. By supertime, the improvised crew of Amish from Wisconsin, Mennonites from throughout the Midwest and Canada, and many of Skalet's neighbors had raised a barn measuring 84 feet by 30 feet.

Heddings said the outpouring of volunteer help that rebuilt Skalet's barn and helped other victims of the tornado shows that something good can come from tragedy.

"It has been proven a lot in the last eight weeks," he said. "It's been an inspiration to me."

"You've got to give them a lot of credit; the old spirit is there," gray-haired Albert Bakken of Black Earth said as the barn rose. "They don't ask anything in return except something to eat and a place to sleep."

At one point, there were two dozen men straddling the barn's roof rafters, the clank, clank, clank of hammers striking nails syncopating the rhythm of a hot, sunny day.

In an hour and a half, the walls were up. The shy Amish in their broad-brimmed straw hats seemed to know what to do by instinct, without having to be told. Some of them said it was their fifth Wisconsin barn-raising of the season.

It took more than 200 pounds of nails, 23,000 board feet of rough-sawn oak, basswood, cottonwood and aspen, 75 to 80 helpers of varying experience, and the know-how of the local farmers.

They came from Cashton, Westby, Viroqua and New Glarus. The Mennonites came from Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Minnesota, the Dakotas and Manitoba.

"Boy, these guys know what they are doing. There's not a moment of hesitation," Ethel Skalet said in wonder.

Skalet said he asked an Amish friend, William Kampf of La Farge, who had broken horses for him, what he should do.

Kampf drew a plan for a new barn on a brown paper bag, looked at the twisted trees in Skalet's woodlot, and announced: "Your new barn is lying there."

Harland Ruhland of Plain brought his portable saw mill and cut the lumber to Kampf's specifications.

## County sirens sounded 3 times

Dane County's tornado siren system sounded three times Friday morning. The final siren went countywide after Sheriff's Department officials "pushed all the buttons."

The Dane County Sheriff's Department operates a siren system to warn residents of tornadoes. Department officials sound the system in response to information from the National Weather Service.

The siren system is in five parts, each covering a part of the county.

Stan Klein, the department's chief deputy, said the first tornado siren Friday sounded at 1:05 a.m. in the northwest and southwest sections of the county after the National Weather Service issued a tornado warning.

The second siren sounded at 1:25 a.m. in Madison and the northeast section of the county after reports of tornado touchdowns at Black Earth and Barneveld, west of Madison.

The third siren came at 2:23 a.m. after a report of a possible tornado sighting at Mazomonie in northwestern Dane County. Klein said by the third warning, department officials decided to press all the siren buttons, sending the alarm to all sections of the county.

## Separated mom, son are safe

When Alan Lien telephoned his mother to say he had just lived through a tornado, his mother offered both sympathy and empathy.

Lien lost his home in Black Earth in Friday morning's tornado. His mother lives in Albert Lea, Minn., which was struck by a tornado Thursday night.

## No more food or clothing needed

The outpouring of generosity exhibited by communities in the aftermath of Friday's tornado has been so overwhelming that relief organizations can no longer accept donations of food and clothing, said Marty Gifford of the Dane County Red Cross.

"There's just no place to put everything," Ms. Gifford said Saturday. She said relief organizations will resume accepting such donations if adequate space is made available.

Cash contributions are still being accepted by the Red Cross to help feed, clothe and house the victims, she said.

Donations for the Barneveld victims should be made to the Iowa County Red Cross Chapter, 503 W. Fountain St., Dodgeville, Wis., 53533. Donations for the Black Earth victims should be made to the Dane County Red Cross Chapter, P.O. Box 603, Madison, Wis., 53701.

The money is being used to buy bulk quantities of food, she said. Breakfasts, lunches and dinners are prepared at a Mount Horeb church, then taken to the sites where the tornado caused damage.

The seven vehicles being used to transport the food will be out again today to feed victims and volunteers, she said.

Red Cross caseworkers also issue vouchers for food and for necessary medication, such as heart or high blood pressure medication, Ms. Gifford said.

The money helps pay for personal clothing items, such as underwear, or for items that are not available through donations, she said.

The money donated also helps the Red Cross provide help in finding alternative housing, such as rental apartments, Ms. Gifford said.

Many of the victims have been welcomed by area residents who have opened their homes, she said.

The funds can be used to help victims replace large appliances, such as refrigerators and stoves, damaged in the storm, she said.

## Parade of Homes opens aid fund

Visitors to the Madison Parade of Homes can contribute money that will go to a tornado disaster fund, according to organizer Bonnie Gold.

She said the money will be collected at the ticket booths at each Parade location and will be deposited in an account set aside for disaster relief at the Park Bank. The Parade of Homes is open daily through June 17.

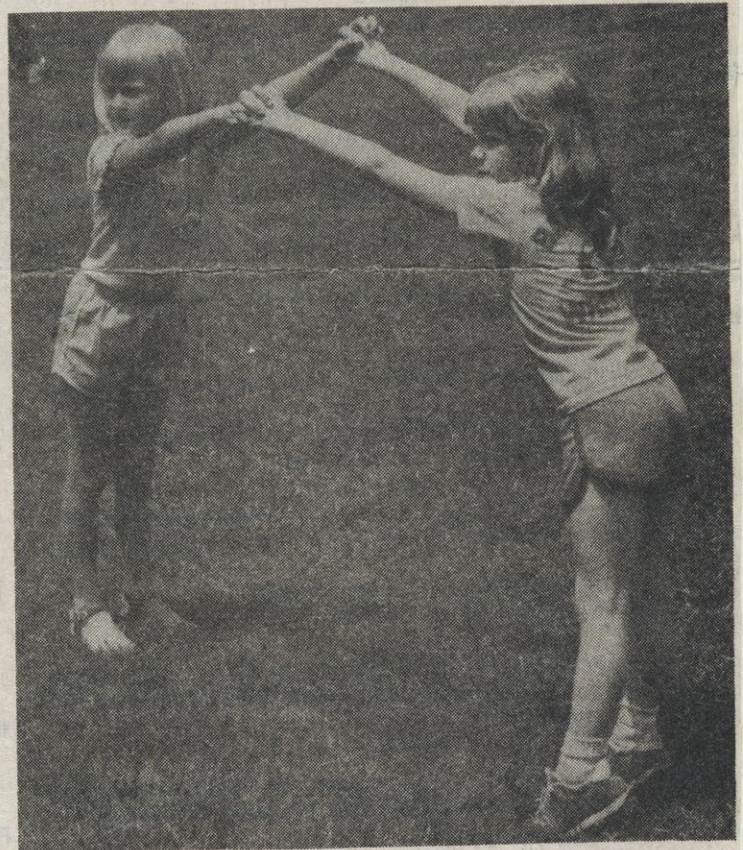
Fourteen persons were being treated at Iowa County Memorial Hospital at Dodgeville, but hospital authorities would not release the names of the injured there.

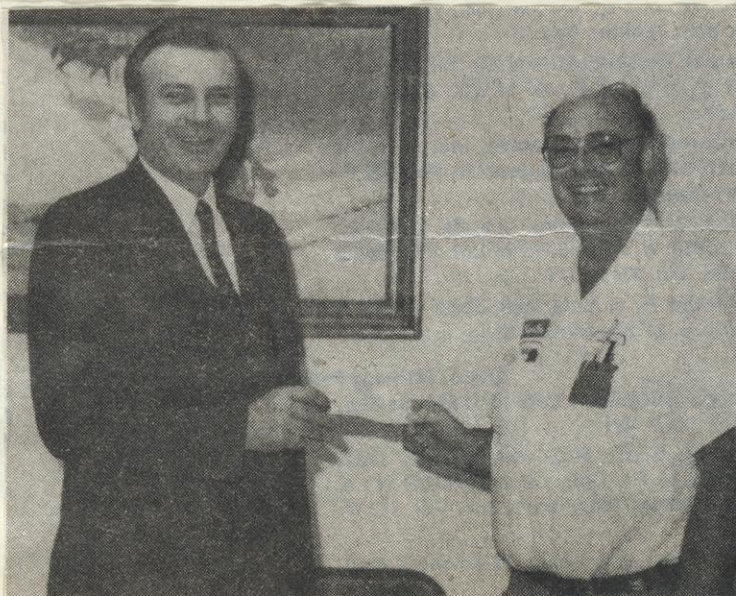

# Barneveld Board Gets Reports

Barneveld's Village Board has been meeting on almost a daily basis for the past two weeks and last Friday morning was no exception as the board gathered at the temporary Village Hall, a mobile home behind the previous fire station, at its new regular meeting time of 9 a.m.

A representative of Strand Associates, Inc. of Madison informed the board that the fire station is about 37 percent salvageable. If the basic structure of the fire station is rebuilt as it previously was, the cost is covered by federal funding. However, if there was a change in the structure, there may be a funding problem, he said.

The board gave Strand Associates approval to start seeking a contractor for the project. Strand, and federal and state officials have a projected rebuilding cost estimate in mind and are seeking a contractor to fall within that total.

The Strand representative said that Joe Daniels Construction of

Madison would be given the first chance to bid. If the company exceeds the cost estimate, three other contractors will be given a chance to bid. "It's the quickest plan and would provide for federal funding," the Strand representative said. The village board gave its approval.

Two representatives from the Department of Natural Resources were also present to report on the status of the village's water. The water is currently bacteriologically safe, but is heavily chlorinated. It is safe to use and drink and no longer needs to be boiled, despite some rumors.

At least 6,500 gallons of petroleum was lost by the Co-op and Standard Oil because of the tornado and the DNR will be trying to locate the area where it has collected in the ground because it could affect the water.

The DNR is also concerned about well no. 1, and if it's found to be contaminated, it may never be acceptable for use again.

DNR representative Doug Morrisette also announced that the

DNR will donate 500 trees to the village. The tree varieties will include mountain ash, green ash, silver and hard maple, and cedar. "Ideally, the best time to plant them is the spring," Morrisette said.

The DNR also has a 100 foot rightaway along the old railroad tracks which will be developed as part of a bike trail between Fitchburg and Gov. Dodge State Park. Morrisette said some concessions could be made on the DNR rightaway area, depending on the plans for the downtown area, but he said that a 15 foot width is necessary for the bike trail.

Morrisette suggested a cost-sharing development plan with the village for the bike trail. The cost-sharing could also provide shelter and park development along the trail.

"Look at it as an asset to the community," he said.

In other action, the board approved a minimum frontage of 60 feet and also approved numerous building permits.

Steve Webster reported that Walter & Dorothy Frautschi & Webcraft Foundation will give \$50,000 for a downtown beautification, including large trees, shrubs, etc, for a Jerome J. Jones Memorial. Official announcement will be made in conjunction with the Arbor Day Celebration the end of April. He further stated that DNR trees could be used in right of way in front of property next to sidewalks.

A motion for a Resolution approving an Arbor Day celebration was made by M. A. Myers, 2nd by C. Roberts and carried.

The EDA Grant application for \$671,000 is proceeding for final authorization.

A Resolution to approve payment of \$48,000 appraised value for the Co-op property was made on motion by D. Williams, 2nd by C. Robert & passed.

## Local and international lions donate to Barneveld recovery

given by Lions members from the district during the Barneveld cleanup.

The \$25,000 donation from the international foundation will be used to purchase needed fire equipment and will be recognized by a plaque in the new Barneveld Fire Station.

## Unemployment Benefits Available Due To Tornado In Barneveld

Special unemployment benefits are available to workers in Dane and Iowa Counties who lost wages or jobs due to the June 8 tornado.

Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) became available when the two counties were declared a major disaster area on June 12 by President Reagan, said John Whalen of the Job Service Division, State Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations (DILHR).

Workers have until July 14 to apply for the special assistance, Whalen said. To be eligible, workers must have been unable to work full-time during the week beginning June 10 because of the storm damage. Whalen added that workers who are not eligible for regular state unemployment compensation (UC) may nevertheless be eligible for DUA.

Those who may be eligible for DUA, Whalen said, include persons who:

- \*Had been working or had been self-employed in the Dane and Iowa County disaster areas at the time of the disaster, and who no longer have jobs or places to work as a direct result of it;

- \*Are unable to reach their

regular places of employment as a direct result of the disaster;

- \*Cannot work because of injury caused as a direct result of the disaster;

- \*Became the major support of a household because the head of the household died as a direct result of the disaster;

- \*Were to begin work in the disaster area and could not begin as scheduled as a result of the disaster.

DUA payments are calculated much like state UC, Whalen said, amounting to half the worker's average weekly wage up to a maximum of \$196. The minimum weekly payment is \$37, and DUA may be claimed for a maximum of 52 weeks.

Regular UC claims will also be taken at the Barneveld Assistance Center for area residents who became unemployed because of the disaster, Whalen said.

Persons applying for DUA should bring, if possible, their social security cards and any available evidence of their earnings, as well as the number of weeks worked in the past 52 weeks. Income tax records,

Whalen said, are good evidence for self-employment verification.

Evidence which indicates that the claimant's unemployment is a direct result of the disaster is helpful, Whalen said. He added that claimants should file even if records were destroyed in the tornado.

Federal funds finance DUA payments. DUA does not cover damage to homes, businesses or crops, Whalen said, since programs operated by other state and federal assistance agencies provide for such purposes.

## Jaycees To Help Barneveld

*July*

Through the efforts of two Dodgeville Jaycees, the Wisconsin Jaycees could be raising over \$10,000 for the Barneveld Jaycees to be used for help from the recent tornado disaster in their village.

Paul Swenson, regional director, and Gary Lobenstein, Wisconsin Management State Vice-President, have been working on a plan to aid the Barneveld chapter, a group that chartered in August of last year and who are under the supervision of Swenson.

Lobenstein recently attended the National Jaycee Convention at Atlanta, Ga. While there he contacted the Wisconsin Jaycee Executive Committee and Steering Committee with the idea of contacting all 326 state chapters to hold a statewide money-raiser for the Barneveld area. The money raised would be used by the Barneveld Jaycees strictly

for projects that Jaycee chapters run, but in light of the recent disaster, wouldn't be able to run. The chapter probably wouldn't be able to raise money by such normal projects as: chicken barbecue, pancake breakfast, dances and carnivals due to the lack of funds in the community plus a place to hold such events. Also, being a new chapter, they do not have much available money in the treasury. With the money they could possibly help construct a new park or other needed facilities that chapters normally help with. But, basically, all the money raised will be turned over to the Barneveld chapter to do with as they see fit.

Lobenstein said that he and Swenson will be sending a letter to every chapter president in Wisconsin with an explanation of what happened in Barneveld and why the money raiser is a necessity. The letter will suggest

about \$1.00 per member to be raised in ways such as: 1. directly from the treasury, 2. from member donations, or 3. from money raisers in their own communities.

The letter, along with the entire idea received full backing by the Wisconsin Jaycees Steering and Executive Committee.

Several chapters in Wisconsin called Swenson and Lobenstein the day after the disaster to see what they could do to help. One Whitewater chapter called to send a busload of volunteers to help clean up.

Lobenstein also pointed out that while in Atlanta, Jaycees from all over the U.S. asked about the Barneveld chapter.

## Red Cross sets up center

The American Red Cross has set up an emergency service center at the new Brigham town garage in Barneveld to give emergency assistance to tornado victims, said Marty Gifford, Dane County Red Cross spokeswoman.

She said the center is to open at 9 a.m. today, and will remain open until at least 6 p.m. Victims can receive attention for immediate personal needs, such as eyeglasses and daily medication, she said.

The garage was one of the few Barneveld buildings left undamaged.

## Damage should be documented

Property owners hit by the tornado should start documenting the extent of damage to their homes, businesses and other belongings immediately, a spokesman for the insurance industry said.

The first thing property owners should do is notify their insurance agents promptly, according to John Maes of the Insurance Information Institute in Chicago, a public relations and information organization for the property casualty industry.

Maes said they then should begin gathering as much documentation as possible about damage to speed the claims process.

"The best form of documentation would be photographs," he said. He said in cases where belongings have been destroyed beyond recognition, owners should make a good list, to the best of their knowledge, of what they had. The list should include an estimate of the value of individual items when they were purchased.

Photographs and lists then should be turned in to insurance agents or insurance company adjusters promptly.

Maes said the insurance industry will work as quickly as it can to handle the claims stemming from the tornado damage.

But he said it is very difficult to tell how quickly claims will be settled. "Some claims will be handled in days, some will take longer," Maes said.

## Oregon wants better tornado warning siren

OREGON — More than 100 residents of the Village of Oregon, shaken by the tornado that hit Barneveld and Black Earth and by another tornado warning a few days later, have petitioned the village board for action on the local warning siren.

A number of those who signed the petition and presented it to the board earlier this week came from the north, east, and south ends of town — roughly three-quarters of a mile away from the only siren in town. Some lived as little as seven blocks away.

In response to the outcry, the board directed village clerk and treasurer Jeanette Foreman to contact county civil defense officials to see what action could be taken by the county to put in another siren or increase the coverage of the present one.

"But if it comes down to the fact that the county doesn't have the funds or they can't do it," said Foreman, "the village has to do something about it."

Foreman will present a report to the trustees at the next board meeting in early July.

In other news, the construction work on the post office on Brook Street probably will be finished by this weekend, and it should open by the first week in July.

A medical clinic, built by local investors but staffed and backed by the Stoughton hospital medical staff, plans to remodel the old post office on Spring Street, opening their doors this fall.

## Area People React To Tornado Warning

Hearing sirens today is not an unusual happening. A siren will blow to indicate a fire call, an ambulance run, or perhaps it's a squad car. People have become somewhat passive of these occurrences and do not pay much attention to the warning of a siren.

But many people now find it hard not to notice a siren, especially a tornado warning. Since the disaster that struck Barneveld Friday morning, June 8, the sign of bad weather has made people more aware of what could happen.

Sunday night's bad weather covered a large area of southern Wisconsin. Tornado warnings were issued for the entire corner of the state. A tornado had been sighted two miles north of Platteville heading northeast. The storm had blown a roof off a church in Platteville. The sirens in Dodgeville, Mineral Point, and Cobb went off indicating a tornado.

In this area between 6:00 p.m. and 6:30 p.m., the sirens could be heard. Area businesses and people at home related in a telephone conversation what they were doing during the warning.

In Mineral Point, Mark Wallace tells what people did at the Redwood Motel. "I sent people down in the basement at the motel. Also the restaurant, but not everyone went to the basement, some people sat through it."

At the Red Rooster in Mineral Point four people left when the siren went off, according to Patty Lawinger who had been working that night. She turned the grills off and closed up. The A&W at Mineral Point also closed.

Jeff Basting, the store manager of Mark's IGA, Dodgeville said, "Twenty-five customers were in the store when the siren went off, but all of the customers kept shopping. At The Thym's a lot of people became nervous but no one went to the basement."

The Little Rock Motel was occupied mainly by people who were traveling. Pat Hellen, owner of the motel, told people they could come into her house if they would feel more secure. She had no basement in her house but the house did consist of concrete walls. "Only one couple came to

my house," she said, and added, "one person said 'we've been going through this all day.' She was not at all concerned."

The Don Q Inn had no trouble deciding where their customers should go. "Naturally we went to the tunnel," said Ron Dentinger, manager of the Don Q Inn. "It's funny, we spent a fair amount of time in the tunnel and coming out of the tunnel I heard random comments like, 'Nice talking to you.' 'See you later tonight.' 'We are considering doing this every night.'"

People at The Old Homestead in Rewey went to the basement after the whistle blew. After the tornado was sited near Platteville, people in Rewey felt it was safer in the basement.

Blackhawk Lake Park Manager Tom Presny said, "I drove around the park and warned campers what was going on. I told them to look out for bad weather and if anything happened they should take shelter down along the bluff area. I also told them to stay away from high elevations. We lost one of our horses from lightning. We used the horse to pull a wagon," he added.

Residents from this area took precautions when they heard the warning.

Peggy Murphy, Mineral Point, listened to the radio and watched for a tornado. Her husband told her "it's going to pass." The wind changed and the storm blew past Mineral Point.

Becky Covert, Mineral Point said, "We were watching television and listening to the radio. We decided to go down in the basement."

Mrs. Alan Lindauer, Cobb, was watching television when the whistle blew. She said, "We decided to go the basement, and ended up playing cards all night."

Mrs. William Buckingham, Mineral Point said, "I watched for a tornado and got ready to go down in the basement, but I never went down."

When a siren goes off now, especially during a storm, most people are listening. As one Dodgeville resident noted: "Barneveld's disaster is still with us."

Deputies from several surrounding counties will continue to screen people who attempt to enter the community, restricting entrance to volunteer workers, residents, service agency connected people and enforcement officials.

Security of the town and safety are factors, Basting said. Heavy equipment is in use and there are many hazardous areas in the village.

It will be some time before tourists and sightseers are allowed in, he added.

### Humane Society matches pets, owners

The Dane County Humane Society are helping match pet owners in Barneveld with missing pets and others that have been found. "We went around from family to family asking if they were missing pets and getting descriptions," says shelter manager Charlotte Fairlie.

The owners of two dogs are still being sought. One, a brown and white mixed-breed female with a red collar, is at the shelter. The other, a black Labrador-mix pregnant female, is being held at a Barneveld home. The society also has not located the owner of a black and brown husky/shepherd-mix female that was found dead, or a blue parakeet that has been flying around loose in the town.

Meanwhile, residents are still searching for 14 lost pets — four dogs and 10 cats, according to Fairlie. "We think a lot of cats are holed up in the rubble, afraid to come out."

### Blue Mounds gives to Barneveld fund

The Blue Mounds Village Board Wednesday kicked in \$500 to help with the rebuilding of Barneveld, just four miles and a killer tornado away. The board also will set up solicitation stations at the Village Hall and in several businesses in town so village residents can pitch in to help.

The trustees also offered village services in whatever area Barneveld would need in the future to help in their rebuilding.

## USDA Says FHA Office Will Stay In Barneveld

The USDA Farmers Home Administration District office will remain in Barneveld according to State Senator Dick Kreul (R-Fennimore), Chairman of the Wisconsin Senate Republican Caucus.

Senator Kreul, whose district includes the Barneveld area, said that he "received the news directly in a telephone conversation from State FmHA Director Ron Caldwell.

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) Barneveld office was completely destroyed in the devastating tornado that recently struck the area. During the past week, a temporary office has been operating in Mt. Horeb.

In addition to losing its former home in Barneveld, the agency lost one of its fine employees, Elaine Slewitzke, who was killed in the storm. Ms. Slewitzke had served the district office as its chief clerk. Prior to serving in that capacity she served in the United States Army as a Sergeant Major.

Senator Kreul said that the district office operates with a staff of about five and serves a nine county area.

In addition to working with the various FmHA county offices, the District 1 office hears appeals brought before it by persons not granted FmHA services at the county level. The district office also supervises a multi-family housing program. It also originates loans for various units of government and various public facilities. Finally, the district office works in consultation with the state office with regard to

loans for rural business and industry applicants.

Kreul said the FmHA hopes to have the new office up and operating in the very near future. During the meantime, the operation will continue to function out of a temporary Mt. Horeb office until further notice, Kreul said.

The party will be held on the streets and sidewalks between the Town Pump, 300 South Main, and the Railroad Crossing, 102 Railroad Street. Both taverns will donate their profits to the Barneveld victims and the money will be matched, dollar for dollar, by the Lutheran Brotherhood Disaster Fund.

## Barneveld to get another \$750,000

An additional \$750,000 in federal funds will be available to the Barneveld business community to aid in the recovery from a devastating June tornado, Lt. Gov. James Flynn reported Friday.

In a letter to Stephen Eveland, president of the Village of Barneveld, Flynn said the state would be ready to accept applications within two weeks.

Flynn, who is secretary of the State Department of Development, led a state team to Barneveld last month in efforts to get aid for the community in the wake of the June 8 tornado.

The tornado killed nine people and damaged or destroyed most of the homes and businesses in the community of about 600 population.

Damage estimates ranged up to \$21 million.

## Red Cross Lists Some Donations

The contributions have come from all over the country. "I don't think we've missed any states," he said. The largest individual donation has been for \$3,000, followed by \$1,000. Tredinnick said that many \$500 and \$100 checks have been received but that the most common amount has been \$25.

The majority of money, of course, has come from Wisconsin but Tredinnick said that he has been surprised by the large number of donations from the Milwaukee area.

The money that has been received will go towards food, clothing, laundry expenses, dry cleaning, rent, utility deposits, cleaning supplies, toilet articles, minor emergency home repairs, bed linens, cooking and eating utensils, bedroom furniture, tables and chairs, stoves, refrigerators, washing machines, dryers, emergency health services, occupational supplies and equipment, and any other emergency needs for the Barneveld victims.

Tredinnick said the Red Cross had estimated that it saved \$10,000 because it didn't have to buy any food after receiving so many food donations in the five days following the tornado.

## Red Cross staying on

The center will now be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily. Nurses will be available to give tetanus shots and first-aid treatment. Anyone injured or scratched is encouraged to get a booster shot if he or she has not had one in the last six years.

As of Tuesday, more than 4,000 meals had been served to victims and volunteer workers by Red Cross and Salvation Army mobile units. The Red Cross will be coordinating its services with the federal disaster center opening in the village Friday.

## More heavy equipment is needed

FROM MR. WOLL'S DESK:

We still have a need for volunteers to help clean up on the interior of the school. If you are over 16, and willing to help, please call Barb at the office and she will schedule you into a work shift. Volunteers may need to bring equipment such as a broom, sponge or a pail.

A question has arisen concerning the reason for our involvement in the cleaning with volunteers when we have a two million dollar insurance policy. There are a couple of ways to look at the reconstruction. One way is to consider it a contest with the insurance company where the goal is to extract every last nickel and dime out of the settlement regardless of the time involved. There is another way to view the situation and it is the way I see it. It is still a crisis, it is still an emergency and the most productive route must be followed to the solution with as much speed as reason allows. Things are winding down now as everything rapidly begins to draw toward a conclusion. There is little doubt that we could contract out most of the clean-up. But there are rules that must be followed and that is time-consuming. We can not afford to waste even one week. We need the school clean NOW. And that is why we are asking for Volunteers. Wausau Insurance has held up their end of the deal. In many cases they have even agreed to pay for expensive items that contractually are not their responsibility. For example, several code violations in the original building were uncovered. This is the owner's responsibility according to the contract, but in all cases but one, Wausau has picked up the cost. No one is being taken advantage of and it is to the best interest of our children and us if we can pitch in and speed things up.

### Cleanup volunteers sought

The Village of Barneveld is looking for volunteers to help in debris cleanup this weekend. Individuals or groups of volunteers should bring rakes, shovels and wheelbarrows as available and wear appropriate clothing, including gloves and work shoes.

People interested in volunteering should call Ron Jabs at 924-8742. Those who sign up will report to the Red Cross Center in Barneveld Saturday and Sunday for their assignments.

### Relief checks issued

Two senior citizens Thursday received the first disaster assistance checks issued under programs applied for last week at Disaster Assistance Centers in Barneveld and Black Earth, and a family of tornado victims has been placed in temporary housing with federal assistance.

The checks were for the individual and family grant program, which covers needs not met by home repair and rebuilding programs. State Division of Emergency Government administrator Carol Hemersbach said the number of checks being issued for the program should increase rapidly.

A family of three from the Barneveld area will move into a privately-owned Blue Mounds trailer park this week with assistance from the federal temporary housing program. As of this week, 131 applications for temporary housing had been received, and emergency government officials estimated all applicants will be placed within three weeks.

### Lutheran disaster fund at \$60,000

The Lutheran Brotherhood tornado disaster fund has reached \$60,000 in contributions and continues to grow. The insurance company said its nine area branches plan to contribute an additional \$19,300. Donations to the fund can be made at most banks and savings institutions in southern Wisconsin.

### Clothes, housewares available

Tornado victims can pick up free items of clothing, appliances and other housewares at the Hoff's Store distribution center on Main Street in Mt. Horeb. The center does not need any more clothing donations, but can use small appliances, linens and bedding, housewares and furniture, plus volunteers to sort the items. The center is open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily. For more information or to volunteer, contact coordinator Linda Szabo at 437-3075.

### American Legion holds garage sale

## Tornado fund reaches \$140,000

The Lutheran Brotherhood Tornado Disaster Fund for the residents of towns hit by twisters on June 8 has completed its fund-raising effort with more than \$140,000.

Committees to be established in Barneveld, Black Earth and DeForest will evaluate the needs of residents of those towns and apply those to a point system and submit those to the Lutheran Brotherhood Disaster Relief Foundation for evaluation. # Iowa County Homemakers Fair

## A Sell Out In Successful Style

It's holiday time in Iowa County. How do we know? Because the Iowa County Extension Homemakers Christmas Fair was held December 1, at the Dodgeville High School, with all the vim and vigor that can be mustered up by over 700 club members.

There were shoppers buying up special gifts; baked goods and homemade crafts. The Iowa County Extension Homemakers Chorus - one of two remaining Homemakers choruses left in the state - were there in colorful new red vests and hats.

Others took part in a "Hats Off To The Holidays" style show of historic and humorous hats. In the cafeteria, food and craft demonstrations were presented. Judy Reddy and Diane Reuter served oriental appetizers. Sharyn James was busy stenciling and Extension Home Economist Pam Einerson showed off her "Year 'Round Holiday Fun And Games." Heritage quilting was on view as Alice Mueller and June Nagel talked of their "very enjoyable craft." They had many of their "works of art" on display.

On the stage two big Christmas trees were decorated with beautiful handmade tree orna-

ments. Many of the ornaments were later given to 21 Barneveld Extension Homemakers who had lost their's in the June 8 tornado. According to Lois Manteufel, 121 Christmas boxes were given to Barneveld residents by Extension Homemakers from the Southwestern District.

Yet another Homemaker had lost her home and her child had experienced emotional trauma. She was leaving the area but not before she sent letters to several friends. She sent them an old Irish blessing "May God Hold You In The Palm Of His Hands." The letter continued, "I firmly believe that we were held by Him and still are being held by Him. My prayer is that He will hold you, too."

Bogenschneider said, "These two and other Barneveld Homemakers have reaffirmed by belief that God didn't cause this catastrophe to happen to the good people of Barneveld. He did, though, give the hope, the courage, the strength we've seen to go on. I've never seen such an outpouring of help and gifts. We hope your support will continue as it will be a much longer time before Barneveld has completely recovered," she added.

She thanked the group for their help and told of another project called "Adopt A Special Friend." Anyone interested in adopting a Barneveld family can do so by contacting the Extension Office. Phone 935-3354.

At the afternoon program, Iowa County Extension Home Economist, Karen Bogenschneider greeted everyone. She also noted, "I don't want to dampen today's spirit but I don't think any of us here today can reflect on the year gone by without thinking of one day that's carried indelibly on our minds and in our hearts." She was referring to the June 8 tornado.

Bogenschneider related that she had gained insights into two dimensions of the human spirit from talking with tornado victims and the volunteers who have helped. She told of one victim who had only a set of dishes in her kitchen. Yet when she was asked what Extension Homemakers could do for her she noted that others were more in need, and to help them.

She continued, "In talking to her I was awed by her wellness, her warmth and yes even her concern for others as she reminded me that people in Barneveld have their up and down days."

The Disaster Emergency Response volunteers have always provided immediate response and service to disaster victims, especially those affected by fires. But in recent years, questions like "Can Red Cross respond to a large disaster effectively?" or "Is Red Cross disaster service necessary when we don't have major disasters?" have repeatedly been asked. The answers came resoundingly loud and clear with the terrible and devastating tornadoes which struck Barneveld and Black Earth. Within hours, Red Cross staff and volunteers were at the scene surveying damage and beginning to assess the magnitude of the need for Red Cross assistance. By daybreak, many volunteers were assembled and, with staff and volunteer leadership coordination, began to provide a wide range of Red Cross services to victims and in support of emergency workers:

- nearly 1,000 telephone welfare inquiries were received from throughout the country and from overseas;
- individual casework contacts were made with each disaster family to assess their needs and provide both emotional and financial support, much of it coming weeks after the disaster when actual needs could be determined;
- thousands of meals, both at shelters and through mobile feeding vans, were provided;
- nursing and health services provided immediate medical assistance to over 600 victims and relief workers at the Red Cross Disaster Service Center in Barneveld, along with hospital visits by nurses to all hospitalized victims;
- a variety of coordination and administrative services were provided with government and other social service agencies to insure that victims' needs were being met.

Yes, Red Cross met the challenge immediately with needed emergency services . . . so effectively that the 'questions' need not be asked except to keep ourselves prepared for any future disasters.

## LB BRANCHES PROVIDE AID TO TORNADO VICTIMS

**M**ore than \$100,000 has been raised by branches to aid victims of a devastating tornado which leveled the small town of Barneveld and damaged the nearby town of Black Earth in Wisconsin on June 7.

The tornado struck without warning in the middle of the night and damaged every structure in Barneveld except the water tower.

As news of the catastrophe spread, many groups and individuals began the overwhelming task of picking up the pieces of what once was Barneveld.

By 4 p.m. Friday, June 8, 10 branches and their fraternal branch consultants in the area around Barneveld were actively involved in disaster relief efforts.

"The destruction touched virtually our total area," says Harold Helwig, fraternal branch consultant for the Mounds Branch 8095, Mt. Horeb, Wis., and disaster relief

project director. "Four of the seven counties in this area received damage. Nearly everyone has become involved and concerned because of friends and relatives living in the damaged area."

**A**s of July 1, the total amount collected through branch efforts was more than \$100,000, Helwig reports. Collection centers staffed by volunteers were set up

in more than 80 financial institutions around the area. In terms of dollars raised, this is the largest disaster relief project ever conducted by LB branches. In 1980, branches raised \$70,000 for Mt. St. Helens' disaster victims and \$33,000 for victims of the Grand Island, Neb., tornado.

The total amount eligible for matching from LB through the branches' efforts exceeds \$25,000. That amount was reached after the first days of fund-raising activities.

This disaster relief project is also unique for Lutheran Brotherhood because the branches involved formed a nonprofit board to administer the funds so that gifts would be tax deductible. The board of the foundation consisted of each branch president (or other designated officer) from each branch participating in the disaster relief project. All funds were disbursed by Labor Day.

Barneveld is now laying out the streets and beginning the lengthy process of rebuilding. However, the Lutheran Brotherhood name will remain in the minds of the townspeople because of the generous support and activity of LB members.

Though it may seem a little slow in coming to introduce myself, or more specifically, my position; there just wasn't time when things got started in September. But for those of you who have been confused, since October I have been working with the pastors in Barneveld and Black Earth sort of as an extra community pastor to help in the recovery from the tornado. In this capacity I have especially been working on community related programs (like with Project Care and Winter Needs), and in supporting the pastors/churches in their work. Technically the funds for this have come from Church World Service through the United Methodist District in this area. I will continue to work at least through March, and very likely on through the summer.

Since I don't preach regularly from any pulpit, and would like to share some thoughts with everyone in the community I decided to write you all a letter in this way.....

\*\*\*\* Six months ago I couldn't imagine what it might be like to get out \*\*\*\* from under the mess the tornado had left to us. Today with businesses just beginning to rebuild, only half our homes replaced, loan checks still out, and the filing of tax returns in front of us it's clear the frustrations aren't over yet.

But things are different than in June. And there is less havoc than this fall. Each of us have found some return to order and routine, even if it is in temporary quarters. (It sometimes feels like one is on an extended camping trip.) And with the coming of the first snowfall I believe one could hear an audible sigh of relief; without the weekly thunderstorm we all could relax a bit. Passing from December 1984 to January 1985 was like a graduation: it had been a taxing and costly year (materially and spiritually), but we had actually begun the reconstruction of a whole town. We'd hung in there against incredible odds, each in our own ways.

In the bustle of such activity, in the midst of the energy it has taken to survive these days there hasn't been time for much else -- especially to wonder. Yet in the relative quiet of the winter days and nights I have begun to wonder. And it feels important to share these thoughts and know if anyone else is wondering too.....

I wonder...Home, I know now, is not a haven from all harm. Yet my home and possessions do mean something to me. What really is their value? It's more than just having things to possess.

I wonder...That night and the first days after the tornado I was stripped to the bare essentials of life, shaken to my core along with a lot of other people. I don't believe life can or should be lived in such a state of crisis, but the world - people and things - felt somehow different. What was that feeling? Its so easy to forget. It made me wonder where you and I fit in the whole scheme of things. And how do people manage who live constantly in such crisis, the chronically poor or those in combat zones?

I wonder...The tornado itself was terrifying, the loss of people and homes and work painful (still is), the reorganization of the community disruptive and frustrating though important. And I want to blame someone or something. I need badly for new decisions to go my way. Once again, I am impatient with people I didn't like or know before (even with friends). Is this grief? How do I get it out? One day it feels like everything is at stake and I'm pushy. Another day, nothing seems to matter

I wonder...Is all this, and my tiredness part of recovery? I care about other people, but it doesn't always show. And I wonder, do others care about me? For all of this effort will things just go on as they always have? (And sometimes I just long for it all to be just like it was... ummm?)

Maybe you are wondering too. What is important, I think, is that we do allow ourselves to wonder, to take a look at the things that have happened in and around us. I would suggest that it is dangerous to try to go on with our lives as if nothing is really different. The building and community we are constructing are different. Can that be any less true of ourselves? I wonder....

The Iowa County Law Enforcement Association is a non-profit organization that provides its services at events such as the county fair, Cobb Corn Boil and many dances. The money raised from last year's breakfast and the country western show enabled the Association to donate \$500.00 to the Barneveld Relief Fund and to purchase badly needed tables and chairs for its meeting room. This year the Association is striving to purchase some portable radios to improve communication at the special events.

It was explained that when a Municipality vacates a street or alley the property is split between the abutting property owners. The Board passes a Resolution; holds a public hearing; surveys and the description is registered.

## Barneveld Looter Turned Loose After Jury Declares Guilty

A theft case stemming from the June 8 tornado that destroyed Barneveld resulted in more than two hours of jury deliberation last Thursday, before the nine man, three woman panel found Paul E. Anderson, 34, Blue Mounds, guilty of felony theft after a disaster.

After the verdict, Anderson was immediately sentenced in Iowa County Circuit Court by Judge James P. Fiedler to the time, 15 days, he had already served in the Iowa County jail during preliminary phases of the case leading up to the trial.

Fiedler explained his sentence last Monday by saying Anderson was a "first offender" and a "vagabond." The judge continued that no one knows where he (Anderson) is and he can't pay a fine.

Anderson was arrested on June 13 for taking an electric drill, a

china plate, about eight woven baskets, a paint scraper and several pieces of silverware, all from the demolished home of Douglas Salisbury, Jr., 504 Swiss Lane, Barneveld.

Anderson was observed taking the items by Richard Ehlert, Iowa County deputy sheriff and Barneveld chief of police.

Felony theft after a disaster carries a maximum penalty of a \$10,000 fine or up to five years in prison or both.

While free on the felony theft charge, Anderson still faces a bail jumping charge and a charge of criminal damage to property within a cell at the Iowa County jail.

Ehlert testified that he saw Anderson helping a group of Mennonites clean up at the demolished Salisbury home. According to the deputy, Anderson would place debris on a discard pile and other

items on a recovery pile, both on or near the Salisbury property. Ehlert said that Anderson would then sift through the recovery pile and take some items across a street to a personal file on the Lutheran church lawn.

Ehlert then testified that he saw Anderson "deposit" some items from his personal pile into his van, which was parked along the street. The deputy added that he saw Anderson go across the street to his personal pile three times, and Anderson then "went to his van twice" with items.

Anderson was subsequently arrested, and his van was impounded.

A search of the vehicle several days later was made by Ehlert, and the deputy found a stack of wicker baskets, a china plate, an electric drill, a package of paper bags, a paint scraper, two screw drivers and a table knife, accor-

ding to Ehlert's testimony.

Darlington Attorney James C. Klein, representing Anderson, sought to weaken Ehlert's eyewitness account by getting the deputy to admit the items eventually found in the van could have been in a debris pile and not a recovery pile.

But, under additional questioning from Paul McLimans, Iowa County district attorney, Ehlert said he saw Anderson remove the items from a recovery pile and not a debris pile.

Since Anderson has been released, an appeal is moot. However, it could have been an issue in the case had he been assessed a lengthy prison sentence, because one juror was dozing frequently during the afternoon portion of the case.

# Fire department to receive \$25,000 from disaster fund

BARNEVELD — The Barneveld Disaster Fund will make a \$25,000 contribution to the Barneveld Fire Department to help replace five fire trucks destroyed in the June 8 tornado.

The fund is a special program of Youth Services Inc., the non-profit charity of The Wisconsin State Journal.

The department lost four fire trucks and its equipment house when the fire station collapsed during the tornado.

Village President Steve Eveland estimates the destroyed equipment will cost \$264,000 to replace but was insured for only \$120,000. So the village, in the midst of other expenses, will have to find \$144,000 to replace its fire equipment.

"We felt one way we could be of immediate service to the people of Barneveld would be to help replace the fire equipment needed to keep them safe," said J. Martin Wolman, coordinator of Youth Services Inc.

According to Eveland, Barneveld — which hasn't experienced a fire since the tornado — is now being protected by a coalition of area volunteer fire departments.

"Depending on where a fire breaks out, it might be handled by the Ridgeway Fire Department or the Mount Horeb Fire Department," Eveland said. "But, then, firemen from Dodgeville or Verona or another community would back up the first department so that no one village would be left without fire protection."

"All the fire departments met right after the tornado and worked out a pretty good plan — but I'm glad we haven't had to use it."

Your help is still needed to help rebuild Barneveld and other places damaged by the tornado.

## STATE JOURNAL FUND COMMITTEE

This committee will be taking a month or so to consider how the money might best be used. Most of the fund has been utilized in the months following the tornado, both for individuals and for community projects. But a significant chunk is left.

The members of the committee will meet the first week of February. At that time we will determine the actual amount left, and begin the process of talking with individuals and groups in town for your suggestions. ## ADDITIONAL WISCONSIN STATE JOURNAL FUNDS TO BE DISPERSED

In the months following the June 8th tornado, the Wisconsin State Journal became the administrator of over \$300,000.00 in donations for the Barneveld-Black Earth areas. By January of this year all but \$58,000.00 has been spent or pledged to aid in our recovery. At that time the Journal administrators of the fund asked Rev. Mitzi Eilts for a local committee to make decisions about the allocations of the money left and take care of its dispersement. The people who consented to serve are: JoAnn Manteufel, Thane Myers, Mary Ann Myers, and Bob Schaller.

We have worked at collecting information on needs, where money has already been spent, and projects being considered. We have considered the old, the young, the community and the individual. From the approximately \$45,000 available to Barneveld (\$11,000 - 12,000 is set aside for Black Earth), we have reached consensus to do the following:

- 1) Send each homeowner a \$100.00 check towards trees or general landscaping needs. Everyone who lost significant trees, or whose lot was torn up and has rebuilt/repared a home will receive a check. If you do not receive a check and feel you qualify please contact a committee member; we don't mean to miss anyone. (\$8,500)
- 2) We have a strong feeling among ourselves, and have sensed from others in the community that something needed to be done for our business people. To that end we are giving \$2,000 to each of the businesses that were destroyed in the tornado and are rebuilding in Barneveld. Just like we need our school and our churches, without the businesses this community couldn't recover. We applaud the 'stick to it ness' of our business people. (\$24,000)
- 3) To set aside about \$10,000 for needs that will appear in stages of recovery 3-6 months down the way. We will be keeping an eye out for further needs of individuals and the community, and will appreciate input any of you might make as things progress. (\$10,000)
- 4) There's an additional \$2,000 - 3,000 for which we are discussing several projects which only require small amounts (i.e. 500-1,000). Already we have decided to offer \$1,000 towards Birch Lake lights, \$300 to the library specifically for cassettes and books for teenagers, and several hundred promised to the village for tables at Birch Lake. (\$2,500 +)

## Blue Mounds Man Denies Looting After Tornado

A former Blue Mounds man, Paul Anderson, 34, pled not guilty last Tuesday in Iowa County Circuit Court to a charge of felony theft after a disaster.

He appeared before Judge James P. Fiedler on a charge of looting in Barneveld after the June 8 tornado that destroyed the village.

Anderson is charged with stealing an electric drill, two woven baskets, three china plates and some silverware and other kitchen utensils from the Douglas Salisbury, Jr. home in the village.

Fiedler set a trial date for Anderson for Thursday, September 6, at 9 a.m. The judge ordered continuance of a \$500 signature bond for Anderson pending the trial.

The penalty upon conviction for felony theft after a disaster is a maximum fine of \$10,000 and up to five years in prison or both.

## Tornado spotters training for Barneveld

The Barneveld community is scheduled to receive a Tornado Spotter Presentation and Training on Monday, April 1 from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the Barneveld Community School gymnasium. Chief Meteorologist, Edwin Addison III of the National Weather Service Office in Madison will conduct the training for those residents of the community who are interested in joining together as an organized spotter group.

The training will include a multi-media presentation on basic understanding of tornadoes, how to spot them, tornado safety rules and other severe weather phenomena. Mr. Addison has had 29 years of experience in meteorology and has been in charge of the Madison National Weather Service Office since 1970. His presentation will be both informative and helpful for those who are concerned with the approaching storm season and would like to organize a spotter's group that evening.

This training has been scheduled through the Iowa County Emergency Government Office, Kenneth Palzkill, Director. Location plans have been coordinated by Project CARE. This program is free and open to the public. For more information, contact the Project CARE office at 924-5971.

## Firemen Deserve Credit At Barneveld

Dear Editor:

Now that things have settled down a little in the Barneveld area, and those that did little or nothing have had their moments of glory, I feel it's time to draw attention to some facts that have been neglected in the news coverage of the tornado disaster. Granted, there was much turmoil and confusion, and certain things could be overlooked. But let's give some credit where it is due.

According to an interview with two gentlemen, one representing the Red Cross and the other from the Emergency Government office, seen on WISC T.V., the tornado struck at approximately 12:55 a.m. on June 8. The Red Cross representative stated that they had a unit into the area by

approximately 2:45 a.m., and I don't doubt it in the least. But who do you think was in Barneveld within minutes after the tornado struck? Let me tell you.

Firemen from almost all of the surrounding towns!!!

They came in fire trucks, vans, cars - anything that could move and get them there. They came into an area that was pitch black except for what flashlights they could muster. The threat of live power lines and the danger of being electrocuted was real in their minds, but it did not deter them. There was a job to be done, and they did it!

They went from house to house, from building to building, calling and waiting for people to answer. They went into seriously damaged buildings to make certain that there were no people so badly injured that they were incapable of answering. They cut people free with chain saws. They pulled people out of holes in damaged buildings. They walked on areas of shattered glass and nails that were protruding from shredded pieces of wooden buildings.

Firemen continued to arrive all through that horrible night, from towns a good distance from Barneveld.

These firemen, from all areas, spent the night getting seriously wounded people to rescue squads and ambulances, sorting out those who had superficial injuries that needed care, and taking names of people so that they could be located at a later time. They worked not only throughout the dark hours, but also throughout the entire day.

Keep in mind that these men are not career firemen. They are volunteers from small towns and believe in strong community commitment. They are not looking for glory. They don't consider themselves heroes. There were many courageous people other than firemen helping during that terrible period, and these firemen would be among the first to recognize the fact.

Not once, in any of the news media, did I see or hear about these firemen, who gave so freely of themselves. The sensational was photographed, residents were interviewed, hospital staff members were interviewed, the

Red Cross got their fair share of coverage - but not once - NOT ONCE - did anyone see or hear from a fireman.

Someone pointed the fact out to me that we DID see a picture of a Wiotra fireman, and that "you could see firemen working in the background of all the pictures." You're darned right you could!!

They worked hard! They do deserve some recognition! Let's give it to them! They have earned it!

## Betsy's Cafe, Pot Of Gold At The Rainbow's End

June 8—Will anyone ever forget the sight that emerged with the dawn's first light at Barneveld. The total destruction, the battered trees, and houses; the cries of human beings in despair. I doubt that anyone will. I know that I won't.

June 9—Rain pours throughout much of the day, adding insult to injury, or so it seems to me. Not only does it hinder the efforts of the volunteers who have come to Barneveld to help; it makes the heartbreaking task of looking for personal items even more useless. But soon the stories come out...a wedding ring had been found, a trophy that was given by a father-coach to his son was slightly bent, but the trophy will be a treasured keepsake, as the father had died. The stories kept coming, and although there was thoughts of deep despair, it gave one hope.

The Dodgeville High School became the hub of activities as people came to help prepare food for the homeless. In the parking lot I waited with Gary Olson, one of many volunteers taking food to Barneveld, and we talked of the awesome power of the destructive storm. To say our spirits were low would be putting it mildly.

A ray of sunshine suddenly broke through as the storm apparently was passing over. We looked upward to the sky. "Look," I said, "What a beautiful rainbow, and it appears to be right over Barneveld." Olson murmured, "If ever a town needs a rainbow right now, it's Barneveld."

You remember that this "bow in the clouds" is an everlasting covenant between God "and every living creature of all flesh that is upon the earth."

The hundreds and thousands of volunteers who have shared this tragedy with Barneveld certainly must be the "pot of gold" at the end of the rainbow. Many of their names will never be known but as you hear so often... "that doesn't matter, we just came to help."

The Brigham Town Shop was built shortly before the tornado went through, but it was not damaged, and so it was quickly put to use.

Betsy's Cafe, located inside the shop, came out of the rubble. The name came about because of Betsy Thronson, a rural Barneveld farm woman, who "got busy that first day and coordinated a food kitchen." At first she had only cheese, sausage, and crackers,



The Brigham Town Shop was built last fall, but not until early this spring had the finishing touches been added. On June 8 the Brigham Town Board scheduled an open house. Dale Theobald and other board members had gone to Barneveld only the evening before to get chairs and tables from the fire station and the American Legion Hall, and had put them in the town shop to be ready for the next day's open house. Theobald noted, "Look what has happened. We've had open house ever since."

Since the tornado the shop has served as a restaurant, a meeting place, and a place to coordinate the various disaster services. Volunteers helping with Betsy's Cafe recently were: Esther Ritter, Mineral Point; Betsy Thronson, Hazel Roberts, Beverly Lee, Barneveld; Clarice Ryan, Blue Mounds; Aleta Hughes, Lorene Collins, Betty Evans, Barneveld; and Verna Hauffman.

and she used an old feed bunk, and a couple of planks for a serving table. But as time went on they moved it to the town shop, and got equipment — pots and pans from the school, a stove from the American Legion Hall, the list goes on and on. From the freezers that were left undamaged, but with no electricity the food would have spoiled, Betsy and others salvaged what they could. Thronson noted, "People were so good about giving what they could...it's nothing short of miraculous."

When asked why she has been at the shop every day since, she answered, "It's something I have to do." She hands you her Bible, and not surprisingly it's opened to St. Matthew, Chapter 25:35.

"For I was hungry, and ye gave me meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave me drink: I was a stranger, and ye took me in." "It tells you why," she relates as she hurries about the business of preparing food for the hundreds of people who will come on this particular day. I've heard this Bible verse quoted many times, and so it is not surprising that Betsy too shares the same feelings of other volunteers.

At the town shop one can see cans and boxes of food piled high, clothing in boxes, and other items that will be needed someday soon

as people build homes, and rebuild their lives. It is only a scattering example of the generosity of the people around the world who have showered Barneveld with an "outpouring of love."

Georgia Seis has vacationed at the Blue Mounds State Park for the past 15 years. She noted,

"Why Barneveld is just like home to me. I came because I wouldn't be comfortable sitting in the sun while there is so much work to be done here." Not only has she worked in the "kitchen" but she has been raking up debris as well. She said, "And when I leave here, I never want to see a rake again." Everyone around her laughs.

Walking down the long rows of tables I stop to chat with Barneveld residents — the victims, yes, but they are also the heroes and heroines to my way of thinking. Some of these people I've known since I was a child going to Barneveld to watch the free movies. Many I've written about, usually they've been happy stories.

What can I say to someone who has lost a loved one, and all of their possessions. I wish I had the words to let them know I care, and wish I could soothe the empty spot inside their hearts where tears are born.

I stop at another table as I recognize the emblem of the Mennonite Disaster Service, and ask the first young man, "Where are you from?" He looks up at me with big melting brown eyes. I repeat the question. He looks at me with questioning eyes. Slightly embarrassed, I glance around

the table, as it seems that I am talking to myself.

There is a burst of laughter, and Clarence Headings, a Mennonite from Muscoda explains, "He's a refugee from Poland. He does not understand or speak English." I laugh with them, and like Betsy Thronson has said, "It's good to hear people laugh again."

Heading's son, Wes, has coordinated the MDS effort in Barneveld, the surrounding farms, and in Black Earth. He has been here since June 8th, and will stay "until everything is back in order." He relates the latest speculations: "There was two cement stove silos on the edge of Barneveld yet not one of our people nor anyone else has found even one cement block. The silos must have been pulverized and blown into the homes."

There are many stories to be told, and retold. Some are funny, if you don't think before you laugh - if you do, you will cry. For example a young girl was wearing a t-shirt on June 8th as she worked at Hardee's. A tourist

asked her the question on her shirt that read: "Where the heck is Barneveld, Wisconsin." She promptly replied: "All over the state."

We've witnessed the result of the awesome power of a violent force out of control. But, right now it's more important that we look for the rainbow, and cherish the pots of gold as the world helps to rebuild Barneveld. Every day we hear of another "miracle" that can't help but uplift the spirits of us all.

One learns a lot at Betsy's Cafe. Volunteers are always needed. Why not go today. I am betting that at Betsy's Cafe you'll find the pot of gold at the rainbow's end.

BARNEVELD — Barneveld won't become the blooming beauty it had hoped to be this spring, thanks to the early November onslaught of snow and cold.

Residents of Barneveld, Holland, shipped 5,000 tulip bulbs, primarily reds and yellows plus a mixture of the two hues, to their namesake community in Wisconsin last fall. It was to add spring color to the Iowa County community which had been stripped of most trees and foliage by the devastating tornado of June 1984.

Barneveld had hoped to plant 3,000 of them in two giant 60-foot planters in the downtown median strip. Construction work was still being completed when the first November storm hit, followed by cold weather, more snow and no plantings.

The 3,000 bulbs still rest in 50-degree comfort in the Municipal Building and won't be blooming this spring.

Still, there were 2,000 bulbs passed out to village residents for private planting, says Village Clerk Pat Messinger. A batch was planted at the Municipal Building and others, and in lawns and gardens across town. So all is not lost.

Incidentally, faithful readers will recall we ran a column story about the then upcoming dedication (Dec. 1, 1985) of the new Barneveld Lutheran Church and what the rebuilding of the church leveled by the tornado meant to the congregation and community.

Another winter storm hit that weekend "after all the sandwiches and food were ready" and forced a cancellation. The cornerstone was placed and the church was finally dedicated on Sunday, Jan. 5.

Congratulations to Rev. Bob Twiton and congregation on their triumph over both wind and winter.

Danette Tessman, 4-H and Youth Agent, presented each Board member with a 1985 Iowa County Platt book.

Both Mr. Smith and Mr. Heins praised members of Iowa County for the fine jobs done during and after the Barneveld Disaster.

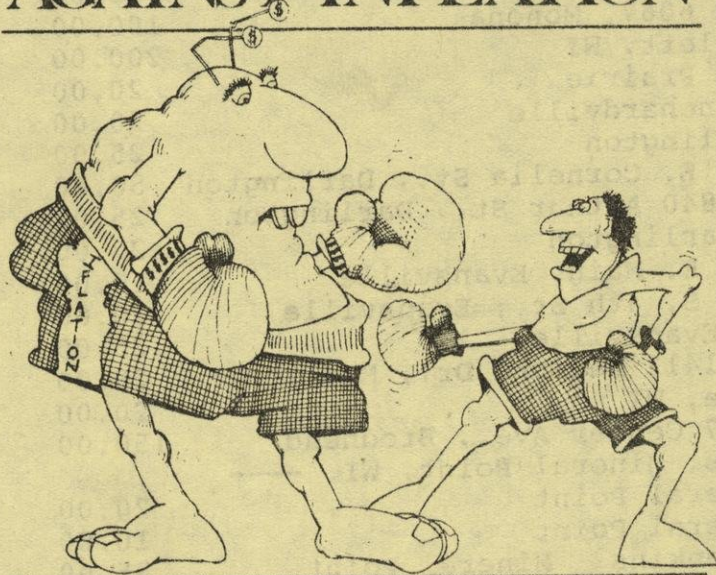

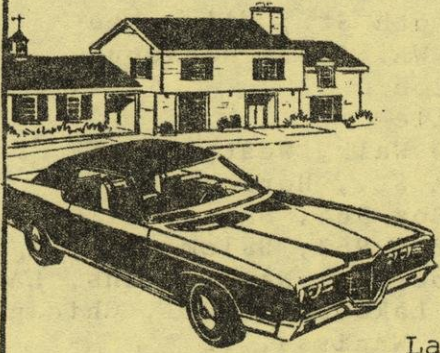

## Tornado leaves indelible mark on Barneveld

A tornado defined as incredible by scientific terms and simply gut-wrenching by human terms skewered southern Wisconsin June 8, killing nine in almost leveling Barneveld in Iowa County.

Scores more were injured. Damage was estimated at \$26 million, \$10.5 million in Barneveld, which suffered 260 mph winds.

The storm's 100-mile path ran northeasterly from Belmont, through Barneveld and Black Earth (where it damaged more than 20 homes), before dying near Green Lake.

The area's top story ran further:

✓ Help came from as far away as Barneveld, Holland, and from as close as Sauk County, which lost Sgt. Stuart J. Searles, a sheriff's pilot who died when his helicopter crashed during storm relief efforts.

✓ People reached to their pockets for more than \$300,000 in disaster aid, still being administered by The Wisconsin State Journal's Youth Services Inc.

✓ Memories of the tornado sent people throughout the area scurrying to basements during the summer at the wail of a siren or the mere mention of a tornado watch.

Efforts to mend businesses, homes and hearts continued even as 1984 ended.
