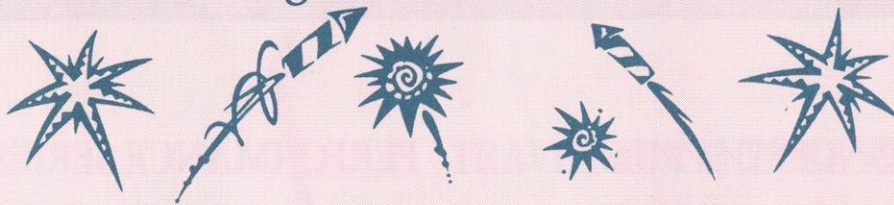

Mini Course Program Celebrates First 20 Years.



This summer marks the 20th anniversary of the Wisconsin Union Mini Course program. In the summer of 1972 Wisconsin Union Directorate offered the first set of non-credit courses under a "free university" format. The first term had 22 courses and enrolled 121 people. Today the program offers over 900 course sections a year and enrolls approximately 8,000 people annually.

Since the beginning, the Mini Course program has seen its ups and downs. The spring 1973 term had an enrollment of 980. Significant waiting lists were reported for almost all courses. Bartending, Buying A Stereo and Photography enrolled the most.

During the disco craziness of the late seventies, annual enrollments swelled to close to 10,000. In the spring of 1978, over 2100 people enrolled in disco dance and classes were held as late as midnight!

By 1986 enrollment had dropped to less than 6000 people per year. The program responded with major changes to accommodate its audience: a wider variety of shorter classes, a new 6 month Union Guest membership and new marketing efforts.

Today, the program continues to respond to its audience of students, Union members and faculty/staff. A staff of four, including a student intern, programs five terms annually, works with approximately 150 instructors and offers over 850 different course titles annually.

One instructor deserves individual recognition. Robert Wollersheim, owner of the Wollersheim Winery in Prairie Du Sac, Wisconsin, has faithfully come to Madison twice a week for 20 years to teach his always popular Wine Appreciation class. Bob's courses are consistently full and are always well liked by participants.

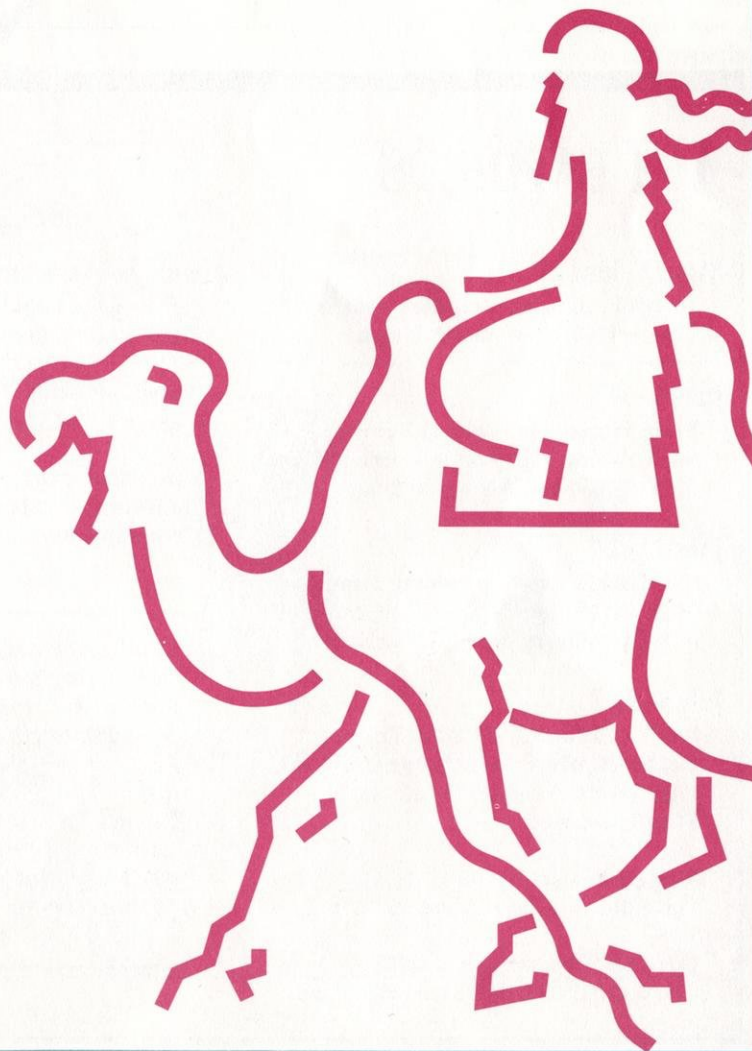

ART GALLERY HONORS PORTER BUTTS



The Union's Main Gallery has been renamed the Porter Butts Gallery. Porter Butts served as the Wisconsin Union director from 1926 until 1968 and was active with the Memorial Union Building Association until his death in 1991. He was prominent in the development of college and university unions in the United States and throughout the world. As a tribute to one of his most meaningful contributions: establishing the importance of art in the Union, the Building Trustees voted to rename the second floor Main Gallery in his honor. A portrait and narrative of his accomplishments are permanently mounted in the entrance of the Gallery.

Hoofer Sailing Club Youth Instruction Program

Renovation Update

Construction on the first floor of Memorial Union is progressing as Phase I of the renovation is about complete. The expanded Deli Sweet Shop will open in its new location in July carrying new products such as freshly baked cookies and frozen yogurt as well as its familiar variety of sandwiches, muffins, cold drinks, etc.

Phase II of construction starts soon and will be completed by the end of the summer. This phase includes refurbishing the present Commons Desk/Deli Sweet Shop area to an expanded store, called Essentials. This store will combine services from the Service Center (film processing, UPS, Terrace T-shirts) and the Commons Desk (newspapers, magazines, candy) as well as offer UW memorabilia. During construction, a temporary store will be set up in the lobby so service will not be interrupted.

An additional construction project affecting the Union is also planned this summer. An information booth, run by the Campus Assistance Center, will be located adjacent to the Union Theater on the northern end of Park Street. Staff from this facility will answer your questions about the campus, including events and parking information. This service is scheduled to be available this fall.
