





## UW Gets \$1,000 as Fund Gift

## Frankenburger Memorial Formed

A gift of \$1,000 from Mrs. Bargaret F. Williams and Mrs. Dorothy F. Sanders of Evanston, Ill., to establish the Frankenburger Memorial Fund as a living memorial to their father and mother, Prof. and Mrs. David B. Frankenburger, has been received by the University of Wisconsin, M. E. McCaffrey, secretary of the niversity board of regents, announced Saturday.

Prof. Frankenburger was appointed to the university staff during the presidency of John Bascom and served as head of the university speech department for 37 years from 1869 to 1906. As originator of the Frankenburger Oratorical contest still held annually on the Wisconsin campus, Prof. Frankenburger was known to thousands of Wisconsin student debators and orators during an age when public speaking contests were the most popular events in collegiate campus life.

The Frankenburger Memorial fund is to be held in trust by the state university regents, and Wisconsin alumni and other friends of the university are invited to add contributions, Mr. McCaffrey explained.

Income from the fund is to be used to promote scholarship and research in the field of speech, and may take the form of cash awards, scholarships, or loans to undergraduate or graduate students on recommendation of the department of speech either annually or from time to time as considerable amounts accumulate.
