VALEDICTORIAN

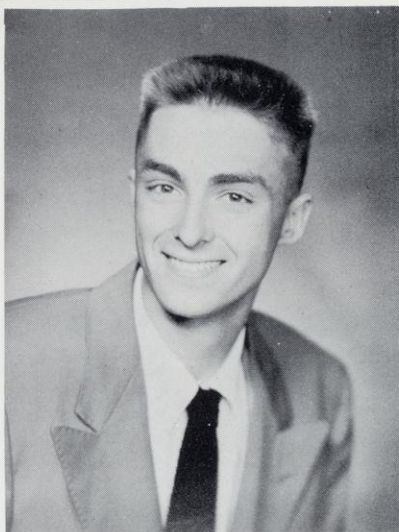

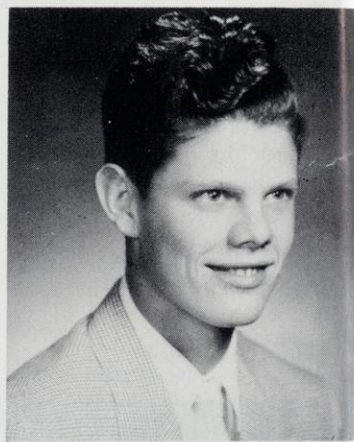

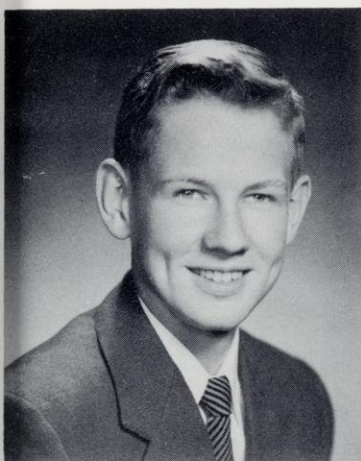
DARLENE BRAUND

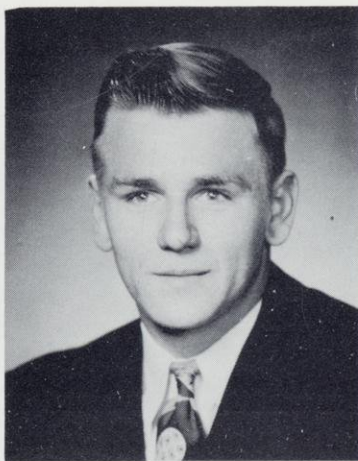
BEVERLY BROWN

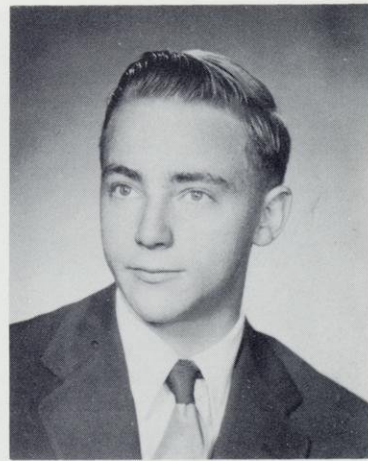

Jerry was an active member of the band for three years. He played solos at the Whitewater Festivals and for Open House. He was a member of the chorus for two years and played basketball for three years.



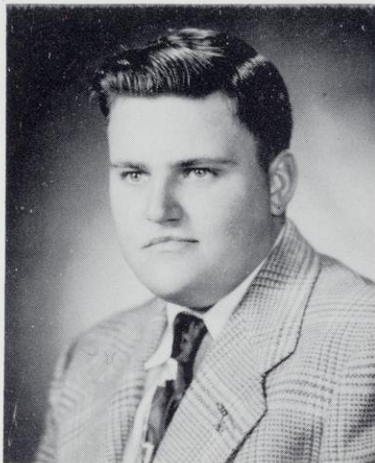
ROBERT CHRISTIANSON

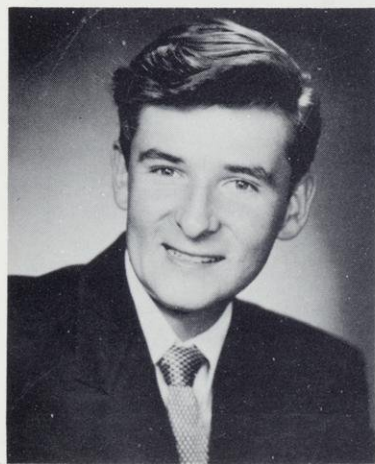
SHIRLEY HOOVER

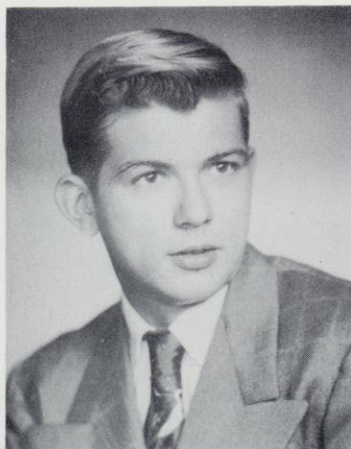
ROSEMARY KAMIŃSKI

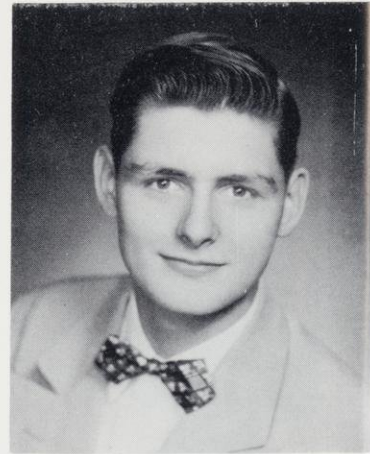
DAWN NOLAN

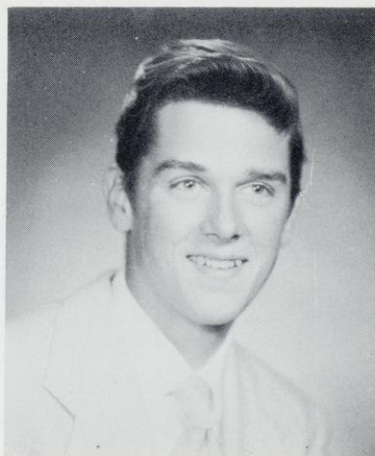
MARGARET ROBEL

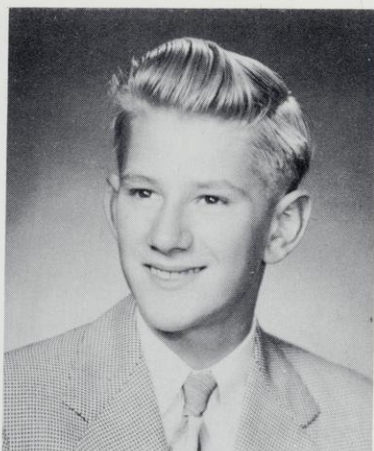
DICK SATTERSTROM

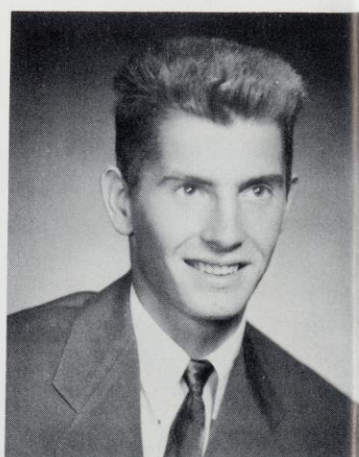
BETTY SCHMIDT

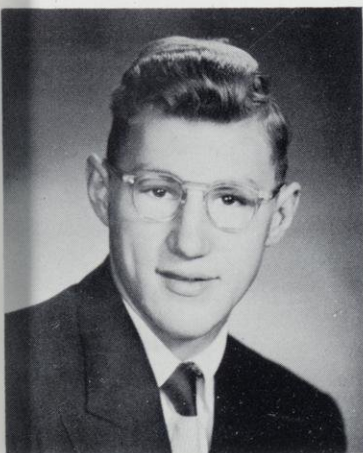
JANET SHEPARD

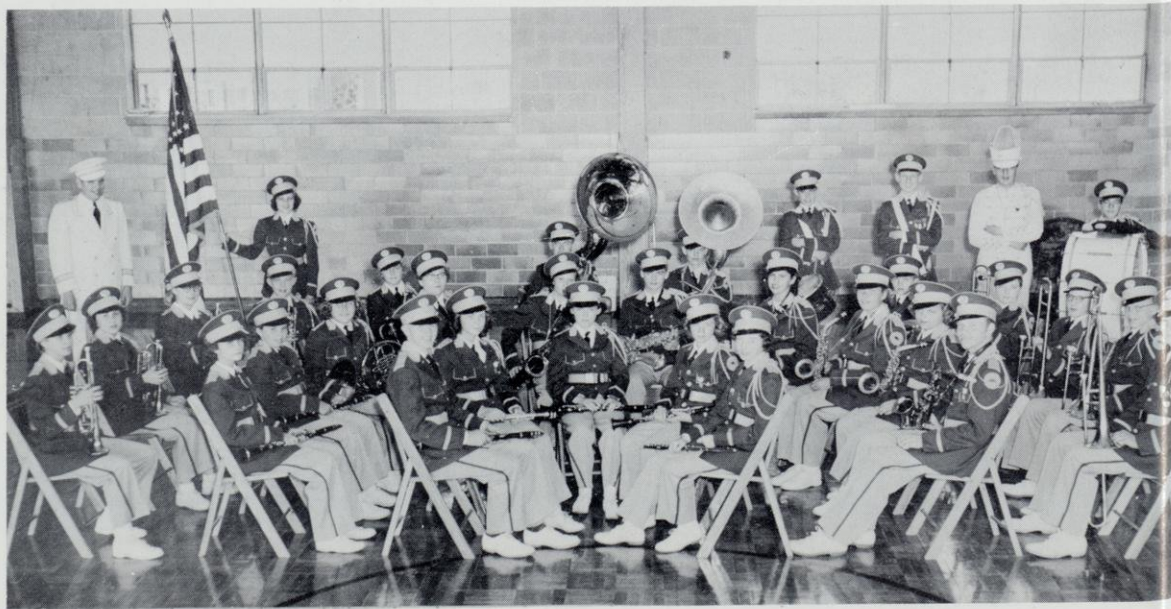
Myron C. Beckman

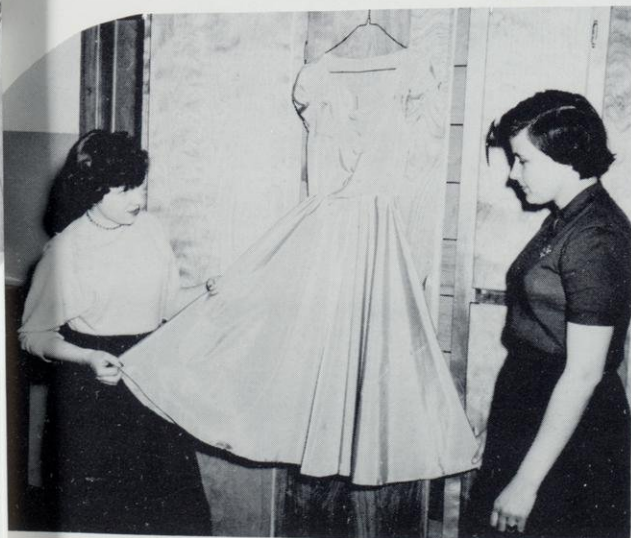


HOME ECONOMICS

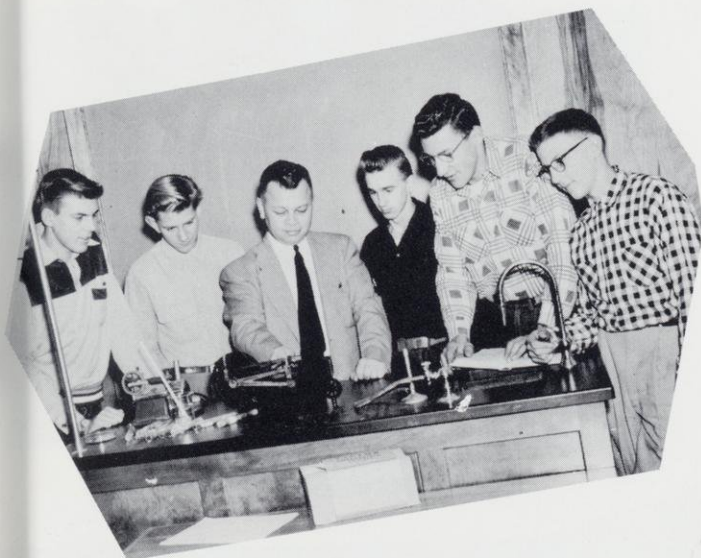

Miss Handran, in her first year as librarian, reorganized our library and formed the Library Club. She coached oratory and extempore reading.



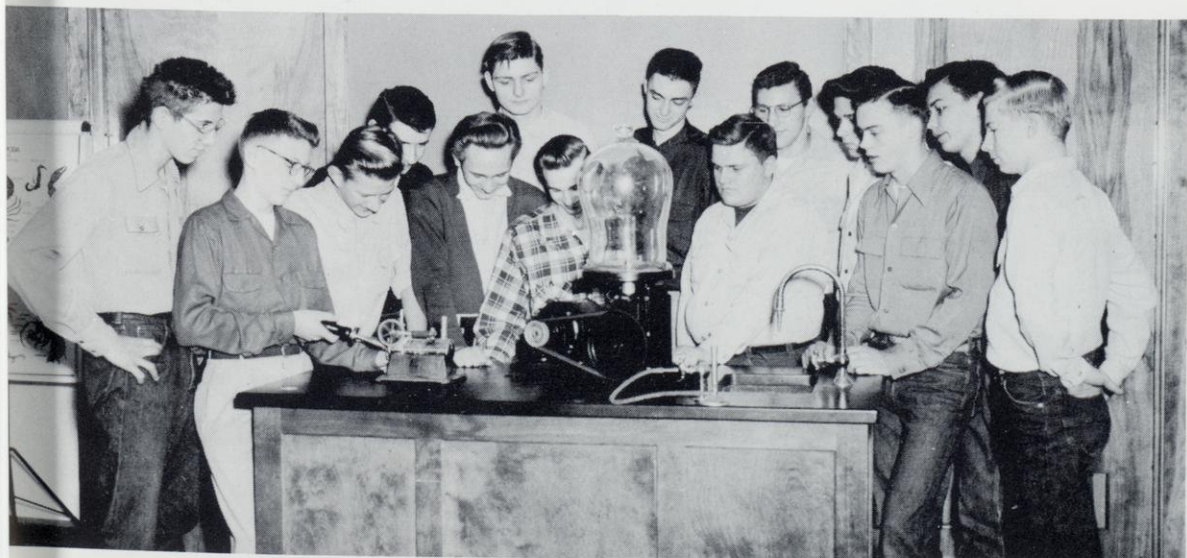

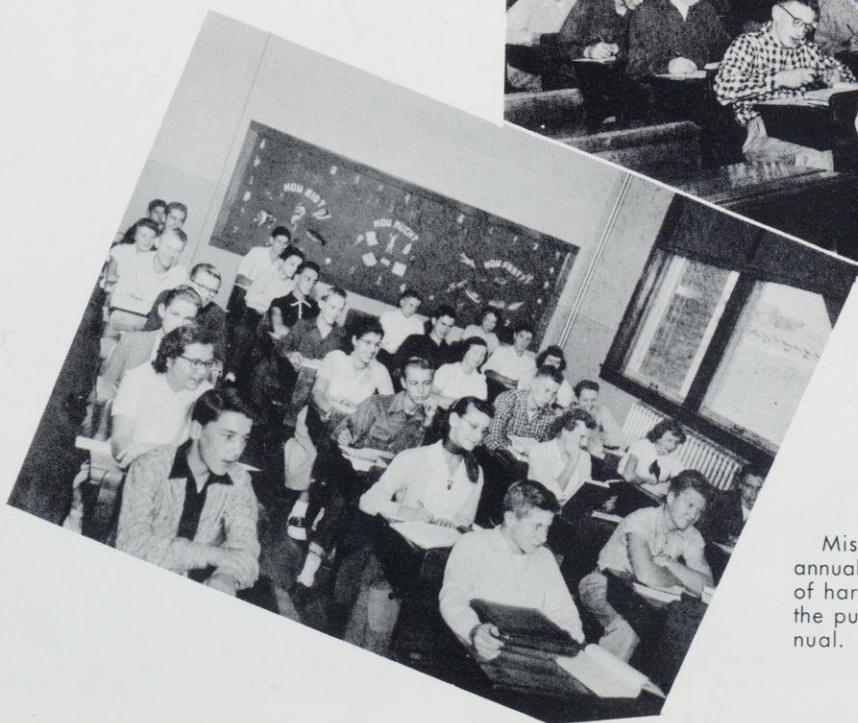
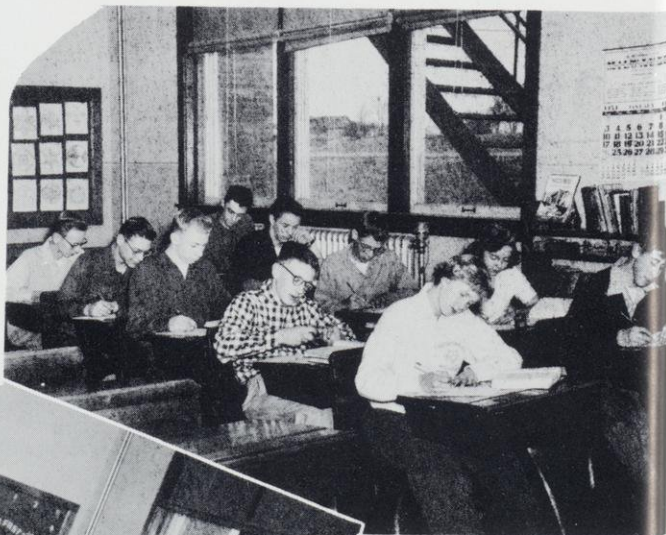


ESTHER M. KLEMP

In this way, he helped us to choose the courses which would best fit us for our future life work. He taught three freshmen civics classes and sponsored the cheerleader groups.





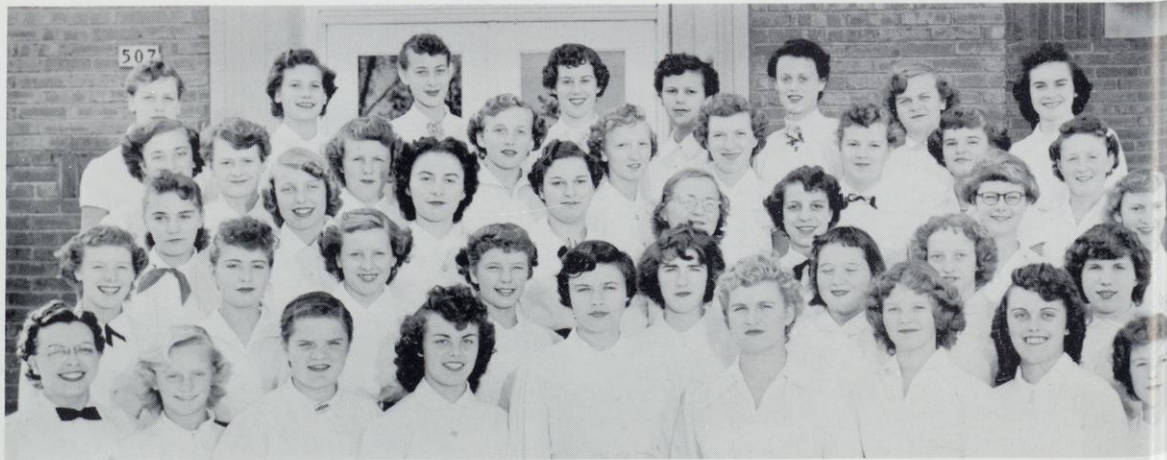

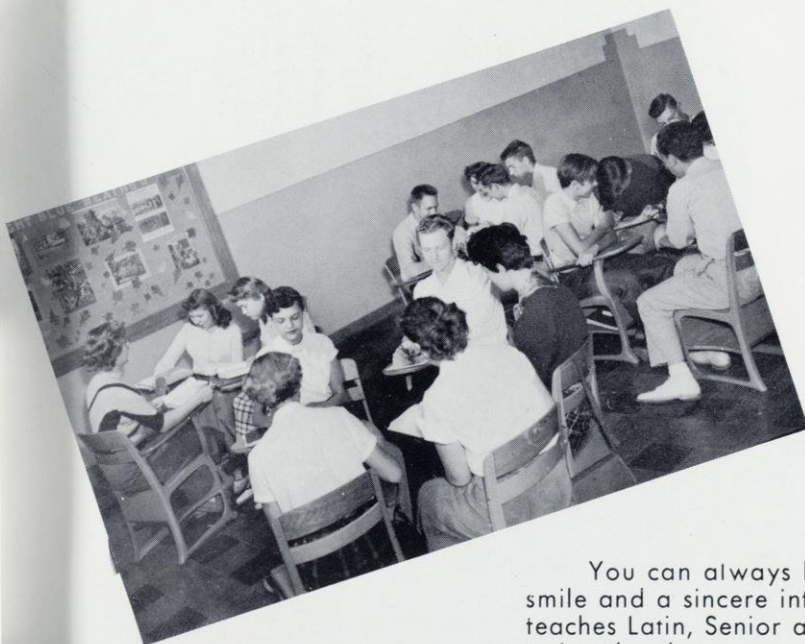

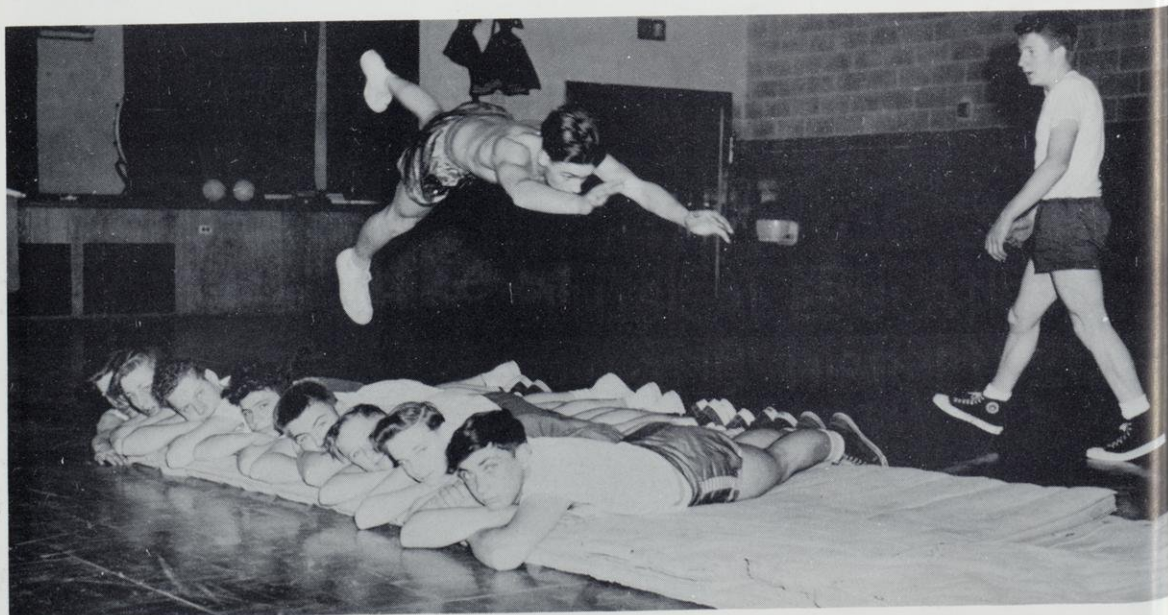
Mr. Stasnopolis, who teaches U. S. History and Social Problems has added a semester of Economics to an interesting course to which reality is added by his many personal experiences.

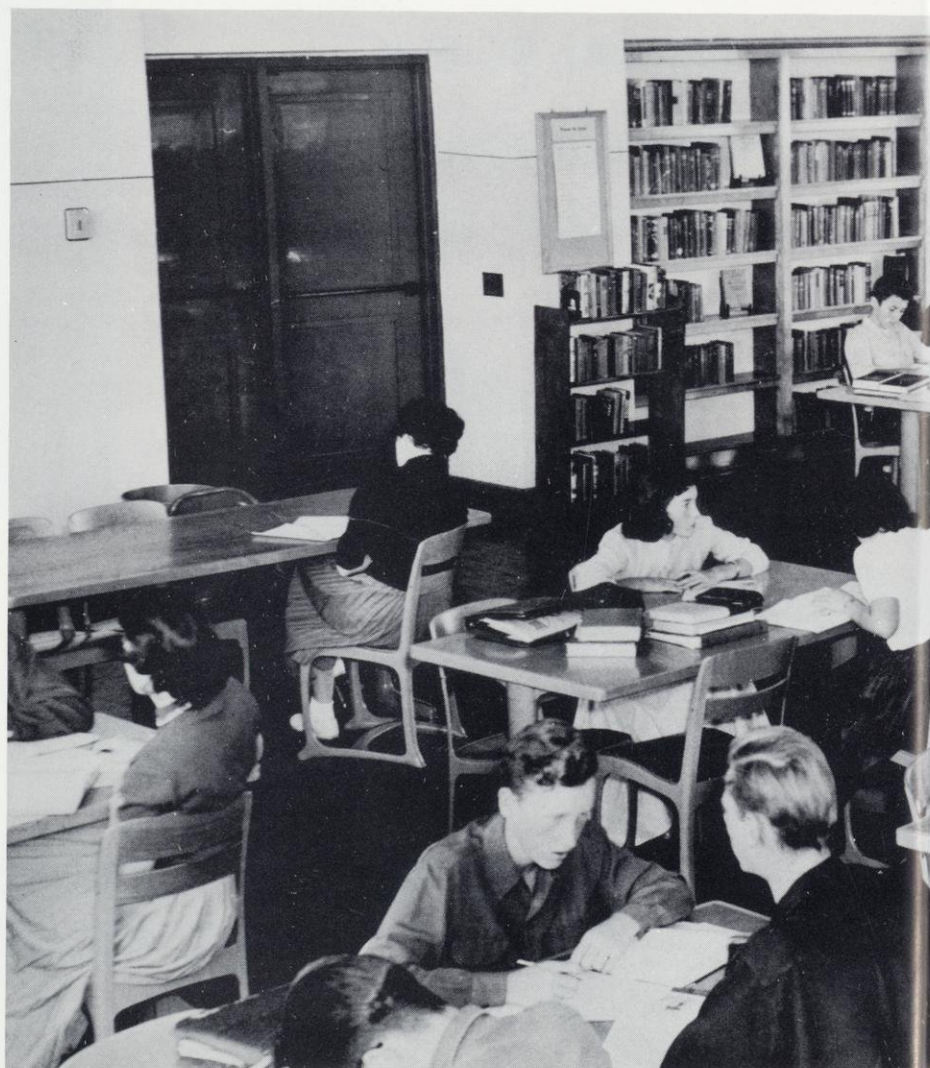

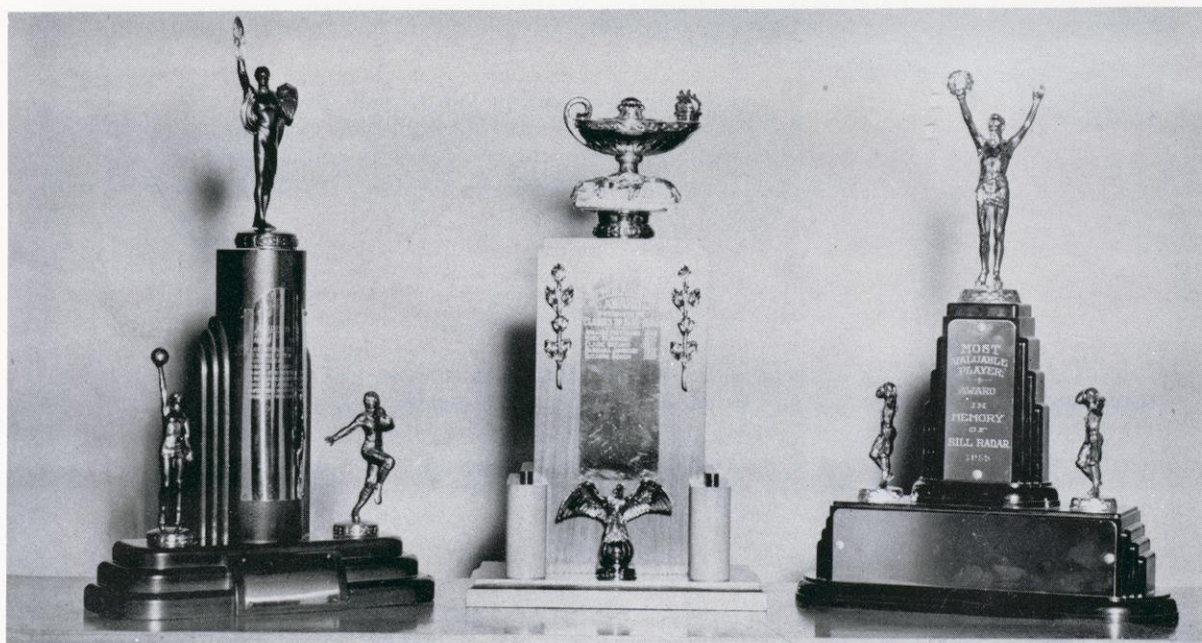
