## WILL PERFORMERS BE HIT BY THEIR OWN BOOMERANG?

The boomerang is a device characteristic of Australia where its use is confined to the semi-barbarous bushmen who find that it saves a lot of walking to be able to throw a weapon which will return to the thrower in case a shot is missed. Even in Australia, indeed, the boomerang is passing as a crude instrument which doesn't belong to these days of modern civilization. The agitation which is on in Chicago relative to the exhibition of the JeffriesJohnson fight pictures suggests that the second city in the United States is experiencing a retrogression -that folks here are toying with a boomerang. Champions of one brand of high class morality have hurled a weapon at what they have chosen to call a "brutal, demoralizing exhibition," and now, if Chief of Police L. T. Steward stands pat, this weapon will come back and hit them fairly between the eyes.
Acting upon an application which has been made for a license to exhibit the Jeffries-Johrson fight pictures in Chicago, Chief Steward on Monday issued the following order to his assistant superintendent of police, the real executive head of the department: "Permit the exhibition of no pictures or representation in any form of acts illegal in the state of Illinois." In explanation Chief Steward said emphatically that the order speaks for itself and is to be interpreted literally, as it reads. The official's position in the matter is clear. He realizes that the country's constitution guarantees a government of laws and not of men. He knows that certain things cannot be prohibited merely because he wishes them to be prohibited but must stand or fall because they are either right or wrong with existing laws as the standard of judgment. In other words, Chief Stew ard has merely directed that existing laws be enforced and that his construction of existing law is that the representation in any way of things that are illegal in the state of Illinois is likewise illegal.
Reformers who have insisted that the JeffriesJohnson pictures be barred from Chicago, it would seem, must therefore prepare themselves for expurgated editions of Shakespeare and the drama as exemplified by other classic authors. Chief Steward must, to be consistent, insist upon "Hamlet" without its murder scene and Macbeth without its dripping
dagger. It will be a long time before murder will be legal in Illinois. "The Death of Caesar," by Gerome, at the Art Institute, is in danger, if Chief Steward plans to be consistent-for it is certainly the representation of an act that is illegal in the state of Illinois. And innocent "Baby Mine" which has been delighting thousands in Chicago for months, mainly through its representation of the illegal act of kidnaping, must go-if Chief Steward plans to be consistent.
But the chief's ultimatum is not the last word in this controversy if the Illinois moving picture men who have the state rights for the films really gave up fifty thousand real, cold dollars for their rights, as it has been announced they did. Fifty thousand dollars is a lot of money and worth a lot of argument. And the courts in the land are commonly supposed to have been established for the interpretation of law which chiefs of police are appointed to administrate. The governor of one of these United States had his gray matter working the other day when he said that he was no gambler, did not bluff, and consequently was not going to prohibit anything which he had no right to prohibit. "The legislative body of any community, town, city or state can prohibit these things by enacting laws, if laws to cover them do not already exist," he said, "but the stretching of laws to accomplish a purpose, laudable as this purpose may be, will not suffice.'
Looking at the matter from an absolutely disinter ested standpoint it would seem that the country-wide agitation against the fight pictures is the magnification of an ant hill into a mountain. If the exhibition of fight pictures is demoralizing, it remains a certainty that the exhibition of the Jeffries-Johnson pictures would demoralize a fewer number of people than has been demoralized by any set of fight pic tures made in years. The result of the battle was far from being popular and the public wants to forget it. If given free rein the pictures would run themselves out in less time than has been taken up with the discussion of their influence upon poor, dependent Young America which is thrown face to face with vice at every corner in every great city and still seems to be weathering the gale.
