OLD SHOW INDIAN DIES IN OKLAHOMA

Bull Bear, Cheyenne, Formerly with Miller Brothers Is No More

Bliss, Okla., July 27.—The Miller Brothers, prominent in the control of Miller Brothers' 101 Ranch Wild West, have just been advised of the death of Bull Bear, one of the foremost show Indians in this country. Bull Bear died at Kingfisher, Okla., July 17 at the age of fifty-nine years. The deceased Indian was a Cheyenne and had been made a chief among his tribesmen because of his bravery in times of war. He was one of the contestants in the famous Pat Hennessey massacre at Beecher Island, Neb., and also took part in the Indian troubles at Navajo Mountains when forty Texas Rangers were annihilated while under the command of a state governor, who, it is said, to this day does not know what tribe of Indians was responsible for the killing.

Until recently Bull Bear had been in service with the Miller Brothers' Wild West and notification of his death was given the Oklahoma showmen by his brother, Thunder Bird, "for the reason that Bull Bear had often mentioned the good treatment he received from the Miller Brothers." One of the Indian's most recent activities with the show was his participation in the making of the big moving picture called "The Buffalo Hunt"; Bull Bear followed the chase and shot the bull with bow and arrow.

LAURA JEAN LIBBEY PLAYS FOR MORRIS.

New York, July 27.—Laura Jean Libbey, who has written about seventy novels and eighty plays of the heart throbbing variety, has succumbed to the call of the footlights and will open at the American Music Hall here for William Morris next Monday. Mrs. Van Mater Stillwell, of Brooklyn (Laura Jean Libbey), will recite two original poems and a "love monologue" which she has written.

SHUBERTS ARE AFTER HOUSE IN DAYTON

Dayton, Ohio, July 25.—Memorial Hall in this city may be turned into a theater to house the Shubert attractions. A committee of the Chamber of Commerce is conferring with the county commissioners relative to the required architectural changes. As it stands at present the hall is a losing proposition.

OLD LYCEUM PASSES IN SALT LAKE CITY

Salt Lake City, Utah., July 25.—The old Lyceum theater, one of the landmarks of this city, is being torn down; on its site there is to be erected a modern vaudeville theater. The Lyceum had served as a theater for ten years, before that time had been used by a number of business institutions, and before that had been used as a schoolhouse.

SULLIVAN & CONSIDINE PLAYERS IN TROUPES

Bill Will be Taken Over the Country Intact Next Season—
Conference in Chicago

The shows will move from one Sullivan & Considine house to another next season intact, without the changing of a single act. This was determined at Chicago on Wednesday of this week when Chris O. Brown, New York manager of the firm, and H. C. Robertson and Paul Gourdon, of the Chicago office, held a conference.

The shows will open in Cincinnati and then move to Milwaukee, Minneapolis, St. Paul, Duluth, Winnipeg (Monday opening) and then west.

There are many advantages in the new arrangement. It makes the jumps better and saves at least \$10 per per-

former on railroads; it makes the rail-roading easier, as special train service has been arranged for at the points it is needed; it makes it nicer for the artists inasmuch as it gives longer time contracts, and it is nicer for S. & C. as it saves a lot of work.

Where the houses are owned by individual managers and one wants an expensive show and another a cheap show such a plan is not practical but Sullivan & Considine have the leases of their houses and all of them play the same shows.

Work is in progress on the foundation of the new S. & C. theater in St. Paul.

SELLS-FLOTO TURN 3,000 AWAY AT OMAHA

Engagement in Nebraska City Monday Another Tribute to Independents

Omaha, July 25.—The great Sells-Floto Shows came, we saw, and they conquered. From the grand entry to the last mad dash down the homestretch by the rumbling, careening chariots at the close of the performance, the 12,000 people inside the "big top" in the afternoon were perfectly satisfied that they had seen one of the best tented arenic shows before the public.

The Sells-Floto people are remarkable economists in the matter of time, making each minute of the two hours and more divulge its quota of refined circus entertainment. The courage of a great show like the Sells-Floto traveling the country at the small admission of twenty-five cents aroused the admiration of a long-abused circus public and the latter flocked out to see if it were really true that the circus is classed with the largest in the land. The continuous applause that greeted the various acts showed plainly that the folks realized that at last a great circus had fairly "cut the price in two, but left the fine performance whole."

But the performance. We will not be so foolish as to say that it was the best thing we ever saw in a circus tent, but considering the price of the Sells-Floto shows and the price charged by other big moguls, we can truthfully say that the Sells-Floto aggregation gives the public more nearly their money's worth. It is no wonder the Sells-Floto management has succeeded in "showing the great American public," having a corps of lieutenants who know the truth of the

assertion the public wants to be coddled and made much of and treated as human beings, and not as a drove of animals, each with a half dollar in his or her hand.—Smyth.

Omaha, Neb., July 25.—The Sells-Floto Shows turned them away in droves at night and packed them to the ring bank in the afternoon here today. It is the biggest thing at the "split" ever seen in this city and has established itself so strongly that when they come again the same great crowds will be present to bid them welcome. It was the third big show into Omaha this year and the Forepaugh & Sells Bros.' combination was heavily billed for September 19. All of this seemed to have no effect whatever on the attendance. It is no exaggeration to state that fully 3,000 people were turned away at the night show. A heavy rain came up about ten o'clock just as the performance was over.

H. H. Tammen and Otto Floto were on to visit the show here and both are as enthusiastic as ever over the success of the "big thing." Plans are now being put through to give the people a three-ring and two-stage circus for twenty-five cents next season. There will be a six-pole top and many new features will be added. Mr. Tammen states that the menagerie will be doubled and will include some of the rarest animals that money can buy.

All the principal railroad officials, including General Manager Mohler of the Union Pacific, and Mr. Spend of the Burlington, took in the performance.—C. L. H.

HAGENBECK-WALLACE TO BE AT HAMMOND.

Most Notable Feature of Performance Said to Be Jim Rutherford's Clowns.

The Hagenbeck-Wallace circus will exhibit at Hammond next Monday. The show will arrive there on Sunday and the performers are planning an invasion on Chicago on that day. On Monday many members of the Chicago circus colony will return the visit.

The show has been in Indiana for more than two weeks and, considering that the farmers are in harvest, business has been very good. Last Sunday the show was at Valparaiso, Ind., and had many visitors. Among them was W. E. Haines, contracting agent of the Sells-Floto show; Frank Purcell, press agent of the Sells-Floto shows, and Mr. and Mrs. Z. A. Hendricks and E. E. Meredith, of Chicago.

The performance this year is well spoken of. The feature which stands out most is the work of the clowns. James H. Rutherford, the principal clown, is surrounded with as capable a bunch of jesters as has been gathered together in circus history, and an aeroplane stunt is one of the most notable travesties yet produced. Henry Stantz, who impersonates an old lady in the hippodrome ring and entertains before the performance begins, makes a tremendous hit.

Fred Wagner, who is with the show again this season, ran into Chicago last Monday from Valparaiso.

"UNMARRIED" GIRLIE SHOT BY HER HUSBAND

New York, July 27.—Mrs. Alfred H. Dalby, one of the "Girlie" chorus girls who are billed as "none of them twenty and none of them married," was shot by her husband Friday night. Mr. and Mrs. Dalby had not been living together, but the husband resented it when his wife walked home from the theater with another man. Dalby put two bullets into his own head after he had shot his wife. Both have a chance to recover.

MARSHALL P. WILDER ILL AT ATLANTIC CITY.

Atlantic City, N. J., July 27.—Marshall P. Wilder is dangerously ill at his home here as the result of a collapse from overwork. Attending physicians who had been fearful as to his recovery now express the opinion that he has a chance to get well.

Buy Lubin Theaters in Baltimore.

Baltimore, Md., July 25.—The Knickerbocker Theater company has purchased the Lubin theaters at Nos. 404 and 410 East Baltimore street and will erect on the sites a large theater with a seating capacity of 1,800. Polite vaudeville, moving pictures, and other novelties will furnish the entertainment. The new theater will be one of the largest of the kind south of New York City.

Harry Bulger and Vincent Bryan are busily engaged these hot summer days in making over "The Flirting Princess" to fit the Bulger style of comedy. It appears that the Singers will send this piece on the road this season with Bulger as the chief funmaker. Just now the chorus is being selected, and in a few days the piece will go in rehearsal. Bulger always insists that he be allowed to inject his own comedy in whatever role he essays, and it is to be hoped that he will write himself some funny lines.

Two other of Mort H. Singer's shows, "The Goddess of Liberty" and "Miss Nobody From Starland," will begin rehearsals within a fortnight.

Peyton Boswell's new sketch, "The Burglar and the Baron," which was tried out at the Bush Temple Theater last week, made a distinct hit. It received five curtain calls, which probably means that it will get the much coveted big time.

Joy looms up ahead in great big gobs. "The Midnight Sons" is headed straight on for the Lyric, and if reports are to be credited, the show is a snappy one, and one that ought to set Chicago by the ears. George W. Munroe, who does fat Irish women with great unction, is in the cast and Maud Lambert is also in the list, to say nothing of a long string of other entertainers. The attraction opens August 1.

Channing Ellery certainly does put on Tschaikowsky's overture "1812" with much eclat at Bismarck Gardens. The other night his band played this remarkable composition. The lights were all turned off in the garden, guns were fired, red light flared, and there was noise enough to arouse the seven sleepers. It hit the spot all right, and anyone who wants to be thoroughly awakened should take a run out some night and hear the overture.

There are no changes in the downtown theaters for the coming week. "Madame Sherry" will remain at the Colonial; "My Cinderella Girl" will continue at the Whitney; "The Girl in the Kimono" is at the Zeigfeld, and "The Fortune Hunter" is still on at the Olympic, while "Baby Mine" makes them all laugh down at the Princess.

Bert Glickhauf, one of the old newspaper men of the city, who has for some years been in the show business, was in town last week calling on friends. Mr. Glickhauf has had a varied experience since he left the newspaper business, and he has made good, too.

One report coming from New York is to the effect that Herbert C. Duce and Sam P. Gerson were seen together on Broadway.

Charles Elliott, who had a brief career as manager of the Bush Temple Theater last season, is managing a theater out in Portland, Ore., and seems to be making good. Elliott is a hustler, and in the old days when he managed Hopkins' Theater he had the town sitting up to take notice about all the time.

The very latest news down Studebaker way is that Montgomery and Stone will open that playhouse Monday evening, August 15, in "The Old Town."

Ringling Brothers Got Hard Wallop in Big Michigan City.

Lonesome looking ballyhoo men hung about the entrances to the side shows on the North street grounds Saturday evening, waiting for the crowds of sight-seers which didn't materialize.

While the Ringling Bros.' Shows were well patronized in the afternoon, the attendance being mostly by people outside the city, the evening performance was given a decided frost by Kazooks. The long list of burglaries and incendiaries of the Saturday night previous had made the townsmen cautious and they did not care to leave their homes unguarded to attend a circus.

This heedfulness on the part of citizens meant a loss of thousands of dollars to the circus management, as the big circus arena contained hundreds upon hundreds of vacant seats, every one of which represented so much good money unspent.

The Ringling Shows were, however, up to their usual standard and both performances were satisfactory. — Kalamazoo Evening Telegram.

Robbins has many friends here, as he listed the Cole Brothers' property last January and remained a month or more. Rumors of short-changing and shell games are heard since the show left, but it is believed no one was seriously harmed.

JACK CAMPBELL BECOMES RAILROAD EMPLOYEE.

Jack Campbell, the well known agent who has been in advance of many well known Chicago attractions and who has of late been connected with the W. F. Mann forces, has been appointed assistant chief clerk in the motive power department of the C., M. & St. P. R. R. at Chicago.

Malcolm have leased a plot of ground from Mrs. Mary Otis Keep at No. 3202 West Madison street, Chicago, and are about to begin the construction of a three-story building which is to be occupied, in part, by a theater which will seat 1,650 people. The lease is for thirty years at a total rental of \$72,265, or \$2,408 per year.

I had the same printed on white satin and sent to circuses to frame and hang in the ticket wagon; to secret orders to frame and place on the walls of their lodge rooms; to dramatic papers for their sanctums, where stories of "white top" are created and given to press and paper. Why can't this custom of white satin tribute be adopted by show people everywhere? This week the death of Mrs. Virginia Jeffries Wolcott is announced. She was known to the stage by her maiden name, Virginia Jeffries. The end came at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. V. O. Jeffries, this city, last Friday night. She was twenty-five years of age and had been on the stage about five years. She played in stock in a number of cities. Possessed of a fine figure and charming personality, she became quite a favorite. For the last two years she starred both east and west in her own company under the name of "The Virginia Jeffries Theatrical Company." Three weeks ago she collapsed from the strain of overwork and gave up the stage. Brain affection developed and spinal meningitis brought the end. Her husband, Edwin Walcott, survives. Her sweet sleep of eternity is at Greenlawn.

I made a trip to the historic town of Birmingham, which, when blessed with a postoffice, was called Milnersville, situated near Cambridge, Ohio, and known to all old-time circus folk. No railroad touches the place. It is a stone's throw from the farm of "Cy" Young, the baseball pitcher, who has his home at Paoli, illuminated by the circus light. In the days of the wagon shows, when the "slick" ones worked the three thimbles and the paper wad and the old army game, Birmingham was a regular stop. Money hung on the trees and you could reach to a limb any morning and pull down a breakfast. The O'Brien show stopped here every year and took all the money in sight and out of sight. The old stone building that in those days served as a hotel and sheltered and hid many a circusman is now the home of my dearest friends. The late Frank Aldrich (you couldn't get them trickier) was compelled to flee from the sheriff and constable at Birmingham and the landlord of the then hotel hid him in the big chimney

They now have their own car and are dated leading state and county fairs. This, they figure, makes it easier and gets them more money. Mr. Harris dated at leading state and county fairs. Cleveland. Doc Minturn writes: "We have done fine business up on the Iron Range. In all my experience I never met better officials and newspaper people. It has been a love-feast. We have had opposition with the Gollmar and Campbell Bros.' shows, but it certainly did not hurt us. Any show that is able to deliver the goods and is without graft can come up here and get the money."

Columbus Car Strike Hurt Recent Circus Dates.

The street car company and its employes who belong to the union have been disputing for some time. The first strike was declared the day the Hagenbeck-Wallace and the 101 Ranch Wild West contested here for business. It has never been made clear to me why the circuses should be injured by parties with whom they never had dealings. The strike, you know, rendered going impossible to many. Had the cars been running I believe both shows could have given three performances that day. Well, the strike is on again. The union men walked out Sunday morning. The city is full of strikebreakers and desperate characters; the head of the police department is weak; the chief executive of the city is weaker. I make this statement, too, in the face of all that has been said about a second meeting between the former champion and the Smoke. There is one great obstacle that Jim just can't overcome, and that is his wife. She has set her head on one point, and that is that Jim will not fight again. In the drawing room on their private car, leaving Reno, the day after the fight, she, Jim and myself were seated together. Only once did she refer to the fight, and that was when she said: "Let's be thankful that no bones were broken. The fight is over now and I will have Jim to myself from this time on. I never want him to fight again."

That statement should be strong enough to silence for all time the report that he is going to fight again. 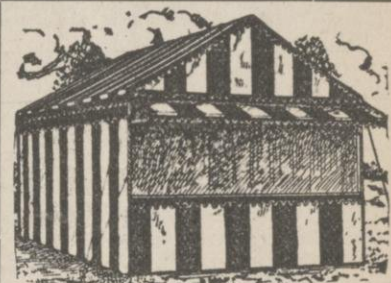

Letters like this one are only an indication of the upheaval the Show World has already caused in the field of amusement papers. Three years young, the Show World has a future. It is proving successful because it is a n-e-w-s-p-a-p-e-r devoted to the interests of followers of amusements everywhere.

The latest Richard Strauss opera, "Feuersnot," produced in London, is in one act and lasts less than an hour. The first-night audience was delighted.

WILL PERFORMERS BE HIT BY THEIR OWN BOOMERANG?

The boomerang is a device characteristic of Australia where its use is confined to the semi-barbarous bushmen who find that it saves a lot of walking to be able to throw a weapon which will return to the thrower in case a shot is missed. Even in Australia, indeed, the boomerang is passing as a crude instrument which doesn't belong to these days of modern civilization. The agitation which is on in Chicago relative to the exhibition of the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures suggests that the second city in the United States is experiencing a retrogression—that folks here are toying with a boomerang. Champions of one brand of high class morality have hurled a weapon at what they have chosen to call a "brutal, demoralizing exhibition," and now, if Chief of Police L. T. Steward stands pat, this weapon will come back and hit them fairly between the eyes.

Acting upon an application which has been made for a license to exhibit the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures in Chicago, Chief Steward on Monday issued the following order to his assistant superintendent of police, the real executive head of the department: "Permit the exhibition of no pictures or representation in any form of acts illegal in the state of Illinois." In explanation Chief Steward said emphatically that the order speaks for itself and is to be interpreted literally, as it reads. The official's position in the matter is clear. He realizes that the country's constitution guarantees a government of laws and not of men. He knows that certain things cannot be prohibited merely because he wishes them to be prohibited but must stand or fall because they are either right or wrong with existing laws as the standard of judgment. In other words, Chief Steward has merely directed that existing laws be enforced and that his construction of existing law is that the representation in any way of things that are illegal in the state of Illinois is likewise illegal.

Reformers who have insisted that the Jeffries-Johnson pictures be barred from Chicago, it would seem, must therefore prepare themselves for expurgated editions of Shakespeare and the drama as exemplified by other classic authors. Chief Steward must, to be consistent, insist upon "Hamlet" without its murder scene and Macbeth without its dripping

dagger. It will be a long time before murder will be legal in Illinois. "The Death of Caesar," by Gerome, at the Art Institute, is in danger, if Chief Steward plans to be consistent—for it is certainly the representation of an act that is illegal in the state of Illinois. And innocent "Baby Mine" which has been delighting thousands in Chicago for months, mainly through its representation of the illegal act of kidnaping, must go—if Chief Steward plans to be consistent.

But the chief's ultimatum is not the last word in this controversy if the Illinois moving picture men who have the state rights for the films really gave up fifty thousand real, cold dollars for their rights, as it has been announced they did. Fifty thousand dollars is a lot of money and worth a lot of argument. And the courts in the land are commonly supposed to have been established for the interpretation of law which chiefs of police are appointed to administrate. The governor of one of these United States had his gray matter working the other day when he said that he was no gambler, did not bluff, and consequently was not going to prohibit anything which he had no right to prohibit. "The legislative body of any community, town, city or state can prohibit these things by enacting laws, if laws to cover them do not already exist," he said, "but the stretching of laws to accomplish a purpose, laudable as this purpose may be, will not suffice."

Looking at the matter from an absolutely disinterested standpoint it would seem that the country-wide agitation against the fight pictures is the magnification of an ant hill into a mountain. If the exhibition of fight pictures is demoralizing, it remains a certainty that the exhibition of the Jeffries-Johnson pictures would demoralize a fewer number of people than has been demoralized by any set of fight pictures made in years. The result of the battle was far from being popular and the public wants to forget it. If given free rein the pictures would run themselves out in less time than has been taken up with the discussion of their influence upon poor, dependent Young America which is thrown face to face with vice at every corner in every great city and still seems to be weathering the gale.

WALTER L. MAIN ANNOUNCES POSITION ON CIRCUS QUESTION

Walter L. Main, veteran circus man, has favored The Show World with the following communication which is self-explanatory and tells where he stands in certain circus activities with which his name has been associated during the past few weeks:

Gentlemen:—As I remember it, a few weeks ago there was a write-up in your paper saying that I had affiliated myself with Walter Shannon and Mr. Brotherton, his backer from my county, in the Norris-Rowe circus deal and that my Ashtabula county friend and I did not now speak as we passed by. This is a mistake. While we are not close friends, Mr. Brotherton and I are acquaintances and have never had any misunderstanding.

When I started for the Norris & Rowe sale I intended to buy or bid on anything that went cheap, and that I thought I could sell again and turn a profit. When I got on the train at Geneva, Mr. Brotherton was aboard and we rode all the way to Peru together. I did not know until that time that he wanted the show. He said that he had corresponded with Shannon, and I asked him if his correspondence had not been with Rowe. His reply was that he was sure it had been with Shannon and that he thought he would buy the show and make Shannon manager of it. I agreed not to bid against him if he wanted the

show, and I boosted the deal under circumstances which would have made many a man a knocker and not a booster. Mr. Brotherton was undecided as to whether or not he would bid, and I told him that, although I had met Shannon but twice in my life, I regarded him as a gentleman and thought that he had not been given a fair chance for his \$15,000 or \$20,000 which he had invested in the show, when it had been closed after being out only three weeks. I am always sorry to see any man lose his money without a fair run for it.

When we arrived in Peru, Shannon met us at the train and I told Shannon that if he wanted to make the deal he had better keep Brotherton in the background and prevent knocking showmen from upsetting his plans. I suggested that he get a buggy and take Mr. Brotherton out to the farm to look at the property. He followed my advice and I did not know until the next morning that they had finally agreed to bid on the show. Just before the sale began, Shannon told me it was a go and asked me to help them all I could. I did help all I could, although I had no financial interest whatever in the deal. My only information as to the future of the show, at this writing, is that published in the Show World last week, which said that the show would go on the road in the fall.

My attention has also been called to another publication in your paper, saying that I as back in the harness again with a certain circus, and that I in-

sisted upon the agents calling me "Governor," as I had done with the Big Main circus. In a way I did insist upon being called "Governor" with the Main show. I really did not care what they called me, whether it was "Governor" or something else, just so it was not Main—and with reason. When the citizens in a town you are playing with a circus know who you are each person who meets you wants to sue you or to hold you up for free tickets, and you are continually annoyed from the time you strike town until you leave it. Any if the big show managers will agree with me that it is best to go on the still hunt and not to be too much in the limelight.

In conclusion, I have not signed a contract to be the general agent for any circus. I have dealings of a private nature with some American circumstances, but am not responsible whether they win or lose.

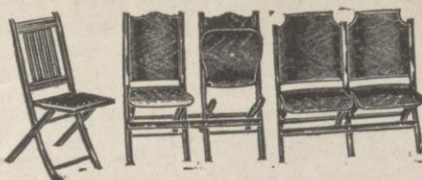
