Upon motion by Regent Neshek, seconded by Regent Pelisek, it was  
VOTED, That the minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board of Regents  
of the University of Wisconsin System held on July 16, 1976, be approved.

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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

President McNamara called upon Regent Lavine to report on the Higher  
Educational Aids Board meeting. Regent Lavine referred to the report of the  
HEAB meeting of July 30, 1976 (attached as EXHIBIT A), and offered to answer any  
questions. Regent DeBardleben reported that the Executive Committee of the HEAB  
did meet in Wausau on September 10. The sole function of the meeting was to adopt  
the dollar amounts for the HEAB budget requests, which conform exactly to the  
policies that were adopted at the previous meeting.

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President McNamara reported that because of the press of business relative  
to the search and screen for a new System President and because of the upcoming  
budget it was felt that we could not prepare adequately for a useful joint business  
meeting with the University of Minnesota Board of Regents but that there would be a  
social affair prior to the Minnesota-Wisconsin football game hosted by President and  
Mrs. Weaver.

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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

President Weaver presented the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Adminis-  
trative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the  
Regent Record.

Regent DeBardleben moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion  
was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1289: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed. (EXHIBIT B, attached)

President Weaver made the following report with respect to the Legislative Council Education Committee:

"The Joint Legislative Council of the State Legislature has established an education committee to undertake several studies, including one which is devoted to the question of access to and quality in higher education.

"The Joint Legislative Council, as you know, is the 'study arm' of the legislature, whose principal function is to give careful consideration to various problems of government and to then present their findings to the legislature. The Council operates through committees such as the Education Committee--committees which submit reports--together with legislative proposals to carry out their recommendations--to the Legislative Council for approval. If those proposals are approved by the Legislative Council, they are then introduced in the legislature. The Legislative Council is composed of: The six members of the Joint Committee on Legislative Organization; the Senate and Assembly Chairmen; the ranking minority members of the Joint Committee on Finance; the Assembly Speaker Pro Tem; and three Senators and five Representatives appointed as are standing committees in each house.

"The Education Committee of the Legislative Council is made up of the members of the Senate and Assembly Education Committees. Among the public members of the Council are:

Marvin Brickson, representing the VTAE System  
Robert Cramer, President of Carroll College, representing the private sector of higher education  
Buff Wright, President of United Council, representing the students  
Warren Carrier, Chancellor of the Platteville Campus, representing the University of Wisconsin System and public collegiate higher education

"The Legislative Council Education Committee has held two informational hearings and has scheduled the third for next week. In its first public hearing the committee focused on a statistical overview of the UW and Voc-Tech Systems and a discussion of issues which the committee might address. In the second hearing, UW System personnel made extensive presentations regarding the process of approval of new programs and evaluations of existing programs, and on the subject of coordination between the UW and VTAE Systems. In its next hearing the UW System will make presentations regarding our policies on enrollment and targeting and resource allocation policies, as well as enrollment projections and state aids funding.

"As you know, it has been one of our aims to establish a broader base of understanding of University problems in the legislature. We have, therefore, welcomed the opportunity, whenever possible, to work with legislative committees and staff to explain our policies and current thinking about how to meet some of our difficulties, as well as our opportunities. We, therefore, view our relationship with the Legislative Council Education Committee as a positive one, and hopefully a productive one, in establishing better communications with the Legislature."

President Weaver called upon Chancellor Dreyfus to report on the activities of the Council of Chancellors, of which he is Chairman. Chancellor Dreyfus reported the Council met on the Oshkosh Campus the previous week and was able to meet with all or most all of the private school presidents, allowing an exchange of views on some mutual problems confronting private universities and colleges and the University System. He reported a Committee consisting of Chancellors Baum, Guskin and Carrier, with Chancellor Carrier serving as Chairman, had been appointed to address the problem of the use of University facilities for religious services. He said it appeared there was a wide diversity of opinion among the Chancellors on the matter and a paper will be forthcoming with recommendations relative to the matter. He reported the members of the Council unanimously approved a resolution that the inflationary erosion of the faculty retirement package be the number one priority for retirement plan improvement consideration. He noted that Chancellor Haas' term as the Wisconsin representative of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities had ended and Chancellor Lindner was to replace him for the next two years. He also noted Chancellor Haas' term as the Council's representative on the State Advisory Committee for Career Education ended, and Chancellor Fort was elected to serve in that position. Regent DeBardleben stated that he was disturbed by the fact that the Chancellors are going to spend some time on the question of whether or not University facilities should be used for religious services and inquired if we have a policy on that matter. Senior Vice President Percy stated that we do not have a policy--we have a Board policy that deals with the use of facilities by outside groups. He noted that the lack of a policy with respect to the use of facilities by denominational groups presents a problem and that he is pleased that the Council of Chancellors intends to address the matter. He stated that the subject will be back to the Board before the end of the calendar year.

At the request of President Weaver, Assistant to the President Joseph Wiley introduced the following interns for the 1976-77 academic year:

Mary Jo Zabawa, Wisconsin Rapids, a Political Science Graduate, who has just completed her Master's Degree in Public Policy Administration at UW-Madison, who has chosen the Office of Personnel Employee Relations for her internship.

Yvonne McDonald, Asheville, North Carolina, completing her Master's Degree in Sociology at UW-Madison, who has selected the Office of Analysis Services and Information System for her internship.

Sue Desmond, Duluth, Minnesota, a candidate for the Ph.D. in Educational Administration, UW-Madison, who has chosen to divide her internship between the UW Extended Degree Program, Central Administration, and the Chancellor's Office at UW-Superior.

Chancellor George Field, UW-River Falls, introduced Mr. Clyde Smith, who is to assume an internship on the River Falls campus. Mr. Smith is a graduate of Northwestern University and is presently employed at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. He has chosen the Office of the Assistant Chancellor for Business and Finance at UW-River Falls for his internship.

President Weaver stated that he had assembled a work plan and schedule for the forthcoming academic year and rather than make it an oral report would forward it to the Regents within the next week or so.

President Weaver reviewed the fall enrollment, indicating that the enrollment count for the System stood at 136,083 students, which is 3,340 students larger than at this point one year ago. If past experience is continued, it is expected that between 10,000 and 11,000 more students will register during the first two weeks of classes, which would bring the total for the first semester to approximately 146,000 or 147,000 students. He noted the transitional enrollment target approved by the Regents for this semester was 146,214. He continued that we will have presumably somewhat near 3,000 more students in the System this year over last year.

President Weaver stated that it seemed important that at regular intervals the members of the Board should receive a review of developments, problems, and aspirations from each of the campuses and major academic units of the System. The first of the reports will be by Chancellor Birnbaum, UW-Oshkosh. President Weaver noted that extensive written material had been distributed to the Regents by Chancellor Birnbaum and called upon him for his presentation. Chancellor Birnbaum introduced the following members of the UW-Oshkosh faculty and staff:

Chancellor Birnbaum reviewed in some detail the material that had been distributed prior to the meeting. Regent DeBardeleben said that he felt all of the Regents were impressed by the accomplishments of Chancellor Birnbaum and inquired if there were any problem areas or areas of inadequacy that the Regents ought to be told about.

Professor Gloria Link responded the faculty perceives as a very, very, serious problem, the enormous amount of paperwork required by Central Administration and from the Campus Administration. Chancellor Birnbaum observed that each report requested is considered essential and indispensable by the agency that generates it, but cumulatively it creates a vast blizzard of work on the campus, which people now feel is taking away from their professional responsibilities and causing faculty members to become bureaucrats.

Regent Lavine inquired as to how the Administration learns of problems at the various levels of the institution. Chancellor Birnbaum responded there are meetings that are held between all department chairpersons and University Administration on a monthly basis; he stated he meets briefly with the Executive Committee and the Oshkosh Student Association on a weekly basis; there are all kinds of other meetings that take place routinely that give people the opportunity to bring forward problems and deal with issues on the campus. He stated that planning is important but you can spend all your time on planning and there has to be a happy medium somewhere.

Regent DeBardeleben stated he was concerned about the persistent complaint of campus people about paperwork and asked for comments as to lack of coordination between Central Administration and the Campus Administration - to the extent that there is a duplicative requirement for reports. Chancellor Birnbaum stated he did

not feel that would be the case - information overload is a problem, but there is not duplication. Most campuses have an academic administrative calendar which is projected for a year and an attempt is made to coordinate all deadlines with Central Administration, but we are at a time in higher education where we must generate a voluminous amount of information and this does trickle to the faculty and to the other segments of the community, and appropriately so when you have participatory government.

Regent Zancanaro inquired if the time required for making of reports detracts from the amount of time available for teaching and research. Professor Link responded that the teaching load does not decrease - this work must be done on top of everything else. Chancellor Birnbaum said this is a very serious question, noting that the workload of a faculty member is just a small part of the work that occurs in the classroom and that as you begin to eat up these outside classroom hours with planning and other governance responsibilities, you begin to take away the time faculty members can spend in reading and preparing themselves for teaching. Over the long haul this is going to have a very significant impact on all higher education in the country because what we are discussing is not a unique problem to our institution or our system. He said our workload has not declined in terms of responsibilities - if anything the new programs on the campus have increased it. As an obvious consequence, the faculty members are going to have to work more hours than they have in the past and most of the studies indicate that even now faculty members work 55 to 60 hours a week, and something is going to have to give. He said that even though it may be less useful for the University System to have faculty members spend their time filling in a form from a legislative or administrative agency, nevertheless that must be done. We have to do it or face some terrible consequences. Preparing for next week's lecture has to take second place to things that are demanded, and he stated he feared this is the direction of the future. Much too much time is spent on things that are of relative little consequence internally to the campus, the demand for which comes from outside, and which have deadlines that must be met. He stated he did not think any of this should be interpreted as a complaint involving the relationship between Central Administration and the institutions. The relationships are supportive and sound and he was not complaining about the kinds of material that are requested by Central Administration. Most of their requests are because of a demand from the outside and those are the ones that cause a great deal of difficulty.

Senior Vice President Percy said that the report just presented is a substitute for an effort that took some two-hundred hours average on every campus in each of the last two years. The biennial budget request to be considered next month took 90% less bureaucratic paper work than the last time around. He noted the calendar plan at Oshkosh permits a student to complete his or her education in less than four years, resulting in savings to the students. Irv Portman, President of the Oshkosh Student Association, stated that he will be graduating in two years and eleven months after he started, resulting in a considerable financial savings to him.

Regent Thompson noted that Oshkosh prepares many teachers in all the secondary schools and inquired as to what the new calendar does for the length of time for student teaching. Chancellor Birnbaum stated that it has cut back on the time for those departments in some ways and the major impact has been reducing the time for student teaching. This has been felt by some departments to be a major problem, while other departments find it not to be a problem at all. He stated that when the campus was visited by the Department of Public Instruction they made specific comments about the problems related to reduced amount of time available for student teaching, and it is a serious problem and he was not sure exactly how the campus will cope with it. He said it is probably true that there is no way of providing time so that every possible

University program and every possible agency can be accommodated and that there had been some problems with what has been done. The question is whether overall, the advantages outweigh the disadvantages. Regent Thompson stated that when you had your own campus lab school you did not have any problem. She stated she did see, and does have a concern that teachers do need even more time in the practical working along side of the active teacher -- not only learning from books, etc. Dean Fitzgerald stated that she felt the students responded very well to the increased emphasis on preservice, where there is, in a sense, a prepractice teaching that occurs at the end of the second year, and then there is another involvement for a fourteen week span in the third year before the practice teaching assignment. She said we are really talking about a shift to a fourteen week, rather than a seventeen week assignment, and that she had seen figures that indicated actually the potential teacher candidate gets involved in a classroom setting in a teacher aide role seven weeks longer than previously.

Senior Vice President Smith stated that the Universities are spending between one and three percent of their budgets on federal reporting requirements which were not in existence a year ago, which translated into dollars means that six million dollars of resources in this System, which are unreimbursed, are now going into the efforts required in one segment of this reporting effort. He continued that he could foresee the possibility that when the formal processes are understood and become established that the re-establishment of the conversational level for handling certain kinds of reporting and planning estimates and evaluations can be undertaken. Chancellor Birnbaum said that he wished he were as optimistic as Vice President Smith. He said that he could see an iron law that says once you ask for a report, you never stop asking for it, and that these things are cumulative. He stated the efforts of Central Administration of changing the budgeting system was a giant step contrary to the iron law, but a most unusual one, and it is not only the question of reports that are continuing, whether they are useful or not -- there will be more reports coming out that are no longer useful and also agencies being developed to watch agencies to watch agencies created to watch us, all of which have their own reporting requirements. He concluded that for a considerable period of time you are going to be caught up in inflationary data requests.

Regent DeBardleben inquired if there are areas of alleged inadequacy. Chancellor Birnbaum responded that we probably responded in a too casual way to your question and he would take off the word "alleged". He stated his own sense is "yes" there are real problems created by a change of the nature that occurred at UW-Oshkosh. He said you would have those problems whether you were changing to his system or from his system to a traditional system. They relate to the way individuals conduct their personal life, time sequences, meetings that they have with others -- things that they are used to and which they find suddenly are changed. He continued that people were teaching one way and now have to adapt to different time schedules. He said he felt a lot of that will disappear as the new way becomes the old traditional way. He stated the faculty development program is funded by a faculty decision to permit assigning them to teach during time other than the traditional academic year; for example, they may be required to teach during the summer and take their vacation in the Autumn, and they also get less compensation for any official teaching they may do during the first half of the Summer, and that these two sources provide the funding for the faculty development program. There are many faculty members who have been used to getting the additional compensation every year, and they consider the loss of that compensation a very significant problem. Assistant Chancellor Jim Baugh stated one of the difficulties faced in his area was communicating informationally with Central Administration using terms and words and meanings which are traditional, but sometimes you are asked questions in the tough support areas which are perfectly meaningful to the person asking the question, but do not make much sense to the recipient of the question. He stated it was his sense that the difficulties are decreasing and things are becoming simpler as he gets used to it.

Regent DeBardleben inquired if there are things that this Board should be doing or not doing to assist in the work of the campus. Chancellor Birnbaum responded in the negative, stating that he felt that the Board has been extremely supportive, as has Central Administration, which is critically important. He said we have been asking people to work much harder than people should be asked to work, and the faculty by and large have done it because they have sensed the support on the part of the Board. He said that he had no special request on the part of the Board and stated he was thankful for the support given in the past.

President Weaver expressed appreciation to Chancellor Birnbaum and his colleagues for their comments and presentation, stating they had brought fermentation and innovation to the campus, which he felt is not always completely comfortable but must have many satisfactions.

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#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The report of the Executive Committee was presented by President McNamara.

President McNamara reported that the Executive Committee met in Milwaukee on September 8, 1976, with fifteen Regents present, and considered the protocol to guide the search and selection process for a new President of the University System. President McNamara noted that there had been distributed our statement of procedure, description of the position we are seeking to fill, and the statement of the qualifications we seek in the person to fill the position of President. Also available was a resolution approving that statement, and both the description of the Office of the President of the UW-System as included in the By-Laws of the Board, and a description of the Office of the President contained in the State Statutes establishing the University of Wisconsin System.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek:

Resolution 1290: That a Special Regents' Presidential Search Committee be established, comprised of 17 voting and 3 ex officio members without vote, appointed by the President of the Board of Regents or by reason of Board office, and charged with the responsibilities listed in the attached document; and

That a Regent Presidential Selection Committee be established, comprised of not fewer than nine Regents, appointed by the President of the Board, and charged with the responsibilities listed in the attached document; and

That the "Description of the Office of President, UW System" and the "Preliminary Description of Qualifications Sought in the President of the UW System" contained in the attached document, be approved. (EXHIBIT C, attached)

After a short discussion, it was agreed that Section C, on page 5 of Exhibit C, be amended to read as follows:



C. A Preliminary Description of Qualifications Sought in The President of the UW System

The Board of Regents identifies at this time several qualifications as among those most crucial to a search for a new President. The Board recognizes that the Special Regent Presidential Search Committee will necessarily need to refine and possibly expand this listing in order to develop most clearly the criteria it will apply in its evaluations, and in order to reflect appropriately wise counsel which may be received from constituents. The Board affirms at this time, however, that the new President should insofar as possible be a person with:

- \* Significant academic accomplishments sufficient to command the professional respect of the academic communities of Wisconsin and higher education leaders nationwide, and to provide educational leadership for the Board, the System, and the people of Wisconsin.
- \* Significant and successful experience in an administrative leadership position, preferably in higher education, would be desirable but not mandatory.
- \* An understanding of the multiple purposes and constituencies of a public university with its missions of instruction, research, and public service.
- \* Outstanding abilities in establishing effective communication and sound relationships among diverse constituencies, including governmental relations.
- \* An understanding and appreciation of and commitment to the scholarly values requisite to the potential for serving the public good inherent in a major public university system.

Professor Robert Baruch made the following statement: "The Association of UW Faculties wishes to reiterate its firm belief that a search and screen committee for the President of the UW System should continue the tradition of significant faculty representation on search and screen committees and should establish a precedent for such participation for other systems that follow. It is our contention that this may best be achieved by forming a search and screen committee with the majority of its members being teaching faculty. We also wish to express our understanding of the need for maintaining within the committee some balance of membership from the various constituencies of the System, and our belief that Regent involvement in the early stages of such a search and screen committee is not only desirable but imperative. Thank you."

The question was put on Resolution 1290, and it was voted.

President McNamara stated considerable thought had been given to the above appointments in an effort to have all points of view represented -- from the Regents, Chancellors, Faculty, Students and ex officio members. He stated he had tried to balance it by various academic fields and the fields of interest in terms of student representation. He noted that Barbara Walter is a graduate student, Buff Wright is President of the United Council of Student Governments, and that as an older student as part of the Committee, Mr. Heimbach, being 29 years old, represented the older student segment. He stated that he was pleased that Regent Erdman was willing to accept the arduous task of acting as Chairman of the Committee.

Regent Thompson stated that she felt two major elements had been short changed -- there were no appointees in terms of education and yet the University System is responsible for education of elementary and secondary teachers in the state; also the quarter or fifth of the state in the Superior area has been ignored. President McNamara responded that in his judgment the northern part of the state is extremely well represented in the persons of Regents DeBardeleben and Lavine and there is a Professor from River Falls, and considering the population of the area, he would suspect the northern part of the state is over-represented. He continued that with a third of the state population residing within a fifty mile radius of Milwaukee, he would think that the Metropolitan areas of the state would think they are under-represented. He noted there had been criticism of the size of the Committee and that it is impossible to represent every point of view, so that this is obviously a compromise and all professions and academic fields, while important, could not be represented.

Senior Vice President Smith pointed out that Chancellor Fort's professional field is education. President McNamara noted that Vice President Smith has some "slight" knowledge of education and he is an ex officio member.

Regent Zancanaro moved to concur in the spirit of the above appointments, and the motion was seconded by Regent Fish.

Regent Pelisek stated that he supported the spirit of the motion, but felt it was out of order. The protocol gives the President total and absolute authority to make these appointments in his discretion and it would be a very bad precedent to set to have the Board undermine its own determination in the protocol.

The question was put on the resolution and it was voted.

## REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Fish.

Regent Fish stated that naming the Engineering Library on the UW-Madison Campus the Kurt F. Wendt Library is an especially great tribute to Kurt Wendt because the Regent policy is to make exceptions to name buildings for living individuals only in very rare and unusual circumstances and this was deemed by the Physical Planning and Development Committee a rare and unusual circumstance.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1291: Upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Madison and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the engineering library on the UW-Madison campus be named the Kurt F. Wendt Library.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted:

Resolution 1292: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Regents authorize the preparation of a request for allotment of advance planning funds to undertake development of a concept and budget report on the design for renovation of Holton Hall, one of the Downer Buildings on the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee campus and further,

That, in addition to seeking release of the advance planning funds for Holton Hall, the Board of Regents authorize the following:

- (1) Placing before the State Building Commission and its staff, for their response, the University's suggested plan for use of the seven Downer Buildings;
- (2) Obtaining from the Bureau of Facilities Management its technical evaluation of the consultant's report which recommends preservation and continued use of the buildings;
- (3) Requesting the State Building Commission to take a specific position with regard to the preservation of the Downer Buildings, in accordance with Chapter 386, Laws of 1975, and
- (4) Determining whether the University should proceed with several minor projects and plans for the exterior preservation of Holton, Merrill and Johnston Halls.

Regent Fish stated that the Chileda Institute had leased Steiner Hall since September of 1973 and has used it for maintaining and operating a licensed child welfare institution with residential living and education programs for children with developmental disabilities. He continued that it is believed that in the leasing of the hall we give the University the chance to recover without charge to the students the full cost of the dormitory debt amortization as well as to permit an educational institution to function in that area.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1293: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Stevens Point Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Vice President for General Services be authorized to sign a lease with option to purchase with Camp Chileda, Inc., Chileda Institute Division, a Wisconsin non-profit organization, for lease of Steiner Hall Dormitory, located at 1319 Fremont Street, Stevens Point, Wisconsin, for a term of nine (9) months, commencing October 1, 1976 and ending June 30, 1977 for the total rental of \$86,500, and an option to purchase for \$600,000 during the term of the lease the property covered by the lease plus the adjacent parking lot. This property is more fully described as:

All of Lots 1 through 8, both inclusive,  
Block 2, Isabella Fay's addition to the Village,  
now City, of Stevens Point

Regent Fish stated the property at the University of Wisconsin-Stout mentioned in the next resolution has no operative value to the University and we are therefore seeking authority to sell the small parcel to the bidders on the property. He noted the parcel was offered for sale in 1974 but no bids were received. During the summer of 1976 it was again advertised and sealed bids were received in the amount of \$950 and the other for \$3,000. Two appraisals were received, one for \$3,000 and another for \$3,200. It is the recommendation of Central Administration staff that the high bid for \$3,000 be accepted.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton:

Resolution 1294: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Stout, and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, and as approved by the State Building Commission, authority be granted to sell the follow described land to the highest bidders, Mehar and Savitri Arora:

Lots One (1) and Two (2), Block 37, Gates Addition to the City of Menomonie, Dunn County, Wisconsin except: Commencing at the Southeast corner of Lot 2; thence North 132.00 feet; thence West 125.26 feet; thence along the arc of a curve concave Southwesterly, radius 100.00 feet whose chord bears South 57°30'00" East, 107.46 feet; thence South 25°00'00" East, 81.93 feet to the point of beginning.

(Continued)

The President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary are authorized to execute a quitclaim deed conveying the above described land.

Regent Barkla inquired as to the use to which the property is to be put as she was concerned that there might be some sort of commercial venture on property adjacent to the campus. Chancellor Swanson stated that he did not know the intent of the purchaser as to its use, but that he was not concerned with it and was happy to get rid of it.

The question was put on Resolution 1294, and it was voted.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin:

Resolution 1295: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Superior, and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Memorial Football Field at UW-Superior be named the Ole Haugrud Field.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that he assumed the request came initially from the faculty at Superior and was advised by Chancellor Meyer that it came from the Director of Athletics. Chancellor Meyer noted that the field is administered jointly by the City and the campus. Regent DeBardeleben inquired if it is customary in the naming of buildings to get some type of approval of a faculty committee. Senior Vice President Smith stated that each campus has its own rules in that respect.

The question was put on Resolution 1295, and it was voted, with Regent DeBardeleben voting "No".

With respect to item (1) of the next resolution, Regent Fish stated this is to put in a secondary brine chiller so that we can get the maximum amount of revenue and to keep the facility operating. There is a reserve in the student segregated fee account and this will not have any effect on the segregated fee charge to be made to students. With respect to item (4), Regent Fish stated the purpose of the special metering is to save money by identifying where energy is being lost and the ecological bit of it of saving energy. He noted the spending of the money in itself will not cure these things but is diagnostic -- to find out where the losses are. He stated we are now spending approximately seventeen million dollars per year for energy in the System and the total cost of this project is approximately 2½% of that.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro:

Resolution 1296: That, upon the recommendation of the appropriate Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to plan, bid and construct the following minor projects, at the cost and from the funding sources indicated:

- (1) 1976 Additional Brine Chiller for the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, UW-Madison, at a cost of \$80,000 from Segregated Student Fees.
- (2) 1975-77 Physical Therapy-Therapeutic Facilities, UW-Whitewater at a cost of \$190,000, from the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (\$128,960) and State Building Trust Funds (\$61,640)
- (3) 1975-77 Space Conversion of Wylie Library-Learning Center, UW-Parkside, at a cost of \$60,000 from State Building Trust Funds
- (4) 1976 Electrical, Chilled Water and Steam Energy Metering and Water Meter Installation, UW System, from State Building Trust Funds/1975-77 Minor Project Contingency Allocation and Program Revenues.

Regent Lavine inquired as to the mechanism on the campus for students to have an input into the expenditure of \$80,000 for the 1976 Brine Chiller for the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, UW-Madison, to be paid from segregated student fees. Chancellor Young stated that the Recreation Board has student members, and that Board approves these expenditures. Regent Lavine inquired if they had looked at this proposal, and Chancellor Young responded that he did not know. Regent DeBardeleben inquired if this is the sort of expenditure that would traditionally be paid by intercollegiate athletics. Regent Fish stated the hockey team rents the facility for practice and it is also used for intramural sports. Regent Lavine stated that if he knew the student involvement and the hours of usage by various parties he would probably be supportive, but he was frustrated in voting on it not knowing those facts. Regent DeBardeleben stated that he would accept Regent Fish's demonstration of the need for the project, but that his question is similar to Regent Lavine's, that segregated student fees are being used and we do not know whether or not they had a voice in the matter. He requested that the item be voted separately. After further discussion it was agreed that (1) 1976 Additional Brine Chiller for the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, UW-Madison, at a cost of \$80,000 from Segregated Student Fees, be separated from the resolution and considered later in the meeting when more information was available.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that at the Building Commission meeting, according to press reports, the Governor asked Assistant Vice President Exo "if the University officials had gone up in the attic to see if we had enough insulation, or whether additional insulation was included in the amount of the projects. Exo and other UW officials were unable to answer". Regent DeBardeleben inquired if we are now able to answer that. Regent Fish responded that due to the type of construction that we have in the majority of University buildings

it is not quite so simple that you go up in the attic and look -- almost all is built up deck insulation and there is no way to look at it. He continued that the Central Administration individuals who are working on this project are aware that the Building Commission apparently wants some action or some expression from us as to our concern on this subject.

The question was put on Resolution 1296, with item (1) deferred, and it was voted.

Prior to the close of the meeting, Chancellor Young made the following report with respect to paragraph (1) in the above resolution:

The building was built with Intercollegiate funds, but then given to the Intramural Recreation Board on the condition that part of it could be used by Intercollegiate Athletics on a rental basis. The Intramural Board, with funds that had been set aside some years ago, remodeled the building and put in the ice. He noted that the manual for the operation of the building indicates the exact hours that Intercollegiate Athletics can rent it -- roughly from October until March, during which time the rink is used 25% for Intercollegiate Athletics and the rest of the year it is less than 10%. He noted this particular item was part of the budget adopted by the Intramural Board. It came up for specific action on October 25 last year, and at least one and probably two student members were present. It was also passed by the Campus Planning Committee, which has student representation on it.

Regent Walter inquired as to the percentage of students on the Intramural Board. Chancellor Young responded that they were in a minority. Professor James Bower stated the Intramural Board has three members out of eight that are students.

Regent Zancanaro moved adoption of paragraph (1) of Resolution 1296, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted.

Regent Fish stated that the next resolution providing for the construction of the Maintenance-Stores Buildings at Oshkosh, Green Bay and River Falls at a cost of \$2,456,300, is considerably less than the original estimate of approximately \$3,000,000 and that a modified or supervisory construction approach will be used. He noted that the resolution provides that gift and grant funds are to cover the estimated cost of supplementary solar energy system at Green Bay, if they do it. He said he had great hesitation about approving an experimental solar energy heating system in a metal building which is hard to heat from solar heat, has no lighting in it which contributes to heat, and no student body to give it body heat.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1297: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Oshkosh, Green Bay and River Falls Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to plan, bid and construct the three Maintenance-Stores Building projects at a total cost not to exceed \$2,456,300:

to be funded from General Obligation bonding (\$2,306,300) and gift and grant funds (\$150,000). The gift and grant funds are to cover the estimated cost of the supplementary solar energy heating system for the UW-Green Bay project.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted:

Resolution 1298: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellors at UW-Madison and UW-Stout and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, approval be granted to lease the following land for parking purposes:

Regent Fish reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day Regent Grover voted against approval of the increase of \$275,250 in the budget for the 1973-75 West Campus Chillers and Medical Center Utilities project because it seemed like a large overrun and wanted to voice his objection for that reason.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted, with Regent Grover voting "No":

Resolution 1299: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the budget for the 1973-75 West Campus Chillers and Medical Center Utilities project, on the UW-Madison campus, be increased by \$275,250, for a revised total project cost of \$7,936,000.



Regent Fish reported that the Committee received a report of land holdings of the System, which is analyzed each year, and that the Central Administration recommendations relative to the capital budget for the 1977-79 biennium will be considered at the November meeting, using approximately the same procedure as previously used.

Regent Fish reported that the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation wishes to provide a building at Camp Upham Woods, Wisconsin Dells, having a value of approximately \$130,000, which the University of Wisconsin-Extension favors and appreciates.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1300: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Extension and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents indicate their willingness to accept a "gift-in-kind" of the construction of an environmental/nature center building at Camp Upham Woods, Wisconsin Dells, through the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation.

Regent Fish recalled that a couple of years ago the Mound City Bank of Platteville requested the release of an easement, but the members of the Board were not receptive to the proposal at that time because of the accessibility problem that we could conceive it could create. They have renegotiated and reworked this program and it is now enthusiastically supported by the campus.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1301: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Platteville Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to execute the release of an easement on property of the Mound City Bank of Platteville in exchange for title to a 65' x 20' property that will provide entrance to and egress from the Rountree property. The legal descriptions of the easement to be relinquished and the property to be received are as follow:

1. Easement to be Relinquished

Extending from the South 51 feet of Lot 2, North to Pine Street, being 19.9 feet in width at the South and tapering evenly on the East side to 14.8 feet at the North or Pine Street end, all of said property being in Block Two of Homestead Addition to the City of Platteville.

2. Property to be Received by the University

Of Lot 3 that part beginning at a point 20 feet North and 56.5 feet West of the Southeast corner of Lot 3, thence West 4.4 feet, thence North

(Continued)

20 feet along the West edge of Lot 3, thence East 4.4 feet, thence South to the point of beginning; of Lot 4 beginning 20 feet North of the Southeast corner of Lot 4, thence West 60.9 feet to the West edge of Lot 4, thence North 20 feet, thence East 60.9 feet to the East edge of Lot 4, thence South 20 feet to the point of beginning.

The Mound City Bank also agrees to provide curbing only for the driveway entrance at Bayley Avenue and UW-Platteville agrees to support a variance in the zoning regulations to allow the Mound City Bank to place a parking lot to the north boundary of the property to be received by the University, which is 65 feet in length.

Regent Pelisek stated that the Council of Trustees of the University of Wisconsin Hospitals will be taking a tour of the medical facility on the West Campus on November 18, prior to the Board committee meetings on that day and that each member of the Board will be invited on that tour in order to get a better appreciation of the progress and magnitude of the project.

#### REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

Regent Lavine stated that Senior Vice President Donald Smith made brief comments in the Committee meeting about Biennial Operating Budget Policy Paper #3.0, noting that it was a complement to Papers #1.1, #2.0, and #4.0, which had been acted upon in the joint session with the Business and Finance Committee. He observed that the paper had been developed by the biennial budget working group and had been reviewed carefully by faculty and Chancellors of the several institutions and edited in response to such review. It follows from earlier Regents' policy statements on faculty development and renewal and sets a four-year frame of reference for the period 1977-81.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1302: That Biennial Budget Policy Paper #3.0: Faculty Development and Renewal: Instructional Improvement and Faculty Revitalization, 1977-81, be approved as a basis for developing the UW System's 1977-79 biennial budget request for Board of Regent consideration in October, 1976. (Copy on file with the papers of the meeting)

Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been a special presentation by Robert Ragotzkie, UW-Madison Professor of Meteorology, Director of the Institute for Marine Studies Center and Director of the Sea Grant Program.

Regent Lavine reported the Committee next received the report of the Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs: (1) Re: Goals and Objectives of Academic Affairs in 1975-76: Report of Accomplishments, and (2) Work Plan for Academic Affairs, 1976-77.

The Committee was advised by Vice President Smith of the promotion of Dr. Doralyn Hickey from Director of the School of Library Science to Dean of the School of Library Science, UW-Milwaukee.

Regent Lavine reported the resignation of Associate Vice President Adolph Y. Wilburn to accept appointment as Director of the Council for International Exchange of Scholars, the senior Fulbright-Hays Program administered by the American Council on Education, effective December 1.

Regent Lavine stated that a prospectus on Center System Minimum Curricular Module Report will be mailed to the Regents, providing a short summary of background and setting a direction for the report to be made to the Board in December.

Regent Lavine stated that the next proposed action removes the requirement that campuses file a copy of the permanent record of degrees and certificates granted with the Secretary of the Board. The information is now available to Central Administration by means of the Central Data Request, obviating the need to file a separate report with the Secretary.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1303: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, (Policy-Revised) Regent Resolution No. 140 (of 4/7/72) be revised to read as follows:

That the Board of Regents authorizes the granting of degrees and certificates for Regent-approved instructional programs, from time to time, by each of the institutions of the University of Wisconsin System, to such candidates as are certified by the appropriate Registrar as having met the requirements for their appropriate degrees and certificates, and who are not, at Commencement, under disciplinary action or under charges that could lead to suspension or expulsion; that each Registrar keep a permanent record of degrees and certificates granted; and that each institution of the University of Wisconsin System be authorized to award such honors, awards, medals, and prizes as are customary at Commencement exercises.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1304:

The Board of Regents recognizes that under Paragraph E of Article Fourth of the Deed of Gift and Conveyance under the Will of William F. Vilas that the Trustees may provide from time to time, as increase of available net income shall warrant, for professorships or chairs for instruction or for research as to them and the Regents shall seem most to promote knowledge and education and benefit the university.

(Continued)

Therefore, the Board of Regents requests that the Trustees of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate establish one additional Vilas professorship, presently in all respects similar to the 15 Vilas professorships heretofore established, annual compensation of \$10,000 together with appropriate allowance of \$5,000, amounting to \$15,000 for the 1976-77 academic year, as an additional request to that heretofore adopted by this Board under date of April 9, 1976 and certified to this Board by the Trustees of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate.

Regent Lavine reported that the Committee received a report by Dr. Jean Foss, Assistant Vice Chancellor, UW-La Crosse, Chairperson of the System Study Group on Telecommunications and Mediated Materials.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1305: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the status of Jan M. Vansina, Professor of History, College of Letters and Science, UW-Madison, be changed to Vilas Research Professor of History, College of Letters and Science, UW-Madison, on a permanent basis, beginning with the academic year 1976-77, salary as shown in the 1976-77 budget, with \$10,000 chargeable to the funds of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1306: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the status of Barry M. Trost be changed from Professor of Chemistry, College of Letters and Science, UW-Madison, to the Evan P. and Marion Helfaer Professor of Chemistry, College of Letters and Science, UW-Madison, effective immediately, salary as shown in the 1976-77 budget.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1307: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Stout, authorization to recruit for a Dean of Liberal Studies, UW-Stout, be approved.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Hales.

Regent Hales noted that all Regents were invited to participate in the Committee meeting on the previous day.

Regent Hales reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been considerable discussion of the policy with respect to nondiscrimination in gifts, grants and bequests. Regent DeBardeleben noted that the word "age" had been omitted from the proposed resolution, and it was the consensus of the members present that it be inserted after the word "sex".

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

**Resolution 1308:** That, although it is the constitutional right of a person to dispose of property as he or she sees fit, it is the policy of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System to discourage restrictive terminology in gifts, grants, contracts, devises or bequests and, in particular, restrictions relating to sex, age, race, color, creed, religion or national origin.

Further, that the existing policy relating to the acceptance of gifts, grants, contracts, devises or bequests as set forth in Resolution 719 be rescinded.

Regent Hales reported that at the May 1976 Board meeting during the presentation of the 1976-77 Auxiliary-Segregated Fee Budget an informal request was made of Central Administration to provide the Regents with comprehensive data regarding any remuneration to students participating in student government activities. A similar request for data regarding the cost of faculty governance was transmitted to Central Administration by the United Council of Student Governments. A study was initiated relating to student government costs, but prior to compilation of a full report a request was made to have this topic brought back to the Board. He noted that Regent DeBardeleben expressed his views on this matter during the Committee meeting yesterday, indicating that he felt that the inquiry was inappropriate. Regent Hales said that the following resolution had been approved by the Committee, with Regents Erdman, Pelisek and Sandin voting "No".

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

**Resolution 1309:** That, the inquiry into compensation paid to student government officers in the University of Wisconsin System from segregated student fees not be completed.

Regent Hales reported that the Committee next considered Paper #1.1: State Aids Support Formula for Enrollment Increases. This document is a response to the statutory mandate to suggest a replacement to the currently suspended state aids enrollment funding formula.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1310: That Biennial Budget Policy Paper #1.1: State Aids Support Formula for Enrollment Increases, be approved as a basis for developing the UW System's 1977-79 biennial budget request for Board of Regent consideration in October, 1976. (Copy on file with the papers of the meeting)

Regent Hales reported that the Committee next considered Paper #2.0: Non-credit Outreach Programs for 1977-81. Senior Vice President Percy reviewed the document for the Committee and extensive discussion followed.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1311: That Biennial Budget Policy Paper #2.0: Noncredit Outreach Programs for 1977-81, be approved as a basis for developing the UW System's 1977-79 biennial budget request for Board of Regent consideration in October, 1976. (Copy on file with the papers of the meeting)

Regent Hales stated that the Committee discussed Biennial Budget Policy Paper #4.0: Proposed Department of Administration Survey of UW Extension Student Income Levels. He noted that through this survey of UW-Extension students and VTAE students in continuing education courses, the DOA intends to "obtain a meaningful analysis of ability to pay fees" for course work based on student incomes and to determine "possible duplication between UW Extension and VTAE continuing education courses". He said a basic issue from the view of Central Administration staff is whether the System has authority to release information it has gathered for one purpose to an outside state agency for a different purpose. At the same time it recognizes that the Department of Administration has the right to survey whomever they wish. He said there were misgivings on the part of the Committee members as to whether this study would accomplish what was intended, and it was the decision on the previous day to modify the Central Administration's recommendation to reflect the feeling of the Board by changing the recommendation on page 6 of Paper #4.0 to read "That, while questioning the merit underlying the purposes of the proposed survey, the Board of Regents . . .". Regent DeBardleben stated that there had been considerable discussion about the inclusion of the word "that" and that it was his understanding there was an agreement to substitute the word "while". Regent Pelisek agreed that it was the intention to strike the word "that".

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1312: That Biennial Budget Policy Paper #4.0: Proposed Department of Administration Survey of UW Extension Student Income Levels, as amended, be approved as a basis for developing the UW System's 1977-79 biennial budget request for Board of Regent consideration in October, 1976. (Copy of document on file with the papers of the meeting)

Regent Hales reported that Vice President Lorenz reviewed the gifts, grants and U. S. Government contracts, noting that this is the largest amount of gifts and grants ever recorded at a single meeting and exceeds the previous record by \$11 million. He stated that Mr. Lorenz reported that the increase could be high because it could reflect the change in the federal fiscal year to October 1; there was a substantial increase of \$11.4 million in the area of student aids, which will even out in the next couple of months; and last year the \$4 million-plus WARF grant was received in October and this year it was accepted in July. Regent Hales stated that an encouraging aspect was that every institution was represented and not only in the student aid category.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1313: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

Regent Hales stated that the late Ethel L. Brown bequeathed \$10,000 to establish the Ray A. Brown Law Student Award Fund and that the terms of the bequest provided for an award on the basis of character, gentlemanliness, dedication, scholarship and general deserving merit and need. He noted that when the Court assigned the trust to the Regents, it had information available that it was the intent to interpret "gentlemanliness" in such a way as to make women eligible for the award and to administer the fund in a nondiscriminatory fashion.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek:

Resolution 1314: That the bequest of the late Ethel L. Brown, Westport, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Ethel L. Brown, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Barkla stated that she intended to vote against the bequest because, if we are going to continue to discourage this kind of language in bequests, the only way we can discourage it is to protest and vote against it.

The question was put on Resolution 1314, and it was voted, with Regent Barkla voting "No".

Regent Hales noted that the bequest from the late Eunice L. Hoffman provided \$7,812.76 to the University of Wisconsin-Madison to help defray the living expenses of "a Christian girl or girls who have limited assets while attending the University of Wisconsin under a scholarship". He said the Committee was persuaded that Chancellor Young's position on nondiscriminatory selection of financial aid recipients

as a step previous to assignment of funding from the total pool of such aid was sufficient safeguard against any charge of discrimination. It could be reasonably established for purposes of satisfying the trust that among the financial aid recipients in any given year one could find a Christian girl or girls. It would not be the intention of the campus to require certification of that fact in each instance unless there were reasonable cause to believe that such was not the case, and with this understanding the Committee recommended approval of the bequest.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek:

**Resolution 1315:** That the bequest of the late Eunice L. Hoffman, Montgomery County, Maryland, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Eunice L. Hoffman, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Barkla stated that she could not vote for this resolution because it offended her sensibilities. She said we have no policy but the language is completely unacceptable and in her personal judgment it is discriminatory and she wanted to register her protest against accepting this kind of bequest. Regent DeBardleben stated that he too felt obliged to vote against the resolution and hoped it would be defeated. He said that the basis on which he was going to decide how to vote on this sort of language discrimination was on what he regarded as invidious and he so regarded this. He said the effect of the language is to say that you shall not give this money to a Jew, an agnostic, an atheist, or to any person who subscribes to any religious class which does not accept Jesus Christ as the divine person upon whom that religion is based. He said in his opinion this is invidious discrimination and the University should not have anything to do with it either by way of trying to work around it or by way of making inquiries as to whether somebody fits within it. He continued that he felt that it is wrong, that it is contrary to the statement of policy we adopted yesterday, and that we should reject it.

Regent Lawton stated that he disagreed with both Regents Barkla and DeBardleben. He stated that by refusing the bequest you are going to punish dead people and lawyers of many years ago, and do nothing to help the students who need the money or to keep the name of Eunice Hoffman clear. He said he had been a recipient of many such grants in the past, that he needed the money and got it, but with Regent Barkla's policy he would not have. Regent Barkla stated that it is too bad that we are going to lose money for students but you could justify almost every evil on the face of the earth by saying somebody is going to be hurt by it. The point is we are never going to get rid of what Regent DeBardleben called invidious discrimination if somebody doesn't take a stand and speak out against it. Regent Lawton stated that we did take a stand yesterday, which is going to be widely publicized and lawyers should know better, but he saw no purpose in punishing these donors or lawyers.

Regent Lavine stated that he did not vote for yesterday's resolution nor confirm it today. He continued that he would be equally adamant if the proposal were for a Jewish girl or any other. He said he did not consider himself a



Christian, that he was proud of what he is, but assumed that other people would find it difficult to consider themselves a Jew, if this resolution were turned around. He said that it is appropriate for this Board, though difficult, to support bequests to help those students who have been markedly discriminated against. No one likes to have to do that nor have to enter into discrimination in any kind of form even if it is addressing something in the past. The reality is that we have to because we have some clear areas, such as with the Robert Wood Johnson gift, that are obvious, and that is the only way that one can reasonably handle them. He urged the Board to look at the principle behind what we are doing. He said it is very uncomfortable for a non-Christian to receive money even from a so-called pool, when they feel their money might come under that umbrella. He noted that Chancellor Young said that the intention is not to ascertain the religion, simply to use the pool. He noticed that the bequest had been made sincerely and if someone had made the bequest for a Jewish girl, he would feel strongly that we had an obligation not to play games with the intention of the person making the gift. He said he interpreted it to mean that the aid was to go to a specific girl who indicated that she was a Christian and that if it had been intended for a pool, it would have been set up differently--for deserving students at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

President McNamara stated that he differed with Regent DeBardleben's definition of Christian. He stated that his is a dictionary view, and as a lawyer, he would think in those terms, which is perfectly proper. He stated that his definition of the term Christian as we should use it at the University is a cultural definition, and, noting that he had made his lack of a religious conviction clear yesterday, he stated that in the two years he spent in India he came to look upon himself as a Christian because of the cultural differences. Similarly, when he was in Japan, where the religion is stated as Shintoism, again in making the cultural differences obvious, although he wouldn't meet the test under Regent DeBardleben's definition, he was culturally a Christian, and he felt the broader definition is the more accurate one in terms of bequests to the University. He stated that he was going to support acceptance of the bequest because he believed we should take money from any source within reason. He stated that he would rule out obvious discriminatory organizations that we all abhor and would vote against that kind, but, short of that, would support money from any reasonable source. He said you cannot discriminate by taking money--you can only discriminate by the positive act of giving it out, and the civil libertarians in their zeal and self-righteousness lose sight of the basic issue--how to give money away and to whom you give it, not where you get it from. He continued that if the federal government adopted the test that Regents Barkla, DeBardleben and Lavine want us to adopt, our whole tax structure would collapse overnight because it takes money from any source and make no distinction on how they got their money--how they spend it is a concern to all of us.

Elizabeth Wright, President of the Wisconsin Council of Student Governments, stated that the very worst kind of discrimination that the State of Wisconsin and this Board could exercise is to discriminate against students who could not afford to come to the University with adequate funds and that she sincerely hoped that the members of the Board realize there are Christian girls within the University who would be more than happy to receive this money. Regent DeBardleben stated that he did not believe this is a question of the people who oppose this motion wanting to object to where the money comes from--it is not a question of saying "We object to Eunice Hoffman"--it is not a question of saying she does not have the right to give her money to Christian girls if she wants to. He said it is not that we are saying that we are looking at where the money comes from, we are looking at what the donor is asking us to do, which is to administer the fund in a discriminatory manner. He said that President McNamara had stated that he felt that

if the money was coming from an organization that we all abhor, we should refuse it --and what is this asking us to do? Are we going to operate by majority--if the majority says--I guess the Christians are in the majority, that makes it all right. He said that he felt that we are not being honest with ourselves and we are not being square with our principles when we allow this kind of invidious discrimination and say we are going to put a stamp of approval on it, and somehow we are going to wiggle our way around it by saying that maybe somebody is getting the money who fits within the required category. He inquired if there is any doubt about it, are we willing to ask a question--are you a Jew?--Are you a Christian?--Are you a Lutheran?--Are you a Methodist?. He said that he felt that this is wrong, that we are being asked to do something that is wrong, when we are asked to approve this resolution. Senior Vice President Percy observed that if the Board of Regents refuses to accept this gift, the Court would see to it that the money did go to a Christian girl. Regent DeBardeleben agreed that the money is not going to be lost--it is going to go to a Christian girl.

The question was put on Resolution 1315, and it was voted, with Regents Lawton, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Thompson, Walter and Zancanaro voting "Aye" (8), with Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Grover, Hales and Laving voting "No" (5), and with Regents Erdman, Fish and Gerrard absent (3).

Regent Hales noted that the late Mildred Bolger bequeathed \$1,000 to the University of Wisconsin Medical School for research relative to strokes.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

Resolution 1316: That the bequest of the late Mildred Bolger, La Crosse, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Mildred Bolger, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales stated that the bequest of the late Oluf Haugsrud provides that 25% of the residue of the trust is left to the UW-Superior for scholarships for male or female students of good character and high type American citizens. A subsequent paragraph states his "wish and desire" that a "reasonable amount" of scholarships be given to men who participate in athletics. He said discussions with Chancellor Meyer, who knew Mr. Haugsrud, indicate it was his feeling that the conditions of the first reference, "for male or female students", would establish the basis for interpreting the intent of Mr. Haugsrud. It was further pointed out that the phrase "wish and desire" is not a mandatory directive.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1317: That the bequest of the late Oluf Haugrud, Duluth, Minnesota, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Oluf Haugrud, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Superior,

Regent Hales stated that the late Eufemia Neroda, Elizabeth, New Jersey, bequeathed \$500 to the University of Wisconsin and that her son, in consultation with other family members, has indicated that the money should go to the UW-Madison campus.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

Resolution 1318: That the bequest of the late Eufemia Neroda, Elizabeth, New Jersey, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Eufemia Neroda, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales reported that the late Herbert E. Tautz, Denver, Colorado, bequeathed 11 shares of stock in Rainbo Lodge, Inc., Land O'Lakes, Wisconsin, to the University. Since Rainbo Lodge has supported research in Zoology at UW-Madison for a long period of time, it seemed appropriate that the bequest be directed to the University of Wisconsin-Madison. The stock has a value of approximately \$1 per share.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1319: That the bequest of the late Herbert E. Tautz, Denver, Colorado, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Herbert E. Tautz, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales said that the late Joseph Lyell Temby, Chicago, Illinois, bequeathed a collection of 750 books to the University of Wisconsin as a memorial to his mother, Mary Johns Temby, to form a collection to be known as the "Mary Johns Temby Collection". The collection is to be housed in the Memorial Library.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1320: That the bequest of the late Joseph Lyell Temby, Chicago, Illinois, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Joseph Lyell Temby, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

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Regent Hales reported that the late Louise Fleming Troxell, former Dean of Women on the Madison campus, bequeathed \$10,000 to the UW-Madison to be added to a scholarship fund previously established in her name.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1321: That the bequest of the late Louise Fleming Troxell, Palo Alto, California, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Louise Fleming Troxell, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

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Regent Hales reported that the Committee received a report from Burton Wagner, Chairman of the Systemwide Committee on Tax-Deferred Annuities, on the progress of the committee relating to implementation of recent legislation. The recommendation of the committee and the administration will be presented to the Board for action at a future meeting.

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Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardleben:

Resolution 1322: That in accordance with Section 19.85(1)(c) and 19.85(1)(f), WIS. STATS., a closed session be held to consider personnel matters.

The resolution was adopted by a roll call vote, with Regents DeBardleben, Grover, Hales, Lavine, Lawton, McNamara, Neshek, Sandin, Thompson, Walter, and Zancanaro voting "Aye", and with Regents Barkla, Erdman, Fish, Gerrard, and Pelisek absent. (Regent Barkla was not present for the vote but was a participant in the meeting.)

The Board recessed into closed session at 12:30 P.M.

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The Board arose from closed session at 1:25 P.M.

President McNamara announced adoption of the following resolution:

Resolution 1323: That on recommendation of the System President and in accord with the statutory provisions pertaining to the State Executive Salary Group Program, Leonard Haas's appointment as Chancellor of the UW-Eau Claire be extended through June 30, 1978.

The meeting adjourned at 1:26 P.M.

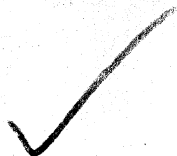

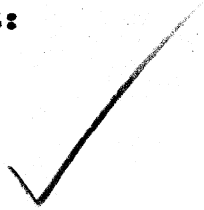

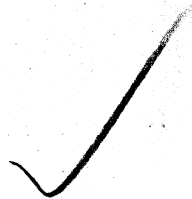

The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, Princeton, N. J., to continue the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation loan and scholarship program designed to respond to the need for improving access to physician services in rural areas and inner-city poverty areas. The fund shall be administered in accordance with the following terms:


The funds provided by this program will only be utilized for financial aid for the following categories of students: women students, students from rural backgrounds, and those from this country's Black, Indian, Mexican-American, and mainland Puerto Rican populations. Students of rural backgrounds are defined as students having a legal residence at the time of initial enrollment in medical school in a county located outside a standard metropolitan area and with a population under 50,000 inhabitants. Only U. S. citizens are eligible.

The program funds must be expended by June 30, 1977.

As a condition of eligibility for the full amount of its grant, the University agrees to maintain, in addition to the grant funds, its expenditure during 1976-77 of "school funds" at a level no less than 95 percent of the average it has expended during the last two years.

Loans from the Foundation grants will carry a maximum interest rate of 3 percent, and will be payable over a period of no less than ten years, starting one year after the student completes or otherwise terminates his medical school studies. Repayment may be deferred during uniformed or Peace Corps service or advanced professional study, including internship and residency training programs. (Trust)

The annual meeting of the Higher Educational Aids Board was held in the Governor's Conference Room, Madison, on July 30, 1976. Regent members present were Arthur DeBardleben, Edward Hales, and John Lavine.

After numerous tied ballots and after a series of legal questions which brought first Attorney General Bronson LaFollette and then Deputy Attorney General David Hanson to the HEAB meeting, the Higher Educational Aids Board made a certain amount of history with its vote for election of officers.

First, Attorney General LaFollette told the Board that despite the new July 1 open meeting law which provided for an election of officers by secret ballot, the Board could, if it chose to, conduct an open ballot for the election of officers.

On motion of Mr. DeBardleben, the Board then approved on a seven to six vote with the chairman abstaining a procedure for public balloting.

Subsequently a seven to seven vote took place on three or four ballots conducted intermittently during a number of hours, with public board members Esther Kaplan and Dan Satran tied in a race for chairman. Both Kaplan and Satran then withdrew. Mr. Lavine then nominated brand new public board member Jerry Madison, of Wausau, who received unanimous support and became the first HEAB board chairman to be elected the first time that he had attended a meeting. John Geilfuss and Esther Kaplan were re-elected Vice Chairman and Secretary, respectively.

In approving the 1977-79 biennial budget to be forwarded to the Department of Administration, HEAB affirmed 14 budget decision issues at the meeting. The Higher Educational Aids Board budget is consistent with the Governor's budget guidelines in that it asks for no new programs. However, Mr. Lavine urged, and it was agreed, that the staff make clear in the budget narrative that there is approximately \$2,000,000 in new GPR funds requested. These funds lift the \$1,500 ceiling on the Tuition Grant Program; allow for half time students to be covered under the Tuition Grant Program as is presently allowed for students under the Wisconsin Higher Education Grant Program; and raise the equity ceiling for students under the new Wisconsin Higher Education Grant II Program. (\$1,000,000 of this amount will not come due under the projections of the HEAB staff until 1980, that is for the lifting of the ceiling on the Tuition Grant Program. Another amount just under \$200,000 will be used for students projected on a half time basis under the tuition grant program, and \$300,000 will be used to increase the equity ceilings for students under the Wisconsin Higher Education Grant II Program.)

Mr. Lavine asked the staff to explain why it did not recommend a state work/study program. Various student and staff members attending the meeting told the Higher Educational Aids Board that some UW institutions and private colleges in the state did not use up their present federal work/study monies. They said that financial aid officers at these schools balked at the idea of handling the administrative problems of students who would use federal work/study monies for work with local, county, state, or federal units of government. Mr. Lavine pointed out that if tax dollars were going to have to be paid for jobs done by these units of government,

it was certainly preferable that these jobs be done, where possible, by students. Thus, the money would be taken from the taxpayers, paid to the students who need an education for work done for the taxpayers--with the result that there would be little or no real cost.

The staff of HEAB was asked to review institutional needs to determine what steps might be taken in order to fully use the federal work/study monies and put into effect a state work/study program. A recommendation will be brought to the Higher Educational Aids Board about this subject in November.

With respect to the Wisconsin Higher Education Grant Program (WHEG II), the Board approved a budget which calls for a 6% inflationary increase in each year of the biennium with some program improvements. In total, the Board request is \$1,000,000 higher for 1977-78 and \$1,700,000 in 1978-79. Estimated spending in 1976-77 is \$10,641,000. On motion of Mrs. Kaplan, the staff is to present to the Board an alternative proposal for program improvements which would call for maintaining a status quo relationship between WHEG II and state loans--the premise being that the Board not encourage expansion of student loans without appropriate increases in grant funds.

With respect to the student loan program, it was recommended that the staff's best estimate of loan needs be submitted with a request that the Governor and the Legislature meet 100% of identified need. Additional capital needs are estimated at about \$25 million for the 1977-79 biennium. The Board also authorized the staff to proceed with its program of selling loans to private lenders and to the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands.

Next, preceded by a major condition and notation to the Governor and Legislature, the Higher Educational Aids Board recommended that the existing supplemental medical student loan program be allowed to lapse on June 30, 1977. This was done in anticipation that federal legislation will be approved which allows for an expanded health professions loan program under the guaranteed student loan program. On motion of Mr. Lavine, the Board emphasized that if Congress didn't provide these funds--and especially in light of the recent "drastic cuts" in capitation grants for medical students from \$1,500 to \$880--HEAB should notify the Governor and Legislature that it will present a program to solve this potential financial problem for Wisconsin students. The motion also called for a change in language which broadened the program from one which identified only medical/dental students to loans for students "in the health professions".

In other budget action, the Board:

(1) Approved a Tuition Grant program fund request (aid to private institution students) designed to sustain similar need factors between the Tuition Grant and the WHEG II programs. Mr. Lavine sought clarification from the Executive Secretary, Jim Jung, that these changes were to make equal only the similar need factors and granting procedures between the Tuition Grant and WHEG II programs, and if they were not intended to be a prelude to a definition of equity between the programs which would see a recommendation for a grant program for private students built on top of the present Tuition Grant program. Assurance was given that there was no intention to bring in such a grant program and that the definition of equity did not include such a proposal.

(2) Approved an Indian Student Assistance Program funding request totaling \$2,300,000 for the biennium. This program is independent of other aid programs.

(3) After a good deal of discussion, approval was granted for a level of funding for the Dental Education Contract with Marquette University at \$3,300 per student for 500 Wisconsin students. This is \$500 higher than the current \$2,800 level of support. Mr. Lavine and Mr. DeBardleben questioned how the staff could recommend such a large increase in support for a professional program at a private institution. They based this question on the fact that the public institutions in Wisconsin had received only an approximate 6% increase, which was not even enough to cover inflation, whereas the proposed increases for Marquette ran approximately 18% and 23% for each of the two years of the biennium--enough to cover cost increases as well as inflation. Mr. Lavine emphasized that he didn't agree with the approach taken by the Governor and the Legislature with respect to less than inflation and cost increase funding for the University of Wisconsin System and VTAE schools and that he felt sympathetic to Marquette's request for cost increase and inflation funding. However, for equity's sake he and Mr. DeBardleben felt that the funding approach for all professional programs should be the same.

(4) Approved the budget for staff operation in the student support program at current levels. Mr. Lavine asked if there were funds adequate to take care of workload increases for higher enrollments expected in the UW System. The Executive Secretary responded by saying that he hoped that system administrative improvements would take care of workload increases. Mr. Jung said that request increases and administrative improvements would allow the agency to handle 5,000 to 10,000 new students and the workload related to their presence. Mr. DeBardleben stated that the rationale for this part of the budget was too imprecise and voted against it.

(5) Approved budgets for the Board's institutional support and educational opportunity programs as recommended by the staff. Mr. Lavine asked that the EO staff present a briefing to the Board at a later date, specifically to describe how they interface with institutions.

(6) Approved a budget for state operations at 100% of the present level of GPR funding, instead of the 5% reduction called for by the HEAB staff. Mr. Lavine strongly objected to the staff recommendation and called on the HEAB Board to take the amount of GPR funds that it was going to replace with federal money and instead give that federal money to HEAB grant programs. He said that the Board ought to be worried about using every available dollar to meet "the tremendous level of unmet needs for Wisconsin's students in these economic times". On his motion, the Board agreed to override the recommendation of the staff and take the \$53,000 of federal money which was going to be used to accomplish a 5% GPR reduction and put it behind HEAB grant programs.

In non-budget action the Board adopted a revised independent student equity model in the WHEG II program for 1976-77; and approved consolidation of all WHEG II funds previously distributed between dependent and independent students into a single fund for operating the program in 1976-77. It also approved a staff report identifying methods and procedures used to ensure that the various statutory provisions are complied with in the administration of the Dental Contract with Marquette University. This had been requested by the Board on motion of Mr. DeBardleben on May 21, 1976. At its next meeting Mr. DeBardleben asked the staff to report the criteria used in evaluating academic credentials of Wisconsin residents versus non-residents.

The Higher Educational Aids Board also requested pursuit of legislative language which would insure that HEAB would not be charged with judging the quality of dental education at Marquette University. HEAB objected to a Legislative Audit Bureau report which suggested that HEAB should monitor the quality of dental education. The Higher Educational Aids Board said that such judgments would better be made by outside professional accrediting agencies and the professional faculty involved.

The Executive Committee of HEAB will meet early in September to determine exact dollar amounts to be included in the HEAB budget request. The full Board at its regular meeting on November 5 will consider additional budget policy matters such as the student state work/study program and the fulfillment of the Governor's request for areas of HEAB to be given a performance audit as well as the measures to be used in these performance audit studies.

With regard to specific items of Board policy, Mr. Lavine made the request that the staff confer with financial aid officers to review the confidentiality of student data, and, after the impact and interpretation of the Buckley Amendments are discerned and in place, come up with a recommendation for HEAB Board policy on confidentiality. He also proposed clarifying language for policy statements for financial aid as it relates to satisfactory academic progress and for financial aid as it relates to punishment for involvement in student disruptions. The language for satisfactory academic progress essentially said that a student who receives financial aid should be considered as meeting the requirement of satisfactory academic progress--if that student achieves the same level of progress as a student who does not receive financial aid and is considered meeting the institution's requirements of satisfactory academic progress.

The language for punishment for involvement in student disruptions said that financial aid should not be limited or curtailed as part of punishment for involvement in student disruptions, since this discriminates against those students who receive financial aid versus those who do not. The Board will consider these and other changes in its policy update at its November 5 meeting. A report will be made to the Regents at that time.

THE SEARCH AND SELECTION PROCESS: PRESIDENT, UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

A. Committees and their functions

1. The Special Regents' Presidential Search Committee

The Special Regents' Presidential Search Committee shall be a body of 17 voting and 3 ex officio members without vote appointed by the President of the Board of Regents or by reason of Board office and charged with the following responsibilities:

- a) Seeking, receiving, and evaluating according to established criteria, nominees for the office of President, UW System. The Committee will solicit nominees from all educational constituencies in Wisconsin, from alumni and the public, and nationwide.
- b) Selecting not fewer than five, nor more than eight persons judged to be most highly qualified for the position, and transmitting these names as unranked nominees from the Search Committee to the Selection Committee,
- c) Providing additional nominees upon the request of the Regent Presidential Selection Committee should that Committee judge that such nominations are wise or needed.
- d) Carrying out the affirmative action policies of the Regents in its search and evaluation activities.
- e) Maintaining the confidentiality of its evaluations of individuals in accordance with policies governing the confidentiality of deliberations pursuant to the selection of an Officer of the University System.
- f) Maintaining records showing the application of search criteria to the decisions made concerning all nominations received.
- g) Appropriately informing all active candidates for the position at the time when they are no longer under active or possible consideration for the position.

The members of the Committee shall include:

2.

- a) A Chairperson who shall be a member of the Board of Regents.
- b) Three Regents in addition to the Chairperson.
- c) Three persons selected from among the Chancellors and Provost of the UW System.
- d) Seven members of the faculty of Institutions of the UW System appointed by the President of the Board of Regents on the basis of nominations received from faculty governance bodies of the Institutions of the System.
- e) Three students of the UW System appointed by the President of the Board on the basis of nominations received from student government organizations of the Institutions of the UW System, and from UW-Extension.
- f) Three ex officio members, who shall be without vote unless otherwise determined by the Committee as a whole: (1) a staff member from Central Administration appointed as Secretary to the Committee by the President of the Board; (2) the President of the Board; and (3) the Vice President of the Board.

No person serving on the Search Committee should be a candidate for the presidency, and persons accepting appointment to the Committee will be asked to indicate their intention not to accept candidacy.

2. The Regent Presidential Selection Committee

The Regent Presidential Selection Committee shall be a body of not fewer than nine Regents, appointed by the President of the Board and including as its Chairperson the President of the Board. All Regents serving on the Search Committee shall also be requested to serve on the Selection Committee, and all members of the Executive Committee of the Board of Regents shall also be requested to serve.

The Regent Presidential Selection Committee shall be charged with the following responsibilities:

- a) Evaluating nominations received from the Search Committee.
- b) Conducting interviews with all or a select number of the nominations received.

- c) Requesting additional nominations from the Search Committee should this be deemed wise or necessary.
- d) Maintaining the confidentiality of its evaluation of the persons under consideration.
- e) Maintaining records showing its application of the relevant selection criteria to the evaluation of the nominees.
- f) Selecting and bringing to the consideration of the full Board the names and qualifications of one or more persons judged to be most highly qualified and possibly available for appointment as President, UW System.
- g) Confirming the terms and procedures within which the Office of President, UW System, may be offered to a particular candidate.

Appointment of the new President shall be by action of the full Board of Regents meeting in Executive session.

B. A Description of the Office of President, UW System

The President of the UW System is the Chief Executive Officer of the System. As created in 1971 by the laws of Wisconsin, this System includes all fifteen Institutions of higher education of the state, identified by the Regents as follows;

- 1) Thirteen universities, organized as a doctoral cluster of two universities with program entitlement at the baccalaureate, master, specialist, advanced professional, and doctoral levels, and a university cluster of eleven universities with program entitlement at the baccalaureate, masters, and specialist levels;
- 2) A Center System of fourteen campuses offering two year transfer and associate degree programs; and,
- 3) A University Extension Institution responsible in cooperation with the campuses for statewide extension services.

Under Wisconsin law and Regent policies, the President of the System carries the following responsibilities:

- \* Administering policies of the Board of Regents setting statewide higher education standards, goals, and priorities.

\* Directing a Central Administration which assists the President and the Board in establishing Systemwide policies; in monitoring, evaluating and reviewing these policies; in coordinating program development and operations among the Institutions of the System; in planning the programmatic, financial, and physical development of the System; and in maintaining fiscal control and recommending new educational programs, operating budgets, and building programs to the Board.

\* Providing necessary leadership to interpret and gain wide understanding and support for the fulfillment of the purposes and missions of the System.

\* Establishing and maintaining effective relationships with the executive and legislative branches of state government on behalf of the Board of Regents, and maintaining appropriate accountability by the System to the Board, state government, and the public.

\* Assisting the Board in the selection and evaluation of chancellors.

\* Protecting and enhancing the maximum degree of Institutional autonomy possible to the end that Chancellors, faculty, staff, and students can most effectively fulfill the responsibilities and missions established for their Institutions. The Board delegates to each Chancellor of an Institution the necessary authority for the administration and operation of his/her Institution, and under state law the faculty of each Institution shares in responsibility for its governance and carries primary responsibility for academic and educational activities and for faculty personnel matters. Within the context of responsibilities delegated to Chancellors and faculty, students have responsibility and opportunity for active participation in the governance of their Institutions.

The spirit of the merger which resulted in the establishment of the University of Wisconsin System was to create effective planning and coordination of higher education in Wisconsin while decentralizing the operations of the Institutions

comprising the System. The President should lead the System in this direction, abiding by the mandate of merger to promote and protect Institutional identity and autonomy within the context of effective planning and coordination, avoiding excessive centralization or elaboration of administrative structure and functions, and seeking those policies and priorities which will enhance the capacity of each Institution better to fulfill its mission and better to serve the needs of Wisconsin and the nation.

C. A Preliminary Description of Qualifications Sought in The President of the UW System

The Board of Regents identifies at this time several qualifications as among those most crucial to a search for a new President. The Board recognizes that the Special Regent Presidential Search Committee will necessarily need to refine and possibly expand this listing in order to develop most clearly the criteria it will apply in its evaluations, and in order to reflect appropriately wise counsel which may be received from constituents. The Board affirms at this time, however, that the new President should insofar as possible be a person with:

- \* Significant academic accomplishments sufficient to command the professional respect of the academic communities of Wisconsin and higher education leaders nationwide, and to provide educational leadership for the Board, the System, and the people of Wisconsin.
- \* Significant and successful experience in an administrative leadership position, preferably in higher education, would be desirable but not mandatory.
- \* An understanding of the multiple purposes and constituencies of a public university with its missions of instruction, research, and public service.
- \* Outstanding abilities in establishing effective communication and sound relationships among diverse constituencies, including governmental relations.
- \* An understanding and appreciation of and commitment to the scholarly values requisite to the potential for serving the public good inherent in a major public university system.

A. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

1. President McNamara called upon Regent Lavine to report on the Higher Educational Aids Board meeting. Regent Lavine referred to the report of the HEAB meeting of July 30, 1976 (attached as EXHIBIT A), and offered to answer any questions. Regent DeBardleben reported that the Executive Committee of the HEAB did meet in Wausau on September 10. The sole function of the meeting was to adopt the dollar amounts for the HEAB budget requests, which conform exactly to the policies that were adopted at the previous meeting.

2. President McNamara reported that because of the press of business relative to the search and screen for a new System President and because of the upcoming budget it was felt that we could not prepare adequately for a useful joint business meeting with the University of Minnesota Board of Regents but that there would be a social affair prior to the Minnesota-Wisconsin football game hosted by President and Mrs. Weaver.

B. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

1. President Weaver presented the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record.

Regent DeBardleben moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:



Resolution 1289: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed. (EXHIBIT B, on file)

2. President Weaver reported on the informational hearings held by the Legislative Council Education Committee. His remarks will be found in the full minutes on file in each library.

3. President Weaver called upon Chancellor Dreyfus to report on the activities of the Council of Chancellors, of which he is Chairman. The detail of Chancellor Dreyfus' report is to be found in the full minutes on file in each campus library. Regent DeBardleben stated that he was disturbed by the fact that the Chancellors are going to spend some time on the question of whether or not University facilities should be used for religious services and inquired if we have a policy on that matter. Senior Vice President Percy stated that we do not have a policy--we have a Board policy that deals with the use of facilities by outside groups. He noted that the lack of a policy with respect to the use of facilities by denominational groups presents a problem and that he is pleased that the Council of Chancellors intends to address the matter. He stated that the subject will be back to the Board before the end of the calendar year.

4. At the request of President Weaver, Assistant to the President Joseph Wiley introduced the following interns for the 1976-77 academic year:

Degree in Sociology at UW-Madison

Chancellor George Field, UW-River Falls, introduced Mr. Clyde Smith, who is to assume an internship on the River Falls campus. Mr. Smith is a graduate of Northwestern University and is presently employed at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

5. President Weaver stated that he had assembled a work plan and schedule for the forthcoming academic year and rather than make it an oral report would forward it to the Regents within the next week or so.

6. President Weaver reviewed the fall enrollment, indicating that the enrollment count for the System stood at 136,083 students, which is 3,340 students larger than at this point one year ago. If past experience is continued, it is expected that between 10,000 and 11,000 more students will register during the first two

weeks of classes, which would bring the total for the first semester to approximately 146,000 or 147,000 students. He noted the transitional enrollment target approved by the Regents for this semester was 146,214. He continued that we will have presumably somewhat near 3,000 more students in the System this year over last year.

-

7. President Weaver stated that it seemed important that at regular intervals the members of the Board should receive a review of developments, problems, and aspirations from each of the campuses and major academic units of the System. The first of the reports will be by Chancellor Birnbaum, UW-Oshkosh. President Weaver noted that extensive written material had been distributed to the Regents by Chancellor Birnbaum and called upon him for his presentation. Chancellor Birnbaum introduced the following members of the UW-Oshkosh faculty and staff:

C. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

1. President McNamara noted that the Executive Committee met in Milwaukee on September 8, 1976, with fifteen Regents present, and considered the protocol to guide the search and selection process for a new President of the University System.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek:

Resolution 1290: That a Special Regents' Presidential Search Committee be established, comprised of 17 voting and 3 ex officio members without vote, appointed by the President of the Board of Regents or by reason of Board office, and charged with the responsibilities listed in the attached document; and

That a Regent Presidential Selection Committee be established, comprised of not fewer than nine Regents, appointed by the President of the Board, and charged with the responsibilities listed in the attached document; and

That the "Description of the Office of President, UW System" and the "Preliminary Description of Qualifications Sought in the President of the UW System" contained in the attached document, be approved. (EXHIBIT C, attached)

After a short discussion, it was agreed that Section C, on page 5 of Exhibit C, be amended to read as follows:

Professor Robert Baruch made the following statement: "The Association of UW Faculties wishes to reiterate its firm belief that a search and screen committee for the President of the UW System should continue the tradition of significant faculty representation on search and screen committees and should establish a precedent for such participation for other systems that follow. It is our contention that this may best be achieved by forming a search and screen committee with the majority of its members being teaching faculty. We also wish to express our understanding of the need for maintaining within the committee some balance of membership from the various constituencies of the System, and our belief that Regent involvement in the early stages of such a search and screen committee is not only desirable but imperative. Thank you."

The question was put on Resolution 1290, and it was voted.

2. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted:

Resolution 1292: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Regents authorize the preparation of a request for allotment of advance planning funds to undertake development of a concept and budget report on the design for renovation of Holton Hall, one of the Downer Buildings on the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee campus and further,

That, in addition to seeking release of the advance planning funds for Holton Hall, the Board of Regents authorize the following:

- (1) Placing before the State Building Commission and its staff, for their response, the University's suggested plan for use of the seven Downer Buildings;

7. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1297: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Oshkosh, Green Bay and River Falls Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to plan, bid and construct the three Maintenance-Stores Building projects at a total cost not to exceed \$2,456,300:

9. Regent Fish reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day Regent Grover voted against approval of the increase of \$275,250 in the budget for the 1973-75 West Campus Chillers and Medical Center Utilities project because it seemed like a large overrun and wanted to voice his objection for that reason.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted, with Regent Grover voting "No":

Resolution 1299: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the budget for the 1973-75 West Campus Chillers and Medical Center Utilities project, on the UW-Madison campus, be increased by \$275,250, for a revised total project cost of \$7,936,000.

10. Regent Fish reported that the Committee received a report of land holdings of the System, which is analyzed each year, and that the Central Administration recommendations relative to the capital budget for the 1977-79 biennium will be considered at the November meeting, using approximately the same procedure as previously used.

11. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1300: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Extension and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents indicate their willingness to accept a "gift-in-kind" of the construction of an environmental/nature center building at Camp Upham Woods, Wisconsin Dells, through the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation.



12. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

The Mound City Bank also agrees to provide curbing only for the driveway entrance at Bayley Avenue and UW-Platteville agrees to support a variance in the zoning regulations to allow the Mound City Bank to place a parking lot to the north boundary of the property to be received by the University, which is 65 feet in length.

13. Regent Pelisek stated that the Council of Trustees of the University of Wisconsin Hospitals will be taking a tour of the medical facility on the West Campus on November 18, prior to the Board committee meetings on that day and that each member of the Board will be invited on that tour in order to get a better appreciation of the progress and magnitude of the project.

E. REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

1. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1302: That Biennial Budget Policy Paper #3.0: Faculty Development and Renewal: Instructional Improvement and Faculty Revitalization, 1977-81, be approved as a basis for developing the UW System's 1977-79 biennial budget request for Board of Regent consideration in October, 1976. (Copy on file with the papers of the meeting)

2. Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been a special presentation by Robert Ragotzkie, UW-Madison Professor of Meteorology, Director of the Institute for Marine Studies Center and Director of the Sea Grant Program.

Regent Lavine reported the Committee next received the report of the Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs: (1) Re: Goals and Objectives of Academic Affairs in 1975-76: Report of Accomplishments, and (2) Work Plan for Academic Affairs, 1976-77.

The Committee was advised by Vice President Smith of the promotion of Dr. Doralyn Hickey from Director of the School of Library Science to Dean of the School of Library Science, UW-Milwaukee.

Regent Lavine reported the resignation of Associate Vice President Adolph Y. Wilburn to accept appointment as Director of the Council for International Exchange of Scholars, the senior Fulbright-Hays Program administered by the American Council on Education, effective December 1.

Regent Lavine stated that a prospectus on Center System Minimum Curricular Module Report will be mailed to the Regents, providing a short summary of background and setting a direction for the report to be made to the Board in December.

3. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1303: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, (Policy-Revised) Regent Resolution No. 140 (of 4/7/72) be revised to read as follows:

That the Board of Regents authorize the granting of degrees and certificates for Regent-approved instructional programs, from time to time, by each of the institutions of the University of Wisconsin System, to such candidates as are certified by the appropriate Registrar as having met the requirements for their appropriate degrees and certificates, and who are not, at Commencement, under disciplinary action or under charges that could lead to suspension or expulsion; that each Registrar keep a permanent record of degrees and certificates granted; and that each institution of the University of Wisconsin System be authorized to award such honors, awards, medals, and prizes as are customary at Commencement exercises.

4. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1304:

The Board of Regents recognizes that under Paragraph E of Article Fourth of the Deed of Gift and Conveyance under the Will of William F. Vilas that the Trustees may provide from time to time, as increase of available net income shall warrant, for professorships or chairs for instruction or for research as to them and the Regents shall seem most to promote knowledge and education and benefit the university.

Therefore, the Board of Regents requests that the Trustees of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate establish one additional Vilas professorship, presently in all respects similar to the 15 Vilas professorships heretofore established, annual compensation of \$10,000 together with appropriate allowance of \$5,000, amounting to \$15,000 for the 1976-77 academic year, as an additional request to that heretofore adopted by this Board under date of April 9, 1976 and certified to this Board by the Trustees of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate.

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5. Regent Lavine reported that the Committee received a report by Dr. Jean Foss, Assistant Vice Chancellor, UW-La Crosse, Chairperson of the System Study Group on Telecommunications and Mediated Materials.

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6. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1305: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the status of Jan M. Vansina, Professor of History, College of Letters and Science, UW-Madison, be changed to Vilas Research Professor of History, College of Letters and Science, UW-Madison, on a permanent basis, beginning with the academic year 1976-77, salary as shown in the 1976-77 budget, with \$10,000 chargeable to the funds of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate.

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7. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1306: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the status of Barry M. Trost be changed from Professor of Chemistry, College of Letters and Science, UW-Madison, to the Evan P. and Marion Helfaer Professor of Chemistry, College of Letters and Science, UW-Madison, effective immediately, salary as shown in the 1976-77 budget.

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8. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1307: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Stout, authorization to recruit for a Dean of Liberal Studies, UW-Stout, be approved.

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F. REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Hales.

Regent Hales noted that all Regents were invited to participate in the Committee meeting on the previous day.

1. Regent Hales reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been considerable discussion of the policy with respect to nondiscrimination in gifts, grants and bequests. Regent DeBardleben noted that the word "age" had been omitted from the proposed resolution, and it was the consensus of the members present that it be inserted after the word "sex".

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

Resolution 1308: (Policy-Revised) That, although it is the constitutional right of a person to dispose of property as he or she sees fit, it is the policy of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System to discourage restrictive terminology in gifts, grants, contracts, devises or bequests and, in particular, restrictions relating to sex, age, race, color, creed, religion or national origin.

Further, that the existing policy relating to the acceptance of gifts, grants, contracts, devises or bequests as set forth in Resolution 719 be rescinded.

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2. Regent Hales reported that at the May 1976 Board meeting during the presentation of the 1976-77 Auxiliary-Segregated Fee Budget an informal request was made of Central Administration to provide the Regents with comprehensive data regarding any remuneration to students participating in student government activities. A similar request for data regarding the cost of faculty governance was transmitted to Central Administration by the United Council of Student Governments. A study was initiated relating to student government costs, but prior to compilation of a full report a request was made to have this topic brought back to the Board. He noted that Regent DeBardleben expressed his views on this matter during the Committee meeting yesterday, indicating that he felt that the inquiry was inappropriate. Regent Hales said that the following resolution had been approved by the Committee, with Regents Erdman, Pelisek and Sandin voting "No".

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1309: That, the inquiry into compensation paid to student government officers in the University of Wisconsin System from segregated student fees not be completed.

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3. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1310: That Biennial Budget Policy Paper #1.1: State Aids Support Formula for Enrollment Increases, be approved as a basis for developing the UW System's 1977-79 biennial budget request for Board of Regent consideration in October, 1976. (Copy on file with the papers of the meeting)

4. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1311: That Biennial Budget Policy Paper #2.0: Noncredit Outreach Programs for 1977-81, be approved as a basis for developing the UW System's 1977-79 biennial budget request for Board of Regent consideration in October, 1976. (Copy on file with the papers of the meeting)

5. Regent Hales stated that the Committee discussed Biennial Budget Policy Paper #4.0: Proposed Department of Administration Survey of UW Extension Student Income Levels. He noted that through this survey of UW-Extension students and VTAE students in continuing education courses, the DOA intends to "obtain a meaningful analysis of ability to pay fees" for course work based on student incomes and to determine "possible duplication between UW Extension and VTAE continuing education courses". He said a basic issue from the view of Central Administration staff is whether the System has authority to release information it has gathered for one purpose to an outside state agency for a different purpose. At the same time it recognizes that the Department of Administration has the right to survey whomever they wish. He said there were misgivings on the part of the Committee members as to whether this study would accomplish what was intended, and it was the decision on the previous day to modify the Central Administration's recommendation to reflect the feeling of the Board by changing the recommendation on page 6 of Paper #4.0 to read "That, while questioning the merit underlying the purposes of the proposed survey, the Board of Regents . . .". Regent DeBardeleben stated that there had been considerable discussion about the inclusion of the word "that" and that it was his understanding there was an agreement to substitute the word "while". Regent Pelisek agreed that it was the intention to strike the word "that".

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1312: That Biennial Budget Policy Paper #4.0: Proposed Department of Administration Survey of UW Extension Student Income Levels, as amended, be approved as a basis for developing the UW System's 1977-79 biennial budget request for Board of Regent consideration in October, 1976. (Copy of document on file with the papers of the meeting)

6. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1313: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

7. Regent Hales stated that the late Ethel L. Brown bequeathed \$10,000 to establish the Ray A. Brown Law Student Award Fund and that the terms of the bequest provided for an award on the basis of character, gentlemanliness, dedication, scholarship and general deserving merit and need. He noted that when the Court assigned the trust to the Regents, it had information available that it was the intent to interpret "gentlemanliness" in such a way as to make women eligible for the award and to administer the fund in a nondiscriminatory fashion.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek:

Resolution 1314: That the bequest of the late Ethel L. Brown, Westport, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Ethel L. Brown, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Barkla stated that she intended to vote against the bequest because, if we are going to continue to discourage this kind of language in bequests, the only way we can discourage it is to protest and vote against it.

The question was put on Resolution 1314, and it was voted, with Regent Barkla voting "No".

8. Regent Hales noted that the bequest from the late Eunice L. Hoffman provided \$7,812.76 to the University of Wisconsin-Madison to help defray the living expenses of "a Christian girl or girls who have limited assets while attending the University of Wisconsin under a scholarship". He said the Committee was persuaded that Chancellor Young's position on nondiscriminatory selection of financial aid recipients as a step previous to assignment of funding from the total pool of such aid was sufficient safeguard against any charge of discrimination. It could be reasonably established for purposes of satisfying the trust that among the financial aid recipients in any given year one could find a Christian girl or girls. It would not be the intention of the campus to require certification of that fact in each instance unless there were reasonable cause to believe that such was not the case, and with this understanding the Committee recommended approval of the bequest.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek:

Resolution 1315: That the bequest of the late Eunice L. Hoffman, Montgomery County, Maryland, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Eunice L. Hoffman, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Extended discussion followed, the details of which will be found in the full minutes on file in each campus library. The question was put on Resolution 1315, and it was voted, with Regents Lawton, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Thompson, Walter and Zancanaro voting "Aye" (8), with Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Grover, Hales and Lavine voting "No" (5), and with Regents Erdman, Fish and Gerrard absent (3).

9. Regent Hales noted that the late Mildred Bolger bequeathed \$1,000 to the University of Wisconsin Medical School for research relative to strokes.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

Resolution 1316: That the bequest of the late Mildred Bolger, La Crosse, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Mildred Bolger, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

10. Regent Hales stated that the bequest of the late Oluf Haugrud provides that 25% of the residue of the trust is left to the UW-Superior for scholarships for male or female students of good character and high type American citizens. A subsequent paragraph states his "wish and desire" that a "reasonable amount" of scholarships be given to men who participate in athletics. He said discussions with Chancellor Meyer, who knew Mr. Haugrud, indicate it was his feeling that the conditions of the first reference, "for male or female students", would establish the basis for interpreting the intent of Mr. Haugrud. It was further pointed out that the phrase "wish and desire" is not a mandatory directive.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1317: That the bequest of the late Oluf Haugrud, Duluth, Minnesota, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Oluf Haugrud, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Superior.

11. Regent Hales stated that the late Eufemia Neroda, Elizabeth, New Jersey, bequeathed \$500 to the University of Wisconsin and that her son, in consultation with other family members, has indicated that the money should go to the UW-Madison campus.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

Resolution 1318: That the bequest of the late Eufemia Neroda, Elizabeth, New Jersey, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Eufemia Neroda, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

12. Regent Hales reported that the late Herbert E. Tautz, Denver, Colorado, bequeathed 11 shares of stock in Rainbo Lodge, Inc., Land O'Lakes, Wisconsin, to the University. Since Rainbo Lodge has supported research in Zoology at UW-Madison for a long period of time, it seemed appropriate that the bequest be directed to the University of Wisconsin-Madison. The stock has a value of approximately \$1 per share.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1319: That the bequest of the late Herbert E. Tautz, Denver, Colorado, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Herbert E. Tautz, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.



13. Regent Hales said that the late Joseph Lyell Temby, Chicago, Illinois, bequeathed a collection of 750 books to the University of Wisconsin as a memorial to his mother, Mary Johns Temby, to form a collection to be known as the "Mary Johns Temby Collection". The collection is to be housed in the Memorial Library.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1320: That the bequest of the late Joseph Lyell Temby, Chicago, Illinois, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Joseph Lyell Temby, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

14. Regent Hales reported that the late Louise Fleming Troxell, former Dean of Women on the Madison campus, bequeathed \$10,000 to the UW-Madison to be added to a scholarship fund previously established in her name.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1321: That the bequest of the late Louise Fleming Troxell, Palo Alto, California, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Louise Fleming Troxell, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

15. Regent Hales reported that the Committee received a report from Burton Wagner, Chairman of the Systemwide Committee on Tax-Deferred Annuities, on the progress of the committee relating to implementation of recent legislation. The recommendation of the committee and the administration will be presented to the Board for action at a future meeting.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben:

Resolution 1322: That in accordance with Section 19.85(1)(c) and 19.85(1)(f), WIS. STATS., a closed session be held to consider personnel matters.

The resolution was adopted by a roll call vote, with Regents DeBardleben, Grover, Hales, Lavine, Lawton, McNamara, Neshek, Sandin, Thompson, Walter, and Zancanaro voting "Aye", and with Regents Barkla, Erdman, Fish, Gerrard, and Pelisek absent. (Regent Barkla was not present for the vote but was a participant in the meeting.)

The Board recessed into closed session at 12:30 P.M.

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The Board arose from Executive Session at 1:25 P.M.

President McNamara announced adoption of the following resolution:

Resolution 1323: That on recommendation of the System President and in accord with the statutory provisions pertaining to the State Executive Salary Group Program, Leonard Haas's appointment as Chancellor of the UW-Eau Claire be extended through June 30, 1978.

The meeting adjourned at 1:26 P.M.
