COVERING THE BADGERS

COMMUNICATIONS CENTER: Wisconsin's working facilities for press-radio-television are located on the west side of Camp Randall Stadium and can be reached from Breese Terrace via the elevator at Gate 6.

WORKING TICKETS: All Requests for Communications Center tickets must be placed with the Sports Information Office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call window at the ground level entrance at Gate 6, Section E. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations. Telecopier service will be available to members of the working press by the appropriate servicing organizations.

RADIO: Each station admitted for broadcasting by signed contract will be issued five booth tickets. Booths are assigned and tickets mailed upon receipt of necessary fees and signed contract. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the Sports News Service Office, or on game day at the Press Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Field passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers who may work from assigned space in booths on the Radio-TV level, or from the east or west sidelines (except between the 30-yard lines) and beyond the end zone.

PARKING: A limited number parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 are available to working media only. They will be issued as requested.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: Player interviews will be held in the "W" Club Annex following practice as prearranged with the Sports Information Office. There will be no player interviews allowed on Thursdays and Fridays.

Media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players after each game following a short post-game meeting of the squad and coaches. All post-game interviews will be conducted in the Media Interview Room.

COACHES INTERVIEWS: Dave McClain will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game meeting with team and coaches. The post-game interview of Coach McClain will be conducted in the Media Interview Room.

The Media Interview Room on game days is the Wisconsin Weight Training Room directly below the Wisconsin Dressing Room.

Best time to interview Coach McClain is from 2:30-3:15 Thursdays, or 2:00 to 3:00 Fridays before home games, or after practice each day.

YOUR HOSTS in Camp Randall Stadium and at all University of Wisconsin athletic events are **Jim Mott**, Sports Information Director, and **Bob Leu**, Radio-TV Director.

Jim Mott is a Madison native and has B.A. degrees in Zoology and Journalism from the University of Wisconsin. As an undergraduate, he served as Wisconsin's basketball team manager for four years, earning a major "W" award for his work.

Jim is a past president of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) and the Madison Pen and Mike Club. He was named to the CoSIDA Hall of Fame in 1979.

He and his wife **Dorothy** are the parents of three sons — **William 20**, **David 17**, and **Eric 15**.

Bob Leu joined Wisconsin's Athletic Department staff as Radio-TV Director in September, 1973 from WHA-TV where he had served as producer-director and director of sports.

He's a Milwaukee native and a 1960 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in speech.

Bob handles radio and television contracts for the athletic department and is the producer of Wisconsin's post-season football, basketball, and hockey highlight films. He has also done color commentary on Wisconsin's hockey broadcasts, and has served in past years as producer-host of Badger Football on the state's public television stations.

He and his wife **Janis** are the parents of daughters **Dawn 23**, **Amie 20**, and son **Adam 11**.

Bob is a past president of the Madison Pen and Mike Club.

THE HEAD COACH—DAVE McCLAIN

Dave McClain begins his fifth season as head coach at Wisconsin after being named Wisconsin's 24th head coach on December 16, 1977.

The 44-year-old McClain, a native of Upper Sandusky, Ohio and a 1960 graduate of Bowling Green University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education, came to Wisconsin from a highly successful coaching stint at Ball State, where he posted an overall 46-25-3 record in seven seasons.

In his first season with the Badgers, he became the first coach since Ivan Williamson in 1949 to post a winning mark as a first year coach. He led the Badgers to a 5-4-2 season, including 3-4-2 Big Ten mark.

McClain played football at Upper Sandusky High School and Bowling Green University, where his teams went 45-5-4. McClain played both quarterback and safety at Bowling Green.

He started his coaching career at Crestline, Ohio High School with an 8-1 record and then returned to Bowling Green as a graduate assistant in 1961, where he served as freshman offensive coach and earned his master's degree in Education.

He then served as an assistant coach at Cornell University under Tom Harp in 1962; at Miami (Ohio) University under Glenn E. "Bo" Schembechler 1963-66; at Kansas under Pepper Rodgers in 1967-68; and at Ohio State under W.W. "Woody" Hayes in 1969 and 1970 before accepting the head coaching job at Ball State.

He coached seven seasons at Ball State, with only his first a loser at 4-5-1. He was named Mid American Conference "Coach of the Year" in 1975 after a 9-2 season. His

three year MAC record of 13-4 included the 1976 conference title.

His first Badger squad opened with four straight wins and finished 5-4-2—the team's first winning record since 1974. His 1979 and 1980 squads posted identical 4-7-0 overall and 3-5-0 Big Ten marks.

In 1981 the Badgers went 7-5-0 including the first Bowl appearance for a Wisconsin team since the 1962 season. Their 6-3-0 Big Ten record was good for a third place tie, and it included wins over national powers Michigan and Ohio State. The Badgers lost to Tennessee 28-21 in the Garden State Bowl.

Dave and his wife, the former Judy Perry, have three children—son Tom 16, and daughters Mindy 14 and Marcy 11.

1982 WISCONSIN FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

Wisconsin's football team finished in a tie for third place in the 1981 Big Ten title chase — their highest conference finish since the 1962 championship team—and their 7-4 record earned them a Garden State Bowl berth at season's end.

A total of 37 lettermen — 15 of them starters — return for 1982 play, including a pair of All-Americans — middle guard **Tim Krumrie** and free safety **Matt Vanden Boom**.

Both **Krumrie** and **Vanden Boom**, along with strong safety **David Greenwood** were All-Big Ten selections last year as juniors.

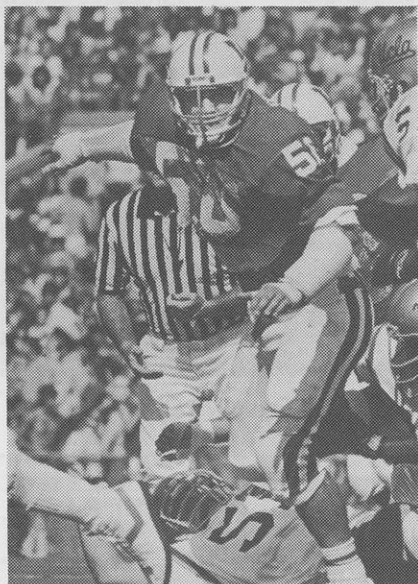
Offensive tackle **Bob Winckler**, tailback **John Williams**, center **Ron Versnik**, and defensive tackle **Mark Shumate** were second team or honorable mention choices a year ago.

While **Krumrie** keyed the Badgers defense along the line of scrimmage — he made tackles all over the field — it was the play of the secondary, sparked by **Vanden Boom** and **Greenwood**, that was vital to Wisconsin's overall defensive success.

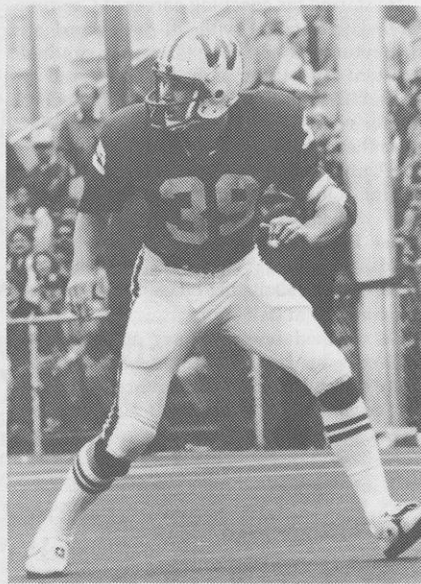
The Badgers, who had intercepted a meager ten passes in 1980 (seven in conference play), grabbed off 26 enemy aerials last year (22 in Big Ten play) with **Vanden Boom** and **Greenwood** each grabbing six. **Vanden Boom**, who had made his first defensive start in the 1980 finale against Minnesota, started off 1981 with three interceptions in the 21-14 opening game victory over Michigan.

Wright, who survived an early season injury to provide capable back-up, and had an outstanding spring, will be vying for the No. 1 position in the autumn.

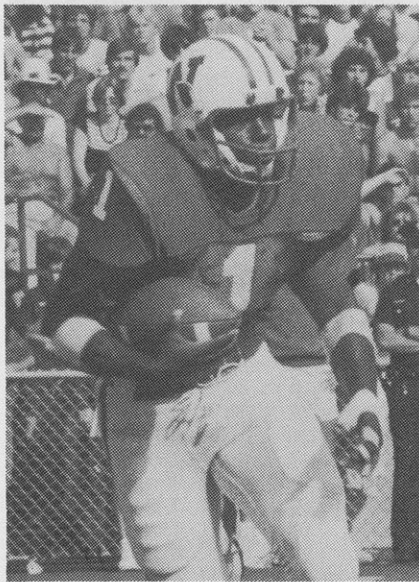

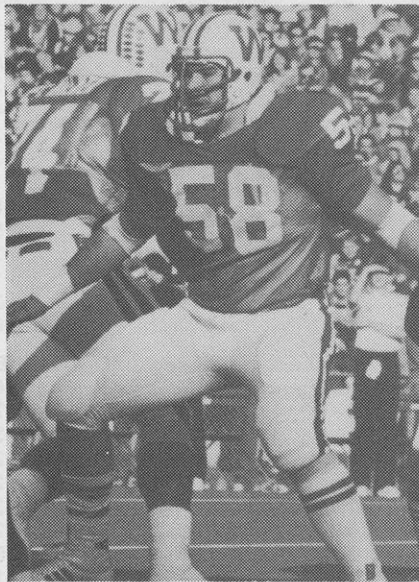

BILL DUDLEY—Quarterbacks and Receivers; Offensive Coordinator

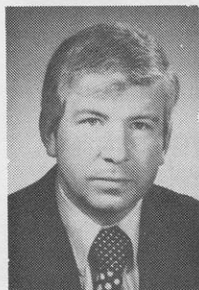

He had served as defensive secondary coach for the Flyers in 1973, and added defensive coordinator duties to that in his final three seasons at Dayton.

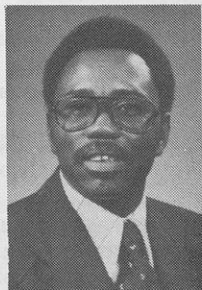

Jim and his wife Ellie are the parents of three children: Jeff, 25, Jody, 22, and Jim, Jr., 21.

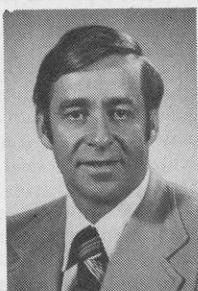
CHUCK HEATER—Defensive Backs

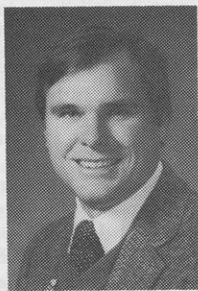

He and his wife Deborah are the parents of a 21-month old daughter, Emily.



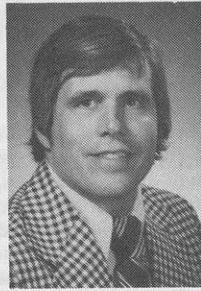

If the pieces all fit together, a twelfth game will beckon for the second straight year.

Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program

Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch is in his 14th year as Wisconsin's Director of Athletics and he's the guiding force behind one of the finest athletic programs for men and women in the United States today.

Wisconsin's men's and women's athletic programs have consistently ranked in the Big Ten's first division during his tenure over the past thirteen years.

The Wausau native came back to Wisconsin — where he gained collegiate fame as a star sophomore running back in leading the Badgers to a No. 3 ranking during the 1942 football season — from the Los Angeles Rams on February 28, 1969.

His original appointment as athletic director — slated to end in 1979 — was first extended in 1974 by the school's athletic board through June 30, 1984, and again in April, 1979 through June 30, 1988 by Chancellor Irving Shain upon recommendation of the Athletic Board.

Chancellor Shain stated in a letter to Hirsch, "I am very pleased to take this present action. My own observations certainly support the opinion of the Athletic Board that you are one of the outstanding athletic directors, not only in the Big Ten — our 'home' conference, but also in the country at large. I am personally, as well as professionally, delighted to have you as a member of our university staff."

His career has been one of success.

Wisconsin fans, especially the older generation, remember him as a triple threat halfback on Harry Stuhdreher's 1942 football team that won eight games, lost only to Iowa, and tied Notre Dame.

Hirsch's play as a 19-year-old sophomore on Wisconsin's 1942 football team carried the Badgers to the brink of the national championships. The Wausau native rushed for 766 yards on 141 carries — his best was 174 yards on 22 attempts vs. Missouri — and his overall contribution added 226 yards passing, 390 yards on receptions and runbacks of punts, kickoffs, and interceptions plus nine touchdowns, five by rushing and four by passing.

He played at Michigan in 1943, as a Marine trainee, and he not only played football, but basketball, track, and baseball. He won his "M" in each sport, the only athlete ever to accomplish such a feat at Michigan.

He had a successful professional football career, first as halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference, and later with the Los Angeles Rams for nine seasons as one of the all-time great ends.

It was at end that "Crazylegs" was to attain new heights in his career. The Rams, in transition to the modern passing game, often split him wide as a receiver and finally moved him permanently to end — establishing him as the first flanker.



Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch

Hirsch was one of the athletes — like Otto Graham and Sam Huff and Gino Marchetti — who brought special talents to the sport in the 1950's as it changed from two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

In 1951, Hirsch displayed all his talents as he put together one of the finest seasons in National Football League history. He gained 1,495 yards on receptions, an all-time record approached only by Bobby Mitchell of the Washington Redskins (1,436 yards in 1963) and Hirsch had only twelve games to set the record, not 14, like Mitchell!

That same season Hirsch caught 17 touchdown passes to tie the league record set by Don Hutson of the Packers in 1942. He also caught at least one touchdown pass through 11 consecutive games over the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

Elroy compiled a total of 343 passes caught for 6,299 yards and 53 touchdown catches during his career with the Rams before retiring from NFL play following the 1957 season.

He was a successful executive with the Rams, first as general manager of the team, and later as assistant to the president of the team, a job he relinquished to accept the job as Wisconsin athletic director.

He's been named to the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame (1965), to professional football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio (1968), to the National Football Hall of Fame in New York (1974), and to the Madison Sports Hall of Fame (1977).

He's also a member of the all-time NFL All-Star team for his play as end and flanker during his nine year career with the Los Angeles Rams

Elroy and his wife, Ruth, are the parents of son Win Stephen, Los Angeles, and daughter Patricia Caroline, a recent University of Wisconsin-Madison graduate.

WISCONSIN ATHLETIC OFFICIALS

PROF. FRANK J. REMINGTON

Frank has served as Wisconsin's Big Ten Faculty Representative and a member of the school's athletic board since 1959, except for the 1970-71 school year. He chaired the athletic board in 1966 and 1967.

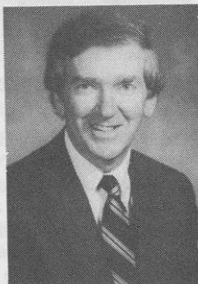
The lawyer-educator, who has been a member of the law faculty since 1949, is one of the nation's foremost authorities on criminal justice and administration.

The 50-year-old political scientist succeeded emeritus Professor Frederick W. Haberman as board chairman in 1979.

During his first year as a member of the Athletic Board, Professor Tarr was responsible for developing a board study on its educational policy and philosophy of athletics.

He has served as a member of the UW-Madison faculty since 1963 and is a former chairman of the political science department. He has published in the fields of international relations, politics and government, and national defense and arms control of strategic weapons. He has served on the faculty's Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC) policy committee.

He received his B.A. degree from the University of Massachusetts in Amherst and his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Chicago.

OTTO BREITENBACH Associate Athletic Director

Otto joined the Wisconsin Athletic staff July 1, 1973 following a very successful tenure as athletic director and football coach at Madison's LaFollette High School.

He's a native Madisonian and is a 1941

graduate of Edgewood High school where he was a three-sport star.

He was a sophomore halfback on Wisconsin's 1942 football team when World War II interrupted his schooling until 1946. He served as an instructor-pilot in the U.S. Air Force.

Otto received his Bachelor of Science degree in physical education in 1948 and his master's degree in physical education in 1955 from Wisconsin.

His high school coaching career started at Chilton in 1948; he moved to Middleton in 1952; and went to Madison LaFollette in 1963 when the school opened.

Three of his Middleton teams won Badger Conference titles and his 1967 and 1969 LaFollette football teams won Big Eight championships. The 1967 team was ranked

No. 1 in the state, and his 1969 LaFollette track team won the state Class A title.

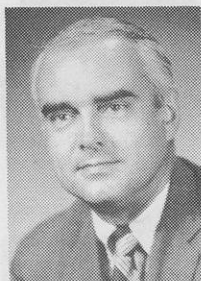

Jerry and his wife Janet are the parents of three children — Jason 13, Sarah 11 and Rachael 8.

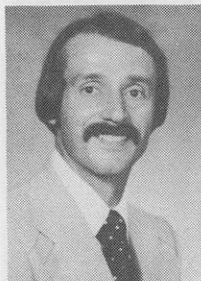

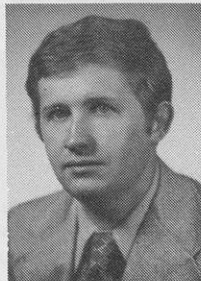
Terry Murawski joined the Wisconsin staff in 1979.

Dick is in his tenth year serving as Business Manager for the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics. He is a native of Rockford, Ill.

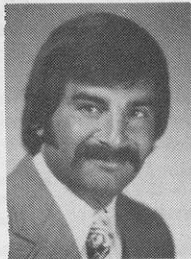

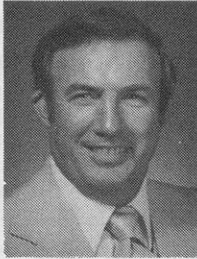

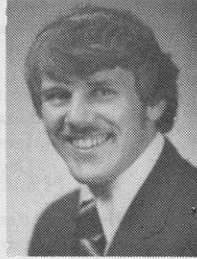

He received his degree in Physical education from Wisconsin in 1974 and worked professionally with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1974 before joining the Wisconsin staff.

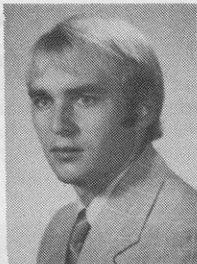

TWO BADGER NUMBERS RETIRED

Two football jersey numbers have been retired in Wisconsin's football history. They are No. 80, worn by All-American end **Dave Schreiner** when he was an All-American end in 1941 and 1942; and No. 83, worn by quarterback **Allan J. Shafer** in 1944.

Schreiner was killed in action with the U.S. Marine Corps during the battle of Okinawa, June, 1945. **Shafer** was fatally injured in the second half of the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa football game and died shortly after Wisconsin had defeated the Hawkeyes 26-7 in Camp Randall stadium, November 11, 1944.

WISCONSIN ALL-TIME FOOTBALL TEAM

Six All-American football players were picked on Wisconsin's all-time football team by fans during the 1969 centennial season of collegiate football.

Fullback **Alan 'The Horse' Ameche**, 1953 and 1954 All-American and 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was voted Wisconsin's all-time greatest football player in the poll.

In the backfield with Ameche are quarterback **Ron VanderKelen** (1962); and **Marlin 'Pat' Harder** and **Elroy 'Crazylegs' Hirsch**, members of the famed 1942 Wisconsin team that posted an 8-1-1 record and a No. 3 national ranking.

The ends named are All-Americans **Dave Schreiner** (1941 and 1942) and **Pat Richter** (1961 and 1962).

Linemen honored included **Robert 'Red' Wilson** (1946-49); **Howard 'Cub' Buck** (1915); **Arlie Mucks, Sr.** (1914); **Dan Lanphear** (1959); and **Ken Bowman** (1961-63).

CAMP RANDALL HISTORY

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 88 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U.S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural Society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "Field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University has had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the 1966 addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 77,280, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men, but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.

The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings.

The original capacity of the stadium when first utilized in 1917 was 10,000, with permanent seats being added in stages to increase seating capacity.

There have been three enlargements to Camp Randall Stadium since the end of World War II. The first, in 1950 and 1951, saw the completion of the horseshoe at the north end of the stadium.

The running track was eliminated in 1958 expansion which saw the playing field lowered by ten feet to add almost 12,000 seats to the stadium capacity which grew to 63,435 at that time.

The addition of the second deck on the west side of the stadium in 1966 added almost 13,000 prime viewing seats, including the modern Communications Center.

The current capacity of 77,280 makes Camp Randall Stadium the fifth largest college owned stadium in the United States—exceeded only by those at Michigan, Stanford, Ohio State and Tennessee.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horseshoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 12,204 following renovation in 1976.



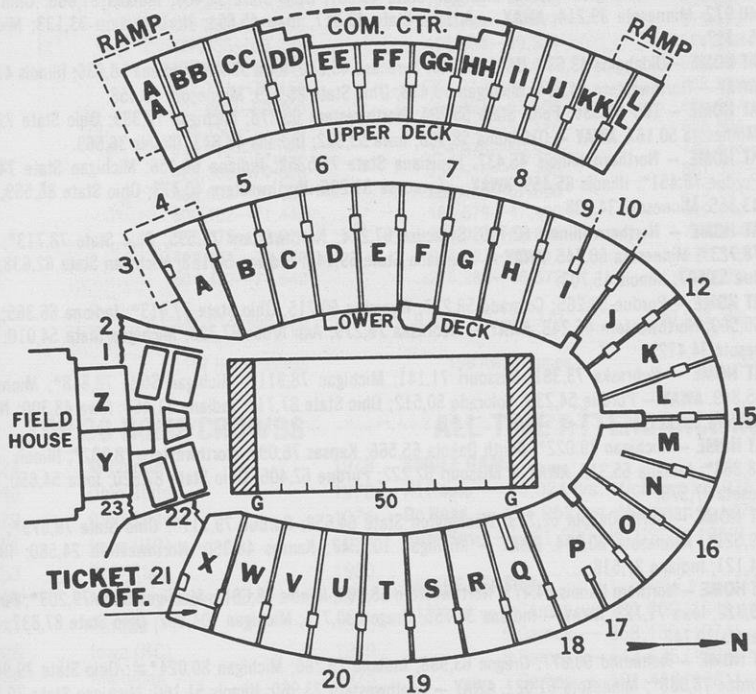

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

The University of Wisconsin-Madison was established in the same constitutional document which proclaimed Wisconsin's statehood in 1848.

Today, the University of Wisconsin-Madison ranks among the great universities of the world in size, scope, and academic excellence.

In the fall of 1981, 3,979 courses were offered. Majors were available in 152 bachelor's, 187 master's and 118 doctor's degree programs. An array of intellectual experiences are available at the University. For example, UW-Madison has its own nuclear reactor, one of the finest textile collections in the country, a building in which nearly every conceivable environmental condition can be simulated, a collection of more than 1,700 United Artists Corporation movies from 1919 to 1951, and a mastodon skeleton.

Three faculty members have won Nobel Prizes, the most recent being Professor **Howard M. Temin**, oncologist, who won the 1975 award in medicine. **Dr. Joshua Lederberg** won the 1958 prize for his studies of the genetic material in bacteria, and **Dr. Har Gobind Khorana** was recognized in 1968 for his pioneering work in the field of nucleic acid chemistry.

UW-Madison ranked eighth among the nation's leading institutions in faculty quality in a survey of more than 4,000 professors at four year colleges. UW-Madison departments won a ranking of 12 of the 19 academic fields in a 1977 survey by Everett C. Ladd Jr., and Seymour Lipset, well-known educational researchers. Results were published in 1979 by the Chronicle of Higher Education.

Highest rankings for UW-Madison were second in agriculture and third in biological sciences. Ranked fourth were foreign languages and sociology. Education and history placed fifth, while chemistry stood sixth and mathematics-statistics seventh. Engineering and political science were rated eighth, economics ninth, and psychology tenth.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top ten educational institutions in the country in every published study of faculty and administrative opinion since the early 1900's.

The American Council on Education ranked the University "distinguished" or strong in 26 of 29 academic disciplines surveyed. Particular praise was given to the departments of chemical engineering, geography, Spanish, botany, history, bacteriology, and bio-chemistry.

The University also ranks high in several other areas: Second nationally in number of doctorates awarded in the past four decades. Second in total expenditures for research and development.

Third in providing federal executives holding doctorates, in total gifts received by state universities, in contributions from business and corporations and in foreign student population.

Fifth in number of full-time students, and seventh among alma maters of presidents serving the nation's largest corporations.

Excellence results from the continued financial support provided by the citizens of Wisconsin, and from the University's dedication to providing maximum educational opportunities for all state citizens, the acquisition of new knowledge through research, and the application of knowledge to the improvement and use of society.
