



JIM MOTT



Jim Mott will complete his final football season at Wisconsin this year. Mott has directed the University's sports information office since 1966 and has been a member of the staff since 1953. He officially retired on June 30, but will return to assist with football this season.

"It's been a very rewarding job—really a labor of love," says Mott. "I've enjoyed every minute that I've been here."

Mott has been a part of a lot of UW sports memories, from the 1959 Big Ten football championship and subsequent trip to the Rose Bowl to the 1990 NCAA National hockey championship. A walking encyclopedia of the history of Wisconsin athletics, Mott knows more about UW Athletics than anyone else.

"It really has been a love affair between me and Wisconsin athletics," says Mott.

UW Athletic Director Pat Richter expressed the feelings of many people who have worked with Mott over the years. "Jim has been a long-standing loyal friend and we are going to miss his presence with the Wisconsin athletic program. All of us wish him well in the years to come."

RADIO COVERAGE OF WISCONSIN FOOTBALL

Beginning with the 1989 season, exclusive coverage of all University of Wisconsin Football games is being provided by WTMJ RADIO (620 AM) in Milwaukee. Veteran sportscaster Jim Irwin calls the play-by-play while retired UW athletic director and former Badger and NFL football standout Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch handles the color. Additional commentary is provided by Brian Manthey and Matt Lepay.

WTMJ RADIO provides the University of Wisconsin with an exclusive, statewide network of some 35 radio stations for all Badger football games, both home and away. In Madison, WTMJ awarded the exclusive rights to UW football games to WTSO RADIO (1070 AM).

Radio stations wishing to broadcast from Camp Randall Stadium should contact the UW Sports News Service AT LEAST one week prior to the game they wish to broadcast.

Each radio station admitted to Camp Randall Stadium and the Communications Center for broadcasting by signed contract will be issued five booth tickets.

Booths are assigned and tickets are mailed upon receipt of necessary fees and signed contract. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the UW Sports News Service Office, or on game day at the Press Will Call Window.

TELEVISION COVERAGE OF WISCONSIN FOOTBALL

All University of Wisconsin home football games are broadcast on a delayed basis by WHA-TV (Channel 21/11) in Madison.

Broadcast across the statewide educational television network, usual air time is either 10:30 pm Central on Saturday evenings or 10:30 am Central on Sunday mornings.

Produced by Jim Santulli and Tim Perko, the WHA-TV broadcast is handled by Van Stout with play-by-play.

Information for Media Covering Wisconsin Football

The University of Wisconsin both welcomes and encourages your coverage of Badger Football. Following are some important items to assist you in your plans.

COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

The University of Wisconsin's working facilities for press, radio and television—the Communications Center—are located in the upper deck on the west side of Camp Randall Stadium. The Communications Center can be reached from Breese Terrace via the elevator at Gate 6.

Radio and television broadcast booths are located on level three of the Communications Center while print media should report to level four for assigned seat locations.

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

All requests for working press credentials (Communications Center tickets) MUST be placed with the UW Sports News Service Office and at least one week in advance. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate press credentials are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will-Call Window at the ground level entrance to the Stadium—Gate 6, Section E. Working press credentials contain assigned seat locations in the Communications Center.

PRINT MEDIA

Press Credentials for coverage of University of Wisconsin Football are restricted primarily to daily newspapers, wire services, and regular periodicals.

Requests for press credentials MUST be placed with the UW Sports News Service at least one week in advance of the game you wish to cover. Upon acceptance of your application, appropriate credentials are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will-Call Window at the ground level entrance to the stadium—Gate 6, Section E.

On occasion, and depending on space availability, weekly newspapers will be granted credentials.

RADIO

Radio stations wishing to broadcast from Camp Randall Stadium should contact the UW Sports News Service AT LEAST one week prior to the game they wish to broadcast.

Each radio station admitted to Camp Randall Stadium and the Communications Center for broadcasting by signed contract will be issued five booth tickets.

Booths are assigned and tickets are mailed upon receipt of necessary fees and signed contract. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the UW Sports News Service Office, or on game day at the Press Will Call Window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Field photo passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers who may work from assigned space in booths on the Radio-TV (third) level of the Communications Center, or from the east or west sidelines (except between the 30 yard lines) and beyond the end zone.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Game programs, two-deep flip cards, game-day notes and current statistics are provided to members of the working press prior to kickoff.

A lunch is also served to attending media.

Complete game statistics and play-by-play accounts will be furnished to each working location approximately 30 minutes after the conclusion of the game.

PARKING AT THE STADIUM

A limited number of parking passes for lots directly adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium are available to working media only. They will be issued as requested and as available, on a first-come, first-served basis. Contact the UW Sports News Service for information.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

University of Wisconsin player interviews may be obtained following practice on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays—approximately 6:00–6:30 pm.

Visiting media wishing to interview Wisconsin players must arrange their interview(s) ahead of time through the UW Sports News Service office. Phone: (608) 262-1811.

On game days, media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players in the Badger locker-room following a post-game meeting of the squad and coaches.

Post-game interviews of visiting coaches will be conducted near the opponents dressing room.

INTERVIEWING COACH ALVAREZ

Coach Barry Alvarez will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game meeting with team and coaches. The post-game interview session with Coach Alvarez will be held in the McClain Athletic Facility Auditorium.

Coach Alvarez will conduct a press and telephone conference for local media each Monday at 12 noon central time during the season in the "W" Club Room in Camp Randall Stadium. A light lunch will be served.


On Tuesdays throughout the season, Coach Alvarez will take part in the Big Ten Telephone Conference. (Media wishing to take part in this teleconference should phone the Big Ten Service Bureau in Schaumburg, Illinois at 312-605-8933 to secure the appropriate phone number and further details.)

Coach Alvarez will also usually be available each weekday after practice (approximately 6–6:30 pm). Practice will start daily at 3:30 pm.

1990 WISCONSIN FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

You could almost call it a genuine infection of enthusiasm.

"On the move again." That could be a catch-phrase for the rejuvenated Wisconsin football program as the Badgers depart on a promising new course under Coach Barry Alvarez in the decade of the 1990s.

Alvarez and his high-powered staff have already made a profound impact on this program. Everywhere you go, people are talking Wisconsin Football again. Phone calls and written inquiries for football ticket information and upcoming home dates continue to run strong. Season ticket sales are up significantly. But it appears the best is yet to come.

"My number one goal," says Alvarez, "is to have a team out on the field that people in the state of Wisconsin can identify with and be proud of.

"I don't ever want to talk about wins and losses . . . I do that with my team separately. I don't want to put any pressure on them with how many they have to win because sometimes they can't control that.

"I just want them to go out and play as hard as they can, know what they're supposed to do, have fun playing, and be excited about it."

This fall, Coach Alvarez greets 39 returning Badger football lettermen—21 on offense and 18 on defense. Sixteen of those lettermen—eight on offense and eight on defense—were starters in the 1989 finale against Michigan State. Two more, place-kicker Rich Thompson and punter Brad Brekke, were the forces behind the kicking game.

BADGER OFFENSE

"The offense I like to run is one that's multiple enough where you can take advantage of what somebody's giving you," said coach Barry Alvarez. "Every week you'll face people that will try to line up and overplay what they feel is your strength. You've got to be flexible enough to go to another package; if they load up on you and take away the run then you've got to be able to open up and go to the passing game. And if you spread out and have great success throwing the ball, then they're going to load up—maybe play a nickel package—and do some things to make it tough on you. You can take anything you want away from an offense."

Among the top offensive linemen to watch this fall are 6-8, 285-pound all-Big Ten candidate and tackle Brady Pierce; 6-4, 321-pound post-season honors candidate and guard Nick Polczinski; 6-3, 265-pound center Rick Godfrey (honorable mention all-Big Ten); 6-3, 322-pound guard Chuck Belin (honorable mention all-Big Ten); 6-5, 276-pound tackle David Rapps; 6-3, 273-pound guard Jim Basten; and 6-7, 277-pound tackle David Senczyszyn. Pierce, incidentally, was also named to the Academic all-Big Ten Team in 1989.

Other solid players up front in 1990 will be Tyler Adam and Bill Maksen at tackle, Cory Brye and Jeff Miller at guard, and Jeff Rasmussen and Erik Olsen at center.

At quarterback, two experienced lettermen return in Tony Lowery and Sean Wilson, as well as Brad Brekke. Lowery, who missed the 1989 campaign, came back strong last spring and emerged as the team's clear-cut No. 1 signal caller heading into the fall. Lowery lettered as both a freshman in 1987 and as a sophomore in 1988, leading the Badgers in passing both years. His two-year UW stats showed 109 completions in 210 attempts (51.9%) for 1,284

yards and three TDs while his two-year total offense stats amounted to 1,510 yards. Lowery made a big splash as a first-year performer, earning *UPI*'s Big Ten Freshman of the Year award in 1987. Wilson, meanwhile, heads into his sophomore season of eligibility after completing 66 of 129 passes (51.2%) for 667 yards and three touchdowns in 1989. Wilson also led the Badgers in total offense with 834 yards. Brekke, meanwhile, has been the team's top punter the past two seasons, in addition to his role as a backup QB.


Several additional developments instituted under the new coaching staff last spring included the moves of letterman quarterback Lionell Crawford to wide receiver, letterman monsterback Rafael Robinson to running back, and the return of three-year letterman Bill Williams at wide receiver.

Crawford, who has passed and run for 1,412 yards of total offense the past two seasons, figures to provide the 1990 Badgers with a bona fide offensive threat. Robinson, who was originally recruited as a running back, returns to that position with a fresh outlook and a new confidence. He was a standout all spring long and heads into the fall as the team's No. 1 ball carrier.


Other top returnees at wide receiver are varsity lettermen Aaron Brown, Tony Spaeth, Tim Ware, and Bill Williams. Brown caught 12 passes for 174 yards and one TD, Spaeth caught 14 for 152 yards and one TD, and Ware hauled in four passes for 69 yards in action last fall. Williams returns to the Badger den with 34 career catches for 524 yards and a 15.4 yards-per-catch average.

Players who should come forward at wide receiver in 1990 include Mike Tams, Reginald Holt, Mark Mangum, Anthony McHenry, Tom Browne and Chris Ballard.


At tight end, returning letterman Kerry Miller and Jim Bourne give the Badgers a solid 1-2 punch. Bourne was a standout during the 1990 spring run and was the tentative starter heading into fall camp. Miller, a two-year varsity letterman, caught 13 passes for 98 yards and one touchdown in 1989 play. Other challengers at tight end include Todd Van Roo and

The teams' top candidates for starting jobs at running back, in addition to Rafael Robinson, are returning lettermen Robert Williams and Damone Freeman. Both players enjoyed productive freshman campaigns, with Williams gaining 354 net yards and sporting a 4.8 yards-per-carry average. Freeman owned a 4.1-yard average with 161 net yards. Ellison, on the otherhand, sat out the '89 campaign but is eager to put his 6-0, 222-pound frame to work at fullback.

BADGER DEFENSE

"To be a great defense you have to be physical," says Coach Alvarez. "There are no shortcuts . . . no substitutes. You have to be physical. If you're not physical and you can't outhit people, then you're not

going to be good defensively. That's the first thing.

"Secondly, they have to know what they're doing and we have to have a sound package."

"But most of all, they have to play hard. A defense that's emotional is probably going to be a good one. The good ones have fun playing. The good ones are intimidating."

On defense, the Badgers return standout regulars Don Davey and Dan Batsch up front at tackle, veterans Malvin Hunter and Brendan Lynch at linebacker, and the likes of Eddie Fletcher, Greg Thomas, Troy Vincent and LaMarr White in the defensive backfield.

The 6-4, 270-pound Davey is a three-time first team Academic all-America and was a 1989 all-Big Ten Honorable Mention pick after starting every game as a junior. He also registered 50 tackles, including eight for loss, to lead the team's d-linemen.

Batsch, who goes 6-5 and 255 pounds, has starting experience each of the past three seasons and—in tandem with Davey—gives Wisconsin two tough penetrators up front.

Another young player to watch up front is designated starting noseguard Patrick Thompson, a rugged 6-2, 280-pounder who has three years of eligibility remaining.

Challengers along the front line include Matt Barkley, Jerry Huggett, Todd Anthony and John Filia-traut at tackle, and Pat McGettigan, Lee Krueger and Chris Foy at noseguard. McGettigan earned his first varsity letter last year and should see plenty of playing time.

At inside linebacker, Malvin Hunter is a 6-2, 231-pounder who was the Badgers' Defensive Player of the Year and earned all-Big Ten Honorable Mention in 1989. He shows 230 career tackles entering his senior—and what should be his best—season. Brendan Lynch, who has strengthened an already solid frame to 6-2 and 240-pounds, started every game in 1989 and led Wisconsin in total tackles with 93.


One of the Badgers' up-and-coming defenders and inside backers is Aaron Norvell, a stocky 5-10, 223-pounder who enters just his sophomore season of eligibility in 1990. Norvell had a noteworthy spring and has an excellent shot at a starting position. Others to note at ILB include letterwinner Gary Casper, Todd Orlando and Chris Greer.

At the outside linebacker slots, a talented returnee who has impressed his new coaches and earned a starting role is junior Duer Sharp. A 6-1, 233-pounder with great athletic ability, Sharp figures to step to the front and earn a name for himself in Big Ten circles this fall. He has post-season honor potential.

The Badgers' other tentative starter at outside linebacker is junior letterwinner Curt Maternowski, a 6-1, 225-pounder who saw action in ten of 11 games a year ago.

Also challenging as outside backers are veteran letterwinner Robert Newell, Malcolm Johnson, Nick Rafko, Jason Levine and Pat Rupar.

In the defensive secondary, Eddie Fletcher was all-Big Ten Honorable Mention in 1989 with 41 tackles and a team-leading four interceptions. Greg Thomas, who should mark his fourth straight year as a starter at free safety, has posted 236 career tackles and five interceptions. Troy Vincent, who has displayed all-America and all-Big Ten potential accord-

ing to the new coaching staff, is definitely a player to watch. He started four games last fall, collected 43 tackles, and led the UW and Big Ten in punt returns with 17 for 235 yards and one TD. Veteran LaMarr White, hampered on and off by a hand injury, nonetheless started nine games, registered 59 tackles, and came up with a team-leading eight pass deflections a year ago. He shows 173 career stops, 16 pass deflections and seven interceptions heading into his final Wisconsin campaign.

Another player who performed with great intensity during the spring was red-shirt freshman Scott Nelson at strong safety. A 6-0, 192-pounder, Nelson has the ability to be a starter in 1990.

Wisconsin's defensive secondary will also be bolstered by the likes of letterman Todd Strop and Randy Kleinhans at strong safety, letterman Tyrone Mahone, Pat Cleary and Mike Barker at free safety, and Paul Schneider, Bernie Caputo, Bill Weber, Korey Manley, Neil Glaser and Jeff Kleinschmidt at cornerback.

BADGER KICKING GAME


Wisconsin's kicking game shapes up on a solid note with the return of last season's leading scorer in placekicker Rich Thompson and No. 1 punter in Brad Brekke. Thompson, who could also move into a punting role, connected on 11 of 17 field goals and 17 of 18 extra points for 50 points. Brekke, who earned Academic all-Big Ten honors, punted 67 times for a 38.3-yard average with a longest of 59 vs Iowa.

THE SCHEDULE

Badger Offense

Pre-Season Interview with Coach Barry Alvarez

Q: What was the general attitude throughout your first spring practice session?

"I think the attitude of the players, and the coaches, has been one of excitement and enthusiasm. The players have learned the intensity level and the urgency that the coaches want. We kept pressure on them so that they're not a peak-and-valley type team, and they responded. It was an exciting, very intense spring."

Q: How have the players reacted to the new coaching staff?

"I think very well. They've responded, and they've taken coaching very well. There is nothing that we've asked of them that they haven't responded to. I've said all along, from the first day in the off-season workout, these guys are hungry. When you talk to them, their eyes are wide open, they listen, and they respond."

Q: What was the team's outlook about the 1990 season during spring practice?

"We tried to keep things in the immediate. We have a slogan . . . 'What's Important Now'. We didn't talk about next season; we talked about spring football."

"I didn't want to get too far ahead. You have to take one step at a time and make sure you reach those goals before you start talking about the fall and winning games."

Q: Have you uncovered an intangible you might consider a strength in 1990?

"The work ethic of the players . . . and general attitude. I'd say those have been two key things. They've shown a tremendous amount of resiliency to our coaching and what we've put them through."

"We've been physical, we've hit every day in practice, and we've competed. I've been very impressed."

Q: What are some of the encouraging signs you have seen in your offense?

"Some of the experiments we conducted paid off. Reggie Holt making the move to wide receiver paid off. Lionell Crawford moving to a wide-out paid off. Both of them have chances to be outstanding."

"Billy Williams coming back at wide receiver after not playing last year had an outstanding spring; he'll give us some depth at that position."


"I felt going in that maybe our strength would be on the offensive line, and I wasn't disappointed in them."

"Maybe the biggest surprise and the thing that we needed to have happen this spring was for Tony Lowery to come through for us. He picked up our system and he is exactly what we're looking for."

Q: How do you feel about your offensive line?

"I really like this group. I think they have tremendous potential. I like their size and I like their work habits. Nobody pushes them any harder than (coach) Bill Callahan."

"Brady Pierce is a talent. He's progressed



throughout the spring. I like the way he's fit into our system."

"Nick Polczynski is a tough, hard-nosed football player, a good leader, and he loves to play the game."

"Jim Basteen has been a surprise. He's played guard and has done a good job for us. He's probably our best pass blocker right now."

"David Rapps has been a pleasant surprise. He doesn't look as physical as the rest of them but is probably as tough as any of them."

"David Senczyszyn has played two different positions and will probably play center and tackle for us. He's a big guy with a lot of ability, and just gets better every day."

"Big Chuck Belin . . . there aren't even many 230-pounders around who can run like him. We may have to put him in the backfield a little bit and use him as a 'fridge'."

"Overall, I'm very pleased with this group."

Q: Comment on the development of Tony Lowery and Sean Wilson at quarterback?

"Russ Jacques (offensive coordinator) has done a great job of bringing them around and teaching them our system. We use the old gestalt theory; we put it all in and then we go back and we keep reviewing it. Now we're mixing and matching with formations and motions and so on and so forth. Russ has brought them along . . . they understand the system. Now it's a matter of just doing it automatically."

"Tony has everything you're looking for. He's 6-3, has nice height, runs 4.6, has a strong arm and he's been under fire before."

"Sean thinks he's a thrower. I think he might be more of a runner. But he thinks he's a chunker. He does a lot of good things and he's a good athlete. We have to teach him how to make good decisions."

Q: How would you describe your offensive philosophy?

"The offense I like to run is one that's multiple

enough where you can take advantage of what somebody's giving you. Every week you'll face people who will try to line up and overplay what they feel is your strength. You've got to be flexible enough to go to another package; if they load up on you and take away the run, then you've got to be able to open up and go to the passing game. And if you spread out and have great success throwing the ball, then they're going to load up—maybe play a nickel package—and do some things to make it tough on you. You can take anything you want away from an offense."

As an offensive coach, my philosophy is being flexible to adapt and make the next move."

Q: What were some of the encouraging signs about your defense during the spring?

"These kids love playing the game. They play hard, they get excited and they've taken the personality of their coach."

"Dan McCarney (defensive coordinator) is as enthusiastic a coach as there is in the business. The kids have taken that personality."

"We've spent a lot of time on fundamentals. If we're fundamentally sound, if we chase the ball . . . just get after it . . . and be physical, then we'll be fine."

Q: What, to you, are the keys to a team's success defensively?

"You have to have great chemistry. The kids have to trust one another. They have to understand the total package."

"To be a great defense you have to be physical. There are no shortcuts . . . no substitutes. You have to be physical. If you're not physical and you can't outhit people, then you're not going to be good defensively. That's the first thing."

"Secondly, they have to know what they're doing and we have to have a sound package."

"But most of all, they have to play hard. A defense that's emotional is probably going to be a good one. The good ones have fun playing. The good ones are intimidating."

Q: Who do you see as some of your defensive leaders?

"I think Don Davey's as good a defensive lineman as there is in the Big Ten. There aren't many that I've been around—and Dan (McCarney) has said the same thing—that are any better. And Dan's had a number of all-Big Ten linemen, as well as two conference linemen of the year. Don Davey's as good as any of them."

"I think Troy Vincent has the ability and potential to be as good as any defensive back in the country."

"Those two guys are outstanding."

Q: Assess the state of your kicking game.

"Rich Thompson can be a good kicker. He has a good leg. We just have to settle him down. He presses a little too much."

"I think he's an outstanding punter, and I think Brad Brekke's a solid punter. That's been a pleasant

surprise for me.

"We thought seriously about bringing in a punter but decided not to. And I'm glad we did. We can use that scholarship for someone else because these two guys can get the job done."

Q: Do you place a strong emphasis on special teams play?

"That's a third of the game. We have special teams' meetings every day and special teams' practice at least twenty minutes a day. We go through the entire kicking game at least once a week. We had the kicking game installed over spring; we have a two-deep—naturally some of our freshmen will be included in that.

"I learned the importance of special teams from Lou Holtz. I really didn't believe in them that strongly before until I got to Notre Dame and we won four or five ball games in a three-year span just on special teams."

Q: You have voiced concerns about depth in certain areas. How will you try to turn those instances to advantages?

"We'll just keep shuffling the deck until we find

somebody that can help us win there. If it has to be a freshman, it's a freshman.

"We're not afraid to change positions if we think someone can help us. We'll find the right combinations. The answers are out there someplace.

"The only position right now that we don't have an answer for is fullback, but we'll get that taken care of, too."

Q: How do you feel about your first Wisconsin schedule?

"I feel real good about it. There's nobody who likes to play at home more than I do and we're playing seven of them at home.

"We play our first four games in Camp Randall. I'm excited about it because I think I sense a feeling of excitement in the state. I think we'll put people back in here and I think this will be a tough place to play.

"You can't beat a home-field advantage and that's what I anticipate us having."

Q: Are you glad to be back coaching in the Big Ten Conference?

"I love the Big Ten. I love the Midwest. I'm really

"My number one goal is to have a team out on the field that people in the state of Wisconsin can identify with and be proud of.



HEAD COACH

BARRY ALVAREZ

First-year University of Wisconsin football coach Barry Alvarez has been described as a player's coach. He is also known as a teacher, a motivator, and a disciplinarian.

In just six months on the job, he has rallied his Badger gridiron troops and taken them the first steps up the wall toward their initial engagement on September 8th.

"We play our first four games in Camp Randall," said Alvarez. "I'm excited about it because I think I sense a feeling of excitement in the state. I think we'll put people back in here and I think this will be a tough place to play again. You can't beat a home-field advantage and that's what I anticipate us having."

Throughout his initial spring practice session, coach Alvarez was both a teacher and a student. He worked his first Wisconsin team like a conductor works an orchestra. He made the rounds every day, shifting his attention from the linebackers to the offensive backfield, from the defensive secondary to the punt return units. He stood back and observed, registering what he liked and what he didn't for future staff and player meetings. He took charge, moving into the center of a play. He offered accolades if deserved. He offered constructive lessons. And he registered disgust when necessary.

"The attitude of the players, and the coaches, has been one of excitement and enthusiasm," said Alvarez. "The players have learned the intensity level and the urgency that the coaches want. We kept pressure on them so that they're not a peak and valley-type team, and they responded."

"The work ethic of the players . . . and general attitude . . . were two things we were most impressed with. They displayed a tremendous amount of resiliency to our coaching last spring and what we put them through. It was an exciting, very intense, spring."

Yes, Barry Alvarez inspired, encouraged, bantered, snarled, counseled and cajoled his first Badger team. But most importantly, he set the stage—much like George C. Scott did in the movie *Patton*—and established himself and his new regime as qualified leaders and symbols of unyielding strength.

"The players responded very well to us," added Alvarez. "And they've taken coaching very well. There is nothing that we've asked of them that they haven't responded to. I've said all along, from the first day in the off-season workout, that these guys are hun-



gry. When you talk to them their eyes are wide open, they listen, and they respond."

In a nutshell, what Barry Alvarez has brought to the University, the community and the state in general is an infectious, youthful enthusiasm. You can see it in the faces of his student-athletes, hear it from his assistant coaches and support staff, and

observe it up, down and all around from a rejuvenated public.

"My number one goal for this first season is to have a team out on the field that people in the state of Wisconsin can identify with and be proud of," explained Alvarez.

"I don't ever want to talk about wins and losses

... I do that with my team separately. I don't want to put any pressure on them with how many they have to win because sometimes they can't control that.

"I just want them to go out and play as hard as they can, know what they're supposed to do, have fun playing, and be excited about it."

Wisconsin's 27th head football coach in 101 years of collegiate gridiron action, Barry Alvarez carries an outstanding reputation for strong defense, successful recruiting, and coaching student-athletes.

"I've been preparing for this for a long time," he said at his first press conference. "I'm ready to do it. I've worked for some great coaches (including Lou Holtz and Hayden Fry), some great teachers.

"The program in Madison is in good hands. We're going to make University of Wisconsin Football a source of pride for the people in this state again. If it can be done by hard, honest work, we'll get it done."

A native of Burgettstown, Pennsylvania, Alvarez came to Wisconsin from the University of Notre Dame, where he spent three successful seasons with Holtz. He first joined the Notre Dame staff as outside linebacker coach in March of 1987. He was then promoted to Notre Dame's defensive coordinator and inside linebacker coach for the 1988 campaign, and the Irish went on to attain the No. 1-ranking in the final national polls with a 12-0 record. In 1989, Alvarez served as assistant head coach as well as defensive coordinator as Notre Dame attained a No. 2 national ranking and finished 14th nationally in both rushing defense and total defense.

From 1979-86, Alvarez served as an assistant coach at the University of Iowa with Hayden Fry. His primary responsibility was with the Hawkeyes' linebackers. Alvarez coached in six post-season bowls at Iowa, including the 1982 and 1986 Rose Bowl games.

Alvarez earned both his Bachelor of Science (1969) and Master's (1970) degrees from the University of Nebraska. He was a three-year letterman and inside linebacker for the Cornhuskers, earning All-Big Eight honors as a senior, and played in both the Orange and Sugar Bowls. He also was selected to participate in both the Senior Bowl and Blue-Gray post-season games.



Recruiting Coordinator/ Defensive Assistant Coach

One of Barry Alvarez's first moves as head coach was to secure the assistance of BERNIE WYATT as his recruiting coordinator. Wyatt, who previously worked with Alvarez at Iowa, also serves as a defensive assistant coach for the Badgers.

COACHING BACKGROUND: Compiled a 16-year tenure as an assistant coach for the University of Iowa, after arriving at the Iowa City campus in 1974 as defensive ends coach under former coach Bob Commings. Was named Iowa's first full-time recruiting coordinator in 1979. Remained at UI as defensive ends coach when Hayden Fry took over as football coach.

Served as head football coach at Lindenhurst (New York) High School from 1969-73, where he recorded a five-year record of 37-8-1 (.815). Was head football coach at Iowa City's Regina High School from 1963-68.

DAN McCARNEY

New to the University of Wisconsin football program as defensive coordinator and defensive line coach is DAN McCARNEY. He, too, was pursued heavily by Alvarez after the two worked together at Iowa.

COACHING BACKGROUND: Spent 13 years as a defensive assistant coach for the University of Iowa from 1977-89, including a most recent tenure as defensive line coach. Coached in eight straight post-season bowls, including the 1982 and 1986 Rose Bowl games. Also coached a dozen All-Big Ten Conference linemen at Iowa, including two defensive linemen of the year in Paul Hufford (1984) and Dave Haight (1987), six all-Americans and six NFL draft choices.

Arrived at Iowa in 1977 to serve as offensive line coach under Bob Commings. Was retained by Hayden Fry and became instrumental in the Hawkeye's string of football successes in the decade of the '80's.

EDUCATIONAL BACKGROUND: Earned a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Iowa in 1975. Worked as a graduate assistant coach for the Hawkeyes' football program in 1975 and 1976.

ATHLETIC BACKGROUND: Was a three-time varsity letterman and offensive lineman for Iowa Football while an undergraduate. Elected as Hawkeyes' team captain in 1974. Signed with the National Football League's Atlanta Falcons as a free agent in 1975 and then with the Denver Broncos in 1976.

PERSONAL: 36-year-old native of Iowa City, Iowa. Coach McCarney and wife, Brenda, have two daughters (Jillian and Melanie).



RUSS JACQUES

Offensive Coordinator/ Quarterbacks-receivers Coach

Another of the heralded additions to the Wisconsin football program last winter was RUSS JACQUES (pronounced Jakes), who will serve as the Badgers' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks and receivers coach.

COACHING BACKGROUND: Is a 14-year coaching veteran of Division I football. Was offensive coordinator and architect for Northwestern University's explosive offense the past three seasons (1987-89), one that set a combined 14 individual and team offensive records under his tutelage. Also worked with the outside linebackers at Northwestern his first year.

Prior to arriving at UWV, was offensive backfield coach at Ohio University in 1979 and was defensive secondary coach at Bowling Green State University from 1975-78. Also coached seven seasons in the Cleveland, Ohio prep football ranks.



Was defensive coordinator at Southeast Missouri State in 1988.



Was defensive coordinator and secondary coach at University of Miami in Florida under Jimmy Johnson in 1985.



On-Campus Recruiting Coordinator


ROBERT IANELLO joined the University of Wisconsin football program in January of 1990 as the Badgers' on-campus recruiting coordinator.

JOHN CHADIMA


Administrative Assistant

In 1986, Raridon assisted Tony Yelovich with the Notre Dame offensive line and also helped coach the Notre Dame prep teams as a graduate assistant.


He also spent five years in the University of Nebraska football program in Lincoln, working with Cornhusker strength coach Jerry Schmidt.

Coming to Wisconsin as an assistant strength coach with an emphasis on nutrition in 1990 is DAVE ELLIS.


Ellis works with UW athletes in the weight room, supervises the football team's training table, and advises on nutritional needs.











A World-Class University

The University of Wisconsin-Madison, one of the world's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Established in 1848, the first class of 17 students assembled February 5, 1849. Today, the UW-Madison ranks as the nation's fourth largest university with 43,695 students, 11 schools and colleges, 133 academic departments, 14,000 employees, 5 million volumes in 44 libraries, and a \$1 billion budget. The university's national ranking of third in research and development expenditures supports its reputation as a world-class research institution.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. In what may be the most extensive survey ever done on graduate level education—the five-volume *Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States*—Wisconsin finished eighth in the nation, tied with Michigan and UCLA.

More than 4,100 courses and 12,600 sections are offered at the UW. Majors are available in 151 bachelor's, 191 master's, and 123 doctor's and professional degree programs.

Some of the UW's departments ranked among the top ten in the nation in recent years include Sociology, Mathematics, Chemical Engineering, Economics, Political Science, Zoology, Geography, Statistics, History, Plant Pathology, Molecular Biology, Biochemistry, Spanish and German.

Much of the university's international academic reputation stems from the quality of its faculty. In fact, UW-Madison faculty or alumni have been awarded 11 Nobel Prizes, with Professor Howard Temin receiving the most recent prize in 1975 for his study of retroviruses.

The UW's Center for Health Sciences is one of the Midwest's leading centers for patient care, research and public service, and education of physicians and other health professionals. It includes the professional schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Pharmacy; UW Hospital and Clinics; the State Laboratory of Hygiene; UW Health Service; and the Wisconsin Clinical Cancer Center—one of 21 designated cancer centers in the country.

The Elvehjem Museum of Art, the second largest art museum in the state, houses the university's collection of more than 10,000 paintings, prints, drawings, sculpture, and decorative arts dating from 2300 B.C. to the present, and maintains an active schedule of temporary exhibits.



A Scenic Campus





Located between Lakes Mendota and Monona, amid rolling hills and wooded areas, Madison is one of the nation's most beautiful campuses.

The city was designed so the university and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Two major films, including the 1986 summer hit *Back To School* starring Rodney Dangerfield, have been shot on the picturesque UW campus.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill, which features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, is one of the university's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall (the first building on campus), Van Hise (the UW's tallest building at 19 stories), Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain, and Picnic Point, a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus.

One of the favorite areas for UW students to congregate is the Memorial Union and its lakeside Terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and cool breezes from Lake Mendota.



The Student Body

Over 43,000 students populate the 900-acre UW campus, including more than 9,500 graduate students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the university still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from approximately 125 foreign countries. UW-Madison ranks fifth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students. In 1989, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted for 6.53 percent of the student body, an increase from 4.67 percent ten years ago.

The university's diversity also shows in the more than 500 student groups. Organizations ranging from political action groups and student newspapers to recreational clubs, fraternities and sororities allow students to extend their collegiate life beyond the classroom. Film societies show 400 titles a year, and the intramural recreation program services some 35,000 students and staff at five indoor recreational facilities every month.



The Chancellor



Dr. Donna E. Shalala is the first woman to ever lead the UW-Madison. She assumed her position as Chancellor and Professor of Political Science and Educational Policy Studies in January, 1988.

One of Shalala's major goals has been rededicating the institution to the "Wisconsin Idea"—confirming a commitment to public service and social welfare, as well as an awareness that the borders of the university extend to the borders of the state and beyond.

Dedication to public service has been a trademark of Shalala's career. She spent two years in the Peace Corps, teaching English and working in community development. While a professor at Columbia University, Shalala served as a Director and Treasurer of the Municipal Assistance Corporation for the City of New York, the agency set up to help solve New York City's fiscal crisis.

Shalala earned her bachelor's degree from Western College for Women in Oxford, Ohio, in 1962 and her doctoral degree from Syracuse University in 1970. She has received 14 honorary degrees, and has been elected to the National Academy of Education and National Academy of Public Administration.






Athletics at the UW

Richter has essential experience as a student, an athlete and an administrator. He is committed to excellence in the classroom as well as on the playing field. He is committed to Wisconsin, and he is committed to providing all UW student-athletes with an experience they'll cherish the rest of their lives.



Where Wisconsin Ranks

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top ten lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

One recent survey rated 49 undergraduate programs at the UW-Madison among the top ten in the nation. The university has also ranked third for the last several years in research funding among the nation's universities.

In data taken from the 1983 Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States, Wisconsin tied for eighth in reputation for scholarly quality and second on the basis of faculty publications.

Academic, financial, and other rankings are summarized below to offer a flavor of the quality of the University of Wisconsin-Madison:

Funding

- **Federal Grants:** The UW ranked eighth nationally in 1987, receiving 1.8 percent of the \$8.6 billion federal budget for university research.
- **Research and Development Funds:** The UW ranked third in the country for research and development expenditures in 1988, with almost \$286 million, according to the National Science Foundation.
- **Tuition:** Over the last ten years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW-Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW-Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition, behind the University of Iowa, and the third lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.
- **Voluntary Support:** The UW ranked tenth in the nation, and second among public institutions, in 1987-88 by receiving \$89 million in private support.
- **Wisconsin Money Appropriated for Higher Education:** Wisconsin ranked 21st in 1988-89 in the amount of state tax support appropriated for higher education per state resident.

Research and Programs

- **Research Activity Index:** In 1986, the UW-Madison ranked second, behind Harvard, in a new multidimensional study that ranked research activity at U.S. universities.
- **Doctoral Degrees:** Between the school's founding and 1989, the University of Wisconsin-Madison awarded 26,928 Ph.D.'s—a number few institutions in the world can match.

Departmental Academic Rankings

- **Broadcast Research:** Broadcast faculty at the UW-Madison rank second nationally in research productivity. Radio station WHA is the oldest radio station in the country. A cooperative program with UW-Extension and the Wisconsin Educational Communications Board, it has broadcast continuously since its founding in 1917.
- **Business:** The School of Business ranks fifth in the nation in research productivity. The faculty's scholarly output ranks first among business schools at public institutions.
- **Forestry:** In 1986, the UW's forestry department was named top research department in the country by the USDA.



- **Journalism and Mass Communication:** The faculty at the School of Journalism and Mass Communication was rated first in the nation in research productivity in 1988 by *Journalism Quarterly*.
- **Plant Pathology:** In 1986, the UW's Plant Pathology department tied for a first place ranking with the University of California-Davis.
- **Libraries:** The UW-Madison has the 13th largest university library system in the United States, with 5 million books in 44 locations across campus.
- **Graduates:** According to a 1987 *Wall Street Journal* survey, the UW produced the third highest percentage of CEO's at Fortune 500 industrial companies and at 350 Fortune 500 service companies.



UW Traditions



Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the UW-Madison mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as "Bucky" was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans. In 1949, a pep rally contest was held to determine the best name for Madison's mascot. The name Buckingham U. Badger arose at the drawing and credit was given to a randomly selected sorority. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from "On Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW football team to "buck right through that line."

Band Caps

When one of the Badger teams wins a game, the members of the band turn their hats around and wear them backwards. According to UW Band Director Michael Leckrone, the practice started in the 1920s to symbolize the band looking back at their victory in the days when they marched out with the departing crowd.

Graduating Law Students

At Homecoming, graduating law students march down the football field and throw their white canes over the cross bar of the goal post. If they catch the cane when it comes down on the other side, they are supposed to win their first case. If the cane is dropped, the case will be lost. The custom originated at Harvard and came to the UW-Madison in 1910.

Halloween

In 1979, the Wisconsin Student Association began sponsoring what for years had been a spontaneous event—the annual Halloween State Street costume party. The party grew in size and fame each year as costumed revelers filled the eight blocks between the Capitol and the Mall. In 1988, WSA sponsored its first non-alcoholic indoor party at the fieldhouse.

"On, Wisconsin"

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the UW-Madison campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. The copyright to "On Wisconsin" is currently owned by Michael Jackson, who purchased the music a few years ago from former Beatle Paul McCartney.

"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He came up with the idea after witnessing University of Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

Abraham Lincoln Statue

Unveiled in 1909 as a gift of the sculptor Adolph Weinman, the statue is the only replica of a statue he had previously erected in Hodgenville, Kentucky—Lincoln's birthplace. However, the inscription attributes the gift to Madisonian Thomas Brittingham, who had paid for the casting of the statue and the pedestal on which it was placed.

Lincoln is considered a patron of the university because he signed the Morrill Act in 1862 that provided federal aid to land-grant colleges such as UW-Madison. Tradition holds that Lincoln stands up when a virtuous coed passes by.



Historic Buildings at the UW



Bascom Hall

Bascom Hall was constructed in stages to become the large building it is today. Bascom was originally called University Hall and later Main Hall. In 1920 it was renamed for John Bascom, president from 1874 to 1887. The architecture is of the classic Italian High Renaissance (Federal classic), Wren-modified. The building's original ornate dome was destroyed by fire in 1916. Bascom Hall houses the UW-Madison's main administrative offices including the Chancellor's office, Dean of Students office and Graduate School. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as part of the Bascom Hill Historic District.

Camp Randall

During the Civil War, Camp Randall was used as both a training ground, the state's largest Army staging point, and a hospital and stockade for confederate prisoners. Today it is owned by the university and is the home of intercollegiate athletic and recreational facilities, a small park, and the Memorial Arch, completed in 1912.

Memorial Library

Dedicated to those who died in our nation's wars, Memorial Library is the main research library. Along with the catalog for the holdings for campus libraries, Memorial houses the Mills Music Library, the official archives of the university, and an extensive rare books collection.

Memorial Union

Memorial Union has been called the "living room of the campus." With additions added steadily over the last half century, the Union now includes several dining rooms, theaters, study halls and game rooms, as well as the lakeside Terrace. In 1933, Memorial Union became the first public university union in the country to sell beer.

North and South Halls

North Hall was the first building erected by the university (1851), serving as a dormitory for male students. Later it was converted into a classroom and office space. In 1966, North Hall became a National Historic Landmark.

South Hall has had a wide variety of uses, including housing the old Department of Agriculture and the Hygenic Laboratory. Now it houses the dean and administrative staff of the College of Letters and Science.






The Community

Madison is the home of both the University of Wisconsin and the state capital, in addition to being one of the Midwest's most vibrant communities.

With a diverse population of 180,000, the Madison community offers an endearing quality of life, both for its full-time residents and students. It offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town atmosphere. It is a family-, action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports and recreational activities.

The May 1989 issue of *Outside* magazine rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country, based on such factors as quantity and quality of outdoor activities, the surrounding environment, and the participation of its population in various sports and recreation.



Red Gym

Built in the Norman style in 1894, with Romanesque arches and heavy turrets, the Red Gym was originally intended as an armory and a gymnasium for men's physical education. A fire during the Vietnam protest era closed the gym for a few months in 1970. The building was included in the Bascom Hill Historic District in 1974. The report of a campus committee studying renovation in 1989 called the gym "a gateway building to the campus because of its central location and its historic architecture—a friendly and welcoming place for visitors, prospective students and their parents, and primarily undergraduates from all our academic schools and colleges."

Van Hise Hall

Built in 1967, at 19 stories, Van Hise is the tallest building on campus. The 17th floor houses the administration of the University of Wisconsin System. Van Hise Hall is to the UW System what Bascom Hall is to UW-Madison. Several foreign language departments make their homes here, and classrooms are located in the lower five floors.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Pat Richter

Pat Richter ushered in a new era in University of Wisconsin athletics when he accepted the position of athletic director on December 15, 1989.

"This has been the only university in my life," he said at his initial press conference. "Good things happened to me here. Now I hope I can make it happen for others."

One of the most distinguished athletes in UW history, Richter is committed to a proud University of Wisconsin athletic tradition—one that calls for excellence both in the classroom and on the playing field.

"That commitment is to provide the student-athletes with a very rewarding experience," Richter explained. "You don't want them to leave here and say it's been four years and now I'm gone. When I left here 26 years ago, this was something that went with me for the rest of my life."

"This is a tremendous opportunity for me," he added. "It's exciting to be a part of a program that is going in the right direction. We intend to build the University of Wisconsin athletic program to the level of excellence of the rest of the university."

"Pat Richter is one of Wisconsin's greatest sports heroes, a UW Law School graduate, a successful businessman with strong leadership qual-



ties and a man of complete integrity," commented UW-Madison Chancellor Donna E. Shalala. "He is a wonderful role model for all of our student-athletes."

A 48-year-old native of Madison, Richter has been on a cross-country whirlwind of speaking engagements, promotional events, booster outings, appearances at civic functions, and administrative meetings during his first year at the helm. He is in constant demand, and is a shining symbol of the renewed enthusiasm surrounding UW Athletics.


One of Richter's first assignments as athletic director was to hire the best football coach he could find. He accomplished that impressively with the naming of highly touted Barry Alvarez in January, 1990.

His first year at the helm of the UW athletic program has also witnessed an NCAA ice hockey championship, the running exploits of all-America and NCAA champion Suzy Favor, and a trip to London, England, and the Henley Regatta for the Badgers' national championship varsity crew team.

Clearly, University of Wisconsin Athletics are on the upswing. And with Pat Richter at the controls, the decade of the 1990s promises great things for Badger sports fans everywhere.

An Athletic, Academic and Professional Success Story

As a 6-6, 230-pound student-athlete at the University of Wisconsin, Richter excelled in football, basketball and baseball. He earned three varsity letters in each, and still stands as the school's last nine-time letterwinner. He achieved all-America (1961, 1962), academic all-America (1962), and all-




Big Ten (1961, 1962) honors in football as an end, helping the Badgers to the 1962 Big Ten championship and a berth in the memorable 1963 Rose Bowl game vs USC—a game in which he set the current Rose Bowl record of 11 pass receptions for 163 yards. Richter led the Big Ten in pass receiving in both 1961 and 1962 and ranks third on the school's career receiving list with 110 catches for 1,710 yards and 14 touchdowns. After his senior football season, he was the recipient of the UW's 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor (for proficiency in scholarship and athletics), received the Knute Rockne Memorial Award as the country's top lineman from the Washington Touchdown Club, and was selected to play in both the *Chicago Tribune* All-Star and Hula Bowl post-season games.

As an outfielder for the Wisconsin baseball team, he earned first team all-Big Ten honors in 1963, owned a career batting average of .353, and led the Badgers in hits, home runs and RBI's three straight years. In one game during the 1962 season, he hit two home runs vs eventual NCAA champion Michigan, including a two-run blast with two out in the final inning. Richter, in fact, once said that he thought baseball might have been his best sport. And somewhat ironically, he originally went to the UW on a basketball scholarship.

Richter earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Landscape Architecture from the UW in 1964 and was interested in designing golf courses and swimming pools.

Following his collegiate career, he was a first round draft choice of the National Football League's Washington Redskins and played as both an end and a punter for the 'Skins from 1963-71. He caught three touchdown




passes from QB Sonny Jurgensen for the Redskins in their 1968 season opener against the Chicago Bears in the Windy City. In 1969, he played under legendary coach Vince Lombardi, later recalling it as "perhaps my greatest learning experience in terms of how to look at life in general."

After retiring from pro football, he returned to earn his law degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1971.


Richter spent the next six months with a Madison law firm, then went to work with Oscar Mayer Foods Corporation until returning to the UW campus as athletic director last December. With Oscar Mayer, he held several titles in corporate offices in Madison, Nashville, and Rye Brook and White Plains, New York. Most recently, he served as Vice-President of Personnel at the company's head office in Madison.

In January of 1988, he was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for his post-college achievements and was inducted into the Wisconsin State Athletic Hall of Fame in November, 1988. He is also a member of the American Bar Association, the NFL Player and Alumni Associations and the Madison Sports Hall of Fame. He assists in fundraising for local children's charities and the UW Children's Hospital, and works with the Four Lakes Boy Scouts.







Master's in Education from Kent State University in 1965.



1990 Big Ten Football Outlook

A new decade of Big Ten football will dawn without the familiar face of Michigan coach Bo Schembechler patrolling the sideline. The former "dean" of Conference coaches retired in December of 1989 and accepted the post of president of the Detroit Tigers. Iowa coach Hayden Fry is now No. 1 in the Big Ten in football coaches seniority.

Long-time Schembechler assistant Gary Moeller is now at the helm of the Michigan football show, and he inherits a healthy program that has captured back-to-back outright Big Ten championships.

Moeller is not the only new face on the Big Ten block this season. Former Iowa and Notre Dame aide Barry Alvarez is the new head coach at Wisconsin.

One lesson Moeller and Alvarez won't have to be taught is the one that identifies, more often than not, the Big Ten champion as the team that leads the Conference in defense. In fact, 15 of the last 18 Big Ten titlists led in total and/or scoring defense. The two-time defending champion Wolverines have led the Conference in scoring defense two consecutive seasons.

The Big Ten benefits with the return of many outstanding defensive players; several are in line to receive all-America attention. Consider Illinois nose tackle Moe Gardner, a consensus all-America pick who in 1989 was an Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award finalist and a two-time Big Ten Player-of-the-Week on defense. Gardner has made more than 240 career tackles, including 43 behind the line of scrimmage. Michigan returns strong safety Tripp Welborne, a finalist for the 1989 Jim Thorpe Award and consensus all-America. Purdue linebacker Darrin Trieb is a two-time all-Conference honoree. He's led the Big Ten in solo tackles two consecutive seasons, and has totaled 286 tackles since transferring from Iowa State.

Seventeen players (from eight different Conference teams) were named to the all-Big Ten first- or second-team on defense and are eligible to return. That may be enough evidence to indicate that teams who are consistent and who remain healthy on the offensive side of the ball should have the most success in 1990. Additional returning all-Conference first-team defensive performers include the Illini's Mel Agee, Darrick Brownlow, Henry Jones and Marlon Primous, Indiana's Mike Dumas and Iowa's Jim Johnson. These players were named to the all-Big Ten second team on defense and are eligible to return: Illinois' Chris Green, Iowa's Matt Ruhland and Merton Hanks, Michigan's Erick Anderson, Chris Hutchinson and Vada Murray, Minnesota's Mike Sundvold, and Ohio State's Alonzo Spellman.

On offense, four of the top five quarterbacks ranked on passing efficiency, and seven of the top nine, are eligible to return. Ohio State's Greg Frey led the Big Ten and ranked ninth nationally in passing efficiency. Other starting quarterbacks who are eligible to return are Matt Rodgers of Iowa, Dan Enos of Michigan State, Scott Schaffner of Minnesota, and Eric Hunter of Purdue. At Wisconsin, starter Lionell

Crawford has moved to wide receiver while 1987 Big Ten Freshman of the Year Tony Lowery, who missed the '89 season, returns as the Badgers' top signal-caller. Hunter was the 1989 Big Ten Freshman of the Year. Elvis Grbac started four games for Michigan as a freshman last season, and Sean Wilson was an occasional starter for Wisconsin.

Three running backs who gained more than 1,000 yards rushing last season are gone. Anthony Thompson led the nation in rushing and scoring while setting new standards at Indiana. Darrell Thompson set Minnesota rushing records; he gained better than 1,000 yards in three of his four injury-ridled seasons. Michigan State's Blake Ezor was the Conference's second-leading rusher last season. Despite their loss, 15 of the Conference's top 20 rushers from a year ago return. Northwestern back Bob Christian is the leading returning ground gainer. He broke Mike Adamle's single-season school record a year ago and ranked 13th nationally.

Illinois center Curt Lovelace and Michigan guard Dean Dingman are the only returning all-Conference offensive linemen. The Wolverines' Greg Skrepanek, Michigan State's Eric Moten and Ohio State's Dan Beatty were tabbed second-team all-Conference. At 6-6 and better than 325 pounds, Skrepanek could become one of the Conference's dominant offensive linemen.

Ohio State returns what may be the Conference's best running back tandems in Carlos Snow and Scottie Graham, the Big Ten's fifth- and sixth-ranked runners in 1989. To appreciate the strength of Ohio State's backfield, add Dante Lee, the Conference's 13th-ranked ground gainer and top freshman rusher. Michigan appeared to also have a strong returning backfield with Tony Boles and Leroy Hoard. But Hoard decided to forego his final year of eligibility, and Boles is questionable because of a serious late-season knee injury. Illinois returns the duo of Howard Griffith and Wagner Lester. Griffith ranked 10th in

rushing last season and Lester was 19th as a freshman. Another player looking to return to form is Iowa's Tony Stewart. Stewart, recovering from knee surgery in 1988, gained only 356 yards last season after he had rushed for more than 1,000 the year before. Michigan State's Tico Duckett is another speedster to keep an eye on.

Northwestern also boasts the Big Ten's top returning receiver in Richard Buchanan. Buchanan, who also ranked second nationally, averaged 11.9 yards on 94 catches last season and also averaged an amazing 101.3 yards receiving per game. Michigan State's Courtney Hawkins is another dangerous deep threat. He averaged 18 yards on 60 catches and 98.2 yards receiving per game. Indiana would benefit with the return of Rob Turner who in 1988 led the Hoosiers with an average of 22.6 yards on 36 catches with eight touchdowns. Turner was an academic casualty last season. Ohio State's Jeff Graham led the team in receptions and was one of the nation's top punt returners. Tight end Jeff Ellis was a preseason all-America candidate before a knee injury at Southern California prematurely ended his season. He should be back this fall. Purdue has a speedy duo out of the backfield in sophomore Tony Vinson and senior Jerome Sparkman. They combined for 58 catches last fall. At Wisconsin, shifty Lionell Crawford has moved to wide receiver after playing and starting at quarterback in 1989.

Eight teams return their placekicker and seven teams return their regular punter. Michigan's J.D. Carlson was consensus all-Big Ten. He was 12 of 13 in field goals and led the Conference with 72 kicking points. Michigan State's John Langeloh and Minnesota's Brent Berglund were second-team all-Conference. Shawn McCarthy, the Big Ten's top-ranked punter in 1989, has left. The Spartans' Josh Butland was second-team all-Big Ten. Northwestern's Ed Sutter was Freshman of the Year in 1988 and second in punting last season.



THE 1953 ROSE BOWL

Wisconsin State Journal sports editor Henry J. McCormick pointed out, "Wisconsin has no alibis and needs no alibis. The Badgers lost to a fine Southern California team that made better use of its opportunities than did Wisconsin."

A Wisconsin scoring opportunity at the end of the first period fizzled when the Trojan defense stopped Alan "The Horse" Ameche two yards short of a first down at the USC 14 yard line. The drive covered 66 yards on ten plays and included a Jim Haluska to Roy Burks 28-yard pass play and a 20-yard run by Burks on a left end reverse.

Roger Dornburg intercepted a Rudy Bukich pass early in the second period that stymied a Trojan march that had covered 49 yards on ten plays in reaching the Wisconsin 22 yard line.

The first half was scoreless and was dominated by the fine punting of both "Windy" Gulseth of the Badgers and Des Koch of USC.

Wisconsin's best chance of the game to score came at the outset of the third period when Ameche broke loose on a 54-yard scamper—he ran for 154 yards on 33 carries in the game—on the period's first play from scrimmage, but a fumble that USC recovered on a third down play negated the threat.

The Trojans immediately went to work to tally the game's only score on a 73-yard, nine-play march that was capped by a 22-yard scoring pass from Rudy Bukich to Al Carmichael.

Wisconsin countered with its best march of the day—84 yards on 13 plays—that took the ball from its own 14 yard line to the USC two. The Badgers' fourth down play was a fake field goal and Jerry Witt was dropped a yard short of the first down.

USC controlled play early in the fourth period that saw Sam Tsagalakas miss a field goal from the Wisconsin 15 yard line and then the Badgers put together marches of 63 and 57 yards that couldn't put the tying score on the board. Haluska's final two passes—one to Harland Carl and one to Roger Dornburg—were incomplete in the end zone. USC ran out the final 24 seconds of playing time.



THE 1960 ROSE BOWL

Washington struck with fury following an opening exchange of punts to tally 17 points in the final 5:41 of the first period and take command of the 46th Rose Bowl game.

The Huskies marched 49 yards on ten plays with Don McKeta scoring from six yards out to cap a march that saw quarterback Bob Schloredt gain 30 yards on four carries and use the pass once for a seven-yard completion to Ray Jackson.

George Fleming's 36-yard field goal following recovery of a Wisconsin fumble, and Fleming's 53-yard punt return on the final play of the period gave Washington a 17-0 lead.

The Badgers pulled themselves together in the second period following a pair of lost fumbles and put together a 69-yard, nine-play march that saw Tom Weisner tally from four yards out. Dale Hackbart's two point conversion pass was good and Wisconsin trailed 17-8 with five and one-half minutes left to play in the half.

It was time enough for the Huskies to score again—this time on a George Fleming 55-yard punt return that put the ball at Wisconsin's 27-yard line—with a third down Schloredt pass to Lee Folkins netting the final 23 yards.

Washington upped its margin to 31-8 by controlling the ball at the start of the third period for a 66-yard, 11-play drive that saw Ray Jackson burst into the end zone from two yards out.

A Wisconsin drive reached the Huskies' seven yard line early in the final period, but four Hackbart passes were incomplete and Washington proceeded to score twice again.

Schloredt engineered a 93-yard, ten-play march that featured a Schloredt to Fleming 65-yard pass play that put the ball at Wisconsin's 17. It was Schloredt who ended the march with a three-yard keeper for the score.

The final tally came via the air lanes as reserve QB Bob Hivner combined with Don Millich on a one-yard TD pass to cap a 45-yard, five-play drive.



THE 1963 ROSE BOWL

It's the most memorable of bowl games played.

Southern California jumped out to a 42-14 lead on the first play of the final period. After that play the game belonged to Wisconsin as a 23-point rally fell just short as USC hung on to win, 42-37.

The Trojans opened the scoring by marching 57 yards in ten plays on the game's first possession by utilizing the tackle-eligible play on fourth down—Pete Bethard to Ron Butcher—for the game's first score.

The Badgers responded with an 81-yard, 11-play drive capped by Ralph Kurek's one-yard plunge. Ron Vander Kelen completed five straight passes in the drive—Holland, four, Carlson, 11, Kroner, 12, Kurek, 18, and Pat Richter, 12—to set the stage for Kurek's score.

A pass interception by Damon Bame set up a 30-yard, six-play drive by the Trojans—Ben Wilson scoring—and then a 66-yard, six-play march highlighted by a 45-yard Bethard to Willie Brown pass play, and Ron Heller's 25-yard burst up the middle gave USC a 21-7 halftime advantage.

The Trojans came out in the third period and scored on the first play from scrimmage—a Bethard to Hal Bedsole 57-yard pass play—and it was 28-7.

Wisconsin rallied with Ron Vander Kelen capping an eight-play, 67-yard march with a 17-yard scamper across the Trojans' goal and it was 28-14.

Later in the period USC moved ahead 35-14 on a 23-yard scoring aerial from Bethard to Bedsole and on the first play of the final period the lead went to 42-14 on Bethard's 13-yard scoring pass to Fred Hill.

14:54 to play.

Lou Holland's 13-yard run to climax an 80-yard, 11-play drive made the score 42-21. Elmars Ezerins recovered a fumble at the USC 29 and in five plays it was 42-28 as Vander Kelen hit Gary Kroner on a four-yard TD pass.

USC could not move on its next possession, and a bad center pass on a punting situation netted the Badgers a safety. 42-30.

Following the free kick (returned 21 yards by Ron Smith), the Badgers moved 43 yards to score in three plays highlighted by passes to Richter for 18 yards (Holland recovered the fumble), and of 19 yards for the score.


The game ended on USC's last play—a punt to Holland at the Wisconsin 40. Time ran out on the Badgers. 42-37.

Wisconsin's All-Time Football Team

During the 1969 centennial season of collegiate football, Badger fans were asked to select the University of Wisconsin's all-time football team.

Fullback Alan "The Horse" Ameche, a 1953 and 1954 All-American and winner of the 1954 Heisman Trophy, was voted Wisconsin's all-time greatest football player in the poll.

In the backfield with Ameche were quarterback Ron VanderKelen (1962) and Marlin "Pat" Harder and Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch, members of the famed 1942 Wisconsin team that posted an 8-1-1 record and a No. 3 national ranking.

The ends named were a pair of two-time All-Americans in Dave Schreiner (1941 and 1942) and Pat Richter (1961 and 1962).

Linemen honored included Robert "Red" Wilson (1946-49), Howard "Cub" Buck (1915), Arlie Mucks, Sr. (1914), Dan Lanphear (1959), and Ken Bowman (1961-63).

Four Badger Numbers Retired

Four football jersey numbers have been retired in Wisconsin's 101-year football history. They are #80, worn by All-American end Dave Schreiner in 1941 and 1942; #83, worn by quarterback Allan J. Shafer in 1944; #40, worn by Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch in 1942; and #35, worn by Heisman Trophy winner and All-American fullback Alan "The Horse" Ameche.

Schreiner was killed in action with the U.S. Marine Corps during the battle of Okinawa in June of 1945.

Shafer was fatally injured in the second half of the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa football game and passed away shortly after the Badgers had defeated the Hawkeyes by a 26-7 count in Camp Randall Stadium on November 11th.


Hirsch, who led Wisconsin to a No. 3 national ranking and a 8-1-1 record in 1942, enjoyed a stellar NFL career with the Los Angeles Rams, served as the UW's athletic director for 18 years, and is a member of the NFL Hall of Fame, the College Football Hall of Fame, and the National High School Hall of Fame.

Ameche, Wisconsin's only Heisman winner, wore #35 during the 1951-54 era, during which he established an NCAA record of 3,212 rushing yards for a career.



The team plays its home games in impressive Camp Randall Stadium, the ninth largest college-owned football structure in the nation with a capacity of 77,745.


The mammoth double-deck, horseshoe-shaped stadium also houses the football coaches' and staff offices, lounge and study areas for players and visitors, film rooms, conference rooms, and an extensive display of Wisconsin football memorabilia.

Among the many displays are a showcase highlighting three Rose Bowl games and Alan "The Horse" Ameche's original Heisman Trophy and various photo displays of Wisconsin All-Americans and past and present NFL standouts like Al Toon, Tim Krumrie, Mike Webster, Stu Voigt, Nate Odomes, Jim Bakken, Larry Canada, Paul Gruber, John Williams, Randy Wright, Tim Jordan, Dennis Lick, Pat Richter, Jeff Dellenbach, Ken Stills and Rick Graf.

The Badgers also have the luxury of selecting from three different fields for practice sessions. In addition to the stadium, the Wisconsin team utilizes the state-of-the-art Dave McClain Athletic Facility for indoor sessions and a natural grass football field located just adjacent to the Camp Randall-McClain Facility complex.


In 1990, Wisconsin marks its second full season of residency in the indoor McClain Facility. The center contains a full artificial turf practice area (including enough height for both kicking and punting practice), a large, comfortable, complete lounge that includes Badger football memorabilia, spacious locker rooms and equipment areas, an 8,300-square foot weight-training facility, a 150-seat theatre-style auditorium, numerous meeting rooms, a complete athletic training complex, a lap pool to assist in injury rehabilitation, a sauna, and various supply and storage areas. The McClain Facility connects directly to Camp Randall Stadium via an enclosed walkway for easy access on game days and to the central UW football offices.

From top to bottom, inside and out, the University of Wisconsin football complex is truly unique.



The Wisconsin Strength Program



Scott Raridon

When it comes to Big Ten Conference football, there is nothing of greater significance to a team than the strength, conditioning and well-being of its student-athletes.

With that in mind, one of the first things Wisconsin football

coach Barry Alvarez did after arriving in Madison was secure an individual he knew could mold a top-notch conditioning program and produce the type of players needed to compete at the highest levels.

The individual Alvarez wanted—Scott Raridon—was all too happy to follow him from Notre Dame to Wisconsin. Raridon, incidentally, had spent the past three years as strength and conditioning coordinator for the Fighting Irish program, working closely with the likes of Lou Holtz and Alvarez.

"Barry Alvarez has had a huge influence on me since high school," said Raridon, who played football for Alvarez at Mason City High in Iowa. "I have great respect for him."

"After visiting Wisconsin, seeing the facilities, and meeting people like (athletic director) Pat Richter, I knew the commitment to excellence was there.

"I became very excited at the opportunity to continue working with Coach Alvarez, to put together a well-organized staff, and to build the type of program we had at Notre Dame. Our goal is to have the best one in the country."

Raridon's range of expertise stems from his involvement with two of the nation's premier college football programs, one that also includes Nebraska. Prior to going to Notre Dame in 1986, he spent several years in the Cornhuskers' strength program, including two years as a starter at offensive tackle in 1982 and 1983.

"A great strength coach has a very disciplined head coach and a great recruiting coordinator," said Raridon, "and we have both here at Wisconsin in Barry Alvarez and Bernie Wyatt. He also needs a great support staff."

Raridon's right-hand man at Wisconsin is assistant strength and conditioning coach John Dettman. A 1983 graduate of UW-Oshkosh with a degree in corporate fitness, Dettman, too, was a standout college football player. And more recently, Raridon has also added the assistance of Dave Ellis, who owns a degree in human nutrition along with a solid strength background.

"We have put together a strong staff," adds Raridon. "One that has diverse backgrounds, experience, and expertise in the areas of strength, conditioning and nutrition. That was very important to us."

Strength training for football players at the UW consists of year-round programs, including a pre-season training program, in-season and winter conditioning programs, and spring and summer programs.

"Our job here is year-round and includes work with all the men's and women's sports. We are here not to just make the athletes stronger, but to make them better athletes.

"We must develop speed, athletic ability, strength and conditioning."

One of the most pleasing aspects of Raridon's new environment is the Dave McClain Athletic Facility, his 'home away from home'.

"This is one of the best facilities in the country," he says. "No doubt about it. We have the 8,300-square foot weight room, the training (sports medicine) room, the equipment room, the locker room and the practice field all in one building. That makes it so much more convenient and advantageous for the student-athlete. When there are so many demands on their time, it's great that they don't have to run all over campus."

Like a proud father, Raridon rattled off a few of the McClain Facility's possessions.

"We have 45,000 pounds of free weights, eight bench presses, six inclines, ten squat stations, five power clean platforms, dumb bells in five-pound increments from five to 150, and a new computer center. The computer set-up has been real exciting; we will have so much more capability now."

The UW also makes use of a second, well-equipped weight-training facility located in the

stadium itself.

As college sports expand and grow more complex, as coaching becomes more sophisticated, and as athletes demand more and more of their bodies, the role of the strength coach continues to change as well. As a matter of fact, Raridon doesn't even like the term "strength coach."

"It's much more complex than that. Our role is constantly changing and expanding. We don't just emphasize strength anymore. We recognize three equally important areas—strength, conditioning and nutrition."

"Our philosophy here is to combine all three aspects of development to build a fast, well-conditioned athlete who is strong enough to compete."

Raridon also took time to describe a football player's typical training schedule during the off-season.

"On Mondays and Thursdays we will work in the weight room on the chest, back and triceps for an hour and a half. Then we move into the McClain Facility to work another hour on conditioning and agility.

"On Tuesdays and Fridays, we work in the weight room on legs, shoulders, biceps and the neck for another hour and a half. Then it's over to McClain for an hour of speed and power development drills. Wednesdays are a day off, while the weekends are a time to rest.

"During the competitive season, Badger football players work on the weights two days a week. During the spring football session, we continue working in all areas. Then in late June, we will start on our summer conditioning program . . . so that we will be in the best shape possible for the start of fall camp in August."

Yes, the "physical fitness" of athletes has always been a primary concern at the University of Wisconsin. And under the guidance of Scott Raridon, Wisconsin's program will surely enhance a tradition as one of the Big Ten's most complete.

"We've had only half a year with the football players so far," he pointed out. "But already we've seen impressive gains in speed, conditioning and attitude. I can't wait to see where we are next year."

Wisconsin Athletic Training Facilities

The Wisconsin Athletic Training Department is housed in both Camp Randall Stadium and the Dave McClain Athletic Facility.


Six full-time trainers, under the direction of staff coordinator Dennis Helwig, several graduate assistants, and more than 20 student-trainers are on hand each day to assist University of Wisconsin student-athletes in their complex, personal needs.

In addition to the main training facilities in Camp Randall Stadium and the new Dave McClain Athletic Facility, the department also has five satellite facilities around the Madison campus. There is one at the UW Fieldhouse (basketball), the Red Gym (gymnastics), the Natatorium (swimming and diving), the Dane County Memorial Coliseum (ice hockey), and Nielsen Tennis Stadium.

Helwig and his staff put the main emphasis of their work on preventive programs. Their busy daily routines include coordinating the physiological testing of athletes, enlisting computer programs such as *Anjian* (dietary analysis) to provide nutritional information to athletes, utilizing Cybex strength-testing devices in the evaluation of strength weaknesses, working with attending physicians in rehabilitation of student-athletes, working to improve individual athletic performance, and outlining preventive stretching programs to aid in avoiding the recurrence of past injuries. The UW trainers also advise athletes as to what type of treatments they should do and refer them to appropriate physicians.

Thanks to the introduction of computers into the training department several years ago, the UW staff has the capability of tracking sports injuries; in other words, diagnosing when and where these injuries most often occur. This information has proved extremely helpful to coaches in devising conditioning programs and practices for their teams.

The UW training staff is also proud of their close

working relationship with Madison-area physicians, some of whom regularly visit the campus to see injured athletes. Working directly with the Wisconsin football team are orthopedic surgeons Dr. Jim Keene and Dr. Ben Graf, and Dr. Greg Landry, who handles internal medical problems for UW athletics.

"The frequency of visits to the campus by our attending physicians," reports Helwig, "helps us with rehabilitation programs and shortens significantly the

return to competition for our injured athletes. These individuals make a very large and very important contribution to the success of our athletic programs."

As the city of Madison and university community are blessed with some of the best medical facilities in the world—including the renowned UW Hospital and Clinics—Wisconsin student-athletes are always seen on a priority basis, and are assured of only the very best in medical care.

The Dave McClain Athletic Facility

Opened in 1988, the Dave McClain Athletic Facility is a symbol of the commitment to athletic excellence at the University of Wisconsin.

The impressive structure, named in honor of the late Wisconsin football coach, has helped usher in a new era in UW Athletics.

The 166,264-square foot facility compares favorably with the finest indoor training facilities in the world. It provides the Wisconsin football team with a pleasant environment in which to practice during inclement weather and is playing a significant role in assisting UW student-athletes in off-season conditioning and skill development.

"This is a state-of-the-art facility," said architect Ronald Bowen. "This has to be considered among the elite indoor facilities in the nation."

The 76,380-square foot main floor of the McClain Facility features an artificial turf practice area, with adequate space for all components of practice—including sufficient height for full kicking and punting. The 64,320-square foot lower level houses showers, locker room and dressing areas, a modern, world-class athletic training area—including hydrotherapy space, supply and storage areas—and a new, fully-equipped weight-training room. The upper level consists of 5,300 square feet of space, including a theatre-style auditorium and numerous meeting rooms.

At a total cost of \$9.5 million, the Dave McClain Athletic Facility was constructed on the outdoor practice field immediately north of the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center. The domed structure is bordered on the north by the UW Engineering building, the east by Camp Randall Park, and on the west by Camp Randall Stadium. Direct access between the McClain Facility and Camp Randall Stadium is provided via a corridor.


With the success of Badger Football (football revenues provide the majority of financial support for UW Athletics) impacting on the entire 25-sport men's and women's programs, the university has maintained an essential program of adding new facilities, upgrading existing facilities, and continued planning for future additions. These, together, should help ensure the continued good health of its athletic teams.

CONSTRUCTION FACTS

The Dave McClain Athletic Facility was constructed in two phases. The main floor construction, referred to as "Phase I," was begun in July of 1987 and consisted of a 330-foot by 220-foot concrete floor supporting a 90-yard artificial turf practice field. In addition, a 2,700 square foot viewing and reception area are housed on the main level.

The "Phase II" construction period included the full lower level beneath the main floor. This lower level houses team facilities that include locker rooms, showers, a sauna and steam room, a rehabilitation pool, a weight training facility, equipment storage area, athletic training and sports medicine facilities, offices and a media interview room.

The second floor area above the main floor entrance contains comfortable, eye-pleasing classrooms, a 150-person capacity auditorium and a

direct access to Camp Randall Stadium. The McClain Facility supports activities of both the stadium and the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center.

To fully appreciate the scope of the structure, one need only examine what went into its construction.

To begin with, there are 166,000 square feet in the facility. To make room for the building, some 70,000 cubic yards of earth had to be dug up and

removed. Among the materials? Try 6,500 cubic yards of concrete, 75,000 concrete blocks, 1,550 gallons of paint, 4,300 square feet of carpeting, 2.5 miles of heating/cooling piping, 2.8 miles of plumbing piping, 101,000 square feet of stainless steel roof material, 35,000 pounds of ductwork, 27 miles of electrical wiring, 40,000 square feet of electrical conduit, and 43,000 square feet of roof fabric.






Camp Randall Stadium—Home of Wisconsin Football

Camp Randall Stadium, the home of the University of Wisconsin football team, is recognized as one of the finest collegiate facilities in the nation.

From its impressive doubledeck, horseshoe design and 77,745-seat capacity, to its modern and spacious Communications Center, a visit to Camp Randall leaves an impression you won't quickly forget.

The ninth largest college-owned structure in the nation and third largest in the Big Ten, Camp Randall's official capacity of 77,745 is surpassed only by Michigan (101,701), Tennessee (91,249), Ohio State (85,290), Stanford (84,795), Penn State (83,770), Georgia (82,122), Texas (80,000) and Clemson (78,915).

Wisconsin football teams have played before season averages of more than 70,000 fans per game 12 times since 1972 and have ranked among the nation's top 15 in attendance on numerous occasions. In the decades of the 1970s and '80s, the Badgers have drawn a total of 8,354,070 fans to 124 home games, an average of 417,704 per season and 67,372 per game! Wisconsin football teams have drawn crowds of more than 70,000 on 59 occasions since 1970. The all-time single game attendance record at Camp Randall Stadium is 80,024, set against Michigan in 1978.

Located atop the west side of Camp Randall's double deck, the Communications Center ranks as one of the nation's finest facilities for attending press, radio and television. The Communications Center contains working areas for more than 300 athletic staff and media personnel throughout its three levels. The third level is composed of radio and television broadcast booths. The fourth level is reserved for the UW Sports News Service, print media, UW athletic staff, statistical crews, visiting dignitaries, and competing coaches. The fifth level houses private corporation boxes, game film areas, and is also used for television broadcasts.

A NOTEWORTHY HISTORY

Although the original structure was built in 1917, the history of the Camp Randall area itself dates back much further than the 73 years a stadium has been an occupant.

In the years prior to the American Civil War, the original site was owned by the Wisconsin State Agricultural Society, whose yearly state fairs attracted holiday throngs there.

When Civil War hostilities broke out in 1861, however, the society turned the land over to the government to become Wisconsin's major military training center. Named for a wartime governor, the site thus became known as "Camp Randall Military Training Center."

The land became the state fair grounds again when peace returned to the land. When General Ulysses S. Grant visited it 15 years later, he hailed the transformation of the area from a wartime military training center to the site of the annual state fair as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace." (Others who had visited the Camp Randall grounds included General Sherman, General Sheridan and President Hayes.)

Following the eventual move of the State Fair to






