## MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING

of the BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

Madison, Wisconsin

Held in the Clarke Smith Room, 1820 Van Hise Hall Friday, August 15, 1975, 9:00 A.M.

President McNamara presiding.

Upon motion by Regent Pelisek, seconded by Regent Sandin, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on June 6, 1975; be approved as sent out to the Regents.

## REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

President McNamara made the following statement: "I suppose like all new officers I am constrained to make some opening remarks, and initially, again as all new presidents, I was going to optimistically discuss the future of the University in the next decade, mindful of the fact than ten years from 1975 would be 1985, one year past the fatal year that George Orwell mentioned in his famous essay. And, while I was mulling over what I thought I ought to say, I had to get into a study of the new budget which is under discussion this morning and today, and my optimism for the future vanished. Reading the budget I was greatly disturbed by its failure to provide funding for the 6000 or so new students who will be on our several campuses during the next biennium. I was upset by the refusal in that budget to compensate the University System for the ravages of inflation, which last year and this will undoubtedly exceed 20%; so that here is an added, but concealed, budget cut. That was the second thing that disturbed me. I was further disturbed by what I felt was inadequate funding to again compensate our faculty and staff for the inflationary spiral, and I felt that this again was without justification, and I was somewhat outraged by the added budget cuts in the name of productivity because I knew that productivity as used in business and industry, and that's where the term originated, could not apply to the University.

It means one thing when applied to industry, when we're talking about the output of goods and services. It means quite another thing when it's mechanically applied to the University System, as it was in this instance. In the business community, or an industry, it can simply mean under certain circumstances, increasing the workload, and there's nothing wrong with that in principle.

"But actually, in education as I view it, the ideal arrangement, and we don't subscribe to ideals, would be almost a one on one relationship between professors and students. In some countries it's a one on three in practice, but if we increase the class size 100, 200, 300 or 400 in the name of productivity, what we're actually doing is, in terms of education, decreasing productivity; so we're doing the reverse of what we said, or, if we, through budget activity, make it impossible for a student to participate in experiments in the lab and instead must watch demonstrations, while we've saved some money, we have decreased the productivity of the education system in terms of educating our students; or when we have less counselling, we're in effect decreasing the productivity of the University System by decreasing the quality of education.

"So I was very much disturbed by that, and what we have are three extremely substantial cuts which do not actually appear in the budget, but which are there nonetheless, and which seriously hamper the functioning of this University. Now, I can clearly understand the denial of X amount of money because of the economic recession, but what concerns me is the future, and if this is to become the wave of the future, then I am disturbed about the future of the University System. But I think what really hurt me was the fact that in this budget it appears that the University System, higher education in the state, was treated much more harshly than were the routine administrative bureaus of state government, and I think that that was the blow which hurt most of all. Now, all of us as Regents can have differing views about the budget, and that's certainly proper. We can have different opinions about the mechanics of higher education and about other facets of the University structure. But if we are to maintain the principle of higher, of high quality education and an outstanding University system, with its doors open to every qualified applicant willing and able to absorb a university education, then it will take the dedication and the abilities of this Board and all of our collective talents in that direction. I thought that, in view of the fact that we will be discussing the annual budget today, we ought to discuss generally its implications to the University System and to all of us as members of the governing board of the University."

At the request of the President of the Board, Dr. George Lythcott, Associate Vice Chancellor for Health Sciences, read the following report made by President John C. Weaver's physician, Dr. Ernest Reynolds, dated August 14, 1975: "President John Weaver sustained a heart attack in the early morning hours of July 25 and was admitted to the coronary care units of University Hospitals on the same day. The case was uncomplicated and he has had good recovery. His blood pressure is lower than prior to his heart attack but is stable and this does not cause difficulty. He was discharged from the University Hospitals on Friday, August 8, and is expected to remain at his home for a minimum of three weeks of progressive ambulation. Assuming no complications, President Weaver will resume his duties sometime in September." Dr. Lythcott stated that he had conferred with Dr. Reynolds this morning and Dr. Weaver's blood pressure returned to normal yesterday for the first time.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Whereas, Frank J. Pelisek of Milwaukee served as president Resolution 1049: of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for two years, from July 1973 to July 1975, following a one-year term as vice president, and

> Whereas, his broad knowledge gained as chief architect of the 1973 university merger law, and his wisdom, wit, energy, fairness and parliamentary skills served Wisconsin well as he led this Board and University System to a position of national prominence in higher education; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved, That his fellow Regents commend and thank Mr. Pelisek for his dedicated and excellent service as an officer of this Board during the last three of its four years of existence.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 1050: Whereas, Bjarne R. Ullsvik retired on August 10, 1975, from his administrative duties at the University of Wisconsin-Platteville, where he served as President and Chancellor for 17 years, and will remain on the faculty as Distinguished Professor of Mathematics, and

> Whereas, during his tenure as chief executive officer he guided the campus as it more than tripled in enrollment, merged with the Wisconsin Institute of Technology, constructed a branch campus at Richland Center, developed a graduate program, improved its undergraduate offerings, and became part of the University of Wisconsin System,

> Be It Resolved, that, on behalf of past and present Regents who have worked with Dr. Ullsvik since 1958, we hereby record our deep appreciation for his many contributions, and for those of his equally dedicated wife, Lucille, to the University of Wisconsin-Platteville.

President McNamara noted that he had received an invitation from the Board of Regents of the University of Minnesota to meet with them on Friday and Saturday, November 21-22, and if there were no objections, he would respond to that invitation in the affirmative.

President McNamara also announced the meeting of the Association of Governing Boards Workshop in Minneapolis on October 6 and 7, to discuss the Board's role in financial and academic policy. He requested that any Regent wishing to attend advise the Secretary.

President McNamara introduced Mr. Anthony Brewster, a member of the Board of Visitors. Mr. Brewster referred to President McNamara's remarks about the budget, stating that this is not a situation completely without hope and optimism. He stated that he felt it is important that the members of the Board recognize that the travail of the private sector has impinged on the public sector. He noted that what has happened to non-financial corporations over the last ten years directly affects the funding for institutions and systems such as the University. He stated that corporate debt has exceeded corporate equity over the last ten years, a very significant factor. Corporate debt for the first time in the history of this country has exceeded corporate equity in terms of growth. Liquid assets for non-financial corporations are less than half of short-term debt. Long-term non-financial corporate debt is now one to one with short-term debt, and short-term debt is the high interest bearing debt, and you have to pay that off quickly. He stated these are factors which must be worked with and that they are not going to change in the next ten years.

Mr. Brewster stated that the Board of Visitors, as a creature of the Board of Regents, is available as a competent source of assistance, and in a very real sense is underemployed. He noted that in the report of the Board of Visitors will be found concerns which are consonant with the concerns of the Board of Regents. He continued that if the Regents look to the Visitors for specific assignments, they will be discharged. He noted that in the faculty letter received recently there is a reference to the obvious, yet unfortunate, choice between quality and access. He stated that if the Visitors are asked to work in that area, they are ready to do so. He stated that in his opinion, at all costs, quality must be preserved, which means that access may have to be limited.

Mr. Brewster stated that today is a time when people tend to operate without facts, which is a tragic error. He continued the apparent lack of understanding by the people of the State of Wisconsin of the great work done by the System in the area of the use of federal grants and the ripple effect of those federal grants throughout the State of Wisconsin is of tremendous significance. He also noted that we may not have done the job that perhaps should have been done reminding the people of the State of Wisconsin that the University is not solely interested in research, and, while that is a vital part of the overall mission, teaching is equally important. He stated that the Visitors have found, as they have gone about the State, a growing concern about the lack of quality in teaching, or perhaps, more to put it into context, somewhat less than a top priority for teaching. He continued that that may or may not be true, but they have found it to be a pervasive feeling among the many groups they have talked to throughout the State.

He noted that a survey made by the School of Journalism indicates that one-third of the students who apply do not qualify because they lack the communicative skills of reading and writing. He continued that the Visitors are concerned about that matter and are willing to support and assist in this difficult area. Mr. Brewster expressed gratitude for the guidance, assistance and support of President Weaver.

At the request of President McNamara, Regent Pelisek discussed the status of the Academic Staff Personnel Rules. He noted there had been a public hearing on the rules during the month of June, at which time a number of comments were directed at the substance and certain technical provisions of those rules. During the period of time subsequent to that hearing, a number of modifications were made and suggested drafts to those rules, and it was hoped that a final amended form of those rules would be available for action by this Board today. However, within the last several days a matter has come up which had been somewhat overlooked, a matter of such substance with the rules that it was felt appropriate that action be deferred until the September meeting. He stated that the Academic Staff Personnel Rules will not be presented today, but will be presented at the September 12 meeting and distributed to the Board members well in advance of that meeting for their review and consideration.

At the request of President McNamara, Senior Vice President Percy reviewed the Affirmative Action Progress and Status Reports which had previously been sent to the Regents. He noted that the document was a joint effort by the Chancellors, the Campus Affirmative Action Officers, and Ms. Marian Swoboda and Mr. Joseph Wiley of the Central Administration staff. He noted the report does show some systemwide increase in representation in both minorities and women. Some campuses had greater success than others, but it is important that we evaluate this success bearing in mind that all campuses have felt the impact of budgetary retrenchment. As a temper to a too positive assessment, he stated there are groups of employees who still do not feel adequately represented, nor do they feel the affirmative action plans as drawn on some campuses are adequate to their needs, and they continue to make their feelings known, which is helpful and does affect Central Administration review of these matters.

He stated that many campuses show increases of the percentage representation of both women and minorities, even though they experienced a decrease in total employees. He stated our experience in the UW System is typical of national trends in higher education affirmative action, and it is becoming increasingly important for the Board to know, as it reads in the newspapers about varieties of developments, just what these trends are and that a way be found to take them into account in setting priorities and designing programs and in raising expectations.

Changes in hiring and growth characteristics of universities have prompted some serious reconsiderations of some of the past enforcement policies at the federal level. He continued that John Dunlop, Secretary of Labor, in June asked for a re-examination of the nation's entire equal opportunity employment effort. He called for a review of what he called the multiplicity of equal employment responsibilities and increasing number of enforcement agencies at the state and local level. He asked a number of other questions in determining whether goals and time tables as presently used are reliable tools for evaluating equal employment progress.

Vice President Percy said that the focus until now has been on getting a plan in place; the focus hereafter is on the much more important subject of progress toward goals. He stated that Mr. Dunlop felt examination is needed of whether or not affirmative action obligations ought to cease for a contractor who has shown a successful record of minority employment, or should the monitoring continue. The United States Civil Rights Commission in its annual report in July called for re-examination of federal effort in equal employment opportunity. Most recently the Carnegie Council on Policy Studies in Higher Education has characterized the government's handling in some instances of affirmative action programs as confused and even chaotic. Seldom has a good cause spawned such a badly developed series of federal mechanisms. He stated the report describes affirmative action programs as beset by too many regulations and guidelines, some inconsistent with one another. and duplicating and even feuding with each other, and too small, sometimes unqualified staff and overlong delays in processing claims. Vice President Percy stated that one of the things that they did recommend, which brings to mind Wisconsin experience, along with some thirty other institutions, was that in cases of suspected noncompliance with antidiscrimination requirements, a series of graduated sanctions be developed to replace what they call the atom bomb of a single penalty. It recommended that when an institution has demonstrated that its proportions of women and minorities among faculty and other academic staff approximate pools of qualified persons that are distributed throughout the institution, it should then be exempted from detailed recording requirements and continued reassessment of goals and time tables.

Vice President Percy stated that the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs has scheduled a public hearing in Washington on August 20, on enforcement of affirmative action in colleges and universities. He stated we will be represented at those hearings by a national association representing colleges and universities in which we hold membership and that we are developing a statement of suggestions as to where we see improvements possible.

Regent Lavine stated that he was impressed with the 1973-74 comparisons, particularly for minority employment on campuses like Green Bay and Superior, which had either the same or even a decline in total employment and showed growth in minority employees. He continued that he was concerned with areas like the Center System and Extension System that had four native American employees and stayed the same even though their employment grew. He inquired if we are going to get figures for 1975 in October. Vice President Percy responded that there will be a report following our October cutoff, when new hirees, to make the report complete, will be available.

Regent Lavine observed that many of us share many concerns about the federal morass that is represented by affirmative action, but that he hoped that the System, at least as far as the Board is concerned, is not confused and that he was really not very much impressed with whatever the federal government does on that level. He stated that our affirmative action efforts are a product of policy of this Board. He continued that he hoped we are a long way ahead of the federal guidelines, that he felt we were when we started and that we better stay a long way ahead. Senior Vice President Percy stated that he wished to make it clear that while we do have some confusion at the federal level, we are trying to avoid that at our level. He pointed out the basic guideline that was developed after this Board issued its affirmative action policy is the guideline the Madison Campus followed most recently in detail in submitting an affirmative action plan that won approval in Washington. He continued that all other campuses now have their plans in that format, and we anticipate no problems in obtaining the approval of their plans.

Regent Hales called the attention of the members of the Board to the policy statement that Chancellor Fort made recently concerning the affirmative action plan that is going to be put into effect in the Center System. He stated that he felt that statement is a very good and comprehensive statement and recommended reading it. He continued that he felt that it is going to be challenging for the Center System, as many of those campuses are in outlying areas where it may be difficult to recruit some of the minorities that go to these campuses, given the fact that many of those campuses are in areas that have almost no minority population. Regent Hales stated that as he reviewed the promotions for Assistant Professors, Professors, etc., he noticed the glaring fact that there weren't many women on the promotion list, and that he would like to see the campuses do better in the promotion of women. Regent Hales stated it was not his purpose to state that he was not interested in the promotion of minorities, but the fact is that the women are already there and that we can do a much better job in putting women on the tenure track.

Vice President Percy pointed out that the next resolution on the Restatement of Policy on Equal Employment Opportunity had been developed in concert with each of the campuses and with various groups around the state.

Regent Pelisek moved adoption of Resolution 1051 relating to Restatement of Policy on Equal Employment Opportunity (EXHIBIT A attached), and the motion was seconded by Regent Hales.

Regent Williams inquired if there is any description of what effective grievance procedures are. Senior Vice President Percy responded that later today there will be a report from the Council of Chancellors, who have been working on grievance policy and grievance procedures. He continued that we are in the process of trying to decide on the most effective method in terms of central vs. the campus or a decentralized mode, and that he believed the Chancellors will opt for the latter category.

The question was put on Resolution 1051, and it was voted.

President McNamara stated that the next item was a request from Chancellor Young for a Finding of Emergency in the adoption of emergency rules covering that problem and requested that Regent Pelisek report on the matter. Regent Pelisek stated that the issue is one involving the use of glass or other permanent-type containers within the University facilities. There were a number of very unfortunate incidents that occurred last year on this campus during the football season at the Stadium, and in attempting to prosecute the individuals involved it was determined that there was no lawful basis upon which the authorities could proceed. The City of Madison adopted a local ordinance relating to this subject, but it could not apply to University facilities. It was therefore urged that we consider adopting a University rule which would allow the prosecution of individuals who were engaged in this type of conduct.

Regent Pelisek moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin:



Resolution 1052:

That the attached Finding of Emergency and Order Adopting Emergency Rules (EXHIBIT B, attached) concerning limiting types of containers which may be brought into spectator facilities and prohibiting throwing or dropping hard objects in such facilities, be adopted; and that the Secretary is instructed to publish the attached Finding and Order in the official state newspaper, file certified copies of the emergency rules with the Secretary of State and the Revisor of Statutes, and to mail copies of the emergency rules to each member of the legislature.

Regent Pelisek noted that it is proposed to adopt this as an emergency rule under the Wisconsin Administrative Code, and, under the provisions of the Code, an administrative rule can only be in effect for a period of 120 days, and the thought is that this will apply for the 1975 football season. After the season is over, there will be experience for the application of the rule to see if it has any shortcomings, and, at that point, there will be a public hearing and formal adoption under the Wisconsin Administrative Code as a permanent rule. Regent DeBardeleben inquired if it was intended to prohibit the possession of soft drink cans and bottles and things of that nature. He was advised that soft drinks are not served in hard containers -- nothing is served in the Stadium except in paper cups, unless you bring it in yourself. Regent DeBardeleben questioned as to whether or not the rule is overly broad, pointing out that disposable containers as used in the proposed section would prohibit bringing a prescription bottle containing medicine into the Stadium. He stated that he knew it was not intended to prohibit that, but it does seem to be broad enough to prohibit some types of disposable containers, and that it would be unreasonable to prohibit prescription bottles. He stated that his sole concern was whether or not we have a valid provision.

The question was put on Resolution 1052, and it was voted.

Senior Vice President Smith recalled that at the public hearing on student disciplinary guidelines, there was considerable discussion of whether or not the student government had had ample opportunity for input into the development of the guidelines. He continued that it was clear that there was considerable difference of opinion on what constitutes adequate opportunity, but there was no difference of jugment on the fact that, given the time taken for the development of the guidelines, leadership on a number of campuses in the United Council has changed, and in the period when the guidelines are being enacted, it is to everyone's advantage that the students have time to study the guidelines to make recommendations and engage in the kind of campus hearings which would increase student understanding of the issues. He stated the proposed resolution has been prepared with the hope that this kind of process would be useful as student guidelines and to their open forums, and also to their implementation if and when they become enacted.

Regent Lavine observed that the key issue centers around the fact that there was a proposal made that students be treated in the civil courts and not on the campus and that he would request that our counsel, prior to the discussion of the guidelines, detail in layman's language what kinds of penalties and records and for how long and what effect being put through a civil process would entail,

as it was his understanding of that process, that it was quite substantial. He stated he would also be interested in student reaction, which he hoped would include some understanding of that process as well. Senior Vice President Smith stated that in his discussions with Mr. DeLonay, of the United Council of Student Governments, it was felt that it would be useful on as many campuses as the student government may wish, that student government in association with student affairs offices establish some kind of open hearings on the campuses. He noted that different campuses may have different ways they wish to go about it. They may want seminars, or they may want to have major open hearings on a specific date. It was his understanding that Mr. DeLonay is going to work with the student government heads and they will try to see that they work in association with student affairs personnel. He stated that we would try to make available resource people where they were needed, and in some instances the explanation or discussion may be helped by the presence of someone who has worked intimately with the process of the original development of the guidelines.

Regent DeBardeleben inquired what notice will be given to students on the various campuses of the deadline set forth in paragraph 1. of the resolution. Senior Vice President Smith responded it was expected this would be communicated by the United Council to all of the student association leaders and that Central Administration will see to it that not only the Chancellors but principal student affairs officers have this information, if the resolution is enacted by the Board. Regent DeBardeleben inquired if his assumption that there will be notices of one form or another given in the student newspapers was correct and was answered in the affirmative.

Regent Pelisek moved adoption of Resolution 1053, relating to Student Disciplinary Guidelines (EXHIBIT C attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1054: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record (EXHIBIT D, attached) be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

President McNamara announced the following appointments to the Council of Trustees of the University of Wisconsin Hospitals, in accordance with the By-Laws of the Council:

#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

1. Vice President Neshek reported that at the request of the President of the System, the Executive Committee was convened on July 15, 1975, to receive the President's recommendation that Dr. Alan Guskin be named Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Parkside effective September 1, 1975. The Committee received the recommendation, reviewed the findings of the Regent selection committee, and voted 5 to 0 to approve the appointment of Dr. Guskin.

Vice President Neshek moved that the following resolution adopted by the Executive Committee be confirmed and approved, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1048: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, Dr. Alan E. Guskin be appointed Changellor of the UW Parkside effective September 1, 1975, at an annual salary rate set within State Executive Salary Group 7 and to be specified in the 1975-76 annual budget.

## REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

Regent Lavine stated that in the committee meeting on the previous/day Senior Vice President Donald Smith commented that the report entitled Women's Studies Development in the University of Wisconsin System, 1974-75, was an excellent review of campus activity during the past year. He noted Regent Walter remarked favorably about the fact that the various campuses had taken different approaches to the matter.

Regent Lavine noted that there had also been a progress report: Stydent Evaluation of Instruction at UW Institutions, which is an update of the December 10, 1974, report reflecting and summarizing institutional progress reports received by Central Administration in response to Regent policy on student evaluation of instruction. The opinion was expressed that no university system in the nation has in place as complete a system for student input. There will be a report after July, 1976, when final and complete plans of each campus are to be in place.

Regent Lavine reported that Regent Barbara Thompson joined the Education Committee for discussion of the UW System - Department of Public Instruction Coordination: Certification Programs for Teachers (Amendment to ACIS-1). He reported she described the procedure followed by the Department of Public Instruction in approving teacher education programs upon application from the campuses and explained that under present arrangements the campuses bring proposed certification programs directly to the Department of Public Instruction, whereas it would be preferable if such programs were submitted to Central Administration for judgments about cost factors, program duplication, and resource utilization before being submitted to the Department of Public Instruction for determination of their suitability as programs for licensing teachers.

Regent Lavine noted that passage of the following resolution carried with it the understanding that certification programs would come from Central Administration every four years to determine that they either will or will not be resubmitted to the Department of Public Instruction for continued approval as licensing programs. Such determination would be based upon such factors as cost, resource utilization, mission compatibility, and program duplication.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1055: That, upon recommendation of the Senior Vice President of the UW System, Academic Information Series I (ACIS-1), Revised, approved December 6, 1974, be amended as follows to include graduate and undergraduate teacher education and other school professional certification programs:

Page 2, under Academic Program Changes and Related Policies:
Is Action Required? Add:

Establish Certification Program\*\*\*
Action required: by Institution, Yes

by Central Administration, Yes

by Regents, IO

\*\*\*Refers to graduate and undergraduate course configurations, not identified as degree programs, which are designed for submission to the Department of Public Instruction for approval.

Regent Lavine reported that there had been a report by Senior Vice President Smith in the Committee meeting on the previous day on the allocation of 1975-76 American Ethnic Studies Program Funds. He reported there was discussion as to whether more of the available funds should be directed to campuses having the highest Native American students and area populations, it having been noted that UW-Madison currently enrolls fewer students who identify themselves as Native Americans than two campuses not receiving funding.

Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day Senior Vice President Smith spoke briefly of the Office of Academic Affairs Goals, 1975-76, and the report on activities of the Office of Academic Affairs for 1974-75.

He reported Senior Vice President Smith stated that the record of accomplishment was especially significant in view of the number of unanticipated tasks that appeared, in particular, preparation of the Scope Report in response to the Governor's mandate. He stated Dr. Smith commented that the statement of 1975-76 objectives was probably over ambitious because of the substantial number of unanticipated tasks. Regent Lavine noted that a research group for the Carnegie Council, upon reviewing the 1974-75 summary of activities and scope reports, in an interview with him, commented that based upon a study of ten states, Wisconsin probably leads the country in higher education in terms of academic planning and particularly in terms of the Scope Report.

Regent Lavine noted that the new academic program proposals have been greatly cut back from the number submitted on each campus and have been carefully reviewed, not only this month, but last month, by the Education Committee.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1056: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellors and Faculties of the Institutions involved, the following new academic programs be approved with an effective implementation date of Fall, 1975:

- (1) Joint Master of Business Administration, UW-Eax Claire and UW-La Crosse
- (2) Master of Education in Professional Development, UW-La Crosse
- (3) B.S. in Behavioral Science and Law, UW-Madison
- (4) B.S. in Medical Record Administration, UW-Milwaukee
- (5) B.S./B.A. in Radio-TV-Film, UW-Oshkosh
- (6) B.S. in Criminal Justice, UW-Oghkosh
- (7) B.S. in Engineering Technology, UW-Parkside
- (8) Master of Administrative Science, UW-Parkside
- (9) M.S. in Marriage and Family Counseling, UW-Stout
- (10) Master of Education in Professional Development, UW-Whitewater

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1057: That, for their many years of dedicated service on the faculties of institutions in the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents commends and extends good wishes to those members who have been granted emeritus status by the President and the Chancellors. (Copy of Emeritus Designations on file with the papers of this meeting)

Regent Lavine stated that he assumed the Chancellors involved will convey this information to the proper people.

Regent Lavine stated that the Academic Year Calendars proposed by the campuses in all cases comply with Academic Planning Statement #4 stipulations of a contractual period of 39 weeks and 34 weeks of organized services for students, the latter including a minimum of 170 days exclusive of Saturdays, Sundays, and spring recess.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin:

Resolution 1058: That, upon recommendation of the Senior Vice President of the UW System and the respective Chancellors, the Board of Regents approves the 1976-77 Academic Year Calendars as shown on the attached sheet. (EXHIBIT E)

Regent Barkla inquired if there was some discussion in the Committee meeting of the changing of the contractual period from 36 to 39 weeks. Regent Lavine responded that there was discussion several months ago about the difference in format between the two former systems and the fact that they used different terminology in discussing the term. He continued there might be the implication that this extended the contract period, but, in fact, with the designation of 34 weeks of teaching, the actual teaching period is the same and it merely gives reference to the fact that professors, during the period of the school year, do have duties other than in the classroom and that it does not change the actual time of the contract period. He stated the contract is saying that we are hiring faculty for nine months or the total number of weeks for the totality of their efforts. He noted we do have a problem with one campus in the System that heretofore granted summertime extra type pay for the interim kind of service that took place between the two semesters in January.

Regent Erdman stated that Mr. Muzik of TAUWF appeared before the Business and Finance Committee and pointed out that the totality of time had been increased for the Universities outside of Madison and Milwaukee, and raised the point of compensation, since faculty members had been paid for the total period whether teaching or correcting papers, and if they were working 36 weeks before, now it will be increased to 39 weeks. Senior Vice President Smith stated all these representations had appeared before the Education Committee at the time of the adoption of ACPS-4, which has been brought to the full Board and has been approved, and that he was not sure why Mr. Muzik went back to the Business and Finance Committee with a representation which actually applies to a policy which was adopted by the Board. He stated he would be glad to pull back all of the documentation on the reasons for and the lack of fiscal punishment that is implicit in the adoption of the new calendar. He stated we are talking about an effort to revise what was a policy adopted only two months ago by this Board, with the request that a new calendar be submitted.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that he recalled that at the time we took that action, he asked the question of whether there were any implications as far as faculty compensation was concerned and was assured there were not. He stated he didn't understand it then, he didn't understand it yesterday when Mr. Muzik brought it up, and did not understand it now, and if an explanation were to be sent to Mrs. Erdman, he would appreciate receiving a copy of the same. Senior Vice President Percy stated Mr. Muzik's presentation was relative to subsequent developments—unemployment compensation developments, the new sick leave conversion process—and Central Administration asked at that meeting for a detailed letter to us that we might respond. He stated Central Administration will try to develop a summary for the members of the Board.

The question was put on Resolution 1058, and it was voted.

Regent Lavine reported that in the committee meeting on the previous day Senior Vice President Donald Smith reviewed Academic Program Audit and Review:

Progress to Date and Plans for the Future. The report contained:

1. A statement providing the context for audit and review activity.

2. A summary of the undergraduate and extension program audit and Appendix A - Progress Report on audit and review of undergraduate programs with audit and review flow charts for each institution.

3. A summary of Phase II of the <u>Masters/Specialist Audit</u> and Appendix B.- Consortium and institution reports on Phase II of the Masters/Specialist Audit.

4. A summary of action on the <u>doctoral program audit</u> and Appendix C - Reports from UW-Madison and UW-Milwaukee on doctoral audit and review procedures.

5. A consideration of the goals and means for triggering special lateral program audits, together with a short rationale for each of the three audits which Central Administration proposes to carry out in 1975-76.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of Resolution 1059 relating to rescission of Resolution 556, since it is no longer a legal requirement that the Education Committee and the Board of Regents at each meeting take the pro forma action of approving "the personnel actions taken by the President of the UW System" since those approved at the last previous meeting (EXHIBIT F, attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted. (NOTE: According to Senior Vice President Percy, following the Board meeting it was discovered that the above rescission was in error, and Resolution 556 will be reinstituted in slightly modified form at the next meeting.

Regent Lavine reported that in the committee meeting on the previous day Senior Vice President Smith mentioned new agreements between UW-Superior and Northland College and between UW-Whitewater and Milton College with respect to ROTC programming. He reported that Associate Vice President Dallas Peterson announced the organization of a Systemwide Health Sciences Advisory Council; consisting of 21 members, including seven from institutions and agencies outside the UW System.

Regent Lavine stated that he had referred in his recent-letter to the Education Committee members and all Board members soliciting suggestions for topics for informational presentations before the Committee. He stated that the programs should include all campuses and deal with the content and practice of instruction. He reported there was envisioned a sort of round-robin of the System with a chance to hear from an outstanding professor from each campus actually teaching some of his subject matter. He reported that Sr. Vice President Smith expressed enthusiasm for the idea, pointing to the desirability of having contact with outstanding professors in the context of what they do that makes them successful. He continued that it was the consensus of the Committee that the Board should be informed of the intent of the Education Committee to arrange for informational programming dealing with professors' teaching and research. The Chancellors may expect that Vice President Smith in concert with the Committee will be contacting them regarding the identification of appropriate professorial staff to be involved.

Regent Lavine reported that the campuses are in the process of generating 10-year plans which will be major documents brought for Regents' consideration in the winter or spring, and that a System 10-year plan will ensue.

Regent Lavine reported that he suggested that the Education Committee undertake, on an experimental basis, a series of seminar meetings on the general topic of where higher education could be or should be going. Such meetings would be "think tank" sessions devoid of any specific decision purpose and designed for input only. He suggested ground rules that should apply: (a) no specific action will be or should be the objective of the seminar; (b) the gavel should be used, if necessary, to prevent even the taking of positions. The seminar would include the consideration of the literature on what other systems have done and what other people have done. Individuals of national reputation (including national figures from within the UW System) could be brought to the discussion. The consensus of the Committee was that the seminar should be tried and should be open to all Regents. The meetings would be held on Thursday evening prior to the Board of Regents meeting. Tentative topics for September and October are (a) Liberal and Career Education; (b) Shared Governance.

Regent Lavine reported the Committee was informed of two recent actions taken by the North Central Association affecting two UW units:

- 1. UW-Green Bay has received continuation of the accreditation of its undergraduate program and full accreditation of its master's (MEAS) program.
- 2. UW-Milwaukee has been informed that it has received accreditation as a mature university for the offering of doctoral programs for the next ten years.

Regent Barkla stated that in going over the Women's Studies Report, she noticed that on some of the campuses, the affirmative action officer has the responsibility for the Women's Studies Program. She stated some have affirmative action officers one-fourth time, and some one-half time, and that she felt this is something that out to be separated out if possible. Regent Lavine stated it was his understanding that in any case where affirmative action officers are handling Women's Studies matters, those persons connected with the development of Women's Studies and Academic Course work are going through the same academic process with the same kind of concerns for quality and expertise.

## REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Hales.

1. Regent Hales stated that most of the Regents were in attendance at the Committee meeting on the previous day to hear the presentation on the 1975-76 annual budget, and an opportunity was provided for each Regent to ask related questions.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Gerrard:

Resolution 1060:

That, upon recommendation of the respective Chancellors and the President of the System, the University of Wisconsin System Operating Budget for the fiscal year July 1, 1975, through June 30, 1976, in an estimated amount of \$661,619,205 (including University Hospitals approved on June 6, 1975, and auxiliary enterprises and services budgets and user charge rates approved on May 9, 1975) and including fund allocations, program adjustments, classified salaries and adjustments, and other items reflected in Book A, Regent Annual Budget Summary and Highlights, be approved; that Central Administration be authorized to make necessary final accounting changes, including any adjustments required by State bargaining agreements; and

That the budget-related unclassified personnel actions delegated to the President and Chancellors (promotions, changes of status, and salary adjustments) as presented in <u>Book B</u>, <u>Summary Report on Budget-Related Personnel and Salary Actions</u>, be confirmed, and other unclassified personnel adjustments for 1975-76 be approved, subject to selective full Board review in Executive Session on August 15.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that his amendment on the previous day had been defeated, but he continued to feel that there is a serious problem with respect to those increases in salaries in the way of merit step advancement for top administrators at a time when we are operating under severe constraints as far as faculty salaries are concerned, at a time when representations will be made to the Governor, the Legislature, and the people of the State of Wisconsin as to the effect these limitations on the faculty compensation will have on the quality of instruction. He stated he was fully aware of the fact that the top administrators have voluntarily forgone merit increases in past years and that their compensation is inadequate. He stated that he felt they are entitled to merit increases under any fair and equitable salary plan. Nevertheless, taken in the context of the total picture and the need of the University and our responsibility to advance to the faculty not only everything we can do substantively, but even symbolically, and having in mind the symbolism to the taxpayers of the State, he moved the following amendment: to add, at the end of the resolution, a comma in place of a period and add these words: and except that there shall be no merit increase in salary beyond the mandatory economic adjustment for any member of Central Administration, or any Chancellor, or Provost covered by the State Executive Salary Group Program.

The motion to amend was seconded by Regent Erdman.

Regent Hales stated that the salaries mentioned in the amendment are in the Executive Pay Plan, and he questioned whether we could transfer those funds to compensation for the faculty. Regent DeBardeleben stated it was his understanding that the merit increase money is totally discretionary—he had asked that question yesterday and it was answered in the affirmative. Senior Vice President Percy stated that he did answer that the funding for merit steps of all state agency executive pay plan designees is a separate sum sufficient appropriation to come only after the Board exercises its action. He stated we do not have permission to move that category into another category of employees. Regent

Pelisek stated that the resolution, as originally introduced, closes by indicating "subject to full Board review in Executive Session on August 15". He continued that the amendment offered by Regent DeBardeleben seems to be rather specific as to the individuals that he covers and it seems that those increases are within the selective full Board review in Executive Session language, and it would seem that since we are talking about the merits of individual members of Central Administration and Campuses, this is a far more appropriate item for Executive Session and would fall within the appropriate subject matter for Executive Session under Wisconsin's open meeting laws.

President McNamara ruled that the amendment was out of order at this time and properly ought to be discussed in Executive Session.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that he was appealing the rule of the Chair because he felt the motion was directed to a matter of policy and is not directed to a consideration of merit with respect to any individual office; so it would be a violation of the statutes and a violation of our responsibilities to attempt to consider this policy question in Closed Session.

The ruling of the Chair was sustained by a show of hands, with six Regents indicating "Aye" and five Regents indicating "No".

Regent Lavine noted that in the Committee meeting on the previous day, he raised some question about the Ethnic Studies money. He continued that his concern was that it makes no positive judgment about the program for Native Americans on the Madison Campus. He noted we are concerned with the fact that we have two groups of Native Americans in the state, about 10,000 in the Milwaukee area and another 11,000 to 12,000 essentially in the northeast and western parts of the state, and we have three or four campuses already involved in programs with Native Americans and are doing so with limited funds. He stated his concern was that instead of spending \$30,000 on the Madison Campus for that program, we might better direct that money to additional support to the few Native American Programs that we now have so that they are really solid and running before we add another campus. He stated he was going to support the program on the Madison Campus because the Native American students there number almost as many as on the three other campuses that have prime programs, and the faculty people have done a superior job of working within the academic structure to bring forth the programs. He noted it is a very exciting academic program because it is interdepartmental and will involve interdisciplinary things in a very unique way. He stated he did not feel the Legislature gave the University System nearly enough money for an effort that is long overdue, but was grateful for anything we can get and did not want to put the program in any kind of jeopardy. He stated that he hoped the campuses involved in the effort can bring further review in the next session.

The question was put on Resolution 1060, and it was voted.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1061: That, upon recommendation of the respective Chancellors and the President of the System, the 1975-76 bi-level Schedule of Student Fees-/incorporating segregated fee rates approved on May 9, 1975, and related payment/refund guidelines, be approved.

\*/ The University of Wisconsin System Schedule of 1975-76 Student Fees.

Regent Hales reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day, Vice President Lorenz discussed the Gifts, Grants, and U. S. Government Contracts for the period since the last meeting. He reviewed the life cycle of a grant to assist in understanding the process involved, noting there are 5,000 to 6,000 active accounts in the Madison Campus processing center alone. Regent Hales noted that student financial aids from the federal government for this year are up about ten million dollars from what they were in 1974-75, and referred to a grant on page 106 which is the first of its kind for this System, a federal improvement program for secondary education to the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh in the amount of \$78,880. He also pointed out that research grants total \$14,000,000 to date, compared to a total for all last year of \$76,000,000, 93% of which was for research grants and contracts to the UW-Madison alone, a real tribute to the faculty for their efforts in bringing in extramural support.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Gerrard, and it was voted:

Resolution 1062: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants, and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

Regent Hales referred to the bequest made by the late James Abrams, who bequeathed his entire estate to the University of Wisconsin without restriction. The will was contested by the sister, with the court granting her 25% of the net inventory. The remainder (approximately \$17,000) is being presented for acceptance by the Board.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1063: That the bequest of the late James F. Abrams, Calumet, Michigan, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of James F. Abrams, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest for the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales stated that the late Alice Hall bequeathed \$1,000 to be used by the University of Wisconsin-Madison for research into the cause of diabetes.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1064: That the bequest of the late Alice Hall, Pewaukee, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Alice Hall, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales reported that the late Mary Rose Kobetich bequeathed \$5,000 to the UW-Madison for assistance to worthy students in the Library School.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1065: That the bequest of the late Mary Rose Kobetich, Tacoma, Washington, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Mary Rose Kobetich, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales stated that the Committee next considered a student newspaper disclaimer to be carried in the masthead of all editions prepared by and for students in the System and subsidized by funds and facilities under the jurisdiction of the System. He noted that while an Attorney General's informal opinion was that such a disclaimer would not limit liability to the Regents, it was felt that it would at least allow readers to know that the primary responsibility for content rested with the students. He noted that Regent action is necessary to rescind earlier actions by the Board of Regents of State Universities relating to the subject since they are no longer considered appropriate or necessary.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1066; (Policy-New)

That former Wisconsin State Universities Board of Regents resolutions 3629, 3694 and 3710 relating to university newspapers be rescinded and that the following statement be carried in the masthead of all editions of those newspapers prepared by and for the students of any institution or Center campus in the University of Wisconsin System and subsidized by funds or facilities under the jurisdiction of the System or its Institutions:

The (name of paper) is written and edited by students of the University of Wisconsin-(name of campus) and they are solely responsible for its editorial policy and content.

## REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Barkla.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1067:

That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Eau Claire and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, a permanent easement be granted to the City of Eau Claire in, over and upon the following described premises, for the purpose of constructing a public bus shelter:

Part of Lot 8, Block 4, Eau Claire Lumber Company's 8th Addition to the City of Eau Claire, Eau Claire County, Wisconsin: Commencing at the SE corner of said Lot 8; thence Nly along the E line of said Lot 8, also being the W line of State Street, 52.0 ft. to the point of beginning; thence Wly at right angles 13 feet; thence Nly at right angles and parallel with the E line of said Lot 8, 12 ft; thence Ely at right angles 13 ft. to the E line of said Lot 8; thence Sly along said E line of Lot 8, 13 ft. to the point of beginning.

And, that the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the easement.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of Resolution 1068 relating to Easement for Construction and Maintenance of Boat Channel and Vehicle Access, UW-La Crosse (EXHIBIT G, attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted.

Regent Barkla stated the purpose of the next resolution is to correct a traffic and safety hazard at an intersection on the UW-Parkside Campus.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of Resolution 1069 relating to Easement for Highway Purposes, UW-Parkside (EXHIBIT H, attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Hales, and it was voted:

Resolution 1070: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-River Falls and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to lease the following property:

305 acres of farm land located in Pierce County, Wisconsin, located in close proximity to the existing Campus Laboratory Farm for UW-River Falls.

Robert H. and Mrs. H. F. Moody, Lessors 22 Cudd Court and 806 Oak Knoll Avenue River Falls, Wisconsin 54022

The 67 acres of pasture land on the Moody Farm would be leased for the period September 1, 1975, to December 31, 1975. For the period January 1, 1976 through December 31, 1976, the entire 305 acres will be used to provide 238 acres of crop land and 67 acres of pasture land for the UW-River Falls. The annual rental cost is \$5,095.

Regent Barkla reported that there had been discussion in the committee meeting on the previous day relative to negotiation and investigation of possible sale of some land at UW-Superior to the Indianhead VTAE district. She reported Chancellor Meyer affirmed the UW System's desire to cooperate with VTAE; however, it seemed that the proposal would involve the relocation of the UW-Superior football field. She reported it was pointed out by Regent Fish that at this point it appears VTAE is responsible for seeking a solution to the dilemma.

Regent Barkla reported that the Committee had received a report on Leases for UW-Extension.

Regent Barkla reported the Committee had received a report on gift-financed construction projects and that the report was laid over until further information can be obtained from the Madison Campus.

Regent Barkla stated that the next resolution is before the Board because the Building Commission had some questions about the original request in the budget for the facility, which necessitated some delay in the planning process, and that by the time the final report was received from the Building Commission and the question was resolved, the cost of construction of the facility was increased.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1071:

ry of

That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, the construction budgets for the Dairy Cattle Center (Dairy Research Barn) be increased from \$375,000 to \$463,000 and the construction budget for the Public Events Facility be increased from \$500,000 to \$656,000. Receipts from land sales, the Hill Farms receipts and gifts will be used to provide the additional funds for the projects.

Regent Barkla reported the next resolution deals with a parcel which was authorized for sale by the Board on July 12, 1974. There were three sealed bids received which were substantially above the appraisal.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 1072: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to sell the following parcel of land for \$3,150 to the high bidder, Duaine Turner:

Lot 6, Block 4, in the Lake Forest Subdivision on Field Street, Madison, Wisconsin

and that the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a deed conveying said property.

Regent Barkla reported the Board previously approved the cost of improvements on lots to be sold in the University Hill Farms-Gugel Addition and the development of the lots, and that the lots now had been authorized for sale by the State Building Commission. She noted that Regents Fish and Solberg expressed some reservations at the Committee meeting about the advisability of financing the cost of improvements prior to sale as opposed to selling the land as is, and to the advisability of handling the sales within the University administration. She reported they both voted to approve the resolution for the express purpose of raising these questions for discussion by the full Board.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek:

Resolution 1073: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, that the UW System Real Estate Officer be authorized to sell the lots in the University Hill Farms-Gugel Addition at prices not less than the minimum prices approved by the State Building Commission; and that the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign deeds conveying said lots.

Regent Solberg stated that we normally dispose of excess property by selling it to the highest bidder and do not get into the production part of it as we are doing in this instance, and it is the production process and developing land and splitting it into parcels and selling them that he objected to, plus the fact we are going to invest \$186,000 in improvements.

Regent Lavine expressed concern as to our taking on the responsibility of developing certain types of lots. Regent Erdman stated that she was impressed with the way the University Hill Farms were developed a number of years ago, and which resulted in making a small fortune for the University. In response to questions, Regent Sandin was advised that the area is zoned for single family dwellings and the \$186,000 development costs will come from land acquisition money, which had previously been approved. Regent DeBardeleben stated that if the University is going to dispose of property, it should be developed in a manner in which we can get the most amount of money out of it. He noted the Hill Farms development was remarkably successful and provided much needed revenue for research and the scholarly advancement of the University of Wisconsin at Madison, which otherwise would not have been available. Regent Neshek noted this is not buying raw land for the purpose of development, which he would oppose, but was a part of the University farms at one time, is not now being used for that purpose, and that the University should use every means available to get the maximum revenue.

The question was put on Resolution 1073, and it was voted.

Regent Barkla stated there had been a report on Family Medicine and Practice Program Facility Financing - Center for Health Sciences at UW-Madison. She stated that Regent Fish, who is a member of the Regent Committee on Medical Affairs, reported on that Committee's action to approve the proposed long-range plans for the development of additional model clinics. This approval was predicated on the assumption that the Board of Regents would be notified early in the planning of any new facility.

Regent Barkla reported that the Committee considered the Lease of Space for Northeast Family Practice Clinic-UW-Madison, but that since the entire question had not been reviewed by the UW-Madison and Central Administration, Vice President Winter stated that it was being laid over for a month. Regent Barkla reported some discussion of the situation ensued with the Health Sciences Center representatives present--Associate Vice Chancellers Lythcott and Davis, and Dr. John Renner. She stated that four firms were solicited for bids in 1973, but all

except one declined, and added that the present proposal calls for a five-year leaseback agreement with a five-year renewal option. The Department of Administration has agreed to underwrite any deficit during the first two years, and it was stated that the faculty of the Center for Health Sciences have pledged their CPP funds to cover any deficits beyond patient revenues during the balance of the period.

Regent Barkla indicated that the Committee looks favorably upon the concept as presented, subject to review of the actual lease at the September meeting.

Regent Barkla reported the Committee had received a status report on site development for Center for Health Sciences - UW-Madison. She reported Mr. Edsall indicated that he and other representatives of the UW-Madison have been working diligently with the Village of Shorewood officials to find solutions to the residents' concerns. She reported that the hearings and discussions with various groups, including the Village of Shorewood Hills, the City of Madison, and the Dane County Regional Planning Commission, have delayed completion of the environmental impact statement approval, but this has now been achieved.

Regent Barkla reported the Committee received Progress Reports on the Status of Projects, Building Commission actions, and contracts over \$25,000.

Regent Barkla reported that the next resolution has been explored thoroughly, partly because former Regent Kopp is a principal in the Platteville Cable TV Corporation.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg:

Resolution 1074: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Platteville Chancellor and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System the agreement for use of the UW-Platteville Pioneer Tower by Platteville Cable TV Corporation for installation of microwave antenna and related equipment be approved and that the Vice President for Administration be authorized to sign the agreement.

Regent DeBardeleben noted that this matter was referred to in the agenda material by Vice President Winter as being something that should be discussed confidentially, and he gathered the Committee overruled him on that since it was discussed in open session. Regent Barkla stated that all the committee members expressed concern to the Chairman that it ought to be brought to the open session. Regent Erdman noted that it states in the contract that the UW-Platteville will provide the electricity to operate the station and then provides that the permittee shall be responsible for all costs including maintenance and operation. She questioned whether or not electricity was a cost. She was advised that it would cost more for us to bill for the electricity than to absorb it as the figure amounts to approximately \$1.50 a month.

The question was put on Resolution 1074, and it was voted, with Regent Walter abstaining from voting.

Regent Barkla stated the next item was discussed in Executive Session as it relates to acquisition of additional land for the circulation of traffic at the Center for Health Sciences, UW-Madison, site. She pointed out that the plans for the entrance to the Health Center have been changed as a result of discussions with the Village of Shorewood Hills, the Dane County Regional Planning Commission, and the State Highway Department, and as a result of the modification of the Health Center development from a four-stage to a two-stage project. It is believed that this new proposal is superior to earlier ones; however, it does require the acquisition of three lots on University Bay Drive.

She reported that Mr. Edsall affirmed that the original entrance plan could be implemented, although it has drawbacks in that it would not manage the traffic as well as the new design and it would not satisfy the concerns of Shorewood's residents or the other agencies involved in the planning. Regent Barkla noted that since provision for land acquisition was not made in the Center's estimated project cost that has now been authorized in the capital budget, funds for the purchase of these lots will have to come from the allocation for "advanced land acquisition". Regent Williams inquired if there are buildings on these lots, and was advised in the affirmative, and that the Board has to approve authorization for the real estate officer to get appraisals and negotiate for the acquisition of these pieces of property.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 1075: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Madison and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to the System Real Estate Officer to secure appraisals and negotiate the acquisition, subject to the approval of the State Building Commission, of the following parcels of land for circulation development for the Center for Health Sciences:

905, 907 and 911 University Bay Drive, Village of Shorewood Hills

THE REPORT OF THE SPECIAL REGENT MEDICAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

The report of the Special Regent Medical Affairs Committee was presented by Regent Pelisek.

Regent Pelisek reported the Committee met on the previous day and there was a discussion and approval of the concept of the final summary for the Family Medicine and Practice Centers which the Center for Health Sciences is developing in various places throughout the State. He noted the Regent Physical Planning and Development Committee had been faced with a number of requests for leases of these facilities and had suggested that it would be appropriate for the Special Regent Committee on Medical Affairs to review the overall concept of the Family Medicine and Practice Centers. In answer to that request the staff of the Center for Health Sciences prepared such planning summaries. He reported that planning

summary was discussed in substantial detail and at the conclusion of that discussion the concept of the planning document was approved, subject to approval of the specific locations by the Madison Campus Administration and by Central Administration. He stated this does not require Board action, but there will, of course, be specific Board action on each lease as it is negotiated. He reported there was brief discussion of the Madison Northeast Center, but no action was taken. It was the view of the Committee that specific leases would fall appropriately within the purview of the Physical Planning and Development Committee.

### UNFINISHED AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Regent Williams noted that several of the subjects mentioned by the Board of Visitors merited further study. President McNamara stated that the report was referred to the Central Administration for consideration and report back to the Board.

Regent Lavine noted that the Education Committee, at their meeting in September, will deal with programs and accomplishments of the campuses for 1974-75, and the proposed objectives for 1975-76, and stated that he hoped that the Regents would convey to Senior Vice President Smith or to him suggestions of the areas in which they have interests, so that the campuses could be alerted as to those kinds of questions which may require either their bringing special information or having different people here than would normally be here.

Regent Solberg noted that at the River Falls meeting he had made the suggestion that we give consideration to setting up a fifth standing committee on Personnel. He stated that his concern is, now that we are facing a financial crisis, there is going to be some spin-off of problems and suggested that we start getting ready for more of this type of work. He noted the Regent Education Committee will have to try to figure out how they are going to meet the educational needs on a quality basis with inadequate funds and limited budget, and that with inadequate funding for compensation of faculty, there is more and more probability of collective bargaining and that we should have a standing committee that would develop some degree of expertise in this one area. President McNamara suggested that the matter be referred to the Executive Committee for a more detailed discussion and analysis.

Regent Solberg moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1076: That the matter of the creation of a fifth Regent Committee, a personnel committee, be referred to the Executive Committee for detailed study and report back to the Board.

Chancellor Haas presented the Report of the Council of Chancellors. Chancellor Haas reported that the Council of Chancellors had met on the previous day and considered an inquiry from Central Administration relating to the matter of the establishment of systemwide grievance procedures for affirmative action

items and whether or not there should be campus committees. He stated the Council voted unanimously that these be retained as campus grievance procedures, rather than systemwide. Regent Lavine inquired if it is the vision of the Chancellors that there would be some provision for appeal of decisions somewhere outside the campus, other than through the courts. Senior Vice President Smith responded that the situation in which we find ourselves is not simply an appeal to the courts, but also agencies of the state and federal government that are specifically charged with employment opportunity enforcement, and that the situation we now face is one of multiplicity of appeals, and the general feeling of the Chancellors was that to elaborate on the appeals procedure within the campus, with another appeals procedure within the System, and the likelihood of a third appeal going on with an external agency, would complicate the problem rather than resolve it.

Chancellor Haas reported that the Council of Chancellors elected new officers, with Chancellor Young to be Chairman, Chancellor Dreyfus Chairman Designate, and Chancellor Fort as Secretary.

(The meeting recessed at 11:40 A.M. and resumed in Executive Session at 12:34 P.M. to consider personnel matters.)

(The meeting reconvened at 3:25 P.M.)

President McNamara announced that the following resolutions had been adopted in Executive Session:

Resolution 1077: That the 1975-76 budget-related personnel actions requiring specific Regent review be approved.

Resolution 1078: That, upon recommendation of the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, Dr. Michael J. Stolee be appointed Dean of the School of Education and Professor of Educational Administration at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaykee, effective September 15, 1975, at an annual salary of \$34,500.

President McNamara reported that the Board discussed other personnel matters but took no formal action.

The meeting adjourned at 3:26 P.M.



## Restatement of Policy on Equal Employment Opportunity

The Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System has from time-to-time issued various policies dealing with Affirmative Action and Equal Employment Opportunity. (Resolution 200 - Nepotism Policy; Resolution 235 - Equal Employment Opportunity offices and Affirmative Action Programs for Minorities; Resolution 506 - Sick Leave Policy.)

The following policy and guidelines are congruent with and are hereby issued to supplement and update those policies.

Resolution 1051:

#### Part I - Policy Statement

WHEREAS, it is and continues to be the policy of the University of Wisconsin System to adopt and support measures designed to prevent and eliminate discrimination against employees and prospective employees of the University of Wisconsin System on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, or physical handicap; and

WHEREAS, as a part of this policy the University of Wisconsin System is committed to the implementation of affirmative action employment programs to recruit, employ, and promote qualified women and minorities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System that the System administrators and the University faculties continue to take such steps as may be necessary to accelerate the final elimination of any and all vestiges of discrimination because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, or physical handicap that may still exist in the employment policies, practices and/or procedures of the University of Wisconsin System.

Part II - Guidelines for Policy Implementation
Basic Requirements

#### Each Institution Shall:

- 1. Examine all employment policies, practices, and procedures dealing with recruiting, interviewing, testing, screening, selection, placement, classification, evaluation, transfer, promotion, training, compensation, fringe benefits, layoffs, and terminations for discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, or physical handicap and take remedial action to correct such discrimination if found to exist.
- 2. Maintain a written affirmative action plan for the recruitment, employment, and promotion of women and minorities in accordance with System Affirmative Action guidelines and Federal and State laws. Make the plan readily available for reference in campus libraries and affirmative action offices. Make summaries of affirmative action plans available for distribution upon request or through campus publications. Update the plan as necessary to keep it current. Prepare affirmative action progress reports for distribution at least once a year.
- 3. Establish an affirmative action committee (or committees as appropriate) which include faculty, academic staff, classified employees, and students to advise the administration on affirmative action needs and concerns.
- 4. Establish and publish effective grievance procedures for addressing discrimination complaints.

#### The Affirmative Action Plan

The Plan shall contain as a minimum the following components:

- A policy reflecting the institution's commitment to equal employment opportunity and an account of when, how, and to whom it is distributed.
- 2. A description of who is responsible for the implementation and monitoring of the affirmative action plan, including the specific responsibilities of the Affirmative Action staff, institutional administrators, deans, department chairpersons, and line supervisors.
- 3. A description of the procedures established for monitoring the plan and for measuring program effectiveness.
- 4. A description of the affirmative action procedures to be followed in the recruitment, employment, and promotion of women and minorities.
- 5. A profile of the number and percent of women and minority employees by department, rank, and/or classification.
- 6. The identification of the underrepresentation of women and minorities by department, rank, and/or classification.

  (Underrepresentation is defined as having fewer women and/or minorities in a particular department, rank, or classification then would be reasonably expected by their availability.)
- 7. Identification of availability data sources used for measuring underrepresentation.
- 8. The establishment of realistic goals and timetables relative to expected accretion potentials for overcoming the underutilization of women and minorities.

- 9. A review of promotional patterns to determine if the rate of advancement for women and minorities as a group has been equal to that of other employees as a group.
- 10. An account of the procedures by which salary equity is measured and maintained.
- 11. A description of training programs designed to assist in the promotion of women and minorites.

A system affirmative action progress report shall be made annually to the Board of Regents through the System President.

#### FINDING OF EMERGENCY

The Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System finds that the attached rules are necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace and safety. A statement of the facts constituting the emergency is:

During the last football season there were several incidents of bottle throwing at UW-Madison football games. During recent months, two bottle throwing criminal cases involving incidents occurring during the last football season were dismissed from Court because the Judge determined that there was no existing law to prohibit this type of conduct. If this situation is allowed to continue, the likelihood of spectator or player injury is high in any spectator facility in the System.

The rules are therefore adopted as emergency rules to take effect on September 12, 1975, following publication and filing with the Secretary of State and the Revisor of Statutes, as provided in section 227.027, Wis. Stats.

#### Order of the Board of Regents of The University of Wisconsin System Adopting Emergency Rules

Pursuant to authority vested in the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System by section 36.11(1)(a), Wis. Stats., the Board of Regents hereby adopts emergency rules as follows:

Sections UW 1.07(24) and (25) of the Wisconsin Administrative Code are adopted to read:

UW 1.07(24) Containers in Spectator Facilities. It is unlawful for any person to carry or possess any disposable container within the confines of public areas in spectator facilities. As used in this subsection, "disposable container" means any bottle, metal can, or other container designed or used for carrying liquids or solids but does not include a personally-owned container designed for reuse and originally sold or purchased as a refillable container. The provisions of this section shall not apply to containers purchased from authorized concessionaries who are required to dispense beverages to consumers in either paper or plastic containers.

UW 1.07(25) Throwing or dropping of any hard object, bottle, metal can, container, or other item of a similar nature within the confines of spectator facilities is prohibited and is subject to the penalties of section UW 1.08.

The rules contained herein shall take effect on September 12, 1975 and remain in effect for a period of 120 days, pursuant to authority granted by section 227.027(1). Wis. Stats., as emergency rules.

#### REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

Resolution 1053:

That, upon recommendation of the Senior Vice President of the UW System, the Board of Regents approves a delay in the final action on the Student Disciplinary Guidelines under the following time schedule and assumptions:

- 1. Central Administration and the Board of Regents will receive further recommendations for specific amendments to the draft Guidelines stemming from testimony received at the public hearing on June 20, 1975, with such recommendations to be submitted, in writing, on or before November 1, 1975\* to the Office of Academic Affairs, 1668 Van Hise Hall, University of Wisconsin System, c/o Associate Vice President Adolph Y. Wilburn.
- 2. During the first semester, 1975-76, institutional student governments, associations, or other organizations interested in the Guidelines will work with campus administration and the faculty in developing discussions directed toward interpreting and clarifying the meaning and implications of the Guidelines.
- 3. Amendments received shall be reviewed by Central Administration and representatives of the committee developing the draft Guidelines, and that recommendations for the incorporation or other disposition of amendments received shall be prepared for the Regents, and
- 4. Final action by the Regents on the Guidelines will be scheduled for the January, 1976 meeting of the Board of Regents, with opportunity for discussion provided at the time of final action.

- C. An amendment has been signed, dated May 7, 1975, to Publisher Agreement of August 20, 1973 between Addison-Wesley Publishing Company and the Board of Regents (UW Madison, IGE Teacher Education Project funded by Sears-Roebuck Foundation). This amendment revises the schedule of royalties to be paid to the University for the right to publish and

market printed and audiovisual materials for teacher education programs of Individually Guided Education. (Amendment signed by Vice President and Controller.)

- D. An agreement has been signed between Agents Assistance Corporation of Wisconsin, Inc. and the Board of Regents for the benefit of the University of Wisconsin Madison, Division of Intercollegiate Athletics, for the period August 15, 1975 through August 14, 1976, providing for telecasting by Agents Assistance Corporation of intercollegiate athletic events. AAC agrees to pay the University \$1,000 per athletic contest or event televised, with a minimum of \$11,000 to be paid during period of agreement. - I. An agreement between the Board of Regents and Mr. Arthur L. Miller, Jr., relating to the security resident at the Physical Sciences Laboratory, UW Madison, has been signed.
- J. An agreement between the Board of Regents and Mr. Delmore Henning which provides for an extension of current arrangements relating to the Arboretum security residence, UW Madison, has been signed.
- K. An agreement between Drs. John McKichan and Charles Steidinger and the Board of Regents covering the provision of student health services on the campus at UW - Platteville for the 1975-76 academic year and the 1976 summer session has been signed. The cost of this service is \$17,165.

1973, be rescinded. Resolution 556 reads as follows:

Resolution 556: That Resolution 80, approved February 11, 1972, be (Policy - rescinded, and that the following resolution in lieu thereof be approved:

That the President of the University of Wisconsin System be authorized to approve, on behalf of the Regents, personnel actions involving staff in or for positions other than central vice presidents, provost, unit chancellors, and vice provosts (chancellor); and that the President be authorized to delegate such authority, with the following provisions:

That, prior to authorizing recruitment to fill any academic staff position for which the planned rate of pay exceeds the maximum annual salary equivalent in Group 5 of the State Executive Pay Plan, the President shall furnish the Board with a description of the position and a justification of the salary range assigned to it. Unless a Regent requests that the appointee be considered by the Board, the President may authorize recruitment and report its subsequent accomplishment to the Board; and

# SUMMARY MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING of the BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

## Madison, Wisconsin

Held in the Clarke Smith Room, 1820 Van Hise Hall Friday, August 15, 1975, 9:00 A.M.

## President McNamara presiding.

PRESENT: Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Erdman, Gerrard, Hales, Lavine,

McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Solberg, Thompson, Walter, and

Williams.

ABSENT: Regents Fish and Zancanaro.

Upon motion by Regent Pelisek, seconded by Regent Sandin, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on June 6, 1975, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

# A. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

- 1. The remarks of President McNamara, relating primarily to the budget and its effect on the future of education in the State of Wisconsin will be found in the full minutes on file in each library.
- Associate Vice Chancellor for Health Sciences, read the following report made by President John C. Weaver's physician, Dr. Ernest Reynolds, dated August 14, 1975: "President John Weaver sustained a heart attack in the early morning hours of July 25 and was admitted to the coronary care units of University Hospitals on the same day. The case was uncomplicated and he has had good recovery. His blood pressure is lower than prior to his heart attack but is stable and this does not cause difficulty. He was discharged from the University Hospitals on Friday, August 8, and is expected to remain at his home for a minimum of three weeks of progressive ambulation. Assuming no complications, President Weaver will resume his duties sometime in September." Dr. Lythcott stated that he had conferred with Dr. Reynolds this morning and Dr. Weaver's blood pressure returned to normal yesterday for the first time.

3. Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1049: Whereas, Frank J. Pelisek of Milwaukee served as president of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for two years, from July 1973 to July 1975, following a one-year term as vice president, and

Whereas, his broad knowledge gained as chief architect of the 1973 university merger law, and his wisdom, wit, energy, fairness and parliamentary skills served Wisconsin well as he led this Board and University System to a position of national prominence in higher education; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved, That his fellow Regents commend and thank Mr. Pelisek for his dedicated and excellent service as an officer of this Board during the last three of its four years of existence.

4. Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 1050: Whereas, Bjarne R. Ullsvik retired on August 10, 1975, from his administrative duties at the University of Wisconsin-Platteville, where he served as President and Chancellor for 17 years, and will remain on the faculty as Distinguished Professor of Mathematics, and

Whereas, during his tenure as chief executive officer he guided the campus as it more than tripled in enrollment, merged with the Wisconsin Institute of Technology, constructed a branch campus at Richland Center, developed a graduate program, improved its undergraduate offerings, and became part of the University of Wisconsin System,

Be It Resolved, that, on behalf of past and present Regents who have worked with Dr. Ullsvik since 1958, we hereby record our deep appreciation for his many contributions, and for those of his equally dedicated wife, Lucille, to the University of Wisconsin-Platteville.

5. President McNamara noted that he had received an invitation from the Board of Regents of the University of Minnesota to meet with them on Friday and Saturday, November 21-22, and if there were no objections, he would respond to that invitation in the affirmative.

President McNamara also announced the meeting of the Association of Governing Boards Workshop in Minneapolis on October 6 and 7, to discuss the Board's role in financial and academic policy. He requested that any Regent wishing to attend advise the Secretary.

- 6. President McNamara introduced Mr. Anthony Brewster of the Board of Visitors who reviewed in some detail the report of the Board of Visitors. His remarks will be found in detail in the full minutes on file in each library.
- 7. At the request of President McNamara, Regent Pelisek discussed the status of the Academic Staff Personnel Rules. He noted there had been a public hearing on the rules during the month of June, at which time a number of comments were directed at the substance and certain technical provisions of those rules. During the period of time subsequent to that hearing, a number of modifications were made and suggested drafts to those rules, and it was hoped that a final amended form of those rules would be available for action by this Board today. However, within the last several days a matter has come up which had been somewhat overlooked, a matter of such substance with the rules that it was felt appropriate that action be deferred until the September meeting. He stated that the Academic Staff Personnel Rules will not be presented today, but will be presented at the September 12 meeting and distributed to the Board members well in advance of that meeting for their review and consideration.
- 8. At the request of President McNamara, Senior Vice President Percy reviewed the Affirmative Action Progress and Status Report and responded to questions relating thereto. The full discussion will be found in the minutes on file in each library.
- 9. Regent Pelisek moved adoption of Resolution 1051 relating to Restatement of Policy on Equal Employment Opportunity (EXHIBIT A, attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Hales, and it was voted.
- 10. Regent Pelisek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and after some discussion, it was voted:

Resolution 1052: That the attached Finding of Emergency and Order Adopting Emergency Rules (EXHIBIT B, attached) concerning limiting types of containers which may be brought into spectator facilities and prohibiting throwing or dropping hard objects in such facilities, be adopted; and that the Secretary is instructed to publish the attached Finding and Order in the official state newspaper, file certified copies of the emergency rules with the Secretary of State and the Revisor of Statutes, and to mail copies of the emergency rules to each member of the legislature.

- 11. Regent Pelisek moved adoption of Resolution 1053 relating to Student Disciplinary Guidelines (EXHIBIT C, attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted.
- 12. Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1054: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record (EXHIBIT D, on file) be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

The Committee received the recommendation, reviewed the findings of the Regent selection committee, and voted 5 to 0 to approve the appointment of Dr. Guskin.

Vice President Neshek moved that the following resolution adopted by the Executive Committee be confirmed and approved, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1048: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, Dr. Alan E. Guskin be appointed Chancellor of the UW-Parkside effective September 1, 1975, at an annual salary rate set within State Executive Salary Group 7 and to be specified in the 1975-76 annual budget.

#### C. REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

- Regent Lavine stated that in the committee meeting on the previous day Senior Vice President Donald Smith commented that the report entitled Women's Studies Development in the University of Wisconsin System, 1974-75, was an excellent review of campus activity during the past year. He noted Regent Walter remarked favorably about the fact that the various campuses had taken different approaches to the matter.
- Regent Lavine noted that there had also been a progress report: Student Evaluation of Instruction at UW Institutions, which is an update of the December 10, 1974, report reflecting and summarizing institutional progress reports received by Central Administration in response to Regent policy on student evaluation of instruction. The opinion was expressed that no university system in the nation has in place as complete a system for student input. There will be a report after July, 1976, when final and complete plans of each campus are to be in place.
- 3. Regent Lavine noted that passage of the following resolution carried with it the understanding that certification programs would come from Central Administration every four years to determine that they either will or will not be resubmitted to the Department of Public Instruction for continued approval as licensing programs. Such determination would be based upon such factors as cost, resource utilization, mission compatibility, and program duplication.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1055: That, upon recommendation of the Senior Vice President of the UW System, Academic Information Series I (ACIS-1), Revised, approved December 6, 1974, be amended as follows to include graduate and undergraduate teacher education and other school professional certification programs:

# Page 2, under Academic Program Changes and Related Policies: Is Action Required? Add:

Establish Certification Program\*\*\*

Action required: by Institution, Yes
by Central Administration, Yes
by Regents, IO

\*\*\*Refers to graduate and undergraduate course configurations, not identified as degree programs, which are designed for submission to the Department of Public Instruction for approval.

- Regent Lavine reported that in the committee meeting on the previous day there had been a report made by Senior Vice President Smith on allocation of 1975-76 American Ethnic Studies Program Funds.
- Regent Lavine reported that Senior Vice President Smith also spoke briefly of the Office of Academic Affairs Goals, 1975-76, and the report on activities of the Office of Academic Affairs for 1974-75.
- 6. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:
- Resolution 1056: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellors and Faculties of the Institutions involved, the following new academic programs be approved with an effective implementation date of Fall, 1975:
  - (1) Joint Master of Business Administration, UW-Eau Claire and UW-La Crosse
  - (2) Master of Education in Professional Development, UW-La Crosse
  - (3) B.S. in Behavioral Science and Law, UW-Madison
  - (4) B.S. in Medical Record Administration, UW-Milwaukee
  - (5) B.S./B.A. in Radio-TV-Film, UW-Oshkosh (6) B.S. in Criminal Justice, UW-Oshkosh

  - B.S. in Engineering Technology, UW-Parkside

- Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:
- That, for their many years of dedicated service on the faculties Resolution 1057: of institutions in the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents commends and extends good wishes to those members who have been granted emeritus status by the President and the Chancellors. (Copy of Emeritus Designations on file with the papers of this meeting)
- Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:
- That, upon recommendation of the Senior Vice President of the UW Resolution 1058: System and the respective Chancellors, the Board of Regents approves the 1976-77 Academic Year Calendars as shown on the attached sheet. (EXHIBIT E)

Regent Lavine reported that in the committee meeting on the previous day Senior Vice President Donald Smith reviewed Academic Program Audit and Review: Progress to Date and Plans for the Future. The report contained:

1. A statement providing the context for audit and review activity.

2. A summary of the undergraduate and extension program audit and Appendix A -Progress Report on audit and review of undergraduate programs with audit and review flow charts for each institution.

3. A summary of Phase II of the Masters/Specialist Audit and Appendix B - Consortium

and institution reports on Phase II of the Masters/Specialist Audit.

A summary of action on the doctoral program audit and Appendix C - Reports from UW-Madison and UW-Milwaukee on doctoral audit and review procedures.

- 5. A consideration of the goals and means for triggering special lateral program audits, together with a short rationale for each of the three audits which Central Administration proposes to carry out in 1975-76.
- Regent Lavine moved adoption of Resolution 1059 relating to rescission 10. of Resolution 556, since it is no longer a legal requirement that the Education Committee and the Board of Regents at each meeting take the pro forma action of approving "the personnel actions taken by the President of the UW System" since those approved at the last previous meeting (EXHIBIT F, attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted. (NOTE: According to Senior Vice President Percy, following the Board meeting it was discovered that the above rescission was in error, and Resolution 556 will be reinstituted in slightly modified form at the next meeting,)
- Regent Lavine reported that in the committee meeting on the previous day Senior Vice President Smith mentioned new agreements between UW-Superior and Northland College and between UW-Whitewater and Milton College with respect to ROTC programming. He reported that Associate Vice President Dallas Peterson announced the organization of a Systemwide Health Sciences Advisory Council, consisting of 21 members, including seven from institutions and agencies outside the UW System.

Regent Lavine stated that he had referred in his recent letter to the Education Committee members and all Board members soliciting suggestions for topics for informational presentations before the Committee. He stated that the programs should include all campuses and deal with the content and practice of instruction. He reported there was envisioned a sort of round-robin of the System with a chance to hear from an outstanding professor from each campus actually teaching some of his subject matter. He reported that Sr. Vice President Smith expressed enthusiasm for the idea, pointing to the desirability of having contact with outstanding professors in the context of what they do that makes them successful. He continued that it was the consensus of the Committee that the Board should be informed of the intent of the Education Committee to arrange for informational programming dealing with professors' teaching and research. The Chancellors may expect that Vice President Smith in concert with the Committee will be contacting them regarding the identification of appropriate professorial staff to be involved.

Regent Lavine reported that the campuses are in the process of generating 10-year plans which will be major documents brought for Regents' consideration in the winter or spring, and that a System 10-year plan will ensue.

Regent Lavine reported that he suggested that the Education Committee undertake, on an experimental basis, a series of seminar meetings on the general topic of where higher education could be or should be going. Such meetings would be "think tank" sessions devoid of any specific decision purpose and designed for input only. He suggested ground rules that should apply: (a) no specific action will be or should be the objective of the seminar; (b) the gavel should be used, if necessary, to prevent even the taking of positions. The seminar would include the consideration of the literature on what other systems have done and what other people have done. Individuals of national reputation (including national figures from within the UW System) could be brought to the discussion. The consensus of the Committee was that the seminar should be tried and should be open to all Regents. The meetings would be held on Thursday evening prior to the Board of Regents meeting. Tentative topics for September and October are (a) Liberal and Career Education; (b) Shared Governance.

Regent Lavine reported the Committee was informed of two recent actions taken by the North Central Association affecting two UW units:

- 1. UW-Green Bay has received continuation of the accreditation of its undergraduate program and full accreditation of its master's (MEAS) program.
- 2. UW-Milwaukee has been informed that it has received accreditation as a mature university for the offering of doctoral programs for the next ten years.

#### D. REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

and

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Hales.

1. Regent Hales stated that most of the Regents were in attendance at the Committee meeting on the previous day to hear the presentation on the 1975-76 annual budget, and an opportunity was provided for each Regent to ask related questions.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Gerrard:

Resolution 1060: That, upon recommendation of the respective Chancellors and the President of the System, the University of Wisconsin System Operating Budget for the fiscal year July 1, 1975, through June 30, 1976, in an estimated amount of \$661,619,205 (including University Hospitals approved on June 6, 1975, and auxiliary enterprises and services budgets and user charge rates approved on May 9, 1975) and including fund allocations, program adjustments, classified salaries and adjustments, and other items reflected in Book A, Regent Annual Budget Summary and Highlights, be approved; that Central Administration be authorized to make necessary final accounting changes, including any adjustments required by State bargaining agreements;

(MORE)

That the budget-related unclassified personnel actions delegated to the President and Chancellors (promotions, changes of status, and salary adjustments) as presented in Book B, Summary Report on Budget-Related Personnel and Salary Actions, be confirmed, and other unclassified personnel adjustments for 1975-76 be approved, subject to selective full Board review in Executive Session on August 15.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that his amendment on the previous day had been defeated, but he continued to feel that there is a serious problem with respect to those increases in salaries in the way of merit step advancement for top administrators at a time when we are operating under severe constraints as far as faculty salaries are concerned, at a time when representations will be made to the Governor, the Legislature, and the people of the State of Wisconsin as to the effect these limitations on the faculty compensation will have on the quality of instruction. He stated he was fully aware of the fact that the top administrators have voluntarily forgone merit increases in past years and that their compensation is inadequate. He stated that he felt they are entitled to merit increases under any fair and equitable salary plan. Nevertheless, taken in the context of the total picture and the need of the University and our responsibility to advance to the faculty not only everything we can do substantively, but even symbolically, and having in mind the symbolism to the taxpayers of the State, he moved the following amendment: to add, at the end of the resolution, a comma in place of a period and add these words: and except that there shall be no merit increase in salary beyond the mandatory economic adjustment for any member of Central Administration, or any Chancellor, or Provost covered by the State Executive Sálary Group Program.

The motion to amend was seconded by Regent Erdman. After a short discussion, President McNamara ruled that the amendment was out of order and properly should be discussed in Executive Session. Regent DeBardeleben appealed the ruling of the Chair, stating that he felt that the motion was directed to a matter of policy and is not directed to a consideration of merit with respect to any individual office. He stated he felt it would be a violation of the statutes and would be a violation of the Board's responsibilities to consider this policy question in closed session.

The ruling of the Chair was sustained by a show of hands, with six Regents indicating "Aye" and five Regents indicating "No".

After further discussion, the question was put on Resolution 1060, and it was voted.

- 2. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:
- Resolution 1061: That, upon recommendation of the respective Chancellors and the President of the System, the 1975-76 bi-level Schedule of Student Fees-/incorporating segregated fee rates approved on May 9, 1975, and related payment/refund guidelines, be approved.
  - \*/ The University of Wisconsin System Schedule of 1975-76 Student Fees.

3. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Gerrard, and it was voted:

Resolution 1062: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants, and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

4. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1063: That the bequest of the late James F. Abrams, Calumet, Michigan, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of James F. Abrams, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest for the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

5. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1064: That the bequest of the late Alice Hall, Pewaukee, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Alice Hall, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

6. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1065: That the bequest of the late Mary Rose Kobetich, Tacoma, Washington, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Mary Rose Kobetich, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

7. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1066: (Policy-New)

That former Wisconsin State Universities Board of Regents resolutions 3629, 3694 and 3710 relating to university newspapers be rescinded and that the following statement be carried in the masthead of all editions of those newspapers prepared by and for the students of any institution or Center campus in the University of Wisconsin System and subsidized by funds or facilities under the jurisdiction of the System or its Institutions:

The (name of paper) is written and edited by students of the University of Wisconsin-(name of campus) and they are solely responsible for its editorial policy and content.

E. REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Barkla.

1. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1067: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Eau Claire and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, a permanent easement be granted to the City of Eau Claire in, over and upon the following described premises, for the purpose of constructing a public bus

shelter:

Part of Lot 8, Block 4, Eau Claire Lumber Company's 8th Addition to the City of Eau Claire, Eau Claire County, Wisconsin: Commencing at the SE corner of said Lot 8; thence Nly along the E line of said Lot 8, also being the W line of State Street, 52.0 ft. to the point of beginning; thence Wly at right angles 13 feet; thence Nly at right angles and parallel with the E line of said Lot 8, 12 ft; thence Ely at right angles 13 ft. to the E line of said Lot 8; thence Sly along said E line of Lot 8, 13 ft. to the point of beginning.

And, that the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the easement.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of Resolution 1068 relating to Easement for Construction and Maintenance of Boat Channel and Vehicle Access, UW-La Crosse (EXHIBIT G, attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted.

- 3. Regent Barkla moved adoption of Resolution 1069 relating to Easement for Highway Purposes, UW-Parkside (EXHIBIT H, attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted.
- 4. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Hales, and it was voted:

Resolution 1070: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-River Falls and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to lease the following property:

305 acres of farm land located in Pierce County, Wisconsin, located in close proximity to the existing Campus Laboratory Farm for UW-River Falls.

Robert H. and Mrs. H. F. Moody, Lessors 22 Cudd Court and 806 Oak Knoll Avenue River Falls, Wisconsin 54022

The 67 acres of pasture land on the Moody Farm would be leased for the period September 1, 1975, to December 31, 1975. For the period January 1, 1976 through December 31, 1976, the entire 305 acres will be used to provide 238 acres of crop land and 67 acres of pasture land for the UW-River Falls. The annual rental cost is \$5,095.

- 5. Regent Barkla reported that there had been discussion in the committee meeting on the previous day relative to negotiation and investigation of possible sale of some land at UW-Superior to the Indianhead VTAE district. She reported Chancellor Meyer affirmed the UW System's desire to cooperate with VTAE; however, it seemed that the proposal would involve the relocation of the UW-Superior football field. She reported it was pointed out by Regent Fish that at this point it appears VTAE is responsible for seeking a solution to the dilemma.
- 6. Regent Barkla reported that the Committee had received a report on Leases for UW-Extension.
- 7. Regent Barkla reported the Committee had received a report on gift-financed construction projects and that the report was laid over until further information can be obtained from the Madison Campus.

8. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1071: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, the construction budgets for the Dairy Cattle Center (Dairy Research Barn) be increased from \$375,000 to \$463,000 and the construction budget for the Public Events Facility be increased from \$500,000 to \$656,000. Receipts from land sales, the Hill Farms receipts and gifts will be used to provide the additional funds for the projects.

9. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 1072: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to sell the following parcel of land for \$3,150 to the high bidder, Duaine Turner:

Lot 6, Block 4, in the Lake Forest Subdivision on Field Street, Madison, Wisconsin

and that the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a deed conveying said property.

10. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek:

Resolution 1073: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, that the UW System Real Estate Officer be authorized to sell the lots in the University Hill Farms-Gugel Addition at prices not less than the minimum prices approved by the State Building Commission; and that the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign deeds conveying said lots.

Regent Solberg stated that we normally dispose of property by selling it to the highest bidder, we do not get into the production part of the business, which in this instance is splitting it into parcels and selling them. He also noted that we are going to invest \$186,000 in the development. Regent Lavine expressed concern as to our taking on the responsibility of developing certain kinds of lots. After further discussion, the question was put on the resolution, and it was voted.

- 11. Regent Barkla stated there had been a report on Family Medicine and Practice Program Facility Financing Center for Health Sciences at UW-Madison. She stated that Regent Fish, who is a member of the Regent Committee on Medical Affairs, reported on that Committee's action to approve the proposed long-range plans for the development of additional model clinics. This approval was predicated on the assumption that the Board of Regents would be notified early in the planning of any new facility.
- 12. Regent Barkla reported that the Committee considered the Lease of Space for Northeast Family Practice Clinic-UW-Madison, but that since the entire question had not been reviewed by the UW-Madison and Central Administration, Vice President Winter stated that it was being laid over for a month.
- 13. Regent Barkla reported the Committee had received a status report on site development for Center for Health Sciences UW-Madison. She reported Mr. Edsall indicated that he and other representatives of the UW-Madison have been working diligently with the Village of Shorewood officials to find solutions to the residents' concerns.
- 14. Regent Barkla reported the Committee received Progress Reports on the Status of Projects, Building Commission actions, and contracts over \$25,000.
- 15. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg:
- Resolution 1074: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Platteville Chancellor and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System the agreement for use of the UW-Platteville Pioneer Tower by Platteville Cable TV Corporation for installation of microwave antenna and related equipment be approved and that the Vice President for Administration be authorized to sign the agreement.

Regent DeBardeleben noted that this matter was referred to in the agenda material by Vice President Winter as being something that should be discussed confidentially, and he gathered the Committee overruled him on that since it was discussed in open session. Regent Barkla stated that all the committee members expressed concern to the Chairman that it ought to be brought to the open session. After a short discussion, the question was put on Resolution 1074, and it was voted, with Regent Walter abstaining from voting.

16. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 1075: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Madison and the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to the System Real Estate Officer to secure appraisals and negotiate the acquisition, subject to the approval of the State Building Commission, of the following parcels of land for circulation development for the Center for Health Sciences:

905, 907 and 911 University Bay Drive, Village of Shorewood Hills

### F. THE REPORT OF THE SPECIAL REGENT MEDICAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

The report of the Special Regent Medical Affairs Committee was presented by Regent Pelisek.

Regent Pelisek reported the Committee met on the previous day and there was a discussion and approval of the concept of the final summary for the Family Medicine and Practice Centers which the Center for Health Sciences is developing in various places throughout the State. He noted the Regent Physical Planning and Development Committee had been faced with a number of requests for leases of these facilities and had suggested that it would be appropriate for the Special Regent Committee on Medical Affairs to review the overall concept of the Family Medicine and Practice Centers. In answer to that request the staff of the Center for Health Sciences prepared such planning summaries. He reported that planning summary was discussed in substantial detail and at the conclusion of that discussion the concept of the planning document was approved, subject to approval of the specific locations by the Madison Campus Administration and by Central Administration. He stated this does not require Board action, but there will, of course, be specific Board action on each lease as it is negotiated. He reported there was brief discussion of the Madison Northeast Center, but no action was taken. It was the view of the Committee that specific leases would fall appropriately within the purview of the Physical Planning and Development Committee.

# G. UNFINISHED AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

- 1. Regent Williams noted that several of the subjects mentioned by the Board of Visitors merited further study. President McNamara stated that the report was referred to the Central Administration for consideration and report back to the Board.
- 2. Regent Lavine noted that the Education Committee, at their meeting in September, will deal with programs and accomplishments of the campuses for 1974-75, and the proposed objectives for 1975-76, and stated that he hoped that the Regents would convey to Senior Vice President Smith or to him suggestions of the areas in which they have interests, so that the campuses could be alerted as to those kinds of questions which may require either their bringing special information or having different people here than would normally be here.

Regent Solberg noted that at the River Falls meeting he had made the suggestion that we give consideration to setting up a fifth standing committee on Personnel. He stated that his concern is, now that we are facing a financial crisis, there is going to be some spin-off of problems and suggested that we start getting ready for more of this type of work. He noted the Regent Education Committee will have to try to figure out how they are going to meet the educational needs on a quality basis with inadequate funds and limited budget, and that with inadequate funding for compensation of faculty, there is more and more probability of collective bargaining and that we should have a standing committee that would develop some degree of expertise in this one area. President McNamara suggested that the matter be referred to the Executive Committee for a more detailed discussion and analysis.

Regent Solberg moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1076: That the matter of the creation of a fifth Regent Committee, a personnel committee, be referred to the Executive Committee for detailed study and report back to the Board.

Chancellor Haas presented the Report of the Council of Chancellors. Chancellor Haas reported that the Council of Chancellors had met on the previous day and considered an inquiry from Central Administration relating to the matter of the establishment of systemwide grievance procedures for affirmative action items and whether or not there should be campus committees. He stated the Council voted unanimously that these be retained as campus grievance procedures, rather than systemwide. Regent Lavine inquired if it is the vision of the Chancellors that there would be some provision for appeal of decisions somewhere outside the campus, other than through the courts. Senior Vice President Smith responded that the situation in which we find ourselves is not simply an appeal to the courts, but also agencies of the state and federal government that are specifically charged with employment opportunity enforcement, and that the situation we now face is one of multiplicity of appeals, and the general feeling of the Chancellors was that to elaborate on the appeals procedure within the campus, with another appeals procedure within the System, and the likelihood of a third appeal going on with an external agency, would complicate the problem rather than resolve it.

Chancellor Haas reported that the Council of Chancellors elected new officers, with Chancellor Young to be Chairman, Chancellor Dreyfus Chairman Designate, and Chancellor Fort as Secretary.

(The meeting recessed at 11:40 A.M. and resumed in Executive Session at 12:34 P.M. to consider personnel matters.)

(The meeting reconvened at 3:25 P.M.)

4. President McNamara announced that the following resolutions had been adopted in Executive Session:

Resolution 1077: That the 1975-76 budget-related personnel actions requiring specific Regent review be approved.

Resolution 1078: That, upon recommendation of the Senior Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System, Dr. Michael J. Stolee be appointed Dean of the School of Education and Professor of Educational Administration at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, effective September 15, 1975, at an annual salary of \$34,500.

President McNamara reported that the Board discussed other personnel matters but took no formal action.
