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**THEATER'S SPRING CALENDAR
CELEBRATES DIVERSITY OF PERFORMING ARTS**

Second semester brings another lively celebration of the performing arts to the Wisconsin Union Theater. Dance, drama and music are all part of the busy spring calendar, with many of the world's most respected artists slated to appear.

*The dancer's art will receive particular emphasis this semester, with four programs speaking to the diversity of this mode of creative expression. Les Grands Ballets Canadiens will perform works by George Balanchine, Maurice Bejart and Brian MacDonald in concerts slated January 23 and 24. February 7 will bring exciting young soloists John Parks, Carol Fonda, Kathryn Posin and Clyde Morgan to the Theater stage for an evening of modern dance. Renowned dancer/choreographer Jennifer Muller and her company, The Works, will present a lecture-demonstration and a performance February 14 and 15, and March 6, 7 and 8, the Theater will welcome back the internationally-acclaimed Paul Taylor Dance Company for a lecture-demonstration and two performances.

*The excitement of live drama comes to the Theater stage via a recent Broadway hit, an American classic and a lively musical presentation. Ira Levin's "Deathtrap," described by Broadway critics as "just frightening enough and just funny enough," will be presented in matinee and evening performances February 16. March will bring a return visit from the Guthrie Theater company which scored an overwhelming success last spring in its first visit to Madison. This season, the company brings its mainstage production of Tennessee Williams' "The Glass Menagerie" for three performances March 13 and 14. And on April 12, in matinee and evening performances, "H.M.S. Pinafore," one of the world's most venerable seagoing vessels, will set sail with the Gilbert and Sullivan A La Carte Company and the Richmond Sinfonia.

*Marvelous music will fill the air this spring as the Theater offers concerts by respected virtuosos from around the world. Among those scheduled to perform are Daniel Phillips, violinist, February 1; Richard Stoltzman, clarinetist, February 2; the Toulouse Chamber Orchestra, February 9; Henryk Szeryng, violinist, March 9; The Philip Jones Brass Ensemble, April 2; The Amadeus Quartet, April 26; (continued on P. 2, col. 1)

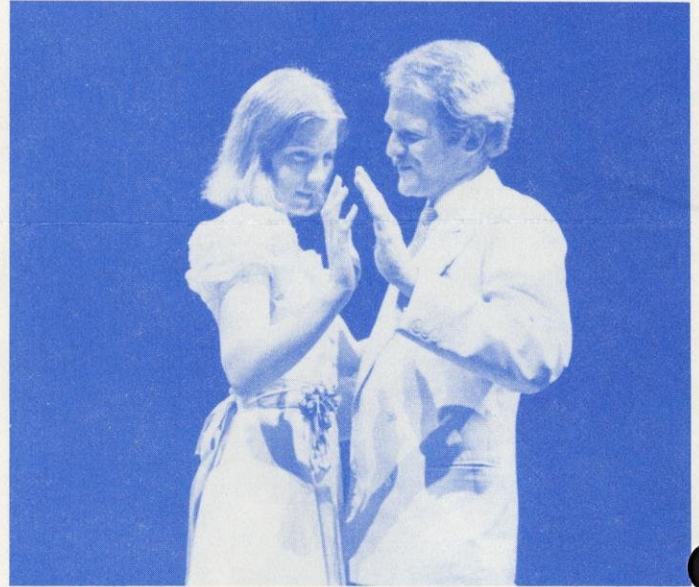

CLASSES CAMPAIGN FOR MONEY FOR UNION GIFTS

Several UW classes planning reunions have decided to give some of their money to the Wisconsin Union for special gifts.

The Class of 1929 has collected nearly \$25,000 for new sound systems for the Theater and Great Hall. Plans are for the installations to arrive in the spring.

Meanwhile, the Class of 1930 is hard at work raising money for their 50th anniversary gift which will include two to the Union -- an acoustical shell for the Union Theater and an art award.

The new acoustical shell will replace a temporary one designed and built by the former theater technical director, Fred Buerki, when the funds ran out in 1939 before a shell was purchased. The new shell will be used for concerts

by soloists, chamber music ensembles and orchestras.

The art award gift will be added to the existing Class of 1930 Art Award, which was the class' graduation gift fifty years ago. The award has been made annually at the Student Art Show.

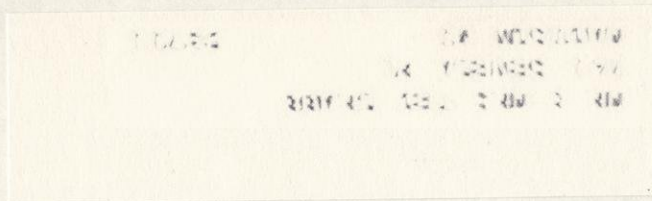

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UNION'S ART COLLECTION "AT HOME" AND ON TOUR

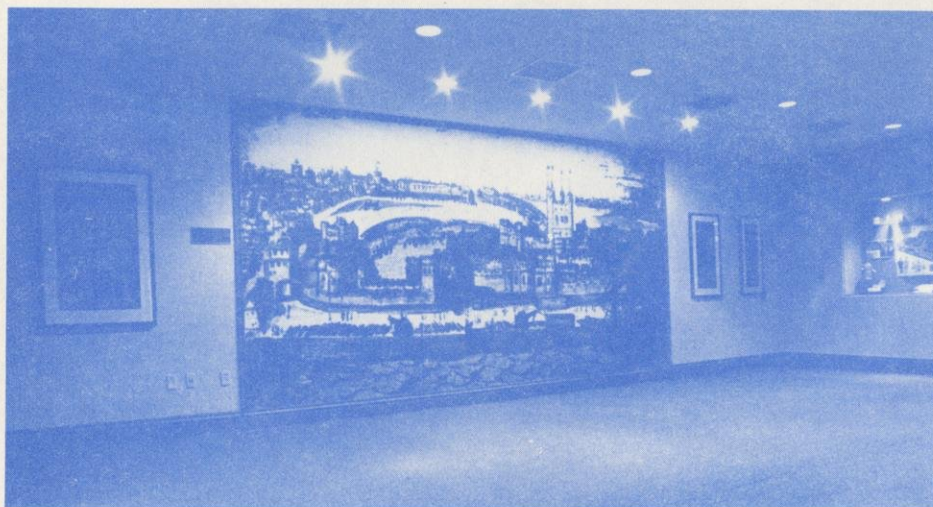
Paintings, prints and sculpture you've stopped to admire in the halls, dining areas and meeting rooms in both the Memorial Union and Union South are all part of the Union's own art collection. With works acquired from student shows, the Wisconsin Salon of Art and individual artists' exhibitions over the past 50 years, the collection now totals nearly 700 pieces and represents one of the most extensive collections of Wisconsin art in the state.

In addition to providing ongoing exhibitions for the Union buildings, the collection serves as a basis for the "Art-To-Go" program in which students and other Union members are invited to rent pieces for dorm rooms or apartments on a semester basis. Pieces from the collection frequently are loaned to other museums for exhibition also. Currently, 17 pieces of WPA art from the Union collection are on loan to the Leigh Yawkey Woodsen Museum in Wausau for its upcoming "Wisconsin's New Deal Art" exhibition. The exhibition will then go on tour with stops at LaCrosse,

Neenah, Green Bay, Racine, Duluth, Beaver Dam, Milwaukee and at the State Historical Society in Madison.

The Union's Art and Craft Interest Area has also been cooperating with the Elvehjem Museum of Art on another touring project. A selection of work from the Mark and Helen Hooper Print Collection is now on exhibition at the Neville Public Museum in Green Bay, following display at the UW-Whitewater gallery. The collection of prints by renowned American and European printmakers was presented to the University and its inaugural exhibition was held in the Union galleries as part of the Union's 50th anniversary celebration.

A catalog of the Union's collection is currently being prepared by Union staff members and student assistants. The catalog will include a listing of all works in the collection as well as providing a look at the active and innovative visual arts program offered by the Union during its first 50 years and continuing now in the Union's second half-century. Details on the publication will be announced later.



One of the most interesting rooms in the Memorial Union since the 50th anniversary remodeling is the Beefeaters Room on the third floor of the commons wing. Dominating the room on the south wall is a 4-color mural of the Tower of London taken from a 17th century painting by a Dutch artist. Flanking the mural are brass rubbings and a case of memorabilia from the Union's own Beefeater tradition, including pictures from the old Beefeater Banquets.
