REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

The Vice President of Business and Finance presented the recommendation  
of the Division of Residence Halls for the orderly curtailment of the Badger Vil-  
lage Housing Project, beginning June 30, 1950, and ending with the entire closing  
of the project on June 30, 1952. Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent  
Grady, it was

VOTED, That the recommendation of the Division of Residence Halls be ap-  
proved for the curtailment and closing of the Badger Village Housing Project in  
accordance with the following schedule:

- (1) On June 30, 1950 - close four barrack apartment buildings (104 apartments) in the North Badger section.
- (2) On June 30, 1951 - close the remaining six barrack apartment buildings in the North Badger section and continue to operate only the row house section (451 apartments) for the year 1951-52.
- (3) On June 30, 1952 - close the entire Badger project.

- (b) Army Air Forces Contract No. AF 33 (166)-76, under which the Government pays the equivalent of the nonresident tuition, during the period June 1, 1950 to June 30, 1953, for military personnel of the USAF assigned to the University for instruction.

- (c) Supplement Agreement No. 2 to Chemical Corps Contract No. W-18-064-CM-217, which contract covered research work entitled "Research Studies on the Mechanism of Action of Germicides and Antibiotics" in the Institute for Enzyme Research during the period September 15, 1948 through September 14, 1949. Supplemental Agreement No. 2 effects termination of the contract by reducing the total contract price by \$307.39, from \$20,000 to \$19,692.61, which latter amount represents the actual cost to the University for the performance of the contract.

- (d) Modification "A"---Supplemental Agreement to Contract No. W 11-183 QM-8124, with the U.S. Army Quartermaster Corps, extending the expiration date from September 30, 1950 to June 30, 1951, with no increase in funds. The contract provides for research on the "Nutritional Values of Army Rations" being carried out in the Biochemistry Department.
- (e) Project Agreement No. 3, under Contract No. AT(11-1)-64 with the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, covering research in the Department of Chemistry on the "Rates and Mechanisms of Oxidation Reactions Involving Cerium (IV)," during the period April 1, 1950 through March 31, 1952, under which the Government contributes \$6,050 during the first year of the project. Additional contributions by the Government will be determined as of March 31, 1951, for the ensuing year.
- (f) Project Agreement No. 4, under Contract No. AT(11-1)-64 with the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, covering research in the Institute for Enzyme Research on the cyclophorase system of animal tissue, during the period January 1, 1950 through December 31, 1952, under which the Government contributes \$29,400 during the first year of the project. Additional contributions by the Government will be determined as of December 31, 1950 and December 31, 1951, for the ensuing years.
- (g) Department of the Navy, Contract No. Nonr 03000 providing \$2,000 for research on "The Influence of Flashes of Light upon Dark Adaptation, Including but not Necessarily Limited to, the Dimensions of (1) Intensity, (2) Duration, (3) Number, (4) The Stage of Dark Adaptation at Which Flashes Are Present" in the Department of Psychology during the period March 1, 1950 through February 28, 1953.
- (h) Office of Naval Research Contract No. N7onr-285, covering research in the Department of Physics
  - (i) Amendment No. 4 - Task Order I, providing for a revised overhead rate of 25.8% during the period July 1, 1949 through December 31, 1950.
  - (ii) Amendment No. 4 - Task Order II, providing for a revised overhead rate of 23.96% during the period July 1, 1948 through June 30, 1949.
- (i) Amendment Nos. 3 to Office of Naval Research Contracts N7onr-28503 and N7onr-28504, providing for a revised overhead rate of 25.8% during the period July 1, 1949 through December 31, 1950. These contracts cover research in the Departments of Physics and Chemistry, respectively.
- (j) Amendment No. 9 to Navy Department, Bureau of Ordnance Contract No. NOrd-9938, establishing 12.04% of direct salaries and wages as the overhead rate applicable during the period September 1, 1949 through August 31, 1950, under the contract which covers research in the Department of Chemistry.

- (k) Supplement No. 1 to Contract No. V1001V-191 with the Veterans Administration for education and training by correspondence under the provisions of Public Laws 16 and 346, 78th Congress. This Supplement, effective as of April 1, 1950, provides for the substitution of courses.
- (l) Agreement renewing Veterans Administration Contract VAm-22808 for the period July 1, 1950 through June 30, 1951, covering the furnishing by the University Extension Division of lesson correction and test service to veterans receiving instruction through the correspondence courses and self-teaching courses of the Armed Forces Institute.
- (m) Revised Amendment to Agreement (V3030V-349) with the Veterans Administration for services relating to the testing and counselling of veterans, providing for an increase effective January 3, 1950, from \$6.50 to \$7.50 per case in the fee for testing and from \$19 to \$22 per case in the fee for testing and counselling paid to the University by the Government.

2. In accordance with the authority granted by the Regents on September 27, 1947, for the Vice President of Business and Finance to sign contracts and leases not in excess of \$2500, the following agreements and orders have been signed:

- (a) Contract with Brinks, Incorporated, of Wisconsin for the period June 21, 1950 through June 30, 1951, for the pick-up and delivery of sealed shipments of money, checks and securities between the Milwaukee Extension Division and the bank designated as its depository. Estimated cost \$145.
- (b) Memorandum of agreement with Associated Hospital Service, Inc., providing for the affiliation with Associated Hospital Service, Inc., of the State of Wisconsin General Hospital and Wisconsin Orthopedic Hospital for Children, as service hospitals, as defined in Section 180.32(1)(d) Wisconsin Statutes. Under this agreement, the Wisconsin General and the Orthopedic Hospitals will receive the regular charges for care of patients.
- (c) Lease with the Milwaukee Auditorium Board covering the rental on April 29, 1950, at a cost of \$85 of Engelmann Hall in the Milwaukee Auditorium for a labor-management conference on wages and employment.
- (d) Rental from the Estate of W. S. Kelley, Eau Claire, for use as an office for the Extension Division field representative of Room 8 at 316 South Barstow Street, Eau Claire, from January 1 through March 31, 1950. Total cost \$52.50.

- (e) Rental from the Superintendent of Public Schools, Marinette, of the High School Gymnasium for basketball games of the Extension Center on November 25 and December 16, 1949, and January 20, February 3 and February 8, 1950. Total cost \$55.
- (f) Rental from Board of Education, Green Bay, of West High Gymnasium and Locker Room on December 3, 1949, and of East High Gymnasium on January 5, 7, 10, 12 and 14, and February 25 and March 4, 1950, for basketball games of the Extension Center. Total cost \$89.54.
- (g) Rental from Racine Woman's Club, Racine, of the Racine Woman's Club Building for a Pro Arte Quartet concert program (admission free) on April 19, 1950, under the auspices of the Extension Center. Total cost \$25.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Grady, recommendation No. 1 (a) to (m), inclusive, and recommendation No. 2 (a) to (g), inclusive, listed under the report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (I. Report of Actions Taken) were approved.

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Regent Grady presented the report of the Executive Committee, as follows:

"The Regents on March 11, 1950, authorized the Executive Committee to act for the Board in awarding contracts for the extension of Steam Tunnel and Piping on Linden Drive, the cost of which is chargeable to the schedule of costs for Babcock Hall.

Bids for this work were opened on March 24. The total of the low bids received was \$79,189 as compared with a total of bids received in 1947 of \$186,187 for approximately the same work. Eight bids were received for the construction of the Tunnel with the bids ranging from a high of \$69,432 to a low of \$39,850. Three bids were received for the piping work ranging from \$32,825 to \$35,630. Two bids were received for the insulation of the piping in the amounts of \$6,514 and \$7,982. Pursuant to authority granted by the Regents, the Executive Committee awarded the contracts for this work on the basis of the low bids received. The Executive Committee recommends to the Regents:

That the action of the Executive Committee be approved in awarding contracts for the extension of Steam Tunnel and Piping on Linden Drive, chargeable to the schedule of costs for Babcock Hall, on the basis of the following low bids:

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the recommendation of the Executive Committee be approved.

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Regent Gelatt presented the report of the Finance Committee. Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Jones, it was

VOTED, That the Director of Intercollegiate Athletics be authorized to sign an agreement with the National "W" Club for the handling of refreshment concessions and printed programs for home athletic contests for the period July 1, 1950 through June 30, 1951, on the same basis as the agreements authorized by the Regents on September 10, 1949 and December 17, 1949, which covered the 1949-50 athletic season.

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Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That authority be granted to rent space in the Washington School, Madison, for the 1950 Summer Laboratory School, Reading Clinic, and Aphasia Clinic for the duration of the 1950 eight-week Summer Session at an estimated cost of \$1500 chargeable to the 1950 Summer Session budget; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.

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Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That in accordance with the action of the Emergency Board on March 15, 1950, and to confirm approval given by the Regents in writing, the following revised per diem rates be established as of April 1, 1950, in the Wisconsin General and Orthopedic Hospitals:

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Grady, it was VOTED, That upon the recommendation of Dr. Middleton, the balance of \$3,348.73 in the M. W. McArdle Cancer Gift Account be transferred to the University Trust Funds.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That \$17,500 be allotted from Unbudgeted 1-E Receipts for repairs and maintenance of residential properties used for faculty and staff housing.

Regent Gelatt reported that the Welfare and Student Life Committee, because of the press of other business, had been able to meet only for a brief time and had no report to make at this time.

Regent Jones presented the report of the Constructional Development Committee. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the approval by the Regents on October 15, 1949, of the site for the new State Laboratory of Hygiene Building, to be constructed by the State Board of Health, be amended to more specifically describe the site as the area bounded on the West by the East drive on Henry Mall, on the North by Linden Drive, on the East by Lorch Street, and on the South by the South line of Lot 3, Block 2, Wald's Subdivision, extended to the East Drive of Henry Mall.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That the proposal of the Hanson Wrecking Company, Madison, Wisconsin, to raze the building at 708 Langdon Street to ground level for the salvage material and for a consideration of \$500 to be paid by the University be accepted.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the final plans and specifications for the Cardiovascular Research Unit to the McArdle Memorial Building be approved, and that authority be granted to advertise for bids.

Regent Jones presented the following recommendation of the Constructional Development Committee:

That the offer of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation to loan \$380,000 to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation for the purpose of financing in part the cost of constructing and equipping a building for Chemical Engineering and to amortize the principal and pay the interest annually over a period of thirty years, be approved;

That \$120,000 of the funds allocated for the Engineering Building from the Post-War Construction appropriation be allotted for the Chemical Engineering unit;

That the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be authorized to proceed with the construction and equipment for one unit of the east wing of the New Engineering Building, to be occupied by the laboratories of Chemical Engineering, at an estimated cost of \$500,000, including the employment of a private architect, and to borrow not to exceed \$380,000 from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation for this purpose to be amortized over a period of thirty years at an annual interest rate of 4%; that the President and Secretary be authorized to sign a memorandum agreement with the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation providing for the loaning of not to exceed \$380,000 to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation for the construction and equipment of one unit of the east wing of the New Engineering Building and providing for annual grants by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation to the University sufficient to cover the amortization of the loan over a period of thirty years and payment of the interest; that the President and Secretary be authorized to sign a lease to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation for a term of thirty years covering the site of said unit of the east wing of the Engineering Building; and that the President and Secretary be authorized to sign a lease from the Wisconsin University Building Corporation to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin covering the leasing of the land and the one unit of the east wing of the New Engineering Building at an annual rental sufficient to amortize the principal and to pay the interest over a period of thirty years.

(Cont.)

The approval of the recommendation was moved by Regent Jones and seconded by Regent Gelatt.

Regents Grady and Kleczka stated that they were in favor of providing facilities for Chemical Engineering but were opposed to the method of financing suggested and therefore were obliged to vote against the motion.

A called vote was taken - Regents Arveson, Campbell, Gelatt, Jones, Watson, Werner voting "Aye"; Regents Grady and Kleczka voting "No". The motion was declared carried.

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Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That authority be granted for the drawing of final plans and the preparation of specifications for one unit of the east wing of the New Engineering Building, to be occupied by the laboratories of Chemical Engineering, and to employ Foeller, Schober, Berners, Safford and Jahn, Green Bay, Wisconsin, for the architectural work on this project, and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement for architectural services.

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Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That upon recommendation of the Campus Planning Commission, the priorities and schedule of new construction and equipment for the 1951-53 requests to the Legislature (Schedule I attached), and the schedule of building projects for future biennia, as listed on Schedule II attached, be approved, and that Schedule III, attached, listing probable new construction at the University of Wisconsin to be financed from other than State appropriations and possible items for consideration at a later date, be approved for presentation to the State Building Commission.

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Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Campus Planning Commission, the previous action locating the Bacteriology Building immediately north of the west wing of the Biochemistry Building be rescinded, and that a new location be selected in the general area west of Agricultural Hall, north of Linden Drive, and east of the relocated Babcock Drive, it being understood that the building would be designed as the first unit of a larger building to be occupied by departments whose work is related to that of the Department of Agricultural Bacteriology.

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Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Campus Planning Commission, a Social Studies Building be located immediately west of Bascom Hall and east of Charter Street, and that the first unit of this building be devoted to the work of the School of Commerce and that of the Department of Economics.

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Regent Kleczka presented the report of the Personnel Committee. Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That Arthur H. Uhl, Director of the School of Pharmacy, be appointed Dean of the School of Pharmacy, effective July 1, 1950; salary to be fixed in the 1950-51 budget.

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Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That John V. Irwin be appointed professor of speech, beginning with the academic year 1950-51; salary \$6,000 for the academic year; charge to the 1950-51 budget.

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Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Grady, it was VOTED, That Henry A. Lardy, associate professor of biochemistry, be appointed professor of enzyme chemistry, effective July 1, 1950; salary to be fixed in the 1950-51 budget.

In commenting on the appointment of Dr. Henry A. Lardy as professor of enzyme chemistry, President Fred explained the purpose and work of the Enzyme Institute, pointing out that the plan is to have the institute consist of research teams. He stated that Dr. David E. Green, who was appointed the first professor of enzyme chemistry, was the leader of the first team and that Dr. Henry A. Lardy would be the leader of the second team of research workers in the field of enzymes. He stated that the two team leaders would maintain separate research units and would arrange cooperative research programs.

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Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the Second Report, on Internal Survey, of the Committee on University Functions and Policies be referred to the Educational Committee with the request that the Committee digest its contents fully and report back to the Board.

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Regent Watson presented a recommendation for a study of the committee organization of the Regents. Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was

VOTED, That, in order to enable and facilitate the consideration of additional important items of University business, now made extremely difficult if not impossible by the number of committees, the duplication of membership and the tremendous business now necessarily handled by some committees, the President of the Regents and the President of the University, with the chairmen of the existing committees, study the whole committee problem with the possible thought of reducing the number of committees and establishing a procedure by which each of the committees may meet regularly.

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Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

- Stalker, June - Gen. Univ. Service, U.W.Press, change period from 10/1/49 - 2/28/50 to months of October, 1949 and February, 1950 only, salary \$95 per month. (Mrs. Stalker did not work during the months of Nov., Dec. and January.)
- Woodard, John W. Jr. - I&S, Botany, reduction in appt. for Sem. II, salary total \$91.67.

#### Fellows:

- Eckhardt, August G. - Law School, Carnegie Research Fellow and Lecturer in Law. Mr. Eckhardt is to receive \$100 a month during the second semester as a Lecturer. His stipend as a Research Fellow from March 1 to July 31 is to be reduced \$100 a month and is to revert to the original figure (\$333.33 a month) for the last month and a half of his appointment.
- Katchman, Bernard J. - Grd. Sch., Enzyme Institute, change in title from Project Associate to Fellow of Heart Institute beginning 2/15/50 to 2/14/51, salary change from \$3870.17 to \$3600.

#### Scholars:

- Proctor, Tommy L. - Gen'l. Univ. Service, Loans & Undergrad. Schol., Wis. Alumni Club of Cincinnati Schol., increase scholarship stipend from \$200 to \$250.
- Solveson, Jean A. - Loans and Undergrad. Schol, Trust Funds (Knapp Fund), reduce from \$125 to \$62.50 for Semester II.

#### Miscellaneous:

- Gill, Howard B. - Extension, Lecture at Fond du Lac Center, 2/15/50, change in beginning date of appointment to 3/1/50.

COMMITTEE ON OUTSIDE ACTIVITIES OF FACULTY MEMBERS

Your committee appointed to examine certain problems which have arisen in connection with outside activities engaged in by faculty members hereby begs leave to submit the following report for your consideration and for discussion and approval by the University of Wisconsin faculty.

Your committee has considered information relating to four different classes of outside activities:

- (a) Services performed for the University Extension Division by faculty members not holding regular appointments in that division.
- (b) Expert services rendered to the local, state or federal government.
- (c) Consulting or other professional services rendered to private individuals or organizations.
- (d) The conduct of business enterprises.

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS

Your committee is of the opinion that members of the University of Wisconsin faculty must have freedom to decide how they are to spend time not required for the performance of the duties relating to their teaching, research, and other University activities. It is convinced that their privilege of self-regulation of time and of efforts in serving the University is rarely abused. Moreover, the willingness of faculty members to serve the University beyond their line of duty without extra compensation is amply demonstrated when in vacations and other leisure periods they engage in research, read doctoral dissertations, participate in examinations for higher degrees, advise students, and perform various other tasks of benefit to the institution.

In surveying the outside activities of faculty members, your committee has given special attention to questions connected with the employment by the Extension Division of faculty members not on its staff. Occasions arise when the Extension Division requires expert services not available on its regular staff and which cannot be obtained except at considerable expense or over-staffing of the Division. In such cases the faculty member in doing extra work is actually saving the State money and deserves compensation for the time devoted to such additional services.

Your committee appreciates that the special knowledge, training, and capabilities of members of the faculty may be used properly by various agencies which serve the needs of the State of Wisconsin and the federal government as well as by private interests. It recognizes further that such services and contacts may enhance the value of the work of faculty members as teachers and scholars. Service to the public, enhancement of professional capacity, and financial reward are considerations which in varying degrees provide the incentives for undertaking outside duties. Of course, outside work, even when it contributes to scholarship and professional skill, is not necessarily of greater benefit to academic attainment and to the University than an equal amount of time and energy devoted to study, research, and student contact on the Campus.

Having considered various aspects of this question, your committee wishes to emphasize that the net effect of outside activities on the performance of University duties should be the primary factor in judging the desirability of these activities.

This principle applies also to members of the teaching staff in the professional schools and colleges of the University, for whom it may be not only desirable but necessary that they be allowed to practice their skills and maintain their outside contacts.

Your committee believes, that provided his obligations to the University are duly performed, it is proper for a faculty member to accept outside work and to receive compensation for it.

An individual faculty member is entitled to spend his leisure time as he sees fit. It is, however, reasonable to assume that the conduct of a separate business enterprise of any significance, whether alone or with others, may detract from the energy and attention required for effective performance of full time duties. The possibility that conduct of such an enterprise may impair the participant's services to the University should, in the opinion of your committee, be subject to review by the proper administrative authorities.

Your committee believes that it would be unwise to attempt a rigid classification of outside activities and to adopt detailed rules for their control. Ordinarily, specific regulations can be adopted and applied most effectively in the smaller units of departments, schools, and colleges. However, in the interest of the University as a whole and for the guidance of individual faculty members and the administrative authorities, your committee submits the following statement of policy and recommends its approval by the University Faculty.

#### PROPOSED STATEMENT OF POLICY

1. The Faculty recognizes that its members should abstain from engaging in activities, whether paid or unpaid, which impair the instructional, scholarly, and other services which they must render in the nature of their/university employment.
2. It is assumed that each member of the faculty is capable of judging the extent to which occasional outside activities may interfere with his obligations to the University. In case of doubt, the matter should be presented to his department and, if necessary, to the dean of the college or school concerned and to the President of the University.
3. A member of the faculty should not engage in private business or accept regular salaried appointments or regular consulting engagements without informing the appropriate University authorities.
4. The conditions under which faculty members might properly be placed on a part-time basis vary so widely that no general rule can be established.

A staff member placed on such a basis should be so designated in the budget and in the staff directory. The arrangements made concerning his duties to the University should be communicated in writing to the members of his department.

5. Whenever a faculty member renders professional or other expert services, it should be on such terms as not to impair confidence in his integrity.



6. In cases where the Extension Division needs the services of faculty members not on its staff, the following policy is recommended:

- \*a. Lecturers participating in special institutes or adult education programs beyond their line of duty should be paid honoraria and expenses. The honorarium should be recorded as part of the actual salary paid to the lecturer for services rendered to the University. If the honorarium is paid from fees collected, this fact should be so recorded.
- b. Appointments for the preparation of correspondence courses and other special assignments should be made at the time of agreement, with compensation computed on a monthly basis but with payment deferred until the work has been completed.
- c. Appointments as readers of correspondence study papers should follow the customary procedure with monthly salary approved by the proper University authorities.
- d. A member of the resident University faculty whose qualifications make him especially valuable for regular appointment by the Extension Division and who wishes to serve in that division should be appointed to the various sections of the University which he serves and his salary pro-rated accordingly. Only in an emergency should an extension class be added to a faculty member's normal teaching load.

7. Absence from classes or other regular duties to fulfill an outside engagement should be cleared with the proper administrative authorities. Care should be taken to avoid a concentration of class hours detrimental to effective teaching.

8. University facilities should not be used by faculty members for outside activities of a commercial character without prior arrangements with the appropriate University authorities.

\*During the year 1948-49, 50 faculty members not on the staff of the Extension Division gave 109 lectures under its auspices at a total cost, including expenses, of \$3,043.80 of which \$980.00 came from University funds.

Note 1: This list does not provide for remodeling and modernizing structures not involved in the building program suggested above. In addition funds are urgently needed for additions to and modernization of the general utilities, temperature controls, water supply system, safety provisions, roads and parking, meters, ventilation, etc.

Note 2: Pending the report of the engineering survey concerning over-all heating facilities it seems desirable to plan for the possible installation of individual heating units in the buildings listed above, since our present central heating plant cannot furnish steam for more than a very small portion of these buildings. The results of this survey will indicate the relative advantages and disadvantages of an additional heating plant vs. individual heating plants for each building. It is estimated that an additional central heating plant which would serve the above units and provide boiler capacity for future expansion will call for from \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000.
