


Construction of the new dormitory, the first major building program at River Falls in the last 25 years, was started July 31, 1950, shortly after the release of funds by Governor Oscar Rennebohm.

Completion of the dormitory in time for use next fall will make possible the housing of approximately 90 additional women students. Incorporated in the plans are an apartment for the housemother, a basement lounge, recreation room, first floor lobby and mail room, and four "date rooms."

The two-story building will be faced with Bedford limestone to the first floor level and will have a decorative limestone trim around the three front entrances. The remainder will be of brick.



Rural fair chairman Paul Sylla and adviser John M. May were largely responsible for the successful completion of this event. Monetary prizes




THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION







RIVER FALLS 6 - AUGSBURG 6

In the opening game of the season River Falls battled the Augsburg Auggies to a 6-6 deadlock. The game got under way with both teams playing a scoreless first quarter. In the second quarter a 17 yard pass from Harkness to Morgan gave the Falcons a first down on the Auggies 26 yard line. Six plays later Vogel plunged over left guard for the touchdown. On a 45 yard pass play the Auggies scored in the third quarter. Trying desperately in the last quarter, the Falcons unleashed a series of passes but failed to score.

RIVER FALLS 20 - MILWAUKEE 7

The Falcons fell behind in the first period when Milwaukee's Art Derksen scored from the two but took over in the second period and never were in danger the rest of the way. In the second quarter Morgan intercepted a Milwaukee pass on his own 12 and raced 88 yards to score. A few minutes later Harkness passed 24 yards to Morgan for the touchdown that put River Falls out front. The third quarter found both teams unable to score. In the final period Pat Christie's 71 yard dash brought the Falcons' final marker. Some of the season's greatest runs were made during this game.

RIVER FALLS 7 - SUPERIOR 7

Playing scoreless football for almost three full periods the Falcons finally scored when Alexander broke through and blocked the Superior punt on the 30 and defensive Bagott picked it up on the 20 yard line and ran over for the score. Linehan's kick was good and the Falcons led 7-0. It looked as if Superior was going to lose their first homecoming game since 1930 until West passed to Kavie Kallio for the touchdown with less than a minute to play. Their kick was good and the score stood at 7-7. The Falcons held off a Superior drive on the one yard line in the first quarter and again in the second. Christie made the outstanding run of the game on a 42 yard punt return in the first period.

RIVER FALLS 0 - LA CROSSE 19

The Falcon grid men were handed their first defeat of the season by La Crosse by the score of 19-0. With forty seconds left to play in the first half Sladsky passed 14 yards to Hallub in the end zone to make the first score. The second half saw the Indian attack get moving by scoring the quick touchdowns in the third quarter. Curry broke away for a 67 yard run and Hallub plunged from the one foot line to end the scoring. The Falcons could get no closer to scoring than the 25 yard line.

RIVER FALLS 7 - STEVENS POINT 21

River Falls failed to hold a fast first quarter pace and lost to Stevens Point 21-7. The Falcons tired quickly after the first quarter in which they gained 101 yards rushing and held Stevens Point to 5 yards. In the first period Matthias made the only Falcon touchdown when he broke around the left side of the line to run 19 yards into the end zone. Linehan made the kick and River Falls led 7-0. Midway in the second quarter the Pointers made their first score. This was followed by a 21 yard pass and three more runs to make the second touchdown for Stevens Point. From here the Pointers marched 95 yards without stopping before Samelstadt tasted pay dirt on a quarterback sneak from the two yard line. The extra point was good and Stevens Point held the long end of a decisive 21-7 victory.

RIVER FALLS 18 - EAU CLAIRE 6

River Falls spotted visiting Eau Claire a 6-0 second period lead and then powered for three touchdowns to grab an 18-6 Homecoming victory. A 37 yard pass play from Schomisch to Emmanuel provided Eau Claire a tally. But River Falls hit pay dirt moments later when Christie bucked over from the six to make it 6-6 at halftime. The Falcons went ahead late in the third period on a nine yard run by Matthias. Harkness tossed a 21 yard aerial to Vogel midway in the final stanza for the Falcons' final score. Christie, Matthias, and Vogel were the three Falcon players scoring.

RIVER FALLS 13 - STOUT 44

Seven touchdowns and two placekicks kept the Stout gridmen in a favorable edge against River Falls in the final conference game of the season. At only one time was the score close. That came when River Falls recovered a Stout fumble on their own 40 yard line and drove to a touchdown with Onstad going over from two yards out. The score then was 13-6 in Stout's favor. Stout's passing attack lived up to all expectations as they completed 14 out of 20 attempts. They gained 166 yards through the airways. The final two tallies for Stout came on a four yard plunge by Hansen and a one yard smash by Jacobson. The Falcon final tally came late in the fourth quarter when Harkness stole the ball on Stout's 45 yard line and scampered over for the touchdown. Linehan's kick was good leaving the final score at Stout 44, River Falls 13.

RIVER FALLS 30 - MANKATO 27

Onstad led his Falcon mates to a thrilling 30-27 conquest over highly rated Mankato Teachers in the Falcons' final game of the season. Onstad stole the show as he crossed the last chalkline three times and massed a net yardage of 242 yards. Linehan shared the spotlight by tallying twice on pass plays. Mankato carried the ball around right end for 15 yards and the first score of the game. From five yards out Onstad made the first Falcon score. Still in the first period Onstad scored again, leaving the score in their favor 12-6. A pass from Vogel to Linehan resulted in the Falcons' third touchdown. In the third period after five minutes of play Mankato scored. Onstad again tallied after running 45 yards, putting River Falls out front again. A 19 yard pass from Vogel to Linehan in the end zone led to the Falcons' final touchdown. Mankato scored with a minute left in the game when Mauer tossed the longest pass of the game, a 40 yard one, to Dunn. River Falls emerged the victors in spite of the fact that Mankato tied with Bemidji for the Minnesota Teachers Championship.





KUSS BREAKS RECORD

Roger Kuss, sophomore, hit 21 field goals and 10 free throws for a grand total of 52 points to set a new Wisconsin State Teachers College Conference scoring record at Eau Claire, February 6. He hit 62 per cent of his shots from the floor.

This record was previously held by another Falcon star, Nate DeLong, who scored 47 points against Eau Claire in the '49-'50 season.

Rog has also topped another mark of his predecessor, Nate DeLong, by totaling 384 points in 12 Wisconsin State Teachers College games this season. This topped by 12 points DeLong's record total of 372 points last season.

Kuss' feat is all the more remarkable when it is noted that River Falls lost eight of its twelve games this season. DeLong's record was made last year when the Falcons were leading the conference.

Counting both conference and non-conference games, Kuss scored a total of 502 points this season for an average of 26.4 a game. His conference average was 32 points.



RIVER FALLS 65 - ST. JOHN'S 76








RIVER FALLS 92 - EAU CLAIRE 104


