it will not hurt us much -

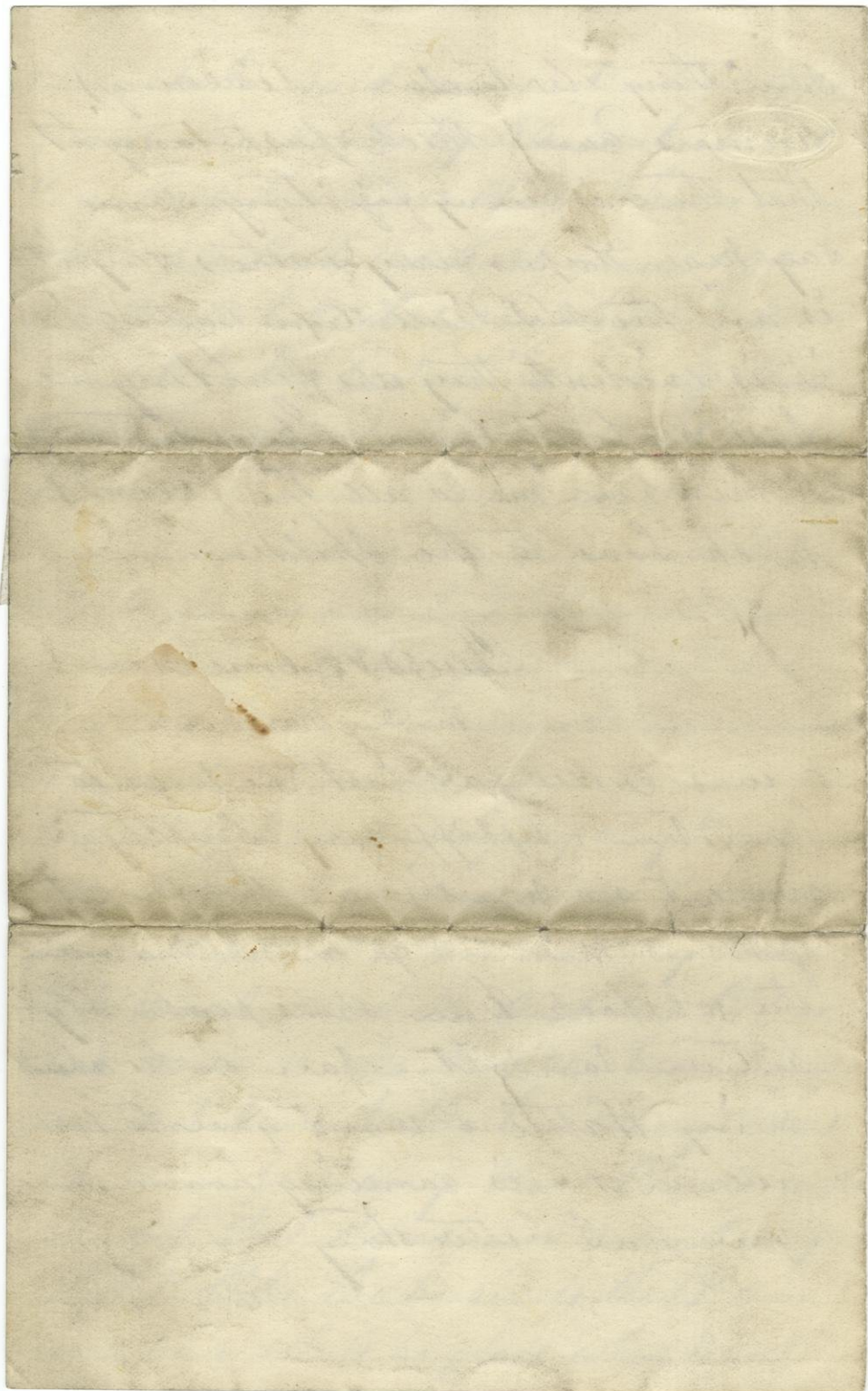
I should like to give you a history
