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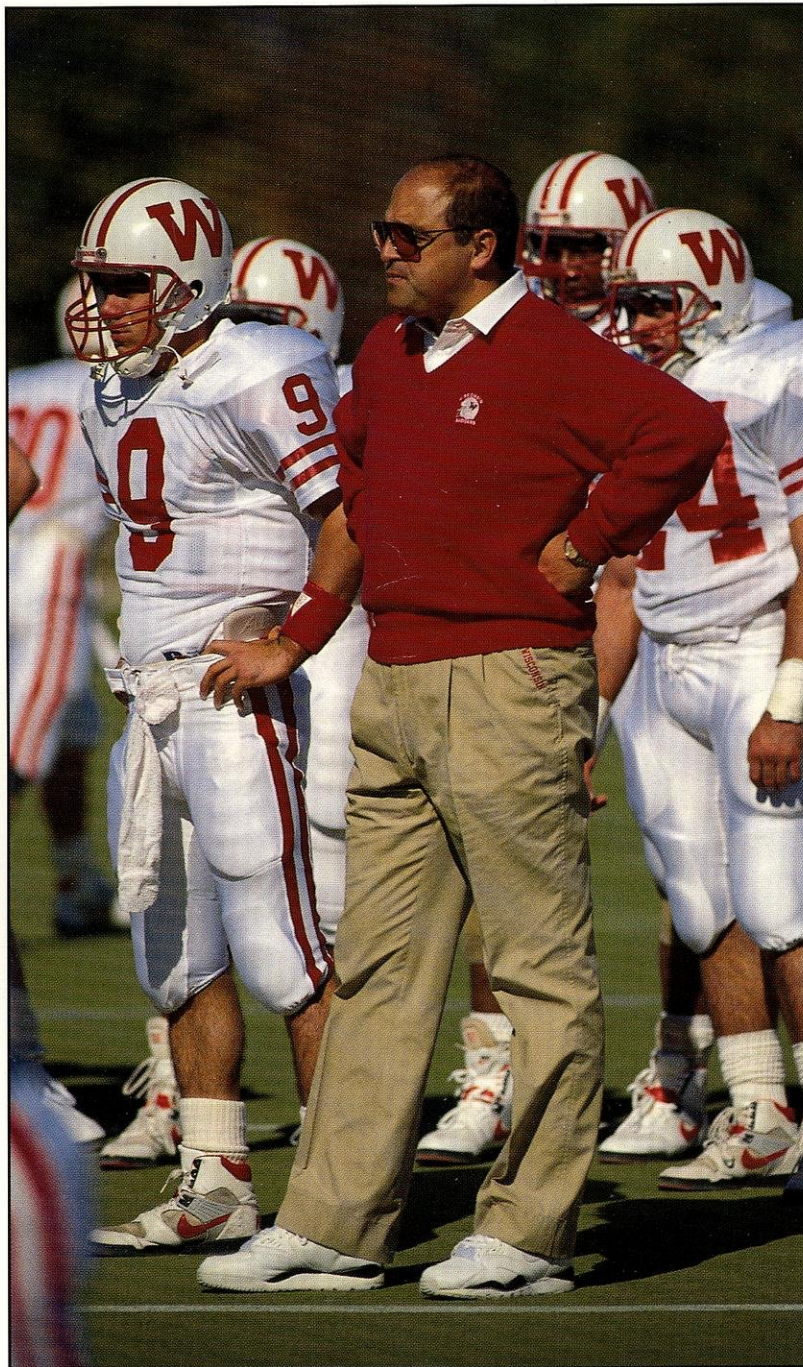

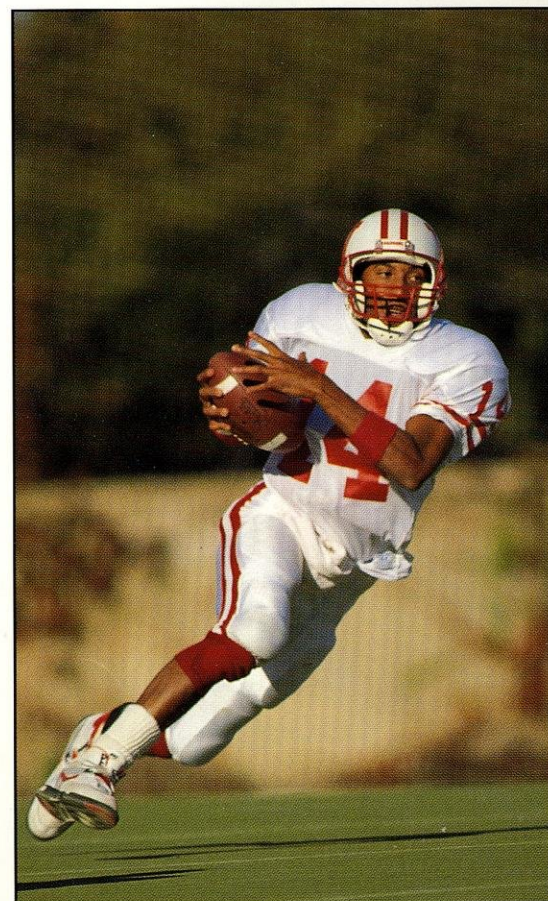

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Media Notes

Credential Requests

PRESS BOX: Requests to cover Badger football games from the Communications Center are honored from sports editors of DAILY newspapers and sports directors of radio and TV stations that REGULARLY cover the teams. Exceptions to this policy are granted on a space-available basis. Requests for credentials should be mailed or faxed (608/262-9212) to: Steve Malchow, Sports Information Director, University of Wisconsin, 1440 Monroe Street, Madison, WI 53711. Requests should be received at least two weeks in advance of the game. Media passes which cannot be mailed will be left at Will Call (Gate 6—west side of the Stadium).

There are three levels in the Communications Center: **LEVEL 3** for play-by-play radio stations and TV photo decks; **LEVEL 4** for working press; and **LEVEL 5** for special guests of the Athletic Department. Your cooperation is requested in staying on your assigned level.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Sideline credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers on assignment. Photographers must wear a credential and a special sideline armband AT ALL TIMES to be on the field level. Armbands cannot be mailed and must be picked up inside Gate 6. Photographers cannot shoot in the area reserved for team personnel (between the 25-yard lines).

PARKING: Media parking passes are available on a limited basis. They will be issued as requested and as available.

Game Procedures

INTERVIEWS: With approximately five minutes left in the fourth quarter, media members will be escorted to the interview area by Sports Information personnel. Coach Alvarez meets the media in the McClain Center Auditorium. Badger players are available OUTSIDE the lockerroom (lower level of McClain Facility).

PHONES: Several courtesy lines provided by the UW Sports Information Office are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Media requiring their own phones should call the UW Telecommunications Office (608/262-0521).

Interview Requests

PLAYER INTERVIEWS:

Player interviews during the week should be arranged through the Sports Information Office (608/262-1811) at least one day in advance. Players will return phone calls, but home numbers will not be released. Players are available for interviews Monday through Wednesday following practice.

ALVAREZ INTERVIEWS:

Coach Barry Alvarez holds a weekly press conference on Mondays at 1:30 p.m. in the "W" Club Room. Media may monitor the weekly press conference by calling 608/263-4737. Alvarez is available after practice Monday-Thursday. Alvarez participates on the Big Ten Teleconference each Tuesday from 11:40-11:50 a.m. Media can participate by calling 708/399-1700.

Steve Malchow starts his second season as Director of Sports Information at Wisconsin. The 30-year-old Malchow is in charge of publicity for all Badger men's sports programs.

Malchow worked from 1979-89 at Iowa as a student, graduate and full-time assistant in the Hawkeye Sports Information Office.

He is a member of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA), which has honored over 30 of his press guides for excellence. Malchow's 1985 football and basketball yearbooks were rated first and second in the nation, respectively.

The 1983 graduate of Iowa earned degrees in marketing, journalism and management sciences. The native of Sioux City, Iowa, is single and resides in Madison.

Gregg Elkin enters his second year as an assistant SID at Wisconsin. The 26-year-old Elkin handles publicity for basketball, tennis, swimming and golf as well as editing the football and basketball programs.

Elkin came to Wisconsin from UNLV where he was the interim SID. He worked with the Rebels' football, basketball and baseball teams.

A 1988 graduate of Arizona State, Elkin interned with the Phoenix Suns and *USA Today* during his stint in Tempe. Prior to that, he was Public Relations Director for Buffalo's AAA baseball team.

Elkin worked 3 1/2 years in the Iowa SID Office before transferring to ASU. The native of St. Charles, Ill., is single and lives in Madison.

Julie Kluge begins her second campaign as a full-time member of the UW Sports Information staff. She has worked for the Athletic Department since 1984.

Kluge directs all publicity for Wisconsin's hockey, cross country and track squads. She also assists with Badger football. The 1988 graduate of Wisconsin has B.S. degrees in zoology and secondary education.

She edits both the UW hockey media guide and game program. Julie was formerly publicity director of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (1989), where she was a liaison between the league and the nine member institutions.

Kluge, a native of Benton, Wis., is single and lives in Madison.

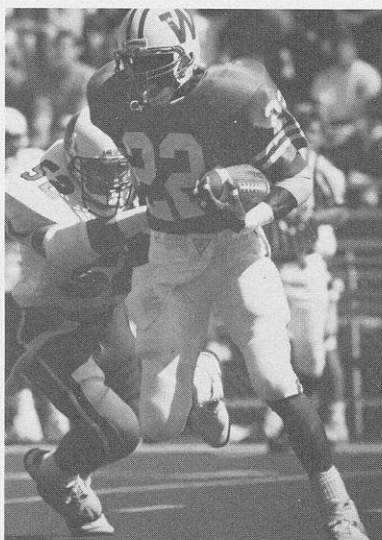
Year Two . . .

Familiarity with schemes. Repetition on plays. Togetherness among players. Coach Barry Alvarez hopes this mixture in the second year of his rebuilding process provides dividends.

Outlook

If winning football programs are built on defense, then Coach Barry Alvarez has a good foundation for his second season in Madison.

The Badgers, 1-10 overall in 1990, made great strides in the second half of the season. The defense, in particular, improved by limiting opponents to 324.4 yards and 22.2

points the last five outings. That was a reduction of almost 60 yards and seven points from the opening six games. The UW defense also forced 16 turnovers in the last five games after creating just nine miscues in the first six.

Alvarez' mission this year is to develop a dependable ground attack. The Badgers averaged less than 100 yards per game rushing in 1990. "We have made some progress in putting together a stronger running attack," said Alvarez. "However, there should

be some keen competition at RB for starting spots this fall."

A look at the Badgers:

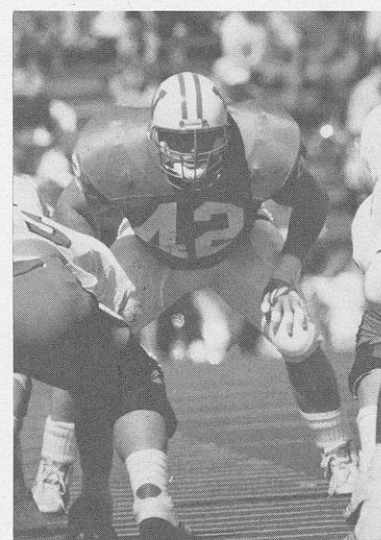
Defensive line: A team strength last season, the Badgers need some players to step forward. Tackles Don Davey, the school's first all-Big Ten pick in four seasons, and Dan Batsch, have graduated. A pair of youngsters — sophomore Carlos Fowler and redshirt freshman Mike Thompson — may move in. Fifth-year senior Jerry Huggett and freshman Dustin Rusch will challenge. Former wrestler Lee Krueger, who split time in '90, emerged from spring drills as the top noseguard. Sophomore NG Lamark Shackerford averaged eight tackles per game last year after becoming a starter in game seven. Alvarez says: "Replacing Davey is the toughest job we have on defense. There is an opportunity for some people to earn time."

Outside linebacker: JC transfer Dwight Reese may develop into an impact player on the outside. He has excellent speed and can become a big-time pass rusher. Duer Sharp, an athletic end, will start opposite Reese. Curt Maternowski (10 starts in '90) and Nick Rafko are solid back-ups.

Inside linebacker: The Badgers return both starters in fiery Gary Casper and consistent Brendan Lynch. Casper came from nowhere to lead the team with 140 tackles. He started only seven times. Lynch added 119 stops in 11 starting assignments. Two-

year letterman Aaron Norvell and sophomore Yusef Burgess are possibilities. Alvarez says: "The inside linebackers should be very strong. The steadiness of Lynch and Casper's enthusiasm are qualities to build around."

Defensive back: The secondary is one of the squad's deeper areas

led by cornerbacks Troy Vincent and Eddie Fletcher. The senior duo has 39 collegiate starts between them. The speedy Vincent is a 1991 nominee for the Jim Thorpe Award and a legitimate all-America candidate. Vincent was a 1990 second team all-Big Ten pick and Fletcher has started for parts of three seasons. Reggie Holt established himself as the starter at strong safety in spring drills. Rafael Robinson, who played RB last season, is Holt's challenger. He started 11 games as a sophomore in the

secondary. Safety Scott Nelson (106 tackles in six starts) will start at free safety. Redshirt freshmen Jamel Brown and Jeff Messenger are good athletes that Alvarez can't wait to see in action.

Alvarez says: "There is good talent in the secondary. Vincent, in my opinion, will be one of the top CBs in college football."

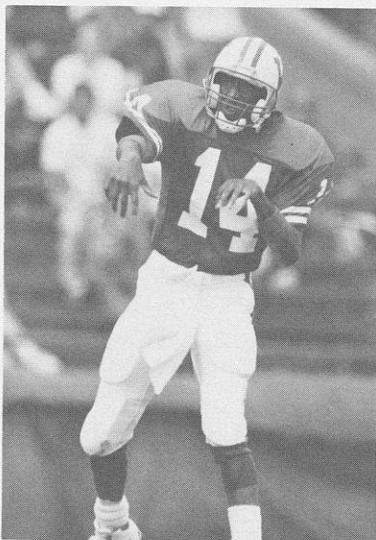
Offensive line: Wisconsin lost five fifth-year seniors up front, and replacing them is a necessity. Guard Chuck Belin, a 325 pounder, is the anchor. Sophomore tackle Tyler Adam got starting experience last year but missed much of the spring. Junior college all-American Mike Bryan will help immediately at guard based upon an impressive spring session. Jeff Rasmussen is the top center. Youngsters Mike Verstegen, Bill Maksen, Pat McGettigan, Joe Panos and Rich Andrus are all in the two-deep. *Alvarez says: "We had to shift some people around on the line. This group must develop some chemistry and confidence."*

Tight end: Alvarez is excited about the quality and quantity of his tight ends. Three — Dave Czech, Jim Bourne and Mike Roan — can play at the Big Ten level according to the coaches. Czech caught 11 passes in '90, Bourne has much experience and Roan owns great hands.

Wide receiver: Five players have experience although the top receiver from a year ago (Bill Williams) is gone. Tony Spaeth (29 catches), Lionell Crawford

(26), Tim Ware (19.7 avg.), Tom Browne (11 catches) and Aaron Brown (9) head the list of returnees. Crawford's status is unknown after knee surgery in the spring.

Quarterback: Tony Lowery, a 21-game starter in his career, closed spring training as the No. 1 quarterback. He completed 56.8

percent of his passes for 1,757 yards, third and fourth best in UW history. The challengers include: 1990 Scout Team Offensive Player of the Year Jay Simala and runner Sean Wilson. *Alvarez says: "The staff is very excited about Tony's improvement last spring. He has a better grasp of the offense, and that familiarity will be evident on the field."*

Tailback: Senior Robert Williams (541 yards rushing) started seven times in 1990. Williams and redshirt freshman Theo

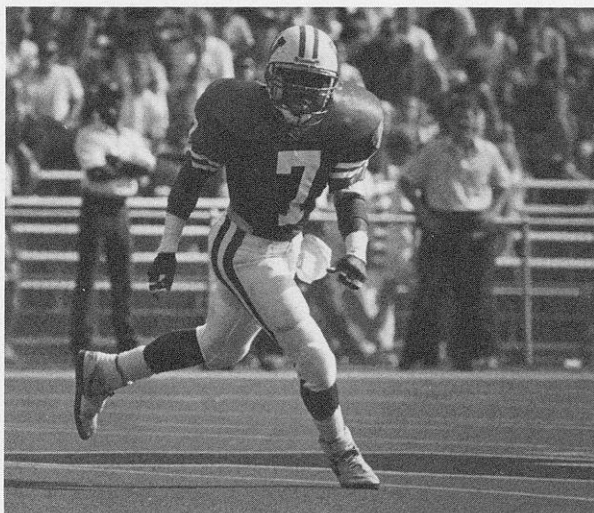
Carney are tied for the top spot entering fall workouts. Other challengers are sophomore Rory Lee (3rd in Big Ten kickoff returns), sophomore Brent Moss and redshirt freshman Jason Burns. *Alvarez says: "Robert has the experience based upon last season. Carney, Lee, Moss and Burns are all talented. We are also anxious to see what the recruited freshmen can offer."*

Fullback: Sophomore Mark Montgomery established himself as the top fullback. A recruited TB, Montgomery added 20 pounds since last season. Alvarez feels the fullback position has improved more than any spot on the team. Junior Kevin Ellison, a former LB, is the understudy. *Alvarez says: "Montgomery can be the guy in a one-back offense and his size is up to par with other Big Ten fullbacks."*

Kicking: Rich Thompson has led the Badgers in scoring twice. He made 10 field goals including 7-of-7 from less than 40 yards last year. Thompson also closed the spring with the punting job.

1991 Schedule: Wisconsin plays five Big Ten teams that participated in bowl games last year. The Badgers drop Michigan from the schedule, and pick up Purdue. The non-conference schedule includes three home games — Western Illinois, Iowa State and Eastern Michigan — for the second year in a row.

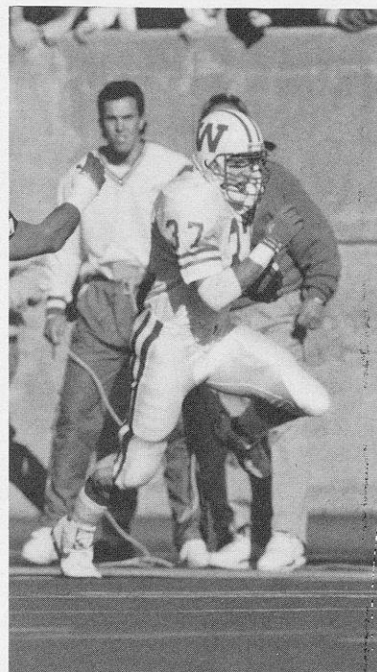

Head Coach

"There can be no quick fix. I want to have a consistent program, and there are no shortcuts to get there. People here are hungry for a winner, and I believe we'll have that at Wisconsin."

The Wisconsin Athletic Department closed the decade of the '80s with renewed optimism. One reason was the appointment of Barry Alvarez as the school's 27th football coach on Dec. 31, 1989.

A former assistant coach at both Notre Dame and Iowa, Alvarez has been associated with strong winning traditions. He coached in a bowl game nine consecutive years during his stints with the Irish and Hawkeyes.

Despite a 1-10 record in Alvarez' first season (1990) at Wisconsin, many gains were made. Consider the following:

— the Badgers averaged 51,027 fans per home game, an increase of 9,293 over 1988. . . that increase ranked third nationally (behind Texas and California) . . . Wisconsin's increase was almost double the next best jump in the Big Ten (Michigan State increased 5,414 per game).

— Don Davey became the first Badger since 1987 to make first team all-Big Ten . . . he earned academic all-American praise for the fourth straight year.



— Wisconsin's 1991 recruiting haul ranked in the top half of the Big Ten and included several prep all-Americans and 13 academically honored students.

Alvarez is committed to returning Wisconsin football to a competitive level within the Big Ten Conference. Looking at his personal record, that's merely standard fare for Barry.

For three seasons, Alvarez was a defensive assistant for Coach Lou Holtz at Notre Dame. He served as linebackers coach in 1987, was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1988 and worked as assistant head coach in 1989 for the Irish.

Notre Dame finished 17th, 1st and 2nd in the final *Associated Press* poll the three seasons Alvarez was there. The Fighting Irish won an incredible 23 consecutive games in 1988 and 1989.

The 1988 Fighting Irish team won a national championship and posted a perfect 12-0 record. As

coordinator, Barry's defense ranked third nationally in scoring, 10th against the run and 13th in total defense. A Fiesta Bowl victory over West Virginia capped the undefeated season.

Notre Dame was 12-1 in 1989 and was the nation's No. 1 team for 11 straight weeks. Alvarez' defense keyed a 21-6 Orange Bowl victory over top-ranked Colorado. The 1989 ND defense was nationally ranked in every category: scoring (12th), turnover margin (13th), rushing (14th) and total (14th) and passing (43rd) defense.

Barry coached all-American linebackers in each of his three seasons in South Bend. Michael Stonebreaker was a consensus all-America pick in 1988. Ned Bolcar, Cedric Figaro and Wes Pritchett also made all-America squads once for Alvarez.

As an Iowa assistant, Barry coached LBs from 1979-86. The Hawkeyes went to postseason games the last six years, including Rose Bowls in 1982 and 1986. Alvarez helped the Hawkeyes turn a program, which hadn't had a winning season in 17 years, into a regular bowl game participant.

His prize pupil at Iowa was two-time consensus all-American linebacker Larry Station. An academic all-American as well, Station is the Hawkeyes' career tackle leader. Alvarez coached five first team all-Big Ten linebackers at Iowa.

Barry got his coaching start in 1971 as an assistant at Lincoln

Norvell got his coaching start as a graduate assistant at Iowa in 1986. The Hawkeyes played in the Holiday Bowl that season.

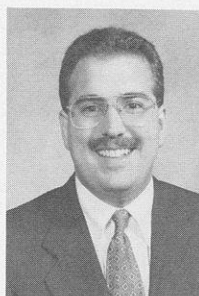
Jay had National Football League tryouts with the Chicago Bears and Denver Broncos. Norvell played one year (1987) with the Bears.

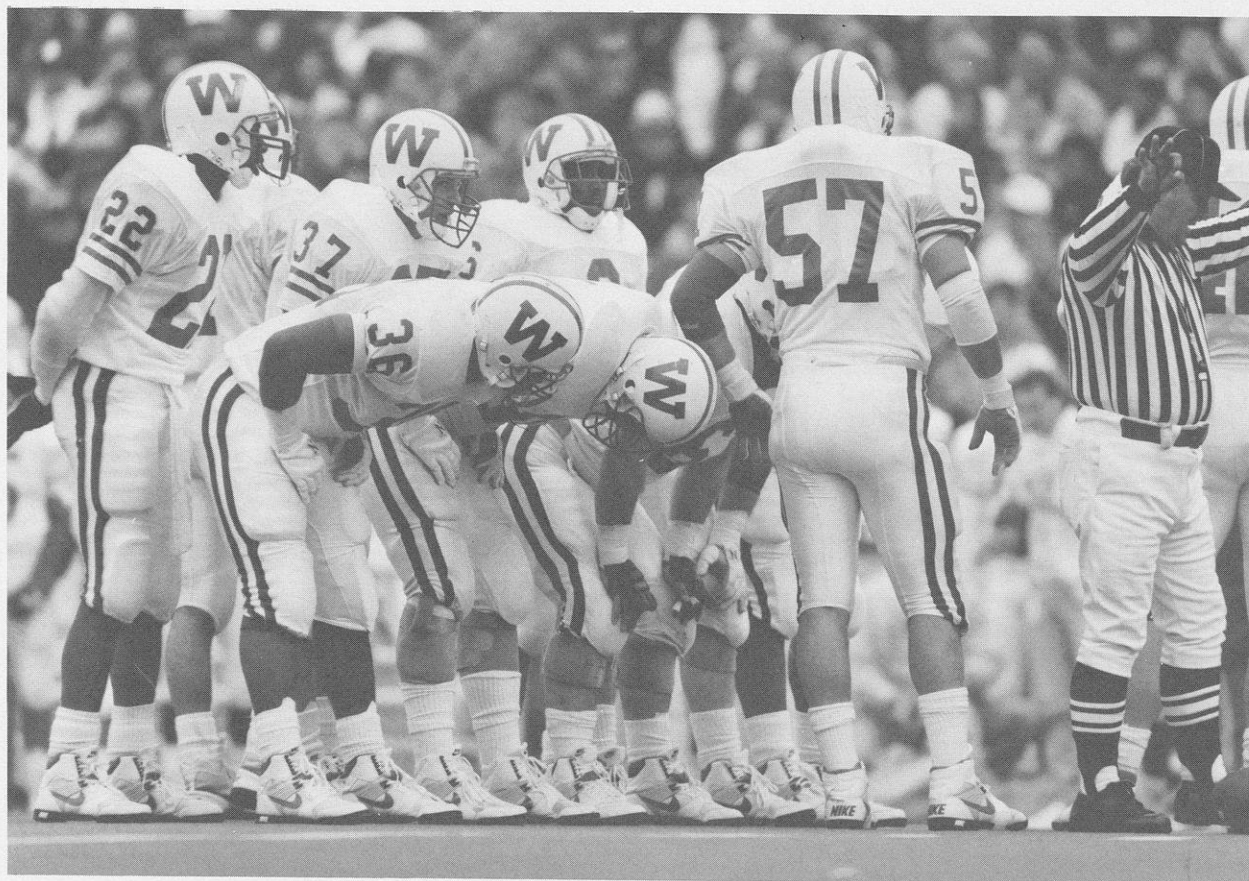
Jim Roberts begins his fifth year working with the Badger football program. He has been in charge of video operations and equipment for the squad since 1986.

1990 Review



The accomplishments . . .

The 1990 Badger football season included a nationally ranked attendance increase, the first all-Big Ten player in four seasons and marked the start of a new era.

1990 Highlights

1990 RECAP: Wisconsin finished 1-10 overall, but was in a position to win every game in the fourth quarter except against Michigan. Three times -- vs. Temple, Iowa and Indiana -- Wisconsin was within a touchdown entering the final quarter.

DEFENSIVE DATA: Five Badgers -- Gary Casper, Greg Thomas, Don Davey, Brendan Lynch and Scott Nelson -- reached the century mark in tackles . . . the UW defense gave up 15 touchdowns in the last five games, but only five were on drives longer than 40 yards.

OFFENSIVE INFORMATION: QB Tony Lowery passed for 1,757 yards, the fourth best figure in school history . . . TB Robert Williams rushed for 541 yards, the best by a Badger since 1987.

FAN SUPPORT: Wisconsin averaged 51,424 fans per game in 1990, sixth best in the Big Ten and 31st in the nation . . . the home-game average was 51,027 . . . that was an increase of 9,293 over 1989 . . . Wisconsin's increase was almost double the next best improvement in the Big Ten (Michigan State jumped 5,414 fans per game) and the third best in the NCAA (trailing Texas and California).

IOWA CITY, Iowa — The upstart Badgers led Iowa 10-3 before a late second-period rally paved the way for a 30-10 Hawkeye victory on homecoming. It was the second week in a row that the Wisconsin defense had a second quarter lapse.

The Badger running game came alive with 104 yards in the first half. Robert Williams gained 82 first-half yards and his 20-yard touchdown gave the Badgers a 10-3 advantage.

Iowa rallied with a 77-yard scoring drive that ended on Tony Stewart's 33-yard run. That tied the game at 10. The Hawkeyes took the lead for good when Merton Hanks blocked a punt out of the end zone with 17 seconds left in the first half for a safety.

1895—Wisconsin plays vital role in the organization of the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives, which eventually became the Big Ten.

1896—Wisconsin claims first outright Big Ten championship enroute to 7-1-1 record for Coach Phil King.

1897—Coach Phil King produces second straight Big Ten title and outscored opponents 210-14 in 9-1 campaign. The Badgers beat Minnesota, Chicago and Northwestern on the road.

1901—First undefeated team in UW history posts 9-0 mark for Coach Phil King and wins third conference title in six years. Eight shutouts highlight the season as UW has 317-5 scoring advantage.

1902—Lost 6-0 to Michigan breaking a 17-game Badger winning streak.

1906—Dr. C.P. Hutchins coaches Badgers to 5-0 record and another Big Ten championship.

1912—Last undefeated Wisconsin football team (7-0) won the

school's fifth Big Ten title for first-year coach William Juneau. Seven Badgers named to Walter Eckersall's all-Western team.

1942—UW is named mythical national champion by the Helms Foundation after 8-1-1 season. A stunning 6-0 loss to Iowa prevented the Badgers from earning a conference championship.

1951—The "Hard Rocks" team led the nation in total defense and set five Big Ten records in a 7-1-1 campaign. The UW defense outscored the opponents' offense 58-53. Four Badgers earned all-American praise.

1952—Wisconsin voted to represent Big Ten in '53 Rose Bowl after Purdue and the Badgers finished with 4-1-1 records. USC scores a third-period TD for a 7-0 Rose Bowl victory.

1953—Badgers upset then No. 1-ranked Illinois 34-7 at Camp Randall Stadium.

1954—Alan Ameche becomes the only Badger to win the Heisman Trophy, given to the nation's top collegiate football player.

1959—UW rallies to defeat Minnesota 11-7 and earn second Rose Bowl berth. Badgers lose to Washington 44-8 at Pasadena.

1962—The No. 2-ranked Badgers make their second Rose Bowl appearance in three years. The foe was top-rated USC. Badgers' 23-

point fourth quarter rally falls short in 42-37 Rose Bowl loss. Ron VanderKelen was named Big Ten MVP, and Wisconsin led the nation in total offense.

1974—Billy Marek scores five touchdowns and rushes for 304 yards as Badgers close season with 49-14 win over Minnesota.

1981—Matt VandenBoom intercepts three passes to spark Badgers' 21-14 victory over No. 1-ranked Michigan. Wisconsin earns trip to Garden State Bowl under guidance of Coach Dave McClain. Badgers fall to Tennessee 28-21 in bowl game.

1982—John Williams tallied the only score in a 6-0 win at Ohio State, the Badgers' first triumph in Columbus since 1918. Randy Wright's 87-yard pass to Tim Stracka, the longest in UW history, keys 14-3 Independence Bowl win over Kansas State.

1983—Al Toon sets Big Ten record with 252 yards receiving in a 42-38 victory at Purdue.

1985—Three former Badgers — Al Toon (Jets), Richard Johnson (Oilers) and Darryl Sims (Steelers) — are first-round National Football League draft picks.

1990—Don Davey becomes the first four-time first team academic all-American in NCAA university division history.

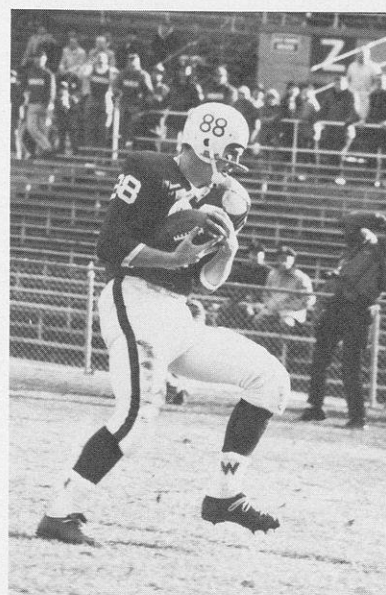

Low-scoring Rose tilt to USC

PASADENA, Calif. — Southern Cal scored the game's only points on a 22-yard touchdown pass from Rudy Bukich to Al Carmichael in the Trojan's 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl. It was the Badgers' first postseason appearance.

The Badgers dominated the game from a statistical standpoint, outgaining USC by 120 yards. Led by tailback Alan Ameche's 133 yards, Wisconsin had a 211-48 advantage on the ground. However, both defenses rose to the occasion when necessary.

One of Wisconsin's best scoring chances came in the opening minutes of the third quarter. Ameche got loose for a 54-yard run as the Badgers got to the USC 21-yard line. On third down, Archie Ray Burks fumbled on an end run and the Trojans recovered.

USC then put together the game-winning drive (73 yards), which ended on Bukich's touchdown pass. Wisconsin countered with a 13-play, 84-yard drive that ended at the Trojan two-yard line when Jerry Witt was stopped a yard short of a first down on a fake field goal play.

Coach Ivy Williamson's club became the first in Badger history to play in a bowl game and the first to play before a crowd of more than 100,000.

Thorny roses for Bucky

PASADENA, Calif. — Underdog Washington scored the game's first 17 points enroute to a 44-8 Rose Bowl victory over the Badgers. It was Wisconsin's second Rose Bowl trip.

Washington tallied the first TD on a six-yard run by Don McKeta about 10 minutes into the game. George Fleming booted a 26-yard FG after the Huskies recovered one of four Wisconsin fumbles. Fleming then returned a punt 53 yards for a score on the final play of the period for a 17-0 first quarter lead.

Badger fullback Tom Wiesner tallied Wisconsin's only points on a four-yard run with 5:27 left in the opening half. Dale Hackbart connected with Al Schoonover for a two-point conversion cutting the lead to nine points (17-8).

Husky quarterback Bob Schloredt, who shared game MVP honors with Fleming, tossed a 23-yard TD pass to close first-half scoring. Schloredt completed four passes for 102 yards and was the game's top rusher (81 yards).

Wisconsin mounted a final challenge in the third quarter, but four plays inside the Husky 10-yard line failed. Washington then marched 93 yards on 10 plays for another tally. Coach Milt Bruhn's Badgers entered the game with a defense that had surrendered just over 10 points per game for the regular season.

Rose rally falls short

PASADENA, Calif. — A 23-point fourth quarter explosion ended just short as the Badgers dropped a 42-37 Rose Bowl encounter to Southern Cal. The Trojans had claimed a 42-14 lead on the first play of the fourth quarter before the huge Badger comeback.

USC raced to a 21-7 halftime lead and extended it on the first play of the third stanza. Quarterback Pete Beathard hit Hal Bedsole for a 57-yard score. But then Badger quarterback Ron VanderKelen led one of the biggest charges in bowl-game history.

VanderKelen reached paydirt on a 17-yard scamper cutting the margin to 28-14. Southern Cal responded with a pair of TD passes by Beathard and USC led 42-14 with 14:54 left to play.

Lou Holland (13-yard run) and Gary Kroner (4-yard pass from VanderKelen) tallied for the Badgers within three minutes. A bad center snap on a punt resulted in a UW safety and a 42-30 Trojan advantage. After the free kick, VanderKelen hit three straight passes including a 19-yard score to Pat Richter for the final tally.

VanderKelen, the game MVP, set both Wisconsin and Rose Bowl records with 401 yards passing. Richter caught 11 of those aerials for 163 yards. The 79 total points was a Rose Bowl record that stood for 28 years.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Tennessee scored 18 straight points in the first half and held on to defeat Wisconsin 28-21 in the Garden State Bowl.

The Badger defense limited UT to 89 yards rushing, but Volunteer QB Steve Alatorre unleashed a potent passing attack. Alatorre threw for 315 yards, completing 24 of 42 attempts. WR Anthony Hancock caught 11 passes for 196 yards. His 43-yard TD reception upped Tennessee's halftime lead to 21-7.

After Fuad Reveiz booted the first of his two field goals in the first quarter, Wisconsin assumed its only lead of the game on a three-yard run by Jess Cole. Willie Gault returned the ensuing kickoff 87 yards to give Tennessee a lead it never lost.

Reserve quarterback Randy Wright came off the bench to throw a pair of second-half touchdown passes for the Badgers. Wright hit Jeff Nault and Thad McFadden on scoring tosses in the final period.

The game featured two high-powered offenses which combined for 49 points, 793 total yards and 49 first downs. The teams averaged just under five yards per offensive play.

Wisconsin's third bowl game in school history and first non-Rose Bowl drew a crowd of 53,220. The Badgers' seven victories were the most since UW won the same number in 1974.

Independence at last

SHREVEPORT, La. — Wisconsin won its first bowl game in the school's history with a 14-3 Independence Bowl victory over Kansas State.

Randy Wright threw a bowl-game record two touchdown passes and the Badger defense set a scoring record in the matchup between Big Ten and Big Eight schools before 24,684 fans. The anticipated crowd was over 49,000, but a 23-mile-per-hour wind dropped temperatures to 10 below zero.

Wright, the game offensive MVP, completed only nine of 24 throws. However, his 87-yard effort to Tim Stracka was the longest in Wisconsin and Independence Bowl history. The UW defense limited Kansas State to 192 total yards in the Wildcats' first-ever postseason appearance.

"Winning our first bowl game was a big thing for our program," Coach Dave McClain said.

KSU had taken a 3-0 lead on Steve Willis' 29-yard field goal before the Badgers scored 14 straight points. Noseguard Tim Krumrie was the game Defensive MVP. He helped limit the Kansas State running attack to less than two yards per carry.

Game totals showed: five turnovers, 14 punts, 22 completions in 59 attempts (37.3 percent) and 14 penalties.

Todd Gregoire's attempt with 1:55 left never materialized after holder Bob Kobza dropped the center snap. Gregoire, a freshman, had tied a school record with four field goals earlier in the game.

Wisconsin had assumed a 13-0 lead on a pair of Gregoire three pointers and a three-yard TD pass from Mike Howard to Thad McFadden. The Badgers outgained their SEC foe both on the ground and through the air.

However, UW was assessed 13 penalties for 133 yards, both Hall of Fame Bowl records. The Badgers also suffered two interceptions. Kentucky, which was making its second straight postseason appearance in Birmingham, had no turnovers.

Besides Wisconsin game MVP Gregoire, Joe Armentrout (115 yards rushing) and Howard (19 completions for 203 yards) were the Badger stars on offense.

Over 7,500 Badger fans made the trip to the school's third bowl game in four seasons.

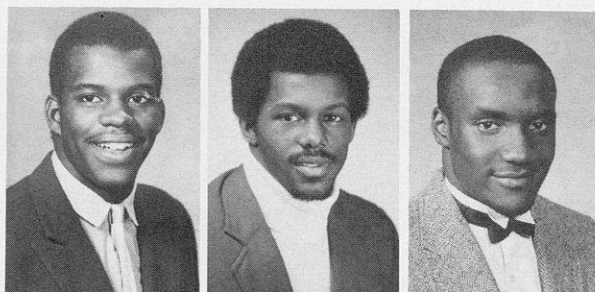

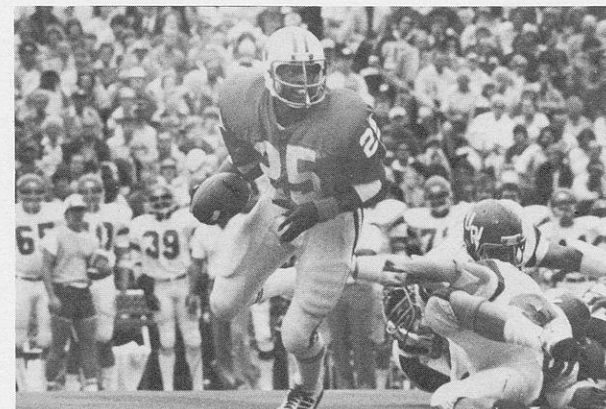

Hall of Fame



The Wisconsin Athletic Department in conjunction with the National "W" Club established its own Hall of Fame in 1991. Thirty-five of the most successful people associated with Badger athletics were inducted into the Hall as members of the inaugural class. Following are the 15 honorees that were associated with the football program at UW.

Alan "The Horse" Ameche won the Heisman Trophy and the Big Ten MVP Award in 1954. The two-time all-American and three-time all-Big Ten fullback set conference (2,463 yards) and NCAA (3,345) career rushing marks.

Rolland Barnum was a nine-time Badger letterman in football, basketball and baseball. He played semi-professional basketball and baseball upon graduation. Barnum officiated Big Ten football for 21 seasons.

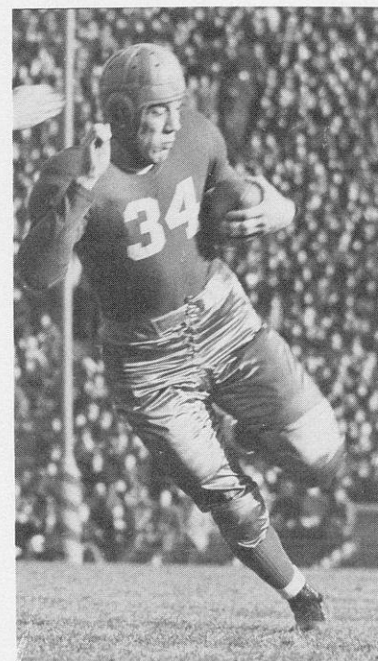
Milt Bruhn led Wisconsin to Big Ten titles and Rose Bowl berths in 1959 and 1962. Three of his

teams were ranked in the nation's Top Ten including the 1962 Badgers, which finished second. His 1957-58-59 teams posted a 20-6-1 record.

Howard Buck was a three-year letterman at tackle for Wisconsin. He captained the 1915 club and earned all-Big Ten and all-American honors. After graduation, Buck spent one season (1916) as a UW assistant coach.

Pat Harder, a bruising fullback in the 1940s, led the Big Ten in rushing (590 yards) and scoring (58 points) as a sophomore. Pat was an all-Big Ten and all-American selection for Wisconsin's third-ranked Badgers in 1942.

Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch made his mark at Wisconsin as both a

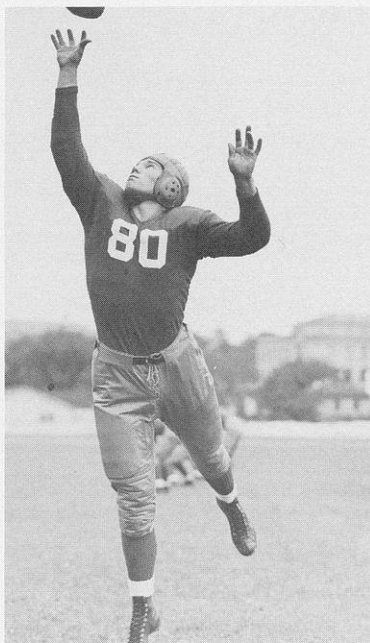
player and administrator. He was a star halfback of the '42 Badger team, which placed third nationally. Elroy served as Athletic Director from 1969-87, the longest tenure in school history.

Arlie Mucks, Sr., was an all-Western Conference and all-America pick in 1914. The two-sport star won a silver medal in the discus at the 1912 Olympic Games and captured national championships in the shot put and discus three times.

Pat O'Dea, nicknamed the "Kangaroo Kicker," immigrated to Madison from Australia. He excelled as a drop kicker making four field goals in one game and 14 in one season. Pat made a legendary 65 yarder in a snow-storm at Northwestern in 1898.

Pat Richter is the last Badger to win nine letters. He was a two-time all-American (1961-62) in football and earned academic all-American praise as a senior. Pat won the NCAA Silver Anniversary Award in 1988, the same year he was named UW Athletic Director.

Harlan Rogers lettered three times in football, basketball and baseball at Wisconsin. He played left end for three years and captained the squad as a senior. Rogers is a member of the Wisconsin State Hall of Fame. A scholarship has been established in his name at the University.

Dave Schreiner earned all-American honors twice in his career at end. The Big Ten Conference MVP in 1942, Dave was team captain and led the Badgers in receiving as a senior. He once caught three TDs in a quarter vs. Marquette in 1942.

Howard Weiss, a former senior class president at Wisconsin, made his mark on the gridiron as well. Howard lettered three seasons, captained the '38 squad and was a two-time Badger MVP. Weiss closed his career as Big Ten MVP in 1938.

Rollie Williams was a model student-athlete-administrator at Wisconsin. He won nine letters, made the all-Western Conference football team in 1922, served as senior class president and was employed as an Assistant Director of Athletics.

Ivan Williamson compiled a 29-13-4 record as football coach. He led the 1952 Badgers to a Big Ten title and Rose Bowl berth. Ivan was Badger Athletic Director from 1955-69. He is a former chairman of the NCAA Football Rules Committee.

Robert Wilson is a three-time Wisconsin football Most Valuable Player (1947-48-49). As a senior, he was Big Ten MVP too. Also a four-year starter in baseball at UW, Robert was senior class vice-president and the Big Ten Medal of Honor winner in 1950.

Alan Ameche, fullback

One of the greatest running backs in UW history and the Heisman Trophy winner in 1954. Nicknamed "The Horse," Ameche was a two-time all-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time leading rusher (3,212 yards). Alan led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl, where he rushed for 133 yards against USC. The five-time Pro Bowl selection was inducted in the NFL Hall of Fame in 1975.

Elroy Hirsch, tailback

Although he played football only one season at Wisconsin, Hirsch is one of the most beloved figures in Badger sports history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He also starred for nine seasons with the Los Angeles Rams before returning to Wisconsin as Athletic Director from 1969-87.

The two-time all-American end was named Western (later the Big Ten) Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three seasons at Wisconsin as an end both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. After graduation, he served as a company commander of the Sixth Marine Division.

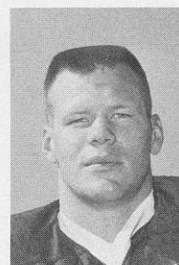
Allan Shafer, quarterback

History: Founded in 1849, the University of Wisconsin-Madison is the nation's fifth largest institution. Dedicated to the support of academic freedom, the UW-Madison has ranked among the top universities in the United States in every scholarly pursuit since 1910.

Accomplishments: The UW-Madison has been a leader in many areas. Among the breakthroughs at UW: establishing the first academic programs in the U.S. for Scandinavian Studies (1875), Psychology (1888), Agricultural Economics (1909), Genetics (1910) and Wildlife Management (1939); launching the world's first space observatory; conducting the first bone marrow transplant in the United States; operating the nation's first radio station (WHA) in 1917; discovering Vitamins A and B; and finding evidence to link cancer with saccharine and cyclamates.

Programs: The UW has 11 schools and colleges, 133 academic departments, over 16,000 faculty and staff and a budget over \$1 billion. In one of the most thorough studies of its kind, the *Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the U.S.*, ranked the UW tied for eighth in reputation for academic quality. Majors are offered in 151 bachelors, 191 masters and 123 doctorate programs.

Students: Over 43,000 students attend the University, coming from every county in Wisconsin, all 50 states and more than 125 countries. The UW ranks fourth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment, making it one of the nation's most diverse populations.

Faculty: The UW-Madison faculty routinely win national citations for teaching excellence, research and service. Much of the university's international reputation comes from the quality of its faculty. In fact, UW faculty and alumni have accounted for 11 Nobel and 16 Pulitzer Prizes.

Athletics: A member of the prestigious Big Ten Conference, Wisconsin offers its student-athletes the finest opportunities in both academic and athletic pursuits. The Badger men's athletic department sponsors competition in basketball, crew, cross country, football, golf, hockey, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and wrestling.

Landmarks: Tree-lined Bascom Hill is one of the university's most famous sites. Its centerpiece is Bascom Hall, which houses the UW's main administrative offices. Campus highlights also include North Hall (the oldest campus building), Van Hise Hall (the tallest building), Library Mall (featuring its clock tower) and Picnic Point (a 129-acre peninsula). The Memorial Union, complete with its lakeside terrace, is a favorite meeting place for students.

Dr. Donna E. Shalala, the first woman to lead a Big Ten University, has been the chancellor at UW-Madison since 1988.

As the leader of the nation's fifth largest university and the largest public research institution, Dr. Shalala has demonstrated a dynamic and energetic approach to dealing with issues in education.

During her tenure at Wisconsin, Dr. Shalala has launched efforts to strengthen undergraduate education; to be more competitive in recruiting and retaining top faculty, staff and students; to upgrade research facilities; to increase opportunities for women and members of minority groups on campus; and to strengthen the university's research program.

Dr. Shalala has garnered high national visibility during the past year. She was named one of the top five managers in higher education by *Business Week* and was tagged one of the fifty most

powerful women in the United States by *Ladies Home Journal*.

In the athletic environment, Dr. Shalala has been a leader in restructuring the UW Athletic Department. She also serves on the Knight Commission, a national panel that is charting reform in intercollegiate athletics.

Prior to her arrival at Wisconsin, Dr. Shalala served for seven years as president of Hunter College. She served on the faculty at Columbia University and as Assistant Secretary for Policy Development and Research of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development during the Carter Administration.

She is a member of the National Academy of Public Administration and the National Academy of Education, and has received more than a dozen honorary degrees.

Public service has been a hallmark of her career. She spent two years in the Peace Corps. She is vice chair of the Children's Defense Fund, a trustee of the Committee for Economic Development, a member of the board of directors of Spelman College, the Brookings Institution, the American Ditchley Foundation, the Institute for International Economics and the Spencer Foundation.

Chancellor Shalala earned her bachelor's degree from Western College for Women (Oxford, Ohio) in 1962 and her doctorate degree from Syracuse in 1970.

Traditions

Bucky Badger

The university's nickname, "Badgers," was borrowed from the state. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State" not because of the animals in the region, but rather an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Badgers in various forms have been recognized as the UW mascot for decades. The version currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white letter sweater, was developed in 1940 by artist Art Evans.

A 1949 homecoming pep rally contest was staged to give a name to Madison's favorite Badger. The winner was Buckingham U. Badger, or Bucky, for short. The name apparently came from a line in the song, "On, Wisconsin." The lyrics encourage the Wisconsin football team to "buck right through that line."

"On, Wisconsin"

The university's school song was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago. Words were written by UW alumnus Carl Beck. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. The copyright to "On, Wisconsin" is owned by Michael Jackson, who purchased the music from Paul McCartney.

"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brainstorm of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He saw University of Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed Wisconsin students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank after each game.

Band Caps

When a Badger team wins a game, the members of the band turn their hats around and wear them backwards. The practice started in the 1920s to symbolize the band looking back at their victory in the days when they marched out with the departing crowd.

Paul Bunyan Axe

Every year when Wisconsin battles Minnesota on the gridiron, there's more at stake than bragging rights. The winner of each year's football game returns to campus with the legendary Paul Bunyan Axe. The battle between the Badgers and Golden Gophers is the longest running rivalry in Division I. The teams have met 100 times, including 84 consecutive meetings.

The axe legend was born in 1948 when the Wisconsin National "W" Club presented Minnesota with the axe wielded by Paul Bunyan, the mythical giant of Midwestern lumbercamps. Each year since, the winner of the annual battle between Big Ten rivals is presented with the axe, complete with scores inscribed on the handle, for display on its campus. Since the tradition was started, UW leads the series 21-19-3.

Fifth Quarter

Football games traditionally last four quarters, but there is a special post-game celebration at Wisconsin home games known as the "Fifth Quarter." Win or lose, the nationally known Wisconsin marching band performs a half-hour post-game concert.

Band members play their instruments, dance the polka and generally tear around the field. Fans now wait for the famous celebration since Band Director Michael Leckrone added crowd-participation gimmicks. A local sportswriter dubbed the ritual the "Fifth Quarter."

Graduating Law Students

At the homecoming game, graduating law students throw canes over the cross bar of the goal post in a pre-game ceremony. If they catch their canes, they are supposed to win their first case. If the cane is dropped, the case will be lost. The custom originated at Harvard and came to UW in 1910.

Madison

Wisconsin's capital city

The Community

Located in southern Wisconsin, Madison is home to both the university and the state capital. The city was designed so that the school and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of academics and politics in Wisconsin.

One of the Midwest's most vibrant communities, Madison offers an endearing quality of life to both its residents and students.

The centerpiece of the city is the State Capitol. The campus is west of the Capitol and offers easy access to shopping malls, restaurants for every taste and popular night spots.

With a diverse population of more than 180,000, Madison offers the unique combination of big-city excitement plus small-town charm. Madison is an action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts and recreation.

Besides the UW Athletic Department, the city offers a large quantity and high quality of outdoor leisure activities. *Outside* magazine ranked Madison as one of the Top 15 sports towns in the nation in 1989.

Sailing and other outdoor activities are common on Lakes Mendota and Monona near the UW-Madison campus.

The Campus

The campus is situated among rolling hills and wooded areas between Lakes Mendota and Monona. The 900-acre campus features many landmarks:

Bascom Hall — a stately building (of Italian High Renaissance Wren-modified architecture), which houses campus administration.

Camp Randall — site of the intercollegiate athletic and recreational facility, it was originally an Army training ground during the Civil War. Included on the east end is the Memorial Arch, built in 1912.

Memorial Union — the “living room of the campus,” which includes the lakeside terrace.

North Hall — the first building on campus (1851), designated a National Historic Landmark in 1966.

Van Hise Hall — the tallest building on campus (19 stories) and home to the administration of the University of Wisconsin System.

Pat Richter

Athletic Director

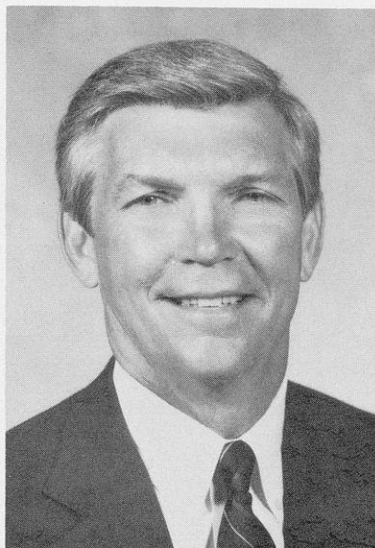
Pat Richter, a name synonymous with success in Madison and at the University of Wisconsin, is in his second season as Athletic Director of his alma mater.

Named to his position on Dec. 15, 1989, Richter is in charge of one of the nation's most successful collegiate athletic programs. He directs a program which has 20 sports, nearly 1,000 athletes, more than 160 employees and a large physical plant.

Since Richter's takeover the Wisconsin Athletic Department has made giant strides. Richter first lured Barry Alvarez from Notre Dame to head the football program. Richter oversaw an improvement in facilities boosting UW's ranking to among the nation's best. He also helped regain program support from every corner of the state.

In his opening year on the job, Richter saw both the hockey team and crew win national championships and track star Suzy Favor capture the Broderick Cup, an award given to the nation's top female athlete. Clearly, UW athletics are on the upswing and Richter is the driving force.

The 49-year-old Madison native was a three-sport letterman at UW. He is the last nine-time letterwinner in Badger history, gaining three monograms in football, basketball and baseball.



Pat Richter

On the Badger gridiron, Pat earned all-American and all-Big Ten mention twice as an end. He led Wisconsin to its last Rose Bowl appearance (1963) and set a game record with 11 receptions for 163 yards. The Badger's 42-37 loss to USC is recognized as the top Rose Bowl game ever.

Richter was an academic all-American in 1962 and was the recipient of the Big Ten Medal of Honor his senior season. Richter led Wisconsin in receiving twice, and his name remains in the school's record books.

As a slugging first baseman, Richter earned all-conference honors and led the Badgers in hits, home runs and runs batted in for

three straight years. Pat actually earned his scholarship to Wisconsin for basketball, where the 6-6 center played three seasons.

After earning his Bachelor of Science degree from UW in Landscape Architecture in 1964, Pat was a first-round draft pick of the Washington Redskins. He played nine seasons (1963-71) as an end and punter.

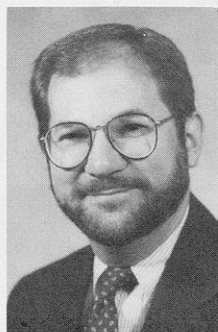
Upon retirement from the NFL, he returned to the UW-Madison to earn his law degree (1971). After six months with a Madison law firm, he worked his way up to Vice President of Personnel at the Oscar Mayer Corporation.

Among his achievements, Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the Wisconsin State Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame, the NFL Player and Alumni Associations and the American Bar Association.

Pat is a regular contributor to many charitable organizations, including the UW Children's Hospital and the Four Lakes Boy Scouts.

Richter and his wife, Renee, have four children: Scott, Brad, Barry and Tim. Barry is a member of the Badger hockey team.

The Big Ten Conference was formed on Jan. 11, 1895, when Purdue President James H. Smart and six other university leaders established the principles for the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives.

Within the next year, those seven universities — University of Chicago, University of Illinois, University of Michigan, University of Minnesota, Northwestern University, Purdue University and University of Wisconsin — set the blueprints for what was to be called the "Western" or "Big Ten" Conference.

The makeup of league members has changed several times, with the addition of the Universities of Indiana and Iowa in 1899, Ohio State University in 1912, the departure of Chicago in 1946 and the addition of Michigan State University in 1949. Penn State University is the newest member of the league, and the Nittany Lions will compete for some league championships in 1991-92.

Football and baseball were the two most popular sports in the Big Ten prior to the turn of the century. Wisconsin had early success, winning the first two football championships. The Big Ten currently sponsors 11 championships for men and 10 for women.

The office of the commissioner was established in 1922, and Jim Delaney became just the fifth person to hold that prestigious position when he succeeded Wayne Duke on July 1, 1989. Delaney oversees the operation of the Big Ten Conference and its 24-member staff.

Camp Randall Stadium

The Wisconsin football team plays its home games in Camp Randall Stadium, one of the finest facilities of its kind.

The impressive double-deck structure and horseshoe stadium design are distinguishing characteristics of the 74-year-old facility.

Camp Randall's capacity has been raised many times and currently seats 77,745 fans. It is the 11th-largest college-owned facility in the nation.

Badger football teams have averaged better than 70,000 fans per game a dozen times since 1972. Wisconsin has drawn better than 70,000 spectators to 59 games since 1970. The single-game record is 80,024 set against Michigan in 1978. The last time UW drew better than 70,000 to a game was on homecoming vs. Northwestern in 1987.

Located on top of the west side of the stadium is the modern Communications Center, one of the

Midwest's best facilities for working press, radio and television. There are three floors in the Communications Center: Level 3 — working radio and photo decks; Level 4 — working press, coaches' booth and statistics crews; and Level 5 — corporate and TV broadcast booths.

Built in 1917, the stadium and grounds have a great history. Prior to the Civil War, the site was owned by the Wisconsin Agricultural Society. When hostilities broke out in 1861, the society turned the land over to the government for the state's major military training center.

When peace returned to the nation, the land was returned to State Fair property. The Fair later moved to Milwaukee, and the state's Civil War veterans urged the legislature to purchase the land. In 1893, the state presented the site to the university as a memorial athletic field.

Football joined the Wisconsin scene in 1889, but the first games were actually played on the lower part of campus. A "real" stadium was built in 1913, but the wooden stands collapsed in 1915. Two years later, a 10,000-seat concrete stadium was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature.

The first game played in Camp Randall Stadium was a thrilling 10-7 homecoming victory over arch-rival Minnesota in 1917. Capacity of the structure has increased several times, jumping to 51,000 by 1951. A revision of

the seating arrangements in 1955 boosted the capacity to 52,788. The running track was removed in 1958, the playing field was lowered 10 feet and 10,647 seats were added.

Capacity was raised to its current figure in 1966 with the addition of the second deck on the west side. The Communications Center was also built that season.

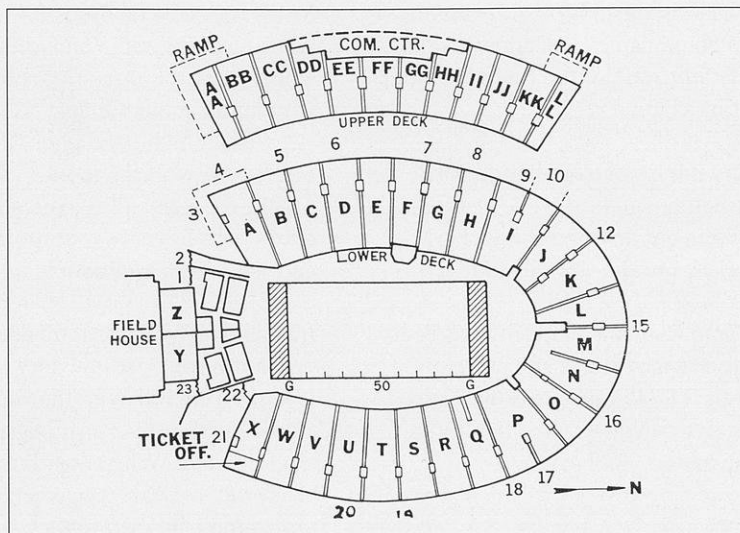
Fourteen corporate boxes were constructed in 1984 as well as several radio booths. In the summer of 1990, a new astro-turf playing field was installed. New scoreboards were added to the stadium prior to the '91 season.

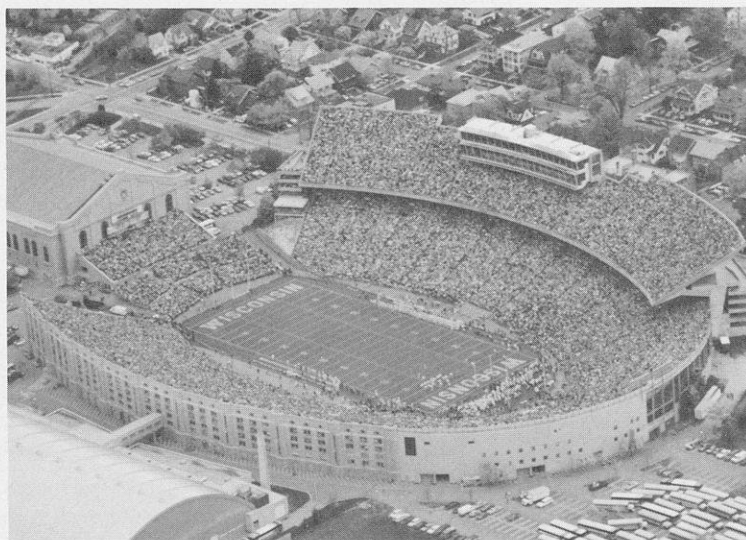


Camp Randall Stadium diagram

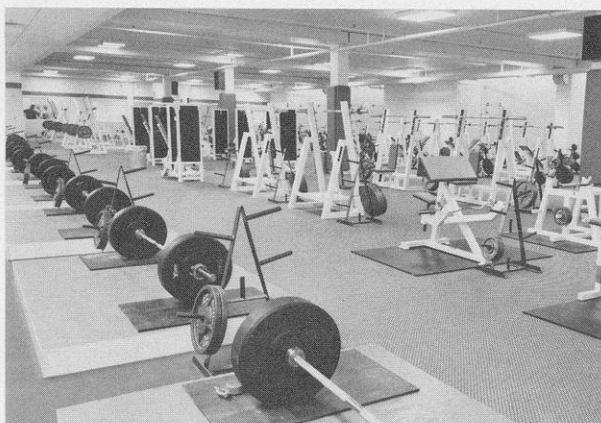

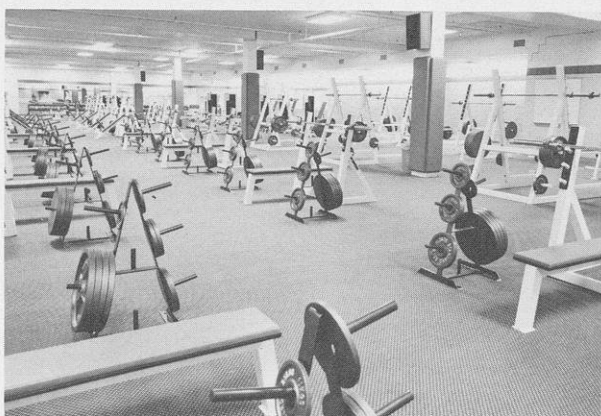

McClain Center

Opened in 1988, the Dave McClain Athletic Facility is a symbol of the Wisconsin Athletic Department's commitment toward developing a first-class sports program.

The 166,264-square foot facility compares favorably with the finest indoor training centers in the nation. Named in honor of the late Wisconsin football coach Dave McClain, the structure provides a first-class environment for practice during inclement weather.

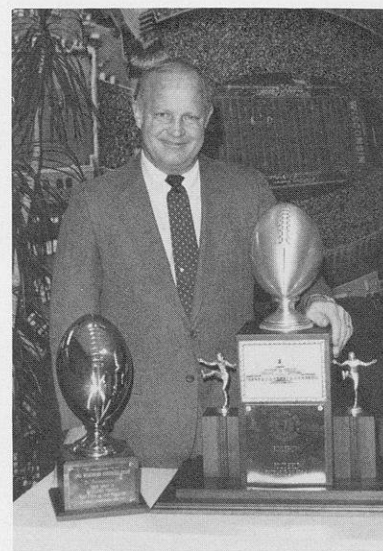
A 76,380-square foot main floor features an artificial playing surface with a ceiling high enough for kicking drills. The lower level

includes a lockerrooms, state-of-the-art training facilities and a huge weight room.

On the second level, a theater-style auditorium (seating 150), numerous classrooms and a player's lounge are the highlights. The entire facility cost \$9.5 million.

Located immediately north of the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, the domed structure is bordered by the UW Engineering building, Camp Randall Stadium and Camp Randall Park.

The McClain Athletic Facility was constructed in two phases. The

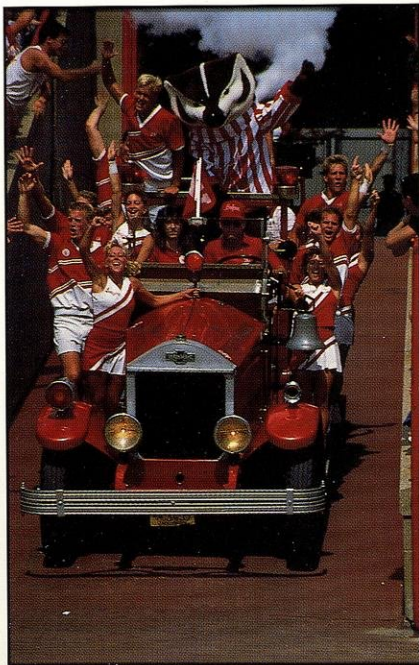
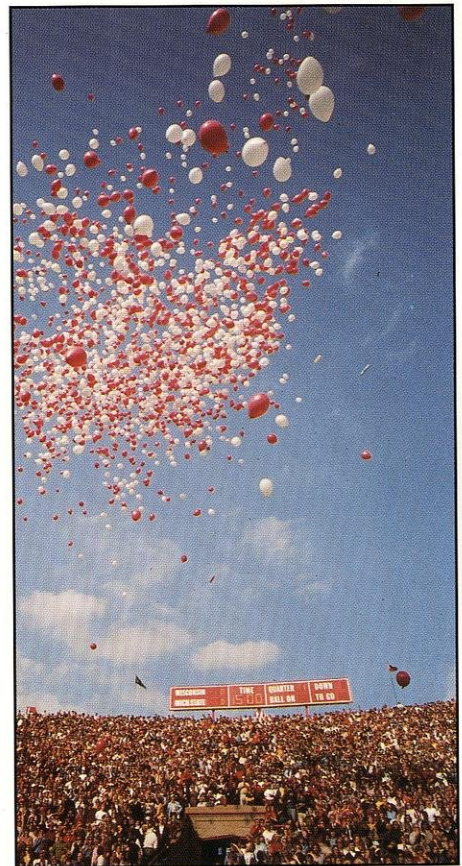
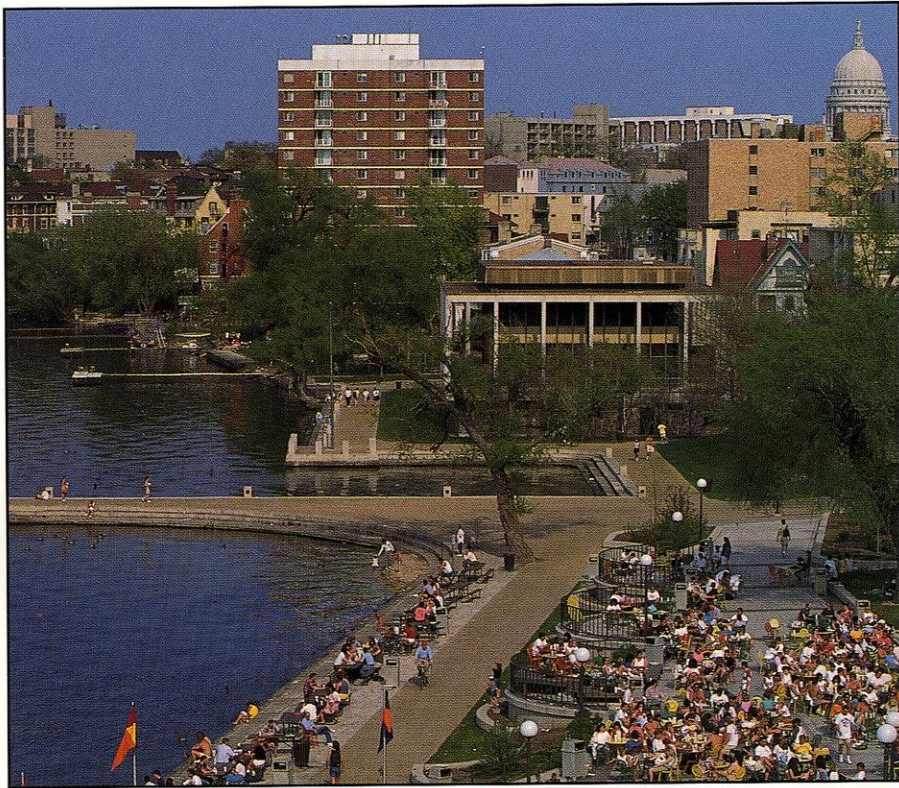


The McClain Athletic Facility has been the indoor home of the football team since '88.

first project consisted of a 330-foot by 220-foot concrete floor supporting the 90-yard practice field. The second phase included the lower level construction consisting of lockers, showers, storage areas, a sauna, a steam room and a rehabilitation pool.

To build the structure, over 70,000 cubic yards of earth had to be removed. Among the materials used in the construction were: 75,000 concrete blocks, 1,550 gallons of paint, 4,300 square feet of carpeting, 5.3 miles of piping, 27 miles of electrical wiring and 101,000 square feet of stainless steel roof material.
