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

Unfortunately many get busy with other matters and forget the obligations which were taken in their younger days when in the enthusiasm of youth they joined the church; namely to attend the services regularly.


Somehow on Holy Week we again allow our minds to think of those your which we took and again we intend to get back into the habit of attending the services of the church of our choice.
