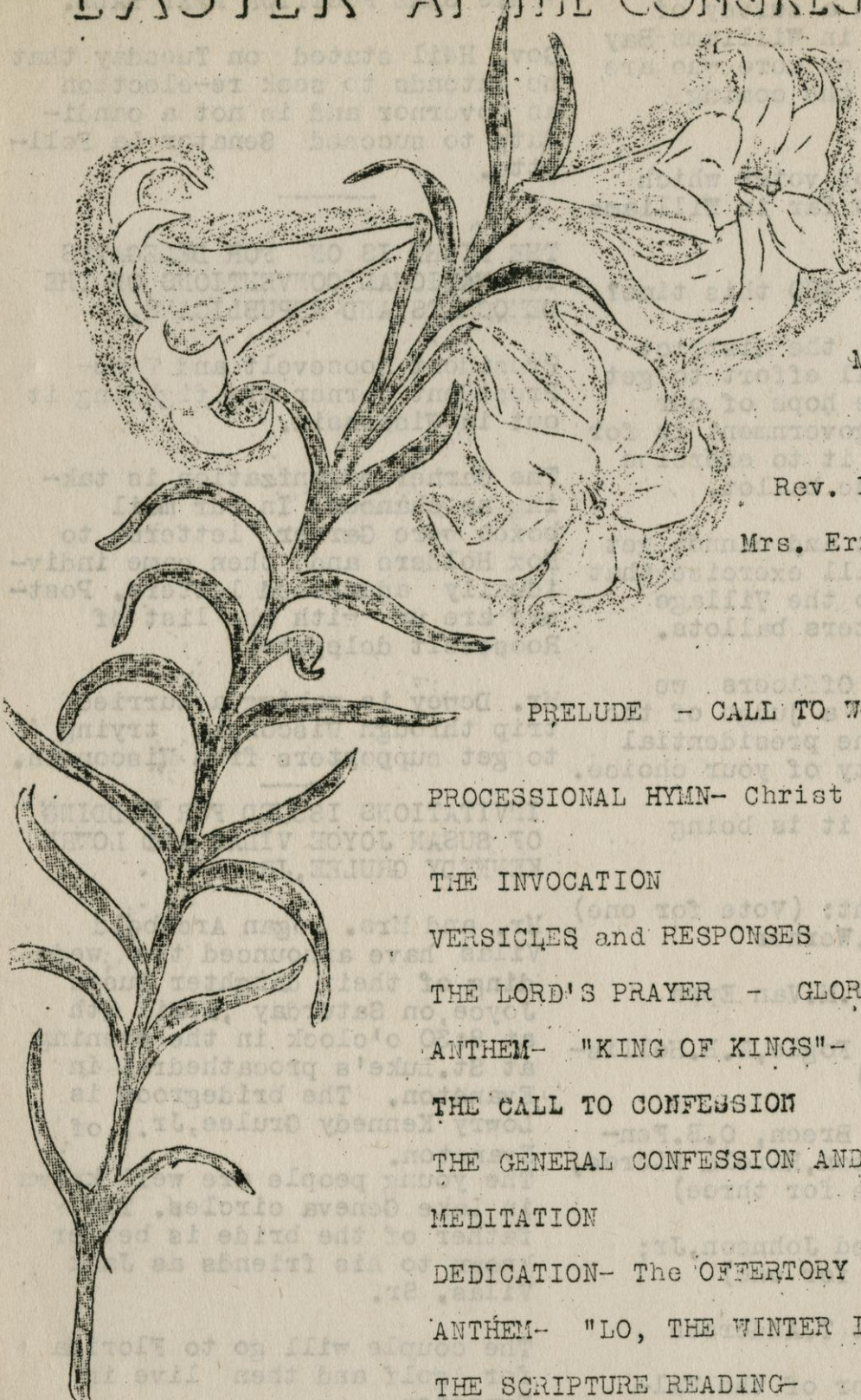

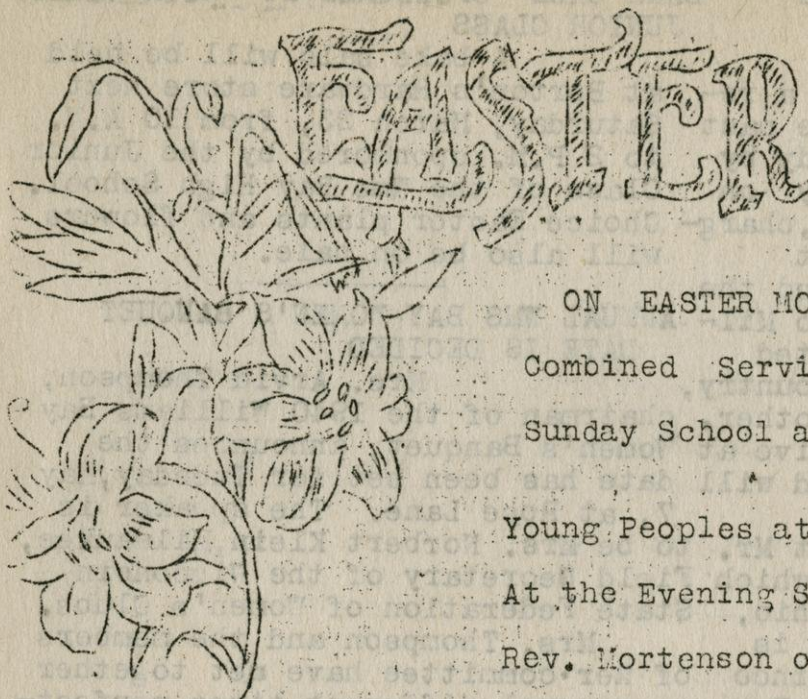
Mr. Dewey is making a hurried trip through Wisconsin trying to get supporters from Wisconsin.

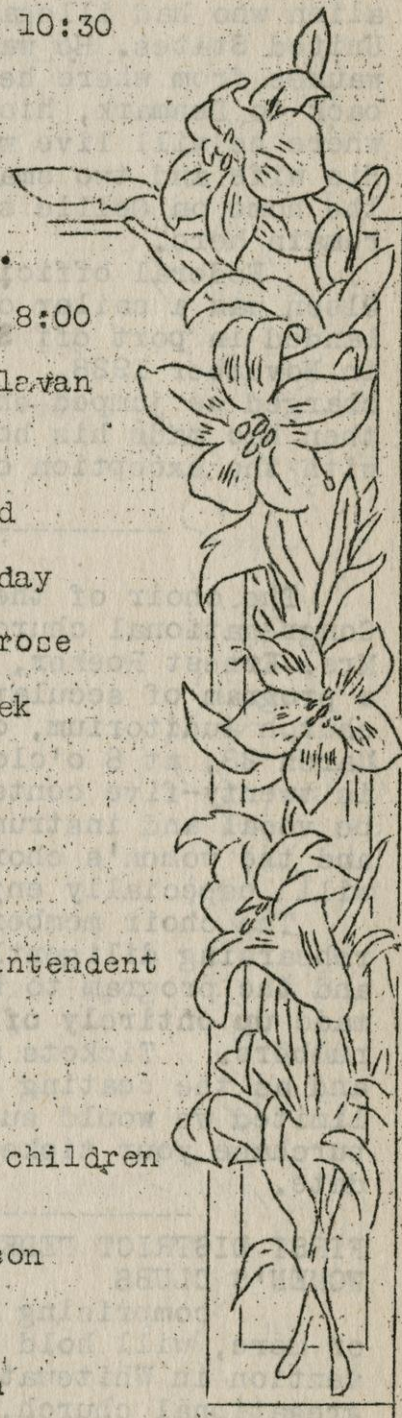

RESIDENT OF WILLIAMS BAY IS DE-
PORTED TO DENMARK

Carl Henry Olsen, 35, a resident of Williams Bay for the past ten years, was taken in custody by the sheriff of Walworth county on a department of labor warrant, charging that he was a non-resident alien who had illegally entered the United States. He was taken to Milwaukee from where he was started back to Denmark, his native country, where he will live with his mother. His wife and two small sons live at the home on Collie street, and will remain here.

Federal officials report Mr. Olsen was a sailor on a boat which landed in port off Sandusky, Ohio, in November 1928. There, it is charged he jumped ship, and since then has made his home in the Bay with the exception of a short time.

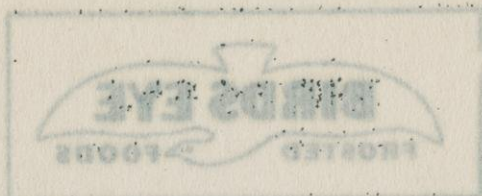
