ATHLETIC DIRECTOR GUY M. SUNDT

GUY M. SUNDT

Athletic Director

FIRST "honest-to-goodness" Badger to head up the University of Wisconsin intercollegiate athletic program, Guy M. Sundt, present director of athletics, certainly merits all of the honors bestowed upon him.

Guy was born in Madison on Feb. 18, 1898, then moved with his parents to Stoughton where he later starred as an all-around high school athlete. He enrolled at Wisconsin in the fall of 1918, graduated in 1922, and, with the exception of the next two years spent as athletic director and coach at Ripon College, Guy has been associated with Wisconsin athletics ever since.

An incident in 1919 provides an insight into the character of Guy Sundt. When he enrolled at Wisconsin in 1918, World War I had brought about freshman competition and Guy almost immediately became a regular on the varsity eleven. His performance was so outstanding that he was elected captain for the 1919 season.

Then came the Armistice and Charles "Chuck" Carpenter, who had been elected captain for the 1918 team but who entered the service before he could assume those responsibilities, returned to the campus.

Sundt gracefully and quietly stepped down and Carpenter took over the leadership of the team.

That single act was typical of Guy and down through the years since, he has won the admiration and respect of all his co-workers, friends, contestants, officials, and contemporaries because of his steadfast loyalty to Wisconsin and his fine sense of values.

All of this culminated in his being named to succeed Harry Stuhldreher as athletic director when the latter resigned Oct. 1, 1950.

While at Wisconsin, he won eight major sports letters. Four of them were in football, three more in track, and one in basketball.

As a hard-driving fullback and outstanding punter on the varsity football teams coached by Guy Lowman and John Richard, Sundt received All-American honorable mention by the late Walter Camp in 1921 and was Walter Eckersall's first choice as All-Western Conference player that same season. He captained the team in 1921 and also was voted the most valuable player. He was senior class president.

In track, he competed in the weights and broad jump, ranking high in the Big Ten meets.

Following his graduation as president of his 1922 class, he became athletic director and coached football, basketball, and track at Ripon College for two years. In the fall of 1924 he returned to Wisconsin as freshman football and basketball coach, assistant track coach, and instructor in physical education.

Since that time he has been associated with the department of intercollegiate athletics in either a coaching or directing capacity. He was varsity back-field coach and chief scout in football (1924-1948), assistant track and cross country coach (1924-48), head track and cross country coach (1948-50), freshman baseball coach (1925-26), freshman basketball coach (1924-1929), and assistant athletic director (1936-1950).

In addition, he managed the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association state basketball tournaments and track meets since 1925 along with several state prep swimming and skating meets. He has been secretary of the Alumni Association board of directors.

He made his debut as head cross country coach in the fall of 1948 by winning the Western Conference championship and his charges repeated that title success the next season (1949). His indoor track team shared the Big Ten crown in 1949 with Ohio State.

Sundt is married, has two daughters, Mrs. Deane Page, and Ann.

IVAN B. WILLIAMSON

Head Football Coach

THE MOST SUCCESSFUL COACH in the modern era of Wisconsin football history is Ivan Baum Williamson, who now enters his seventh season as Badger gridiron boss man with the forthcoming 1955 campaign.

The past six years of Ivy Williamson-coached football at Wisconsin offers an unprecedented record. Each of the first five seasons (1949 through 1953) found Wisconsin in Big Ten title contention right up to the final gun and in consideration for the Rose Bowl four times (the Badgers were ineligible for the 1954 selection). Last fall Wisconsin tied for second.

In the past six seasons, Wisconsin has won 37 games, lost 14, and tied four others. For Big Ten play, the record of 26 victories as against four ties and nine defeats is the best any member school can boast over the last six-year period.

Ivy, as he is known to thousands of Badger followers, is the 20th man to guide football fortunes at Wisconsin. He came to Wisconsin in the spring of 1949, succeeded Harry Stuhldreher, and in five years has placed Badger football on a solid foundation.

He came to Wisconsin with an excellent background. He played football at Michigan during the seasons of 1930 through 1932, won honors as an all-conference end, and captained the team in his senior year. In that three-year span, Michigan won three Big Ten titles and lost only one game while winning 24 and tying two.

At Michigan, "Ivy" also earned two basketball letters and his football coach at that time, Harry Kipke, said, "Ivan Williamson is the smartest player I have ever had or hope to have." When Williamson was named to the Wisconsin coaching spot, Kipke, now a business executive in Detroit, repeated that original statement and then added, "As a player, Ivy was a standout. In his senior year when he played under the handicap of a bad knee, he wasn't stopped and he proved himself a great player and competitor."

Before coming to Wisconsin, Williamson was head coach for two seasons at Lafayette College. His 1947 team won six games and lost three, while, in 1948, his charges won seven games out of nine, bowing only to Army and Rutgers.

Born in Prairie Depot, Ohio (now called Wayne), on Feb. 4, 1911, Williamson was graduated from Bowling Green high school after excelling in both scholarship and athletics. He entered Michigan and upon his graduation had not only won laurels as one of the outstanding athletes in Wolverine history but wound up with special honors in scholarship. He also holds a master's degree from Michigan, obtained in 1940. He is married and has twin sons, Jack and David, age 17.

Following his graduation in the spring of 1933, Williamson coached football and basketball at Roseville, Mich., high school, producing an unbeaten eleven. In the spring of 1934, he accepted a position as assistant coach on the Yale football staff, serving there under Raymond "Ducky" Pond through 1940, and under Emerson "Spike" Nelson in 1941.

In June of 1942, he entered the Navy and put in a season of coaching under Potsy Clark at Pensacola, Fla., Navy base. His war-time service also included duties at the naval station in Sanford, Fla., the Gunnery school at Hollywood, Fla., the Cadet Selection board at Detroit, Mich., and the training carrier, USS Wolverine, Chicago.

After his discharge in 1945, he resumed his former football duties at Yale, this time assisting Howie Odell. He left there in 1947 to take over head coaching duties at Lafayette.



VERN WOODWARD, assistant boxing coach, also has been a member of the football staff for several years, aiding in the tutelage of freshman candidates. Woodward attended River Falls State Teachers, then matriculated to Wisconsin to win a major letter as a heavyweight boxer in 1936 and 1937. He was appointed assistant to Boxing Coach Walsh upon graduation and held that position until he entered the Navy physical training program in 1942. He spent five years in the Navy, attaining the rank of lieutenant commander. During Navy duty he coached the boxing teams of Pensacola, Bunker Hill, and Iowa Seahawks. He returned to Wisconsin in 1947 as boxing assistant and at that time was named to the football coaching staff. Woodward is married, and has two daughters.

FRESHMAN COACHING ADDITIONS

One or more part-time freshman football assistant coaches will be added to the staff early in September by Coach Ivy Williamson.

PROSPECTS IN FOOTBALL FOR 1955

DEVELOPMENT of reserve strength, particularly at the end and halfback positions, is the major problem confronting Ivy Williamson, head football coach at the University of Wisconsin as he opens full-scale preparation of a representative Badger eleven for the seventh straight season, in September, 1955.

The lean-jawed, shrewd-planning Badger grid boss man has produced a winning football team in each of his previous six years of tenancy at Camp Randall stadium, and reasonably could do it again if he solves the vexing problem of quickly converting raw material into poised, experienced personnel, capable of handling the continually tough assignments of Big Ten play.

Right now, Ivy has an even dozen major lettermen returning and 10 of them currently are rated as first stringers at their positions. All saw considerable action last fall, particularly in the last three games of the season. Two other major lettermen, plus seven junior varsity emblem winners, offer supporting strength but the rest depends on sophomores who still must prove themselves.

Wisconsin lost by graduation 10 lettermen, eight of whom started the final game of the season against Minnesota last fall. Foremost of these was the All-American fullback and ground-gaining mainstay for four years, Alan Ameche. Others were James Temp and Ron Locklin, top-notch defensive players at the end positions; Norm Amundsen, Clarence Stensby, and Don Ursin, rugged guards for the past three seasons; Gary Messner, fine center and linebacker; halfbacks Clary Bratt and Bob Gingrass, steady if not spectacular performers; and Glen Wilson, reserve quarterback, who was Jim Haluska's defensive replacement with fine results.

Martin Booher, twice a major letterman as a reserve tackle and virtually set as a first stringer this fall, has been lost through scholastic ineligibility.

Pre-season analysis of Wisconsin material, based on known performance in both 1954 season competition and the past spring drill, would lead to the first team selection of 10 major lettermen and one junior "W" winner.

This indicates that James Reinke and Dave Howard, who won their spurs as second string ends last fall, will be at the flanks. John Dittrich and Captain Wells Gray, both regular starters last fall, will continue at the tackles while the veteran, Paul Shwaiko, will have Steve Ambrose, a junior "W" winner, working with him in the guard tandem. Bill McNamara, twice a major letter winner as reserve center, has first call on the pivot spot while the backfield is made up of the veteran Jimmy Miller at quarterback, Pat Levenhagen and Billy Lowe at the halfbacks (they were starters more than half of the time in 1954) and

Charles Thomas, second string fullback for the past two seasons, has the nod currently in the attempt to fill the place left vacant by the Horse (Ameche).

Bob Konovsky, a starter at tackle until injuries sidelined him last fall, is one of the two major lettermen in reserve. The other is Jim Haluska at quarterback, a happy circumstance for Wisconsin. Haluska was the signal caller in the 1952 football campaign and set many school passing records. A broken leg kept him idle in the 1953 season but he came back to be of invaluable aid last fall despite the handicap of slowness afoot which was attributable to the long period of wearing a cast on the spiral fracture. Haluska has regained a good deal of his running ability in the last few months and should be in fine shape.

Six other candidates who have won junior "W" awards as reserves include Tom Rabas, center; John Bridgeman, halfback; Glenn Bestor, fullback; Jack Stellick, Dick Kolian, and Ron Hoenisch, ends.

Of these, Rabas, Bestor, and Kolian are the most likely to challenge for starting positions. Rabas looked good in spring drills as did Bestor, while Kolian, shifted from halfback to end, gave indication that his senior year will see the long overdue fulfillment of his early promise.

Foremost of the sophomores are Art Bloedorn, center; Doug Russell and Jon Hobbs, guards; Tom Peters, end; Rocco Cinelli, tackle; Pat Cvengros, quarterback; Eric Hagerup, fullback; Danny Lewis and Jan Jay, halfbacks. The latter two have fine potential and currently rate second team berths.

In addition, Williamson can call upon several candidates who have been squad members before but who did not see enough action to qualify for an award.

One of these is husky Jerry Cvengros who won a numeral in 1952 but who did not regain eligibility until this spring. He is a 6-3, 246-pound tackle. Another big tackle is Myron Cooper who is progressing fast. Help also will come from Bill Brandt and Rod Anderson, ends; Bill Gehler, guard; Dick Simonsen, quarterback; and Bill Sorenson, halfback.

Williamson experimented with some offensive formation changes during the spring drills and apparently has settled on including them in this fall's campaign. For the first five seasons, Williamson employed only the T-formation, with occasional use of a spread or a flanker. Last fall, he adopted the single wing which, by the final third of the season, was used nearly 40 per cent of the time.

This fall, there will be a shift from the straight T with balanced line into the single wing with an unbalanced line, along with some use of a semi-spread T-formation.

How successful Wisconsin will be this fall, of course, depends on the development of reserve material. As Williamson says . . . "We're not too disturbed about our first string. It's the second string that has us uneasy. We're thin at ends and uncertain at center. Besides, you can't get away from it . . . we're going to miss the Horse (Ameche) . . . but we'll see . . . we should still be a very tough team to beat".

Williamson's record of 37 victories as against 13 defeats and four ties in overall competition (except for the Rose Bowl) for the past six years at Wisconsin indicates that Ivy hasn't misplaced his confidence in the Badgers or that Wisconsin enthusiasts haven't misplaced any confidence in Ivy and his solid, capable staff of assistants.

After all, his record is the best ever produced by a Wisconsin coach against major competition. On top of that, his record of 26 wins, nine defeats and four ties in Big Ten competition currently is the best six-year record for any coach in the rugged Western Conference.

PROSPECTS IN BRIEF: Coach F. L. "Frosty" Ferzacca has 18 lettermen returning for his second year at the helm of the Warriors, and hopes are high that some outstanding sophomores will live up to their advance notices to add depth to the squad.

The biggest loss from the 1954 team which won 3, lost 5, and tied 1 was Halfback Ron Drzewiecki, the great running back of the Warriors who was a constant threat to opponents at all times. He led Marquette in rushing last year with 403 yards in 85 carries. Also lost were veteran halfbacks Ed Mixan, Don Molenda, and Quarterback Dick Shockley, the latter giving up football even though he still has a year of competition remaining due to a recurrent shoulder injury. Shockley was the leading passer for the Warriors last year with 34 completions in 65 attempts for 373 yards.

Marquette lost nine lettermen in the line from last year's team, but personnel switches during spring drills offset some of these losses. Lettermen not returning include Guards Stan Andrie, Wayne Brandt, and Mary Swentkofski, Tackles Frank Scaffidi, and Jim Pasterski, Centers Ed Jarosz and Dean Mielke, and Ends Tom Braatz and Dick Varish.

In spring drills Ferzacca moved Tackle John Madden and Fullback Dave Donarski to guard, while sophomore Jim Surane went from halfback to fullback, replacing Donarski. Other changes saw Jim Steel, an end, move to halfback, Don Cuccinello from end to tackle, and Don Walsch from guard to tackle, to provide depth at those positions.

The Warriors have a fine prospect at center in Dick "Soup" Campbell, whom Ferzacca bluntly calls the "best" in the nation.

In the backfield, quarterback is the weak position, with only Jere Carmody, second signal caller last year, returning. Depth here must be found from among the sophomores, Pat Gallagher, John Hauser, and Phil Johnson. At halfback, letterman Ray Zagar returns at right halfback, and opposite him will be Lee Hermansen, a devastating runner at left halfback. Hermansen, blessed with speed, was Marquette's second leading ground gainer last year, behind Drzewiecki. In reserve are Fred Connally, Terry Ward, Floyd Campbell, Gene Dick, and Jim Heid. Bob Girman, who shared running chores with Donarski at fullback last year, will be the king pin at this spot, with good depth coming from sophomores Walt Fidler, Frank Neu, and Alonzo Robinson.

PROSPECTS IN BRIEF: Iowa, which was separated from an unbeaten conference season by only 12 points in 1954, will rest its hopes for a continuation of its resurgence into the football limelight on 18 returning lettermen, headed by its great All-American guard, Calvin Jones, in 1955.

Eleven of the returning lettermen are linemen, and they will provide the nucleus for a sturdy line that will be hard to move against. At end, seniors Frank Gilliam and Jim Freeman, starters last year, return, and there is reserve strength available at right end in the return of Ken Meek. Four returning tackles brighten the picture at that position, though reserve strength must be found at right tackle, where only Terry Shuck, on the second team last year, returns. Roger Swedberg, a starter last season, and reserves Richard Deasy and Bill Reichow, return at left tackle.

The guard positions will be manned by Jones, chosen on 15 All-American teams in 1954, and George Kress. The Hawks lost three guards who played against Wisconsin last year—John Hall, by graduation, and Boyd Green and Terry Moran who dropped out of school.

An uncertainty exists at center where Warren Lawson held forth last year. He has departed, and the first replacements, Norman Six and Don Suchy, have had little past experience. The sophomore candidates—Bill Van Buren, Charles Pierce, and Donn Buck—need seasoning.

In the backfield, the Hawkeyes are blessed with a fine quarterback in Jerry Reichow, and two shifty and speedy halfbacks, Eddie Vincent, last year's leading rusher in the Big Ten, and Earl Smith, who was featured on many long scoring plays in 1954. He returned a punt 76 yards and a pass interception 66 yards for touchdowns against Ohio State. He was the Big Ten's leading scorer with 48 points, and scored 11 touchdowns in Iowa's nine game schedule.

Roger Wiegmann is the only returning letterman at fullback, where Broeder was the mainstay for three years, while other experienced backs returning are Don Dorino, quarterback, and Eldean Matheson and Ken Ploen at halfbacks. Other backfield strength must be found from among the upcoming sophomores—Collins Hagler, Delmar Klower, Ron Means and Bill Happel at halfback, and Fred Harris and Jon Janda at fullback.

PROSPECTS IN BRIEF: Although Purdue has lost a host of key performers from last year's surprising squad, which upset Notre Dame, and finished with a 3-3 mark in the Big Ten, the Boilermakers will be a strong contender for the Big Ten's first division if newcomers can plug the gaping holes in the middle of the line and provide needed depth at fullback.

Eighteen lettermen from last season's team are not returning this autumn, among them All-American Guard Tom Bettis, and End John Kerr, who was the Big Ten's leading pass receiver last year. Also gone are John Allen, the "iron-man" center, Walt Houston and Chuck Andres, outstanding guards, and Halfbacks Rex Brock and Ed Zembal.

However, the overall outlook is brightened by the return of Len Dawson, sensational as a sophomore, who led the nation in touchdown passes, and Bill Murakowski, a rocket-starting fullback, who led the Boilermakers in rushing and scoring last year.

Fifteen other lettermen join Dawson and Murakowski to form a formidable nucleus around which Coach Stu Holcombe can build. Among them are Ends Lamar Lundy—6-7, 215 pounds—Bob Khoenle, Len Zyzda, and Bob Springer; Tackles Joe Krupa, Dick Murley, Frank Paparazzo, and Ken Panfil, the latter a husky 6-6 244 pounder, who played on Purdue's 1951 and 1952 teams, who has just returned to school.

At guard, Dick Skibinski and Don Jackson return, with Jackson having played in 1949 and 1950 before entering service.

Dawson, at quarterback, was an All-Conference selection last year as a sophomore, and led the Big Ten in both passing and total offense. He will carry much of the offensive load again this year, though he will gain some relief from reserves Ted Krzeczkowski and Stan Eaton.

There is some uncertainty at the halfbacks, where only Jim Whitmer, Jim Peters, and Ed Neves are lettermen. The sophomores must provide the needed depth, and they could even take over the posts if they develop fast enough. Promising newcomers include Tom Fletcher, Kenneth Mikes, and Bernard Haag at left halfback, and Erich Barnes and Randall Barrett at right halfback.

Murakowski is a fixture at fullback, but again the Boilermakers lack reserve strength here, as Phil Ehrmann, a capable performer last year, has graduated. Sophomore Mel Dillard will spell Murakowski when necessary.

PROSPECTS IN BRIEF: Twenty-four lettermen, plus material from the Pacific Coast's top rated freshman squad in 1954 should make the Trojans a formidable, if not outstanding team in 1955.

Coach Jess Hill lost but 12 lettermen from last season's team which won eight, lost three in regular season competition, then lost 20-7 to Ohio State in the Rose Bowl.

The Trojans will be stronger in the line this year than last year, with only the tackles providing a drop-off from last year's performance. At end, five lettermen return, among them Leon Clarke, Don McFarland, Chuck Leimbach, Bing Bordier, and Chuck Griffith.

At tackle, despite the loss of last season's regulars, the picture is not desperate. Four lettermen, plus two transfer students from junior colleges, fill the gap adequately. George Belotti, Ron Fletcher, Dick Westphal, and Roy Smith are lettermen returning, while Hank Schmidt and Fabian Abram are the junior college transfers. Schmidt is 6-4, 237 pounds, while Abram is 6-3, 220 pounds. Belotti, who will start at left tackle opposite Schmidt, is 6-3, 231 pounds.

Both of last year's regular guards, George Galli and Orlando Ferrante, return, along with lettermen John Miller, Dick Enright, and Laird Willott, Jerry Hagy, a junior varsity performer last year, returns.

Marv Goux, an outstanding center who played 408 minutes last year, and a possible All-American choice, returns, along with his number one replacement, Vern Sampson, who saw 211 minutes of action last year.

Reserves at quarterback last year, Ellsworth Kissinger and John Hall, return this year as replacements for the departed Jim Contratto. Hall, in brief action last year, was the second best Trojan passer, ranking behind Jon Arnett. An outstanding frosh prospect is Walt Gorrell, up from last year's freshman team.

Jon Arnett, the leading passer and ground gainer for the Trojans in 1954, though injured at times, returns at left halfback, and he will be backed by sophomore Ernie Zampese.

At right halfback, sophomore Don Hickman, a fine prospect from the 1954 frosh team, rates the starting post, with letterman Ron Brown as the second choice.

Gordon Duvall, who played 334 minutes last season, returns at fullback, and he will find help from sophomore C. R. Roberts and letterman Bob Isaacson.

PROSPECTS IN BRIEF: Rebuilding of a graduation-weakened line is the theme at Ohio State as Coach Woody Hayes prepares for the 1955 season with all intentions of repeating the successes of an unbeaten 1954 eleven.

Losses due to graduation were severe, with 16 Buckeyes, including eight regulars—six linemen and two backs—completing their eligibility. Another, Fullback Hubert Bobo, a fine punter and a good blocker, has transferred to Tennessee, after dropping out of school.

The major rebuilding task must come in the line, where six of the seven regulars have departed, along with three top replacements. Dean Dugger and Dick Brubaker, ends; Dick Hilinski, tackle; Bob Thornton, center, and Guards Dick Williams and Jim Reichenbach are the regulars lost, while top reserves Don Swartz and Jerry Krisher, and End Paul Ludwig all must be replaced if the Buckeyes are to have the aggressive well-coordinated defense that featured their play last year.

Lettermen returning, however, give Hayes a good nucleus with which to work, including Ends Bill Michael and Fred Kriss, Tackles Francis Machinsky, Dick Guy, and Bob Whetstone—a letter winner in 1953, Guards Jim Parker and Bill Jobko, and Centers Ken Vargo and Bob Bond. If Hayes can uncover some reserve strength from among the upcoming sophomores, his line problems may not be as serious as indicated.

To an extent, the backfield must also be rebuilt, for the Buckeyes lost Quarterback Dave Leggett, who played 476 minutes last season and provided the necessary field generalship that made the offense click, along with Halfback Bobby Watkins and Fullback Bobo.

However, Ohio State has three experienced halfbacks returning—All-American Howard Cassady, Jerry Harkrader, and Jim Roseboro, along with letterman Dick Vicić at fullback, which should provide the Buckeyes with a strong, well-balanced running attack. Bill Booth, senior letterman, is being groomed to replace Leggett at quarterback. Booth, though lacking in experience, could give opponents fits utilizing his throwing arm to guide the aerial attack—especially with such experienced receivers available as Cassady and Harkrader in the backfield, and Michael and Kriss at ends.

Reserve strength behind Booth at quarterback presents a problem, with Frank Ellwood, John Lepley, and Bob Lilenthal being the more outstanding candidates.

PROSPECTS IN BRIEF: Michigan State will attempt to improve on its 1954 record of 3 wins, 6 losses, worst for a State team since 1917. The 1955 team will have better than average team speed, and will have 18 returning lettermen, augmented by a good sophomore contingent. However, there will be a serious lack of experience at the varsity level, even among the lettermen. Eleven of the 17 lettermen lost from last year's team were regulars all or most of the time. The line this season will still be relatively small, though it will be heavier and stronger than last year. Once again, there is doubt about the passing attack, though Earl Morrall, last season's top passer, is returning.

Jim Hinesly and John Lewis are the only two experienced ends returning, but they are good ones, and were the leading pass receivers for the Spartans last year. Hinesly caught 15 for 231 yards, while Lewis caught 10 for 338 yards and four TD's.

Leading returnees at tackle are Carl Diener, Embry Robinson, and Don Cutler, who won a letter in 1952, then went into military service. Diener, at 6-3 and 220 pounds, is the Spartans' biggest tackle. Upcoming sophomores who could help include Dan Currie, 6-3, 210 pounds, and Ray Wilder, 6-0, 200 pounds.

The Spartans appear set at guard and center, as three two-year lettermen return at these positions. At guard are Norm Masters and Carl Nystrom, the latter 1955 Spartan captain, while at center, Joe Badaczewski returns. Other lettermen returning here include Dale Hollern and Al Lee at guards, and John Matsko at center. Outstanding sophomores coming up are Dave Jeter at guard, and Bill Luke at center.

At quarterback, Earl Morrall and Pat Wilson are lettermen returning, and between them they threw 123 of State's 156 forward passes last year, completing 49 for 912 yards and 6 touchdowns. Coming up from the sophomore ranks will be Jim Ninowski, a fine prospect.

Clarence Peaks, last year's sophomore sensation at right half, who led the team in rushing with a 7.1 average on 321 yards in 45 carries, has been shifted to left halfback to take over the departed Bolden's place. Lou Constanzo appears to be in line for the right halfback position, with Jerry Planutis at fullback.

Other returning backs include Travis Buggs and Gerald Musetti at halfbacks, and Gary Lowe at fullback.

Twenty lettermen, headed by Captain Sanford Sacks, a bruising tackle, provide Saban with an experienced nucleus with which to work. However, graduation hit hard at the Northwestern forward wall, where graduation took six regulars—all but Sacks. Graduation took only two regular backs, but they were important losses, Dick Ranicke at right halfback, and Bob Lauter at fullback.

Bob Morman and Fred Nosal are lettermen returning at end, where the biggest loss is Ziggie Niepokoj, who was one of the leading pass receivers for the Wildcats last year.

At tackle, Sacks will anchor the left side of the line, with John Smith, a rugged 6-4, 249 pounder, the leading candidate at right tackle. Also back are Tom Vasos and Stan Dwyer from last year, and much is expected from Bob Kelly, a rugged sophomore tackle from Beaver Falls, Pa.

Two juniors, Tom Williams and John Lohbauer, head the guard candidates, while two outstanding prospects from last year's frosh squad are Al Viola and John Eldridge.

Ted Ringer, a 6-1, 200 pound letterman from South Bend, is the leading center candidate, and in reserve are two fine sophomores—Roger Windey and Gary Kluever.

At quarterback, Saban has two good juniors, who alternated last year at that position. Jack Ellis showed much promise until sidelined by a knee injury in mid-season. Dale Pienta, who missed spring practice because of baseball, took over after Ellis' injury and did a creditable job during the final portion of the season.

Letterwinners Bob King, left halfback, and George Gondek, right halfback, appear to have the starting jobs at those positions, with reserves Frank Jeske and Jerry Weber, a letterwinner in 1953, ready to step in if they should falter. Ollie Lindborg, a fine sophomore candidate from Michigan City, Indiana, may work out as a starter.

The departure of Fullback Bob Lauter throws that position wide open, and one of the more widely heralded sophomore prospects, Ben Napski, a 215 pounder from Cicero, Ill., may take up the slack here.

PROSPECTS IN BRIEF: Another strong offensive backfield and lettermen available at every line position except center are the chief assets of Coach Ray Eliot's 1955 football team—one which hopes to do better than last year's dismal 1 win, 8 loss record.

Captain and All-American in 1953, J. C. Caroline will again be on hand to spearhead the Illini running attack. Caroline was a vastly improved ball player last year, but the overall record of the team did not qualify him for an All-American position. Even so, he was the team's leading rusher with 440 yards in 93 attempts for a 4.7 average, and also led in punting with a fine 40.4 yards per kick on 17 boots.

Returning in the backfield to give Caroline help are lettermen halfbacks Harry Jefferson, Mickey Bates, and Abe Woodson. All were spotty in their performances last year behind an ineffective line, but all are fast, and capable of going all the way once in the clear. These three backs, with Caroline, accounted for all but 102 yards of Illinois net yardage by rushing last year. They will carry the load again.

At fullback, Bob Wiman, little used last year, returns, and he must fight off upcoming sophomores Jack Gordy, Dick Hendrickson, Don Kraft, and Ken Sutter for the starting job.

Em Lindbeck, the Big Ten's most accurate passer last year, and Hiles Stout, a top-notch reserve, give the Illini strength at quarterback. Lindbeck threw 66 passes last year and completed 38 for 476 yards and two touchdowns for a .576 completion percentage. Stout completed 26 of 57 throws for 474 yards.

Five lettermen return at end—Herb Badal, Gary Francis, Dean Renn, Charles Butler, and Bob DesEnfants, so there should be no problem there. Renn and DesEnfants appear to be the regulars, and Renn last year was the leading pass receiver with 17 catches for 246 yards.

Floyd McAfee and Rudy Siegert are lettermen returning at tackle, but the Illini lost a fine prospect in 270 pound Fred Wilmoth, who has accepted an appointment to West Point. Siegert is set at right tackle, but left tackle will be a problem. Outstanding sophomores include Paul Adams, Carl Johnson, Bob Wood, and George Brokemond.

However, the Gophers will be hard pressed to equal last season's fine seven won, two lost record. All-American Right Halfback Bob McNamara has departed and he made the Gophers click in 1954. Warmath lost 17 lettermen, nine of them definite starters at the close of the 1954 season. The schedule for 1955 is a tough one, with no breathers to allow new men to work slowly into the starting line-up. They will have to be ready when the season opens Sept. 24 against Washington to go all the way from the start.

Even so, the Gophers appear set at both ends, where the veterans Tom Juhl and Franz Koeneke return, at right tackle with Bob Hobert, at left guard with Captain Mike Falls, at center with Dean Maas, and in the backfield at both halfbacks where Darrell Cochran and Dick McNamara return.

The other positions are wide open, but upcoming sophomore talent could push some of the veterans already listed out of the starting line-up.

Bigest problem appears to be left tackle where no veterans return, and Warmath must uncover his starter from either 240 pound Norm Sixta or Gary Paul, 230 pounds, both sophomores.

Left guard does not appear too great a problem, as lettermen Bob Hagemeister, Dick Kubes, and Elden Dahl, the latter a starter near the end of last season, return. Nevertheless, they will face rugged competition from sophomore Monte Miller, a 6-1, 187 pounder from Minneapolis, for the starting call.

Depth in the line will be supplied from among the sophomores, among them Bud Hamilton, Jon Jelacic, and Bob Schmidt at ends, Frank Youso at tackle, Bob Rasmussen at guard, and Gerald Hassett at center.

Returning varsity men of last year, John Kapotas, John Purmont, and Ken Fischman at ends, Loren Solberg at tackle, and Gerry Nelson at center, will give added depth in the line.

At quarterback, the "heart" of the split-T formation, Don Swanson, returns, but he will face stiff competition from sophomores Dick Larson and Norman Anderson, plus Ron Gohde, a reserve who did not letter last year. Larson won the Minnesota state 440 yard championship in 1954, while Anderson won both dashes that same year,—being timed in 9.9 seconds for the 100 yard dash.

Outstanding halfbacks in the sophomore crop include Ken Bombar- dier and Dave Lindholm at left halfback, and Dick Blakley and Bill Chorske at right halfback. Duane Jennett, and Dave Suer, seniors who played some last year, could also help.

At fullback, Frank Bachman and Ken Yackel, both lettermen, return, and they will be challenged by sophs Lyle Hubbard and Dick Borstad, and junior Don Cassidy, for the starting job.

HISTORY OF CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

THEY CALL it Camp Randall. That's important.

Every now and then some hurried out-of-town sports announcer will call it "Randall Field," but he is corrected quickly.

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 61 years of ownership, the university has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, baseball diamond, room for other sports, and trailer camps.

But the university didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil war who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the university took it over, they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil war, the site was owned by the State Agricultural society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The display halls were transformed into white-washed barracks and the hall used for flower shows became a hospital. A total of 70,000 troops was drilled—usually about 7,000 being stationed there at a time—and 500,000 relatives and friends came to visit them.

Later in the war part of the camp became a prison where a group of sick Confederates, captured by Gen. Pope at Island No. 10 in the Mississippi, was brought. Many died in the drafty prison hospital on the knoll and were buried in what is now Confederate Rest at Forest Hill cemetery.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U. S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes and when the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural society stopped

using it for fairs, the Civil war veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the university as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the university had had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6 to 0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

Charles Van Hise, who became president of the university in 1903, was a sports enthusiast as well as a great president and he used to ride his horse nightly out to watch the football practice. Games were played before the old wood fairstand and many Madison business and professional men still boast of the holes they found as boys to insure a free look at the fun.

The university had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—completed only in 1951—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which seats 51,000, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.

The field house at the open end of the stadium horse shoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has room for about 15,000 people. In addition to basketball and boxing events, it is the site of the university's commencement ceremonies.



EARLY DAYS IN FOOTBALL AT WISCONSIN

A HISTORY of intercollegiate football at the University of Wisconsin, necessarily, must start with the 1889 season for that is the first year in which a score is reported and official mention made of the sport.

Earlier, there are reports of a football team on the campus in 1883, but there are no names of players nor reports of activity to substantiate the reports.

Tennis and baseball were the big sports in those days and because football was in its infancy at the time, its childhood at Wisconsin was extremely weak until 1888.

A football association was formed at Wisconsin in that year, but if the team ever played any games, the scores were not listed for posterity.

The team of 1889 did get into action and it has probably the best claim to being the first intercollegiate eleven to represent Wisconsin. The season was not very successful, however, for the Badgers lost to Calumet Club, 27-0, and bowed to Beloit College, 4-0. Andrew Bruce, a law school faculty member, who had learned Rugby in the English school system, is generally given credit for having helped to organize the team that year.

Gridiron stock continued on the upswing in 1890, with two football associations being formed, with one merely a local movement, while the other was a league including Beloit, Northwestern University, Lake Forest, and Wisconsin. The Badgers opened that season with a rousing 106-0 win over Whitewater Normal, highest score ever run up by a Wisconsin football team. However, the series with Minnesota, also initiated that year, saw the Golden Gophers wallop the Badgers 63-0, one of the worst defeats ever suffered by a Wisconsin team.

Form League

By 1893, football was on a firmer footing, and the Western Intercollegiate League with Michigan, Minnesota, Northwestern, and Wisconsin as members was formed that year. The title was decided on Nov. 11 when Minnesota humiliated a previously unbeaten Badger eleven by a 40-0 margin.

In 1894, Wisconsin had one of its best early teams, with the Badgers crushing Iowa, 44-0, blanking Chicago 30-0, and gaining its initial win over Minnesota by a 6-0 margin, an occasion that called for the student publication, the Daily Cardinal, to print an extra in "red" ink.

Only defeat that season was by a forfeit to Purdue, when the Wisconsin team became enraged at the decision by one of the officials—a Purdue coach—to eject from the game, for "alleged slugging", the captain of the team, T. U. Lyman.

King Brings Success

The coming of Phil King, Princeton's All-American quarterback for two years, to coach Wisconsin in 1896, started the Badgers off on a new era of football. The material available suited King's system of play, and with his ability to make the most of the players present, plus his inspirational leadership, King built up a seven year record of 55 wins, nine losses, and two ties.

In those days, while the Badgers usually had a few outstanding individuals, Wisconsin rarely had the wealth of material available at other leading schools. But Wisconsin elevens were always sound in fundamentals, used a limited repertoire of plays with precision and tremendous drive, and were renowned for their fight and high team morale. It was in this period that the slogan "There are no quitters at Wisconsin" originated and became famous throughout the Midwest.

The Western Conference was organized in 1896, and Wisconsin promptly walked off with the first football championship, whipping Chicago 24-0, beating Minnesota 6-0, and tying with Northwestern 6-6.

The Badgers won again in 1897, and in 1901, 1906, and 1912, but then the long famine set in that was to last 40 years before another football championship would be won—1952. 1912 was the banner year for Wisconsin, for the Badgers also won championships in the Western Conference in basketball, track, and baseball.

O'Dea—Player Extraordinary

The hero of the early days of Wisconsin football was the seemingly legendary Pat O'Dea, the "Kangaroo Kicker".

Pat came to Wisconsin from Australia in 1897, where he had been successful in soccer football, a sport from which he acquired his uncanny kicking ability.

In the 1897 season, Pat, who performed at fullback, though he seldom carried the ball, kicked eight field goals, one a 55-yarder against Minnesota, and another for 57 yards against Chicago. The next season, 1898, O'Dea booted 10 field goals, one of them 65 yards long against Northwestern on Thanksgiving Day at Evanston, Ill.

His senior year was most productive, however, as he drop-kicked 13 field goals and added one other—57 yards—from placement. Against Yale that season, at New Haven, O'Dea punted 100 yards for another outstanding achievement. In his stay at Wisconsin, the Badgers won 33 games, lost only five, and tied one.

1912—Greatest Team

The 1912 championship team probably was the finest ever to perform for Wisconsin in the early days. William Juneau, who replaced John Richards at the helm, inherited a fine nucleus from the 1911 team that lost only one game, and he made good use of such a legacy.

Its record was sensational. Lawrence was the first victim, 13-0; Northwestern was swamped 56-0 and Purdue was mauled by 41-0; Chicago fought hard, but lost 30-12; Arkansas scored a touchdown, yet lost by 64-7; Minnesota was conquered 14-0, and Iowa was beaten back by a 28-10 score.


Some members of that championship team were Joe Hoeffel and Hod Ofstie, ends; Ed Samp and Butts Butler, tackles; Max Gelein and Tubby Keeler, guards; Powell, center; Eddie Gillette, quarterback; John Van Riper and Al Tormey, left halfbacks; Noyes "Moose" Bright at right halfback, and Al Tandberg, fullback.

So impressive was the Badgers' showing that year that Walter Eckersall chose seven Badgers on his All-Western team. Nine of them made his All-Conference team.









Beck Composes New Words for Famous 'On Wisconsin' Song

WISCONSIN SPIRIT is still an inspiration to Carl Beck, the man who in 1909 wrote the original words for "On, Wisconsin", famous collegiate marching song of the University of Wisconsin.

For Beck has written new words for the song that Badger students and alumni sing wherever they get together.

And the new words are considered to be as good or better than the originals, by those who should know—musicians and long-time loyal Badgers. The original words were primarily for use at Badger football games; the new words can be used at all kinds of occasions.

Here are the new lyrics for "On, Wisconsin"—
On, Wisconsin! On, Wisconsin!
Stand up, Badgers, sing!
"Forward" is our driving spirit
Loyal voices ring.
On, Wisconsin! On, Wisconsin!
Raise her glowing flame!
Stand, Fellows, let us now
Salute her name!

In a note accompanying the new words he sent to the University, Beck wrote:

"These new words are to meet numerous requests for words for possible use on occasions other than football, in connection with both state and University events. Instead of stringing out a lot of words, brevity, as in the original, is their aim, having swing and action in keeping with the music and title."

Beck, now an investment and public relations counselor in New York, first became a student at Wisconsin in 1908. In 1909 he stayed out of school to work in Chicago, earning money to further his education. It was in a boarding house there that he met William T. Purdy, genial Irishman who knew music.

Purdy had started to write the music for a song to be entered in a University of Minnesota song contest when Beck prevailed upon him to do the song for Wisconsin instead. So Purdy provided the music and Beck the words, and the famous "On, Wisconsin" was the result.

Beck could not get the time off from his job to bring the song to Madison, so in the fall of 1909, Purdy, armed with a bundle of songs and some letters of introduction to student friends of Beck's at Madison, came to the Wisconsin campus on the eve of the Wisconsin-Minnesota football game of that year.

The song was introduced at the pre-game rally of students and townspeople. It made an instant hit. Purdy sold the manuscript for the song for \$50 before his death in 1918. Beck returned to his University studies in 1911, was graduated, and was one of the founders of the Wisconsin Alumni club of New York.

Over the years the song continued to grow in popularity and is now considered among the foremost of American collegiate marching songs. Its music has been adopted by hundreds of high schools and colleges throughout the nation, to which each has written words to fit its own needs.

The need for "state" words, or words which would fit occasions other than football, has been recognized for "On, Wisconsin" many times in the past, and once in 1913 and again in 1927 such words were written, but they never stuck.

Singers constantly reverted to the original words, except for the line "run the ball clear 'round Chicago," for which the words "run the ball clear 'round Minnesota" or "run the ball clear down the field" were substituted after the University of Chicago dropped out of Big Ten football competition. When the song was originally written, Chicago was considered Wisconsin's greatest grid foe each year, the team the Badgers really had to defeat to have any sort of successful gridiron season.
