





A Brief Historical Sketch

of

 Shawano County.

General History.

.....Shawano County IS SITUATED IN NORTHEASTERN WISCONSIN. It is bounded on the north by Langlade and Oconto, on the east by Oconto and Brown, on the south by Outagamie and Waupaca, and on the west by Waupaca, Marathon and Langlade counties. Its territorial limits embrace thirty-two townships, including the Stockbridge reservation of one-half township in Town 28, Range 14, and seven townships of the Menominee reserve, and its area approximates eight hundred and seventy-five square miles, or five hundred and sixty thousand acres, exclusive of the reservations and lakes.

There is nothing distinctive in the geographical structure of the county as compared with the surrounding region. Geologically, most of it belongs to the tertiary period. A range of hills composed of sandstone and granite, trending from northeast to southeast, break the surface of the western towns. Much of this section is covered with well-worn boulders, and wherever found, the soil is rich and of enduring quality. Outcroppings of cliff limestone abound in the southeast; the bold bluff about four miles east of the city of Shawano, known as "Lime Kiln Hill," being the conspicuous northern or northwestern limit. Along the Wolf, and that portion of the county lying north of Shawano lake and between the Wolf and Oconto rivers is for the most part a vast sand region. The county presents great diversity of soil, embracing the extremes of heavy clay and pure sand, with all the intermediate combinations and gradations; a rich, dark loam predominating, that is unsurpassed for the production of any crop that can be grown in this latitude. The sandy lands produce good crops when judiciously farmed, and owing to the fact that the cost of clearing, preparing and subsequent culture is so much less than on heavier

soils where timber and stone are found, many experienced cultivators are persuaded that the sand yields the best return for the money and labor invested. Experience has also demonstrated that our sand will stand drought, or an extremely wet season, better than clay. The soil is largely impregnated with iron and other minerals : and, as some of these are soluble, mineral springs of doubtful medicinal virtues are found.

Shawano county is drained by the Oconto, Shioe, Wolf, Red and Embarrass rivers and their tributaries. There are numerous lakes within its borders, of which Lake Shawano is by far the largest. Most of them are remarkable for their picturesque surroundings, pure waters, abundance of fish, and for game fowl in season. Lake Shawano, two and a half miles east of the city of Shawano, and Pine Lake, in the south part of the town of Belle Plaine, are famous summer resorts.

Shawano county is a portion of that vast and magnificent domain, of which the Menominee tribe of Indians were in possession when the white man first set foot on Wisconsin soil. Furthermore, it was then a portion of that great pine region that has poured its wealth down the Wolf to build up the Winnebago lake cities, and lay the foundations of many fortunes outside its borders.

....Early Settlement

IT IS CONSIDERED probable that some of the early Jesuit missionaries were the first white men who ever set foot on the soil of Shawano county. The first white settler was Chas. D.

Wescott, who is still living on his farm in the town of Richmond, a short distance north of the city of Shawano. In the spring of 1843, Samuel Farnsworth employed Mr. Wescott and a small crew of men at Green Bay to build a saw mill on Wolf River. The party arrived at the present site of the city of Shawano early in the summer, coming by way of Fox River and Lake Winnebago to Oshkosh, and thence up the Wolf. Shortly after his arrival Mr. Wescott planted some potatoes on the land now owned by J. A. Winans, north of the mill pond. This was the first soil broken for crop in the county by a white man. The mill was located near where the old Kast mill now stands, and was soon completed. It subsequently passed into the hands of J. C. Lewis, but Mr. Wescott continued in charge for eight years. In the autumn of 1843 the steamer Manchester, the first steamer ever launched on Lake Winnebago, made its first trip to Shawano. Mrs. Wescott joined her husband in 1848. The same year Samuel Farnsworth came into possession of the first land procured by a private individual by preempting the N. $\frac{1}{2}$ of S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 25, T. 27, R. 15. In 1849 a mill was built near the mouth of Red River, and another at Keshena, by other parties. In the meantime the little band of pioneers had slowly, but steadily, increased in number by the arrival of others at intervals, and at the expiration of ten years from the advent of Mr. Wescott the young settlement had passed the embryonic stage, and the year 1853 marks the beginning of the FORMATION PERIOD.

Following is the formative act:

CHAPTER 9, LAWS OF WISCONSIN FOR 1853.

AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE COUNTY OF SHAWANAW.

The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. That all that section of country lying and being within the following described boundaries, to-wit: Beginning at the southeast corner of town twenty-five (25) of range eighteen (18) east; thence running north to the northeast corner of town twenty-seven (27); thence west to the range line between ranges fourteen (14) and fifteen (15); thence north on said range line until it strikes the north line of town twenty-nine (29); thence west to the range line between range eleven (11) and twelve (12); thence south to the north line of Waupaca county; thence east to the range line between ranges fourteen and fifteen thence south to the town line between towns twenty-four (24) and twenty-five (25); thence east to the place of beginning, shall be and is hereby set apart and shall constitute a county, with all the rights and privileges of other counties, and shall be known by the name of Shawanaw county, and shall for the time being be attached to Outagamie county for judicial purposes.

SECTION 2. The county seat of said county shall be located and established at or near the southeast corner of section six, upon the fraction of section seven, east of Wolf river, in town twenty-six, range sixteen east.

SECTION 3. The first election for all officers to which said county will be entitled, shall be held at the house of J. C. Lewis, at the Shawanaw Mills, and occupied by C. Wescott, on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday of November next.

SECTION 4. Said county shall constitute one town, and for all town purposes shall be known as the town of Shawanaw, and under such name shall be entitled to all the rights and privileges heretofore granted by law to other organized towns; and the first election for town officers shall be held at the aforesaid Shawanaw Mills house, on the first Tuesday of April next, and shall hold their offices for the term of twelve months thereafter, and until their successors are duly elected and qualified; there shall also be elected in said town, at the election herein named, a town clerk, treasurer and assessor, who shall hold their offices for the term of twelve months, and until their successors are duly elected and qualified; said town supervisors herein provided for, shall hold their meetings at the house hereinbefore mentioned, until otherwise provided for at the county seat.

SECTION 5. That the county of Shawanaw shall pay unto the treasurer of Outagamie county, all costs, fees, charges and expenses that shall be paid by the county of Outagamie, that may accrue in consequence of any prosecution, conviction, imprisonment or proceeding whatever, against any person charged with any crime or misdemeanor within said county of Shawanaw; and the supervisors of the county of Outagamie may sue and collect the same from said county of Shawanaw, in any court of competent jurisdiction.

Approved, February 16, 1853.

The records are incomplete, but indicate that a town meeting was held in April, 1853, at which 47 votes were cast and Elias Murray, Chas. D. Wescott and Elisha Alexander were elected supervisors. That an election was held in November of that year and the following county officers elected, viz: Elias Murray, clerk of the board; John Wiley, superintendent of schools; J. A. Murray, register of deeds, and E. F. Sawyer, county surveyor. The foregoing act was amended by an act approved February 27th, of the following year, authorizing the election of county officers at the annual town election, on the first Tuesday of April, 1854, to hold their offices until their successors were duly elected and qualified in November following, indicating that the attempt to organize under the primary act had failed because of some irregularity. By virtue of this latter act Towns 28, 29 and 30, of Ranges 15, 16 and 17 became attached to Shawano county for county purposes.

The first meeting of the county board that appears of record was held November 13, 1855, and the accounts and charges against the county for the year 1854 were audited and settled at that time. Order No. 1 for the sum of \$4.00 was drawn in favor of Chas. D. Wescott. In all, eleven orders were drawn amounting to the sum of \$135.50. The settlement with the county treasurer shows that state and county taxes to the amount of \$355.60 had been collected, that the sum of \$41.57 remained in the hands of the treasurer subject to the order of the board of supervisors, and that a school fund of \$103.48 had also been collected. The treasurer's fees amounted to the magnificent sum of \$3.00.

In July, 1854, E. F. Sawyer platted a village in Section 6, Town 26, Range 16, near the location designated as the county seat in the act of 1853. But public favor clung to the region adjacent to the old mill property, and at the November election in 1855, it was decided by popular vote (84 votes) to locate the county seat at Shawanaw after December 15th following. The state census of that year gave the county a population of 254.

July 8, 1856, Abial Richmond platted the E. $\frac{1}{2}$ of N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 36, Town 27, Range 15, as the Town of Richmond. September 8, 1857, the same was further subdivided and became Dank's & Richmond's plat of the Village of Shawanaw. This was the first ground platted that is now included within the limits of the City of Shawano. By January, 1856, the county had been divided into three towns, viz: Shawanaw, Richmond and Waukechon, and was fairly organized for town and county purposes. The first newspaper, called the "Venture," was started by W. C. Thompkins in 1858, and A. J. Rockwell was the first editor. It proved to be a success and was soon sold to a stock company, the name changed to The Shawano County "Journal," and under that name has been continuously published to the present time.

The early history of Shawano county includes the usual story of wild cat schemes, chief of these being the city of Osceola, a paper metropolis, located on what is now known as White Lake, in the towns of Hartland and Lessor, surrounded at that time by miles of unbroken wilderness. Mortgages on quarter sections of land adjacent to this imaginary city were floated in the East for thousands of dollars in some instances. The early settlers had some unpleasant experiences in dealing with the Indian occupants of the soil ; but, fortunately, no conflict transpired that resulted in loss of life.

The federal census of 1860 gave the county a population of 829, showing a gain of 575 in five years ; and about this time Shawano county entered upon a new era in its development.

....Judicial Organization THE FIRST ACT (Ch. 68, Laws of 1859), providing for the separation of Shawano county from Outagamie and its organization for judicial purposes proved abortive, and was repealed by chapter 251 of the laws of 1860. Under the provisions of the latter act the county was declared to be fully organized from and after January 1, 1861 ; two terms of court to convene on the third Monday of February and the second Monday of August of each year were authorized, and the county made a part of the Tenth Judicial Circuit.

By the provisions of Chapter 119, of the Laws of 1860, Towns 28, 29 and 30 North of Ranges 15, 16 and 17 East, were detached from Oconto county and attached to Shawano county. A portion of this territory lying within the Menominee reservation being thereby attached to Shawano county for judicial purposes. And Towns 26 and 27 of Ranges 11 and 12 are therein defined as a part of Shawano county. By the provisions of Chapter 120, Laws of same year, all that part of range 10

East, North of South boundary line of Town 26 was taken from the counties of Oconto and Shawano and attached to Marathon county for all purposes.

By legislative enactment (Ch. 411, Laws of 1864), "Shawano" was made the authorized way to spell the name, instead of "Shawanaw" as formerly and as appears in the revised statutes of 1858.

By the provisions of Chapter 114, Laws of 1879, Town 30 North, of Ranges 11, 12, 13 and 14 East were detached from Oconto county and attached to Shawano county; and Towns 28, 29 and 30 of Ranges 16 and 17 were detached from Shawano county and attached to Oconto county. By the same act all of the territory comprised within Ranges 11, 12, 13 and 14 East, lying north of the line between Towns 30 and 31 North, and extending north to the state line between Wisconsin and Michigan, and Sections 19, 20, 29, 30, 31 and 32 of Town 31, Range 15, was formed into the county of New and attached to Shawano county for judicial purposes. The county of New, as such, was never organized. Its territory has been divided among several counties, but no part of it has been retained by Shawano county. The following year (Ch. 247, Laws of 1880) the same territory, excepting the six sextions in Town 31, Range 15, was re-formed into the county of Langlade, but was not detached from Shawano county until the following year. By an act of the legislature approved February 19, 1881, (Chapter 7) the organization of Langlade county was effected, accompanied by further shifting of boundary lines, whereby Shawano county lost Town 30 of Ranges 11 and 12 permanently, and gained temporarily, Towns 31, 32 and 33, Ranges 13 and 14, and the west twelve Sections of Town 31, Range 15. Two years later (see Ch. 303, Laws of 1883) the territory last described was returned to Langlade county. This act failed to be ratified as therein provided, but its provisions were reinacted subsequently (Ch. 137, laws of 1885) whereby said territory was finally severed from Shawano county, effecting the latest change in its boundary lines or territorial extent.

....Development

INDIAN TRAILS and the Wolf River were the only thoroughfares of the early settlers.

The first mails from Green Bay were packed over the old Indian trail. What passed for a wagon road was opened between Shawano and New London sometime in the fifties, and about the year 1866 the "military road" was completed between Shawano and Green Bay. Until the present railroad was built in 1884, communication was maintained with the outside world by means of stages running to New London, to Shioc and to Green Bay. The latter route is still maintained.

From 1871 to 1873 a strong effort was made to get a railroad from Green Bay. Work was actually begun on the right of way, but was abandoned after about \$75,000 had been sunk. Shawano County had issued bonds to the amount of \$100,000

in aid of the road, but these were afterward canceled, and the County lost nothing but the incalculable advantage that such an outlet would have been.

Shawano, the County seat, is the only incorporated City in the County, contains a population of about 1,800, and is located on the Oconto branch of the C. & N. W. Ry., 189 miles from Madison. The present Court house and jail were built in 1879-80, at a cost of \$17,000. Birnamwood, Wittenberg and Tigerton, all in the western part of the County, are incorporated villages.

When C. D. Wescott and his party arrived here 55 years ago, the liveliest imagination could scarcely have pictured the accomplishment of such mighty changes in so brief a time. Then an unbroken wilderness, embracing an apparently inexhaustible supply of the wealth producing pine, all practically untouched by civilized man. Now the pine is scarcely more than a memory, and the entire timber wealth has been reduced to comparative insignificance. The forests, and the roving savage have given place to a prosperous civilized community of nearly 25,000 people, supported chiefly by the products of the soil. Roads everywhere affording the means of inter-communication, and commercial facilities and educational and church privileges are provided for all.

In the clearing of the forests there has been deplorable waste, owing to a number of causes. For many years the settler kept in advance of the timber market, excepting the pine, and in the process of clearing his land burned timber that would be worth more to-day than his farm ; and the fire fiend following in the wake of the insatiate lumberman has completed the destruction over vast areas. The most destructive visitation of fire was in 1870, at the time of the great fires at Peshtigo and Chicago. In 1873, alone, 150,000,000 feet of pine went down the Wolf to the Winnebago Lake markets, and the aggregate cut for the county up to that date is given at 1,800,000,000 feet. As late as 1876, it was estimated that 500,000,000 feet of good, sound pine, remained standing. In 1897, Mr. Filbert Roth, special agent of the Division of Forestry, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, aided by the State Geological Survey, spent several months in Northern Wisconsin, and has issued a report on the "Forestry Conditions and Interests of Wisconsin." This movement now directed to the accomplishment of forest preservation and restoration, in which the State and National Governments are co-operating, should be vigorously advanced as it is a matter of vital importance. Following is Mr. Roth's report on the forestry conditions of Shawano county :

"The southeastern one-third of this county, with its variable sandy loam and loamy soil, was formerly covered by a heavy forest of Pine, mixed with hard woods. The country about Lake Shawano and north to the county line is part of the sandy pinery district extending from this lake to the Menominee River. The north-western two-thirds was a very heavy mixed forest of Hemlock, hard woods and Pine, growing on a good, though in places very strong, loam and clay soil. The Pine is cut, except

in the Indian Reservation, where about 300,000,000 feet are still claimed standing. The hard woods and Hemlock of the southeastern two-thirds are culled and damaged by fire, while those of the northwestern half are largely intact and have been injured only about Pine slashings. The standing Hemlock is estimated at 650,000,000 feet, the hard woods at 700,000,000 feet, of which Basswood, Elm and Maple form over 70 per cent. and Oak only about 5 per cent. Beech occurs only in the sandy loam area. About 30,000 acres around Shawano are covered by young White Pine, which has sprung up on old slashings. The extensive swamps of the southeastern part have all been burned over, and many of them are being drained and cultivated. Those of the western half are largely stocked with Cedar and Tamarack, some of them yielding 15,000 feet and more per acre. Bare "stump prairies" occur in all parts of the county.

It is interesting to note that the extensive swamps referred to are mostly in the town of Navarino, and have made that town a subject for ridicule in the past; but the exhaustless fertility of the swamp lands that have been reclaimed, strongly indicates that Navarino may eventually become the richest town in the county.

The decline of the lumbering industry turned attention to the possibilities of the soil, and it has richly repaid the efforts of the husbandman. The achievements of the past are indicative of the possibilities of the future, and who can calculate the results of another half century of progress?

....Statistical   SHAWANO COUNTY constitutes an assembly district; a part of the 14th senatorial; a part of 10th judicial circuit, and a part of the 9th congressional district. The growth of the county in population has been steady and uniform as indicated by the alternate state and federal census reports, taken at intervals of five years, to-wit: 254; 829; 1,369; 3,165; 6,635; 10,371; 16,629; 19,236; 22,573. The percentage of native and foreign born, as given by the state census report of 1895, is as follows: Native born, 65.73; foreign born, 34.27, including Germans, 22.39; Scandinavians, 5.59; all other foreign countries, 6.29. The industrial report shows 2,800 farms, aggregating 100,000 acres of improved land, valued at \$4,305,690. In manufacturing branches 905 men were employed during 1895, who received wages to the amount of \$178,270, and produced manufactured articles valued at \$441,801.

...Educational  THE EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES of Shawano County rank with the best in the state. There are 108 public schools in the county and when all are in session, employ a force of 124 teachers at an average salary, for males, \$36.10 per month, females, \$27.37 per month. The cash value of school houses and sites in county, as returned by district clerks, is \$87,143. Total amount of money for school purposes, received during year ending June, 1898, was \$77,344.55. Number of children of school age as per last school census was 9,483 and

the average attendance during past year was 5,589, of which 3,637 were between the ages of 7 and 13 and attended school for twelve weeks or more during the year.

....Menominee Indians *

THE EARLY JESUIT MISSIONARIES were the first white men who visited the Menominees, at or near the mouth of Menominee River ; the name being synonymous with wild rice, which was an important part of their food. Fathers Allouiz and Andre established a mission among them in 1710, and described them as lighter in complexion than the neighboring tribes. They belong to the Algonquin race. They remained allies of France in the wars with the English, aided in the relief of Detroit in 1712, and were a part of the French-Indian forces until the time of the revolutionary war, when a part of the tribe went over to the English. In the war of 1812 they again were with the English, aided in the capture of Mackinaw that year, and under their chief, Souligny, formed a part of the Indian forces in command of the great chief, Tecumseh, at the siege of Fort Meigs, on the Maumee, in 1813, and of the party repulsed by Col. Croghan at Sandusky about the same time. They came under the dominion of the United States as one of the results of the war of 1812.

At this time they were in possession of all that country bounded on the north by the dividing ridge between waters flowing into Lake Superior and those flowing south into Green Bay ; on the east by Lake Michigan ; on the south by Milwaukee River, and on the west by the Mississippi and Black Rivers. March 30, 1817, their chiefs by treaty ceded grants of land to Clarke, Edwards and Choteau. Successive treaties were made between them and the United States Government in 1825, '27, '31, '36, and finally by treaty concluded October 18, 1848, they ceded their remaining lands in Wisconsin preparatory to their removal to a reservation of 600,000 acres west of the Mississippi. It transpired that there were obstacles in the way of the treaty stipulations, the western grant was re-ceded to the United States, and they were located on their present reservation in 1852, originally containing twelve townships. By the treaty of February 11, 1856, they ceded Town 28, of Ranges 13 and 14, to the United States for the use of the Stockbridges and other New York Indians.

They assisted the United States in the Black Hawk war, and during the War of the Rebellion refused to join the Sioux outbreak and furnished nearly a regiment of men to the U. S. service. The veterans maintain a flourishing G. A. R. Post.

Their present reservation contains ten townships, or about 231,000 acres of land. The eastern tier of three townships is attached to Oconto county for judicial purposes. In 1822, the tribe was estimated to number 3,900. They now number about 1,500. About 300 still adhere to their ancient religion, and the remainder are members of the Catholic Church. The Menomi-

nees are a peaceable and industrious people and gain a livelihood by logging and farming. They have about \$1,000,000, held in trust for them by the United States Government, the interest of which is expended for their benefit.

...Stockbridge and Munsee Indians

Massachusetts was the ancient home of the Stockbridges, where they were known as Mo-he-kum-uks or Mohicans. Prior to 1800 they located on a small reservation in Oneida County, N. Y. The plan to seek a new home in the West was first agitated about the year 1817. As the result of successive treaties in 1821, '22, '27 and '32, they were finally located on two townships of land obtained from the Menominees on the east side of Lake Winnebago, in what is now Calumet County. The Munsees became identified with the Stockbridges in 1823. They secured their present location under the treaty of February 5, 1856, and removed from Calumet within 2 years; but the treaty provisions in regard to allotments of land in severalty have not been generally carried out. By the interpretation placed upon the Act of 1871, a portion of the tribe were debarred from the benefits guaranteed by the treaty, and the available lands were reduced to 18 Sections in the south part of Town 28, Range 14 East, and the remaining 18 Sections and Town 28, Range 13 were placed upon the market and sold. Under the provision of the Act of March 3, 1893, those excluded in 1871 were restored to membership, about 30 patents have been issued within the last year to allotors of '56 and '71, and it is the expressed purpose of the Department to allot the remaining land as soon as the matter can be reached. The Stockbridges will then become citizens of the United States. Internal dissensions dating back to 1834, have retarded the progress of these people and wasted their substance. At the present time the tribe numbers 509, and about one-half of them are living on the reservation. They have adopted the white man's habits and language, and earn a livelihood chiefly by logging and farming.







In connection with the Home is a farm of 280 acres, greenhouse and seed department.



....ROMAN CATHOLIC MISSION.

THE CATHOLIC MISSION among the Menominees was founded by Rev. Claude Allouez, a French Jesuit, in 1669, when these Indians resided principally in the region adjoining the Green Bay and Menominee River. During the two centuries following, while the Menominees were shifting their hunting grounds gradually southward, various missionaries made passing visits to them. The first missionary making a permanent abode with them was the Rev. Florimund Bonduel. In 1843 he came to the Menominees who had then settled on a reservation adjoining Lake Poygan, and remained with them when in 1852 the tribe removed on their present reservation in Shawano County. Thus Rev. Bonduel was the first Catholic missionary laboring in Shawano County, the whole Catholic population of which depended then on his ministry. Of his successors up to 1880, special mention should be made of Rev. Father Skolla (1853-'57), and Rev. Amand Masschelein (1875-'80), whose names are ever present to the memory of the old members of the Menominees.


In 1880 the mission was given in charge of Franciscans, who have labored therein uninterruptedly for these past eighteen years. In 1883 they started the Catholic Mission School at Keshena, an industrial boarding school with a present



THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH OF KESHENA


capacity for accommodating upwards of 150 pupils. For the maintenance of the school, the missionaries depended at first solely upon donations collected from friends of the mission. In 1884 Government aid was obtained by a contract given the school; this has continued until now, with a gradual *decrease*, however, during the last five years. Government compensation being alone insufficient for the support of the school, charitable help was needed all along to supply the deficiency.

Twice the mission suffered terribly by fire. In 1884 the first school-house burned down, together with the old mission church built towards the end of the fifties. Another school-house, built on the site of the old one, fell a prey to the flames in 1891. But again a larger and more commodious building was erected, which is an ornament to the mission, and answers its purpose far better than the two foregoing buildings. A new church, the present one, was built in 1886. The present head and director of the mission is the Rev. Blase Krake, who has been laboring among the Menominees since 1882. He succeeded in his capacity as superior the Rev. Odoric Derenthal, well known to the business men of Shawano City, who had filled that office from 1885 until August, 1897, when he was transferred to the Chippewa Missions in the northwestern part of the State.

KESHENA.

Officially known as the Green Bay Indian Agency. Is located on the Menominee Indian Reservation on the East bank of the Wolf River, in Sec. No. 26, T. 28, R. 15 E.; about 8 miles north of Shawano, the County seat.

This Agency has jurisdiction over the Menominee, Stockbridge and Oneida tribes, about 4,000 in all, nearly all of whom have adopted the customs of the whites and obtain their living by farming and logging. There is a fine water power about a mile above the village, on which is located a flour mill and saw mill under the charge of a competent miller. The Govern-







ment Boarding School located just south of the village is a fine institution and ranks with the best Indian Reservation Schools in the country. This school was organized in 1883, and under the efficient direction of Prof. Watson is doing a splendid work in training the Indian youth mentally and in farming and other trades that will be of use to them in future years. Its present enrollment is 173 and the attendance is yearly increasing. The pupils are boarded, clothed and educated at the expense of the government. The present force of teachers and the years of service are as follows :

WHEN the historian records the early development of Wisconsin's resourceful interior, when he tells of that material wealth which has contributed so much to her greatness, let him not forget the promises which bold and enterprising Badger sons made when they started in the unsettled parts of her territory to establish centers of human industry with nothing save a willing hand and a determined mind to execute the undertaking. We sometimes lose sight of the great purpose of society when we tell of great generals, of great statesmen and orators and look upon them with unconcealed admiration. Their accomplishments are incidental to the progress of civilization, necessary for the preservation and protection of society; but the first object of a great state must be the establishment of the home and the means of supporting it. He who can offer to men the means by which they can live industrious, honorable, comfortable lives, does more to benefit mankind than he who seeks fame in the political arena. To such distinction we must attach the name of the master mind



who tapped the thick walls of the Shawano forests and started there the buzz of human industry—never to cease.

The village of Mattoon is the product of the indefatigable labors of a Wisconsin son of that name. Shawano County can bow low in acknowledgement of the work which George B. Mattoon has accomplished for her. Ready to meet a foe in actual warfare to preserve the Union, he was no less ready to fight the obstacles to success in the field of commerce.

Less than ten years ago he conceived the idea of turning to use the timber lands which stand in the northwestern part of Shawano County, and he accordingly planted a saw mill there. Today that saw mill is surrounded by the homes of six hundred people! The influence of Mattoon integrity and thrift spread, and every day marks further progress. Few, if any, ever dreamed of the future possibilities of Mattoon in an earlier day—the best that could be said for it was that it was a saw mill town, such as there are many others. They who thought thus have been deceived—it has proved otherwise. When the few hundred acres of timber were cleared away from the immediate vicinity of the saw mills, the village did not cease to grow.



*** MATTOON ***

There had already been in operation for twenty years or more a large factory in Sheboygan, owned by the same George B. Mattoon. The enormous shipments of lumber to this Sheboygan factory suggested the advisability of erecting such a factory in Mattoon. No sooner said than done, the new plant began turning out millions of feet of veneer panels, bass, oak, maple and other hardwood pieces of every description. Shrewd calculations had made clear the saving on freight expense by shipping directly the finished product.

This gigantic concern, which had been incorporated as the Wisconsin Timber & Land Co., in 1889 operated ten miles of railroad from Aniwa to Mattoon and at that time operated one saw mill. Today the company owns a continuous stretch of railroad of twenty-two miles in length with a complete equipment of locomotives and cars. The company has added another sawmill, another factory for making furniture pieces of all descriptions, and another veneer plant.

When one attempts to estimate the amount of constant personal attention which is absolutely necessary to the man-

agement of such extended interests, one can realize the necessity for business associates who can execute the inestimably difficult details with delicate discretion. Here again the mind of Mattoon demonstrated his exceptional qualifications in selecting Hiram and H. P. Weeks—two men second in ability only to Mattoon himself—and close seconds they have proved themselves to be.

But for all the activity in these various institutions, the motive power for which came from the same resourceful intellect, the foresight of Mattoon is felt in his effort to make for this village a great future. The land owned by the Mattoon interests consists of 22,000 acres in the immediate vicinity of the village. As fast as the timber is being cleared away the land is being sold in small tracts to actual settlers. What a boon for vegetation is the rich soil of this newly cleared timber land! It has not taken long for the stock raiser to realize the immense possibilities of dairy farming where stock can be kept at practically no cost and fed on the juiciest herbage. That this has proven a lucrative undertaking and that it is an inducement to new settlers is plainly demonstrated by the erection of a cheese factory and creamery with exceptionally complete and elaborate machinery.



*** MATTOON ***

Every good citizen looks with jealous interest to the education of the advancing generations. Every parent prides himself in being able to send his offspring into the world intelligent and prepared to successfully solve the problems of life in a world of close competition. Mattoon did not forget the wise warning of Horace Mann, for there is in the village a school, and in that school there is a schoolmaster who bids fair to inspire the ambitious youth.

Nor has religion been slighted in the hurried growth of the city of the forest. The sweet strains of sacred music and the eloquence of the gospel ascend to the skies above every Sunday morning from two little houses of worship. There is one more thing necessary for the complete happiness of the Mattoon villager—he wants to be with his associates when the restraints of the workshop or of the field can be laid aside and he can indulge in the natural instincts of social intercourse. The halls of the Maccabees, the Modern Woodmen of the

United Workmen of America may be opened to him, but even then he will not be deprived of the position of chief cornetist or the base drummer of the brass band, or at least of indulging in an evening of its music.

Mattoon has all the conveniences of older and larger cities. It offers such opportunities for cheap and comfortable living that it need only become known and the land which is now to be sold will become the property of new settlers.

This settlement is a monument to the heroic integrity and fearlessness of a prince of industry. Nor does the permanence of the reputation of George B. Mattoon rest there alone. The mutual interests of the employer and the employes of the vast Mattoon interests have been cemented by cordial relations between them. But for all his flattering success George B. Mattoon is a man of simple and generous purposes.

The future of Mattoon is not sealed—its success is recorded in the book of destiny.

WITTENBERG



IT IS IMPOSSIBLE to do justice to this thriving village in the space allotted it in these pages. Every day of its short life should be a page, and every year a volume, in order to cover its life in a satisfactory manner. . . . Many years ago Chet Bennet, one of those picturesque figures, a timber cruiser, that have an important place in the history of all western towns, was employed by the railroad company then contemplating the building of a railroad through the wilds of Central Wisconsin, to look over the lands for the proposed line. Blazing a trail through the untrodden forests, whose stillness was broken only by the howl of wolves and screech of wildcats, this forerunner of civilization trod the ground where this village now stands. promoters of this idea have succeeded in their endeavors can be stated by a brief survey of the educational advantages of the different institutions. . . . The Martin Luther Norwegian Orphan Home conceived in 1880 and opened in 1882 with four children and one old person as inmates, has grown to be a vast institution, having 150 inmates, representatives of all portions of the United States.

The Martin Luther German Orphan Home was first an academy which was opened in September, 1883. Fire totally destroyed it before six months had gone by, and from the ashes there arose the Orphan Home where now 150 homeless children are cared for.

In 1884 a small log house erected $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from town served the purpose of an Indian Mission under the supervision of the Lutheran (Nor.) Church. In 1885 it was decided to move nearer the rest of the institutions, and a larger building was erected for that purpose a short distance from Wittenberg. The School in 1895 passed into the hands of the United States Government and now consists of two large buildings, fitted in elegant style, where 150 Indian boys and girls are taught the way of the white man.

When Miss L. Root, now the wife of Dave Stewart, rang the bell one September day some 17 years ago, that called into the little frame building a parcel of tow-headed boys and girls, little did she think that she had formed a nucleus around which, in time, would be built a High School, the pride of a county. The building is one of the finest in this part of the state and a corps of four teachers instruct 175 pupils into being true citizens. All the various schools and institutions are situated on high hills overlooking the town and in the center stands the High School building as a chief over all. Wm. Heins, Clerk; Dr. Rathman, Director; Herman Meisner, Treasurer.

In making Wittenberg an educational center her conceivers have not failed, for the few fleeting years of her life she has shown possibility for the future that far surpass the fondest dreams of those who cherish her success in their hearts. She has but begun the preface of a book of

life, that will some day be the pride of the State. Although she ranks second to none in educational advantages, Wittenberg will not yield the palm to any town in other lines. The rich timber lands were an attraction that enticed men to invest their money in the lumbering and sawmill business to a great extent. As the ax of the woodman laid low the giants of the forests, there was revealed beneath a source of wealth which was more lasting and greater than the trees fell. The soil was excellent and especially adapted to the raising of grains and vegetables. The men who had come to log now turned their attention to agriculture, and as a consequence many a handsome frame building now occupies the center of a farm where but a few years ago was standing timber. . . . The possibilities opening up in the agricultural lines are unbounded. As yet the products are nearly all used in home consumption, but each succeeding year adds a few more carloads of potatoes, oats or live stock to the rapidly increasing amount. The land is especially adapted to the raising of live stock and it will be but a few years before it will be one of the leading occupations. . . . We have passed through the crisis that comes in the life of every lumbering town, i. e. the transitory period between a lumbering and a farming community. The sawmills, although there are four still in operation, but not on the extensive plans of past years, are being superceded by manufacturing establishments that furnish work to many.

The Wittenberg Panel and Veneer Plant, now employing 50 men are contemplating extensive improvements in the near future. E. J. Homme's furniture manufacturing plant, situated north of the village, employs 25 men, but is still in its infancy. The sawmills of Louis Glaubitz, Holmes & Smith, H. F. Grallap, and E. J. Homme, furnish labor for many.

As a commercial center Wittenberg will soon outstrip all competitors in the race. The whole history of this village terms with ambition and energy at every turn, and at no time during her existence has there been a year in which she has not made some advancement or progress. During the past four of five years the growth has been remarkable, but at no time has there been that "boom" after which there comes a relapse, but at all times the growth has been healthy and the result is a strong town financially, educationally, and religiously.



WITTENBERG INDIAN SCHOOL.



THE Wittenberg, Wis., Indian School was originally established as the Bethany Indian Mission School in the year 1885, by the synod for the Norwegian Ev. Lutheran Church of America. In 1887 the Mission was moved into the

of five years, under which the school now runs as a Government Indian non-reservation school. The property consists of nine buildings and a farm of eighty acres. The school accommodates 130 Indian children who come from the following Indian tribes of Wisconsin: Winnebago, Oneida, Stockbridge, Chippewa, Menominee and Omaha.



present commodious buildings, situated one-quarter mile from the village of Wittenberg. For a number of years contracts were held with the U. S. Government for support of the Indian children attending the institution, but upon the abolishment by Congress of the so-called contract system in 1895, the property here was leased to the United States for a space

The employe force at the school consists of A. Jacobson, Superintendent, and eighteen assistants, seven white and eleven Indian employes. The school is supported wholly by the U. S. Government. The school has a good reputation, and has done and is doing a great deal of good towards bringing the Indian up to the white man's ways of living and civilization.
