Upon motion by Regent Schenian, seconded by Regent Hassett, minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, held on March 6, 1987, were approved as mailed to the members of the board.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

### Report on the March 20, 1987, Meeting of the Higher Educational Aids Board

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President Weinstein called attention to the written report of the March 20 HEAB meeting, which was included in the agenda materials. Regent members Clusen, Finlayson and Nikolay were present.

### Report on the Association of Governing Boards' National Conference

President Weinstein noted that Regents Clusen and Nikolay and Secretary Temby had recently attended the national conference of the Association of Governing Boards. Written reports had been submitted.

### Report on Joint UWS/VTAE Task Force on Non-Credit Instruction

Regent Lyon, co-chairman of the task force, reported on the March 10 organizational meeting at which an agenda for the task force's work was developed. To be reviewed were mission statements of both systems, problems with funding, VTAE and UW-Extension structures, each system's role in alternative delivery methodology, the relationship of both systems to academic research studies, the extent of duplication, the adequacy of criteria presently used to avoid duplication, the role of one-on-one instruction in VTAE and UW-Extension, promotion of each system's programs, and each system's role in agriculture, business and home economics programs. The next meeting was to be held on April 30, with a hearing tentatively scheduled for June 3.

# Report of Ben R. and Ruth M. Lawton Scholarship Fund Committee

Reporting on the April 9 meeting of the Scholarship Fund Working Committee, Co-Chairman Hanson said the UW-Foundation was completing a brochure and that pledge cards were available. Contributions were encouraged to provide a sound base for the full-fledged promotional campaign which was to begin soon.

# Report on the Past Month's Activities

Regent President Weinstein reported that on March 10 he and President Shaw testified before the Building Commission, which acted very favorably on the UW System's request. On March 11, they both testified before the Senate Education Committee on the operating budget request. President Shaw and Regent Vice President Schilling represented the UW System at a meeting of the Assembly Committee on Colleges and Universities on April 1 and at the April 8 meeting of the Joint Finance Committee. Regent Schenian also attended those meetings, as did a number of chancellors.

SB 85, which would prohibit the university from beginning classes before Labor Day, had been reported out of the Assembly Education Committee with a vote of 12-1 recommending rejection.

### Resolution of Commendation for Regent Finlayson

The following resolution, presented by Regent Schilling, was unanimously adopted with a standing ovation for Regent Finlayson: Resolution 3749: Whereas, on May 1, 1987, Edith N. Finlayson will complete her seven-year term of faithful service as a member of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System; and

> Whereas, she brought to the board a valuable perspective based on many years of civic leadership and community service in the Milwaukee area; and

Whereas, during her tenure on the board, she served meritoriously as chairman and vice chairman of the Education Committee, as chairman and vice chairman of the Council of Trustees of the UW Hospital and Clinics and as a member of the Higher Educational Aids Board, in addition to which she lent her time and energy to a number of special regent committees, as well as to the Regent Study on the Future of the UW System; and

Whereas, Regent Finlayson has persevered in promoting the recruitment and retention of minority students, faculty and staff in the UW System, working diligently to advance achievement of those objectives and inspiring others by her example; and

Whereas, in addition to these contributions, she is especially appreciated for the warmth, compassion and good humor which have enriched her relationships with colleagues and associates on the board and throughout the UW System;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Regents of the University of Wisconsin System commend Edith N. Finlayson for her seven years of dedicated service to the cause of public higher education in Wisconsin; and

Be it further resolved that, with special affection and gratitude, the regents grant to her, upon her retirement from the board, the status and title of Regent Emeritus.

Regent Finlayson made the following statement: "I address you as friends and say that ending my formal relationship with you as a member of the Board of Regents is one of the hardest things I have had to do. I am deeply grateful that I have been able to complete a full term before I had to terminate, and I am comforted by the knowledge of the fact that, had I not become ill, my reappointment would have been imminent.

"More than anything else, I come before you today to say thank you--thank you for all the love and support you have given me, not only these past few months, but during my entire term on the board.

"I want to thank you for sharing the many hours of hard work, discussion and debate, and yes, legitimate arguments about the future course we are setting for the university.

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"Throughout all of this, we developed strong bonds of friendship through a common dedication to a great cause. There is one thing that binds us all together. It is the dedication to our students and their future. No matter what our differences or what issues we were debating, that common commitment was always there to help us reach a consensus.

"I can't think of anything else I have done in my life that has been more exciting, enlightening, energizing, or enjoyable than sharing these past seven years with you on the board.

"I want to be careful here and not become too maudlin or sound sad, because I'm really not. I'm very happy and proud of all we accomplished together.

"We helped lead this great system through some of the most challenging times in its history. We have been through budget reductions and recisions. We have been through the year of the salary freeze and the year of the hotly fought, but historic, faculty and staff catch-up exercise. We have created new programs, including two new Ph.D. programs in nursing.

"We have confronted the most serious challenges facing the future of our great system. We have set ambitious goals and we have developed realistic plans for meeting them. I am proud of these accomplishments, but I am more proud of all of you, and I am proud of what I know you will achieve in the future.

"As we look to that future, there are a few thoughts I would like to leave with you. American education is still to face some of its hardest tests ever. How we meet those challenges will determine the very future of our state and our nation and the survival of our becoming democracy. The greatest danger to us, I feel, is that many people are looking for simple descriptions of our problems and simple answers to them. We must develop simple, direct answers so people understand and support them. But we must never pretend that the problems are simple or the answers easy to achieve. Such achievement will become easier to the extent that we reach out and broaden our base to include the many untapped resources too long denied equity and parity in mainstream America.

"One of the most important and most basic commitments is to enhance and preserve the quality of this great university system. In doing so, we have agreed to reduce the size and the costs. We must also help to develop sound alternatives to address the hardships and additional emerging problems that such action will surely visit upon a very large segment of our population. We must not be afraid to acknowledge and address forthrightly the real facts and issues of our society that continue to impact negatively on many of our efforts.

"I have heard the often-stated commitment to maintaining access to the university for minority and disadvantaged students. To successfully deliver on this promise will take a much greater effort and a much stronger commitment than we have given it so far. We must develop much stronger partnerships with primary and secondary schools. We must work much harder in teacher education, curriculum development and related areas. We need, I believe, a wholesale commitment on the part of the total university to fulfill the promise of increasing our minority enrollment. I trust we will continue to carry forward in that promise.

"I want to end by saying I love and respect each one of you. I will cherish the memories and the achievements that we have shared for the rest of my life.

"I hope you aren't thinking: 'This is the last time we'll see Edith.' You are going to be seeing and hearing from me in the months and years ahead. For we are all part of a large family, a continuing family that cares for each other and that believes in each other. That's the way I feel about you, and that's the way I'd like you to feel about me. I'll remain loyal to the cause and will be an active advocate and supporter for the dreams we all share, as long as I have the strength to do so.

"Thank you again from the bottom of my heart."

### Resolution of Commendation for Regent Knowles

Regent Hassett presented Resolution 3750, which was adopted with a standing ovation.

Resolution 3750: Whereas, Warren P. Knowles has served with distinction on the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, completing the term of his brother, Robert P. Knowles, to which he was appointed on November 13, 1985; and

> Whereas, the board has benefited greatly by the wisdom and sound judgment Governor Knowles brought to regent deliberations from his background as a leader at the highest levels of state government; and

> Whereas, his expertise in financial matters has been of particular value to the Business and Finance Committee on which he served since his appointment to the board, as well as to the Regent Study on the Future of the UW System; and

Whereas, the service he rendered as a regent is evidence of his continuing commitment to the cause of public higher education which he did so much to support and nourish during his years in public office;

Departing from the text of the resolution, Regent Hassett made the following statement: "Governor Knowles did support and nourish public higher education dramatically when he served as Governor of Wisconsin, to the point where I refer to him as the Educational Governor. During his three terms as Governor, two new colleges were added, one at Green Bay and one at Parkside. Also the VTAE System as we know it today, with 16 local, independent districts, was accomplished under his administration. And the first of hundreds of thousands of state student loans were inaugurated under his administration. Thousands and thousands of students have gone through the university with those loans. He was truly an Educational Governor.

"Let me relate a personal insight that emphasizes his love and support of the university system. During the protests over Viet Nam in the late '60s, students protested here as well as elsewhere, disrupting classes and the community, inciting legislators and public officials to take some drastic action. I remember the requests and demands by public officials and legislators, of both political parties, for the Governor to close down the university and arrest those protesters. Governor Warren Knowles, in what I thought was one of his finest hours, defended this great university, its students and faculty. He maintained he would keep the university open, and he did, under great public pressure, while many other universities closed throughout the nation.

"One other incident, not university related, reveals the leadership of Warren Knowles and a bit of Wisconsin's dramatic history. Some of you will remember when Father Groppi and supporters took over the State Assembly in their march on the capitol twenty years ago. Again, police and sheriffs' departments in riot gear were in the Governor's office, and irate legislators demanded that the protesters be removed by force from the Assembly. Governor Knowles refused to use force and spent a long, busy day. When the National Guard arrived and positioned themselves along the stairways from the ground floor to the second floor Assembly, Father Groppi and his followers walked out in order, singing. I believe Warren Knowles prevented injury and bloodshed, maybe worse, through his responsible leadership. It is this person we honor today."

Resolution 3750:	Therefore, be it resolved that the Regents of the

Be it further resolved that the regents grant to him, upon his retirement from the board, the status and title of Regent Emeritus, with special appreciation for having a statesman of his stature as colleague on the board.

Regent Knowles then made the following statement: "I want to say how much I have enjoyed being a part of the Board of Regents' proceedings in carrying out the term of my brother. It has been a rewarding experience and something that I really had not totally anticipated. I thought when I was Governor and making appointments to the Board of Regents that I was making appointments to what was a pretty fair club that enjoyed a great deal of

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social activities. . . I suspect that the passage of the merger law has changed that a great deal and that with the merger came a multitude of problems which are yet to be solved.

"It is important, I think, that a lay board does exist for the purpose of helping resolve problems in relationship to the citizens' interest in education. It is the lay board that really gives the direction and meets the changes of the challenging times that we are having. It is the lay board that protects the academic freedom and protects freedom of enterprise. It is the lay board that has the input from the various viewpoints and the diversity which I have witnessed here in my participation on the board. I am convinced that the future of education in Wisconsin, with a lay board, is in excellent hands. The people that I have met and learned to know here are dedicated to the future course of the university and to meeting the goals that have been established by the regent study of the future.

"I think under the leadership of President Shaw, Executive Vice President Lyall, chancellors, and members of the faculty, the student body really recognizes that Wisconsin has one of the premier educational institutions in the United States. I only wish that there were more occasions when the students would come forth and speak up favorably and say, 'We think we are in the best institution in the world and we would like to support that institution to carry out its principles.'

"To all of you, I appreciate all of the hard work which you have done in the past in trying to formulate a future program. I only wish all of you God speed in carrying it out. To President Shaw and to the faculty, I am hopeful that we can all look forward to that magic year 2000 and see that the merger has been accomplished and the goals that have been established are being faithfully executed. . .

"To all of you, not only on behalf of myself, but on behalf of my brother, Bob, let me say how much we have all appreciated the kindnesses you extended to Bob and the telephone calls during his last illness, the friendship which you have given to Lou Knowles, and to all of us. Being associated with you as individuals and with the university has been a very high privilege and one that I will long remember."

#### Resolutions of Commendation for Regent Schenian

Regent Lyon presented Resolution 3751 which was adopted with a standing ovation.

Resolution 3751: Whereas, on May 1, 1987, John R. Schenian will complete his term of office as the first student member of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System; and

> Whereas, since his appointment on November 20, 1985, he has rendered pioneering service in shaping and refining the student regent role; and

Whereas, he served ably as a member of the Education Committee, the Business and Finance Committee and the Regent Study Group on the Future of the UW System, contributing much to the deliberations of each of those bodies, as well as to the board; and

Whereas, his commitment to the student role in governance has been demonstrated not only by his active participation at regent meetings, but also by his travels throughout the state to meet with students, faculty and staff at all UW System universities and centers;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Regents of the University of Wisconsin System hereby commend John R. Schenian for meritorious and conscientious service in a challenging and precedent-setting role; and

Be it further resolved that, in granting him the title and status of Regent Emeritus upon his retirement from the board, his regent colleagues extend to John R. Schenian best wishes for success and happiness as he embarks on a future already bright with promise.

Regent Schenian made the following statement: "Like any person who has sat in these comfortable chairs at this table and has held the title of regent of the University of Wisconsin System, I have certain sorrows at leaving this board. I think the first will be in acquiring the title 'Regent Emeritus'. . . With all due respect to Regent Knowles, when I think of the word 'emeritus,' I think of someone of his stature and recognition, and I have trouble believing that someone like myself will have the title 'emeritus.' My second sorrow about leaving the board is I am sure my name will be added to every fundraising list in the state. . . And the third thing that I will miss about the board is the tremendous reading and traveling. I just don't know what I will be able to do with the extra 20, 30 and sometimes 40 hours a week that I've spent on this board's activities.

"Obviously, being on the Board of Regents has been a unique experience for me and I think for many other people, too. I have tried in my deliberations to take all the views into account, realizing that I was setting a precedent that other students would have to follow and realizing that they would have to live with whatever precedent I did set. I have taken a lot of heat for some of the positions that I have taken, and I don't mind that. I certainly don't expect everybody to agree with what I say and what I do. In fact, I certainly hope that those students whom I have worked with will agree that I have been a conscientious, hard-working student for all students' concerns. . .

"In many ways, I see this resolution as a recognition for the pain and the accomplishments that I have borne over the last couple years, having really achieved the role of regent on a different path than all other people before me, having risen through the ranks of student government and student politics. I really see this as an end of a journey for myself. I have ŧ

always been involved in student government and student activities, not for my own accomplishments or self-recognition, but because I thought I could contribute. And there were issues to be worked on that needed everyone's attention, including mine. . .

"I am very proud in having been able to have, first of all, the opportunity and the ability to visit all the campuses and centers in the UW System and thank the citizens of the State of Wisconsin for giving me that opportunity. It has been a real learning experience and something that I will cherish for a long time, visiting campuses, meeting with the faculty, staff and students, and seeing parts of the state that I have never had the opportunity to see before.

"I do have a couple points of advice that I would like to give to my fellow members. . . I think the biggest problem that this board has to deal with is the misinformation and misperceptions that the citizens of the state have in regard to the university--ranging from legislators who think that you can measure the work of faculty members solely based on their hours spent in the classroom or those Wisconsin citizens who think that the football coach is paid tax money and don't realize that only 40 percent of the UW budget is tax revenue; and from those students who think that the regents are responsible for everything that goes on in the university system, not realizing that we have to dance to the tune of the Legislature and the federal government.

"There are many people that I would like to thank. I certainly have not gotten to this position alone, having risen through the ranks of student government. I would like to thank those students who worked on my campaign, became friends and helped me get elected -- at the Ant Bridge Party, in particular, and my co-president Avram Rosen. I would also like to thank Judy Temby and her staff for all the help. . . . I would also like to thank the chancellors and their staffs for their help in visiting their campuses and meeting with their staffs and students; President Shaw and his staff, for all their timely help; and Bryce Tolefree/JoAnna Richard and their staffs for their help from United Council these last years. I would also like to thank former Governor Earl and his staff for choosing me and allowing me to have this opportunity. I would also like especially to thank my family and friends who have been so supportive and have had the honor of seeing me stay in college for more than eight years. I would like finally to dedicate this resolution to my parents who have been so supportive through the years and who have instilled in me the need for education and have supported me in my attempts to give back to the university what I think I have been able to get from them."

# Appreciation from the United Council of UW Student Governments

Expressing appreciation to Regents Finlayson and Knowles for their service, Bryce Tolefree, President of United Council stated: "On a lot of occasions I don't think the students do enough to thank you and the board for the hard work and dedication and commitment that you have shown to the educational system and to the students of the state. I think that I would like at this point in time, because we haven't said it enough, to thank you--the chancellors, the faculty, the board--for all the work that you have

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done for students and the university system, because we think that the citizens of the state, and ourselves, the students, are the ultimate beneficiaries of the things you have done.

Mr. Tolefree then read the following resolution passed by United Council:

Whereas, John Schenian has served as the first student placed on the Board of Regents, and

Whereas, John Schenian has demonstrated a high level of integrity, honesty and commitment to the citizens of the University System of our great state, and

Whereas, John Schenian's commitment to the Wisconsin Idea of higher education has extended far above and beyond the call of duty, and

Whereas, John Schenian's prudent decision-making capabilities and willingness to voice the views of students have been invaluable to United Council, and

Whereas, John Schenian has become a role model for all future student regents, therefore

Be it Resolved, that United Council recognizes with great admiration the dedication that Regent John Schenian has demonstrated and hereby commends him for his efforts and achievements.

# Report of the President of the VTAE Board

Regent Hassett, President of the State Vocational, Technical and Adult Education Board, reported that the VTAE System received a five percent increase in general aids, which kept the system at 29 percent of aidable cost. A continuing problem, however, was that four of the 16 districts were suffering from very low land prices and were at the 1.5 mill rate limit, which meant they had no way to obtain additional money to ease their serious fiscal problems. # Report of Nonpersonnel Actions/Informational Items

Upon motion by Regent Schilling, seconded by Regent Schenian, Resolution 3752 was adopted unanimously.

Resolution 3752: That the report of nonpersonnel actions by administrative officers to the Board of Regents and informational items reported for the record (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified and confirmed.

### Review of Legislative Meetings

President Shaw thanked Regent President Weinstein, Regent Vice President Schilling, as well as the chancellors, faculty and staff members who assisted in testimony at various legislative committee meetings in the past month.

# Meeting with Governor Thompson

After the March 6 board meeting, Regent President Weinstein, Regent Vice President Schilling, Regent Heckrodt and President Shaw met with Governor Thompson to urge adequate faculty salary increases. Comparison groups had received raises of two to three percent above inflation over the past few years, and a recent report by the AAUP indicated that the average increase for this year was close to six percent. The Governor was thanked for his support of the catch-up increases which had been granted, and he was assured that the board wanted to avoid having to come back in several years with another catch-up plan. While indicating sympathy for the faculty situation, the Governor also called attention to funding problems at the state level. President Shaw thanked Governor Thompson for so warmly receiving him and the regent delegation.

# Implementation of Future Study Recommendations regarding Interinstitutional Programs

President Shaw noted that the regents' report on the future of the UW System stressed the need to serve students better by encouraging interinstitutional programs and other cooperative efforts to extend existing academic programs as far as possible and reduce expensive program duplication. As examples of the kinds of efforts being undertaken to achieve this goal, he cited a cooperative program that extended a UW-Oshkosh master's program to serve students at UW-Green Bay. Similarly, a UW-Green Bay master's program was offered cooperatively at UW-Oshkosh. The UW-Whitewater MBA program was offered at the Waukesha County Center to serve students in that region. There also was the Nursing Degree Completion

Program at Wausau, involving students at UW-Oshkosh, UW-Stevens Point and the UW Centers at Marathon County and Marshfield/Wood County. Each of these efforts combined faculty and facilities of more than one UW institution in order to offer established programs to a broader clientele and thereby avoid the need to create additional new degree programs or to turn students away. As new program proposals were reviewed, one of the important considerations was whether the desired result could be achieved through a cooperative arrangement, rather than a new program in order to save taxpayers' dollars and still provide necessary student services.

# Appointment of President's Telecommunications Task Force

President Shaw announced the appointment of a special President's Telecommunications Task Force, which was charged with responsibility for evaluating the UW System's administrative, instructional, research and extension requirements related to new and emerging technologies and with developing a plan for meeting those needs. Vice President Bornstein was to chair this special task force, and Dr. Luke F. Lamb, of UW-Extension, was to serve as co-chair. The task force was expected to seek appropriate advice and counsel from experts within and outside the UW System and from appropriate state agencies. The president asked for a progress report from the task force by October 1987 and a final report on or about September 1, 1988.

# Report of the Vice President

# Accreditation for Bachelor of Science in Nursing, UW-Green Bay

UW-Green Bay had been notified that its Bachelor of Science in Nursing program received accreditation for eight years from the National League for Nursing, the accrediting agency for nursing programs.

# Report Due on Teacher Education Programs in the UW System

The vice chancellors had met jointly with the education deans the previous month, to discuss a number of current issues related to teacher education, and particularly to review progress in implementing the recommendations of the "Benchmarks of Excellence" report. A special report on teacher education programs in the UW System was to be made to the Education Committee at the October 1987 meeting. 1

# Status Report on Regent Merit-Based Scholarship Program

Vice President Trani gave the committee a status report on the proposal for a merit-based regent scholarship program, which would be presented to the committee in June.

### Institutional Mission Review

Each institution had begun the process of reviewing its mission, in response to resolution 9A of the Future Study Report.

#### NATO Awards

The National Science Foundation had recently announced its NATO post-docotral fellowships in science awards to young scientists and engineers for full-time postgraduate study abroad at institutions and laboratories in NATO countries or their neighbors. Four of the 58 awards went to individuals at UW-Madison.

# First Reading of New Program Proposal: BS in Geological Engineering, UW-Madison

Regent Flores reported that the committee was presented with a first reading of a proposal for a BS in Geological Engineering at UW-Madison. This would be a four-year program utilizing a comprehensive, interdisciplinary approach in the application of earth sciences to problems important to society. The program would replace the Mining Engineering program, which was being phased out, and would be supported by reallocation of resources within the College of Engineering.

Associate Dean Donald Dietmeyer, of the College of Engineering, and Professors Mary Anderson, of Geology and Geophysics, and Rudolfo de la Cruz, of Metallurgical and Mineral Engineering, presented the program to the committee and answered questions.

The second reading of the proposal, and an action item to authorize implementation, was be on the agenda of the May meeting of the committee.

# Request to the Trustees of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate

The committee unanimously approved a resolution to authorize the system president to request from the Trustees of the Vilas estate an appropriation of \$785,725 for the next fiscal year, to support scholarships, fellowships, research professorships, and certain activities in the arts, humanities, and music.

When the trustees responded to the request, a formal "proffer" of those funds would be presented to the board, for official acceptance.

Adoption by the board of Resolution 3753 was moved by Regent Flores and seconded by Regent Hanson.

Resolution 3753: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison, the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents requests that the Trustees of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate supply the following funds for the fiscal year July 1, 1987 to June 30, 1988, subject to the availability of funds, as provided by the terms of the William F. Vilas Trust:

1. Continuation of 10 Vilas Undergraduate Scholarships at \$400.00 each

\$ 4,000.00

2. Continuation of 10 Vilas Graduate Fellowships: a. 5 at \$600.00 each \$3,000.00 b. 5 traveling fellowships at \$1,500.00 each <u>7,500.00</u>

\$ 10,500.00

3. Continuation of 16 Vilas Research Professorships at \$10,000.00 plus auxiliary allowances of \$15,000.00 for 15 of the 16 following professorships:

\$385,000.00

In response to a question by Regent Nikolay, Regent Flores explained that all monies requested were earnings of the principal and did not invade the corpus. In many years, not all of the earnings were used, some of it being reinvested into the corpus.

Put to the vote Resolution 3753 was then unanimously adopted.

# UW System Academic Staff Professional Development Program Recipients, 1987-88

Regent Flores reported that this was the third year of the academic staff professional development program, which was established as a response to concerns identified during the academic staff review conducted by the regents several years ago. The UW System budgeted \$150,000 per year for this program, which provided a two-to-one match with the institutions. The list presented to the committee constituted about half of the annual awards, with the remaining half to be reported in November 1987.

#### Academic Staff Governance Update

Noting that the committee received periodic reports concerning implementation of recommendations of the regents' academic staff study and provisions of section 36.09(4m) of the statutes, which authorized the academic staff to participate in institutional governance, Regent Flores referred to a summary by institution, included in the agenda materials, of the status of academic staff governance structures and the participation of academic staff in institutional committees and governance structures generally.

Executive Vice President Lyall, who reviewed the report with the committee, felt that significant progress had been made, even though the institutions had addressed the issue in different ways.

Ms. Karen Carlson, a clinical instructor at UW-Madison, and a member of that Academic Staff Committee's Subcommittee on Governance Structure, appeared before the Education Committee to express concern over the way academic staff governance was developing at UW-Madison.

The committee asked that it continue to be provided with progress reports on developments as they affected the academic staff.

In discussion at the board meeting, Regent Weinstein asked if the committee was satisfied that the academic staff governance process was going forward in a satisfactory way at all institutions, including UW-Madison.

Indicating the committee's consensus was that substantial progress had been made, Regent Flores added that there was some surprise at the variety of ways the institutions had gone about implementing the governance process. He had asked what concerns were bing heard by System Administration and was advised by Dr. Lyall that very little dissatisfaction had surfaced. Because the process was still very young, he expected that problems still were being worked on at the campus level. If these efforts were unsuccessful, some issues might reach System Administration and the Board of Regents. UW-Madison was the one institution from which a negative report had been received, and that report did not go unchallenged. While progress was being made, there was a considerable distance to go before full participation by academic staff in governance would be achieved. Different institutions were at different stages of development, and it was for these reasons that the committee asked to be kept informed as the process continued.

Noting that legislation mandating academic staff governance soon would be two years old, Regent Weinstein stated that governance must be implemented without undue delay and asked the Education Committee to continue active oversight.

Regent Clusen observed that the only reason some members of the board had not brought forth the issue of academic staff collective bargaining at this time was that they were willing to give the new statutory language and the new title and compensation plan a chance to be effective. She felt, however, that patience would wear thin if satisfactory governance operations were not implemented within this two-year period. In addition, she

questioned whether some of the diverse means of handling academic staff governance might not in fact be devices to hinder development of a full governance structure. Because of these concerns and because she had heard complaints about current efforts, she suggested that the regents exercise more assertive oversight than simply receiving periodic reports.

Regent Flores noted that legislation on academic staff governance provided for academic staff to organize themselves in whatever manner they wished. Agreeing that hurdles could be thrown in the way of those efforts and that assertive oversight might be needed, he cautioned, however, that care must be taken to allow academic staff the freedom to organize as they saw fit, without a fiat from the Board of Regents.

Regent Weinstein asked if there was any evidence that academic staff freedom to organize was being impeded, to which Regent Flores replied that there were some such allegations at UW-Madison, which the committee would look into in a sensitive way.

Pointing out that the UW-Madison organization principles were approved in referendum by more than an 80 percent vote of academic staff, Dr. Lyall observed that if governance worked correctly, some problems that formerly had to come to the Board of Regents for resolution would instead be resolved through the governance structure at the institutional level. She agreed that the process was still very young and might contain some problems, but also agreed that it would be inappropriate for System Administration or the board to try to tell academic staff how to organize or to veto a process they had chosen.

Regent Weinstein added that it also would be contrary to law for campus administrators to interfere with the right of academic staff to organize as they wished.

Noting the implication that there might be some problems occurring which warranted the board's concern, Regent Weinstein emphasized that the reason academic staff collective bargaining was not an issue before the board at this meeting was because the regents hoped to be reassured that academic staff governance was alive and well. If that turned out to be untrue, he suspected that more than one regent would wish to reopen the collective bargaining issue.

Regent Flores explained that the governance matter was further complicated by the hierarchy of authority set forth in the statute which made academic staff governance "subject to the powers and responsibilities of the board, the chancellors and faculty. . . ." The interplay between those groups was a delicate matter involving statutory construction. While the board needed to ensure that academic staff were not being hindered unnecessarily in their ability to organize as they saw fit, he was not sure that faculty could be required, for example, to enter into a joint assembly or senate with academic staff.

Acting Chancellor Cohen assured the board there was no administration hindrance of academic staff organization at UW-Madison, and that articles of organization were drawn up and voted by the academic staff, with no obstacles placed in their path. Because of the large number--approximately 3800--of academic staff members at UW-Madison, he noted there was bound to

be some disagreement. What the Education Committee heard, he felt, was the dissent of a very small sector of the academic staff, not caused by administration interference, but by unhappiness at the outcome of the academic staff's own process.

Regent Flores indicated that it had been the opinion of Ms. Carlson that, while a majority of the academic staff approved the articles of organization, it was in some sense a contract of adhesion, with academic staff believing this was the best they could do because they were not on even ground with faculty.

### Revision to Faculty Policies and Procedures, UW-Milwaukee

The committee unanimously approved the proposed changes, which previously had been approved by the faculty and administration of UW-Milwaukee, and had been reviewed by legal counsel.

Regent Flores moved and Regent Schenian seconded the following resolution which was adopted unanimously by the board:

Resolution 3754: That upon the recommendation of the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the amendment of Chapters 4, 5 and 6 of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Policies and Procedures be approved.

#### Update on Five-Year Academic Program Reviews

Regent Flores reported that an historical summary of five-year review activity was presented to the committee. Since 1976, 69 reviews had been initiated and 45 had been completed. Eleven reviews were scheduled to be initiated during 1987-88.

# Five-Year Review of the MS in Accounting, UW-Oshkosh

Presenting the report to the committee, Chancellor Penson, Vice Chancellor Ward, Professor Joseph Scherger, Chair of the Department of Accounting, and C. Burk Tower, Associate Dean of the College of Business, described the program as a first professional degree program, designed for students with an undergraduate major in another field. Most of the students were older, planning for a career change, and preparing to pass professional certification examinations to qualify for entry-level positions in accounting.

The review resulted in some recommendations for changes in the program, which were being implemented. The vice chancellor was to make a status report to the Office of Academic Affairs in two years, and by 1990 a decision was to be made on whether the program needed special attention, with the committee to be informed of the results of that process. The recommendation was for continuation of the program, subject to certain changes.

# <u>UW-Madison Student Association Request for Review under UW System</u> <u>Guidelines for Student Governance</u>

Regent Flores explained that this agenda item concerned an appeal to the Board of Regents for review of President Shaw's decision involving the number of students on the Search and Screen Committee for the Dean of Students at UW-Madison. The Education Committee had been asked by Regent President Weinstein to make a recommendation to the board on this matter. There were presentations to the committee by representatives of the Wisconsin Student Association and United Council of UW Student Governments, followed by a response from Acting Chancellor Cohen, who stated that established institutional practice had been followed in this case. After lengthy discussion in committee, Resolutions 3755 and 3756 were unanimously approved.

Adoption by the board of the following resolution was moved by Regent Flores and seconded by Regent Hanson:

Resolution 3755: That the appeal by the UW-Madison Wisconsin Student Association of the UW System President's decision under student governance guidelines regarding the Dean of Students appointment be denied.

In discussion at the board meeting, Regent Schenian stated his intention to vote against the committee's recommendation. While he was somewhat comforted by Resolution 3756, he thought the policy issue underlying this appeal was sufficiently important to warrant board review and that the question involved both legal and policy aspects pertaining to s. 36.09(5), Wis. Stats., as to what role students should play in hiring staff who had a direct impact on student life.

Regent Weinstein asked if the Education Committee received a legal opinion on this matter.

President Shaw replied that his decision was rendered after having received legal advice.

Regent Flores explained it was the consensus of Education Committee members that, while they might have constituted the search and screen committee differently, there was nothing illegal or unconscionable about the makeup of the committee as structured at UW-Madison. Therefore, the regents ought not to substitute their judgment for that of the administration. If the board felt there should be a specific policy on student representation on these types of committees, that would be a proper matter to consider prospectively. ĺ

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Put to the vote, <u>Resolution 3755</u> was <u>adopted</u>, with Regent Schenian voting "No."

To deal with the policy issue raised by the WSA appeal, Regent Flores reported that the committee unanimously approved Resolution 3756.

Upon motion by Regent Flores, seconded by Regent Schenian, the following resolution which was adopted unanimously by the board:

Resolution 3756: That the Education Committee ask Vice President Trani to prepare a report to the committee of the practices at each institution concerning student involvement on all search and screen committees.

Regent Flores added that the report was to be presented at the June meeting of the committee.

#### ROTC

It was reported by Regent Flores that the committee heard testimony by Mr. Eric Jernberg, an alumnus of UW-Milwaukee, Mr. Rick Villasenor, a UW-Madison student, and Mr. Ed Emerson, Academic Affairs Director of United Council, concerning the policies followed by ROTC which resulted in discrimination against homosexuals.

Following lengthy discussion, the committee unanimously approved the following resolution.

It was moved by Regent Flores and seconded by Regent Schenian that the resolution approved by the committee be adopted by the board.

Whereas, the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System is committed to maintaining students' rights to be free from unnecessary discrimination in an academic setting; and

Whereas, the citizens of the State of Wisconsin, through their Legislature, have stated that discrimination based on sexual preference is not to be tolerated or allowed in Wisconsin; and

Whereas, the Reserve Officers Training Corps programs offered on University of Wisconsin campuses discriminate against applicants based on sexual preference;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Board of Regents expresses its concern over the practice of discrimination based on sexual preference toward applicants to Reserve Officers Training Corps programs throughout the University of Wisconsin System; and Be it further resolved that the Board of Regents requests System Administration and the Higher Educational Aids Board to explore the possibility of creating alternative, post-graduation service-based programs that will be free of any type of discrimination; and

Be it finally resolved that the Board of Regents requests the President of the UW System to contact and work with Wisconsin's congressional delegation to attempt to change the federal policy that allows this type of discrimination and attempt to change the programs.

In discussion at the board meeting, Regent Fish commented that in his view the resolution addressed the wrong issue, since the courts had determined ROTC regulations to be legal. Considering ROTC as a kind of federal scholarship, he said the board had the right to reject such scholarships, but should not attempt to mandate the basis on which they were offered. Noting the difference between admission standards and scholarship standards, he observed that university rules and federal as well as state law prohibited barring students from admission because of sexual preference. On the other hand, these laws and rules did not speak to conditions for accepting a scholarship. In defense of ROTC, he said it provided educational opportunity to many who otherwise could not participate in a college experience, including poor, minority or culturally restricted students. Further, he considered an effort to change the federal rules an exercise in futility, since he believed it was clear that would not occur.

Regent Fish then <u>moved to table</u> the resolution. The <u>motion</u>, seconded by Regent Gerrard, <u>failed</u> on a roll call vote, with Regents Fish, Gerrard, Hassett, Heckrodt, Knowles, Lyon and Vattendahl voting "Aye" (7) and Regents Clusen, Finlayson, Flores, Hanson, Nikolay, Schenian, Schilling and Weinstein voting "No" (8).

Noting that the proposed resolution simply would ask the congressional delegation to modify the federal rules that prohibited the participation of avowed homosexuals in ROTC programs, Regent Flores observed that although the courts had held this type of discriminatory action to be legal, that did not mean Congress could not act to change pertinent laws and regulations. He considered it proper for the regents to make such a request.

Regent Heckrodt inquired as to the intent of the fifth paragraph of the resolution.

As author of the resolution, Regent Schenian explained that there had been discussion at the federal level of creating a scholarship-based program much like ROTC, but in a non-military setting. His recommendation was only that the possibility be explored with the appropriate federal and state agencies, with the hope that non-military programs open to all students could be created as alternatives to ROTC.

President Shaw added that there had been discussion by the Peace Corps about development of a program which would be analogous to ROTC, providing scholarship aid and experience while in college, with commitment beyond that to four years of service as a Peace Corps volunteer.

While she intended to support the resolution, Regent Clusen saw no reason to include the fifth paragraph. In addition, she remarked that the Higher Educational Aids Board had no extra money to be devoted to any new purpose at this time.

Regent Clusen therefore moved to amend the resolution by deleting paragraph five. The motion was seconded by Regent Nikolay.

Speaking against the amendment, Regent Schenian noted that the paragraph did not mandate that programs be set up, but simply asked system administration to explore the possibility of creating such programs, so that those students who were discriminated against had alternative ways of obtaining similar financial assistance.

Regent Fish agreed with Regent Clusen that the fifth paragraph was not germane to the resolution. Commenting that part of the objection to ROTC was the fact that it was a military program, he said that while the words, "post-graduation service-based programs," could be military or non-military, President Shaw and Regent Schenian made it quite clear that what was being considered was non-military scholarships which would be substituted for ROTC. If that were the intent, he thought the resolution should address directly the issue of discontinuing ROTC programs.

Regent Schilling stated that he would not support a resolution that would remove ROTC programs from UW System campuses because he believed in the value of those programs. As he read the resolution, it would simply request a change in federal regulations without affecting retention of ROTC programs. The programs mentioned in paragraph five would exist on campus at the same time in order to provide students with an alternative.

Stating that the intention of the resolution was not to attack the military, Regent Schenian emphasized that the purpose was to address what in his opinion was unnecessary discrimination, to look for alternatives--but not to terminate ROTC programs--while working through proper channels to affect a change in federal policy.

Put to a roll-call vote, the amendment to delete paragraph five was <u>carried</u>, with Regents Clusen, Fish, Gerrard, Hassett, Heckrodt, Knowles, Lyon and Nikolay voting "Aye" (8), and Regents Finlayson, Flores, Hanson, Schenian, Schilling, Vattendahl and Weinstein voting "No" (7).

Stating that he considered the rationale which supported discrimination against homosexuals in ROTC programs to be flawed, Regent Flores explained that the federal courts generally had upheld the military need for discipline, security and morale, and it was for those three reasons that avowed homosexuals were kept out of the military. His view, however, was that homosexuals were no more inclined toward being a security risk or creating morale or disciplinary problems than were heterosexuals. Therefore, he believed the law should be changed and urged the board to pass the resolution supporting such a change.

Regent Fish suggested that to make the resolution read correctly the word, "finally," should be stricken from the last paragraph, and President Weinstein directed that this change be made as an <u>editorial correction</u>.

Regent Vattendahl stated that he agreed with the principles embodied in the resolution and did not view homosexuals as a greater security risk than heterosexuals. He had, however, voted to table the resolution in order to give further consideration to the question of whether or not this was an issue on which the board wished to take a position, given the possibility of becoming involved in debates on an abundance of national issues and given the fact that it had not been the board's practice to take positions on many such issues. While he intended to vote in favor of the resolution on its merits, he cautioned against the precedent of acting on national policy issues not directly related to the board's authority.

Regent Schenian stated that he thought this was a significant issue for the board to consider because of the basic importance of individual civil rights and because federal regulations in the case were inconsistent with the views of Wisconsin citizens, as expressed in state law barring discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation.

Regent Fish did not agree that the issue involved civil rights, since the courts had found ROTC regulations to be legal. If regents did not agree with the rules, he felt the vote should be on whether or not to discontinue ROTC. He considered it impractical and incorrect to discuss changing regulations which had been found by courts to be proper.

Regent Heckrodt inquired as to the extent of activity the system president would undertake on behalf of the resolution if it were adopted.

In response, President Shaw indicated that he would convey the board's wishes on the ROTC matter as part of his ongoing communication with the Wisconsin congressional delegation.

Noting that the media was likely to headline the ROTC debate, Regent Knowles commented that the wrong message was being sent regarding what issues were important to the board, and Regent Gerrard expressed agreement with Regent Knowles.

The question was put on the amended resolution, and it was adopted as follows on a roll call vote, with Regents Clusen, Finlayson, Flores, Hanson, Nikolay, Schenian, Schilling, Vattendahl and Weinstein voting "Aye" (9), and Regents Fish, Gerrard, Hassett, Heckrodt, Knowles and Lyon voting "No" (6).

Resolution 3757: Whereas, the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System is committed to maintaining students' rights to be free from unnecessary discrimination in an academic setting; and

> Whereas, the citizens of the State of Wisconsin, through their Legislature, have stated that discrimination based on sexual preference is not to be tolerated or allowed in Wisconsin; and

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Whereas, the Reserve Officers Training Corps programs offered on University of Wisconsin campuses discriminate against applicants based on sexual preference;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Board of Regents expresses its concern over the practice of discrimination based on sexual preference toward applicants to Reserve Officers Training Corps programs throughout the University of Wisconsin System;- and

Be it resolved that the Board of Regents requests the President of the UW System to contact and work with Wisconsin's congressional delegation to attempt to change the federal policy that allows this type of discrimination and attempt to change the programs.

### Revision of Regent Policy Document 81-2, Sexual Harassment Policy Statement and Implementation

Continuing the report of the Education Committee, Regent Flores stated that the committee unanimously approved Resolution 3758. While the proposed amendments would bring policy into conformity with current practice, the committee added the requirement that an annual report also be provided to the regents.

It was moved by Regent Flores and seconded by Regent Finlayson that the following resolution be adopted by the board:

Resolution 3758: That Section II. (2) of Regent Policy Document 81-2, Sexual Harassment Policy Statement and Implementation, be amended as indicated on Attachment A.

(Attachment A is included as EXHIBIT A.)

In discussion at the board meeting, it was pointed out by Regents Weinstein and Flores that no substantive changes were being made in the policy. The amendment simply established a reporting mechanism.

In response to a concern expressed by Regent Fish, President Shaw assured the board that reports brought to the regents would be reviewed and cleared by legal counsel.

Regent Finlayson commented that reporting would be helpful in keeping the regents informed as to progress in discouraging sexual harassment.

Put to the vote, Resolution 3758 was unanimously adopted.

#### REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Chairman Lyon presented the report of the committee.

### Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts

Assistant Vice President Ray Marnocha reported to the committee that the total gifts, grants and contracts through the ninth month of this fiscal year were \$272 million, or \$14.9 million more than the same period last year (a 5.8 percent increase). The non-federal share increased 21.6 percent, or \$12.2 million over a year ago, while the federal share increased 1.3 percent, or \$2.7 million over the same period last year. Primary changes in federal receipts were an increase in research (\$7.6 million), and decreases in instruction (\$.7 million), and student aid (\$5.1 million).

Resolution 3759 was moved by Regent Lyon, seconded by Regent Knowles and unanimously adopted by the board.

Resolution 3759: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

#### Acceptance of the Mary Rankin Bequest

Regent Lyon reported that the committee unanimously approved acceptance of the Mary Rankin bequest, which would provide approximately \$50,000 to the McArdle Laboratory of UW-Madison to support research concerning the causes and treatment of cancer.

Upon motion by Regent Lyon, seconded by Regent Knowles, the following resolution was adopted unanimously by the board:

Resolution 3760: That the bequest of the late Mary Rankin, Seymour, Wisconsin, be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the trust, and that the Trust Officer or Assistant Trust Officers be authorized to sign receipts and do all things necessary to effect the transfer for the benefit of the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

(The bequest under the trust provides as follows:

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"It is my will that this bequest be paid to McArdle Laboratory for cancer research of the University of Wisconsin and it is to be used to support research concerning the causes and treatment of cancer.")

(The University will receive approximately \$50,000.)

# Acceptance of the Mrs. Harry (Evelyn) Steenbock Gift

The committee unanimously approved acceptance of the request of Mrs. Harry Steenbock that \$200,000 be transferred from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation (WARF) to the University of Wisconsin at Madison Trust Fund to fund an endowment for "The Steenbock Center for the Biochemical Basis of Disease." The Center would be devoted to utilization of a broad spectrum of biological techniques and investigation for the solution of human disease problems.

It was moved by Regent Lyon, seconded by Regent Knowles and carried unanimously that the following resolution be adopted by the board:

Resolution 3761: That the gift of Mrs. Harry (Evelyn) Steenbock be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions which have been set, and that the Trust Officer or Assistant Trust Officers be authorized to sign receipts and do all things necessary to effect the transfer for the benefit of the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

> (That at the request of Mrs. Harry (Evelyn) Steenbock, \$200,000 be transferred from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation to the University of Wisconsin at Madison Trust Fund to fund an endowment for "The Steenbock Center for the Biochemical Basis of Disease." The Center shall be devoted to the utilization of a broad spectrum of biological techniques and investigation for the solution of disease problems of man.)

# Deed Correction, Barron County Center Biological Field Station

Regent Lyon reported unanimous committee approval of correcting a deed for land donated to UW Center-Barron County.

It was moved by Regent Lyon, seconded by Regent Fish and carried unanimously that Resolution 3762 be adopted by the board.

Resolution 3762: On the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System and the Chancellor of the Center System, the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System are authorized to execute a quit claim deed conveying to Judith McMillen, Jennifer Pacyga and Janet Hartmann, as tenants in common, the following land in Barron County, Wisconsin:

> That part of Parcel C of CSM 6-61 in Government Lot 2 of 35-35-11, which was included in error in the deed of gift recorded December 30, 1986, in Volume 568 of Records on pages 69 and 70, as document 490751, Barron County Register of Deeds.

(This donation was reported to the Board of Regents as a gift-in-kind on February 6, 1987.)

### Tentative GPR Fee Budget Allocations for 1987-88

President Shaw presented to the committee proposed 1987-88 institutional budget allocations. With regard to "Wisconsin Idea" projects, he noted that \$66,000 of economic development funds had been identified in the UW-Extension budget for dairy profitability and \$200,000 had been budgeted to fund the concept of applied research without identifying specific projects. The funds, which were to be available to faculty of all institutions, were to be awarded through the office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs, based upon need and project relationship to other activities.

Half-year funding for 380 new instructional positions was provided in the budget. Items not fully funded included teacher preparation requirements, which received about one-fifth of the UW System's request. It was noted that more monies for those needs were to be requested in the 1988-89 budget adjustment bill. The UW System had requested \$1 million in the second year of biennium for "Centers of Excellence," and the Governor had indicated an interest in discussing this request for inclusion in the budget adjustment bill.

Two financial aid programs for minority students were proposed for the second year of the biennium. The Governor's budget endorsed funding a tuition award pilot program at \$200,000 and minority teacher scholarships at \$100,000. Not funded were requests for minority and women student and faculty programs. For the fourth biennium out of the last six, no physical plant funding for maintenance of new buildings was provided.

After discussion, the committee unanimously approved Resolution 3763.

Upon motion by Regent Lyon, seconded by Regent Fish, the following resolution was adopted unanimously by the board:

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Resolution 3763: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents approves the decision rules, tentative allocations and budget policy principles outlined in Biennial Budget Policy Paper #87-89/1.

(A copy of the paper is on file with the papers of this meeting.

### Recommendation on Mandatory Refundable Fee (MRF) Policy and Procedures

Summarizing committee review of this proposal, Regent Lyon reported that President Shaw's recommendation on mandatory refundable fees (MRF) was formulated after consultation with a committee of students and administrators. The president proposed that use of the MRF be limited to United Council and to any similar governance group representing more than one UW System institution. Control of funds derived from any MRF rested with UW System students; thus, organizations with a purpose not related directly to the UW System and with a preponderance of members from outside of the UW System would not be eligible. As an organization of UW System students, United Council was accountable directly to those students through voting of campus student representatives.

Students were not precluded from belonging to organizations such as the United States Student Association, since they currently could and did pay membership fees through the segregated fee process, which was created to fund student activities, including memberships. The MRF, on the other hand, was an extraordinary fee approved by the board for United Council and not extended to other organizations.

Mr. Michael Inners and Mr. James Nell, representing the UW-Madison Wisconsin Student Association, reviewed the WSA position regarding the MRF, and there was considerable discussion of their proposal.

After further discussion, the committee approved Resolution 3764, with Regent Schenian voting "No."

Adoption by the board of the following resolution was moved by Regent Lyon and seconded by Regent Fish:

Resolution 3764: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the availability of the mandatory refundable fee mechanism be limited to student organizations with a UW System interinstitutional governance purpose, and in which all students of the relevant institutions are members, and that the attached paper entitled "Mandatory Refundable Fee Policies and Procedures" concerning the implementation and administration of such fees, be adopted (EXHIBIT B).

In discussion at the board meeting, Regent Schenian explained that he voted against the resolution because he saw no reason to limit the MRF to in-state organizations. Disagreeing with the assertion that approval would open a flood gate to national organizations wanting MRF funding, he noted that requests would require student government approval, and in his experience, only one type of organization would receive that approval. He saw no real distinction between the purposes of United Council at the state level and USSA at the federal level, both of which dealt with student governance issues.

Put to the vote, Resolution 3764 was adopted, with Regent Schenian voting "No."

### Report of the Vice President for Business and Finance

### Fiscal Year 1986-87 Projection Summary Report

In reviewing the Fiscal Year 1986-87 Projection Summary Report, Assistant Vice President Marnocha advised the committee that the uncommitted balance for revenue shortfall and other contingencies as of March 31, 1987, was \$1,526,682.

### Report on Proposed Legislation

Outlining for the committee provisions of proposed retirement legislation, Mr. Robert Alesch, Senior Personnel Officer, noted inclusion of a 65/20 rule and an alternate benefit improvement formula. Funding for improved retirement benefits was to come from the difference between the recognized value and the market value of retirement fund assets--about \$2.4 billion.

Mr. Alesch also reported on proposed changes in sick-leave conversion for unclassified employees at retirement. The changes would reduce sick-leave accrual from 12 days per year to 8.5 days and 6.5 days for annual and academic year appointments, respectively. After considerable discussion of this issue, it was felt that the regent position needed clarification, and the issue was to be reviewed by System Administration in the next month.

Mr. Marnocha also reported that the Governor had included language in his budget bill for a statutory change to direct that the UW System assess a tuition surcharge for all credits taken beyond a student's degree requirements. The language would leave to the Board of Regents the decision on how such a surcharge would be implemented. If passed by the Legislature, System Administration would bring an implementation plan to the board for approval at a future date.

### REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The committee's report was presented by Chairman Nikolay.

# Approval of Major Project Concept and Budget Reports, UW-Milwaukee

The committee unanimously approved two concept and budget reports for UW-Milwaukee, the first of which was a masonry restoration project for the Downer complex at a cost of \$702,565. The work to be accomplished was based on recommendations of an extensive consultant's study authorized by the board in 1983.

The second concept and budget report was for the Great Lakes Research Facility dock repair at a total cost of \$1,532,600. A project involving total replacement of the 1,275 foot dock wall was requested in the 1987-89 capital budget, to be funded from the all-agency allocation for minimum maintenance. During the capital budget approval process, the Building Commission decided to enumerate this work and treat it as a major project. Further, the commission decided to repair only a portion of the dock facility at this time and consequently enumerated the project at \$1,532,600.

Resolutions 3765 and 3766 were moved by Regent Nikolay, seconded by Regent Schenian and adopted unanimously by the board.

Resolution 3765: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Concept and Budget Report be approved for the Downer Complex (Johnston, Merrill, Holton and Greene Halls) Masonry Restoration project and authority granted to plan, bid and construct the project for an estimated total project cost of \$702,565, from the following funding sources:

> State Building Trust Funds Contingency Funds (previously authorized) \$ 59,400 1985-87 General Fund Supported Borrowing --Minimum Maintenance Allocation \$ 643,165 \$702,565

Resolution 3766: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Concept and Budget Report be approved for the Great Lakes Research Facility Dock Repair project and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct at a total cost of \$1,532,600 from 1987-89 General Fund Supported Borrowing.

Approval of Amended Urban Renewal Plan for Private Construction of Student Housing and Endorsement of Planning a Parking Structure on the 600 Block of University Avenue, UW-Madison

Regent Nikolay reported unanimous committee approval of the City of Madison's "Amended Urban Renewal Plan for the University Avenue Urban Renewal Area" and authority to develop preliminary plans and a concept and budget report for a lower campus parking structure.

The amended urban renewal plan updated a document originally prepared in 1968. Included were ten significant elements and changes in the plan which related to the university, with four of the changes directly concerning the 600 block of University Avenue.

As allowed in the amended urban renewal plan and as a result of joint planning between the city and the university, it was proposed that a parking structure incorporating approximately 450 parking spaces be constructed in the 600 block of University Avenue/Johnson Street in the southwest corner of the block. This \$3,898,000 program revenue-funded project was part of a plan to develop the entire block. In addition to the proposed parking structure, the block would also contain approximately 280 apartment-type housing units, in three eight-story-high residential buildings to be built, owned and operated by a private developer. These would be primarily two-bedroom units providing for a resident population of more than 1,000 persons. It was the intent that most of the residents would be students.

The developer's concept plan had been approved by the city with several conditions, one being that further details must be developed pertaining to the design of the parking structure. The City Council's approval was with the additional condition that some resident parking must be provided in the development, but no minimum requirement was established.

With adoption of the amended urban renewal plan by the Community Development Authority, the Madison Common Council and the Board of Regents, the city would be able to proceed to negotiate with the developer for the sale of the site for housing. At the appropriate time in the phased development, it might be necessary for the university to sell to or exchange with the city certain university-owned land needed to site the privately-owned residential development. It was anticipated that the Board of Regents and the State Building Commission would be asked to authorize the land transaction in early summer. After development of the university-owned portion of the block and sale of the surplus land, University Housing would be reimbursed for the amount of its program revenue funds used originally to acquire the property.

Regent Nikolay moved and Regent Schenian seconded adoption by the board of the following resolution:

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Resolution 3767: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Acting Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the "Amended Urban Renewal Plan for the University Avenue Urban Renewal Area" be approved (this encompasses University-owned property along the 600 to 900 blocks between University Avenue and Johnson Streets) for private construction of student housing in the 600 block of University Avenue; and

> Further, that authority be granted to seek the release of \$109,000 of Program Revenue funds to prepare Preliminary Plans and a Concept and Budget Report for a 1977-79 Lower Campus Parking Structure, at a revised total estimated project cost of \$3,898,000 to be funded from \$2,940,000 of Program Revenue Bonding and \$958,000 of cash Program Revenue.

In discussion at the board meeting, it was noted by Regent Fish that for an outlay of \$3.9 million, the university would have a parking garage which held 450 cars, at a cost of about \$9,000 per parking stall.

Vice President Brown added that there also would be a repayment back to University Housing of about \$400,000, which was the original purchase price of the land.

Regent Fish asked if the revenues generated by these new parking stalls could cover their cost, and Mr. Brown replied in the negative, adding that it would be necessary to use other parking revenues as supplements.

Indicating that 450 spaces was an approximate figure, Vice Chancellor Van Ess explained that the urban renewal plan revision provided for a parking ramp in the range of 425 to 475 spaces, with the exact number dependent on the consultant's design. For 475 spaces, the per-unit cost would be \$8,200. He also noted that parking rates would have to be adjusted to meet the increased costs.

Vice President Brown added that more precise figures would be included in the concept and budget report to be brought to the regents at a later date.

Put to the vote, Resolution 3767 was unanimously adopted.

# Approval to Grant Land Use Permit to K. R. Imaging, Inc., UW-Parkside

Continuing the report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee, Regent Nikolay summarized committee review of a request for the UW-Parkside chancellor to execute a land use agreement with a non-profit hospital consortium to provide an approximate one-acre site on the UW-Parkside campus for a small, specialized medical treatment facility to be constructed and operated by a consortium of four Racine and Kenosha area hospitals. The consortium, K. R. Imaging, Inc., was interested in the UW-Parkside site because of its central location and accessibility from both cities.

The parcel of land was located adjacent to Tallent Hall, which was remote from most of the other campus facilities, and use of the land by the consortium would not conflict with any planned university use. All costs for constructing, equipping, staffing, operating and maintaining the facility would be the responsibility of the consortium. The initial term of the permit would be five years, with five 3-year renewal options, for a total of 20 years. At the end of the 20-year period, or sooner if operations ceased, the consortium would remove the facility and restore the site to its original condition.

After discussion, the committee unanimously approved Resolution 3768, subject to redraft of the land use agreement, adding a condition that it could not be assigned or sold without the consent of the Board of Regents. The consultant for the consortium indicated that this would not present a problem for its board.

Regent Nikolay moved and Regent Schenian seconded Resolution 3768, which was adopted unanimously by the Board of Regents.

Resolution 3768: That, upon the recommendation of the UW System President, the UW-Parkside Chancellor be authorized to execute a land use permit with K.R. Imaging, Inc., a consortium of four Racine and Kenosha County hospitals, to provide a site for a Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) Scanner. The initial term of the permit will be five years, with five three-year renewal options, for a total of 20 years. All costs for constructing, equipping, staffing, operating, maintaining and removing the facility from the site after 20 years or on cessation of operations will be the responsibility of K.R. Imaging, Inc.

# Increase in Major Project Budget, UW-Stout

The committee unanimously approved an increase in the budget for the UW-Stout University Services Building project. It was explained that the post-bid trial budget, based on bids received on March 4, totaled \$2,412,000, which was \$253,700 over the authorized amount. Subsequent negotiations with the low bidders resulted in identification of deductions which resulted in an agreed-upon post-bid budget of \$2,353,400, which required a \$195,100 increase in the authorized amount.

Resolution 3769 was unanimously adopted by the board, upon motion by Regent Nikolay, seconded by Regent Schenian.

Resolution 3769: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Stout Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to increase the \$2,158,300 budget for the University Services Building project by \$195,100 for a revised total project budget of \$2,353,400 from the following funding sources: 1985-87 General Fund Supported Borrowing\$2,166,1001985-87 General Fund Supported Borrowing -<br/>Health, Safety and Environment<br/>Program Funds187,300\$2,353,400

# Authorization to Raze a Surplus Building, UW-Stout

Reporting unanimous committee approval of Resolution 3770, authorizing demolition of a surplus squad house building located on Nelson Field at UW-Stout, Regent Nikolay noted this action also was subject to approval by the secretary of the State Building Commission. The squad house function of the facility was to be accommodated by relocation of two university-owned metal buildings which were located on the site needed for construction of the new physical education facility.

The following resolution was moved by Regent Nikolay, seconded by Regent Vattendahl and adopted unanimously by the board:

Resolution 3770: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Stout Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, and subject to the concurrence of the Secretary of the State Building Commission, authorization be granted to raze the Squad House structure on the UW-Stout campus. The local assessed value of the structure is approximately \$25,000 but the building's replacement value of \$154,654 exceeds the \$100,000 threshold below which the Chancellor is authorized to approve building razings.

# Approval of Minor Project, UW-Whitewater

The committee unanimously approved a \$34,000 program revenue funded minor project to modify and remodel an area in Drumlin Hall at UW-Whitewater in response to student requests to provide an alternate dining service area in the evening hours. The space to be remodeled originally was used as a game room and since had been used as a fitness center which recently was relocated.

The following resolution was moved by Regent Nikolay, seconded by Regent Schenian and adopted unanimously by the board:

Resolution 3771: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Whitewater Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, approval be granted to plan, bid and construct the Drumlin Hall Kameroom Modifications minor project at a cost of \$34,000, from Program Revenue funds.

# Funding Alternatives for Program Revenue Funded Portion of Physical Education Facilities, UW-Platteville and UW-Stevens Point

Reporting on this agenda item, Regent Nikolay referred to a paper outlining four alternatives, which had been distributed to each committee member. Representative Richard Shoemaker, Chair of the State Building Commission's Higher Education Subcommittee, was present at the committee meeting and recommended that the board not take any position regarding this issue until the Joint Committee on Finance had acted on the commission's recommendations for the UW System's 1987-89 capital budget. He stated discussions were under way in Various quarters advocating a solution to the problem by securing a restoration of full GPR funding for both projects.

The committee members were very pleased to have Representative Shoemaker in attendance and took the opportunity to express their appreciation to him for his special efforts on behalf of the 1987-89 capital budget.

## Status Report on University Research Park Development, UW-Madison

Reporting to the committee on development of the UW-Madison's University Research Park, Wayne McGown, Special Assistant to the Chancellor, showed a video which was being used for marketing and which allowed the committee to see the present and planned development of the park. Mr. McGown stated that the research park had met its basic goals and timetable as projected by the consultants and also as delineated in the overall development plan. Further, the rate of occupancy was consistent with that achieved by successful research parks across the country.

Further efforts were being directed toward recruiting "home-grown" companies and encouraging mature companies to establish "research outposts" in the park, if not full research divisions.

The report indicated that it was important for the park's continued development to secure funding to complete streets and utilities, since very few sites remained which had these services available. The 1987-89 capital budget request included \$2.3 million for completion of the infrastructure.

## Report of the Vice President

## Bid Openings and Actions of the State Building Commission

Regent Nikolay reported that the committee was advised by Vice President Brown of bid openings and of actions by the State Building Commission on requests presented at the March meetings. The results of the March 10 Building Commission meeting that related to the 1987-89 building program were previously reported to the board in a letter from Regent President Weinstein. In that regard, Regent Nikolay stated, a great deal of satisfaction could be derived from the fact that the entire capital budget was approved, with the exception of the Green House addition at UW-River Falls.

Thirteen major projects had been bid since the March meeting, with prebid budgets totaling \$1,707,300. Two projects exceeded their approved budgets by \$20,206, and six projects were under the approved budgets by a total of \$271,100. Thus, the result of biddings was a net of \$250,894 below the authorized budgets.

# COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS AND MEMORIALS

## Comment on ROTC Issue

Regent Flores reported on a telephone conversation he just had with a physician in the Army National Guard who called to comment on the ROTC issue and to state his opinion that the military's position on homosexuals did not result from prejudice but related to concern about AIDS, the availability of blood, and the need to have the army ready for shipment overseas. The doctor felt strongly that the military's position was correct and asked that Regent Flores communicate those views to the board. Regent Flores pointed out that the AIDS question was a fairly recent phenomenon and that there were ways of approaching medical problems from the medical perspective, rather than systematically excluding a class of people. In conclusion, he noted that the discussion was interesting and that the doctor had impressed him as being a very sincere and knowledgeable person.

At 11:35 a.m., the following resolution, moved by Regent Schenian, and seconded by Regent Flores, was unanimously adopted on a roll call vote, with Regents Clusen, Finlayson, Fish, Flores, Hanson, Hassett, Heckrodt, Knowles, Lyon, Schenian, Schilling, Vattendahl and Weinstein voting "Aye" (13), and no regents voting "No."

Resolution 3772:

That the Board of Regents recess into closed session to consider personnel matters, as permitted by s. 19.85(1)(c), Wis. Stats., to consider personal histories related to potential Board of Visitor appointments at UW-Milwaukee, as permitted by s. 19.85(1)(f), Wis. Stats., and to confer with legal counsel regarding pending litigation, as permitted by s. 19.85(1)(g), Wis. Stats.

#### CLOSED SESSION ACTIONS

The board arose from closed session at 12:05 p.m. and made the following announcements:

Resolution 3773: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin Centers and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, Dr. Robert Young be appointed Dean of the University of Wisconsin Center-Fox Valley, effective July 1, 1987, at an annual salary of \$45,000.

Resolution 3774: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, Mr. Gregory Montoto be appointed to the UW-Milwaukee Board of Visitors for a term ending in May 1990.

Resolution 3775 was adopted by the board in closed session on February 6, 1987, but was not announced, pending campus receipt of acceptance from the nominees.

That, upon the recommendation of the Acting Resolution 3775: Chancellor of UW-Madison and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the following persons be awarded honorary degrees, to be conferred at commencement in May 1987 at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, subject to acceptance by the nominees:

> John Vincent Atanasoff, Doctor of Science Elizabeth Gilmore Holt, Doctor of Humane Letters Martin Mark Kaplan, Doctor of Science Charles Selden McNeer, Doctor of Laws

The meeting was adjourned at 12:05 p.m., upon motion by Regent Schenian and properly seconded.

# SEXUAL HARASSMENT POLICY STATEMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION

(Regent Policy Document 81-2)

# I. Policy Statement

It is the policy of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, consistent with its efforts to foster an environment of respect for the dignity and worth of all members of the University community, that sexual harassment of students and employees in the University of Wisconsin System is unacceptable and impermissible conduct which will not be tolerated.

Sexual harassment is a form of sex discrimination. It occurs in a variety of situations which share a common element: the inappropriate introduction of sexual activities or comments into the work or learning situation. Often, sexual harassment involves relationships of unequal power, and contains elements of coercion--as when compliance with requests for sexual favors becomes a criterion for granting work, study or grading benefits. However, sexual harassment may also involve relationships among equals, as when repeated sexual advances or demeaning verbal behavior have a harmful effect on a person's ability to study or work in the academic setting.

For general policy purposes, sexual harassment may be described as unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other physical conduct and expressive behavior of a sexual nature where: (1) Submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's employment or education; (2) Submission to or rejection of such conduct by an individual is used as the basis for academic or employment decisions affecting that individual; or (3) Such conduct has the purpose of effect or substantially interfering with an individual's academic or professional performance or creating an intimidating, hostile or demeaning employment or educational environment.

In keeping with this policy, a concerted effort must be made to protect employees and students from sexual harassment as defined, and to rid the University of Wisconsin System of such conduct.

# II. Implementation

Procedures for prompt corrective action and discipline consistent with due process are an essential part of the effort to eliminate sexual harassment. Equally important, however, is the establishment of programs to educate members of the university community on the subject of sexual harassment, and to make them more sensitive to its forms and damaging consequences. Development of the necessary programs and procedures is most appropriately and effectively undertaken at the institutional level. Therefore, the Board directs as follows:

(1) Each institution within the System shall have or develop a disciplinary process to address allegations of sexual harassment. This process shall include a definition of those forms of sexual harassment which will be grounds for disciplinary action; formal hearing procedures in accordance with due process requirements; and procedures allowing for resolution by mutual consent. In developing these definitions and procedures, institutions should be mindful of First Amendment rights and academic freedom, particularly as they relate to sexual harassment in the instructional setting. Institutions should also recognize that this policy does not address consensual sexual relations that do not involve harassment or discrimination. Institutions should also be aware of and sensitive to the fact that disciplinary action is not the only means of dealing with the problem of sexual harassment; there may be some kinds of conduct which are more appropriately addressed by an educational process or through other informal means. All institutional definitions and procedures are subject to approval by the Board and shall be presented to the Board not later than February. 1982, for purposes of review leading to approval.

(2) Each institution within the System shall establish educational programs designed to inform employees and students of the nature of sexual harassment, to increase their sensitivity to it, and to publicize the procedures, sanctions and remedies available against it. Institutions/shall report/to/the/Board/on/theit/educational/efforts/not/later/than/February/ I982/ Each institution will make a yearly report to the President of the University of Wisconsin System, which will then be reported to the Board of Regents, summarizing the results of educational efforts and corrective and disciplinary procedures. This report will be made in conjunction with the institution's yearly report on Equal Opportunities in Education (Regent Policy Document 83-5).

(3) System Administration staff shall, upon request, assist the institutions in their efforts to implement this policy and shall make available information and materials on the subject of sexual harassment which would be useful in the drafting of definitions or procedures or in preparing education programs.

# University of Wisconsin System

MANDATORY REFUNDABLE FEE Policies and Procedures

April, 1987

The following policies and procedures apply to the implementation and administration of Mandatory Refundable Fees that are approved by the UW System Board of Regents.

Student segregated fees are the primary and preferred means for funding student organizations and membership fees. The United Council of UW Student Governments and other organizations, if any, claiming to represent all of the students of more than one UW System institution will be eligible for approval of a mandatory refundable fee (MRF) from the Board of Regents in accordance with policies and procedures established by the UW System Administration. The MRF is a fee collected by the university with tuition and segregated fees as a condition of enrollment, which may be refunded to students upon request.

# 1. Referendum Language

After the Board approves a Mandatory Refundable Fee (MRF), the question of contributing to the MRF shall be submitted to the students in a referendum at least every two years. At minimum, the referendum shall include, but not be limited to, the following language:

The students at the University of Wisconsinagree to support <u>[name of organization]</u> with a mandatory refundable fee of <u>[amount]</u> per [semester or quarter] and <u>[amount]</u> per summer session. This amount plus postage is refundable upon written request to the <u>[name of organization]</u> within 30 days of registration. If this referendum passes, it will come up for reconsideration at least every two years. The fee may be adjusted between referendums by the Board of Regents.

## 2. Changes in the level of the MRF

The following procedure shall be used for consideration of changes in the level of the Mandatory Refundable Fec (MRF):

 The organization seeking a change in the MRF level will first gain approval by its Board of Directors by a 2/3 vote of the members. The proposal for the change will then be taken back to each individual student senate and must be passed by 2/3 of the student senates by a majority vote in each senate. The proposed change will return to the Board of Directors to be passed by a 2/3 vote of the members.

- 2. The request for the change in funding level will be forwarded to the UW System Administration Vice President for Business and Finance for inclusion in the annual report to the Board of Regents on the segregated fee budgets.
- 3. The changed level will be implemented in the following term. Referendums indicating the new amount will be held in the normal timeframe after the change is approved by the Board.


