

Badgers Face Indiana for Homecoming

The Wisconsin football team (6-2, 2-2) returns to conference play to take on Indiana (5-3, 2-3) today at 11 a.m. The game will be televised by The Big Ten Network. Wayne Larrivee, Charles Davis and Charissa Thompson will handle the commentary.

UW is ranked 25th in the USA Today/ Coaches' Poll and is receving votes in the Associated Press poll. Indiana is not ranked.

The Badgers are coming off a 44-3 win over Northern Illinois while Indiana lost to Penn State, 36-31, last week. Today is the 100th Homecoming game in UW history. The Badgers are 50-44-5 alltime in Homecoming games.

THE SERIES

This will be the 54th meeting between the two teams with Wisconsin leading the series 33-18-2 ... the Badgers lead the series 19-8-1 in Madison and have won four of the last five at Camp Randall ... after not playing for two years (2003 and 2004) UW has won the last two meetings by a combined score of 93-41 ... Wisconsin is averaging 44.2 points in its last five home games vs. IU ... the two teams have combined to average 69.0 points per game in the last six meetings ... Joe Palcic, son of UW offensive line coach Bob Palcic, is the co-defensive coordinator and cornerbacks coach for the Hoosiers ... the last time Wisconsin faced IU on Homecoming was on Oct. 16, 1999, a 59-0 victory for the Badgers





Today's Game at Camp Randall



Sophomore free safety Shane Carter is tied for the Big Ten lead with four interceptions this season.

Key Notes to Consider

♦ The Badgers have won 12 straight games (and 23 of the last 24) at Camp Randall Stadium, tied for the third-longest home winning streak in school history. It is also the fifth-longest current streak in the country. Wisconsin's last home loss came against Iowa on Nov. 12, 2005.

Today is the 100th Homecoming game at Wisconsin. The Badgers are 50-44-5 on Homecoming, including 8-2 against Indiana.

- ♦ Running back P.J. Hill rushed for 184 yards vs. Northern Illinois, the second-highest total in his career. Hill, who went over 1,000 yards for the second consecutive season, is averaging 126.1 yards per game on the ground, ninth in the country and second in the Big Ten.
- ♦ NIU running back Justin Anderson entered last Saturday's game ranked ninth in the country, averaging 124.0 rushing yards per game. He ran for just 14 yards against UW, breaking his string of five straight 100-yard performances. The Huskies totaled -13 yards on the ground. That was the second-lowest rushing total for a Wisconsin opponent in history, trailing only Iowa's -18 yards on the ground on Nov. 17, 1951.

General Notes

- ♦ Wisconsin's 23-1 record at Camp Randall Stadium since the start of the 2004 season is tied with Boise State (23-1) for the best home record in the country in that time span. Southern California (20-1) is the only other team in the country with just one home loss in that span.
- During its 12-game home winning streak (since the start of 2006), UW has scored at least 30 points nine times. The Badgers are averaging 33.3 points in those games, compared to 13.6 for their opponents.

With six wins, Wisconsin is bowl-eligible for the sixth consecutive season and the 11th time in the past 12 years.

- ♦ Since the beginning of the 2004 season only Ohio State has more wins than Wisconsin (37) among Big Ten schools. UW's 37 wins are tied for eighth-most in the country since 2004, behind only USC (42), Texas (39), Auburn (38), LSU (38), Ohio State (38), Boise State (38) and Oklahoma (38).
- ♦ UW defeated Northern Illinois 44-3 on Saturday. The 41-point margin of victory was the most for the Badgers since defeating Temple 65-0 on Sept. 10, 2005.
- ♦ The Badgers have been ranked in the USA Today Coaches' Top 25 for 47 of the past 58 weeks, dating back to the start of the 2004 season.

UW rushed for a season-high 33 1 yards on a season-best 55 rushing attempts against Northern Illinois. The 331 yards and 55 attempts were the most since the Badgers ran for 388 yards on 63 carries vs. Bowling Green on Sept. 3, 2005.

- ♦ The Badgers have converted 49.2 percent of their third downs this season, tops in the Big Ten and good for 10th in the country. UW is also 6-of-10 on fourth down this year (60.0 percent), fourth in the Big Ten.
- Hill, who had 108 yards on the ground in the first quarter against Northern Illinois, has rushed for at least 100 yards in 13 of his 21 games as a Badger, including five of eight this season. Hill's 72-yard TD run vs. NIU was the longest run of his career and the longest rushing touchdown for Wisconsin since Michael Bennett went 75 yards vs. Oregon on Sept. 9, 2000.

Defensive Notes

- ♦ UW's defense allowed just 99 yards against Northern Illinois. That was just the sixth time in school history the Badgers have given up fewer than 100 yards in a game. The last time was when Temple had 45 yards of offense on Sept. 10, 2005.
- ♦ Sophomore free safety Shane Carter is tied for the Big Ten lead with four interceptions this season.

That is the most INTs for a Badger since Jim Leonhard had seven in 2003. Carter had two interceptions vs. NIU becoming the first Wisconsin player with multiple interceptions in the same game since Allen Langford had two at Michigan last year.

♦ Northern Illinois gained just 31 yards and had two first downs in the first half last Saturday. The Huskies went three-andout on their first six drives of the game.


Special Teams Notes

♦ Taylor Mehlhaff, who was 3-of-3 on field goals vs. Northern Illinois, has kicked 41 FGs in his career, good for third place on UW's career list. He also has 54 field goal attempts in his career, fourth all-time. Mehlhaff has connected on 41-of-54 (75.9 percent)


of his field goals in his career, the thirdbest field goal percentage in UW history.

Punter Ken DeBauche has rebounded from a slow start to the season. Over the last four games he has punted 22 times for an average of 44.5 yards per kick. His 8,756 career punting yards are third-most in UW history.

- ♦ Freshman David Gilreath totaled 155 yards on kickoff and punt returns vs. Northern Illinois. Gilreath returned five punts for 97 yards (average of 19.4 per return) and two kickoffs for 58 yards. He ranks fourth in the Big Ten in punt return average (12.5).
- ♦ Gilreath needs only 29 yards to break Brandon Williams' school record of 670 kickoff return yards set in 2002. Gilreath has 642 yards on 28 kickoff returns this season.

Chancellor John D. Wiley



hancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of Wisconsin–Madison, having been a graduate student, a professor, and an administrator during his illustrious university career. Assuming office on January 1, 2001, he is the 27th person to lead the university since its founding in 1848.

As UW-Madison's chief executive officer. Wiley is responsible for the overall vision and direction of the university. He represents the institution for a variety of constituents, including alumni groups, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. A prominent figure in higher education, he chairs both the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors and the board for the Council on Higher Education Accreditation, and is a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Committee. He also serves on several local and community boards, including the William T. Evjue Foundation and the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce. He also has been deeply involved in

fundraising from individual and corporate donors and charitable foundations.

From 1994-2000, Wiley served as UW-Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW-Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968-1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975, Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for Xray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982-86, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

In addition, athletics offers the university another opportunity to connect with alumni and friends.





rry Alvarez is in his fourth year s Director of Athletics at the Iniversity of Wisconsin and secnout the additional title of head coach. Alvarez, who began his s athletic director in April of 2004, as athletic director and football 1 2004-05 and in 2005-06. arez's first year as Director of Athle s (without the football duties) was a mer prable one as Wisconsin won four nation I titles (men's cross country, men's and w men's hockey and women's lightweigh owing) during the 2005-06 athletic compaign. The Badgers also won five conference titles.

caree serve

The UW maintained its winning ways in 2006-07 with the men's track and field team winning its first NCAA title. The women's hockey team repeated as NCAA champions as Wisconsin finished 16th in the Directors' Cup rankings.

Badger student-athletes also showed their capabilities off the field of play during the fall of 2007 when they registered the highest cumulative grade point average for a fall term in department history. Thirteen teams also finished with record high grade point averages for either the fall or spring semester.

Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes for 16 seasons (1990-2005). He has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He piloted Visconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) n route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727)

record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s)

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in

Alvarez and his wife Cindy are cocampaign chairs in the effort to bring a Gilda's Club, a free support center for families dealing with cancer, to Madison. Alvarez also serves on the board of directors for the MACC Fund (Mideast Athletes Against Childhood Cancer).

Alvarez and his wife are the parents of three children—daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer); son Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson: Grace and Jackson Delzer; and Scarlet and Barry John Thomas Alvarez.

ne would be hard-pressed to draw up a better head coaching debut than the one Wisconsin's Bret Bielema fashioned in 2006.

The third-youngest head coach in Bowl subdivision football, Bielema has proven that age is just a number. He has shown that determination, hard work, organization and enthusiasm—all traits Bielema embodies—count the most when sizing up an individual's qualifications.

Bielema guided the Badgers to a 12-1 overall record and 7-1 mark in the Big Ten (good for a second-place tie with Michigan). Wisconsin capped its recordsetting 2006 season with a 17-14 win over Arkansas in the 2007 Capital One Bowl. No previous Wisconsin team had won more than 11 games in a season. In addition, Bielema became just the third rookie head coach in NCAA Division I history to pilot his team to 12 victories.

Bielema's efforts were rewarded when he was named the 2006 Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year. Bielema also was named one of five finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and was a finalist for the 2006 Schutt Sports Division IA Coach of the Year Award.

Wisconsin surprised most observers outside the program by setting school records for overall wins (12) and regular-season victories (11), as well as tying the UW mark for conference victories (seven). The Badgers did it with a defensive unit that ended the 2006 regular season ranked among the top three nationally in pass defense, pass efficiency defense, total defense and scoring defense. And they

did it with an offense led by a pair of seniors (QB John Stocco and All-America tackle Joe Thomas), a young but talented offensive line, the Big Ten Freshman of the Year (P.J. Hill) at tailback and an emerging corps of receivers, including John Mackey Award semifinalist Travis Beckum.

Bielema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999, finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl; UW limited the high-powered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense.

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB Scott Starks) were first-team All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002–03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in



both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and total defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were first-team All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas State, Bielema spent nine seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Iowa, where he worked for head coaches Hayden Pry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997 Hawkeyes posted three shutouts and ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr (first-team All-Big Ten) vernon Rollins and Matt Hughes (both honorable mention All-Big Ten) at Iowa.

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 553 games and guide their teams to 42 bowl games, so the second-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the business. The last four teams (2002–06) for which Bielema has coached accumulated a 53-13 record.

Bielema earned four letters (1989-92) after joining the Iowa football program as a walk-on. He earned a scholarship after his first year and was a member of Iowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a playor coach.

A 1992 graduate of Iowa with a bad elor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13, 1970.

re is never any doubt in the mind junior fullback Bill Rentmeester at his family is behind him at each and every game. And it's not because of cheers rom the crowd but rather voicemails on his cell phone ... with his grandparent among his biggest fans.

"My grandparents will call me real quick during the games and leave voicemails about what they see on the field," he said.

This season his grandmother left him a message saying, "That was a great block!" and then immediately hung up.

"I call them after the games to talk," Rentmeester said.

Rentmeester's grandfather, Otis Mehlberg, 79, was a running back at Valparaiso University from 1946-1950 and has passed his love for the game down to his grandson.

His grandmother, Joanne Mehlberg, equally shares a passion for the sport. She said her husband served as a role model for her grandson. "The two talk the same language as far as football is concerned. They both share the same commitment, dedication, and love for the sport."

The Beaver Dam, Wis., native was influenced to play football from hearing stories about his grandfather and pick-up games with his cousins. As a child, Rentmeester admired his grandfather's numerous football trophies.

Mehlberg holds the rushing record at Valparaiso University and was elected into the Hall of Fame in his home town of Shawano, Wis. "It was a pretty big deal," said Rentmeester. "My entire family attended"

His grandfather began playing football as a freshman in high school since "there was not much else to do" in the small town of Shawano. However, he managed to keep himself busy. In fact, Mehlberg lettered in five sports both his junior and senior year in high school. These included football, basketball, track, tennis, and golf.

In response to his grandfather's success, Rentmeester said "I'd like to be known like he's known - have people look at me the way they look at him. Everybody knows and likes him. It takes hours to go anywhere with him because everywhere we go he stops to talk to everybody."

Rentmeester, a junior majoring in biology, is the oldest of three children. His brother is a junior at UW-La Crosse, and consistently visits him for weekend games while his sister is a freshman at UW-Madison. Rentmeester comes from a long line of Badger alums since his grandfather and both parents received degrees from UW-Madison.

The Rentmeester family is always well represented at Badger games. His parents haven't missed one game, home or away, since he has played for UW-Madison. "I feel privileged that most of my family lives in Wisconsin and wants to come see me play. If I could get enough tickets, my entire extended family would be at the games," said Rentmeester.

Now in his third year, Rentmeester has played in all eight games this season as a reserve fullback and on special teams. After the home games he always makes a point to stop by his family's tailgate.

"He gets dressed then comes over to our tailgate party where he says hi to his folks and others from Beaver Dam. He's a very social person. People really enjoy seeing him," said Mehlberg.

Neither the weather nor the drive from Shawano stop Rentmeester's grandparents from attending their grandson's football games. This year alone, the Mehlbergs have attended two home games and one away game. Rentmeester said, "Any game they can't attend, they watch on television."

"He [Mehlberg] was behind me 100 percent to play college ball," said Rentmeester

Since his high school games, Mehlberg has offered casual advice to his grandson. Although Mehlberg shares football tips with Rentmeester, he also likes to give his grandson advice on life. Rentmeester said, "He always asks about my schoolwork. He makes me understand that school is just as important as football."

"I am really proud of his accomplishments at the university," his grandfather said. "Football hasn't gone to his head. He's a good football player, a good student, and an overall good kid."







Gameday at Wisconsin ...

There's Nothing Else Like It

n 2005, Sports Illustrated on Campus said that Wisconsin has the best gameday atmosphere in the Big Ten Conference. That's quite a statement, but that may not go far enough. The fact is there may not be a better way to experience college football than spending a day at Wisconsin's fabled Camp Randall Stadium.

First of all, Wisconsin fans love a good time and they love to watch the Badgers win. There are plenty of both at Camp Randall. Badger backers arrive early – they are legendary tailgaters – and stay late, with thousands remaining inside the stadium to sing and dance as the UW Marching Band conducts its festive "5th Quarter" routine.

And there is nothing like the oftenimitated-but-never-duplicated madness that is "Jump Around." Between the third and fourth quarters of every home game, thousands of Wisconsin fans, band members (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!

Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 in every game since the 1993 season-opener, a span of 14 years and 88 games. Seventy-eight of those games have been sellouts, including the last 25 in a row. The stadium record was set at the 2005 lowa game when 83,184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game.

A Wisconsin football gameday experience is a tradition that has been handed down from generation to generation of Badger fans. From the cooking of brats to the marching of the band, from the singing of "Varsity" and the "Bud Song" to the chants of "Rooconnn Daaaynnnel," from the ghosts of Crazylegs and the Horse to more recent heroes like Alvarez, Panos and Evans, the Badger gameday experience is a happening that any fan of college football will relish.

"But the thing that really stands out about Wisconsin

is how the team is just such an integral part of the community there. In a lot of ways, Camp Randall is what college football is all about."







Home of the Badgers

ne of college football's finest facilities

Camp Randall Stadium - completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds. Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.







Wisconsin Traditions



Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commer cials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former studentathletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.



Named best-dressed in high school, Jaevery McFadden, a linebacker from Riviera Beach, Fla., would love to learn how to play the piano.


An only child, the sophomore is serious about taking his goal to the next level, but would pursue it just for fun, with no intentions of making a career out of it.







hey came from almost opposite directions.

One, a highly recruited kicker who was ranked No. 1 in the nation during his high school days nearly 600 miles to the west of Madison. The other, a former walk-on punter who grew up a fan of the Badgers while living about 100 miles to the northwest of campus. They may have traveled separate paths, but senior specialists Taylor Mehlhaff and Ken DeBauche met at the University of Wisconsin and have been two essential parts of the Badger football team over the last four years.

Mehlhaff's journey began in Aberdeen, S.D., when he started playing flag football in fifth or sixth grade. This was not his first sport though; he also played soccer, baseball, basketball, hockey, and ren track during his youth. While growing up, Mehlhaff also dreamed of one day playing for a team in red and white, but it

was not the Wisconsin Badgers.

"I grew up wanting to go to Nebraska because I used to go to Comhuskers games with my dad." Mehlhaff said. "I'm big on the atmosphere of the game, all the fans and all the red there and when came here, it was the exact same thing. The atmosphere was a "esome at Camp Randall with all the fans."

Dauche also began his football journey at a young age.

Growing up in Suamcio, Wis., he officially started in first grade with fing football but around age four of five, he learned how to

play o his own.

"I was always outside playing catch with myself, kicking the footba straight up in the air and catching it myself and trying to put to over the power lines because my brothers at the time weren old enough to play catch with me," DeBauche said.

Oce DeBauche got to Bay Port High School, he excelled not only a the team's punter and kicker but also as quarterback for two seasons and as an all-conference wide receiver. Despite his verallel behalf of the field, not many Division I schools were looking at DeBauche and he was planning on attending a Division II or III school in either Wisconsin or Minnesota.

"I rew up a Wisconsin fan," DeBauche said. "So once Wisco in was in the picture and once I knew I had a chance to wall onto the team, I jumped on it and said 'yes' right away, where are the papers? Let me sign them,' because I knew that's what I wanted to do. It's the best decision I ever made."

D Bauche was the first to arrive at the UW in 2003 but redshirted that season. The following year, Mehlhaff joined the squad and, before he could even get to know his teammates, a few had

their own first impressions of the new kicker.

"We thought he was a little psycho at first," fellow special teams member, Paul Standring said. "Just by looking at his kick-off approach, he steps back, has this evil face, it looks like he is marching and it's kind of scary."

Despite the first impressions, once Mehlhaff joined the squad in 2004, he and DeBauche not only became the team's starting punter and kicker, but also earned spots in Wisconsin's record

book as the following seasons progressed.

DeBauche's 44.8 yard punting average in 2005 is the best single-season average in school history and his current career average is second-best behind Kevin Stemke. Even though DeBauche was not sought out by many Division I schools, his spot in the record books as well as his opportunity to walk onto the team are honors for him.

"There's a long line of walk-on success stories here," DeBauche said. "Tm looking out here and I see Luke Swan, I live with Ben Strickland, we were on the team with Jim Leohnard, here are so many guys that have walked onto the team and I hink can give kids out there hope. If you don't get recruited or aren't a big-time prospect but if you work hard and you really tare about what you're doing, that can show people if you do the light things good things will come."

At Wisconsin, Mehlhaff has dealt with some rule changes

such as the shortening of the kick-off tee in 2006 and this season's new rule of moving back the kickoff starting spot to the 30-yard-line instead of the 35. Despite the changes, Mehlhaff still ranks as one of the nation's best kickers (No. 6 by *Lindy's*, No. 7 by *The Sporting News*) and leads the Big Ten in kickoff average and is tied for second in touchbacks. Mehlhaff also ranks among the top five in UW history in field goals and field goal percentage.

"To be honest, it hasn't sunk in yet that I'm in the record books," Mehlhaff said. "I'm sure as time goes by I'll look back on it and think it's pretty awesome because of all the hard work I've put in."

While both are serious when it comes to football, they also know how to let loose for a few laughs, especially when they are around fellow special teams members Standring, sophomore Matt Fischer, junior Dave Peck and senior Steve Johnson. Not only does this group work well together on the field, they also pull some of the best pranks.

"For dinner, when someone puts their food down, we'd put mustard in their gravy, we would open their mashed potatoes and put a half a container of salt in there and close it back up, we would dip their bread roll into water and put it on their plate," Standring said. "If you turn for a second, something could happen with us."

Off the field, they also bond with golf outings and video game competitions that at times get a little intense.

"Steve and I have a pretty heated rivalry going in our house. Steve gets so upset that he is honestly ready to beat me up," DeBauche said. "When Paul and him were playing a couple weeks ago, I was cheering for Paul and I was aggravating Steve. He was probably the most angry I've ever seen him since I've known him for five years."

Despite the heated video games, this group has created a bond that is evident with the success of the kicking unit and is sure to last for many years beyond Wisconsin.


"We're a family. I'm being cliché but we have a lot of fun with each other," Johnson said. "There's a lot of competition and rivalries between us but everyone has each other's back."

However, when he arrived at Chargers Park and saw the wealth of offensive talent he would be joining, including reigning MVP LaDainian Tomlinson and Pro Bowl quarterback Philip Rivers, any apprehension quickly melted away.

'At first I was a little shocked (about the trade), but the excitement started building once I realized what I was coming to, some of the people and the type of team I was coming to and what they're all about," Chambers told the Chargers' official website. "The excitement just kept building. Once I stepped out here today I knew it was for real. I got a chance to run around a little bit and it felt good."

Wearning his new number 89 jersey for the first time, Chambers quickly picked up the Chargers' offense in large part to his previous time spent with San Diego head coach Norv Turner. Chambers and Turner had previously worked together in Miami when Turner was the Dolphins' offensive coordinator for the 2002-03 season.

"A lot of the plays, a lot of the routes and a lot of the formations, I pretty much could step right in the huddle and play a game," Chambers said. "I've played six games already. I'm game ready. I know how to prepare myself. I'm just excited to play with these guys."

After starting the season 0-6 in Miami, Chambers said he was grateful to join a team tied for first place in their division and seeking their third AFC West title in four years.

"I've got a great opportunity, a great blessing to be a part of a team that is a competitor, that's been to some playoff games," Chambers said. "It's a great fit for me right now. I wouldn't have imagined it would happen like this. It's kind of untimely, but I'm glad it happened."

On the season, Chambers has 31 receptions for 415 yards, second on the Chargers to Pro Bowl tight end Antonio Gates, who has hauled in 43 receptions for 547 yards through six games.

Bennett Sees First Action in Tampa


Tampa Bay running back **Michael Bennett** made his Buccaneers' debut

When a udents begin medical school, most usually face two key questions: Where will I end up practicing? And what area of medicine will be best for me?

practice in rural areas

For the five medical students who make up the inaugural class of the Wisconsin Academy for Rural Medicine (WARM) at the School of Medicine and Public Health SMPH), at least one of those big issues has been resolved — they know for sure that they eventually will be based in a rural Wisconsin

The WARM program was created specifically to produce thoroughly trained physicians who are committed to working in areas of the state where there are not nearly enough practitioners to meet the health care needs of the people living there.

The physician shortage is a very serious national problem affecting every state," says WARM creator Byron Crouse, associate dean for rural and community health. "With his program, we are beginning to address the problem and will be producing 25 rural physicians each year by 2015."

The WARM students already are deeply Immersed in biochemistry, histology and Other classes that are part of the school's raditional M.D. curriculum, and they are encouraged to take electives that are relwant to rural practice. The biggest change

will occur during their third and fourth years. when the students will relocate from Madison to regional and rural learning communities for their clinical training. This first WARM group will be placed at the Marshfield Clinic's Rice Lake clinic, starting in 2009.

The studentcentered program is unusual, adds Crouse, in that it offers participants the option to train in multiple specialty areas, not just primary care medicine.

Hailing from medium-sized to tiny communities across the Badger State, the WARM students appreciate the many virtues of small-town life. including low crime rates, small school dis-

tricts, proximity to recreation and the support and involvement of fellow townspeople. The students also are painfully aware of the problems of delivering health care in such communities, where, in addition to the physician shortage, residents tend to be sicker, poorer, older, uninsured and scattered

Undaunted by the problems, the first five WARM students are committed to making things better.

Online program helps working nurses earn bachelor's degrees

A UW System program gives registered nurses a chance to earn bachelor's degrees in nursing with leaving their jobs. UW System's BSN@Home program began in the spring of 1996 and combines the resources of five UW nursing schools - UW-Madison, UW-Milwaukee, UW-Eau Claire, UW-Green Bay and UW-Oshkosh - to provide five shared distance-learning courses to registered nurses seeking bachelor's degrees.

When the program started, each of the five schools had its own RN to baccalaureate program. In creating BSN@Home, the five nursing schools planned an innovative, efficient and sustainable program and curriculum that allowed the schools to share resources and work together.

In the program, students are admitted and enrolled in one of the five institutions, usually the one closest to where they live, and must complete the specific degree requirements of that "home institution" as well as the shared courses of the BSN@ Home program, says Sharon Nellis, assistant dean of the UW-Madison School of Nursing and director of the statewide distance-learning program. Students can be granted up to 60 credits toward their bachelor's degrees through an agreement between the UW System and the state's technical colleges.

Since the program began, more than 550 students have graduated with their bachelor's degrees, and many of them plan to get advanced nursing degrees. To learn more about BSN@Home, visit http://academic.son.wisc.edu/bsnathome/.

UW-Madison recognized by Truman Foundation

For a national scholarship that gives out 75 awards or less each year, Truman Foundation Executive Secretary Frederick Slabach says it is "rare" for a single university to have two scholars in the same year.

That being said, when UW-Madison did it earlier this year, Slabach wasn't surprised. "We clearly get the sense from everything we know about the University of Wisconsin that there is a culture on campus that values public service, and the university has encouraged individuals with an interest to pursue it," he says.

It was that culture that prompted the Truman Foundation to name UW-Madison as one of four "honor institutions" for the academic year.

The Truman Scholarship, named after former President Harry S Truman, awards about 75 college juniors with \$30,000 for graduate study. Beyond that, the foundation also provides students with the opportunity to network with current and former scholars during a leadership week in May after scholarship winners are announced, and, during the summer after graduation, when the foundation runs a summer institute that helps scholars find and finance summer internships in Washington, D.C.

Honor institutions are named to recognize schools that have successfully promoted the scholarship and value of public service. Slabach says UW-Madison received its award for its longtime commitment to public service and overall success in promoting the Truman Scholarship on campus. Since the scholarship's 1977 inception, UW-Madison students have won 15 times.

This year's scholars were Max Bruner and Adam Schmidt.

UW consistently plays in - AND WINS - major bowl games!





ver the last 14 seasons, no team in the country has won more bowl games than Wisconsin. The Badgers' nine bowl victories over that span ties them with Boston College for the most in the nation. UW has participated in 12 bowl games over the past 14 seasons, a mark matched by only Ohio State and Michigan among Big Ten teams. During that time, the Badgers have made eight appearances in January bowl games, including three Rose Bowl wins.

Last season, Wisconsin played in its third consecutive January bowl game, defeating 12th-ranked Arkansas, 17-14. to capture its second straight Capital One Bowl. The win gave UW its school-record 12th victory of the season.

The Badgers had won just one bowl game prior to 1994. Since then, UW is 9-3 in postseason play, including 6-2 in January bowl games. Wisconsin has defeated teams from the Pac 10 (four times), SEC (twice), Big 12 (once), ACC (once) and WAC (once) during the last 14 seasons.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida Arizona and Texas.



These seven former Badgers have received the highest honor the game of football affords. They have been inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. They are the greats of the game and their achievements are documented at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind.



Pat O'Dea (elected in 1962), nicknamed "The Kangaroo Kicker," was a two-time All-America fullback and punter between 1896-99. He was also a two-time team captain.



Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.



Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference's MVP in 1942.



Pat Richter (elected in 1993) was a two-time All-America end and led the nation in receiving as a junior.





Marty Below (elected in 1988), a rugged right tackle, earned All-America praise as a senior.



Alan Ameche (elected in 1975) was the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner and a multi-year All-American in the classroom and on the field.



This Week in Badger History



Chris Chimbers became the first receiver in the Barry Alvarez era to go over 00 yards in two consecutive games. He recorded 191 receiving yard in the Badgers' 13-7 win at lowa.

OCTOBER 27 - NOVEMBER 2

Oct. 27, 1985 — Tony Granato and Jim Johannson ted the record for the fastest two goals scored in UW history when they scored goals six seconds apart at UMass-Lowell.

Oct. 28, 2000 — Chris Chambers recorded 191 receiving yards in the Badgers' 13-7 win at Iowa. Chambers became the first receiver in the Barry Alvarez era to go over 100 yards in two consecutive games.

Oct. 29, 1999 — Sis Paulsen notched the first hat trick for the Badger women's hockey team in UW's 6-1 win over St. Cloud State.

Oct. 30, 1999 — The UW men's cross country team won its first Big Ten cross country title since 1996.
The Badgers finished with 38 points, just two points


ahead of Michigan (40). Senior Matt Downin won his second consecutive Big Ten individual title.

Also on this day, six year earlier in 1993, the No. 21 Badgers beat No. 24 Michigan, 13-10, en route to a Rose Bowl berth, in one of the most memorable games in Camp Randall Stadium history.

Oct. 31, 1997 — The Wisconsin volleyball team defeated No. 1-ranked Penn State, 15-11, 15-7, 6-15, 15-5 at the UW Field House.

Nov. 1, 1998 — Matt Downin won the Big Ten cross country individual title, setting a new course record at the University of Michigan with a time of 24:06 (8,000 meters). His title was the Badgers' first since Donovan Bergstrom won the conference meet in 1992.

Nov. 2, 1990 — Liz Tortorello of the volleyball team set a Field House individual record for the most assists in a single match with 75 against Indiana.






Wisconsin won the 2007 NCAA Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship, crowning the first national title for a UW track and field team. The title was also the first-ever for a Big Ten Conference team.

Senior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2007. He won the 5,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships and claimed his second consecutive title in the 5,000 meters at the NCAA outdoor championships.

The women's hockey team became the first UW program to repeat as NCAA champions since 1985 when it won the 2007 title. The Badgers claimed their second straight title, becoming the third school to repeat at national champions.

Wisconsin also won Big Ten titles in men's cross country, men's indoor track and field and men's outdoor track and field as well as the WCHA title in women's hockey.

In addition, five UW programs also set records for most wins in a season—men's basketball (30), women's basketball (23), football (12), women's hockey (36) and wrestling (19). The football team captured its second consecutive Capital One Bowl title while the men's basketball team was ranked No. 1 in the country on Feb. 19, a first in school history.







The Big Ten Conference

he Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide approximately \$94 million in direct financial aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

Big Ten Universities

- are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- house on their campuses 10 of the nation's 35 largest academic libraries.
 Collectively, conference libraries hold nearly 70 million bound volumes and the institutions work collaboratively to build and share their resources with other league members.

Big Ten Athletics

 Over the past two years, the Big Ten has reached a series of milestone media agreements to provide the conference with its grearest television exposure ever, including extensions with CBS (for basketball) and ABC/ESPN (for football, basketball and volleyball) and the creation of the Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs. The Big Ten Network operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year since it launched in August of 2007. It will showcase a wide array of sports as well as original programming produced by conference institutions and represents a 20-year partnership between the Big Ten and Fox. The conference's new media agreements will result in the broadcast of more than 500 events nationally and regionally beginning with the 2007–08 academic year, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

- The NCAA collects two types of graduation rates-the federal graduation rate, which accounts for all entering freshmen who receive aid and graduate within six years, and the Graduation Success Rate (GSR), which reflects the mobility of student-athletes by accounting for transfers. Based on the most recent federal graduation rate average for the 1996-99 entering freshmen classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 71 percent. In comparison, the student body at conference institutions graduated at 73 percent while all Division I studentathletes graduated at 62 percent. The Big Ten's GSR was 82 percent compared to the Division I average of 77 percent.
- The Big Ten recognized 2,018 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2006–07 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,800 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.

Launched in August 2007, the Big Ten Network is dedicated to covering the Big Ten Conference and its 11 member institutions.


The Big Ten Network will provide unprecedented access to an extensive schedule of conference sports events and shows; original programs in academics, the arts and sciences; campus activities; and associated personalities. Sports programming will include live coverage of more major men's and women's events than ever before, along with news, highlights and analysis, all complemented by hours of university-produced campus programming.

The network is available to all cable and satellite carriers and television distributors nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television. The Big Ten Network is a joint venture between subsidiaries of the Big Ten Conference and Fox Cable Networks.



- · The Big Ten claimed seven team national championships during the 2006-07 season, just one shy of the conference record of eight national titles established during the 1955-56 campaign, while also finishing as the runner-up in five other sports. The Big Ten has earned at least four national crowns in eight of the last 10 seasons. Big Ten national champions in 2006-07 included Michigan State men's ice hockey, Minnesota wrestling. Northwestern women's lacrosse, Penn State fencing and men's gymnastics and Wisconsin women's ice hockey and men's indoor track and field. The conference has also produced team national crowns in the sports of basketball, cross country. field hockey, football, golf, soccer, softball. synchronized swimming, tennis and volleyball over the last decade.
- Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2006–07. months at 7 million fans attended Big Tenhome contests in those sports.





#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



#88 Pat Richter

Pat Richter, who led the nation in receiving as a junior, was a consensus All-American in 1962. A two-time first-team All-Big Ten selection, he paced the conference in receiving in 1961 and 1962. A member of the Washington Redskins for eight seasons, Richter later returned to UW to serve as director of athletics (1989-2004).



#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued with "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shawas fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shawis one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.

NCAA Guidelines



What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ...

You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;

b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;

d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost ser

b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

 c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;

d) providing use of an automobile;

e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;

f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus

h) offering student-athletes, or their relatives or friends, the opportunity to purchase items, even at face value, not adequately publicized as available for sale to the general public; or

i) promising to provide any of the above.

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

Employment

A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

- The student-athlete's compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletis ability;
- The student-athlete may receive compensation for only work actually performed; and
- The student-athlete's compensation must be at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. Camp Randall Stadium Policies



Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol 21 or older) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

Please enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kick off. Fans may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Express Lines

Fans are encouraged not to bring any carry-ins. Fans with no carry-ins will enjoy the use of Express Lines at all gates, with the exception of the student entrance at Gate 5.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

Guest Services Center

For general game day information, visit the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse.

Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

In case of an emergency it is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265 8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

Lost and Found

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Camp Randall Welcome Center in Kellner Hall (608-262-1866).

Items Not Permitted

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. Inside the Program

At every Badger home game, more than 80,000 fans in Camp Randall Stadium and millions more watching on TV witness the UW coaching staff and planers in action.

What they don't see is the behind-the-scenes workings of the UW Athletic Department that makes the sames enjoyable for the fans and the sams. There are hundreds of UW Athletic Department employees that work all week and long hours on Satu days to make Badger football gans the events they have become. This week we profile the receiting assistants.

ne of the unique aspects of college ports is that even during the presnt, you must always be looking the future. That future is built on recruit ig and a large part of recruiting a studer athlete is the gameday experience. well-documented that Camp Randa Stadium is one of the best places a game in the country. That's why it should come as no surprise that during any giv n home game, the UW football staff tries to jet as many potential student-athletes or campus as possible. The responsibility to make sure these high school players enjoy their experience falls heavily on Sharon Betlach, a program assistant in the football office, and her crew of recruiting

Betlach has worked in the football office for eight years and she has a staff of six assistants, all UW students, that help her throughout the year and on gamedays. With the Badgers looking at literally thousands of players each year, much of the recruiting assistants' office work revolves around organizing information, including questionnaires and video tapes, on each prospect. But gameday is when it all comes together.

On a typical gameday, between 25-30 players make "unofficial" visits, while mother couple (usually between two and dire) make "official" visits. The main difference between an "official" and "unofficial" is that the university is allowed to provide student-athletes on "official" visits with transportation to and from campus, idding, three complimentary admissions and meals while they are on their visit. Those on "unofficial" visits receive only the three complimentary admissions. They must pay their own way to and from cam-

pus, pay for any lodging and pay for any meals while in Madison.

"We usually invite about 75 recruits, knowing that not everyone will be able to make it," Betlach said.

For Betlach and her recruiting assistants, gameday starts about three hours before kickoff. They set up their check-in table, complete with sign-in sheets, name tags and tickets sorted for each visitor, game programs (each recruit receives one complimentary program) and a cash box.

Before the game, a meal is provided for the potential student-athlete and their guests (each visitor is allowed to bring two guests per NCAA regulations). This is where the cash box comes into play. All those on "unofficial" visits, including their guests, must pay for their meals.

The meal is served in the Student-Athlete Dining Hall. Recruits begin to check-in and sit down for their meal about two hours before game time. During their meal, coaches take some time out of their game preparation to visit with the recruits.

About an hour before the game, Betlach, along with football operations assistant Josh Sternquist, lead the "unofficial" visitors and their guests on a tour of the football facilities. This tour includes the practice field in the McClain Center, the weight room, the training room, the locker room and the Fetzer Academic Center.

While this is happening, it is usually a good time for those recruits on "official" visits, who have already toured the facilities, to sit down and discuss academics with

members of the UW Academic Services staff and university professors. Once the tour is over, all the recruits and their guests go out to the field to watch the Badgers warm up. They stay on the sideline until the Badgers leave the field and

head into the locker room.

"The kids really love to be on the field," Betlach said. "Obviously the game is the biggest thing but you can definitely see the excitement in their faces when they are down on the turf."

After that, Betlach leads the group up the stands and into their seats. They remain there for the entire game, with the exception of halftime. At that point, those recruits on "official" visits are led up to the football office where they can enjoy a small snack.

"Another highlight for the recruits is watching the student section do 'Jump Around' at the end of the third quarter," Betlach said. "Some even join in."

Once the game is over, Betlach leads everyone to the McClain Center and outside the locker room. Once Coach Bielema is done addressing the team, the recruits and any male guests can go into the locker room to talk to players and coaches. The coaches also make a point of stopping outside to say hello to the moms or sisters waiting outside with Betlach.

"It's our job to make sure the recruits and their guests experience not only the greatest gameday atmosphere in the nation but also the family atmosphere of the Badger football program," Betlach said.







