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

arrived during Payne's War at Lake
Geneva in late May or June 1836.

William Pitt Meacham born
Sept. 27th 1836, was the first
white male child to be born in the
County.

settlement, preached the first
sermon in the County on July 10th ,
1836 at Spring Prairie.
