A Mock Trial.



Justin McCarthy's Lecture.

The large audience that greeted Mr. McCarthy last Friday evening showed-as Professor Frankenburger aptly said in introducing the speaker-"America's interest in the speaker and the cause he is advocating.'

The National Cause of Ireland was his theme. The definition of this he summed up in two words-"Home Rule." He demanded the reason why Ireland of all English dependencies is denied home rule. Position, history, education and tradition all say that home rule is Ireland's right. Other nations were granted home rule as an experiment; but it will not be such in Ireland's case. She had it up to this century,

and prospered under it.

How Ireland lost home rule, was the burden of Mr. McCarthy's address. A comparison of the English and Irish parliaments as they were during the last half of last century shows the Irish parliament to have been a more liberal one; though it was entirely protestant, while Ireland was five-sixths catholic. Henry Grattan had secured to Irish catholic lawyers the right to practice, and was advocating a bill to allow catholics to sit in Parliament. For this King George, whose tyranny caused the American revolution, decided that the Irish parliament must go. The pacific policy of the United Irishmen, a society of protestants working for catholic emancipation, was changed, by the England's recall of Viceroy Fitzwilliam, to one of war. The revolution of '98 followed. America revolted and was praised; Ireland was cursed. Cornwallis, whom Americans chiefly remember in connection with a certain capitulation at Yorktown, was sent with unlimited power to crush out the Irish parliament. It was necessary that the Irish House of Commons

## ARE NOT AN EVIL.

The College Greek Letter Societies.

STATE UNIVERSITY REGENTS NOT OP-POSED TO THEM.

The Recommendations of the Visiting Committee Not Carried Out-Opinions of Members of the Faculty on the Subject.

"No, the Board of Regents took no action in regard to the 'Greek letter'\_societies," said Postmaster Paul. "The year-old recommendations of the Visiting committee, by no means unanimous, did not seem to address themselves to the judgment of the board as a matter of sufficient importance to call for interference. This may be owing to the fact that some of us are fraternity members ourselves. I myself belong to three. If, as such, we are competent to sit in judgment upon undergraduates and their collegiate training, it may be assumed that the 'boys' are not so deep in the mud as some folks are apt to think. It is a matter that is left very properly to the supervision and adjudication of the president of the university."

Probably in every college at some time or other the authorities have undertaken to suppress the Greek letter fraternities. But of recent years such efforts have been infrequent. As the colleges have become older, many of their own alumni have become professors and many of these are themselves members of the college secret societies. It was not to be expected that they would keep up the old warfare against the fraternities, and in fact many of them were warm and active supporters of these organizations. It was something of a surprise a few days ago to learn that the Visiting committee of the university had recommended action looking to the destruction of this feature of college life in the following language: "We would recommend that your honorable board take some steps to discourage the growth of the Greek letter societies in the university. We are informed that the university has about eight of these societies. We believe that it is
