Badgers Kick Off 2007 vs. Washington State

The Wisconsin football team opens the 2007 season today vs. Washington State at 2:30 p.m. The game will be televised nationally by ABC with Brad Nessler, Bob Griese, Paul Maguire and Bonnie Bernstein on the call.

UW is ranked seventh in both the Associated Press poll and the *USA Today*/Coaches' Poll. Washington State received votes in the coaches' poll.

The Badgers are starting their 119th season of football (UW is 90-25-3 in 118 previous season-openers). UW has won nine straight season openers (last loss was vs. Syracuse at Giants Stadium in 1997).

THE SERIES

Wisconsin won its only meeting with Washington State, 35-26, in Madison on Sept. 25, 1976 ... the two teams combined for 771 yards of total offense that day ... Wisconsin held a 262-56 edge in rushing yardage, while the Cougars (then of the Pac-8) outpassed the Badgers by a 303-150 margin ... the head coaches in that matchup were John Jardine of Wisconsin and Washington State's Jackie Sherrill ... a couple non football-related notes between the two schools: Washington State's head men's basketball coach, Tony Bennett, was a Wisconsin assistant (Tony's father, Dick, was Wisconsin's head coach from 1995-2000) ... Wisconsin defeated Washington State to win the NCAA men's basketball title in 1941.

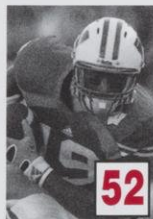

Today's Game at Camp Randall



Head coach Bret Bielema led Wisconsin to a perfect 7-0 record at Camp Randall Stadium last year.

Key Notes to Consider

- ◆ Wisconsin is one of five programs in the nation with no more than one home loss since the start of the 2004 season. The Badgers are 18-1 at Camp Randall Stadium during that time. The others are Boise State (19-0), Southern California (18-0), Louisville (17-0) and Florida (19-1).
- ◆ Wisconsin is 20-1 in its last 21 regular-season non-conference games, including wins in the last 12 straight. UW's only loss during that span was a 23-5 setback at home against UNLV on Sept. 13, 2003.

● ● ●

Wisconsin enters the 2007 campaign riding a nine-game winning streak. Only Boise State (13 games) and BYU (10) have longer active winning streaks.

● ● ●

- ◆ Wisconsin has more wins (31) than any other Big Ten school since the beginning of the 2004 season. Ohio State is second with 30.

General Notes

- ◆ Wisconsin has not been shut out since a 34-0 setback against 17th-ranked Syracuse on Aug. 24, 1997 (the season-opener that year). Since then, the Badgers have scored in 126 straight games. That is the longest streak of its kind in school history.

- ◆ Wisconsin has won its last seven season-openers that were played at Camp Randall Stadium. The Badgers' last loss in such games was a 43-7 defeat at the hands of 13th-ranked Colorado on Sept. 2, 1995.

- ◆ Wisconsin is opening the season ranked No. 7 in both the Associated Press (media) and USA Today (coaches) polls. That is the Badgers' highest preseason ranking since starting the 2000 season at No. 4 in both polls. It is also tied for the third-highest preseason ranking in school history.

The Badgers are 6-2 in their last eight television appearances on ABC.

● ● ●

- ◆ TE Andy Crooks, WR Luke Swan, LB Jonathan Casillas, D Ben Strickland and P Ken DeBauche were voted by their teammates as captains for the 2007 season. Bielema will rotate a six captain throughout the season. UW hasn't had six team captains since the 2001 season. Strickland, the leading vote-getter, is the first "non-starter" to be named a captain at Wisconsin since RB Carl McCullough in 1997. DeBauche is the first specialist to be named a captain at UW since Roger Jaeger (a kicker) in 1971.

- ◆ Saturday will be the first time Wisconsin has opened a season against a Pac-10 opponent since a 27-10 loss at No. 2-ranked Washington on Sept. 12, 1992. UW has opened its season against a Pac-10 foe on four previous occasions and lost all four encounters. The Badgers are 16-25-1 all-time against the Pac-10.

- ◆ Washington State will be the first Pac-10 team to visit Camp Randall Stadium since the Badgers defeated Arizona, 31-10, on Sept. 21, 2002.

Offensive Notes

Wisconsin returns nine starters on offense that averaged 29.2 points per game tied for second in the Big Ten with Michigan last season. The Badgers just missed averaging at least 30 points per game in back-to-back seasons for just the second time in modern era (since 1946) school history.

UW has averaged 31.8 points per game since the start of the 2005 season (a span of 26 games).

The Badger offense is currently without long-time wide receivers coach Henry Mason, who sustained a spinal cord injury over the summer. Mason is rehabilitating with an aim toward returning to the program. In his place, head coach Bret Bielema hired DeV Vaughn Alexander to coach the Badger receivers on an interim basis.

Wisconsin, Michigan and Ohio State were the only three Big Ten teams with at least 2,100 yards rushing and receiving last season.

Three Badgers on the offensive side of the ball appear on preseason watch lists for major national awards. RB P.J. Hill is on the Maxwell, Doak Walker and Walter Camp Award watch lists. TE Travis Beckum is on the Maxwell, Mackey and Walter Camp Award watch lists. C Marcus Coleman, a first-time starter as a junior

last season, is on the Rimington Trophy watch list.

Senior Tyler Donovan is the Badgers' first new starting quarterback since sophomore John Stocco was a first-year starter in 2004. The last time a Badger became a full-time starter for the first time as a senior was in 2003 when Jim Sorgi took over from long-time starter Brooks Bollinger. Donovan is the first Wisconsin-native to be named the Badgers' starting QB since Bud Keyes (Green Bay) was the UW signalcaller at the open of the 1987 season.

Defensive Notes

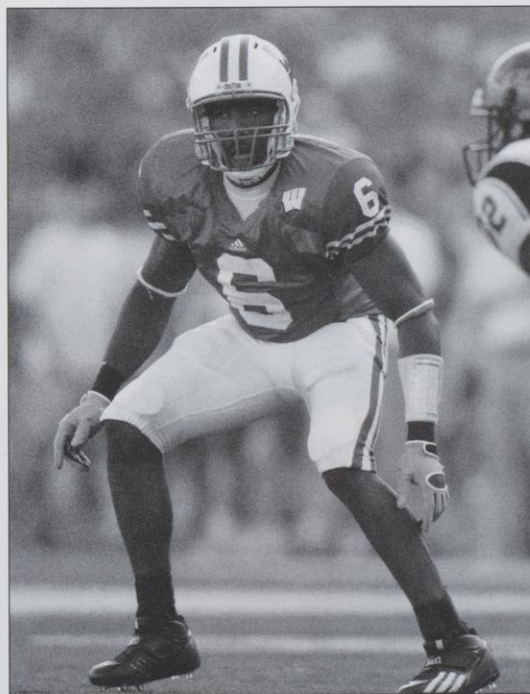
The Badger defense returns seven starters from a unit that ranked No. 1 in the nation last season in pass efficiency defense, No. 2 in scoring defense, No. 2 in passing yards allowed per game and No. 5 in total defense. UW led the Big Ten in all of those categories.

UW's pass defense was particularly good last season. The Badgers allowed just six touchdown passes in 2006 (tied with Virginia Tech for fewest in the nation). Six opponents threw for fewer than 115 yards against Wisconsin and three failed to reach the 100-yard mark through the air.

The Badger defense features two players who are recognized on preseason watch lists for major national awards in 2007. LB Jonathan Casillas, who led Wisconsin in tackles for loss with 12 last season, is on both the Bednarik Award and Lott Trophy watch lists. DE Matt Shaughnessy, a second-team All-Big Ten selection in 2006, is on the Ted Hendricks Award watch list.

Wisconsin allowed just 12.1 points per game last season, the best mark at the school since the 1998 Big Ten champions gave up 11.9 points per game.

The UW cornerbacks form one of the Big Ten's best tandems. Junior Jack Ikegwuonu, a first-team All-Big Ten selection last season, has 17 career starts to his credit. Fellow junior Allen Langford, who intercepted a pair of passes at Michigan last season, has started 21 games during his career.

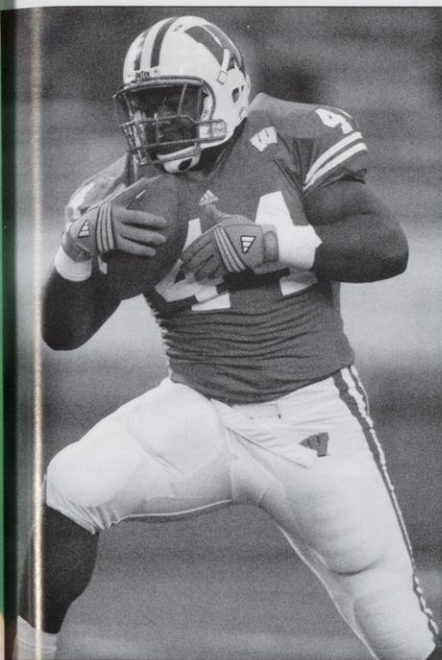

Chancellor John D. Wiley



Chancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of Wisconsin-Madison, having been a graduate student, a professor, and an administrator during his illustrious university career. Assuming office on January 1, 2001, he is the 27th person to lead the university since its founding in 1848.

As UW-Madison's chief executive officer, Wiley is responsible for the overall vision and direction of the university. He represents the institution for a variety of constituents, including alumni groups, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. A prominent figure in higher education, he chairs both the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors and the board for the Council on Higher Education Accreditation, and is a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Committee. He also serves on several local and community boards, including the William T. Evjue Foundation and the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce. He also has been deeply involved in

fundraising from individual and corporate donors and charitable foundations.

From 1994-2000, Wiley served as UW-Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW-Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968-1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975, Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982-86, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

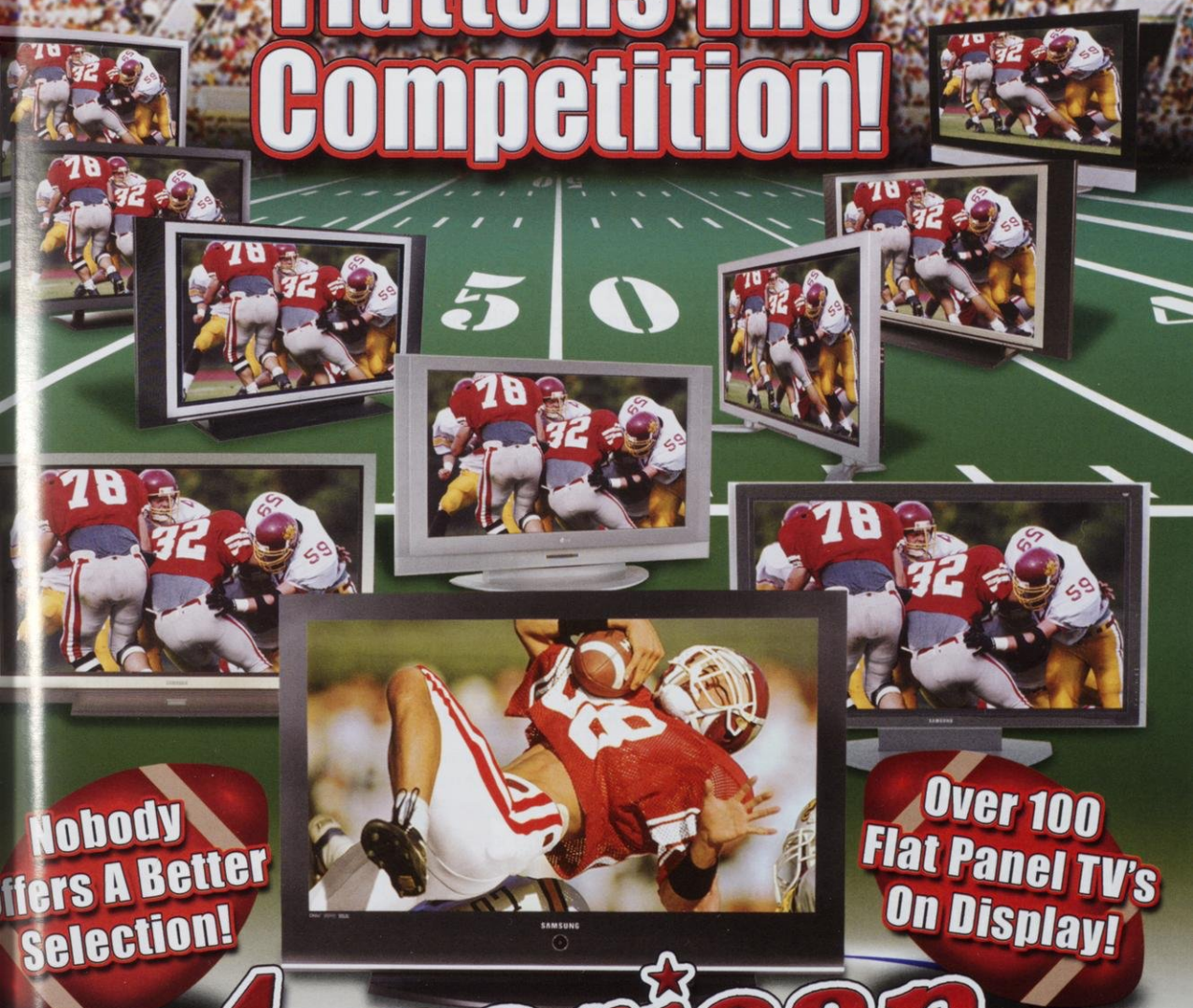
I am committed to helping ensure that our teams achieve the highest standards of excellence, not just in competition, but also in integrity, values and character.

Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez



Barry Alvarez is in his fourth year as Director of Athletics at the University of Wisconsin and second without the additional title of head football coach. Alvarez, who began his career as athletic director in April of 2004, served as athletic director and football coach in 2004-05 and in 2005-06.

Alvarez's first year as Director of Athletics (without the football duties) was memorable one as Wisconsin won four national titles (men's cross country, men's and women's hockey and women's lightweight rowing) during the 2005-06 athletic campaign. The Badgers also won five conference titles.

The UW maintained its winning ways in 2006-07 with the men's track and field team winning its first NCAA title. The women's hockey team repeated as NCAA champions as Wisconsin finished 16th in the Directors' Cup rankings.

Badger student-athletes also showed their capabilities off the field of play during the fall of 2007 when they registered the highest cumulative grade point average for a fall term in department history. Nineteen teams also finished with record high grade point averages for either the fall or spring semester.

Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football program for 16 seasons (1990-2005). He has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He piloted Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record).

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727)

- Babcock Hall, which houses the UW's nationally acclaimed dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Berry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.

record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife Cindy are co-campaign chairs in the effort to bring a Gilda's Club, a free support center for families dealing with cancer, to Madison. Alvarez also serves on the board of directors for the MACC Fund (Midwest Athletes Against Childhood Cancer).

Alvarez and his wife are the parents of three children—daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer); son Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson; Grace and Jackson Delzer; and Scarlet and Barry John Thomas Alvarez.

Head Coach Bret Bielema

One would be hard-pressed to draw up a better head coaching debut than the one Wisconsin's Bret Bielema fashioned in 2006.

The third-youngest head coach in Bowl subdivision football, Bielema has proven that age is just a number. He has shown that determination, hard work, organization and enthusiasm—all traits Bielema embodies—count the most when sizing up an individual's qualifications.

Bielema guided the Badgers to a 12-1 overall record and 7-1 mark in the Big Ten (good for a second-place tie with Michigan). Wisconsin capped its record-setting 2006 season with a 17-14 win over Arkansas in the 2007 Capital One Bowl. No previous Wisconsin team had won more than 11 games in a season. In addition, Bielema became just the third rookie head coach in NCAA Division I history to pilot his team to 12 victories.

Bielema's efforts were rewarded when he was named the 2006 Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year. Bielema also was named one of five finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and was a finalist for the 2006 Schutt Sports Division IA Coach of the Year Award.

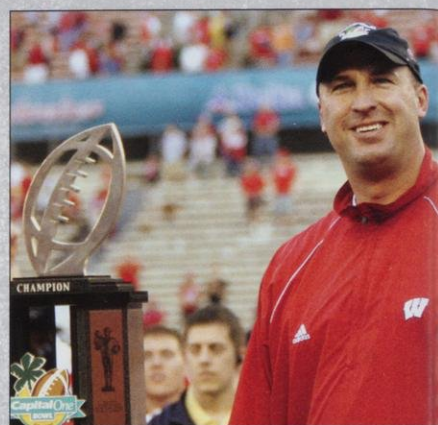
Wisconsin surprised most observers outside the program by setting school records for overall wins (12) and regular-season victories (11), as well as tying the UW mark for conference victories (seven). The Badgers did it with a defensive unit that ended the 2006 regular season ranked among the top three nationally in pass defense, pass efficiency defense, total defense and scoring defense. And they

did it with an offense led by a pair of seniors (QB John Stocco and All-America tackle Joe Thomas), a young but talented offensive line, the Big Ten Freshman of the Year (P.J. Hill) at tailback and an emerging corps of receivers, including John Mackey Award semifinalist Travis Beckum.

Bielema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999, finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl: UW limited the high-powered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense.

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB Scott Starks) were first-team All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002-03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in



both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were first-team All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas State, Bielema spent nine seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Iowa, where he worked for head coaches Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997 Hawkeyes posted three shutouts and ranked No. 1 nationally in scoring defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr (first-team All-Big Ten), Vernon Rollins and Matt Hughes (both honorable mention All-Big Ten) at Iowa.

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 553 games and guide their teams to 42 bowl games, so the second-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the business. The last four teams (2002-06) for which Bielema has coached accumulated a 53-13 record.

Bielema earned four letters (1989-92) after joining the Iowa football program on a walk-on. He earned a scholarship after his first year and was a member of Iowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a player or coach.

A 1992 graduate of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13, 1970.

Junior Offensive Lineman Kraig Urbik

Kraig Urbik describes his family as "normal" and even sometimes "boring." Hard to believe the 332-pound offensive lineman has a "boring" family.

In 2006 Urbik, who moved from right tackle to right guard, earned his second letter as No. 63 on the UW football team. The Hudson, Wis., native made his 26th career and consecutive start vs. 12th-ranked Arkansas in the Capital One Bowl this past January.

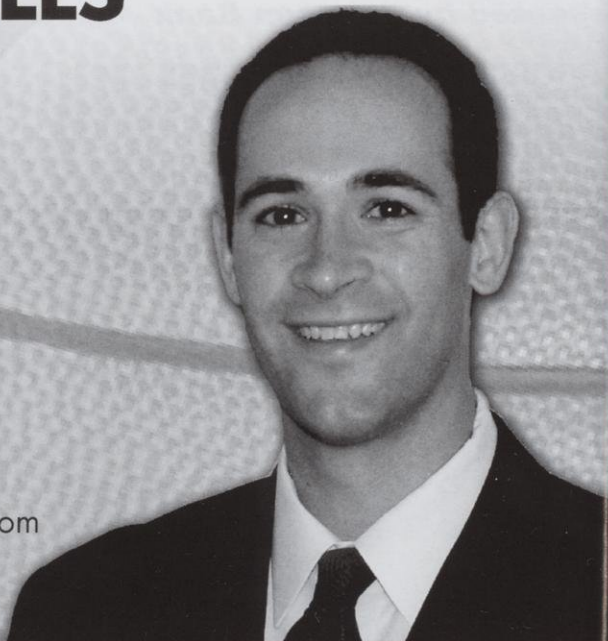

In 2005, *Sports Illustrated on Campus* said that Wisconsin has the best gameday atmosphere in the Big Ten Conference. That's quite a statement, but that may not go far enough. The fact is there may not be a better way to experience college football than spending a day at Wisconsin's fabled Camp Randall Stadium.

First of all, Wisconsin fans love a good time and they love to watch the Badgers win. There are plenty of both at Camp Randall. Badger backers arrive early – they are legendary tailgaters – and stay late, with thousands remaining inside the stadium to sing and dance as the UW Marching Band conducts its festive "5th Quarter" routine.

And there is nothing like the often-imitated-but-never-duplicated madness that is "Jump Around." Between the third and fourth quarters of every home game, thousands of Wisconsin fans, band members (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of

Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!

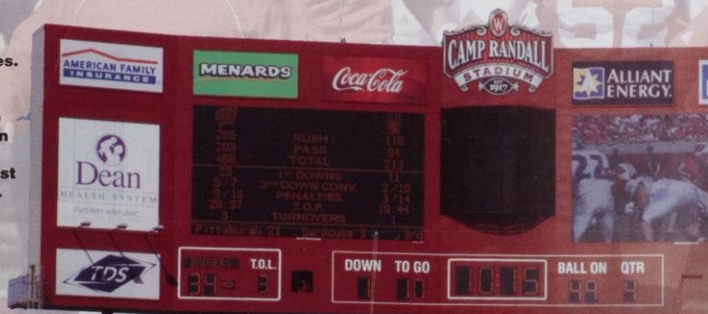
Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 in every game since the 1993 season-opener, a span of 14 years and 88 games. Seventy-eight of those games have been sellouts, including the last 25 in a row. The stadium record was set at the 2005 Iowa game when 83,184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game.

A Wisconsin football gameday experience is a tradition that has been handed down from generation to generation of Badger fans. From the cooking of brats to the marching of the band, from the singing of "Varsity" and the "Bud Song" to the chants of "Rooonnnn Daaaynnne!," from the ghosts of Crazylegs and the Horse to more recent heroes like Alvarez, Panos and Evans, the Badger gameday experience is a happening that any fan of college football will relish.

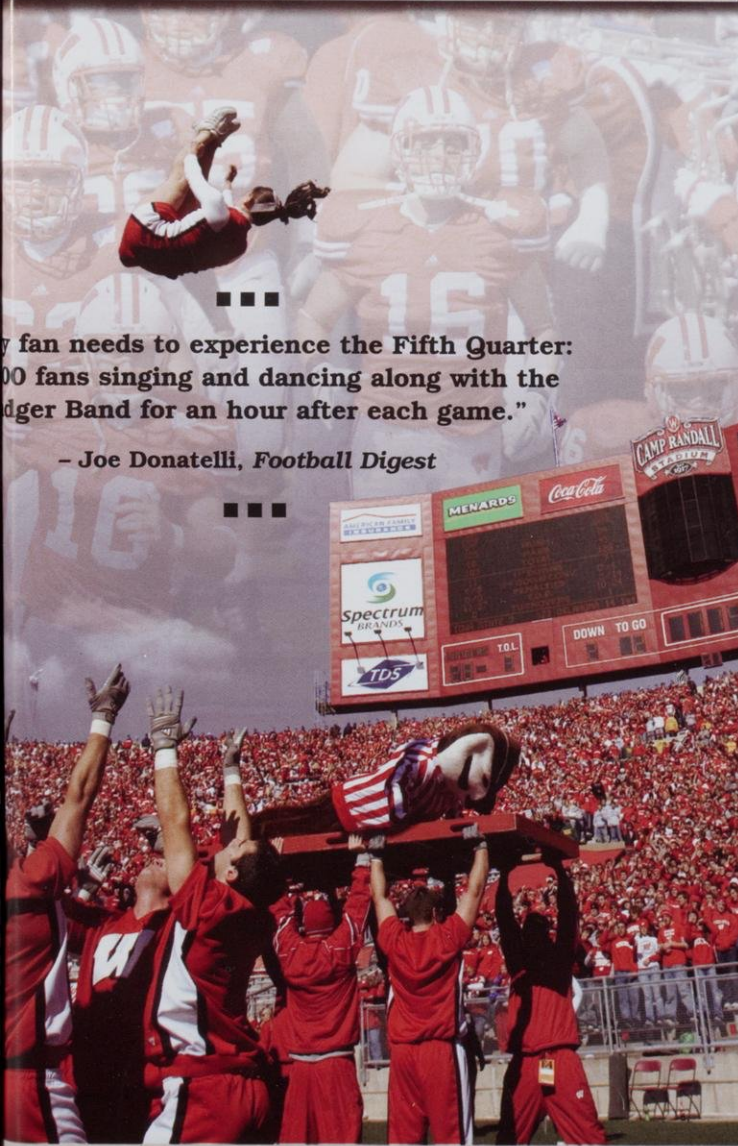

Camp Randall Stadium ...

Home of the Badgers

One of college football's finest facilities – Camp Randall Stadium – completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds. Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.

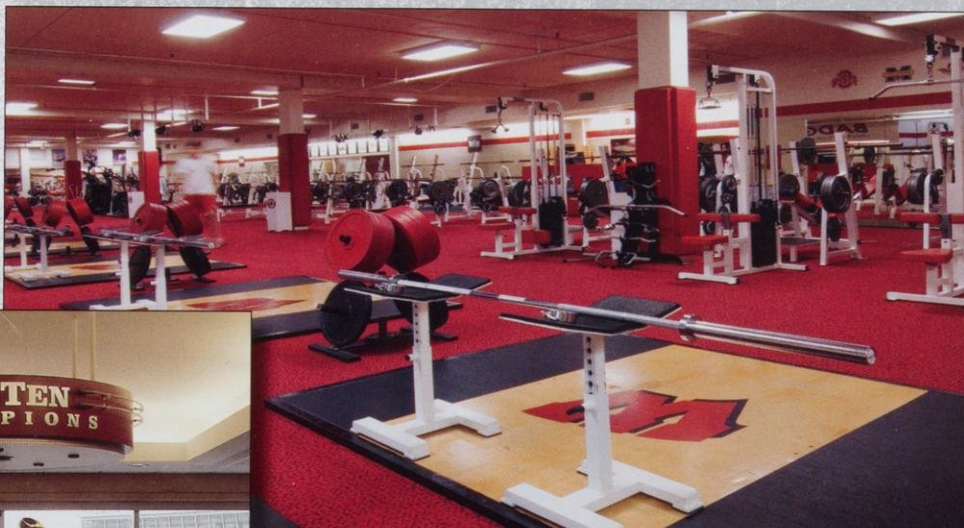

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

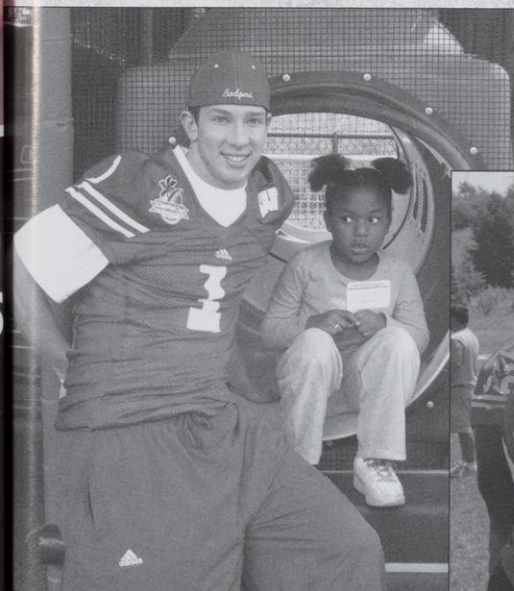
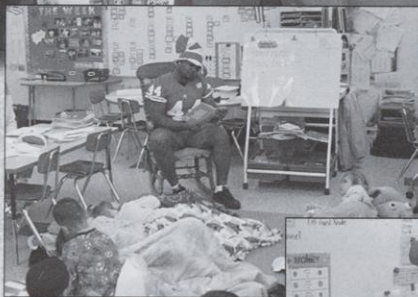
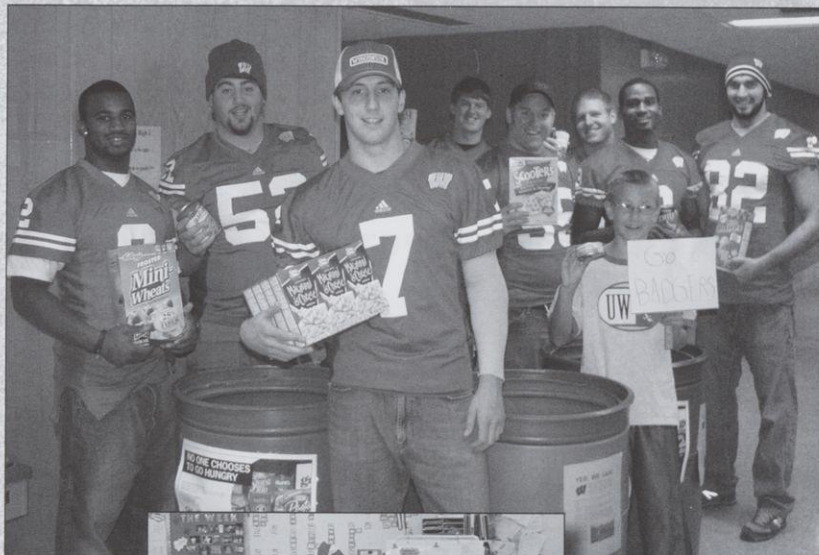
In appreciation for that support, many student-athletes volunteer frequently in community service projects. Every season, the football team works together on a number of community service projects to give back to Madison.

Junior Fullback Chris Pressley

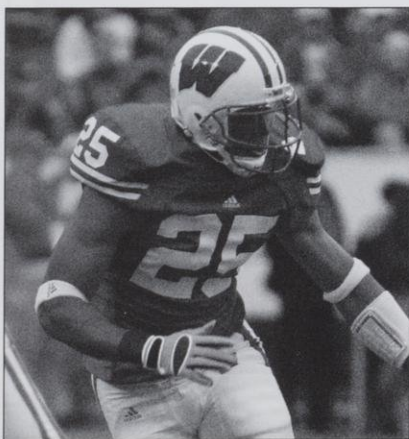
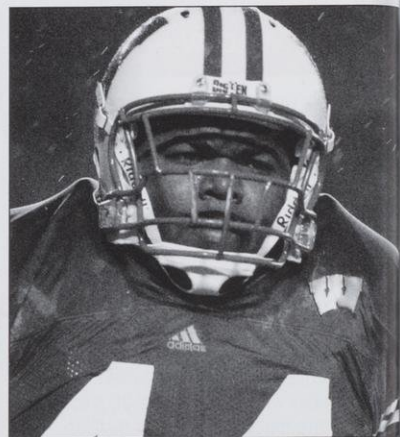
Fullback Chris Pressley spent three weeks this past summer doing something no other Badger football player did. He took a trip to China where he learned about the economy, how to bargain and lost 23 pounds in the process.

The trip was arranged through the UW Business School where Pressley was one of about a dozen UW students to seize the opportunity to learn about the business and financial culture in China. Following a 14-hour flight, Pressley and the group arrived in Beijing, a city of more than 13 million people.

"I was a little cramped up, but even more excited to breathe in the China air for the first time in my life," Pressley said about finally touching ground. "It did not hit me right away (that I was in a foreign country) because most of the other people on the plane spoke English."

Highlights during the trip included visiting the Forbidden City, the Great Wall, the Temple of Heaven, Shanghai University and hikes near the eastern Himalayas.

"It was a workout getting all the way to the top," Pressley said about climbing the Great Wall. "It kind of reminded me of the mountain that we climbed when we went and played Hawaii in 2005."



Sophomore Free Safety Shane Carter

Shane Carter comes from a family of athletes. Not only did his older half-brothers Butch and Chris Carter play professionally, but most of his siblings play sports as well.

His brother Chris, was a star receiver at Ohio State and later with the Philadelphia Eagles and Minnesota Vikings, while his brother Butch attended Indiana University where he played college basketball and later pursued a professional career with the New York Knicks and Los Angeles Lakers.

Carter admits his brothers' success had something to do with him playing sports when he was younger, but knows they were not the only reason.

"It was just something I wanted to do," Carter said. "Obviously growing up, when your family plays, you are always going to see it and want to play. But at the same time, it wasn't something that I felt pressured to do. I wanted to not only follow in their footsteps, but create my own identity."

Although Carter has a good relationship with Butch and Chris, out of all his siblings (Shane's father Clarence has twelve children: eight boys, four girls), Carter is closest to his youngest brothers. Alex, 16, and Lance, 14, also play football and basketball and love to come to his games and support him whenever possible.

Senior Wide Receiver Paul Hubbard

Paul Hubbard is not just a wide receiver on the Badger football team. He was also a long jumper, triple jumper and 4x100-meter sprinter on the UW track & field team which won both the Big Ten Indoor and Big Ten Outdoor Championship last year.

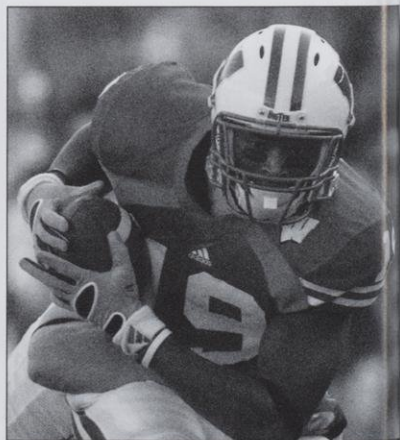
"It was one of those things that I couldn't figure out which sport I loved the most, so I figured I might as well do both," Hubbard said.

Although Hubbard is eligible to compete in one more outdoor season, he graduates in December, and has therefore completed his collegiate track & field career.

Training for two sports became a year-round routine. Following the bowl game, Hubbard would go home for one week and return to campus to begin indoor track training and competition. Even in the summer, Hubbard trained almost every day.

"When you first do it, it is going to be a heavy load," Hubbard said. "You have to get used to it and your body has to get acclimated to the stress and the strain you are putting on it constantly. But after that you will be in the great shape and will be able to blow by every guy."

As far as plans after graduation, Hubbard will see how far he can go with football, but if that doesn't work out, he plans on looking into a career with the FBI.

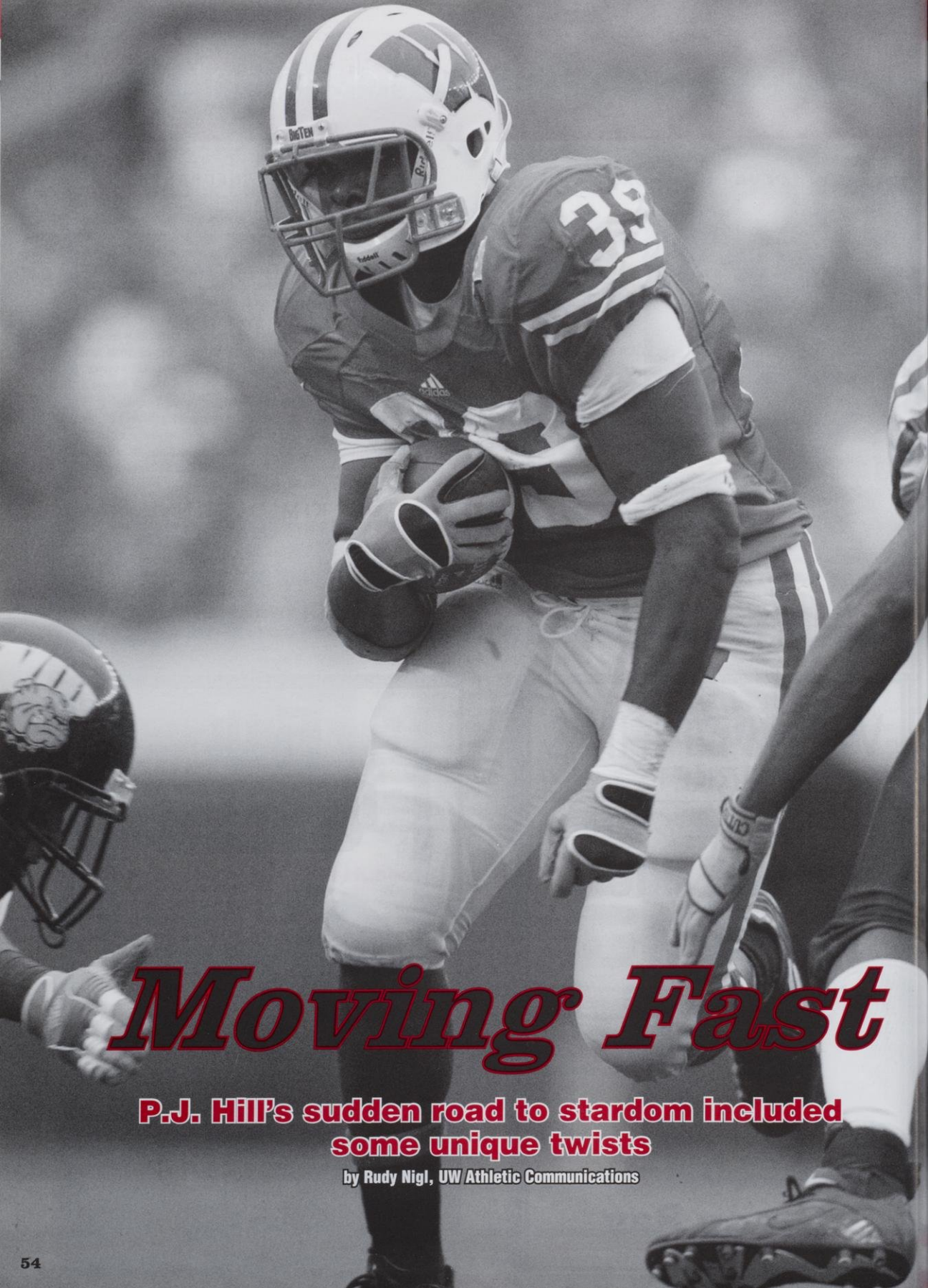

Moving Fast

**P.J. Hill's sudden road to stardom included
some unique twists**

Wisconsin running back P.J. Hill started playing football like any other youngster, but has been running down a different path ever since. Hill's football career began in Alabama where he played Pee Wee football at the local Boys and Girls Club at the age of eight. P.J. was not your average player back then. Weighing in at 90 pounds, the big guy was forced to line up at nose guard and special teams in his early playing days.

After moving to New York City with his father the following year, P.J. didn't play football right away. After some persuading by P.J., his dad found a Pop Warner league in Queens, N.Y., that he was able to join. At 11 years old, P.J. weighed 160 pounds and had to cut weight to play in the league. He was on diets and special exercise routines to get down to about 130 pounds.

"My dad didn't really know too much about football, but he trained me and kept me on track to lose weight and get into shape to play," said Hill. "Sometimes I would have to run laps before practices and games to make sure that I was under the allowed weight."

Hill played defensive line for awhile until one of the coaches thought he could be a pretty tough running back. One day at practice while running the "nutcracker drill" (giving a defender a free shot at the ball carrier as he runs through what would be a hole in the offensive line), the coaches gave P.J. the ball and waited to see what would happen.

"The coach matched me up against the two best defenders we had. I ran over one of them, then the other, and finally both at the same time," laughs Hill. "From that point on I was a running back."

The funny part about this transition was that P.J. had to keep his defensive lineman number and was wearing No. 79 as the team's running back. He remembers the coach running a lot of dive plays up the middle. He would just run as hard as he could and hit anyone in his path.

Hill went on to play high school football at Brooklyn Poly Prep after the team's coach saw him playing Pop Warner. After a very successful high school career, Hill graduated and was on his way to play football at Wisconsin. Coming to college can be one of the toughest transitions in a person's life. For P.J., another move and a new look was something he was used to. P.J. came to Wisconsin ready to run.

"Coming to Wisconsin, I thought that the high school game should be put behind me," said Hill. "I knew that college was going to be different and that I had to come into it with a different mindset. I'm a very physical back and I knew I could bring that to the college level."

Hill's work ethic and mentality were the only things that hadn't changed over the years. Being a physical player, he knew that with hard work he would be able to contribute to the Badger program.

About midway through fall camp in 2005, Hill was slated to be the No. 2 running back behind Brian Calhoun entering the season. The day after the coaches told him he was the second back, he broke his leg during a team scrimmage. Trying to adjust to college can be hard enough on its own, but Hill had to do it with a broken leg as part of the football team.

"When I broke my leg it was a very disappointing time," recalled Hill. "At the time I was making my way up the ladder and was going to be the No. 2 running back."

Hill tried to find positives in the injury. Though he wasn't able to play, he took advantage of his time.

"The injury gave me time to develop my body more by lifting and conditioning," he said. "I was able to understand the playbook better and adjust to the college game and atmosphere while I was injured."

After a breakout season in 2006, Hill looks to improve on last year's success as he finds himself in yet another new position to start the 2007 season. Coming into last year, Hill ran under the radar as not many people knew what to expect from the redshirt freshman. Hill saw that as a challenge and did all he could do to contribute for the team.

"Last year was a learning experience being put into a big position," Hill said. "I took advantage of it and did everything I could for the team."

Hill's transition from last year to the current one has been marked with an increase in leadership and responsibility. He feels that he is a major contributor to the team and that he needs to not only lead by example, but also be there to motivate his teammates when they need it.

"Last year I kept my mouth shut and did my work. Now I lead by example and I feel comfortable telling guys what needs to be done and saying things when they need to be said," said Hill. "I get on the guys when I need to. I'll tell guys if they made a mistake and we correct it together. The lineman and fullbacks do the same thing back to me too, so as a team we work together helping each other out. The mentality is that if you do your job, I'll do mine, and together we can be tough."

Since his childhood, Hill has gone through a lot of changes on and off the football field. With these changes have come maturity, leadership and responsibility. P.J. continues to adapt to changing environments and continues to excel in every new situation. He wouldn't have it any other way.

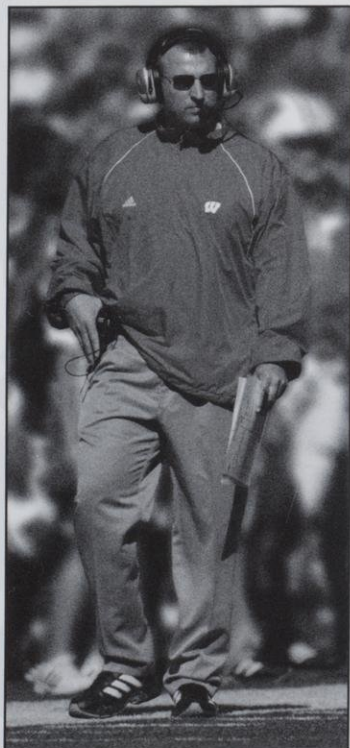

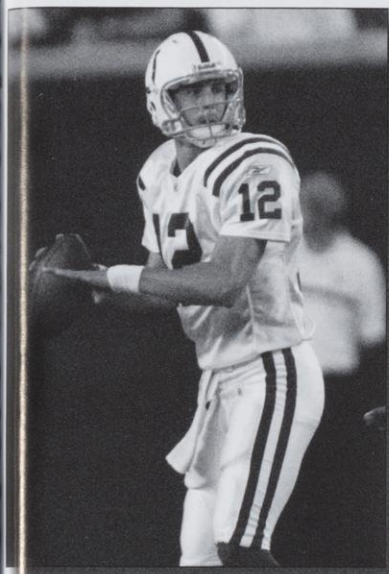

Badgers in the NFL Update

Preseason Action

Thirty-one former Badgers suited up in NFL uniforms during the first two weeks of preseason action in 2007. Eighteen players represented 12 of the 16 teams in the AFC, while 13 play for nine different teams in the NFC.

Three former Badgers, **Owen Daniels**, **Ron Dayne** and **Jamar Fletcher**, don the Houston Texans jersey, while four others, **Lee Evans**, **Jason Jefferson**, **Jim Leonhard** and **Mike Schneck** wear the Buffalo Bills uniform.

On Aug. 11, the Texans lost to the Chicago Bears, 20-19. **Daniels**, who started 12 of 14 games as a rookie in 2006, had two catches for nine yards. **Dayne**, who re-signed with the Texans in March, had four carries for six yards. Signed by the Texans in April, **Fletcher** made five tackles, four solo, against the Bears.

Bills wide receiver **Evans** finished his 2006 season as the team's number one receiver with 82 catches for 1,292 yards and eight touchdowns. **Jefferson**, a defensive tackle, was acquired as a free agent by the Bills in 2006, while **Schneck** was the team's long snapper for most punts and field goals in 2006. **Leonhard** had two tackles and returned two punts

in the Bills' 13-10 preseason win over the Saints on Aug. 10.

Dan Buenning and **Jonathan Clinkscale** play for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, who defeated the New England Patriots, 13-10, on Aug. 10. **Buenning** played in nine games with seven starts at left guard in 2006 before being placed on the injured reserve list. **Clinkscale** re-signed with the Bucs in January.

Anttaj Hawthorne had one solo tackle in the Oakland Raiders' preseason 27-23 win over the Arizona Cardinals.

Long snapper **Matt Katula** is in his third season with the Baltimore Ravens, who beat the Philadelphia Eagles, 29-3, on Aug. 13.

Tight end **Mark Anelli** had two catches for 11 yards in the St. Louis Rams' 13-10 win over the Minnesota Vikings. Anelli faced off with fellow former Badgers **Erasmus James** and **Brooks Bollinger** in that game. **James** started two games at defensive end in 2006 but missed the remainder of the season with a knee injury. **Bollinger** completed 6-of-10 passes for 50 yards in the Vikings' first two preseason games.

In the Indianapolis Colts' 23-10 preseason loss to the Dallas Cowboys, quarterback **Jim Sorgi** completed 6-of-13 passes for 52 yards. The next week, on ESPN's Monday Night Football, **Sorgi** completed 11-of-18 passes for 107 yards, a touchdown and an interception.

Through the first two preseason games running back **Michael Bennett** of the Kansas City Chiefs had 10 carries for 36 yards and two receptions for 15 yards.

Joe Thomas, the lone Badger drafted in 2007, started in each of the first two preseason games at left tackle for the Cleveland Browns. **Roderick Rogers**, another Badger senior from last season, is in camp with the Denver Broncos and saw action in the Broncos' second preseason game.

After spending his first four seasons with the Dallas Cowboys, **Al Johnson** was the first free agent signing of 2007 for the Arizona Cardinals, agreeing to a four-year contract, and started each of the first two preseason games. **Ross Kolodziej** begins his second stint with the team and had three tackles in the first two preseason games.

2006 Recap

Brian Calhoun of the Detroit Lions finished the 2006 season with seven carries for 19 yards, while teammate **Alex Lewis** played in 11 games, starting two, at line-backer.

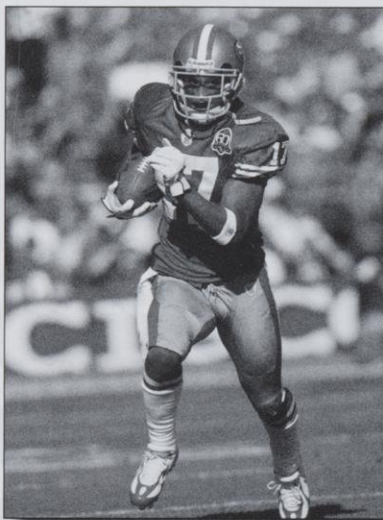
Chris Chambers started all 16 games at wide receiver for the second straight year for the Miami Dolphins, registering 59 catches for 677 yards and four touchdowns.

For the Jacksonville Jaguars, **Nick Greisen** started 10 of 16 games in 2006, registering 34 tackles and an interception. **Scott Starks** played in all 16 games for the second consecutive year, with 29 tackles and one interception, which he returned for a touchdown.

Casey Rabach has started all 32 games at center in his two seasons with the Washington Redskins.

Mark Tauscher enters his eighth season with the Green Bay Packers. He has started 91 games over the past seven seasons.

Brandon Williams, who played in 13 games as a rookie for the San Francisco 49ers, looks to make an impact at wide receiver after serving as the primary return man in 2006. He returned 22 punts and 16 kickoffs last year.

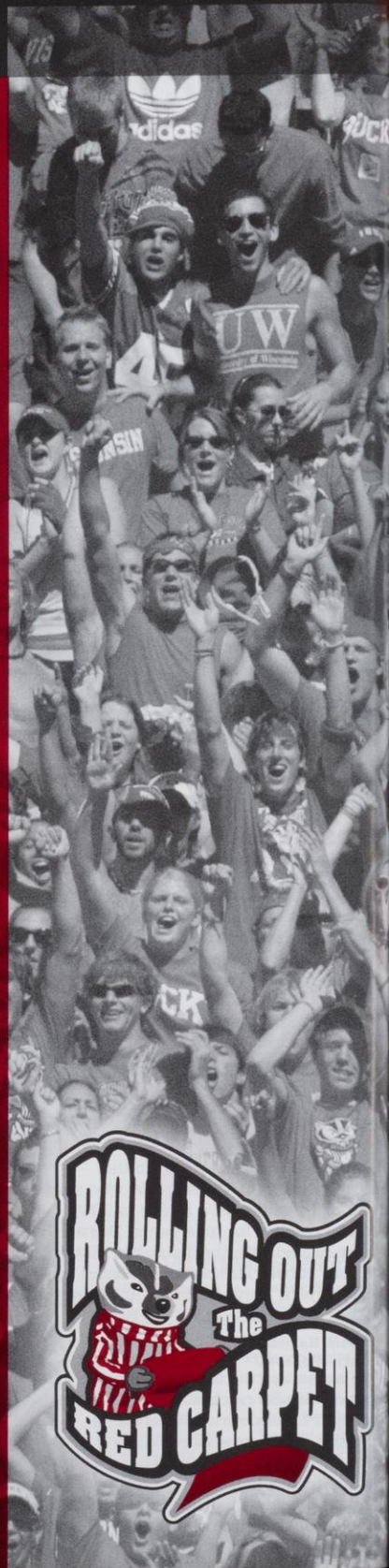


Brandon Williams averaged 23.8 yards on 16 kickoff returns for the 49ers last year.

Spoken word, hip hop become part of higher education

UW-Madison is in the center of the institutionalization of hip hop in higher education, thanks to the Office of Multicultural Arts Initiatives (OMAI).

This fall, the university welcomed its first group of students to the First Wave Spoken Word and Urban Arts Learning Community. Spoken word is performance poetry, often with an urban hip-hop flavor, that promotes messages of social activism, personal experiences and growth. Just as beat writers and rock 'n' roll transformed pop culture, hip hop is one of the big ideas of the young generation.

In the learning community, students will live in a dynamic, multicultural community that will explore all sides of urban arts in the first program of its kind in the country. Students take courses together, participate in internships and service-learning programs, and learn all aspects of performance arts, from performing and writing to organizing and marketing an event.

OMAI executive director Willie Ney says that he hopes his efforts with spoken word and hip hop will help students succeed while also helping the university address an ongoing challenge. "We have a diversity problem on campus," he says. "Through the youth spoken-word movement, we have access to the crème de la crème of student leaders and students of color. UW-Madison is becoming known as the epicenter of spoken word and hip-hop culture in higher education."

New Ogg Hall opens to 600-plus residents

Ogg Hall, the newest residence hall at UW-Madison, opened to 615 students this week, carrying on the university's tradition of blending academics with student housing.

The new six-story facility — along with Newell J. Smith Hall, which opened last year — replaces the outdated 13-story towers of the old Ogg Hall. The new residence hall at North Park and Dayton streets features two classrooms, a technology learning center, a study room, tutoring rooms and an office of the Cross-

College Advising Service on the first floor, plus two additional study rooms on each floor.

The building also features a security system that includes cameras at building entrances, card access for entry and a full sprinkler system. Residents live in clusters, in which groups of four rooms share a common bathroom. They'll also have high-speed Internet connections in their rooms, access to wireless Internet services in common areas, the ability to individually control room heating and air conditioning, and a kitchenette on each floor.

Major bioenergy initiative takes flight in Midwest

An approximately \$125 million award during the next five years established the Department of Energy Great Lakes Bioenergy Research Center, in which scientists and engineers will conduct basic research toward new technologies to help convert cellulosic plant biomass — cornstalks, wood chips and perennial native grasses — to sources of energy for everything from cars to electrical power plants.

The new grant, the largest formal grant in the university's history, is part of a larger Wisconsin Bioenergy Initiative, a statewide effort focused on the development of fuel and energy resources from non-food sources in ways that promote regional economic growth in the context of good environmental stewardship.

The center will be based in Madison and will bring together scientists from Wisconsin; Michigan State University; Lucigen, a Madison-area biotechnology company; the Pacific Northwest and Oak Ridge National Laboratories; and the University of Florida, among others.

Bowling with the Badgers ...

UW consistently plays in - AND WINS - major bowl games!



This second-quarter touchdown catch by tight end Travis Beckum gave Wisconsin a 17-7 lead over Arkansas in last year's Capital One Bowl. The Badgers went on to win the game 17-14, their second consecutive Capital One Bowl victory.

Over the last 14 seasons, no team in the country has won more bowl games than Wisconsin. The Badgers' nine bowl victories over that span ties them with Boston College for the most in the nation. UW has participated in 12 bowl games over the past 14 seasons, a mark matched by only Ohio State and Michigan among Big Ten teams. During that time, the Badgers have made eight appearances in January bowl games, including three Rose Bowl wins.

Last season, Wisconsin played in its third consecutive January bowl game, defeating 12th-ranked Arkansas, 17-14, to capture its second straight Capital One Bowl. The win gave UW its school-record 12th victory of the season.

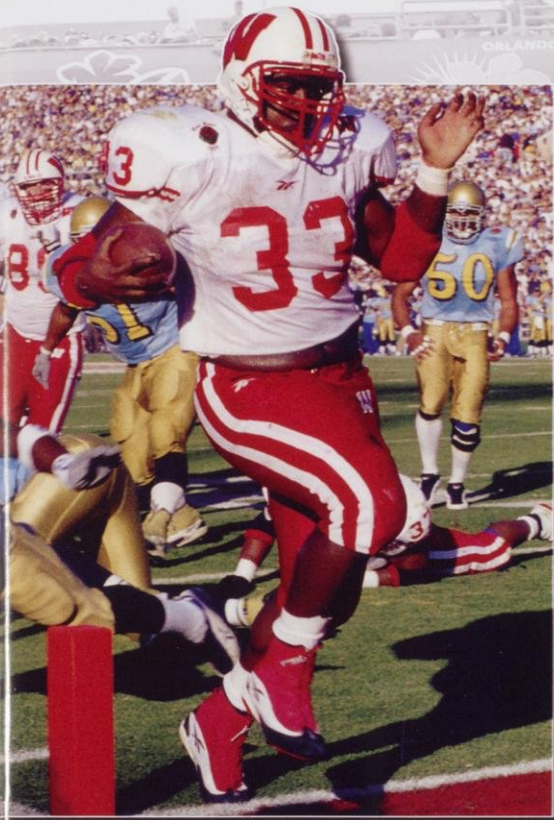
The Badgers had won just one bowl game prior to 1994. Since then, UW is 9-3 in postseason play, including 6-2 in January bowl games. Wisconsin has defeated teams from the Pac 10 (four times), SEC (twice), Big 12 (once), ACC (once) and WAC (once) during the last 14 seasons.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida, Arizona and Texas.

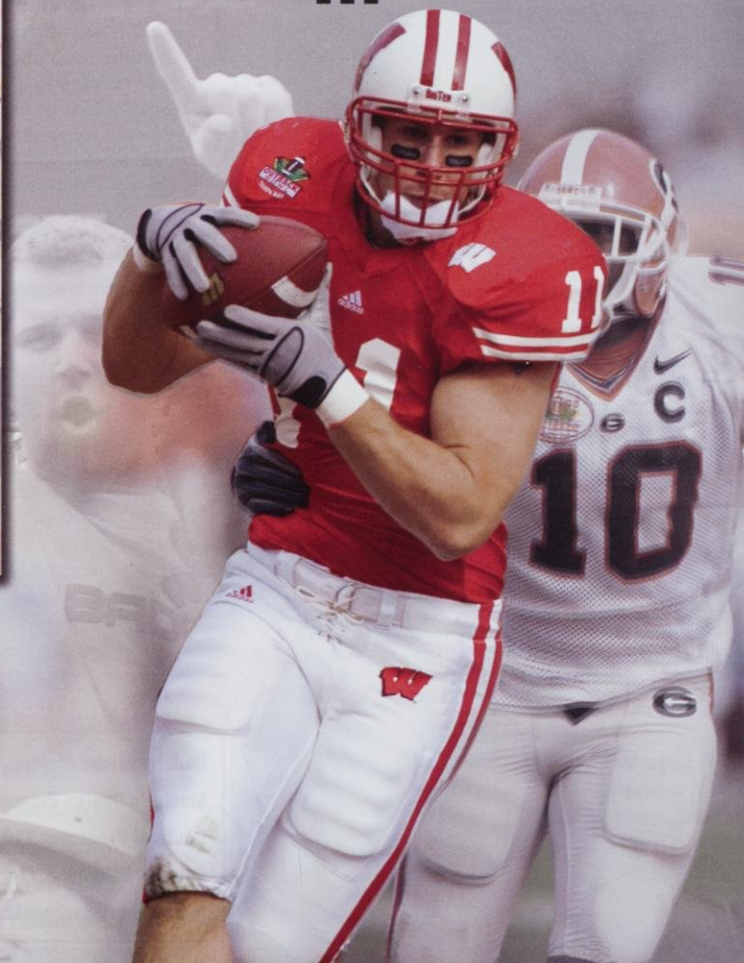

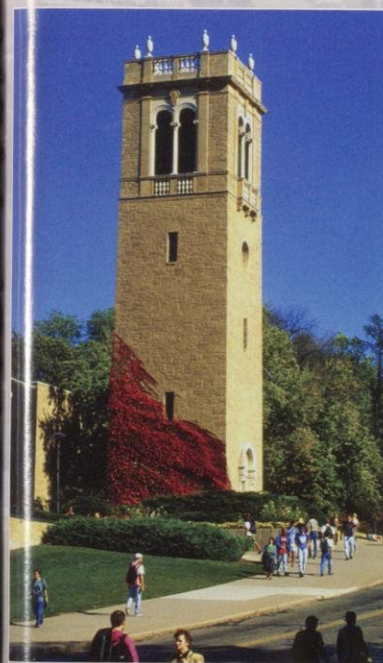

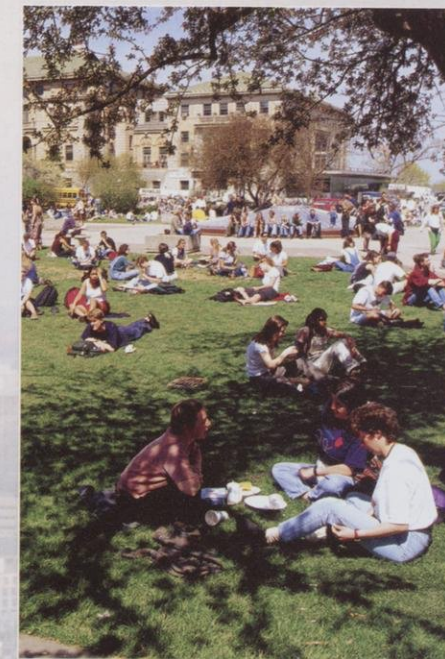

Badgers Recognized Among the Nation's Best!

Every great program is built on the shoulders of outstanding players. It is no different at Wisconsin. With the remarkable success of the football team in recent years has come national recognition for a number of Badger players.

In 2006, many UW individuals were recognized for their contributions to the school-record 12 wins. Chief among those players was offensive tackle Joe Thomas. Thomas was a consensus first-team All-American and became the first UW player to win the Outland Trophy, presented to the nation's top lineman.

Two returnees, junior tight end Travis Beckum and sophomore running back P.J. Hill also garnered national recognition last year. Hill was named national Freshman of the Year by Rivals.com and also earned Big Ten Freshman of the Year honors. Beckum, in his first season as a tight end, was a second team All-American and John Mackey Award semifinalist.

In his first year at the helm, UW head coach Bret Bielema was named Big Ten Coach of the Year and was a finalist for the Bear Bryant national Coach of the Year Award.

The most decorated former Badger is running back Ron

Dayne. The NCAA's all-time leading rusher, Dayne won the 1999 Heisman Trophy in a landslide, outdistancing runner-up Joe Hamilton of Georgia Tech by more than 1,000 points. As a senior, Dayne also won the Maxwell, Walter Camp and Doak Walker Awards.

Dayne was the second Heisman Trophy winner from UW as Alan Ameche took home the award in 1954.

In recent years, Badger players have been fixtures on national award lists. UW players have been finalists for the Rimington Trophy (best center), Outland Trophy (interior lineman), Lombardi Award (lineman), Chuck Bednarik Award (defensive player), Bronko Nagurski Trophy (defensive player), Ted Hendricks Award (defensive end), Fred Biletnikoff Award (receiver), Lou Groza Award (placekicker), Mosi Tatupu Award (special teams) and Ronnie Lott Trophy (defensive player).

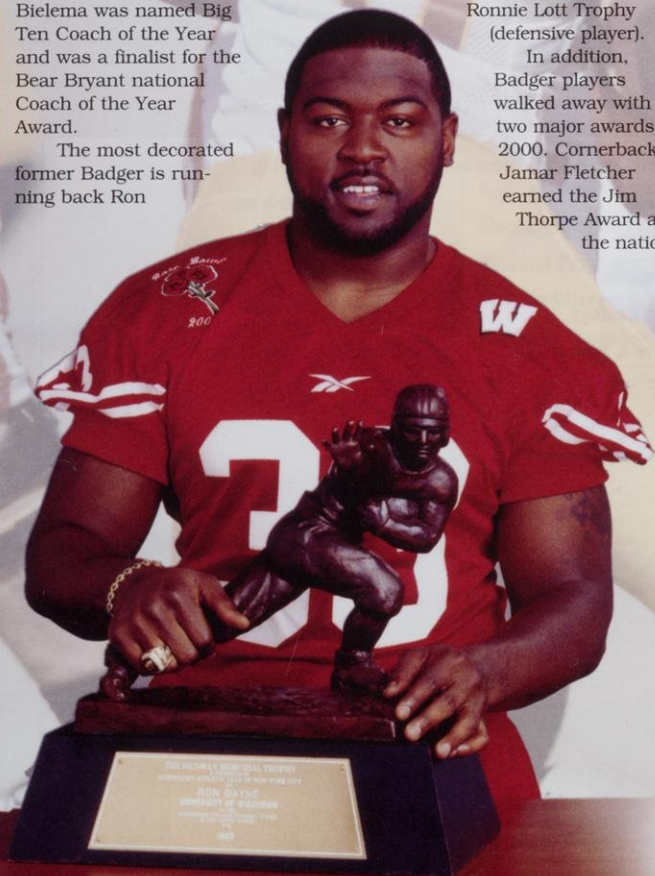
In addition, Badger players walked away with two major awards in 2000. Cornerback Jamar Fletcher earned the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's

best defensive back while Kevin Stemke won the inaugural Ray Guy Award, given to the nation's best collegiate punter.

This year a number of UW players are in contention for major awards. Beckum and Hill are both on the Maxwell Award Watch List. Linebacker Jonathan Casillas was named to the Chuck Bednarik Watch List while center Marcus Coleman is on the Rimington Award Watch List.

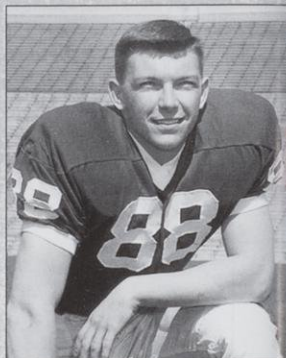
Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.

Marty Below (elected in 1988), a rugged right tackle, earned All-America praise as a senior.

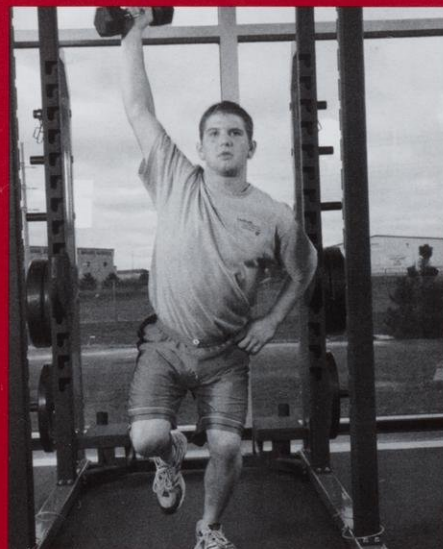
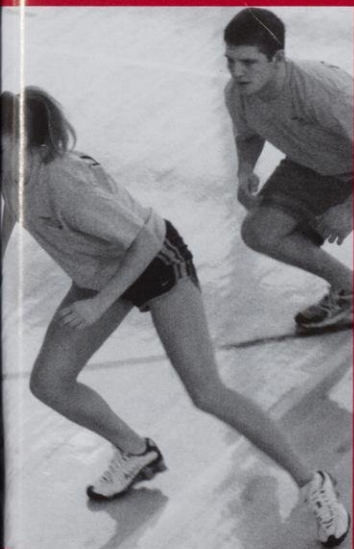
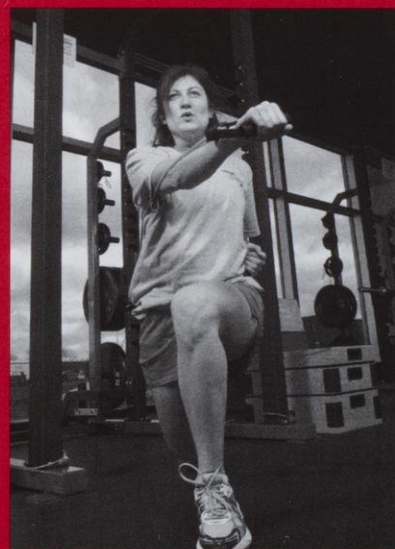
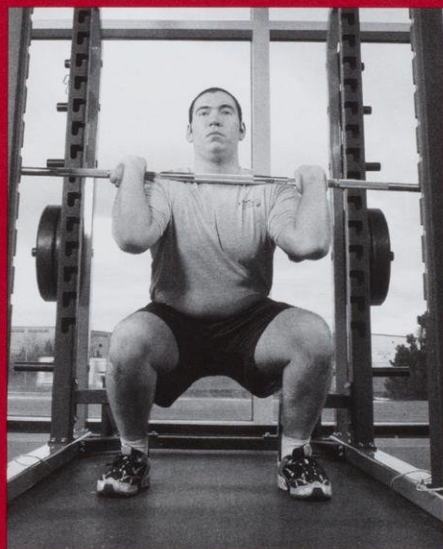
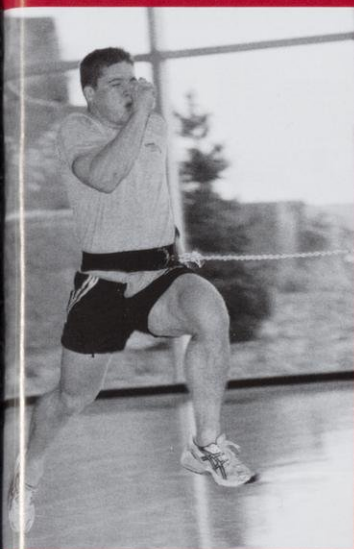

Sept. 1, 1990 — The UW women's soccer team beat California in OT, 1-0, to go to the finals of the Umbro Invitational in Portland, Ore. The team went on to have a 16-2-1 record that year.

Sept. 2, 1995 — The Badgers had a 100-yard rusher, 100-yard passer and a 100-yard returner in one game. Carl McCullough (151 rushing), Darrell Bevell (175 passing) and Aaron Stecker (116 kickoff returns) accomplished this task against Colorado.

Sept. 3, 1987 — The women's volleyball team set a Field House record with 43 total blocks against UI-Chicago.

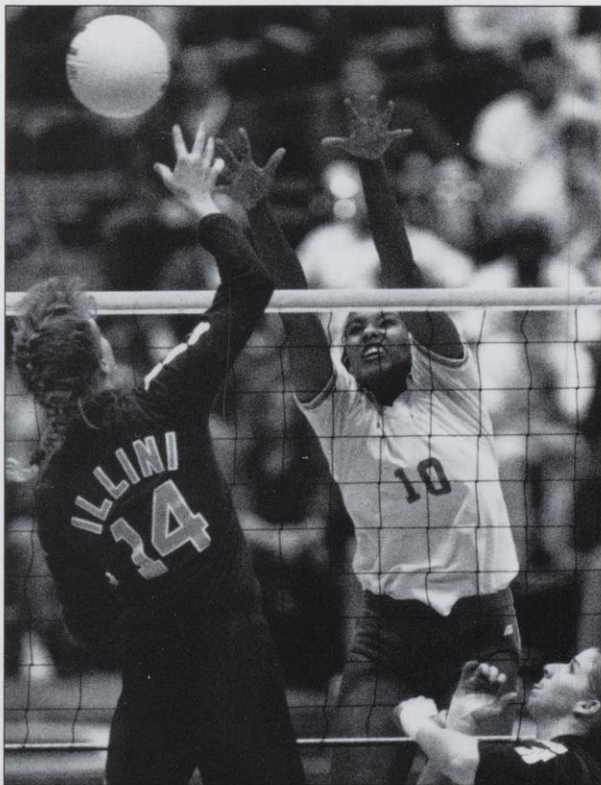
Sept. 4, 1995 — The women's soccer team set a McClimon Track/Soccer Complex record for attendance with 4,532 against North Carolina.

Sept. 5, 1993 — The men's soccer team moved up to third place on the single-game team record list for largest margin of victory with an 8-0 win over California at the Rocky Rococo-UW Soccer Classic in Madison.

Sept. 6, 1990 — Arlisa Hagan of the women's volleyball team set the Big Ten individual single match record for most blocks with 17 against Loyola Marymount.

Sept. 7, 1983 — The volleyball team set both a match record and a Field House record with 25 service aces against UI-Chicago.

Sept. 8, 1993 — The men's golf team set the all-time record for lowest team totals on 18-holes at the Northern Intercollegiate in Ann Arbor, MI, with the total of 279.

Behind the Scenes With ...

What time do you get to Camp Randall and what entails gameday preparation?

I normally get to the stadium three hours before kickoff to beat the traffic. We go on the air 90 minutes before. So I have an hour and a half to do what I need to do, which is touch base with the opposing radio guy and the opposing school's athletic communications director. I check for last minute changes, scratches, position switches and anything like that. And, of course, there is always the all-important free meal which is critical for all us media types. That time is also a chance to go over everything one last time with my engineer.

What kind of preparation do you have to do during the week?

I don't know how many hours it is. I know it's a lot. You spend a few hours just putting together what we call "spotting boards." You just get an 11x14 board, old school, and with a felt tip put the names and numbers of at least the two deep and generally a third tight end, a third tailback. It usually turns out to be 50 some odd names I'm putting down for both schools, names, numbers, height, weight, year and other pertinent statistics. It serves as kind of a cheat sheet, a study board during the week and it's there for me on gameday. I also go through the media guides to get basic biographical information for all the players. Then you spend a lot of time on the internet looking at newspapers from across the country. I always try to call the opposing school's communications director to go over the real basic things like pronunciations and make sure I'm not butchering their player's names. I also end up doing a lot of radio interviews, where I'm either the one asking the questions or I'm on somebody's show answering questions about the Badgers. I try to tape as many of the opponent's games as I can, which is obviously tricky for this game because it's all old news from last year. I look at the tapes from a broadcaster's eye as opposed to that of a coach. It just helps me improve memorization. It's just kind of like studying for a test.

What is the best way you've found to get information of opposing teams?

The internet is great. You can read the stories throughout the week and that is a great starting point. But I still like to talk to people. I don't want to just spit out what's been written in the

papers during the week because things change. The tapes, to me, are pretty valuable in being able to get a feel for a team and it accelerates the memorization game that you have to play with names and numbers. With Wisconsin, obviously, it's not a real challenge, but with the opponents, particularly a non-conference opponent, it is pretty challenging.

What is the toughest football/men's basketball turnaround you guys have had to do?

Two of them come to mind. The 1999 Rose Bowl when the Badgers beat UCLA, the 38-31 game. Mike (Lucas) and I took different flights. I was able to get a red eye out of LA with my engineer. There was a huge snow storm in Madison. We landed sometime mid- or late morning. I think it was one of the last flights that could return to Madison. The basketball team played Ohio State that night. Mike and his wife tried to get through Chicago and they were going to connect through Chicago to get here. They were stuck in Chicago because of the storm and they somehow got a rental car but they ended up listening to the game. They couldn't get back in time because traffic was barely moving. That was a tough one but at least one of us got back.

The other one was before the 2004 Music City Bowl. The basketball team played at Alabama, in Tuscaloosa, the night before. It is about a four-and-a-half hour drive from Tuscaloosa to Nashville. The football team had the bowl game against Auburn the next day, which was an early start. We arrived in Nashville maybe 2:00, 2:30 in the morning and had to be up by 5:00 or 6:00. It was probably worse than that, it was a pretty tight turnaround.

What do you enjoy most about the job?

Meeting the players probably. The event, the game, is the obvious one. Gameday is great. I love the drive to the stadium. When you are there three hours before and you still see people milling about and just getting ready and making the day out of it. That's fun to watch people having a good time. In the long run for me it's just getting to know a lot of the athletes that come through here. We get to know each other. We've been pretty blessed here. We've had a lot of good kids. You get to see kids grow. That is probably the most fun thing.

What is the toughest part?

The toughest part is probably interviewing a player after a tough loss or hearing people ridicule a player because of whatever reason. Because he missed the open receiver or he fumbled or he missed the tackle because they are still college guys. What is it like sitting next to Mike Lucas?

It's fun because he's funny. He is very witty. He has a phenomenal historical perspective of the program. He has covered it for 35-plus years so he's a walking encyclopedia of Badger football. Where I go back 20 years with players he goes back 35-40 years with the players that have gone through here. The funny part is he prepares unlike anybody. He has more notes that are taped up against the wall in the booth, you have to see it to believe it. Basically you can't see the wall because he has his notes all over the place. It's fun because I have known him ever since I've been here. He is a funny guy and an encyclopedia of Badger sports.

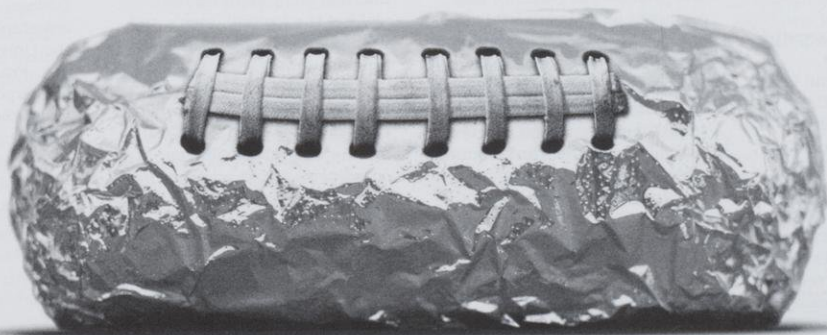

A Great Time to Be a Badger!

In 2006-07, the University of Wisconsin continued its winning ways, claiming two NCAA championships. UW has now won five national titles over the last two seasons. The Badgers also added two individual national titles and won four conference crowns last year.

Wisconsin won the 2007 NCAA Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship, crowning the first national title for a UW track and field team. The title was also the first-ever for a Big Ten Conference team.

Senior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2007. He won the 5,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships and claimed his second consecutive title in the 5,000 meters at the NCAA outdoor championships.

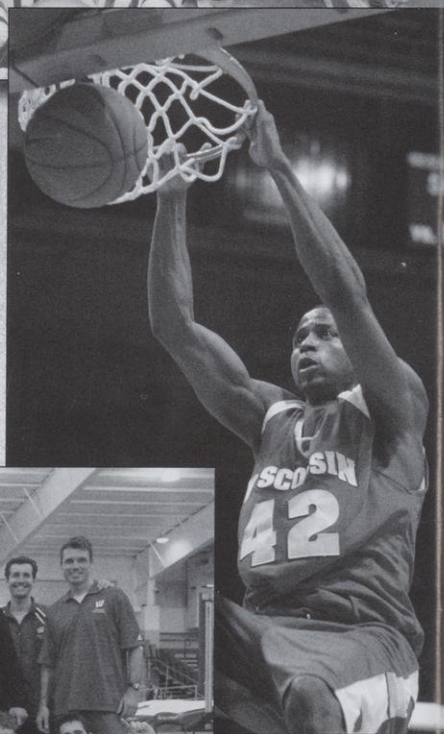
The women's hockey team became the first UW program to repeat as NCAA champions since 1985 when it won the 2007 title. The Badgers claimed their second straight title, becoming the third school to repeat at national champions.

Wisconsin also won Big Ten titles in men's cross country, men's indoor track and field and men's outdoor track and field as well as the WCHA title in women's hockey.

In addition, five UW programs also set records for most wins in a season—men's basketball (30), women's basketball (23), football (12), women's hockey (36) and wrestling (19). The football team captured its second consecutive Capital One Bowl title while the men's basketball team was ranked No. 1 in the country on Feb. 19, a first in school history.

The Big Ten Conference



The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide approximately \$94 million in direct financial aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

Big Ten Universities

- are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- house on their campuses 10 of the nation's 35 largest academic libraries. Collectively, conference libraries hold nearly 70 million bound volumes and the institutions work collaboratively to build and share their resources with other league members.

Big Ten Athletics

- Over the past two years, the Big Ten has reached a series of milestone media agreements to provide the conference with its greatest television exposure ever, including extensions with CBS (for basketball) and ABC/ESPN (for football, basketball and volleyball) and the creation of the

Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs. The Big Ten Network operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year since it launched in August of 2007. It will showcase a wide array of sports as well as original programming produced by conference institutions and represents a 20-year partnership between the Big Ten and Fox. The conference's new media agreements will result in the broadcast of more than 500 events nationally and regionally beginning with the 2007-08 academic year, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

- The NCAA collects two types of graduation rates—the federal graduation rate, which accounts for all entering freshmen who receive aid and graduate within six years, and the Graduation Success Rate (GSR), which reflects the mobility of student-athletes by accounting for transfers. Based on the most recent federal graduation rate average for the 1996-99 entering freshmen classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 71 percent. In comparison, the student body at conference institutions graduated at 73 percent while all Division I student-athletes graduated at 62 percent. The Big Ten's GSR was 82 percent compared to the Division I average of 77 percent.

- The Big Ten recognized 2,018 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2006-07 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,800 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.

Launched in August 2007, the Big Ten Network is dedicated to covering the Big Ten Conference and its 11 member institutions.

The Big Ten Network will provide unprecedented access to an extensive schedule of conference sports events and shows; original programs in academics, the arts and sciences; campus activities; and associated personalities. Sports programming will include live coverage of more major men's and women's events than ever before, along with news, highlights and analysis, all complemented by hours of university-produced campus programming.

The network is available to all cable and satellite carriers and television distributors nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television. The Big Ten Network is a joint venture between subsidiaries of the Big Ten Conference and Fox Cable Networks.



- The Big Ten claimed seven team national championships during the 2006-07 season, just one shy of the conference record of eight national titles established during the 1955-56 campaign, while also finishing as the runner-up in five other sports. The Big Ten has earned at least four national crowns in eight of the last 10 seasons. Big Ten national champions in 2006-07 included Michigan State men's ice hockey, Minnesota wrestling, Northwestern women's lacrosse, Penn State fencing and men's gymnastics and Wisconsin women's ice hockey and men's indoor track and field. The conference has also produced team national crowns in the sports of basketball, cross country, field hockey, football, golf, soccer, softball, synchronized swimming, tennis and volleyball over the last decade.

- Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2006-07, more than 8.7 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.

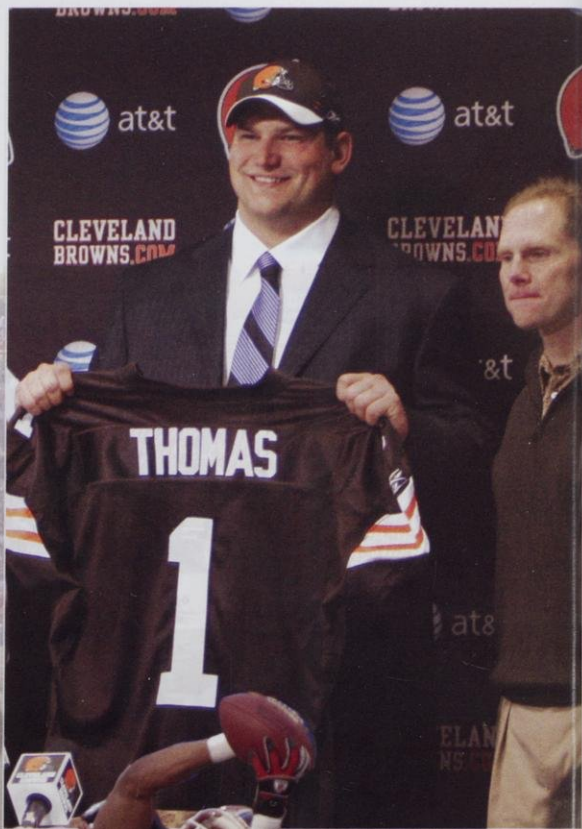

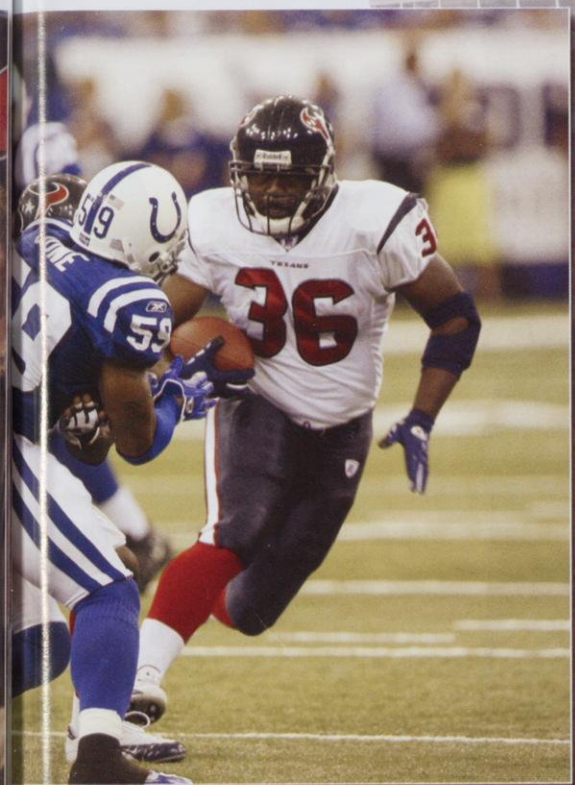

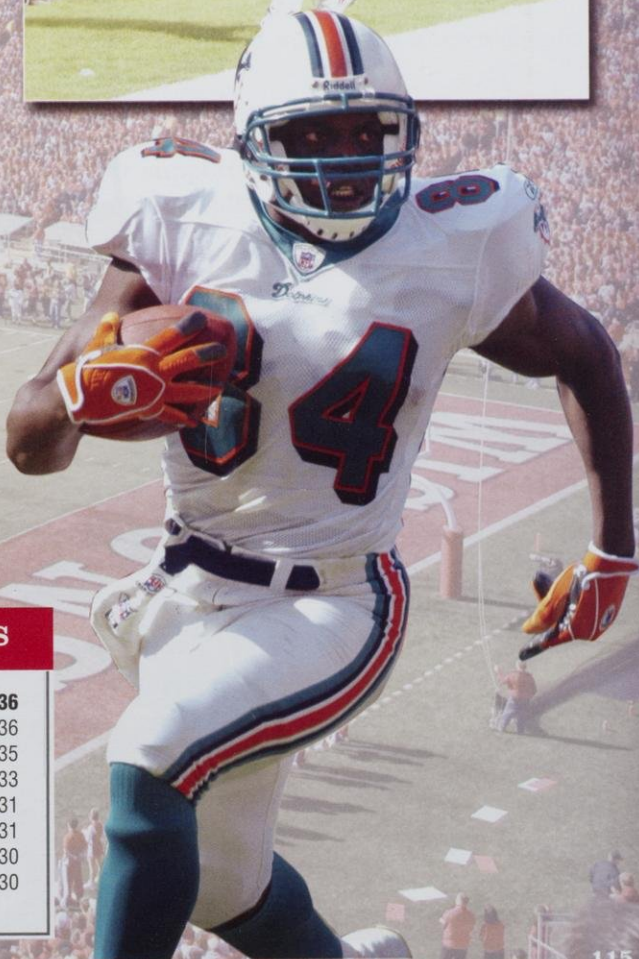
Since 1999, nine Badgers have been selected in the first round of the NFL Draft. That is the second-most in the Big Ten behind Ohio State.

#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



#88 Pat Richter

Pat Richter, who led the nation in receiving as a junior, was a consensus All-American in 1962. A two-time first-team All-Big Ten selection, he paced the conference in receiving in 1961 and 1962. A member of the Washington Redskins for eight seasons, Richter later returned to UW to serve as director of athletics (1989-2004).



#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued via the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shafer was fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafer is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.

ALL-TIME TEAM

In conjunction with the centennial celebration of college football in 1969, Wisconsin fans selected the school's all-time team. The 11-man unit features 1954 Heisman Trophy winner Alan Ameche, who was voted "All-time Greatest Player."

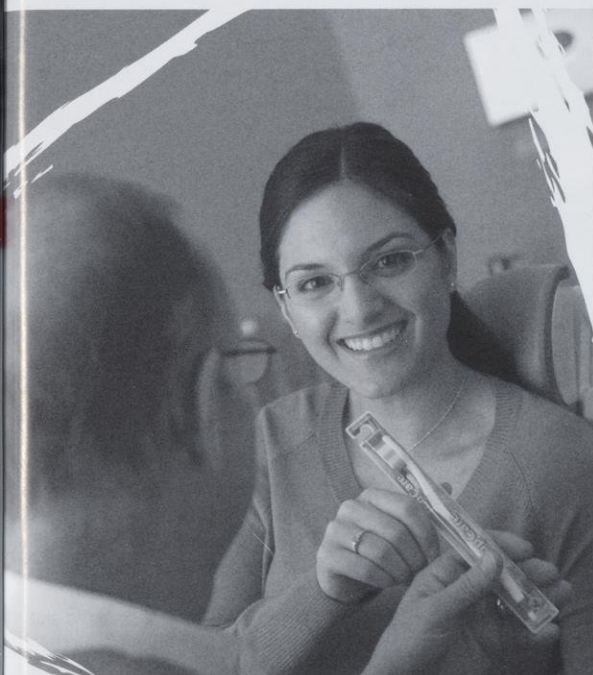

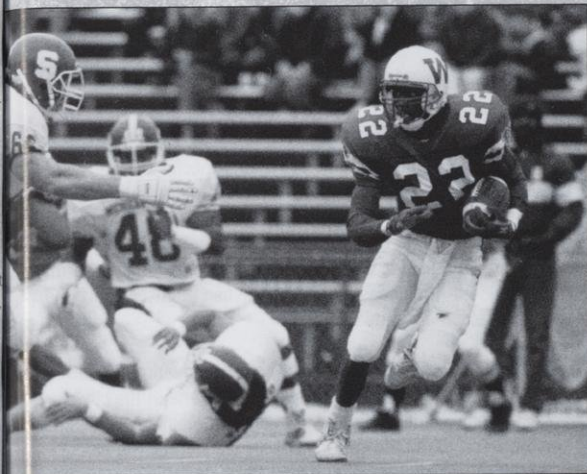

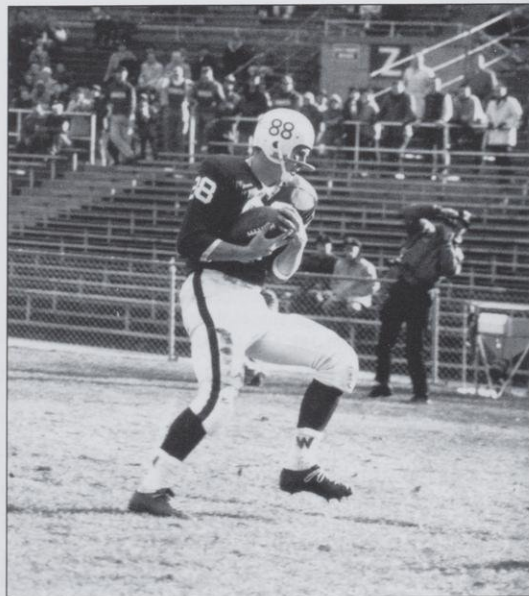

Two former Badger gridiron stars (Alan Ameche and Pat Richter) have been inducted into the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame.

To gain admittance to the Hall, student-athletes must be former Academic All-Americans who distinguished themselves off the playing field after graduation.

Ameche, who played professionally after graduation, retired in Philadelphia after his career and became one of the city's philanthropic leaders. Richter played pro football in Washington before returning to the UW to earn his law degree. He worked at a Madison law firm and at Oscar Mayer before his appointment as Director of Athletics at the University of Wisconsin.

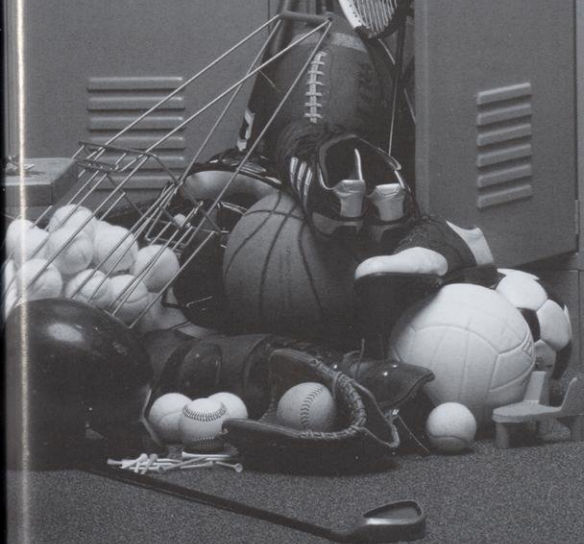

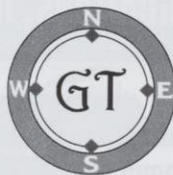

NCAA Guidelines



What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ...

You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

- a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;
 - b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;
 - c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;
 - d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.
- Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic commu-

nications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

- a) providing gifts or reduced cost services;
- b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

- c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;
- d) providing use of an automobile;
- e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;
- f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;
- g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;
- h) offering student-athletes, or their relatives or friends, the opportunity to purchase items, even at face value, not adequately publicized as available for sale to the general public; or
- i) promising to provide any of the above.

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

Employment

A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

- The student-athlete's compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;
- The student-athlete may receive compensation for only work actually performed; and
- The student-athlete's compensation must be at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. 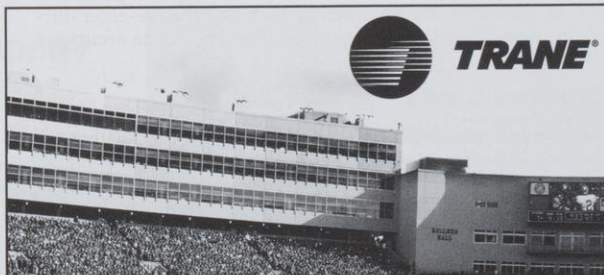

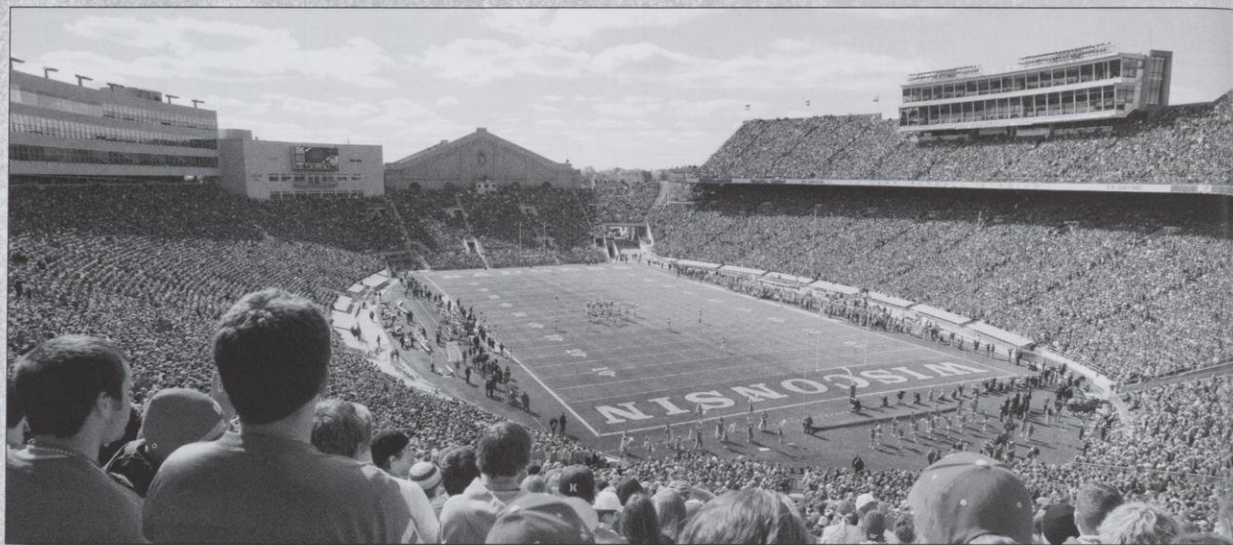

Camp Randall Stadium Policies



Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol 21 or older) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

Please enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kick off. Fans may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Express Lines

Fans are encouraged not to bring any carry-ins. Fans with no carry-ins will enjoy the use of Express Lines at all gates, with the exception of the student entrance at Gate 5.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

Guest Services Center

For general game day information, visit the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse.

Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

In case of an emergency it is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

Lost and Found

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Camp Randall Welcome Center in Kellner Hall (608-262-1866).

Items Not Permitted

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items, cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. All patrons entering Camp Randall Stadium are subject to search. Storage facilities are not available for checking prohibited items.

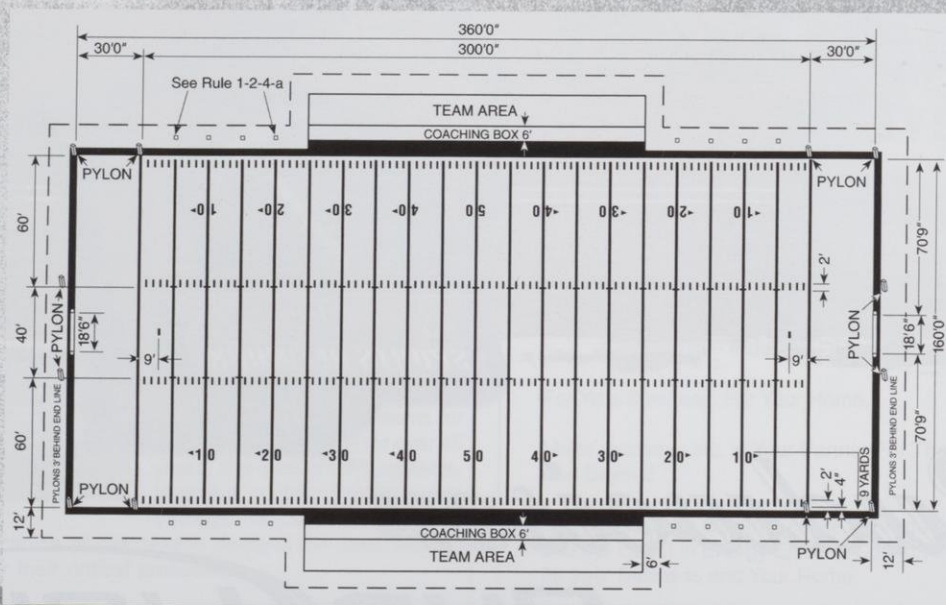

Volleyball 1998-2001

Sherisa Livingston becomes the second Wisconsin Volleyball player to be inducted into the UW Athletic Hall of Fame. Livingston, a Simi Valley, California native joined the Badgers in 1998. Livingston quickly established herself as an upcoming player throughout the Big Ten Conference. Livingston was named 1998 Big Ten Freshman of the Year and received Honorable Mention All-Big Ten honors.

During her career at Wisconsin, Livingston achieved both personal and team success. Livingston's personal honors include being named a three-time First-Team All-Big Ten Selection, the 2000 Big Ten Player of the Year, the 2000-01 UW Female Player of the Year, as well as two-time First-Team All-American awards. Sherisa is the only player in UW history to receive this honor.

The Badgers reached the NCAA tournament all four years of Livingston's career, highlighted by a National Championship Runner-Up finish in 2000. The Badgers won two Big Ten Championships under Livingston's leadership in 2000 and 2001.

Livingston still holds the mark for UW's all-time kill leader and hitting percentage leader. Sherisa has gone on to play professional volleyball in Puerto Rico, Indonesia, The Netherlands, Spain, and Italy.

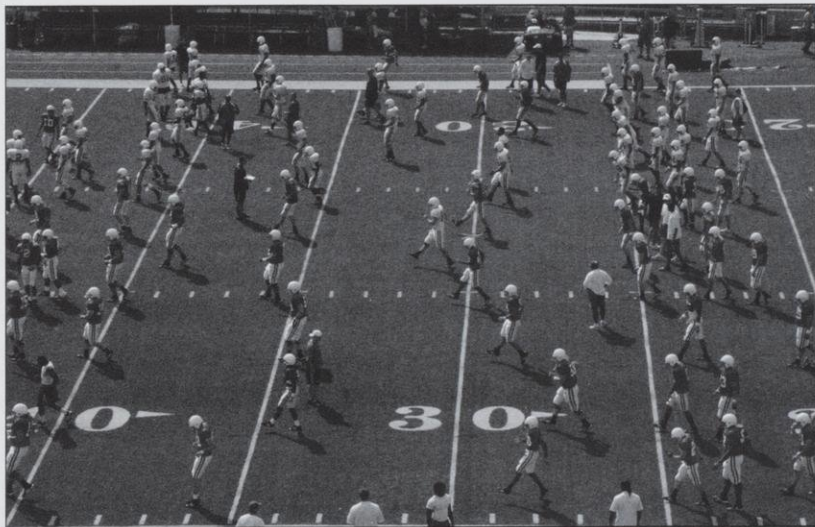

Ask The Badgers!

Each week, Brian Lucas, editor of the Badger Football Gameday Program, will answer questions from you, the Badger fans. Don't care what Brian has to say? Ask someone else related to Badger football a question.

Want to know how many footballs are used in a season? What P.J. Hill does on the morning before a game? How Coach Bielema prepares for his weekly radio show? Brian will find out for you. This week, he came up with some on his own, sort of like Badger FAQs (Frequently Asked Questions). Hopefully yours will be better.



The Badger football team usually practices five days a week, taking Mondays off.

For a road game, the busses usually leave Camp Randall for the airport around 3 p.m. When the team arrives, it is either off to the stadium for a walk-through or to the hotel for some down time. Once at the hotel, the schedule mirrors that of a home game Friday night.

Saturday's schedule, or course, is dependant on the time of the game. An early kick-off really only leaves time for breakfast, some quick meetings and the bus ride to the stadium in order to arrive two hours before game time. Later games allow players to sleep in a little and maybe go over some more things with positional coaches (and maybe another meal).

During the week there are also a couple weight lifting sessions thrown in there and some mandatory study halls, usually for freshmen.

How big is the travel party for road football games?

The answer is a little different for each game. The roster limit for players is 70. Add to that about 50-60 support staff and coaches and you come up with about 120-130 people.

The support staff is usually composed of some administrators, including Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez, and the following groups: equipment, sport medicine, managers, video, ticket office, athletic communications (we usually travel three people), our radio team (Matt Lepay, Mike Lucas and their engineer Dave McCann) and the cheerleaders and Bucky.

On occasion, the band makes the trip as well. This season they will be traveling to UNLV and Ohio State. They also make the trip to any bowl games. The band travels on its own, however.

The bowl trips are unique because of the length of time the team is there and the amount of people making the trip. There is usually one plane that leaves early with the team, coaches and selected support staff. A second plane usually makes the trip later with the band, cheerleaders and some support staff.

What is a typical weekly schedule like for the Badger football team?

During the season, the Badgers usually practice five days a week. On Sunday, the day after the game, they usually come in during the late afternoon for a light workout and to get any treatments that are necessary. Monday is then an off day.

Tuesday and Wednesday are the heavy "Work" days. Practice usually lasts around two hours on those days and much of the gameplan for the upcoming opponent is put in place. Both practices usually take place in full pads.

Thursday is a lighter workout with the emphasis on fine-tuning the gameplan and getting mentally prepared for the game.

For a home game, Fridays involve a walk-through at Camp Randall during the afternoon. Much of the team (starters and key reserves) then get on a bus and go to a local hotel where they stay the night before the game. There are some positional and then full team meetings. Usually the night ends with a movie and a snack.

Final Thoughts



Each week, Justin Doherty, UW's assistant athletic director for communications, will offer a look at the Badger football program. In his position, Doherty has unique access to the coaches and players and a good understanding of their experiences. This week he shares a story about senior captain Luke Swan.

The Big Ten's annual football media day(s) is a 48-hour, late-summer event held in Chicago and attended by all the conference's head coaches, three student-athletes from each team and more than 300 media from around the country.

The final stage of the two days is the annual Kickoff Luncheon. This isn't so much a media event as it is a chance for fans to have a nice meal, hear from the coaches, watch some preseason highlights and, generally, get in the mood for the upcoming college football season.

One of the really cool things the conference does at the luncheon is invite one of the student-athletes to speak. They've been doing that since the mid-1990s, but a Wisconsin player had never spoken at the luncheon in all the years (14) I'd been attending. So, when the conference office came calling this summer and asked each school if they had a student-athlete interested in speaking, I volunteered Luke Swan. Luke, of course, didn't know this, but I was hoping he'd agree to do it and he did.

Luke and I sat down several days before the luncheon to go over potential themes for the speech. We quickly found ourselves in agreement that the presentation should be about "opportunity." A former walk-on, Luke is clearly thankful for the opportunities he has both athletically and academically at the UW.

I offered to help Luke with his speech, but he wanted to write it himself. Turns out he didn't need my help or anyone else's. I made a few suggestions at the end, but it was 99.9 percent his. Luke delivered his speech flawlessly in front of 1,800 fans, athletic administrators, bowl game representatives, head coaches and fellow student-athletes.

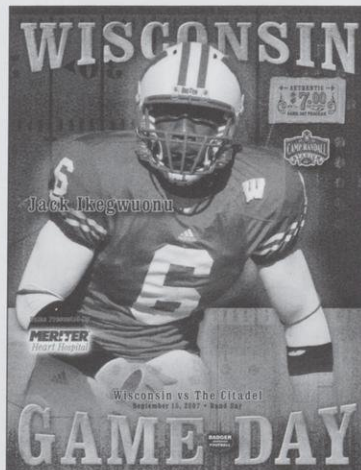
I never imagined I'd hear a Wisconsin native quoting a former Minnesota Vikings quarterback (Joe Kapp) in a speech, but Luke pulled it off. He spread a great message of thankfulness for the rare opportunity he and the other student-athletes have to play college football and earn a degree from a prestigious university. It was terrific.

I later asked Luke what the experience was like. He said it was an honor and that it was special being up there representing the other student-athletes and being among all the head coaches (one of whom even sent Luke a nice note afterward).

Moments like watching Luke Swan at that luncheon help keep me coming to work every day. We have so many special student-athletes here. It's definitely one of the perks of the job to work with and get to know some of them.

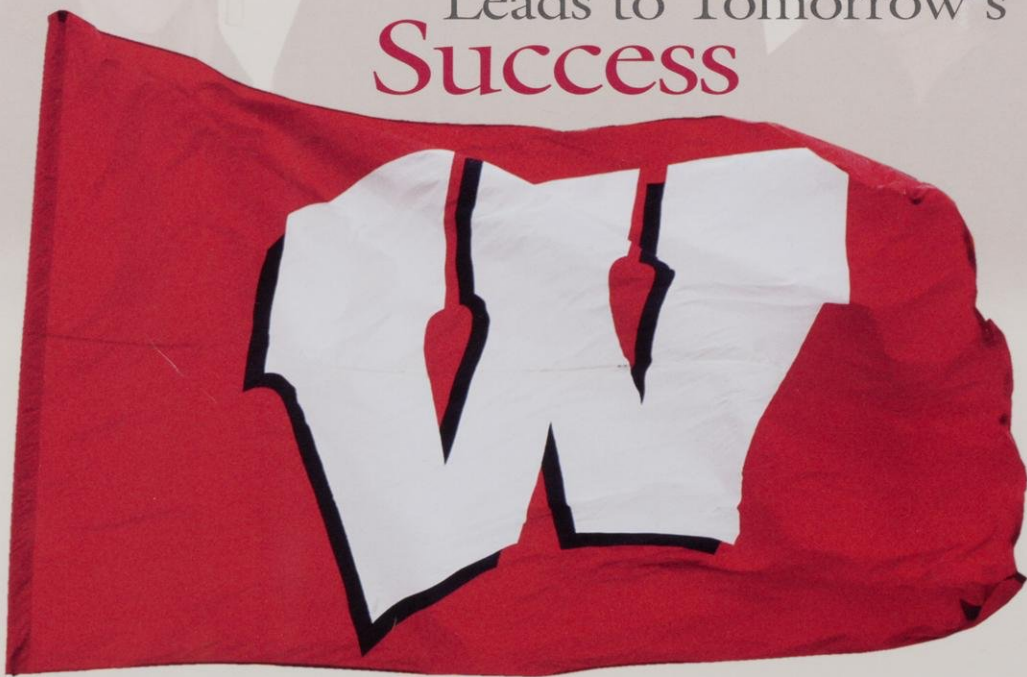
