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
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

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

In the history of Racine County, Wisconsin, the village of Waterford dates from 1836 when Levi Barnes and Samuel Chapman staked their claims here under a land grant by President Buchanan, the former taking the east side of the river and the latter, the west side. The double row of sections of Main Street (Courtesy of Curtis Barnes, the fifth generation) is Waterford Before the Flood of 1881. That was the wooden bridge looking toward the east side of town with Klunefort's cooper shop (for making barrels) where the Heck building now stands. The bridge floated down the river when the dam burst and caused the Flood of 1881. Grass grew in the streets at the corner of Main and Second Streets. Before Main Street was filled, it was low in front of the Palmer House (a department store near the bridge) and Thiegs's Shoe Shop where cowhide boots were made by hand. The Fox River Hotel, run by Clausen and Moulsen, was a lively place. The kerosene street lamp in front illuminated it at night. At the Gamble Store corner was Pete Jacobson's Store, then Wm. Plucker's Tavern, Frank Laphan's Implement Shop, Slip Stange's Barber Shop, Schenkenberg's Harness Shop, Sander's Store, Thiegs's Shoe Shop, and the Palmer House. The original buildings are still intact at the corner of Main and River Streets. The Rochester Academy (Courtesy of George Ela) dates from 1843.




OUR PRINCIPAL



Juniors Display Histrionic Talent in Traditional Play . . .




Projector Club



Bob LaCombe set the pace with a sizzling 17 points. Two days later Lutheran had its revenge 33-19.

In the conference opener our old rivals, the Aggies, jolted our hopes for the championship by handing us a 33-23 defeat. However, Waterford bounced back the following week by tripping Mukwonago 31-26. Johnny Greil split the hoop for 15 points. Our hopes rose again when we nosed out Union Grove 22-19.

The upset came when the lowly-rated, but fast-improving, Norris Farm "5" dealt us a 35-27 defeat. LaCombe was on again for 12 points.

Our next conquest took us to East Troy where the Trojans, armed with Verick, successfully defended their winning streak. Verick, with his 24 points led his team to a 44-35 triumph.

After Christmas we resumed the conference race in a closely-contested game with the championship-bound Wilmot "Panthers". Lady Luck favored Wilmot with a 32-28 victory.

The following week St. Mary's came to town and suffered a 38-24 defeat. Waterford's scoring was evenly distributed with Greil, Rintelmann, and Halbach each netting 10 points. Essman hit for six.

Rochester, in mad pursuit after Wilmot for the conference lead, took Waterford in stride 43-30.

The Waterford-Mukwonago return engagement proved to be a real test. With Rintelmann and Greil sharing honors with 10 points apiece, Waterford managed to eke out a 38-37 win and retain its hold on third place.

Union Grove tumbled next, 37-32. It was Dave Halbach's night to shine with a lucky 13 points.

With Johnny Greil driving in for 17 "big" points and LaCombe supporting him with 14, Waterford emerged a 42-31 victor over Norris.

Our second meeting with East Troy at Waterford had fans on edge throughout. Determined to avenge an earlier defeat at the hands of the Trojans, the Wolverines fought hard to maintain a slight lead until the late moments of the game. With a last desperate rally East Troy surged ahead to win 37-31.

Waterford journeyed to Wilmot for its last conference game. Despite Wilmot's home floor advantage, Waterford's aggressive play threatened Wilmot's chances for the undisputed championship. With three minutes remaining and the score 27-23, Johnny Greil received his last personal foul. The scales were tipped and Wilmot went on to win 37-31.

In conference standings the Mingstmen ranked fourth with 5 wins and 7 defeats.

Under a new arrangement Waterford and East Troy were hosts to tournament teams. Four teams participated in each meet, with the (two) winners of each, meeting at Waterford for the District Tournament championship.

In tournament competition Waterford crushed Pewaukee 39-19, but suffered its bitterest defeat at the hands of the Aggies 23-20—bitter because the winner would play for the championship the following night.

Hartland, the East Troy winner, more than matched the Aggies with a 40-23 barrage.




