Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Steiger, recommendation No. 1 listed under Degrees was adopted.

In presenting to the Regents the recommendation for the acceptance of '+s and grants, President Fred called attention to Items (oo) through (ss) listed Gifts on page 7 of EXHIBIT A, pointing out that these gifts were made under a 'y adopted by a number of donors of granting an unrestricted gift for general purposes in connection with each scholarship awarded directly by the 'udents attending the University. President Fred also called particular Item (tt) listed under Gifts on page 8 of EXHIBIT A, covering a gift of al plastic greenhouse, and pointed out that the acceptance of this gift oproval of its location near the present northeast corner of the Walnhouse range.

Nanvig inquired regarding the extent to which student loan funds

are being used, and whether the University has any promotional activities to publicize the availability of these funds. President Gelatt pointed out that this subject had previously been discussed by the Educational Committee, but that Vice President Little could furnish information on it. Vice President Little reported that at present the student loan funds are not utilized to any great extent by the students as a major source of financing for their college educations, but that these funds are being used primarily to provide emergency financial relief. He stated that part of the work being undertaken by Mr. Andrews, the recently appointed Assistant to the Director of Admissions, includes a study of the possibility of developing greater use of the student loan funds. Regent Wanvig suggested that more students could be encouraged to make use of the student loan funds on a purely business basis, since the earlier completion of their college programs would lengthen their subsequent years of employment at higher levels of earnings.

Vice President Baldwin presented a recommendation for the acceptance of an anonymous gift for the establishment of the Guy M. Sundt Memorial Scholarship. Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was

VOTED, That the sum of \$500 presented by an anonymous giver to create the award of the Guy M. Sundt Memorial Scholarship for the 1955-56 academic year be accepted; that additional amounts from other donors be accepted from time to time; that one or more awards be made each year, in accordance with the statement of terms and conditions, dated November 12, 1955, (copy attached), with the amounts to be determined upon the recommendation of a special committee appointed by the President of the University, to outstanding students in attendance at the University, or contemplating attendance at the University, who have demonstrated their ability to produce a high grade of scholarship, and whose character, achievements, and leadership are representative of those superior qualities identified with the late Guy M. Sundt.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That the gifts and grants listed in EXHIBIT A, attached, be accepted; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreements.

Regent Watson moved, and Regent Werner seconded the motion to approve, ratify and confirm the Actions by the President, since the October 1, 1955, meeting of the Board of Regents, covering resignations and terminations, appointments, leaves of absence, changes in status or salary of personnel, and resignations to accept other U.W. appointments (EXHIBIT B attached).

Regent Wanvig stated that, as he understood it, the By-Laws of the Regents only required the President of the University to report to the Regents on appointments of faculty with rank of associate professor and above; and that, therefore, if the President would limit the report of actions taken to those items, the Regents would not have so many items to consider. Regent Wanvig made the following recommendation and moved its adoption:

That the President limit his report of changes, leaves of absence, etc. (Report of Actions Taken by the President) to those individuals having the rank of associate professor and above.

(Cont.)

There was no second to Regent Wanvig's motion.

Vice President Peterson explained the procedures relating to the approval of staff matters, pointing out that there are two types of employees - (1) the civil service employees, who are subject to the State Civil Service Law, and (2) the faculty and other employees who are in the unclassified service. The appointment of all individuals in the unclassified service are subject to the approval of the Regents. Prior to 1940 each and every appointment in the unclassified service was acted upon by the Regents in formal resolutions. The possibility was considered at that time of discontinuing submitting all of the staff changes in the unclassified service to the Regents for specific approval, but the Attorney General's Office stated that, under the Wisconsin Statutes, all appointments had to be reported to and confirmed by the Regents. Consequently, the present method of submitting to the Regents a report of actions taken by the President was developed. There was further discussion of the form of the report of actions taken by the President, with Regent Wanvig suggesting that the report be revised to include all of the staff members with the same rank in the same part in the report. He thought that the Regents pass over this report of actions taken by the President with very little consideration. Other Regents expressed their opinions to the effect that the report was satisfactory in the present form; and it was pointed out that the Report of Actions Taken by the President is mailed to each Regent in advance of the meeting and the Regents have ample opportunity to study it. It was also pointed out that, in accordance with the By-Laws of the Regents, personnel recommendations for individuals with rank of associate professor and above are presented to the Educational Committee of the Regents for consideration and recommendation to the Board, and that all other personnel items in the unclassified service are included in the Report of Actions Taken by the President.

The question on the above motion for the approval of the Report of Actions Taken by the President was put, and it was voted.

Vice President Peterson presented the report of the Vice President of Business and Finance.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That the Reports of Actions Taken numbered I and II, listed under the Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT C attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That Item No. III., 1. and 2., Miscellaneous, listed under the Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT C attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That Item No. IV., 1. and 2., Construction Contract Awards, listed under the Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT C attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

The Vice President of Business and Finance presented a report of actions taken by the State Building Commission affecting the University (see V. Actions by the State Building Commission Affecting the University, Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance, EXHIBIT C attached).

The Vice President of Business and Finance presented a report of the results of the special events parking (see VI. Report on Special Events Parking, Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance, EXHIBIT C attached).

The Vice President of Business and Finance presented the report of budget transfers for October, 1955, for the information of the Regents. (See Exhibit D appended to EXHIBIT C attached)

In accordance with the provisions of Section 36.34(4), Wisconsin Statutes of 1953, the Secretary reported, for filing as a matter of record in the minutes of this meeting, the formal Action No. 3 of the Regents in executive session on September 9, 1955, relating to the purchase of agricultural lands (EXHIBIT \underline{E} attached).

Regent Laird presented the report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be adopted:

1. That the bequests by the late Evangeline Kohler of Sheboygan, Wisconsin, to The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, in the amounts of \$2,500 each, to be added to the Walter J. Kohler Student Loan Fund (Cont.)

and to the Marie Christine Kohler Student Loan Fund, be accepted by The Regents of The University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Evangeline Kohler, Deceased; and that the Secretary be authorized to sign receipts on behalf of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin for these bequests.

- 2. That the bequest of \$1,000 by the late Ruth Marshall of Wisconsin Dells be accepted by The Regents of The University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Ruth Marshall, Deceased; that the Secretary be authorized to accept and sign receipts for this bequest in the name of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin; and that this bequest be used to establish the Student Financial Aid Fund (Fund 47-2109) to be administered under the following terms and conditions:
 - (1) The Student Financial Aid Fund shall be credited with moneys which are received by the University for the general purpose of financial aid to students, and for which no specified scholarship or loan fund is designated in the gift, bequest, or will.
 - (2) The Student Financial Aid Fund shall be used to extend the scope and flexibility of the University's program of financial assistance to needy and deserving students in all schools and colleges of the University, under general policies to be established by the University Committee on Loans and Undergraduate Scholarships.
 - (3) This fund is to be used primarily to assist students who urgently need and deserve financial assistance, and whom it may not be possible to help through the University's normal program of scholarships, loans, or other student financial aid resources.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Committee on The Humanistic Foundation of the University of Wisconsin, to pay part of the cost of two mosaics to be located at the ends of the corridor adjacent to the auditorium in the School of Commerce Building, \$1,000 be allotted from The Humanistic Foundation of the University of Wisconsin (Trust Fund), which was established by the bequest of the late Howard L. Smith

Regent Laird moved the adoption of the following recommendation of the Educational Committee, and the motion was seconded by Regent Steiger: (Cont.)

That The Regents of The University of Wisconsin approve the request of Marathon County for the continued operation of the University Extension Center in Wausau under existing policies in an additional building to be provided by Marathon County pursuant to Section 59.08(50), Wisconsin Statutes.

The question was raised as to whether the Regents, by adopting the above recommendation, would be assuming responsibility of continuing extension centers of this kind indefinitely. It was pointed out that the only reason for the presentation of this recommendation was to comply with the statutory provision enacted by the 1955 Legislature, which requires approval by the Regents for the operation of extension center facilities provided by counties. There was agreement that the Regents cannot guarantee how long they can continue to operate various extension centers, since the continued operation of the extension centers would be subject to the actions by subsequent Boards of Regents of the University, by the Legislature, and by other agencies of the state government possessing power to take such actions. It was further agreed that the University administration, in transmitting this action to Marathon County, would clarify this point accordingly.

The question was put on the above motion, and it was voted unanimously.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be adopted:

- 1. That Carl R. Oestreich, Associate Professor of Civil Engineering and Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, Milwaukee Extension Center, be granted leave of absence, without pay, for the period November 1, 1955 to January 31, 1956.
- 2. That the resignation of William J. Rundle, Associate Professor of Mining and Metallurgy, be accepted; to take effect November 24, 1955.
- 3. That E. R. Shorey, Professor Emeritus of Mining and Metallurgy, be employed on a special service contract, from November 28, 1955, to the end of the first semester of 1955-56, on a part-time basis; salary at the rate of \$6,250 on the academic basis; charge to the unused balance on salary of William J. Rundle, resigned.

Regent Laird moved the adoption of the following recommendations of the Educational Committee, and the motion was seconded by Regent Steiger: (Cont.)

- 1. That, upon recommendation of the Athletic Board and the President of the University, Ivan B. Williamson be appointed Professor and Director of Intercollegiate Athletics, effective December 1, 1955, at an annual salary of \$13,500.
- 2. That, upon recommendation of the Athletic Board and the President of the University, Milton Bruhn be appointed Assistant Professor and Head Football Coach, effective January 1, 1956, at an annual salary of \$12,000.

Regent Renk made the following statement:

"This marks the end of a golden era in Wisconsin athletics and the dawn of a bright new era. Under the beloved Guy Sundt and under Ivy Williamson our University of Wisconsin achieved a national reputation - national honors. Under our new Director, Ivy Williamson, and Football Coach Milt Bruhn, I am sure we will continue this great tradition and achieve even greater heights. We are very fortunate in having such an outstanding athletic department to complement our educational colleges in the University. This makes us a great and a balanced University of Wisconsin."

The question was put on the above motion, and it was voted unanimously.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, approval be given to the location of the Home Economics Pre-School Laboratory, northwest of the Home Management House and northeast of Agricultural Hall, as shown on the plans dated September 1955, at an estimated cost of \$125,000, chargeable to the allotment approved by the State Building Commission for that purpose; and that authority be granted for the preparation of preliminary plans and specifications.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the President of the University be authorized to appoint a committee of administrative officers and faculty, broadly representative of the University at Madison and at the University Extension Center in Milwaukee, for the purpose of making a preliminary study of the plan, policies and procedures for the merging of the University Extension Center in Milwaukee and the Milwaukee State College into a single institution of higher learning, which shall be operated as an

integral part of the University of Wisconsin; and that this committee be authorized to cooperate with a committee representing the Milwaukee State College, if requested by the Board of Regents of State Colleges or by the Coordinating Committee for State Supported Institutions of Higher Education.

Regent Jones presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

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Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That the Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt, on behalf of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, acknowledging receipt in full payment of the distributive share of the Estate of Henry H. Must, Deceased, assigned to the said Regents by the Sole Heir, and acknowledging that said distribution is made in advance of final audit of Federal Estate Tax Return of said estate, and of Federal Income Tax Returns of said deceased and said estate, and agreeing, in the event that a claim is made against the administrator for any deficiency in such taxes, or either of them, to pay 65% of any such deficiency on demand, and to hold the administrator harmless on account thereof, provided that the liability thereby assumed by said Regents shall be limited to the amount of said distributive share of said estate received by said Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That approval be given to the award of the following alternates by change order additions to the contract with J. P. Cullen and Son for the general construction work on the Addition to Birge Hall, chargeable to the Contingent item in the Schedule of Costs:

Alternate #11 - Ceramic tile \$8,500
Alternate #12 - Painting 10,300
Alternate #14 - Floor covering 6,600

TOTAL \$25,400.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That pursuant to authority granted by Wisconsin Statutes, \$100,000 be declared as surplus, not needed for the ensuing year, in the 20.830(45) Revolving Appropriation for Intercollegiate Athletics, formerly 20.41(5c), and that the said sum be transferred to 20.830(50) Revolving Fund Surplus, formerly 20.41(11), and be disbursed therefrom to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation to provide a

part of the funds needed to finance the construction of the Camp Randall Memorial (Indoor Practice Building). (The above \$100,000 is in addition to the amounts of \$900,000 and \$100,000 previously declared surplus for this purpose by Regent Actions of September 25, 1954, and September 10, 1955, respectively. The balance of \$400,000 required for this project, with a total estimated cost of \$1,500,000, is to be borrowed by Wisconsin University Building Corporation.)

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That upon the recommendation of the State Director of Purchases, the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a contract with the W. M. Welch Manufacturing Company, Chicago, Illinois, for University diplomas required during the period October 1, 1955 to October 1, 1957, at a unit cost of thirty-six cents per diploma.

Regent Jones moved the adoption of the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee, and Regent Steiger seconded the motion:

That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, authority be given for the preparation of preliminary plans and specifications for a Law-Sociology Building to be located on the site of the present Law Building and immediately contiguous land.

Regent Watson inquired whether that part of the campus would become more congested as a result of this construction; and he was advised that it would. In answer to an inquiry as to why he asked that question, Regent Watson replied that it was because we have reached the point, or are approaching it, when we will have destroyed the beauty of the campus. He suggested that the Regents ask the University Campus Planning Commission to advise this Board very frankly and candidly how much further building can be done without destroying the beauty and utility of the campus.

Regent Laird remarked on the arrangement of the Law School Building and dormitories for law students in the form of a quadrangle at the University of Michigan.

Regent Jones reported that the Business and Finance Committee was very interested to hear of the suggestion by Mr. Hagenah that the Law School Building should be constructed on the lower campus mall as a part of the plan for that area envisioned by Mr. Hagenah some years previously and approved in principle by the University Campus Planning Commission and the Regents. He indicated that there might be merit in having a Law Quadrangle as described by Regent Laird. It was suggested that it would be possible to construct Law School dormitories on the proposed lower campus mall, which would place them only a relatively short distance from the Law School Building.

(Cont.)

Regent Jones indicated that he was deeply impressed by the suggestions by Mr. Hagenah, Regent Laird and Regent Watson, and that he would be happy to withhold this recommendation if the Regents wanted to ask the University Campus Planning Commission to make a further study of this recommendation. The other members of the Business and Finance Committee agreed to withhold this recommendation, and the motion and the second were withdrawn.

Regent Steiger displayed a map of the Michigan State campus, and remarked that we already may have ruined our beautiful campus.

Regent Wanvig suggested that the University Campus Planning Commission be asked to act on this matter as promptly as possible.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the University Campus Planning Commission be requested to restudy the question of the location of the Law-Sociology Building and to report to the Regents as soon as possible.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, authority be given for the preparation of preliminary plans and specifications for a new heating plant to be located in the block bounded by Mills, Charter, Dayton and Spring Streets.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, authority be given to continue the planning work on the Poultry Research Building and the Genetics Barn at a site east of the Seeds Building in approximately the arrangement presented in the preliminary sketches, it being understood that this will include exploration of the possibility of providing masonry in the facing portions of these structures.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That the contract for the installation of a new 8-inch water main from the Engineering campus to the Stadium be awarded, on the basis of the low bid in the amount of \$3,816.00, to Garrett Construction Company, Inc., Madison, chargeable to the Intercollegiate Athletic Revolving Fund; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contract.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That, subject to the approval of the Governor, the purchase of the following described property to provide a site for the new observatory, from Joseph E. and Ruth Solvie, Mt. Horeb, Wisconsin, for a consideration of \$4,000, chargeable to gift funds appropriated by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation, be approved in accordance with the option dated September 6, 1955, and amended November 2, 1955:

The southeast quarter of the southwest quarter of Section 16, Township 7 North, Range 7 East, Township of Cross Plains, Dane County, Wisconsin, containing forty acres, more or less.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the resolutions adopted by the Executive Committee (Exhibit F, attached), relating to the construction, financing, schedule of costs, and award of contracts of the Harvey Street Apartments (Married Student Apartments), be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign, on behalf of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, a petition for a parking lot to be operated on North Frances Street by the Delta Upsilon Fraternity.

Regent Jones moved the adoption of the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee, and the motion was seconded by Regent Steiger:

That the operation of the East Hill Trailer Camp be continued until September 1, 1957, and that all present and prospective tenants be notified that the Camp definitely will be closed at that time.

The Secretary reported that a letter had been received, after the meeting of the Business and Finance Committee of the Regents at which the above recommendation was approved for presentation to the Board, from the President of the Wisconsin Student Association, quoting a resolution passed by the Student Senate on November 8, 1955, requesting that the Regents take no action to close the East Hill Trailer Camp until such time as a study of possible alternatives has been made. The Secretary read that letter dated November 8, 1955 (copy on file).

The question on the above motion was put, and it was voted unanimously.

Upon the request of Regent Rennebohm, Chairman, Regent Renk presented the report of the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Lands.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance, with the advice of legal counsel, be authorized to exercise the option and complete the purchase of the following agricultural lands for the use of the College of Agriculture, in accordance with the terms of the option:

80 acres, more or less, in the Township of Leeds, Columbia County, to be purchased from Cormel Swalheim and Doris Swalheim, his wife, for a consideration of \$24,000.

The option on this property expires on November 16, 1955, and provides for a down payment of \$10,000 on December 15, 1955; with the balance of \$14,000 to be paid, without interest, on March 1, 1956, which is the date of possession. The grantors have the option to remove yard fences and buildings, except the silo, prior to March 1, 1957.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That, in accordance with paragraph 7 of the Declaration of Covenants, Restrictions, and Easements of University Hill Farms Subdivision, approved by the Regents on September 10, 1955, the following individuals be appointed to comprise the Architectural Control Committee:

Professor Richard U. Ratcliff (Chairman), Professor G. William Longenecker, and Director A. F. Gallistel.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That acceptance of offers to purchase lots located in the plat of University Hill Farms may be executed on behalf of the Regents by John C. Haley and Sons, contract sales brokers for the said plat, in accordance with the approved sales prices.

Regent Wanvig reported that he had visited the University Hill Farms Subdivision, and that he wanted to commend the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Lands on what it has accomplished and on the wonderful job that it has done.

Regent Laird, reporting on behalf of the Special Regent Committee on Selection of Dean of Women, stated that there is a very active committee of citizens

working on this matter in an advisory capacity, preparing a list of qualifications and a list of names to be considered for this position. She reported that the Advisory Committee will soon have a report ready to submit to the Special Regent Committee.

President Gelatt stated that, since legislation has been enacted on the subject, the purpose of the Joint Regents' Special Committee on Coordination no longer exists and the committee should be discharged. Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Jones, it was

VOTED, That the Joint Regents' Special Committee on Coordination be discharged.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That, in addition to the assignment this Board gave in October regarding a study of the parking problems at the University, and in addition to the request made today for a restudy of the location of the Law-Sociology Building, the University Campus Planning Commission be asked to study how much more building can be done on the present campus without destroying the beauty and the utility of the campus.

Regent Rennebohm suggested that the study requested in the above action might also include a study of the removal of the second-growth timber and brush along the lake north of Bascom Hall and the construction of walks and buildings in that area. Regent Watson stated that he would be glad to have a study of that area included in the study contemplated by his motion.

Regent Wanvig reported that he had received a communication from the Wisconsin Hotel Association regarding the use of the Memorial Union facilities by outside organizations. Other Regents indicated that they had received similar communications, and it was reported that the Wisconsin Hotel Association had been fully advised by the University administration regarding this matter.

Regent Renk remarked that at this time the Regents have a feeling of sorrow at losing Dr. Arveson as a member of the Board, but at the same time have the pleasure of welcoming Mr. Jensen as a new member. Regent Renk paid the following tribute to Dr. Arveson:

"I would like to pay tribute to Dr. Arveson for the distinctive service he has given this Board. You liked him the minute you met him. He was a kindly man; a man of deep thought and wisdom. I thought of Dr. Arveson as a balance wheel on this Board - it seems when the debate waxed warm, when the air was tense, it was Dr. Arveson who, with his quiet humor, cut through that tension and brought us back to reality. It was an effort for Dr. Arveson to serve on this Board; it meant a lot of inconvenience for him; he lived many miles from here; and it took about three days of his time in order to attend a meeting. I think he liked to serve because he wanted to meet the challenge of leadership; and, gentlemen, I believe that this great University of Wisconsin and this state of Wisconsin are better because Dr. Arveson served here."

Regent Renk requested that his previous remarks be considered a part of the following resolution which he presented:

RESOLVED, That the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin express their deep gratitude and appreciation to Dr. R. G. Arveson for his outstanding services to this Board, and send him our continued good wishes.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Steiger, the above tribute to Dr. R. G. Arveson was adopted unanimously.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

- a. That the action adopted by the Regents on June 16, 1955, authorizing the investment of Anonymous and Knapp Funds principal in the Married Student Apartments project on the Cabin Courts site, and the action adopted by the Regents on October 1, 1955, approving the purchase of the University Cabin Camp property in the 2900 block of University Avenue, Madison, Wisconsin, from the Wisconsin University Building Corporation, be rescinded.
- b. That a mortgage loan of not to exceed "380,000 be authorized from the Anonymous and Knapp Funds principal to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation, at an interest rate of 1% per annum, with principal and interest to be amortized in 30 annual payments, for the financing of the Harvey Street Apartments, including the net cost to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation of refinancing its present indebtedness on the site of this project; with the understanding that the Wisconsin University Building Corporation shall refinance this loan, with a lender or lenders other than The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, as soon as it is possible and convenient to do so under no less favorable terms and conditions.
- c. That the following schedule of costs be approved for the Harvey Street Apartments project:

That, subject to the approval of the Governor and the State Chief Engineer, the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be authorized to award the contract for the construction of the Harvey Street Apartments (seven buildings containing 48 apartments) to Grant Kittle Builders, Inc., Madison, Wisconsin, in the amount of \$297,500.
- e. STATEMENT OF TERMS AND CONDITIONS

GUY M. SUNDT MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

November 12, 1955

There is hereby established the Guy M. Sundt Memorial Scholarship to be awarded to an outstanding student at the University of Wisconsin for the 1955-56 academic year and each succeeding year for which funds are available.

The awards are to be made on the basis of achievement and personal qualities which personified the life and work of Guy M. Sundt, who established an eminent record as student, athlete, athletic coach, and director of athletics at the University of Wisconsin.

Specific qualities to be considered are:

- 1) High scholarship
- 2) Good citizenship
- 3) Contribution to the welfare of the school and student body
- 4) Achievement in the competitive athletic program
- 5) Leadership in extracurricular activities.

It is the desire of the donor that a committee of three faculty members, selected by the President of the University, consider nominees and designate the winners of the award. Final designation of the award winners shall be made no later than May 30 of each academic year.

THE CURRENT CONFLICT IN HIGHER EDUCATION By Edwin B. Fred, President of the University of Wisconsin

America's institutions of higher education have helped, in great measure, to make our nation what it is today--world leader, free, peaceful, productive, and forward-looking.

On that point most people seem to agree. The institutions of higher education have won this approval by years of working together to answer the needs of our people and of the country. But today, when higher education itself faces the great challenge of a rapid and probably permanent rise in enrollments, educators are divided, and some have fallen to quarreling among themselves.

This lack of unity is causing dangerous delays in the important task of preparing for the enrollments ahead.

The difficulties center in real and imagined conflicts of interest between <u>privately financed</u> and <u>publicly supported</u> institutions. Thus far, most of the controversy has been between extremists, but an unhealthy undercover struggle evidently is building.

A number of educational leaders have made efforts to analyze the situation and work out a rational program of cooperation. My purpose is to summarize some of these and to suggest a program of unity.

There are two areas of what might be termed "real" conflict:

1. <u>Competition for students</u>. State-supported colleges and universities

have broadened their course offerings, improved their teaching, increased their scholarship and fellowship programs, kept fees relatively low, provided moderate-cost housing, made attempts to interest promising students, and have improved their public relations. These factors, combined with reluctance or inability on the part of some privately financed institutions to increase their enrollments at a time when more college-age students want higher education, have resulted in an increase in the proportion of students attending state-supported institutions. This trend has alarmed some who see its extension into the future when the heavy population bulge reaches college age.

2. Competition for funds. This problem has caused most of the

2. Competition for funds. This problem has caused most of the controversy. Inflation has seriously affected all of education because educational costs have risen faster than income. State institutions, with support provided on a somewhat current basis by legislatures, have not, in general, suffered as seriously as have rivate institutions which depend heavily upon essentially fixed endowments. But the advantage of the public institutions appears greater from the outside than it actually is. Pres. John A. Perkins of the University of Delaware points out that "private colleges, in pleading for the alleviation of their fiscal plight, have made it appear that institutions publicly supported are 'in the clover.'" He adds:

"Realistic appraisal of the situation indicates quite the opposite."
With war-built balances exhausted, legislators have been forced to raise taxes to take care of a backlog of postponed state building programs, increased demands for welfare expenditures, and the generally

higher costs of state government. Most state-supported institutions have fallen victim to "economy" drives by state legislatures, and have both curtailed programs and sought support elsewhere. It is this latter action—the search for private gifts and grants—which has brought the two types of institutions into competition for funds.

Problems created by competition for students and funds have been intertwined. Some educators, concerned that the enrollment trend in favor of the statesupported institutions will destroy the healthy balance of American higher education, have suggested restricting the expansion of such institutions and have actually attempted to delay preparations for this expansion. One private university representative, concerned about the financial conflict, declared that "the taxpayers in each state should be continuously reminded of the high cost of public higher education and that beyond paying their taxes, they have no further obligations to this educational sector."

Pres. David D. henry of the University of Illinois, describing the lengths to which the controversy has grown, points out that it has led some to contend that private education is a competitive enterprise to be identified in spirit, philosophy, and economic interest with private business, while public education, since it is government-supported, is "socialistic" and is to be identified with the philosophy of a regimented economy. "Anyone familiar with American higher education knows it is false to represent public and private education as competitive doctrinaire agents in conflicting social and economic ideas," he answers. 3

Pres. Arthur G. Coons of Occidental College, in showing another direction the charges have turned, reports that some have sought to emphasize their own virtue by decrying "the Godless state university," forgetting that even though constitutional barriers may prevent or render impolitic formal instruction in religion in state colleges, "God is not without witness among all the thousands who administer and teach in state institutions."

Pres. Harlan Hatcher of the University of Michigan lists such other charges in this conflict as these: (1) The state-supported schools have low admission standards, (2) they recruit aggressively and competitively, (3) they charge token fees rather than full tuition charges, and (4) they offer scholarships at state expense to prospective freshmen with low scholastic records. With careful understatement he adds: "It is doubtful if these charges can be sustained." 5

There is less evidence in print of antagonism on the part of state institution partisans. Leaders of publicly-supported institutions make it clear, however, that such unfounded charges should be denied. There are also retaliatory suggestions which advocate reducing such governmental subsidies to private institutions as research grants to them and tax exemptions for their donors, their supporting foundations, and the private institutions themselves.

Because of their great reservoir of general support, the educational institutions of our nation, both private and public, have the strength to harm each other with such charges. My point is that they should use this strength to help each other. My suggestions for such mutual aid are these:

- 1. End the quarreling. All of our institutions have weaknesses we could remedy if we concentrated on improving ourselves instead of attacking other institutions. Higher education cannot afford to attempt to silence constructive criticism—its response to public desires and needs has made it what it is. However, unfair and untrue remarks about other institutions or other types of institutions demonstrate ignorance and envy, undermine public confidence in education generally, and show a lack of scholarly thinking.
- 2. Strive to improve public awareness of the problems facing all of higher education. The American people have great faith in higher education and a tradition of supporting institutions in which they have faith. The public cannot know the needs of higher education unless these needs are outlined clearly and simply, and stripped of the conflict and confusion which bickering causes. America's institutions of higher education, regardless of their means of support, depend heavily upon each other for freedom, faculty, and for standards. Each college or university is handicapped by the weaknesses of other institutions. Improvement in the status of any institution is help to all the others.
- 3. Develop orderly procedures for counselling prospective students to replace present recruiting. No institution can claim to be the best for all students, yet there are particular types of institutions which would seem to be best for each individual student. Publications for prospective students which have emotional rather than intellectual appeals, and which make unsubstantiated claims and offer questionable inducements, confuse rather than counsel prospective students and their parents. It is important that a greater percentage of our most able young people attend college or university.

The need for well-educated people was never greater. Recruiting costs for colleges, and confusion for prospective students can both be reduced. if recruiting practices emphasize cooperative programs aimed at helping young people make intelligent choices about college or university plans. 4. Support each other in fund-raising. In unity there is strength, and every ounce of strength is needed if the enrollment challenge is to be met. There is probably not an institution of higher education in our nation which could not make productive use of more funds. When private institutions begin their fund drives, the voice of a public institution leader lending full support to the effort is effective. Similarly, the needs of a state-supported institution before a legislative body often are effectively spoken by the leader of a privately financed institution in the state. America's community of scholars has built a long tradition of cooperative work in many fields, cutting across the limiting precincts of institution, state line, and even international barriers. This cooperation can be carried into the fund-raising field with similar effectiveness. Where it has been tried, it has been successful.

5. Encourage gifts which are self-supporting. One of the unfortunate aspects of philanthropy is that it actually can become a burden upon those whom it seeks to benefit. The federal government, and more recently foundations and corporations, have grown aware that grants-in-aid for research create institutional costs for space, facilities, and utilities which are not covered by the grants. The remedy has been the inclusion in such grants of an "overhead costs" item which is calculated to meet the extra costs the project imposes upon an institution. The provision of scholarships by private donors is a popular form of philanthropy and probably will grow in appeal as enrollments increase.

But these scholarships, too, can be much less than a blessing for the institution, since the student fee and tuition in both private and public institutions usually is considerably below the actual cost of education. My suggestion to donors, then, is to provide, with scholarships, funds sufficient to meet this difference between actual educational costs and student charges. This would relieve the pressure on the endowments of privately financed institutions and reduce the pressure for the state to subsidize the education of scholarship students in the public institutions.

6. Cooperate in the development of all educational institutions. Neither the state institutions nor the private ones deserve sole credit for preserving the American way of life and the free educational system it sustains. Many institutions, both privately and publicly supported, are making unique contributions today, and promise even greater things in the future. Some of the private institutions offer liberal arts studies in a way no state institution would attempt. Some state institutions offer professional training that the liberal arts colleges would not attempt. Despite these differences, all of the higher educational institutions seek the same general objectives, and face similar problems. As others have pointed out, 6 it is sometimes difficult to draw a definite line between what is a privately supported institution, what is publicly supported. I firmly believe that much of the success of American education can be credited to the diversity and balance of our educational structure. Let us develop both privately and publicly supported institutions and maintain the balance through cooperation.

SUMMARY OF REMARKS BY DEAN BOWERS AT THE INFORMAL CONFERENCE PRECEDING THE MEETING OF THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN ON NOVEMBER 12, 1955

At the invitation of President Fred, Dean Bowers reported briefly on the programs and operation of the University Medical School and the University Hospitals. He pointed out that these institutions constituted what is referred to as a Medical Center and include the Medical School, the School of Nursing, the University Hospitals, the State Hygienic Laboratory, the Student Health Service, and a variety of educational institutes. In commenting on the kinds of educational programs carried out, he gave statistics on enrollments and the numbers of persons trained or graduated currently in the various programs. These included the granting of seventy-five M.D. degrees, the enrollment of three hundred and seventy-five physicians from Wisconsin who carried some postgraduate work in the Medical School, the training of forty-two residents in various specialties, the training of thirty-one occupational therapists, and the graduation of twenty-eight nurses. Dean Bowers stated that questions to be answered for the future are the number of nurses that should be trained here, what their training should include, how the nursing program should be related to the extension and public service programs in the state, and how a program should be developed to offer graduate training for nurses. Training was provided for twenty-six physical therapists, twenty-three medical technologists, and seventeen interns, with almost all of the latter coming from outside of Wisconsin, since the graduates of the University Medical School leave the Wisconsin General Hospital for internships in other hospitals in the state and outside of Wisconsin. Training was provided for thirteen candidates for the Ph.D. degree, and Dean Bowers pointed out that we produce a large number of medical school teachers. Training was also provided for twelve x-ray technicians and eleven dietitians.

Dean Bowers pointed out that the training of doctors is a subject constantly under debate, particularly as to whether a good job is being done and whether the number of doctors being graduated is adequate. As to whether the number of physicians in Wisconsin is adequate, he reported that there was one physician for every thousand persons in Wisconsin, which is just under the national average of approximately one physician for approximately each nine hundred and eighty persons. He reported that when the Addition to the Memorial Institutes, which is under construction, is completed, the number of medical students graduating each year is expected to increase to ninety from the present seventy-five. He indicated that the anticipated maximum of medical students to be graduated annually should be not more than one hundred, since, when the number goes over one hundred, the efficiency of training and the quality of the product decreases.

In commenting on the method of selecting students for admission to the University Medical School, Dean Bowers reported that in the past the policy has been to pick candidates for enrollment on the basis of scholarship, since the best single basis for selection is the kind of scholastic record the individual has made in college. He reported that it has been decided to consider other factors in connection with selecting students for admission to the Medical School, including what kind of an individual he is, whether he possesses the qualities of good citizenship, the opinions of his pre-medical advisers and professors, what his abilities are other than to pound out good grades, etc. To that end, the Medical School plans to maintain closer cooperation with the College of Letters and Science and with other
