Acting President Dykstra brought up the matter of the appointment of Ernest Schwartztrauber as Director of the School for Workers in Industry for 1937-38 at a salary of \$3300 and the appointment of Miss Alice Shoemaker as Assistant Director at a salary of \$2750. Upon motion

of Regent Gates, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That the matter be referred to the Educational Committee. (See page 23)

Acting President Dykstra presented the budget for summer service in the College of Agriculture, amounting to \$59,516. Upon motion of Regent Gates, seconded by Regent Christopherson, it was approved, with the understanding that next year it will be referred to the Educational Committee for consideration before action is taken.

Acting President Dykstra presented a letter from Thomas Jones oin regard to living quarters for graduate students. The matter was referred to the Committee on Student Life and General Welfare.

The matter of the condition of the basement in the Agricultural Chemistry Building was referred to the Committee on Student Life and General Welfare.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Glover, it

VOTED, That the correspondence between Dean Fred and the General Education Board be made a part of the records of this meeting and the communications filed with the Secretary.

Acting President Dykstra read his report to the Regents on the case of William Card. Action was postponed to Saturday morning, June 19, as Professor W. G. Rice, Jr., had asked to be heard before action was taken. (See page 15)

Acting President Dykstra made a report on the <u>Gundersen resolution</u> in re members of the faculty serving as expert witnesses in civil cases. (Copy on file.) Upon motion of Regent Brown, seconded by Regent Gates, it was

VOTED, That the report be approved.

Acting President Dykstra brought up the matter of the Florence Porter Robinson will and explained that the Attorney General's office had held that the Regents could not overrule their former action accepting the bequest. Regent Grady moved, seconded by Regent Gates, that the action of the Board accepting the bequest be reconsidered. Called vote was taken. Regents voting "Aye", Brown, Christopherson, Combs, Gates, Grady, Hones, Runge (7). Regents voting "No", Callahan, Glover, Wilkie (3). Motion carried.

Regent Gates then moved, seconded by Regent Grady, that the bequest be rejected. Called vote was taken. Regents voting "Aye", Brown, Christopherson, Combs, Gates, Grady, Hones, Miller, Runge (8). Regents voting "No", Callahan, Glover, Wilkie (3). Motion carried.

Upon motion of Regent Gates it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn to 11 A.M. Saturday, June 19, with the understanding that the Educational Committee and the Business Committee would meet at 9 A.M. Saturday.

At the request of Regent Grady, Chairman of the Committee on Student Life and General Welfare, action on matters referred to that committee was postponed to the next meeting of the Board.

ABSENT: Regents Backus, Christopherson, Mead, Richards.

Professor W. G. Rice, Jr., and Professor Walter R. Agard were present to discuss the case of William Card. Professor Rice read a statement which he had prepared and Professor Agard made a statement. After considerable discussion it was moved by Regent Gates, seconded by Regent Glover, that the conclusions of the Acting President in his report be approved and that his recommendation be confirmed, which in turn confirms the action of the Dean. Called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye". Motion carried.

Regents Brown, Callahan, Grady and Hones explained their votes

by stating that they were sustaining the recommendation of the Acting President but felt that a further investigation should be made on conditions in the English Department.

Upon motion of Regent Gates, seconded by Regent Glover, it

VOTED, That the Acting President and the Educational Committee be directed to study the matter of relationship in the junior and senior staff with the idea of bringing about an improvement in the existing condition and that such study be made a report at the next meeting of the Board.

Called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye".

It was stated that Mr. Card wished to be heard and upon motion of Regent Glover, it was VOTED, That he be heard at 1:30 P.M.

Regent Gates reported for the Business Committee on their recommendations of projects to be submitted to the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works and moved that application be made for a grant to aid in construction of women's dormitories, in the amount of \$500,000. Called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye".

Regent Gates moved, seconded by Regent Callahan, that an amended application be made for a grant of \$750,000 to aid in the construction of an addition to the Memorial Union. Called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye".

Regent Callahan moved that application be made for a grant of \$445,000 for additional library facilities. Called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye".

Regent Gates, seconded by Regent Brown, moved that an application be made for a grant of \$300,000 to aid in the construction of an addition to the University Extension Building in Milwaukee. Called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye".

Regent Gates then presented the following resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Regent Glover:

WHEREAS, The Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin did, on September 23, 1935, file an application with the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works for federal grants amounting to 45 per cent of the cost of con-

struction, to aid in constructing said buildings and equipments; and

WHEREAS, the said application was reported by the Public Works Administration to have been approved by all examining divisions and to have been placed on a list of projects eligible for PWA allotments; and

WHEREAS, this Board now finds it advisable to amend the said application to request additional grants to aid in the construction of the Memorial Union Building as amended, construction of women's dormitories, additional library facilities, and an addition to the University Extension Building in Milwaukee; and

WHEREAS, the enactment and publication of Chapter 241, Laws of Wisconsin, 1937, has provided a legal means of raising the state's necessary share in constructing said buildings and equipments, and the enactment and publication of Chapter 181 of the Laws of Wisconsin, 1937, has among other things made necessary appropriation to this Board of Regents for building purposes; and whereas, the enactment and publication of said laws makes it possible for an application for the said buildings and equipments to be considered by the Public Works Administration for allotment; and whereas, this Board has been awaiting the adoption of such legislation before filing its amended application for said buildings and equipments;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin that

- (1) J. D. Phillips, Business Manager of the University of Wisconsin, be authorized to amend the application already on file in the name of the State of Wisconsin by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin for grants to aid in the construction of the modified program for the construction of an addition to the Memorial Union Building and equipments, the construction of women's dormitories and equipments, additional library facilities, and an addition to the University Extension Building and equipments in Milwaukee;
 - (2) That J. D. Phillips, Business Manager of the University of Wisconsin, and Charles A. Halbert, Chief Engineer of the State of Wisconsin, be authorized and directed to furnish such additional information as the United States of America, through the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, may reasonably request

in connection with the amended application herein authorized to be filed.

Called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye" and the resolution was declared adopted.

At 2 P.M. William Card appeared before the Regents and made an oral statement. No action taken.

Regent Callahan presented the following recommendation of the Executive Committee:
