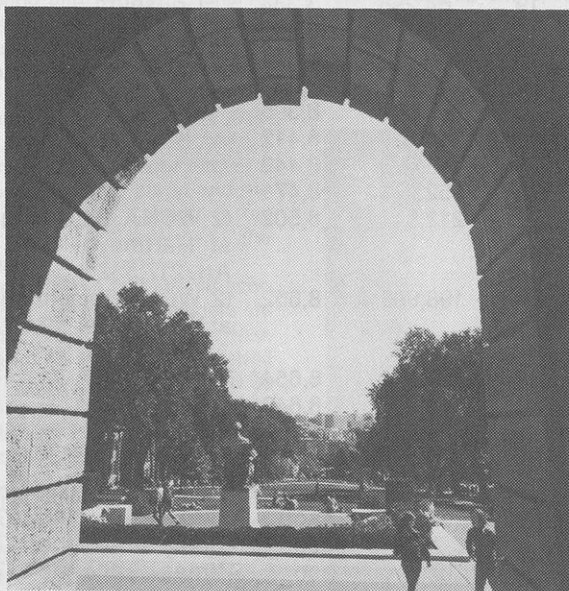

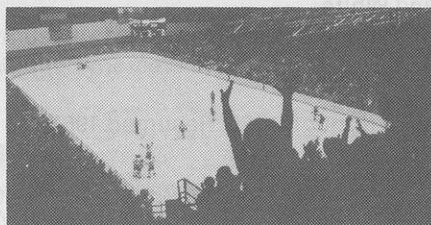

The DANE COUNTY MEMORIAL COLISEUM

Wisconsin plays its home games in the beautiful and spacious Dane County Memorial Coliseum. There are 8,000 theatre type seats and space for 662 additional seats and standing room making the capacity for hockey 8,662. It is the largest college hockey arena in the nation. The ice surface is regulation 85 x 200 feet.



RECORD ATTENDANCE

Wisconsin hockey has attracted record crowds to the Coliseum ever since the Badgers joined the Western Collegiate Hockey Ass'n in the 1969-70 season. Wisconsin fans have set college hockey attendance records for 9 consecutive seasons starting with 1970. The 1976-77 season total of 217,532 fans that saw 27 home games set an all-time collegiate record. The 1978-79 average attendance total of 8,654 is a school and collegiate record.

Wisconsin Hockey History

The "modern" era in Wisconsin hockey history began in March of 1962 when then-Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announced that the Badgers would return to intercollegiate hockey competition for the 1963-64 season—after a 28-year layoff.

Long-time Madison hockey backers John Riley and Art Thomsen coached the early Badger icers; and quickly formed a respectable hockey club. Wisconsin went on to post an 8-5-3 record in its first year, playing mainly teams from small colleges in Minnesota, Michigan and Illinois.

The following season the Badgers won 14 games and lost nine. That year, the Badger icemen, in an effort to upgrade the level of competition, added eight games against opponents from the Western Collegiate Hockey Conference (WCHA). They lost all eight.

Undaunted by their lack of success, the Badgers in 1965-66 scheduled six games against WCHA foes. True to form, they lost the first five; but the final margins were decidedly closer than they had been in the previous year: 3-2 to Colorado College, and 3-1 and 5-3 to Michigan State.

Then on the evening of February 22, 1966, it finally happened. The Badgers had battled back from a three-goal first-period deficit to pull even with the Minnesota Gophers at the end of regulation time, 4-4. Barely two minutes into the sudden-death overtime period, junior wing Jim Petruzates snared an errant Gopher pass and unmolested, fired a 20-foot slapshot past the sprawling Minnesota goalie. Wisconsin hockey had come of age.

John Riley retired as coach after the 1965-66 season and was replaced by 35-year-old Robert N. Johnson, a Minnesota native, a former professional baseball player and the hockey coach at Colorado College. In his first season, Johnson expanded the Wisconsin schedule to 26 games.

The following year, led by national scoring champion Bert DeHate, the Badgers improved their season mark to 21-10. DeHate, a sophomore from St. Paul, Minn., finished the year with 77 points on 47 goals and 30 assists, including seven hat tricks. A mid-term graduate in 1969-70, DeHate still ranks as one of Wisconsin's highest scorers.

Wisconsin's hockey fortunes continued to improve as the Badgers won 22, lost 10 and tied two in 1968-69, including, for the first time, a winning record (11-9-2) against WCHA competition. With his team's record to show, Bob Johnson began lobbying for

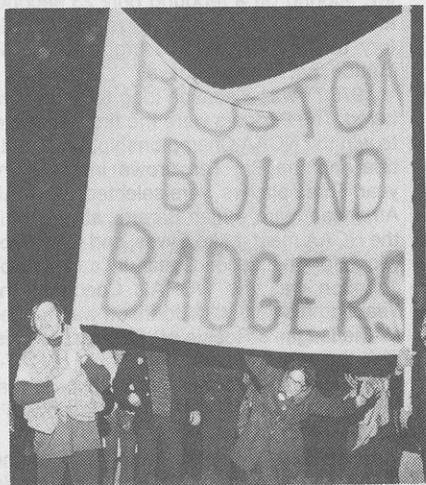
Wisconsin's admittance into the prestigious conference.

On March 30, 1969, the Badgers were admitted to the league, and quickly proved a worthy entry by placing fourth in the standings. All first-year teams previously had finished dead last. It was also the year the Badgers made their initial appearance at the NCAA Tournament in Lake Placid, N.Y. Led by the "Freshman Flyer" line of Max Bentley, Tim Dool and Norm Cherrey, the Badgers finished third in the tourney, and became recognized as a national power.

Following the tournament, defenseman John Jagger, from Sault St. Marie, Ontario, became Wisconsin's first hockey All-American.

In 1970-71, the Badgers again played well, finishing with a record of 20-13-1, but Wisconsin fans, who were packing the Dane County Coliseum in record numbers, had another goal in mind — a national championship. It was not to be that year — or the next, when Wisconsin again placed third at the national tournament.

With a blazing start in 1972-73, the Badgers won 10 of their first 11 contests. They finished 18-9-1 in league play and earned the right to travel to Boston for their third try at the NCAA title. In one of the most electrifying games in tournament history, Wisconsin beat semi-final opponent Cornell, 6-5 in sudden-death overtime. Sophomore Dean Talaious scored with five seconds left in regulation time, and with just 33 seconds left in the extra period, to send the Badgers into the championship game for the first time ever.



Although they fell behind league rival Denver early in the title game, the young Badgers were determined to leave Boston a winner. With workmanlike precision, the Cardinal and White came back to muster a 4-2 decision — and with it, the national championship.

The Badgers did not return to the NCAA meet until four seasons later. Those seasons were not failures by any stretch of the imagination. In 1973-74 the team finished with a fine 18-13-5 record and in '74-75 the Badgers won 24, lost 12 and tied 2 and Brian Engblom became the school's third All-American defenseman. Even during the 1975-76 season, when the Badgers suffered through their first losing season of the modern era, a young and inexperienced team made a late-season surge and moved from 10th to 7th place in the WCHA to make the play-offs.

The Badgers were determined to play in the NCAA meet in '77. They downed Colorado College and Minnesota in the first two rounds of the play-offs and then had to face Michigan in the WCHA's first play-off Championship series. Wisconsin had beaten the Wolverines 3 of 4 times during the regular season and once again the Badgers proved to be the better team by sweeping the total goal series 9-4.

Winning the NCAA meet for the second time was no easy task for the Badgers. It took two overtime victories in Detroit's Olympia Stadium before Wisconsin could claim its second title. In the first game against New Hampshire, it was Les Grauer and Mike Eaves who scored the tying and winning goals that enabled Wisconsin, once more, to play Michigan, this time for the NCAA Championship. Senior Steve Alley, scoring on a rebound only 23 seconds after the overtime began, gave the final victory to the Badgers and triggered a celebration that lasted for days.

1976-77 was a season long to be remembered. The Badgers were the first team ever to win the NCAA Championship, the WCHA title and the Big Ten crown in the same year. Three players were selected to the All-American team, Julian Baretta, also MVP in the NCAA meet, Mike Eaves, and Craig Norwich, for the second year in a row. Bob Johnson was the WCHA's Coach of the Year and his son Mark Johnson was tabbed as the league's Rookie of the Year. All this, plus the school's best record ever of 37-7-1 and a total of 18 other school records that were established, add up to Wisconsin's finest year in hockey.

The Badgers made a return trip to the NCAA tournament to defend their title in

1978, but lost both games and finished 4th in the nation. Mike Eaves, the Badger Captain for three years, ended his career as the school's all-time leading scorer. He was named to the All-American team for the second time, and, with Wisconsin's other All-American Mark Johnson, tied for the WCHA scoring title. Both Eaves and Johnson were named to every WCHA All-Star team.

The Badger fans got into the act when the city of Providence, RI, site of the NCAA '78 tournament, honored the 3,000 plus fans that made the trip by presenting them with a huge trophy. The trophy claimed the Badger fans as "The World's Greatest Hockey Fans."

In the 1978-79 season, the Badgers compiled a 25-13-3 record, which included a win over NCAA runner-up North Dakota and a four game split with NCAA champ Minnesota. A new record crowd saw the Badgers play as games at the Coliseum drew an average of 8,654 fans. 21 of the 23 home games were sell-outs. At one point, seventeen straight games (home and away) were sold out.

Mark Johnson finished second in the league scoring, missing the title by one point. He became the Badger's all-time leading goal scorer and moved up behind Mike Eaves in all-time scoring. He was chosen as the most valuable player in the WCHA and made every all-star team for the second year in a row. He was also named the College Hockey Player of the Year by Hockey News.

Despite the fact that the 1979-80 season was Coach Johnson's first losing season at Wisconsin, it did add to the list of All-Americans. Theran Welsh became the fifth Badger defenseman to be named to the All-American squad and Roy Schultz was an All-American goalie.

Bob Johnson

BOB JOHNSON WISCONSIN HOCKEY COACH

Bob Johnson is entering his 14th season as Wisconsin's head hockey coach. His career record at Wisconsin shows 305 wins, 150 defeats and 21 ties since taking over as head coach in 1966.

During the 1970's, five Wisconsin hockey teams made it to the NCAA tournament with the 1973 and 1977 teams capturing national titles. The 1970 and 1972 Wisconsin teams placed third, and the 1978 team was fourth in national competition.

Wisconsin won five Big Ten hockey titles in the 1970's.

Nine of Wisconsin's players under Johnson's coaching have been honored by being named to the All-American team twelve times.

Johnson was honored by his peers in 1977 by being named WCHA "Coach-of-the-Year." He coached the 1976 US Olympic Hockey team that placed 4th at Innsbruck.

Bob came to Wisconsin in April, 1966 after a three year head coaching stint at Colorado College.

The first three years at Wisconsin the Badgers operated as an independent before joining the tough Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) for the 1969-70 campaign.

That young band of upstarts surprised the hockey world by finishing fourth in the league—a feat never previously matched as new teams entering the WCHA had always placed last in their first year of competition.

From 1973 through 1976 Johnson coached the US National hockey teams and the 1976 US Olympic team. He received the 1976 Meritorious Service Award from the Amateur Hockey Association of the United States. He's currently serving as a consultant to the President's Commission on Olympic Sports.

The 49-year-old Johnson is a native of Minneapolis, MN.

He played hockey and baseball at North Dakota in 1950-51; then transferred back to the University of Minnesota for competition 1952-53 and 1953-54.

Bob received a Bachelor of Science degree from Minnesota and he obtained a Master's degree in Education from Minnesota as well. He's also a professor in the Wisconsin Physical Education and Dance department.

Bob started coaching in 1956 at Warroad, MN., High School. He began his collegiate career at Colorado College in 1963 and in three years compiled a 29-51-3 record. He also coached baseball and was named Rocky Mountain "Coach-of-the-Year" in 1964 and 1965 in NCAA College Division play.

He and his wife Martha are the parents of five children. Son Mark was a member of Wisconsin's varsity for three seasons during which the Badgers won the 1977 NCAA title, and he was a member of the 1980 US hockey team that took Olympic honors. He's currently a member of the Pittsburgh Penguins of the NHL. Son Peter is a junior at Wisconsin in 1980-81.



GRANT STANDBROOK **Assistant Coach - 5th Season**

Grant Standbrook has fast become an important part of Wisconsin's highly successful hockey program. Coach Johnson has given Grant the responsibility of the Badgers off-ice conditioning program and the seeking out of prospective hockey players who can fit the mold of past Badger stand-outs. Grant works closely with Coach Johnson in assessing Badger talent and performances. Coach Johnson has stated that he feels "there is no better assistant coach in the country than Grant Standbrook."

Prior to coming to Wisconsin Standbrook was Johnson's assistant coach for three years with the U.S. National and Olympic teams. A native of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Standbrook graduated from the University of Minnesota-Duluth in 1961. He lettered in hockey two years and was an alternate captain in 1960-61.

Standbrook, 42, began his coaching career at Churchill High School in Winnipeg in 1961. In 1963, he took over the coaching position at Greenway High School in Coleraine, Minn., and in three years his teams posted a 56-21-2 record.

Grant entered the college coaching ranks in 1966 when he joined the Dartmouth College staff; he became that school's head coach in 1970—a position he held for five years. At Dartmouth Grant also coached soccer and lacrosse. Grant was a member of the Canadian championship soccer team in 1963.

Grant and his wife Judy have three children.



TOM OSENTON **Administrative Assistant - 3rd Season**

Tom Osenton serves the Wisconsin hockey program in a number of ways; he not only works directly with Coach Johnson on a part-time basis, but he serves as the Executive Director of the Blue Line Club of Madison. The past season Tom served as Media Liaison in charge of Hockey for the U.S. Olympic Committee at Lake Placid.

Tom came to Wisconsin after being the Public Relations Director for the Amateur Hockey Association of the U.S. in 1976 and 1977. Tom is a 1976 graduate of New Hampshire, where he played hockey and majored in journalism.

Tom is a native of Brookline, MA, as is his wife Mary Ellen.

GOALTENDING: A real battle looms for the starting spot at this position with the loss of Roy Schultz, the All-American who turned pro. Seniors Jamey Gremore and Kip Pendleton will be looked at along with sophomore Marc Behrend and in-coming freshman Terry Kleisinger. The battle of the Badger netminder is wide open and should make the season a real interesting one for the goaltenders.

DEFENSE: With the loss of Bruce Wallace the Badger defensive ranks were thinned. However, with All-American Theran Welsh back for his final year, the Badgers have a solid base to build on. John Dougherty could really help us here as well as some newcomers. There's only one thing for sure, we're going to have flexibility in our wings, whether left or right.

ALL-TIME WISCONSIN WCHA ALL-STAR TEAM

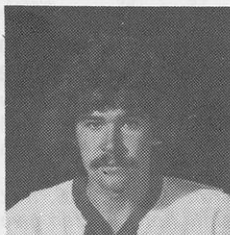
Eleven years ago, Bob Johnson and the University of Wisconsin entered an age that changed college hockey—the Badgers became members of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA).

In the first ten years, the Badgers won 171 WCHA games, lost 102 and tied 15 times for the best winning percentage in the league over the past decade (62%). In nine seasons, Johnson's teams had never had a losing record, finished in the top five in final league standings every year and captured two national championships.

In commemorating the Badgers' ten years in the WCHA, fans voted for the all-time Wisconsin WCHA All-Star team. The list of 66 former Badger lettermen who participated in WCHA action included eighteen professional hockey players and five All-Americans.

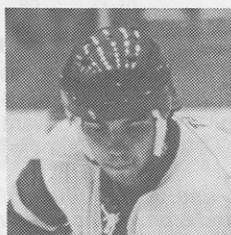
The all-time team, as selected by the fans, includes two All-Americans and five members of national championship teams—four of which played in the 1976-77 squad.

Here then, is "the team"—the "class of classes" over the past decade that molded Wisconsin hockey and its prominence in United States collegiate hockey.



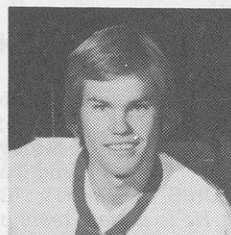
