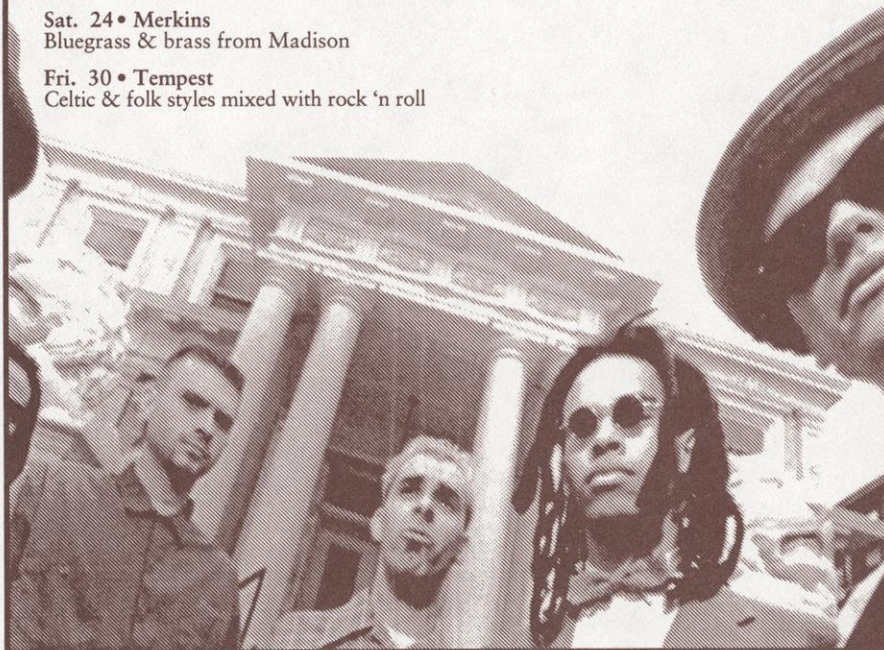

This exhibit features photos taken by UW students traveling throughout the United States with the Wisconsin Union Directorate's Alternative Breaks. The Alternative Breaks program gives students an opportunity to help others and see a different America: a vision which is shared through these photos.

Perception, Projection, and Protection *An M.F.A./Fullbright exhibition by Mary Bennett* *Porter Butts Gallery, Memorial Union*

This show, initially exhibited in Katmandu, Nepal, consists of works done by Bennett individually and in conjunction with Nepalese artists. The cast bronze pieces of this exhibit are veiled with suspended fabric as visual metaphor for, as Bennett explained, "the unfolding process of being open to influence." Bennett hopes the work will encourage viewers to explore the art of other cultures.

Laura Dronzek: Recent Work

Class of 1925 Gallery, Memorial Union

Dronzek's figure and landscape paintings explore non-specific elements of reality. Dronzek said of her work, "Our connection to nature has been greatly diminished in our technological society. I am interested in re-establishing that connection in my work."

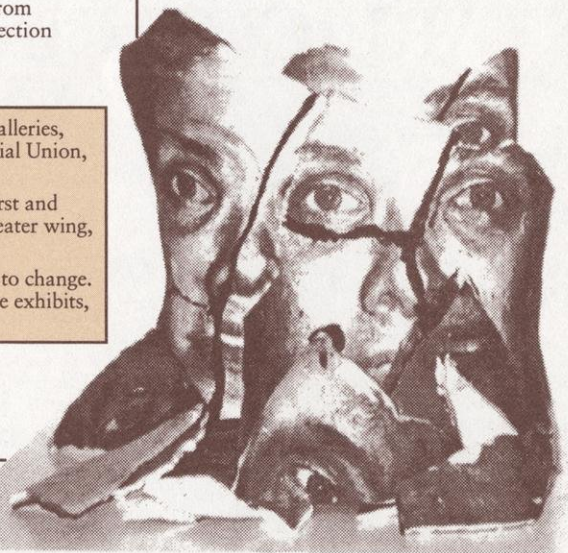

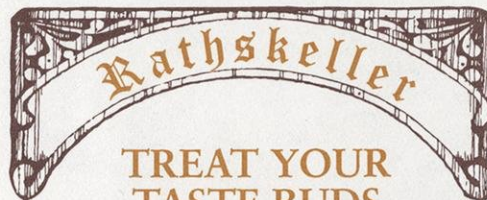

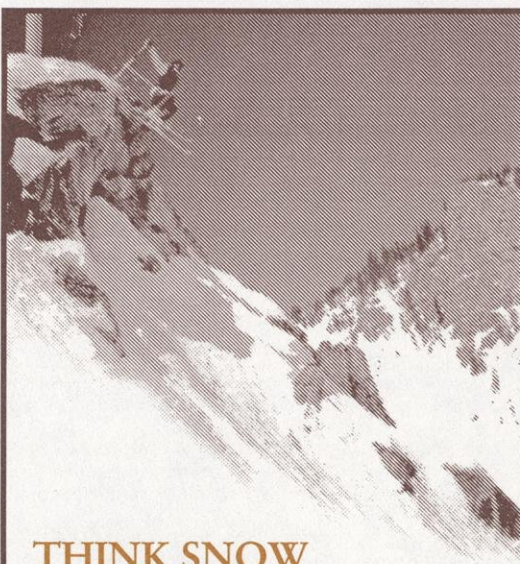

UPDATE ON BUILDING RENOVATIONS

A "greatly improved area with a nice feeling and a different atmosphere" is how Tim Gloeckler, Union South Operations associate manager, described the soon-to-be-unveiled Union South Games Room. The Games Room will be up and operating in mid-September although a few cosmetic finishes are yet to be made. The finishing touches won't interfere with the Games Room's offerings. Watch for details about a grand re-opening celebration in early January.

At Memorial Union, the two grand fireplaces inside the arched Rathskeller entrance will burn again this fall and winter. The fireplaces were part of the building's original 1928 design. For the last decade or so, problems with maintaining wood fires kept the hearths vacant. Now, the fireplaces provide cozy warmth and atmosphere thanks to the Union Building Association's funding of new gas log installations. This winter you may come in from the cold and warm up next to a Rathskeller fireplace. Nearby tables are popular "hot spots" in the Rath.

Renovations to Memorial Union's Park Street entrance have just been completed. Lighting, flooring and wall coverings are now updated to make a more customer-friendly Theater Box Office and grand promenade through Memorial Union's first floor. A mural project for the first floor Trophy Room is still in stages of development. Also, Student Print has moved to the area just outside the Memorial Union Games Room. This move should alleviate the congestion on the elevators since this heavily-used office was previously located on fifth floor.

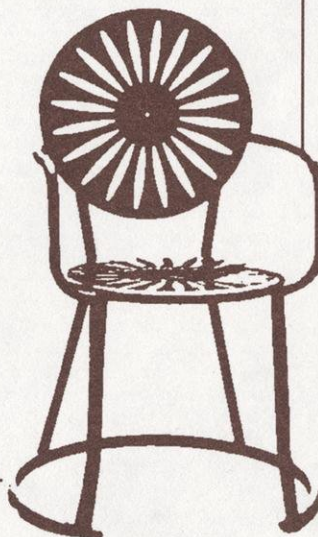
