#### -Summer Session-

I. Regent Hirschman presented the budget for the Summer Session of 1926, stating that the budget had been gone over very carefully by the summer session committee. Upon motion of Regent Hirschman, seconded by Regent Waters, it was VOTED, That the Summer Session budget be approved as pre-

VOTED, That the Summer Session budget be approved as presented, including the arrangements for the Coaching School. (See EXHIBIT "A" attached).

Called vote was taken, all regents present voting and voting "Aye."

Regent Schmidtmann, as Chairman of the Committee on Constructional Development, spoke of the proposed addition to Science Hall, stating that the Governor had suggested that the money might be taken from the balance of \$37,000 for operation.

Upon motion of Regent Schmidtmann, seconded by Regent Richardson, it was

VOTED, That the matter be referred to the Executive Committee with power to act.

Regent Schmidtmann discussed the proposed change in the theatre stage in the addition to Bascom Hall, stating that his committee recommended the change, providing there was sufficient money in the appropriation to do this, in addition to the funds necessary for the construction of the building and equipment. Upon motion of Regent Schmidtmann, it was WOTED, That the matter be referred to the Executive Com-

mittee with power to act.

The matter of a definite location for the Field House was discussed. Upon motion of Regent Schmidtmann, seconded by Regent Bachman, it was

VOTED, That a comprehensive survey be made with respect to locating the large buildings to be erected in the near future and that the following committee be appointed to conduct the survey: President of the University, President of the Board of Regents, Chairman of the Constructional Development Committee and the Business Manager; consulting members, Arthur Peabody, State Architect, Francis A. Aust, Landscape Architect, and L. S. Smith, Professor of City Planning.

Regent Schmidtmann reported that the regents had visited Camp Randall and inspected the buildings there with reference to finding relief for the Military Department. He stated that it would require approximately \$4000 to provide storage for material now on hand and that the money was not available.

Upon motion of Regent Schmidtmann, seconded by Regent Cashman, it was

VOTED, That a survey be made of the facilities in the Men's Gymnasium to ascertain if additional space might be secured there for the military department.

Upon recommendation of the By-Law Committee and upon motion of Regent Bachman, seconded by Regent Olbrich, it was

VOTED, That the last paragraph of <u>Section 2 of Chapter IV</u> of the By-Laws of the Regents, be amended by striking out the words "the president of the university and" where they appear in the next to the last line of Section 2 in the printed by-laws, the paragraph as amended to read as follows: "Requisitions upon budget allowances or special appropriations which involve an expenditure in excess of \$200, before being executed by the Business Manager, shall have the approval of the Chairman of the Executive Committee, unless special authorization is otherwise given."

Called vote was taken, all regents present voting and voting "Aye."

The Secretary presented a communication from the Duluth Wisconsin Alumni Association with reference to the acceptance of gifts.

The communication was ordered placed on file.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Milwaukee Teachers' Association, together with a resolution adopted by the Association with reference to Honorary Degrees. It was VOTED, That the matter be referred to President Frank.

Nominations were made for a successor to Walter J. Kohler on the Board of Visitors. Informal ballot was taken, Henry W. Kircher of Sheboygan receiving eight votes and William Rahr, of Manitowoc. six.

Upon motion of Regent Schmidtmann, seconded by Regent Richardson, it was

VOTED, That Henry W. Kircher be unanimously elected as a member of the Board of Visitors to succeed Walter J. Kohler for the term ending July 1, 1929.

Dear President Frank:

May I submit to you for transmittal to the Regents a recommendation regarding an athletic coaching course which it is proposed to hold during the two weeks intervening between final semester examinations and the beginning of the Summer Session in June next. The course was given last year under conditions parallel to those herein proposed.

The course is to be given upon the fee basis by Director George Little and Dr. W. E. Meanwell. Each student will pay a special tuition fee of \$25 for the course. In all probability there will be approximately 150 students. This would yield then a total of \$3,750. From this sum, \$1 per registrant would be deducted for an infirmary fee, leaving \$3,600. This sum would be divided between the Summer Session and the coaches, the former receiving ten per cent or \$360 and the latter the balance, \$3,240. Of this latter amount, 35% is to go to Director Little and 65% to Dr. Meanwell. The Summer Session will announce the athletic coaching course in its poster, preliminary announcement and regular bulletin. All additional publicoaches.

The proposal, therefore, is to give the course on the fee basis with no possibility of expense to the Summer Session. In fact, the 10% and the infirmary fee which comes to the University will be largely profit. I take pleasure in recommending the approval of the coaching course again this year.
