

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

*** FOREWORD ***

These brief records are like the pieces of pottery gathered by researchers at an old Indian camping ground. Like the broken remnants these notes must be pieced together and added to, hopefully at least to yield the dim outlines for posterity, of the real people who settled the Town of Plover.

The material gathered here is too fragmentary and incomplete to satisfy the author, or the rare individual who might turn to these pages for information about his forbears. But it is hoped that some small reference in these notes will enable the future researcher into his family's history to establish that slender thread of continuity which will prompt him to persevere in a seemingly hopeless project with renewed enthusiasm.

As the reader will discover, I have left many blanks for the dates of birth and places of origin which I have been unable to provide. It is my hope that anyone able to furnish any of these dates (years, that is), and cities (or Countries or States), should take the liberty of filling in the information, and identifying himself in the space allotted for NOTES. (In any of the copies which might be available to him (or more probably her)).

There are many families about whom nothing is known, except the fact that they lived in the Town of Plover at some time in the period covered (1877 to 1935). Some died and left no descendants; others moved away and were eventually lost track of. In some cases the descendants lived in the Township but later died out or moved on. It is highly probable that many grandchildren of the earlier settlers are still alive, and with time and diligence some of them could still be located, but the likelihood of coming up with any specific information about their grandparents is much more remote than the average person would believe (as I have found out from many frustrating experiences).

The families and individuals about whom I was able to gather any information at all number about 220. In addition I have listed alphabetically about 200 names of people who once lived here, giving only the Section they lived in, and the earliest year I could find of their definite residence here. These names were assembled from all the old Plat maps which I had available, and also from some of the Personal Property or Assessment Rolls of earlier years. I assumed that if they had personal property, they probably lived here. The only exception would be cases where they had logs, lumber, or pulp piled up in the Township, and were thus subject to the Personal Property Tax, while living elsewhere. I am sure these cases would be few.

In the case of the Plat maps I took the names only of people who owned land on which the Plat map indicated buildings. Here again I am assuming that if there were buildings the owner of the land probably lived in them. The collection of Plat maps included in the record total 30, of which 15 are duplicates from printed Platbooks, and 15 are hand-drawn copies which I transcribed from the old Assessment Rolls still in the Town's possession. Many of the old Assessment Rolls and other records are no longer available, having been buried by the man that bought and moved the old Town Hall.

I have also listed four unmarked graves, of which I have been able to give the approximate location, and the family names of the deceased. Also included is a list of the six one-room district schools which once existed in the Township.

It is the compiler's intention to have this record bound up in a very "limited edition" of six to twelve copies, for distribution to the Marathon County Library, the Marathon County Historical Museum, the Birnamwood Library, the D. C. Everest Library, the Antigo Public Library, and the Town of Plover Clerk's Office. The assumption is that all copies will not be lost if one or more are destroyed, as happened in the case of many valuable records which were buried when the old Town Hall was sold. It is inevitable that there will be some mistakes made in an undertaking of this kind, and hoping that they are not too frequent, I trust that they will be forgiven, and corrected if possible.

I would like to acknowledge, here, my sincere appreciation for the co-operation I have received from the many people who contributed the time and effort to furnish what they could learn of their family's history. I want to mention especially our local historian, Mrs. Ellem Lyons of Birnamwood; and two experienced family-tree researchers who were anxious to help, Mr. Jerome Lund of Wausau, whose grandparents were early settlers in the Town; and Mr. William W. Schultz, of Rte. 1, Merrill, who grew up in the Town, living at the home of his grandparents, the Herb. Hohensees.

While admittedly incomplete, I feel that this record includes the great majority of the settlers in the Township who came before 1935. I have tried to make the identification of the settlers as accurate as possible for research purposes, by including, wherever possible, the dates of the birth and death of the settler, his wife, and the parents of both; also the places of birth and death of the same people.

To the extent that I have succeeded in this respect I consider the data included to be of sufficient, if limited, interest to have earned for this volume a modest niche in the Archives of Marathon County and the Town of Plover.

Birnamwood, Wis. 1978.

Abel, Otto

He was born in South Dakota in 1882.

His father was Fred Abel, who was born in Germany in _____.
He died in 1912.

His mother was Henrietta (Rues) Abel, also born in Germany
in year _____. She died in 1932.

Otto Abel was married to Amanda Vogel, daughter of John
Vogel of the Town of Plover, in 1904.

They came to the Town of Plover in 1914, and settled on the
S $\frac{1}{2}$ /SW, Sec. 15.

They farmed until 1920, when they sold the farm to William
Bussian.

The farm reverted to Otto Abel in _____, and was operated
by Percy Gardner and Kenneth Totten (son-in-law of Mr. Abel)
during the next ten years. Mr. Abel was at this time a log-
ger and road building contractor. (see Totten, Kenneth)

Mrs. Abel died in 1926, and Mr. Abel lived at Antigo and Wau-
sau, and retired in 1950. He died in 1964.

The Abels had one daughter, Margaret (Mrs. Kenneth Totten),
still living in Wausau.

NOTES.

This farm had formerly been owned by a Chas. Rachow and a
Lawrence Donahue. (both bachelors).

NOTICE---

The reader will observe that there are some conflicting dates
given for the birth and/or death of a person mentioned, also
some confusing variations in given names, as between the infor-
mation given by the descendants, the old Census records, and
the Cemetery headstones.

I have given all the variations, on the assumption that any of my
sources, including the headstones, could be in error. E.A.S.

Armstrong, Dave and Julia

They lived on the DeMars place, and later on the SE/NW, Section 24. He worked in the woods for a Mr. Albert Simpson on the Art Halbesleben (later Hass) place, in Sec. 14. They also lived on the Charles Vogel place, where they had living quarters in the granery, and worked for the Vogels. The Vogels at that time lived on the old Demars road, where they had a large new house, which however burned down in a few years.

The Armstrongs must have lived in the Town of Plover in the period of 1890 to 1910, They are described by Mrs. Edward Jansen and by Mike Bauers, who knew them well, as being good neighbors, she a spotlessly clean housekeeper, and good dancers, attending all the neighborhood parties.

They were the only black people ever to have lived in the Township, until the Radar Station put several families in the Town, who incidently, were also a credit to their race and to the community.

Arnold, Adolph H.

He was born in 1857. According to the Census of 1905 he was born in France, but his father was born in Germany. His wife was Wilhelmina Zehntner, who was born in Kaukauna, also in 1857.

After coming to the United States some time before 1883 they lived in New York, where their eldest child, Wilhelmina was born.

They came to the Town of Plover in 1895, and homesteaded on the NE of the NE of Section 23. Louis Zwirschitz of Aniwa, his grandson, has in his possession a document transferring ownership of that description to Mr. Arnold. It was dated 1895, but recorded in 1896, and signed by President Grover Cleveland. They also owned three forties in Section 15. During the time they lived here they often met Indians on the trail to Aniwa. The forty was not owned by Adolph Arnold very long, as the 1901 Platbook shows it as belonging to Peter Schmidt, by which time the Arnolds had moved to the three forties in Section 15, (NW/NE, SW/NE, and NW/SE).

They established their farm there on the Plover River and farmed until about 1919. Mr. Arnold served as Town Clerk for a number of years.

Adolph Arnold died in _____. and Mrs. Arnold died in _____. They are buried in the Aniwa Cemetery, but have no headstones. They had six children, as follows:

NOTES.

Louis and Herman owned the eighty west of their father's land in 1910. Louis later moved to Unity, where he was a blacksmith. Louis married Louise Kautza, daughter of Chas. Kautza (Sec. 16). Albert and George Arnold owned land across the road in Section 10 in 1920.

Herman has a Government marker on his grave in the Aniwa Cemetery. He died in 1923.

Austin, Eli

Eli Austin was born in Reedsburg in 1874. His parents were Aaron and Elizabeth Austin. His father was born in England, and his mother was born in Canada.

Eli came to the Town of Plover about 1899.

He married Edna Vogel in 1902. She was born at Antigo in 1886, the daughter of Charles and Hulda Vogel, who settled in the Town of Plover a few years later. (see Vogel, Chas.)

Eli and Edna owned and farmed the place, and worked in the woods until 1912, and afterward worked at Oshkosh during World War I.

They moved back to Plover in 1920, and Mr. Austin died the same year. Mrs. Austin sold the place and moved to Eland with her daughter, Bernice (see Meyer, Chas.)

Edna Austin moved back to the Town of Plover later as the wife of Reinhold Boettcher (refer to Boettcher, Reinhold.) She died in 1948.

The Austin log house was later moved to a new location on the North Poll road. Of the old homestead only the lilac bush marks the spot.

Austin, Lawrence

He was a brother of Eli Austin.

He lived in the Town of Plover for a number of years, on the King place, which was the NW/SE, Section 23. His wife's name was Meta.

He moved back to Reedsburg, and was a cattle buyer for many years.

He died in 1948, but still has children residing there.

NOTES.

Elizabeth Austin's maiden name is given in one source as Lidy Gardner. The same source gives her birthplace as Sauk County. (Marathon County Register of Deeds Office).

Baade, Adolph

Mr. Baade was born about 1868.

His wife was born in 1872.

Her maiden name was Catherine Upp.

The Baades came to the Town of Plover in 1919, from Buckbee, near Clintonville, Waupaca County, where the Otto Kuschels had also lived.

They settled on the N. $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SE, Section 16, where Towle and Van Doren had a logging camp on the back part of this eighty.

They farmed until about 1927, when they were divorced.

Mr. baade died in 1929, but Mrs. Baade lived until 1941.

Mrs. Baade had two daughters by a previous marriage, whose names were Martha and Anita Ladwig. Anita (now Mrs. Gene Nichols) lives northeast of Aniwa, in Shawano County.

Bauch, Ervin

Ervin was born in the Town of Plover in 1903.

His parents were Fred and Sophie Bauch, who had moved to the Town of Plover in 1902. Fred was born in Germany, date unknown, and Ervin's mother, born Sophie Wicke\$, was from Manitowoc.

Ervin Bauch bought the farm formerly belonging to Fred Thomas, about 1937.

He married Grace MacDonald in 1933. Her folks had lived around Crivitz, and her grandmother, who was part Indian, was from Brothertown.

They farmed there until 1952, and then worked in Wausau until he died in 1957. Mrs Bauch had died in 1955.

They had two daughters:

Mrs. Edw. Meyer (Wautoma)

Farm was bought by a brother, Elton, Town of Plover.

Bauch, Fred

He was born in Germany in the year of 1858, but the city of his birth is not known. He came to the United States with an uncle at an early age, so nothing is known about his parents.

He was married about 1886 to Sophie Wickes, who was born in Manitowoc in 1868.

They came to the Town of Plover in 1902, and settled on the SE of the SE, of Section 35. They farmed there until about 1934, when the Platbook shows it as belonging to a son Herbert.

In 1936 Fred Bauch died, and the farm was taken over by another son, Elton, in 1938. Mrs. Bauch died in 1945.

Bauch, Elton

Born on the farm in 1914, he took it over in 1938.

He was married to Grace Marie Bultman in that year. She was the daughter of Gerrit Bultman, sr., of the Town of Plover. She was born in Kenosha in 1916.

They greatly enlarged the farm buildings, and added land in Sections 15, 26, 27 and 23, and in the Town of Norrie. They retired about 1970, and have a home on the SE corner of the home farm.

Bauch, Elton, jr.

He took over his father's farm early in 1977.

NOTES.

Fred Bauch, jr. also lived in the Town of Plover during the period from 1915 to 1933, on the South Pollroad, at the $W\frac{1}{2}/SE\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 22.

The 1930 Farmers' Directory also lists Carl F. Bauch as living in Section 36 with his family (his wife May, and children Myron, Helen and Stanley), the land being rented from Fred Bauch.

Fred and Sophie Bauch were married at Manitowoc in 1888.

Marathon County---Township of Plover--E.A.S.-1977.

Bauer, Michael

He was born in Antigo in 1895.

He moved to the Town of Plover when his widowed mother married the widower Julius Meyer.

Mrs. Bauer, the former Barbara Bluhm, was born in Baden - Baden, Germany in 1869, and had four children by her first marriage, of whom Michael was the second youngest.

He married Earsie Wincentsen of the Town of Plover in _____. She was born in 1904, the daughter of Peter Wincentsen, on the NW/NE of Sec. 12.

After working out for a number of years they bought the farm of John Vogel in Section 15, and farmed there from 1930 until 1941, and also served as Assessor from 1934 to 1940.

They moved to a farm in the Town of Maine in 1942, and he farmed there and worked at the Kraft Plant for 18 years, before retiring. He is now 82 years of age.

Bauer, Chris.

Born at Antigo in 1891.

Stepfather was Julius Meyer.

His mother, Mrs. Bauer, married Julius Meyer and moved to the Town of Plover with her four children, of whom Chris was the oldest. She was the former Barbara Bluhm of Baden-Baden, Germany, born in 1869.

Chris grew up on the Meyer farm in Section 10, and later married Adelia Kautza, daughter of Charles Kautza of the Town of Plover.

They bought the farm on the SE/NE, Sec. 16, between 1915-18, and farmed there until after 1945. They eventually moved to Wausau, and he became assistant Highway Superintendant for Marathon County.

He died in 1958. Mrs Bauer died in _____. No children.

Bauer, Armand

Born in Antigo, in 1893. Brother of Chris and Mike Bauer.

Moved to Plover with his mother, and grew up there.

He took over his stepfather's farm in Sec. 10 between 1926 and 1930.

Married Mrs. Bessie Willing, Aniwa. Sold farm in 1966, and moved to Birnamwood, where he died in 1972.

NOTES.

All three Bauer boys were veterans of World War One.

Beckwith, Reno Eugene

Born in 1891, he was married to Grace Margaret Cain, who was born in Burdick, Indiana in 1886, and was the daughter of Ed. Cain of the Town of Plover, Section 24.

They lived on the SW/NE of Section 14 from before 1920 until about 1925.

They built a house on the premises, which was sometimes known as the Sears Roebuck House, probably of pre-cut packaged materials, which was a novelty in an area where log houses were still common.

The Beckwiths had four children, as follows:

Blank, Frank (C.F.)

He was born at Readfield, Waupaca County in 1878.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Blank, his father having been born in Germany in 1825, and who died in 1897 at Readfield, and his mother being the former Henrietta Kraege, born in Bromberg, Posen, Kingdom of Prussia in 1836, and who died in 1887. Her parents were Gottfried and Elanora Kraege, who were born in 1805 and 1811 respectively, and who died in 1889 and 1892 respectively, at Readfield.

Frank Blank lived in various locations in the Town of Plover, and owned, lived on and operated a sawmill on the NW of the SW, Section 24. His wife Mary was born in Germany in 1874.

They had a sawmill later at Big Falls. Frank died at Shawano, and is buried there.

They had three sons: Charles, Albert and Joseph. Charles lived at Iola a few years ago.

NOTES.

Frank Blank was an uncle of the compiler of this index.

His sister was Clara Blank, who married Arthur P. Schmitt at Sheboygan in 1893. (see page 112). She was born at Readfield in 1875. When she was twelve years old her mother died and she lived with her half-sister Mrs. Charles Vogel, at Antigo, from 1887 until 1892. (see Page 140), and during this period she learned the tailoring trade from a Mr. Bulow. She then moved to Sheboygan with a Mrs. Weaver (later of Pelican Lake), and spent most of her life there. She lived the last four years of her life in the Town of Plover, where she died in 1962. She is buried at Wildwood Cemetery, Sheboygan.

Gottfried and Elanora Kraege came to Wisconsin in 1858, settling in the Township of Caledonia, Waupaca County. They bought their farm in 1861, consisting of several forties, their home buildings being located on the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 22. In 1870 they sold their farm to their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. George Blank. Gottfried and Elanora Kraege and George and Henrietta Blank are all buried in the Lutheran Church Cemetery at Readfield.

Blood, George, sr.

Mr Blood was born in 1861 at South Dakota. The family lived at Clintonville until 1900, when they moved to Washburn Siding in the Town of Aniwa, and then soon after moved to the Town of Plover. (In 1904). They lived on the SE/NW, Sec. 26, and built the house there. The house, now enlarged and remodelled, is owned and occupied by Mrs and Mrs. Arne Ecker.

His wife was the former Minnie Johnson, born at Clintonville in 1868, and they were married at Clintonville.

Mr. Blood died in 1906, Mrs. Blood later married Bert Bowen, and they moved to Tomahawk in 1920, at which time George, Jr. bought the farm listed below.

Blood, George, jr.

He was born at Clintonville in 1890, and moved with his parents (above) to Washburn Siding in 1900, and moved again a short time later to the Town of Plover. He was married in 1913 to Blanche Oneal, daughter of Wm. Oneal of the Town of Plover. (NW/NW, Sec. 1). She was born in Ohio in 1892.

He bought the farm on the NW/NE of Sec. 35 in 1920, and farmed there until about 1964 when he retired and moved to the Town of Norrie, where he lived for about eight years before moving to the Home at Birnamwood, where they now reside.

They have two children, as follows:

Raymond (Cecil, Shawano County).

Myrna (Mrs. Kenneth Pospychalla, Wausau).

Mrs. George Blood, sr. (Bowen) died in 1949.

The senior Blood's children were George, Henry, James and Albert., William and Margaret.

The census of 1905 gives the senior Mrs.'s Bloods Age as 35, which would make the year of her birth 1870.

Boeger, Herman

All that is known about Mr. Boeger is that he was born in Germany in 1854. His father was listed in the 1905 Wisconsin Census as having been born in France.

He was married to Julianna Wickers, who was also born in Germany. She was born in 1862.

They came to the Town of Plover in 1900, and settled on the SW of the NE of Section 34. They also owned the $N\frac{1}{2}$ of the NW, of the same Section.

Mr. Boeger farmed there until 1929, although Mrs. Boeger had died in 1919. His son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Rupnow helped to operate the farm until they bought it and took over.

At that time Mr. Boeger bought the small farm on highway "N", described as the SE of the SW of Section 36, where he lived until his death in 1939.

The Boegers are buried in the Birnamwood Cemetery.

They had one daughter, Wilhelmina. She was born in Wisconsin, and married Edward Rupnow of the Town of Plover.

Boettcher, Rheinhold

His parents were Carl Boettcher, born in Germany in 1845, And Bertha (nee Mueller) Boettcher, born in 1948, also in Germany.

They settled in Clintonville in 1883.

Rheinhold Boettcher was born there in 1887.

He was married in 1908, at Clintonville, to Helen Bock.

She was born at Clintonville in 1888.

They lived for awhile at Eland, where he worked for the U.&N.W. Railroad. He also worked for the veneer mill at Morris, East of Wittenberg.

They had one son, Leonard (see below).

Mrs. Boettcher died in 1918.

In 1922 Mr. Boettcher married Mrs. Edna Austin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Vogel of the Town of Plover.

In 1933 they moved to the Town of Plover, where they owned the Art Vogel farm on the SW/SW, Sec.14.

Mrs. Edna Boettcher died in 1948, but Mr. Boettcher continued to farm until 1950, when he retired. He lived on the farm until his death in 1962.

Mrs. Boettcher had one daughter by a previous marriage(see Austin, Ely)

Boettcher, Leonard

Son of the above Rheinhold Boettcher and Helen Bock Boettcher, he was born at Eland in 1908.

He grew up in Eland and went to work at Kaukauna in about 1928, and married Rose Stepanski there in 1929.

She was born in Menasha in 1909.

Leonard worked at the Thilmany Paper Mill until 1946, when they purchased the Fred Vogel farm (SE/SW, Sec.14), in the Town of Plover, where they still live.

In 1962 they bought the R. A. Boettcher farm (SW/SW, Sec.14), (including 11 acres formerly belonging to E. Bendemer and J. Haesely in Sec. 15.)

Mr. Boettcher retired and sold the farm to his son Carl in 1975. Farm now includes 80 acres in Sec. 24.

Leonard boettcher was Town Clerk for 27 years, from 1949 to 1976 inclusive.

Their children are:

Bossell, Martin

Born in Mattoon, Shawano County in 1882.
 He lived in that area until his marriage in 1906.
 The family moved to the town of Plover in 1929, living
 on what is now the August Pietz place and on the Cal.
 Richardson place before buying the farm on the NW/SW Sec.
 Mrs. Bossell was born Nellie Amenson at Poysippi, in 1889.
 They farmed here until Mr. Bossell died in 1948, when the
 farm was taken over by his son, Lawrence.
 Mrs. Bossell died in 1959.
 They had six children, Mrs. Donald Knowles, Green Bay,
 Mrs. Wm. Peasley, Birnamwood, Mrs. Arnold Uttecht, Witten-
 berg, Mrs. Marcellus Ziegelbauer, Town of Plover,
 Clarendon, Wittenberg, and Lawrence, who took over the
 farm.

Bossell, Lawrence was married to Iris Spurgeon, daughter of Mr.
 and Mrs. Elton Spurgeon of the Town of Plover. Lawrence ran the
 farm until his death in 1972.

He was survived by his widow and one daughter, Karen. They sold
 the farm (except the house and 2 acres) to Lloyd Schmitt, Jr.,
 son of Milton Schmitt, neighbor to the North, in 1974.

Bullis, Joe

Mr Bullis and his wife Helen came to the Town of Plover from Essex County, New York, in the year 1884.

They lived on the SE/SE of Sec. 26, settling there some time after 1900.

They had two daughters, both born in Essex County, N.Y.:

Cora , who married James Griswold of the Town of Plover, and whose daughter was Persis Griswold, afterward wife of Fred Hetzel, and mother of Russell Hetzel of the Town of Plover.

They came to the Town of Plover in 1889, and settled on the SE of the NE, of Section 24.

They farmed there until about 1922, when Mr. Cain died. Mrs. Cain sold the place several years later, and moved away. She died in 1962.

Fay Clark came to the Town of Plover about 1900 and settled on the SE of the SW, of Section 33. He married Vera Follett, the daughter of Frank Follett, the first settler in the Town of Plover. She was born in 1882 in the Town of Plover.

They afterward lived on the South Pollroad(SE/NW,Sec.7), and also farther North on the same road, on the opposite side. Then they lived on the Cain Place in Section 24, for awhile. They also returned to Sheboygan County for awhile and then lived at Elderon. Mr. and Mrs. Clark were divorced and Mrs. Clark later married a Mr. Charles Zimmermann of Galloway.

Mrs. Clark-Zimmermann died in 1947, and Mr. Clark died in 1955, in Elderon. Both are Buried in the Birnamwood Cemetery.

In the center of this last forty there is a depression in the ground, indicating that a dwelling stood there once. Also a hole dug out of the bank, indicating a root cellar.

George M. Converse was born in 1873, and his wife Anna was born in 1877. Both were born in Wisconsin.

Six children were listed in the Census of 1905, from which these dates were also taken.

Before coming to the Town of Plover they had lived in Ohio for a time, where their youngest son was born, and later lived in Maryland, where their daughter Minnie was born in 1898. Two older sons, born in Holland, moved with them to the Town of Plover (see below).

Peter De Jong died in 1908, and his wife died in 1909.

Both are buried in the Forestville Cemetery in the Town of Easton.

De Jong Brothers.

The three sons of Peter and Mary De Jong took over the farm operation about 1912-14, and operated under the name of De Jong Brothers in various parts of Sections 30 and 31 until after 1940.

The brothers were:

DeMars, Saul (Solomon)

Mr. DeMars was born near Montreal in 1843. He came to the United States some time before 1876, in which year he married Mary Somerville at Fond du Lac.

He lived a year at Norrie, then came to Washburn Siding, which was then a sawmill settlement $\frac{1}{2}$ mile East of the Marathon - Shawano County line, where Highway Double Z crosses the railroad track. This settlement has completely disappeared.

He bought the farm in the Town of Plover after 1882, as the plat book for that year shows no entry. The description he bought and farmed was the W $\frac{1}{2}$ /NW, Sec. 23.

He died in 1927. Mrs. DeMars had died a few years earlier.

They had two sons, Vele of Crandon, and Edward of Fond du Lac; and two daughters, Alvina (Mrs. Joe Rundhammer), and Etta, both now deceased.

Of the boys, Vele is dead and Edward is now 90 years old.

Daughter Alvina (Or Lavina) was born at Fond du Lac in 1879. She was married to Joe Rundhammer at Birnamwood in 1906. She died at Birnamwood in 1951.

According to the Tax Rolls on file at the Town Hall, Mr. Demars settled in the Town of Plover about 1893.

Ed (Edwin?) DeMars Married Laura Johnson in 1913.

She was born in Union, Wauzeka County.

He was born in Amsterdam, Holland, in 1875. His parents were Levinus De Ruyter who was born in Holland in 1844 and died in Oostburg (Sheboygan County) Wis. in 1908; and his mother's maiden name was G---B---Smith, who was born in 1854 in Holland, and died at Cedar Grove, Wis. in 1877.

John De Ruyter came to the United States, to Sheboygan County with his parents in 1881. He was married to Adrianna De Smith at Cedar Grove in 1891. His wife was born at Cedar Grove in 1871, the daughter of Charles DeSmith, who died in 1909 at that place and whose wife was the former Normia Mindenhout, (whose birth and death dates are not available).

John De Ruyter came to the Town of Plover in 1904, and settled on the W $\frac{1}{2}$ of the NW of Section 8. Mrs. De Ruyter died in 1909, but Mr. DeRuyter farmed there until about 1938-39, When he moved to the Town of Harrison, where he farmed until after 1961. He died in 1971, and both he and Mrs. DeRuyter are buried in the Hogarty Cemetery.

They had two boys: Charles (deceased), and Levi (now 76), living with his sons in the Town of Harrison.

In the 1905 U.S. Census, Adrianna De Smith De Ruyter's first name is given as Ettie.

Dobbert, Fred

He settled in the Town of Plover in 1879, on the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 33, on the road to Wausau(now Highway N).

His wife was Maria Webster, and her father or her brother had a forty immediately to the West.

They had a daughter Hattie, who died in childhood, and was the first person buried in the Birnamwood Cemetery. For details see Mrs.' Ellen Lyons' history of the Town of Plover. The Dobberts also had a son George.

Mr. Dobbert died in 1882, and Mrs. Dobbert later married Gus Anderson.

They sold the farm and moved away in 1900.

Anyone having further knowledge of this family is welcome to enter it below.

Dundee Land Company.

European capital was involved in what was evidently a partnership formed to conduct speculative investment in Wisconsin land. How widespread these operations were is hard to determine, but in 1882 they owned 224 forties of wild land in the Town of Plover. The partners were John Paton of New York City, and William Lawson and William McKenzie of Dundee, Scotland.

By 1891 they had sold off 96 of the forties, and by 1895 their holdings had been reduced to 32.

Some of this land was evidently repossessed as they had sixty-five forties in 1897.

In 1899 they were down to 40, and in 1901 they had only one description left, the NW/SW, Section 36, now owned by Alex Ecker.

Ecker, Joseph

He was born at Brillien in 1872.

He was the son of George and Mrs. Ecker, who were born in Germany.

He married Ida Hietke of Mattoon in 1906.

They lived in Birnamwood until 1919, when they moved to the town of Plover, and farmed on the NE/SW, Sec.36, until 1942, when he sold the farm to his son Alex.

Mrs Ecker died in 1948, and Mr. Ecker lived with his son there until 1953. He died at a nursing home in 1961.

Edgell, Hays

Hays Edgell was born in 1880 in Indiana, the exact location being unknown.

He was the son of Richard and Lucinda Edgell, whose antecedents are also unknown.

Hays Edgell married Lillian Boyer in Indiana, in 1898.

Her parents, who lived near Lincoln, Indiana, were William Boyer and Rebecca (Montgomery) Boyer. the former of whom was born in Pennsylvania, and the latter in Ireland.

Hays and Lillian Edgell came to the Town of Plover in 1923, and bought the farm of Tom Monahan(on the S $\frac{1}{2}$ of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 11). Mr. Monahan had built the house and cleared the land for farming.

Mr. Edgell died in 1939, but the family continued farming until 1943.

Born in Hanover, Germany in 1844.

He came to this country in 1865, and married Eleanor Eich 1868.

They had ten children, of whom five were still living in 1913, 3 in Chicago and 2 in the Town of Plover (Mrs. Emma Krause and Mrs. Amanda Locke).

Firchau, Henry

He came to the Town of Plover in 1900, and bought the SW/NW, Section 25 from the Dundee Land Co.

Mr. Firchau's antecedents were never disclosed to the neighbors, giving rise to the supposition that he had deserted his family.

The neighbors helped him build a log house on the place, which still stands, although now badly decayed.

He lived here until about 1918, when he bequeathed his property to Charles Vogel in return for maintaining him for the rest of his life. He died at the Vogels about 1920, when he was about seventy-five years of age, so he must have been about 55 when he came to Plover.

NOTES.

The log house was occupied by the compiler of this index and his family for eighteen years, from 1929 to 1947.

According to the census of 1905 Mr. Firchau was born in Germany in 1846.

The log-house is shown on the title page of this volume.

(According to the death certificate at the Marathon County Court-house, he was born in 1845 in the province of Posen, in the Kingdom of Prussia, now part of Poland.) He is buried in the Aniwa Cemetery.

Follett, Frank J.

Mr. Follett was born at Winneconne, Wis. in 1853. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Follett. His mother's maiden name was Sarah Jane Moody. They were born in New York State. His father was born in 1823 and died in 1874, and his mother was born in 1822 and died in 1899.

Frank Follett was married to Sarah Luella Richardson in 1875.

He was the first permanent settler in the Town of Plover, when he walked up from Eland to homestead a quarter section in 1877. After building a cabin on the NW/NE, Sec 36, he returned in 1878 with his wife. He ran the farm for the rest of his life, except for several years when he ran a store in the small lumbering settlement of Strassburg in the Town of Relling in Langlade County.

Mrs Follett died in 1913.

Mr. Follett died in 1929, at which time the farm passed to his daughter, Sarah Edna (Mrs. Harry McKellip)

Part of the original homestead became the farm of Joseph Ecker.

Two other daughters were: Fern

Freeman, Charles J.

He came to the Town of Plover some time before 1882, and owned and lived on the three forties straddling the Old River Road in Section 5 (NE/NE).

He owned that place until about 1901, and was either the father or the brother of James and Joseph Freeman, who also lived in Section 4 during the same period.

He was one of the first Town Constables appointed or elected at the formation of the Town of Plover Government, in 1900.

He is buried in the Hogarty Cemetery, but there are no dates on the headstone, so the dates of his birth and death are not known at this time.

There is a Hazel Freeman, presumably a sister, buried there also. She died in 1894.

Freeman, James

He lived in the Township as early as 1882, when he was a member of the Town Board.

At that time he owned six forties in Section 4, adjacent on the South to the settlement of Hogarty.

This land was still in his possession in 1901, but by 1912 it was owned by W. F. Johnson, and by 1918 it was owned by the Harringtons, First T.L., and then Louis.

NOTES.

The last and youngest Freeman to occupy the farm was

Harry, presumably a son of the above.

The 1905 Census gives James Freeman's age as 30 at that time. He was born in Wisconsin, but his parents were born in England. His wife Kate, also born in Wisconsin, was 18 in 1905.

The same census also lists a Kate Freeman, widow, 49, who was apparently the mother of Harry Freeman. The census also lists five daughters: Susie, Rose, Dena, Mary and Hattie. The senior Mrs. Kate Freeman could have been the widow of either Charles, Joseph, or James Freeman.

Freeman , Joseph

He owned 240 acres in Section 4, Town of Plover in 1882. Only roads indicated on platbook of that year were the south Boundary Line of the township (now County Trunk N), and the Old River Road (Wausau to Antigo), cutting across the NW corner of the Township, west of the Eau Claire River.

The Freeman was close to this road. The Plat shows two buildings on the Freeman place, and one on the Donahue place (SW/SW, Sec. 6), about two miles SW of the Freeman home.

The only other buildings on the plat are along the South boundary of the Township (County Trunk N), the homes of Dobbert, Walker, Zimmermann, Cady, Sam Hunter and Follett.

NOTES.

Freitag, Herman

Son of Herman Freitag, sr., he was born in Germany in 1872. He lived in the Town of Plover from 1911, when he bought the $E\frac{1}{2}$ of the $NE\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 25, until his death in 1913. He is buried in the Birnamwood Cemetery. (According to the death certificate at the Marathon County Courthouse.)

Gardner, Percy

Mr. Gardner was born at Shelby, Michigan (near Ludington), in 1895.

His father was Levi Gardner, who died when Percy was nine years old. His mother's maiden name is not available.

This contains the ^{house} now owned and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Krause.

The forty to the South, the NE/SW, Sec. 34, was purchased four years later, in 1896, by Frederick Krause, also from Mr. Paton of New York and Mr. MacKenzie of Dundee, Scotland. These two gentlemen were probably connected with the Dundee Land Co., which in 1891 owned 127 forties in the Town of Plover. They built a small cabin where the Edwin Krause home now stands. When they cleared the land they cut down the trees and burned them, for they had no value, and they had no other way to dispose of them.

The second year, William and Frederick Krause walked to Stevens Point, where they purchased one cow and one heifer. They walked them back to the Town of Plover on a trail leading through Hatley. During the first winter they cut down trees to feed the cows. This was the first livestock on the farm.

The barn, buildings and house now on the farm were all built with lumber obtained from the land.

The present house on the farm was built in 1904.

Wilhelm Krause was killed in 1905, by a runaway team of horses hitched to a lumber wagon. Mrs. Krause died in 1914.

There is a Caroline Lund (born 1829, died 1910) buried at the Bethany Church Cemetery in the Town of Easton, possibly a sister of Martin and Christian Lund.

Christian Lund is said to have been the only log-rider to have made the river trip over the riffles above the Eau Claire Dells, and come through alive.

Gilbert Vallier was born in Canada.

His wife Mary was born in 1830 (approximately), and died in 1910.

Christian Lund received the Land Patent on the Homestead in 1893, signed by Pres. Grover Cleveland. He sold the land to Charles Valliere for \$1,000 in 1905, who sold it to Wm. E. Vaughn on July 27, 1908 (see Vaughn, Wm. E.) The relationship between Chas. Valliere and Malene Valliere Lund is unclear. (Chas. Valliere's wife's name was Julia) After 1905 Chris. Lund lived across the road and half-a-mile West, in the Town of Harrison.

Lund, Martin

He was born in New Hope Township, Portage County, in 1855.

His father was Mads Olaus Lund, who was born in Skien, Norway, in 1817, and died in New hope in 1868.

His mother was Anne Marie Johnson, who was born at Maelum, Norway in 1822. She married Mads Lund in Dodge County in 1845, and died at Wausau in 1889.

Martin grew up in New Hope, and married Bertha Laffin in 1886. She was born in 1868 at Dramburg, in Pommerania, Germany, and was the daughter of Julius Laffin and his wife, the former Pauline Weiss.

Both were born in Germany, and both died in the Town of Hewitt.

Martin Lund came to the Town of Plover in 1896, and settled on the NE/NE of Section 7. He was a farmer and logger, (and flood-gate tender, see below), although Mrs. Lund had died in 1908.

In 1923 he moved to Antigo and lived with a son. He died in 1929.

The Lunds had fourteen children, as follows:

Martin Lund was elected to the office of Justice of the Peace at the organization of the Town Government and first election in 1890.

Julius Laffin was born in 1837 and died in 1914. His wife, Bertha Weiss Laffin, was born in 1830 and died in 1914.

The following is part of a letter from Mrs. Arthur Zivney, Minonk, Ill., a daughter, to Jerome Lund, Wausau. a nephew:

"Your grandpa was responsible for the closing and raising of the flood-gates at the old dam. They Held back the water and then opened the flood-gates, and the drivers with cant-hooks and spiked boots maneuvered the logs downstream to the Kelly Mill.

He had a shanty where they slept and ate between hours. He had a few men to help, as they raised and closed the gates by hand. Once the Sanquist boys and I played hooky from school, and visited Pa at the shanty. He used to fish between times, and I'd often sit on the rock with him. He attended to the flood-gates for years (maybe 15 or 20), but before that, in his younger days, he and Uncle Chris drove the logs with cant-hooks."

"One colorful Character on the old drive was a man named Dubar, (or Dunbar). He was a poet, songwriter, etc. He wrote a song about the Big Eau Claire, a story my Dad verified, and said he knew Dunbar, and the lady in the song ran a millinery shop. Her "true love" drowned in the Big Eau Claire, subject of the song, which I can copy for you if you like".

Lund, Martin

The following notes are supplied by Mr. Jerome Lund of Wausau, grandson of Martin, and were taken down as told to him by his father.

Inconjunction with the description on the previous page they constitute a graphic description of the difficulties encountered in getting the log-drives through the rocks at the Dells of the Eau Claire.

"The dam was about a half mile East of the bridge, and was operated from May first until July first, driving logs.

There were two companies, who would scale and stamp the logs. Each day one man would go down to the loggers to tell them when the dam would be opened. This dam went out around 1923 or 1925.

Four men worked with Martin on the dam. The dam had four gates, one for the logs and the other three for water flowage. They were raised by lifting a notched beam, With a pry-bar type pole. The water would carry the logs just so far, then they'd get hung up. The dam would then be closed, damming up the water again. Then at the right time all gates would be opened together, sending a rush of water through the gates, lifting the logs again, and sending them further down stream."

The farm was then owned by a Mrs. J. McCauley, a J. McCauley and an A. McCauley until 1926, when it was owned by Richard Klopstien

Charles and Jane McCauley had two children:

Ella Born in Minnesota in 1887 (afterward Mrs. R. Klopstien).

Jane Cain McCauley died at St. Francis, Wis.

None of the Platbooks available show Max as the owner of land in the Town of Plover, but the Assessment Roll of 1902 indicates that he had personal property (cattle) at that time. The Census of 1905 shows that they still lived in the Town in that year.

McKellep, Harry

Mr. McKellep was born near Crystal Lake, in the Town of Greenbush, Sheboygan County, in 1879. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry J. McKellep who were born in 1848 and 1850 respectively, and died in 1927 and 1929 respectively. Mrs. McKellep was the former Ellen Louise Willis. Harry McKellep the younger farmed and logged in the Town of Plover since the early years of the century, first on the South Pollroad (NW/NE, Sec. 27), and then on the Follett homestead, which they had acquired on the death of Mrs. McKellep's father, Frank Follett. Mr. McKellep had married the former Sarah Edna Follett in 1910. She was born in the Town of Plover in 1891.

They farmed in the Town of Plover until 1941, then worked at a Land-O-Lakes resort for a number of years.

Mrs. McKellep died in 1952, and Mr. McKellep died in 1961. They had four children, as follows:

He farmed there for 20 years, and then moved to Portage County, where he still resides. He sold the farm to Orville Van Prooyen, his neighbor.

He sold the factory after a few years to Mr. and Mrs. Walter Liesch, who in turn sold it about 1932 and moved to Eland. The factory continued operating under several cheesemakers for some time, before closing down.

Willard Mortenson retained the farmland adjacent to the factory and farmed there for a number of years. He eventually sold the farm to Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Mortenson, (no relation), who still own it, but have their buildings on the eighty to the west. This sale took place in 1952.

Willard Mortenson then moved to Birnamwood/ and was engaged in the insurance business until his death in 1965.

NOTES.

Mr. Mortenson's first wife was Julia Tietzer. They had two adopted sons, Gerald, now of Wausau, and Gaylord, now of Appleton.

His second wife was Rose George (Hoks)

He served on the Town Board, and was Town Treasurer from 1924 until 1941.

Julia Fietzer was born in Russia in 1887, the daughter of Julius and Eva Fietzer. She died in Wausau in 1961.

Julius was married again about 1900, to Mrs. Barbara Bauer of Antigo. She was born Barbara Brum in Germany, and came to the U.S. She was born in 1869. She had four children: Chris, Michael, Armand, (see Bauer, Michael), and a daughter Martha, born 1897, now Mrs. Martha Boudry of Shiocton, Wis.

Julius and Barbara Meyer had four(?) children of their own: Rudi, Eddie, Julius and Julia.

Julius Meyer died in 1939, and Mrs. Meyer died in 1948.

Otto Meyer owned forty acres in the Town of Plover, the NE/NE, Sec. 15, before his father came here. In 1901 he also owned two other forties, the NW/SE, Sec. 10, and the SW/SW, Sec. 13. Otto (born 1873), and his wife Lena (born 1877), had a number of children: Edward, Jennie, William, Ida, Charles, Ella and John.

Meyer, Charles

Son of the above Otto, was born in the Town of Plover in 1902, but moved to Eland with his parents before 1910.

He married Bernice Austin, also born in the Town of Plover (see Austin, Eli), but who then lived with her mother and step-father at Eland. She was born about 1903.

After farming there and working on the railroad, they bought the farm of her grandfather, Charles Vogel, in the Town of Plover. On the death of Charles in _____, Mrs. Meyer sold the farm to her son-in-law, Lloyd Mortenson of the Town of Easton, and her daughter Gloria, whose children are the fifth generation on the same farm. (NE/NW, Sec. 23).

He was born in 1890 and died in 1968. He lived most of his life with his brother George. He lived a long life, although he was something of an invalid. BORN TOWN OF MAINE. None of the Nelson Boys were married. All are buried in the Bethany Church Cemetery.

There were two Pommranke farms just East of the Niemuths as early as 1899, related to Mrs. Niemuth. they were Ed, on the NW/SW of Section 33, and Richard, on the SW/SE of Section 32.

They had two daughters, Lena (Mrs. John Schmoll, Elmhurst), and Gertrude (Mrs. Fred Vogel, Town of Plover), and four sons: John, Cornelius, jr, Anton and Kryn. At the time of his death in 1931 Cornelius Nousen, sr. was living with his daughter, Mrs. Gertie Vogel.

In 1912 Cornelius, jr. owned an eighty in Section 8 (E $\frac{1}{2}$ /NW). He married a daughter of Wm. Vaughn of Section 6.

In the same year John and Kryn Nousen had a quarter section SW, in Section 9, where they lived and logged.

Kryn moved back to Sheboygan County and married Nellie Back in 1908, who was born at Greenbush in 1885, daughter of Cornelius Back.

In 1916 they settled in the Town of Birnamwood. Mrs. Nousen died in 1932, but Kryn farmed until 1945. He died in 1952, survived by a son Reuben on the home farm, and one daughter Mrs. Evelyn Emmel.

John Nousen never Married. He lived with his brother Kryn until his death in 1939. John was born in Holland in 1879.

No information on the brother Anton.

Cornelius, sr., his wife, the son John and daughter Gertrude Notes. are buried in the Hogarty Cemetery.

Kryn's daughter is of the opinion that her father never lived in the Town of Plover, that he stayed in Sheboygan when his folks moved to Plover. I remember a picnic on the Eau Claire River which I attended as a small boy (probably about 1907), to get to which we left the teams at the Nousen camp and walked to the river. I think there were three Nousen boys there: Hans, Conn, and the third whom I have always assumed to have been Kryn, as I have never heard of an Anton Nousen, until recently. (E.A.S.)

Andrew Nysse farmed on the above place until 1945, when he sold it to Walter Youngquist.
He was born in 1891, and died in 1951.
His wife, Eva B., was born in 1902 and died in 1945.

William Nysse, a brother of Conn and Andrew owned the W $\frac{1}{2}$ of the NE of Section 8 in 1910, but died shortly afterward, and the place was owned by Conn in 1915.

There was a T. Nysse and a J. Nysse also showing on the Plat map of 1910.

There seem to have been four brothers; Cornelius, Martin, Tony and Andrew. Martin was the oldest. there were two sisters; Marie and Agnes. There was a John Nysse, probably a son of Cornelius, born 1886, died 1966 (Restlawn Cemetery, Wausau). Our informant Jerome Lund, wausau, Never heard of William Nysse. He was probably a son of Cornelius.

In 1918 Mr. Thomas had the N $\frac{1}{2}$ of the quarter section plus the forty to the west in Sec. 27, and the cornering forty in 22, while the South half of the quarter section was owned by W. The Town government was established in 1890, when the land constituting the present Township of Plover was detached from the Towns of Easton and Harrison.

UNMARKED GRAVES.

KNEISEL, A.

A young son of the Kneisels was buried on their farm, which was the NW/NE of Sec.34. The grave was along what is now the Pine View Road . Fred Tietz afterward owned the farm, an accidentally discovered the grave when one of his horses broke through while plowing. The remains were reburied by Fred Tietz and Wm. Safford, who was driving by, and recalled the circumstances. The platbook of 1891 shows the Kneissels as owners of the forty at that time.

Newman, Robert

Two infant children of the Robert Newman family on the right-of-way of the South Poll Road , on the East side of the road facing the SW/NE, of Sec.22, near the old Town Hall. When the roadway was widened in ____ The remains were dug up and reburied on the West side of the road where the Newman farm had been. This was done according to instructions from the Newman family, who had been contacted. The road boss at that time was Otto Uttecht. The plat book of 1901 shows the Town Hall at the southwest corner of the SW/NE of Section 22. (see Newman, Robert, in the index)

Carpenter, Robert

Daughter of Robert Carpenter was buried on the NE of the NE, of section 32. The grave was under an apple tree near the NE corner. The Carpenters lived here for a time, but they are not shown as owners of the land, on any of the Platbooks. Mr. Carpenter returned to the grave before moving to Florida with his son.

Lund, Chris.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. Lund was buried on the Lund place (NW/NE, Sec.6,29-10), in the year of _____. The location is said to have been where the garage later stood, but could be described now as North from the machine shed, toward the road.

SETTLER'S BRIEF RECORD.

This index, like the record, covers the period from 1877 until 1935. It attempts to list as many as possible of the residents during that period about whom no other information is available, and is derived from the old Plat Maps and Personal Property Tax Rolls. To eliminate absentee land owners and land- and lumber-speculators we have listed only those on whose land the maps showed the symbol indicating buildings, and have assumed that most of those having Personal Property also lived on their land. This list is unfortunately incomplete, as many of these families were like "ships that pass in the night", so restless were their feet, and so brief was their sojourn in the Town of Plover.

Organization of the Township.

County Board Meeting--June 17, 1890.

The County Board of Supervisors do ordain as follows:

Sec. 1/ That the territory hereinafter described be detached from the Town of Easton to-wit; Sections 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, of Town 29, Range 10 East; and that the following described territory be detached from the Town of Harrison to-wit: Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6, Town 29, Range 10 East, and that a new Town be organized out of the above described territory, to be known and constituted as the Town of Plover.

Sec. 2/ The Town of Plover shall consist of Range 10 East, Town 29 North, in Marathon County, Wis.

Sec. 3/ The first town meeting shall be held in said Town of Plover on the first Tuesday of April, 1891, at the school house in said Town of Plover.

Sec. 4/ The taxes to be collected from the tax levied for the year 1890, in the above mentioned territory, to be divided between the town of which the territory now forms a part, and said new town pro rata, according to the assessment roll of the Towns of Easton and Harrison of the year 1890, and all delinquent taxes from the Tax Sale of 1891, and all other resources in the same proportion, and all indebtedness, shall be assumed by said new Town pro rata, according to the assessment rolls for the year 1890. A meeting for effecting such division of property and indebtedness, if any, shall be held within ten days after said Towns of Plover, Easton and Harrison, at some place agreeable to them.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after it's passage and publication.
