
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SOLDIER , REST !

HISTORY OF WILLIAMS BAY (Instalment No. 3)

Unfortunately, the early setlers of Williams Bay were not given very much to writing of their experiences. However, Col. Samuel F. Phoenix, who was the first settler in Delavan, kept a diary and from that we get some very good word pictures of the neighborhood as it was first viewed by Israel Williams and his family.

" To the early explorers the country seemed a veritable paradise, waiting only for man to enter into possession. The southern and eastern parts of the county, which were the first to be viewed by prospectors, was watered by the most considerable lakes in the county. Geneva Lake, stretched for nine miles through heavily wood ed, rolling country, opening out at its southern extremity on to the beautiful Prairie of Big Foot. Across the country, some three miles to the northwest, another beautiful lake, then known as Swan Lake (Del-avan), lay in all its native loveliness, quite heavily wooded about its banks, but flanked farther north by open prairie and groves, or openings, as they were termed, of oaks"

" The oaks had a peculiar fascination for the incoming explorers. Few of them had ever seen the like before. Emerging from the deep woods, they came upon these natural parks, as clear of underbrush as an ordinary orchard, and skirting the prairies on every side. As an old pioneer expressed it, ' They seemed like the old apple orchards in York State, only the fences were all gone, and they extended as far as the eye could penetrate the shade!

It was along borders of these openings where they skirted the prairies, that the first farmers staked their claims, generally including a strip of timber and a strip of prairie.

On July 15, 1836, Col. Phoenix on his horse " Wall " starting from Spring Prairie (where already Dr. Ansel A. Hemenway had just 'erect-certain odors, or gases, which ed a log cabin), passed through the small settlement of a cabin or two at what is now Lake Geneva City, followed the trail on the north shore of Geneva Lake, then turned north and reached Swan Lake continuous flow of air and passed at dusk. He tells of the difficulties of his prospecting trips as follows, " In the midst of the untraversed wilderness, t rmented by hungry mosquitoes and bewildered in turns to the food chambers severtrying to trace the indistinct and sometimes hardly discernible surveyors lines, I was often hungry for the pleasant home in the East and for a brief time felt like giv- Call AMBROSE BROTHERS ICE & ing up ".

The surveyor's marks mentioned had been made the fall before by John Brink, John Hodgson, William Ostrander and party, who had taken a subcontract for surveying the section lines. As Williams Bay is bounded on the north by a section line and is divided east and west by one, this site must have been traversed by the group. It was on this surveying expedition that John Brink in making his map of the district put down ' Geneva Lake ' instead of following his instructions to use the Indian names, otherwise the Lake might have been called Kish-wau-ke-toc meaning " Clear Water."

The actual settlement of the county dates from 1836. Prior to that date, no claims were made on which the claimants remainded: as settlers. Early in 1836 the settlers began to arrive, the surveys had been completed, the Indian tit-le to the land had been extinguished and the country lay in its native loveliness, waiting to welcome the sturdy pioneer, who with their descendents, have made it to " bud and blossom as the rose ", and become the home of as happy and contente ed a community as exists anywhere on God's fair earth.


