Many of the over 3800 annual visitors to the Laboratory are educators from abroad because this valuable collection of textbooks and trade books is part of the Division of International Education of the U.S. Office of Education.

Educators from this country as well as local writers and illustrators also use the resources of the Laboratory. The three visitors pictured on our cover with Mrs. Lois B. Watt, Chief of the Laboratory (standing) are left to right: Miss Mary Helen Mahar, Office of Education Specialist for School and Children's Libraries; Mrs. Esther M. Douty, author and president of the Children's Book Guild of Washington; Dr. Helen K. Mackintosh, Chief of the Elementary Schools Section of the Office of Education.

They are looking over some of the books that are included in the latest issue of the Laboratory's *Report* which lists the materials on Africa added to the collection since 1959. Catholic Book Week, which is celebrated this year from February 18-24, has as its theme "Roots of Freedom: Faith and Knowledge." This is the twenty-second observation of this Week devoted to promoting the publication, distribution and reading of good Catholic literature. To aid in the celebration, there are an adult poster, a children's poster, reading lists, and bookmarks. These may be ordered from the Catholic Library Assoc., Villanova, Pa.

The American Library Assoc. has announced the appointment of Miss Dorothy McGinniss as Executive Secretary of the **American Assoc. of School Librarians**. Her predecessor, Eleanor Ahlers, resigned in the fall to become School Library Consultant for the State of Washington.

A unique collection of several hundred **foreign children's books** can now be seen at the new office of the Package Library of Foreign Children's Books located at 141 Fifth Ave., New York City. These books have been carefully selected under the sponsorship of the American Library Assoc., and represent outstanding books from fifteen countries. All of these books may also be ordered through the Package Library. Librarians and teachers visiting New York are invited to telephone AL 4-3155 for an appointment to see the collection.

Ready to greet the New Year are **two new booklets** from the Assoc. for Childhood Education International (3615 Wisconsin Avenue, N.W., Washington 16, D.C.)—*Literature with Children* and *Creative Dramatics*. The first contains twelve articles by such people as Leland Jacobs, Miriam Wilt, Fern Shipley, and Ruth Tooze and is packed with ideas and encouragement of particular help to teachers. *Creative Dramatics* will be of special interest to those teachers, librarians, and community group leaders who want to develop this kind of dramatics which ties in so closely with reading and books. Three valuable booklists are available in new editions. The first is the long-awaited second edition of Jean Roos' *PATTERNS IN READING: AN ANNOTATED BOOKLIST FOR YOUNG ADULTS*. It includes 1600 titles, of which 1300 are adult books, arranged in seventy-five broad patterns of reading interest. This list is published by the American Library Assoc. (50 East Huron St., Chicago 11) and costs \$2.25. The second list is the Child Study Association's annual *Books of the Year, 1961*. This list has two sections: one is "*Books of the Year for Children*" and the other is "*Books of the Year About Children, Parents, and Family Life*." This list is available from the Association's office at 9 East 89th St., New York 28 at 50¢ a copy. The third list which will be ready for shipping in March is the 1962 edition of *Best Books for Children* which is compiled in the offices of *School Library Journal* published by R. R. Bowker Co. (62 West 45th St., New York 36). This list contains approximately 3000 recommended children's books. It is available at \$3.00 per single copy. (Five copies or more ordered at the same time are \$2.00 each and a five year subscription for the annual edition is \$10.00.)

Two publications of possible interest to high school librarians are *USING BOOKS AND LIBRARIES* (4th Edition, 1960) by Ella Aldrich and published by Prentice-Hall. This is written for college students but the basic information, which is presented in a clear appealing fashion, will be equally helpful to high school students—particularly those who are going on to college. The second is a list of materials on economics prepared by a task force of the Committee for Economic Development studying means of improving the teaching of economics in high schools. The list of materials is available from the Committee's office (711 Fifth Avenue, New York 22) for 50¢. A copy of the report and recommendations of the task force is available for \$1.00.

Two recent additions to the *Wilson Library Bulletin* are a monthly series of articles about elementary school library work edited by Jean Lowrie of the Dept. of Librarianship at Western Michigan University and a regular column every other month by Doris Moulton, Librarian of Milwaukee Central Youth Library.

Watch for the **February issue of *The Horn Book Magazine***. Among the articles will be two about children's book publishing. One is the sixth Anne Carroll Moore lecture given by Margaret K. McElderry last April entitled "A Few Men and Women, an Editor's Thoughts on Children's Book Publishing." The other is "Children's Books in Asia" by Harold Munger of Franklin Publications.

A helpful booklet, *Recordings for Children* has been prepared by the Children's and Young Adult Services Section of the New York Library Association. The list is divided into various categories and is carefully annotated. It is \$1.00 per copy with a discount of 25% on orders of five or more copies. IN THIS SEASON

A new book that will be fun for all the birthdays and special days of 1962 is Esther Hautzig's *LET'S MAKE PRESENTS: 100 GIFTS FOR LESS THAN \$1.00* (Crowell) carefully planned for children's use and enjoyment.

The birthdays of one of the brothers Grimm and of Charles Perrault may be celebrated with such appropriate recent books as *FAVORITE FAIRY TALES TOLD IN GERMANY* and *FAVORITE FAIRY TALES TOLD IN FRANCE*, both by Virginia Haviland (Little, Brown), *HOUSEHOLD STORIES* by the Brothers Grimm with illustrations by Johannes Troyer (Macmillan), *HANSEL AND GRETEL* and *THE SLEEPING BEAUTY*, both illustrated by Warren Chappell (Knopf).

There is a Golden Anniversary Edition of *OLD MOTHER WEST WIND* (Little, Brown) to read in celebration of Thornton Burgess' birthday. And for Edgar Allan Poe's birthday a rereading of *THE GOLD BUG AND OTHER TALES AND POEMS* (Macmillan) would be in order or a venture into the new Alfred Hitchcock's *HAUNTED HOUSEFUL* (Random).

Two new titles to mark the February birthday of Charles Dickens are *WHY THEY WROTE* by Rhoda Hoff and *PLAYS AND HOW TO PUT THEM ON* by Moyne Rice Smith both with chapters concerning this author (both from Walck).

CAREERS IN RESEARCH SCIENCE by Theodore Wachs Jr. (Walck) joins the many books that would make appropriate reading on Edison's birthday.

A new book, *WILLIAM*, by Anne Welsh Guy (Dial) tells of a Negro boy's first months in a newly integrated school. You will want to include this with the other books in a display for Negro History Week and Brotherhood Week. For an excellent list on which to base such a display, be sure to have on hand the 1961 revision of *Books About Negro Life for Children* by Augusta Baker (25¢ from the Public Relations Office, New York Public Library, 42nd St. and Fifth Ave., New York 18).

Add to your list of Valentine books a new one, *MISS FLORA McFLIMSEY'S VALENTINE*, written and illustrated by Mariana (Lothrop).

The birthday of Lord Robert Baden-Powell and of his wife Lady Olave Baden-Powell is also known as Girl Scout Thinking Day and will be celebrated by Scouts and Girl Guides in fifty-one countries. A new book of interest for this event and the forthcoming fiftieth celebration of the Girl Scouts is *THE YOUNG BADEN-POWELL* by Arthur Catherall (Roy).

Good reading for the Lenten season are *THE STORY OF OUR LORD* by Fritz and Margaret Hug (Random) and *TEKLA'S EASTER* by Lillian Budd (Rand McNally). And for the beginning of Spring that will come shortly before Easter, these books belong on the list: *SEA SO BIG, SHIP SO SMALL* by Jeanne Bendick, *FROM SCALES TO FANCY FEATHERS* by Iona S. Hisen (both from Rand McNally) and *JUMP THE ROPE JINGLES* by Emma Worstell (Macmillan).

Shortly after Ghana's celebration of Independence Day, a photographic book of the children of Ghana, *PLAYTIME IN AFRICA* by Efus Sutherland, a principal in a Ghanaian elementary school will be published by Atheneum.

Of special interest for the one hundredth anniversary of the famous battle between the Merrimac and the Monitor is *MAN OF THE MONITOR, THE STORY OF JOHN ERICSSON* by Jean Lee Latham (Harper).

Three books for this year's National Wildlife Week are *COLBY'S NATURE ADVENTURE* by C. B. Colby (Dial), *UNUSUAL CAREERS ON OUR PLANET EARTH* by Martha Munzer, and *FOREST FIRE!* by Frances Judge (both from Knopf).

A new biography of David Livingstone the famous explorer of Africa will be published in time for his birthday. It is *THE YOUNG LIVINGSTONE* by Patricia Pringle (Roy).

GROVER CLEVELAND is a new biography of our twenty-second and twenty-fourth President by Edwin P. Hoyt (Reilly & Lee). Also dealing with the

subject of Presidents is the new Landmark book JOHN F. KENNEDY AND PT-109 by Richard Tregaski (Random) and an interesting book about the Presidential residence THE WHITE HOUSE SAGA by Nanette Kutner (Atheneum).

AWARDS AND PRIZES

Young Reader's Choice. This award presented annually by the Pacific Northwest Library Assoc. went in 1961 to DANNY DUNN AND THE HOMEWORK MACHINE by Jay Williams and Raymond Abrashkin. The selection is based on the popular vote of children in the four Northwest states and British Columbia. An official symbol for the award was adopted this year. It is reproduced on an attractive seal and a bookmark listing the 19 winners to date. These may be purchased from Miss Sara Dickinson, Enatai Elem. School, Bellevue, Wash. Price of the seal: 36 for \$1.00; 55 for \$1.50; 100 for \$2.50. Price of the bookmark: 100 for 50¢.

Southern California Children's Literature Awards. These three awards were first presented in November 1961 by the newly organized Southern California Council on Children's Literature. The donor of the awards is the *Los Angeles Times*. The award for "a notable book published during 1960" went to Scott O'Dell for ISLAND OF THE BLUE DOLPHINS (Houghton). The award for "a body of work of lasting value" went to Mary and Conrad Buff and Holling and Lucille Holling, and the award for "a significant contribution in the field of illustration published in 1960" went to Leo Politi for MOY MOY (Scribners).

Canadian Book of the Year for Children. The 1961 medal for a French-language book went to Claude Aubry for LES ILES DU ROI MAHA MAHA II. No award was given this year for a book written in English.

Texas Writers' Roundup Award. The thirteenth Annual Award was given to Mary Ellen Stevens and E. B. Sayles for THROW STONE: THE FIRST AMERICAN BOY 25,000 YEARS AGO (Reilly and Lee).

Follett Beginning-to-Read Award. The 1961 award went to Jean Horton Berg for THE O'LEARYS AND FRIENDS (Follett).

Lewis Carroll Shelf Selections. Among the books selected for this honor roll by the University of Wisconsin committee are: HITTY by Rachel Field (Macmillan), MISTY OF CHINCOTEAGUE by Marguerite Henry (Rand McNally), THE DOOR IN THE WALL by Marguerite de Angeli (Doubleday), and GRISHKA AND THE BEAR by Rene Guillot (Criterion).

THE COUNCIL AND ITS SERVICES

Over the past few years a number of new services and materials have been added to the Council's activities. Here is a checklist for our readers so that they will be sure to take advantage of them.

Information Sheets. These were created to answer some of the questions that we are asked most frequently. All are available for a stamped, self-addressed large envelope. There are five of them: 1) When You Submit a Manuscript, 2) The Newbery and Caldecott Medals, 3) How to Write to Publishers for Promotional Material, 4) Brief History of Book Week, 5) Members of the Council and their representatives.

The C.B.C. Library. This is a display of all the new books for children open for reference and research. The books are arranged by category. (Since this is a collection that is constantly growing and changing, no shelf list or catalogue is kept. Therefore, for specific bibliographic material, it is necessary to come to the library in person.)

The A.L.A.-C.B.C. Joint Committee. This committee is concerned with problems of mutual interest to publishers and librarians. It also sponsors the program of State Traveling Library Exhibits which are made available through a number of State Library Extension Departments.

Lists of Authors and Artists who Might be Available to Speak. These are made up by state and are sent out according to locale.

Pre-cut Stencils. There are two sheets of these (Series 10 and Series 20) each with a selection of drawings ready for incorporation into booklists that are to be mimeographed. 50¢ each.

Parties in Favorite Books. This is a new quiz for any time of year (50¢). The Book Party Napkins each with one of the illustrations from the quiz and the Special Book Pencils are appropriate to highlight any book or library event. (The Napkins are a set of 16 for 25¢, the pencils are 25 for \$3.00, 50 for \$5.00 and a gross for \$7.50. The Book Party Quiz Kit containing the quiz, 32 pencils and napkins and a special pad of answer sheets is \$2.50.)

Book Fair Kit. A variety of materials to aid those who are planning book fairs. \$1.25.

Aids to Choosing Books for Your Children. A folder giving the names and sources of helpful booklists and books about children's books. 5¢ per copy, 50 for \$1.00.

Collection of Books about Children's Books. The Council is building a reference collection not only of current books on the subject of children's literature and reading but also of out-of-print books on the subject.

Exhibit of Foreign Book Week Posters. This collection of ten posters is available on loan.
