### RULES AND ORDERS OF ASSEMBLY.

1. The Assembly shall choose, viva voce, one of Duties of their own number to occupy the chair. He shall be Speaker. styled Speaker of Assembly. He shall hold his office during one session of the Assembly. He shall take the chair at the hour to which the House is adjourned, and call the members to order; and if a quorum be present, he shall direct the minutes of the preceding day to be read, and mistakes, if any, corrected. He shall pre-erve order and decorum, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the House. In committee of the whole, he shall call some member to the chair, and may debate any question before the committee; in the House he may also call a member to the chair; but such a substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment. He shall, unless otherwise directed by the House, appoint all committees. He shall vote on a call of yeas and nays. In the absence of the Speaker, the House shall elect a Speaker pro tem., whose office shall cease on the return of the Speaker.

2. A Clerk shall be elected at the commencement Duties of of each session, to hold his office at the pleasure of the House; he shall keep a correct Journal of the daily proceedings of the body, and perform such other duties as may be assigned to him; he shall superintend the recording of the journals of proceedings; the engrossing, enrolling, transcribing and copying of bills, resolutions, &c.; shall permit no records or papers belonging to the Assembly to be taken out of his custody, otherwise than in the regular course of business; shall report any missing papers to the notice of the Speaker; and generally, shall perform, under the direction of the Speaker, all duties pertaining to his office as Clerk.

3. A Sergeant-at-Arms shall be elected at the Duties of commencement of each session, to hold his office at Sergeant-at-the pleasure of the House. It shall be his duty to execute all orders of the Speaker or House, and to perform all the duties they may assign to him, con-

nected with the police and good order of the Assembly Chamber; to exercise a supervision over the ingress and egress of all persons to and from the Chamber; to see that messages, &c., are promptly executed; that the requisite fires are kept up during the appropriate season; that the hall is properly ventilated, and is open for the use of the members of the Assembly from 8 A. M. until 10 P. M., and to perform all other services pertaining to the post of Sergeant-at-Arms.

8. Contestants for seats shall have the privileges Contestants of the House until their respective cases are disposed for Seats. of; the privileges to extend only so far as access to the Assembly Chamber during time occupied in set-

tling the contest.

9. The following classes of persons, and no others, Admission shall be admitted to the floor of the House during the sessions thereof, viz.: 1st. Governor and Lieut. Governor; 2d. Members of the Senate; 3d. The State officers; 4th. The Regents of the University; 5th. Members of Congress; oth. Judges of the Supreme and other courts; 7th. Ex-members of the Wisconsin Legislature; 8th. All editors of newspapers within the State, and reporters for the press; Such other persons as the Speaker may invite.

Any fifteen members may make a call of the House and require absent members to be sent for; but a call of the House cannot be made after the voting has commenced; and the call of the House being ordered, and the absentees noted, the doors shall be closed, and no member permitted to leave the room, until the report of the Sergeant-at-Arms be received and acted upon, or further proceedings in the call dispensed with by a majority of the members elect.

Mr. Speaker to be addressed.

14. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall arise from his seat, and respectfully address himself to "Mr. Speaker," and shall confine himself to the question under debate, and avoid personality.

15. When any two or more members shall arise has the floor, at the same time, the Speaker shall name the member who is first to speak.

Motions.

18. When a motion is made, it shall be stated by the Speaker, or read by the Clerk, previous to debate. If any member require it, all motions (except to adjourn, postpone or commit,) shall be reduced to writing. Any motion may be withdrawn, by consent of the House, before division or amendment.

- 19. All questions shall be put in this form: Questions, "Those who are of opinion (as the case may be,) say aye. Those of contrary opinion, say no." And in doubtful cases, any member may call for a division.
- 20. Every member present, when a question is put, Each Memor when his name is called, shall vote, unless the House shall, for special cause, excuse him; but it shall not be in order for a member to be excused after the House has commenced voting.
- 21. When a member is called to order, he shall sit call to order down, and shall not speak, except in explanation, until the Speaker shall have determined whether he is in order or not; and every question of order shall be decided by the Speaker, subject to appeal to the House by any member; and if a member be called to order for words spoken, the exceptionable words shall be taken down in writing, that the Speaker and the House may be better able to judge.

22. Any member offering a resolution in the House, Resolutions. may read the same in his place before sending it to the chair. It shall then be read by the Clerk, and when so read shall be considered to be before the House; but it shall not be acted upon by the House on the same day on which it is offered, without leave.

23. Petitions, memorials, communications, and Petitions &c. other papers, addressed to the Assembly, shall be presented by a member in his place; a brief statement of the contents thereof shall be made verbally, and endorsed thereon, together with his name, by the member introducing the same.

24. It shall be competent for one-sixth of the Ayes & Noes members present, when a question is taken, to call for the ayes and noes, which shall be recorded by the Clerk.

25. Any member may call for a division of the Division almain question, when the same will admit thereof.

26. Every bill shall be introduced by motion for Introduction of Bills leave, or by order of the House on a report of the committee.

27. The first reading of a bill shall be for infor-First Readmation, and if objections be made to it, the question shall be, "Shall the bill be rejected?" If no objections be made, or the question to reject be lost, the

bill shall go to its second reading without further question.

Motion to adjourn.

28. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order. except when the House is voting. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and a call for the previous question, shall be decided without debate.

Precedence of motions.

29. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, unless to adjourn; to lay on the table; for the previous question; to postpone to a day certain; to commit; to amend, or to postpone indefinitely; and these several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arrang-A motion to postpone to a day certain, to commit, or to postpone indefinitely, being decided, shall not be again allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition.

Previous question.

30. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring the House to a direct vote upon the pending amendments, and then upon the main question. When, on taking the previous question, the House shall decide that the main question, shall not now be put, the main question shall remain as the question before the House, in the same stage of proceedings, as before the previous question was ordered. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to the seconding of the same, one call of the House shall be in order; but after proceedings under such call have been once dispensed with, or after a majority shall have seconded such motion, no call shall be in order prior to a decision of the main question.

31. On the third reading of a bill or resolution, no amendment, except to fill blanks, shall be received, except by the unanimous consent of the members present.

The final question upon the second reading of every bill or other paper originating in the Assembly, and requiring three readings previous to being passed, shall be, "Shall it be engrossed and read the third time?" and upon every such bill or paper originating in the Senate, "Shall it be read a third time?" No bill or Ordering to resolution that requires three readings, shall be committed or amended until it shall be twice read; and all joint resolutions which will require the signature of the Governor, shall take the same course as to their reading, as in the case of bills, unless otherwise ordered by the House. And every bill and res- Engrossm'nt olution ordered to be engrossed and read a third time, shall be re-written in a plain hand, with all amendments, before being read a third time, except as is provided for in Rule 43.

40. It shall be in order for the committee on enrolled bills to report at any time, except when questions are being taken, or a call of the house is being

Enrollment.

41. The Committee on Enrolled Bills shall not report any bill as correctly enrolled, that has any words interlined therein, or when any words have been erased therefrom.

Bills to be transmitted to Senate.

42. After examination and report, each bill shall be certified by the Clerk, and by him transmitted to the Senate; the day of transmission shall be entered on the bill books of the Clerk.

Engrossme't of Bills.

43. Whenever an Assembly bill, which is fairly written, without interlineation or erasure, is ordered to be engrossed for a third reading, without amendment, the committee on engrossed bills may report such bill back to the House as the engrossed bill.

No debate on Fridays and Saturdays.

44. On Friday and Saturday of each week, bills and resolutions which do not elicit debate, shall be considered in their order on the calendar of business in preference to all other business, and this rule shall govern the order of business when the House is in committee of the whole.

Signature of Speaker and Clerk.

45. All acts, addresses and resolutions, shall be signed by the Speaker; and all writs, warrants and subpænas issued by order of the House, shall be under his hand and seal, and attested by the Clerk.

Hour of meeting.

46. The hour for the meeting of the Assembly shall be at 10 o'clock, A. M.

Rules in Committee of the Whole.

47. The rules observed in the Assembly shall govern, as far as practicable, the proceedings in the committee of the whole; except that a member may speak more than twice on the same subject, and that a call of the aves and noes, or for the previous question, cannot be made in committee.

Bills to be printed.

48. Two hundred copies of every bill shall be printed after a second reading, unless otherwise or-And all bills, resolutions, and memorials that shall be printed, shall remain at least one day on the files after being printed, before being considered.

49. No standing rule or order of the House, shall Suspension be rescinded or changed without one day's notice tion of Rules being given of the motion therefor. Nor shall any rule be suspended, except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present. Nor shall the order of business, as established by the rules of the House, be postponed or changed, except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present.

50. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Jefferson's Manual, shall govern the Assembly Manual in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with these rules, and the orders of the Assembly, and the joint rules and

orders of the Senate and Assembly.

# REGULATIONS FOR THE DAILY TRANSACTION OF BUSINESS.

After the Journal shall have been read, and an opportunity given to correct it, the order of business shall be as follows:

### XXVII.—JOINT RULES AND ORDERS

Printing of reports.

Whenever any report of a joint committee, or other document, shall be presented to both Houses of the Legislature, the House first acting on the same, if it shall be thought necessary to have it printed, shall order a sufficient number of copies for both branches, and shall immediately inform the other House of its action upon the subject.

Joint convention

21. Whenever there shall be a joint convention of the two Houses, the proceedings shall be entered at length on the Journal of each House. The Lieutenant Governor shall preside ever such joint convention, and the Chief Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk thereof, assisted by the Chief Clerk of the Assembly; Provided, That the Lieutenant Governor shall not act in said convention except as presiding officer, and in no case shall have the right to give a casting vote.

### XXVIII.--RULES AND ORDERS OF THE SENATE.

The Lieutenant Governor of the State, who, Calling Senby the 8th Section of the 5th Article of the Con- ate to order. stitution, is constituted ex officio, President of the Senate, shall, when present, take the chair at the hour fixed for the meeting of the Senate, when he shall immediately call the members to order, who shall thereupon take their seats, and continue with their heads uncovered, while the Senate remains in session; the Clerk shall call the roll of members, and as soon as a majority is present, the journal of the preceding day shall be read, to the end, that any mistake may be corrected.

2. The President shall preserve order and decorum; President. he may speak to points of order in preference to other members, rising from his seat for that purpose; and shall decide points of order, subject to an ap-

peal to the Senate by any member.

3. The President shall have the right to name any President. member to perform the duties of the chair temporarily, who shall be invested, during such time, with all the powers of the President; but no member shall be excused from voting on any question by reason of his occupying the chair; nor shall such substitute's authority, as presiding officer, extend beyond a day's adjournment of the Senate.

4. In the absence or inability of the President, President pro tem. except as provided in rule three, the Senate shall appoint a President pro tempore, who shall possess all the powers and prerogatives of the President of the

Senate for the time being.

5. Whenever the Senate determines to go into committee of the whole, the President shall name one of the members as chairman, who shall, for the time being, be invested with all the authority of presiding officer of the Senate.

7. Whenever any disturbance or disorderly conduct shall occur in the lobby, the President (or chairman of the committee of the whole,) shall have power to cause the same to be cleared of all persons except the members and officers of the Senate.

The Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Treasurer, Attorney General, Senators and ex-Senators, and Members of Congress, Judges of any Courts, Members and ex-Members of State Legislatures, and Members of the Assembly of this State, and all editors of newspapers in the State, may be admitted to seats within the bar of the Senate.

16. After the Journal shall have been read, and Reading Journal, order of busian opportunity given to correct it, the order of business shall be as follows:

> 1. Letters, petitions, memorials, remonstrances and accompanying documents may be presented and referred.

> 2. Resolutions may be offered and considered, notice of intention to introduce bills may be given,

and bills may be introduced on leave granted.

3. Reports of committees may be made and considered; first from standing committees, and next from select committees.

4. Messages, and other Executive communications.

- Messages from the Assembly, and amendments proposed by the Assembly to bills from the Senate.
- Bills and resolutions from the Assembly on their first and second reading.

7. Bills on their third reading.

8. Bills ready for a third reading.

9. Bills reported by a committee of the whole.

10. Bills in which a committee of the whole has made progress, and obtained leave to sit again.

 Bills not yet considered in committee of the whole.

17. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Senate, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to "Mr. President," and shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.

18. When any member is called to order, he shall call to orde sit down until it shall be determined whether he is in order or not, except he be permitted to explain; and if a member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the exceptionable words shall be taken down in writing immediately.

19. When two or more members happen to rise at the same time, the President shall name the member

who is first to speak.

20. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question during the same day, nor more than once on a motion for commitment without

leave of the Senate.

- 21. While the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no member shall walk out of or across the room, nor entertain private discourse; nor whilst a member is speaking, shall pass between him and the chair. No member or other person shall visit or remain by the Clerk's table while the ayes and noes are being called, or the ballots counted.
  - 22. No member shall vote on any question in any

case where he was not within the chamber of the Senate when the question was put, unless by leave of the Senate; nor shall any member be counted, upon a division and count of the Senate, who shall be without the chamber at the time.

Every Senator to vote unless excused

23. Every member who may be within the Senate chamber, when the question is put, shall give his vote unless the Senate shall excuse him from When a question is being taken, or about voting. to be taken, it shall be competent for any member to call for the ayes and noes, which shall be entered on the journal. All motions to excuse a member from voting shall be made before the call of aves and noes is commenced; and any Senator wishing to be excused from voting, may briefly and pertinently explain his reasons therefor, before the call of aves and noes is commenced; but when the aves and noes are being taken, the call shall not be interrupted for any purpose whatever.

24. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, or, being in writing, it shall be handed to the chair, and read aloud before

debated.

Motion to be in writing.

25. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if

the President or any member desire it.

Motion made

26. After a motion is stated by the President, or in possession read by the Clerk, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the Senate, but may be withdrawn or altered at any time before a decision or amendment, on leave of the Senate.

Motions, order of.

27. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be in order, except to adjourn, to send for papers for reconsideration, to reconsider, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone to a day certain, to commit, to amend, to strike out the enacting clause, or postpone indefinitely; and these several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they herein stand arranged. But a motion to postpone to a day certain, to strike out the enacting clause, or postpone indefinitely, shall not again be in order on the same day, or at the same stage of the proposition.

Adjourn.

28. A motion to adjourn shall be always in order, except as restricted by the "previous question."

motion to adjourn, lay on the table, or take a recess,

shall be decided without debate.

29. The "previous question" shall be in this form : The previous "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when sustained by a majority of the members present, and shall preclude amendments and further debate, until the main question shall have been disposed of. The "main question" shall be the original proposition and pending amendments .-When the Senate shall have determined that the main question shall not now be put, the pending subject shall be considered as remaining under debate. When the Senate shall have determined that the main question shall now be put, its effect shall be to bring the Senate to a direct vote-first on pending amendments in their order, and then on the main question, without debate or further amendment. But after the previous question has been sustained, and prior to the Senate having determined that the main question shall now be put, a motion to adjourn, and a call of the Senate shall each be once in order; but no further motion or call shall be in order, except to receive the report of the Sergeant-at-Arms, or dispense with proceedings under the call; and all motions and proceedings authorized by this rule shall be decided without debate, whether on appeal or otherwise.

30. It shall be in order for any member who voted Reconsiderain the majority on any question, or for any member tion. who voted in the negative, when the Senate was equally divided, to move a reconsideration of such vote, on the same or next succeeding day that the Senate shall be in session; and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn, and a motion to recall from the Assembly the proposition on which the vote is proposed to be reconsidered. But no motion to reconsider shall be in order, unless the paper, on which the vote is proposed to be reconsidered, is in possession of the A motion to reconsider having been put and lost, shall be deemed a finality on that question.

31. Any member may call for a division of the question.

question, when the same shall admit of it. A motion to strike out being lost, shall not preclude an

amendment, nor a motion to strike out and insert. 32. In presenting a petition, memorial, remonstrance, or other communication, addressed to the Senate or Assembly, the member shall only state the

general purport of it.

Papers to be read before presented.

A member offering a resolution, or an amendment to a bill, resolution or memorial, shall first read the same in his place, before presenting it to the President; and every petition, memorial, remonstrance, resolution, bill and report of committee. shall be endorsed with its appropriate title; and immediately under the endorsement, the name of the member presenting the same shall be written.

Call of the Senate.

34. Any three members may make a call of the Senate and require absent members to be sent for, but a call of the Senate cannot be made after the voting has commenced; and the call of the Senate being ordered, and the absentees noted, the doors shall be closed, and no member permitted to leave the room until the report of the Sergeant-at-Arms be received and acted upon, or further proceeding in the call be suspended, or the Senate adjourn. vious to the reception of such report, further proceedings in the call shall not be suspended, except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

Rules to govern in Com-

35. The rules observed in the Senate shall govern, mittee of the as far as practicable, the proceedings in committee of the whole, except that a member may speak oftener than twice on the same subject, and that a call of the aves and noes, or for the previous queston, cannot be made in committee.

Amendme'ts in Commit-Whole.

36. Amendments made in committee of the whole tee of the shall be entered on a separate piece of paper, and reported to the Senate by the Chairman, standing in his place, on the floor of the Senate. All amendments and other propositions reported by the committee of the whole, shall be disposed of in the same manner as if proposed in the Senate.

Introduction of bills.

37. All bills and resolutions shall be introduced by motion for leave, after one day's previous notice, or upon reports of committees. And all bills, when introduced, shall be endorsed with the name of the member or committee.

38. Every bill, memorial, or joint resolution re-Bills quiring the signature of the Governor shall receive times. three several readings previous to its passage.

no such bill, or memorial, or joint resolution, shall receive a second and third reading on the same day.

39. No bill or joint resolution shall be committed Commitments. or amended until it has been twice read. If objections are raised to the bill on its first reading, the question shall be "Shall the bill be rejected?" no objection be made, or the question to reject be

lost, the bill shall go to its second reading.

40. All bills and joint resolutions, requiring the Committee approval of the Governor, shall, on a second reading, to consider be considered in committee of the whole, before they all bills. shall be acted upon by the Senate; and those originating in the Senate, except resolutions not requiring the approval of the Governor, and except appropriations or local bills, before being considered in committee of the whole, shall be printed, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate.

41. Two hundred and forty copies of every bill, Copies to be intresolution or monopial of a manual action by printed. joint resolution or memorial of a general nature, shall be printed after the second reading, unless otherwise ordered; and no bill of a private or local nature shall be printed unless ordered; and all bills, resolutions and amendments, after being printed, shall remain at least one day on the files before being considered.

42. The final question upon the second reading Engrossof every bill or other paper, originating in the Sen-ment of bills ate, and requiring three readings previous to being passed, shall be, "Shall it be engrossed and read the third time?" and upon every such bill or paper originating in the Assembly, "Shall it be ordered to a third reading?"

43. After a bill has been read a third time, no Amend-ments on 3d amendments shall be in order, except to fill blanks, reading: without the unanimous consent of the Senate, unless, on commitment, such amendments shall have been reported by a committee, in which case, after amendments so reported shall have been disposed of, the question shall be the same as was pending before the reference, unless otherwise ordered by the A bill, resolution, or memorial, may be

Bills to be engrossed.

committed at any time previous to its passage,

44. Every bill, joint resolution, or memorial originating in the Senate, shall be carefully engrossed before being transmitted to the Assembly for concurrence.

Clerk to transmit embly.

45. Immediately after the passage of any bill or bills to As-other paper, to which the concurrence of the Assembly is to be asked, it shall be the duty of the Clerk to transmit the same to the Assembly, unless some member of the Senate shall make a motion to reconsider the vote by which the Senate passed said bill, or other paper, in which case the Clerk shall not transmit said bill or other paper, until the motion to reconsider has been put; and on the concurrence in any bill or other paper of the Assembly by the Senate, or on the concurrence or disagreement in any vote of the Assembly by the Senate, it shall also be the duty of the Clerk to notify the Assembly thereof.

Memorials

46. Memorials to Congress, to the President of to Congress. the United States, or the head of either of the departments, shall be considered in committee of the whole before being adopted.

Committees not to be absent unless leave be granted. Enrollmunt.

47. Committees shall not absent themselves from the Senate by reason of their appointment, unless special leave for that purpose be first obtained.

48. It shall be in order for the committee on enrollment to report at any time.

Executive sessions.

49. The proceedings of the Senate on executive business shall be kept in a separate book of record. to be provided by the Chief Clerk of the Senate, and published with the proceedings of the Senate. When an amendment of the Constitution, or any bill requiring the concurrence of more than a majority of Senators present, is under consideration, a mere majority may decide all questions arising thereon, except the final question.

Jefferson's Manual.

50. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Jefferson's Manual, shall govern the Senate in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with these rules and the orders of the Senate, and the joint rules and orders of the Senate and Assembly. Upon the final passage of any bill or proposition in which the concur rence of more than a majority of Senators present

is required by the Constitution of this State, the question shall be taken by aves and noes, which shall Ayes and be entered at large upon the journal, and it shall be called and the duty of the Chief Clerk to certify on the back certified. of every such bill or proposition, the number of Senators voting for and against the passage of the same.

51. The President is authorized to administer all President to oaths prescribed in the foregoing rules.

52. The standing hour for the daily meeting of Hour of the Senate, shall be 10 o'clock in the morning, until meeting the Senate direct otherwise.

53. No standing rule or order of the Senate shall Rules not to be rescinded or changed without one day's notice be rescinded therefor; nor shall any rule be rescinded, changed or tice. suspended except by a vote of at least two-thirds of



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
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
