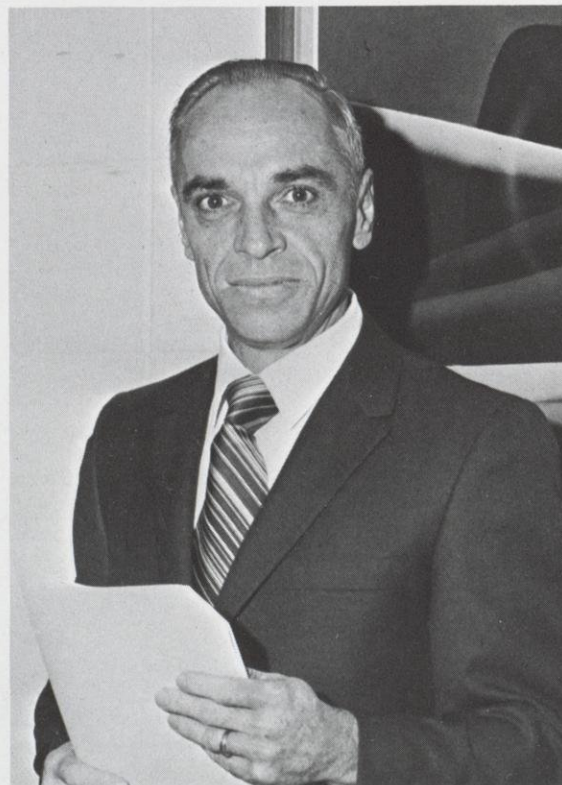

The French booths are frequently used to help develop conversation skills.



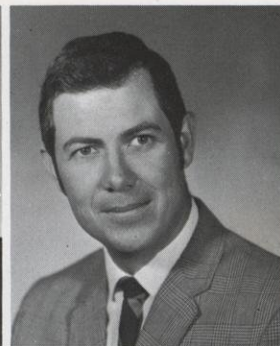
Experimenting into the future

Kris Smith kept pace with her fingers while typing a timed paragraph.

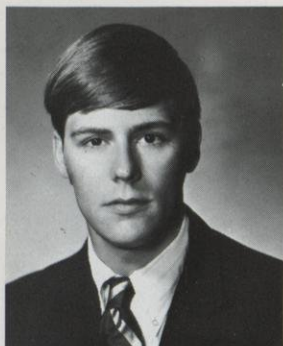

Students formed their own discussion groups in Miss Carlin's English class.



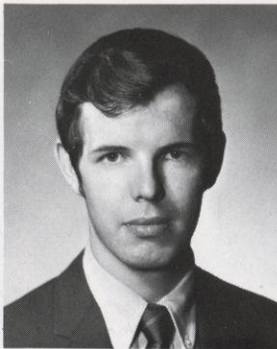

I'm remembering a really nice dream that I had about a year ago.

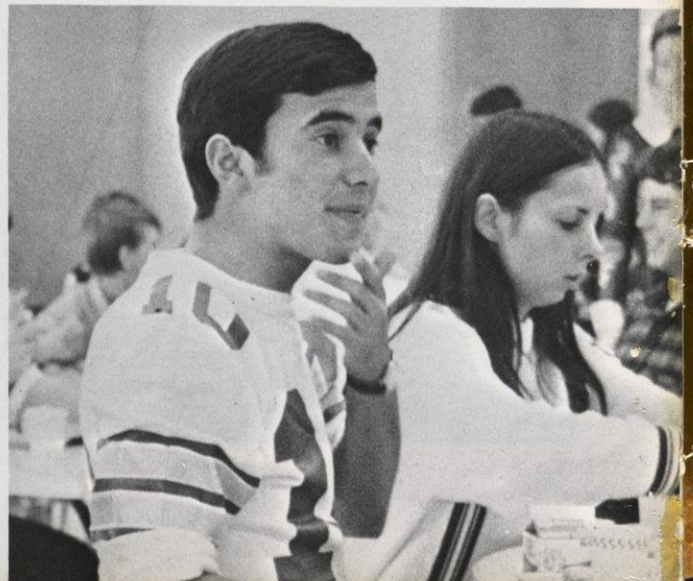
I was dreaming about flying to another country and having the opportunity to meet and to know many people like myself and live among them, as one more person.

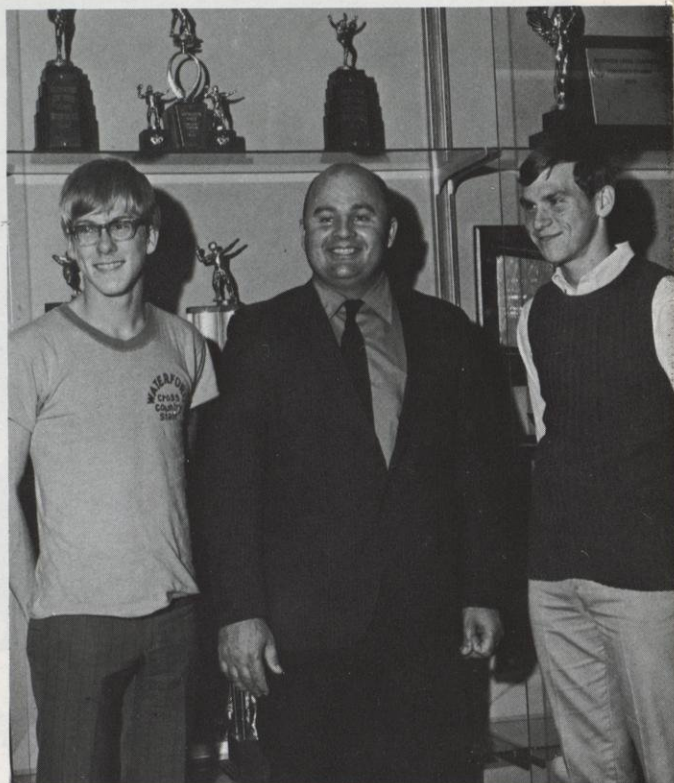
