

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING

At the annual school meeting on July 10th there were nearly a hundred in attendance. There was some delay in starting due to a short circuit in the electric light wires but business was carried on by the aid of lamps and a long cord light.

Mr. F. M. Van Epps was chosen chairman and Clerk Van Biesbroeck acted as secretary. L. A. Hollister was re-elected President of the School Board for three years.

Treasurer Ragnild Nelson showed the expenditures for the last year as follows: (the budget for the new year is given also.)



Boy Scout Log Cabin

Ground was broken last Monday for the foundation of the Log Cabin to be erected on the Boy Scout Camp east of the village. A number of volunteers have generously offered to do their share of the work. Mr. Eric Werner supervises the job. The following men have already been wielding the pick and shovel: Andrew Anderson, Art Etenstrom, Pete Gates, Albin Johnson, Theodore Imega, Ivar Nicholson, and also Ude Imega who was sent down by Carl Ridell. Alfred Johnson sent his tankwagon for the water supply and Dan Blad offered his cement mixer and his help in pouring the cement. After that the work will be mostly up to the carpenters, several of whom have declared their willingness to help. With such all-around cooperation it is hoped that the work will be completed in a short time.

According to the recently taken school census, which includes all children between 4 and 20 years of age, no matter if they attend school or not, there are this year 340 children in the district against 280 last year. For the village of Williams Bay alone the total of this year is 184, an increase of 13 over last year.


