



# 2003-04 SEASON OUTLOOK

As Wisconsin's youngest varsity sport, the women's hockey team is poised to enter the 2003-04 season standing tall like a worldly veteran, not the green five-year-old one might assume.

UW completed 2003 ranked fifth in the final U.S. College Hockey Online Poll and No. 6 in the *USA Today/American Hockey Magazine* Poll for the team's highest final rankings in school history.

Additionally, the Badgers' 22-8-5 overall record (14-6-4 WCHA) ties the 2001-02 team for most wins in a season and set the school record with a .700 winning percentage.

The Badgers graduated a class of seniors in 2003 that helped write both the Wisconsin and WCHA record books, but under the direction of second-year head coach Mark Johnson and his staff, the Wisconsin roster brings both experience and talent back to the ice. Add eight new frosh faces and Johnson is excited for this season.

"We have a good nucleus coming back," Johnson said. "When you have a solid upper class core of players and you surround them with good young players, it will really create a positive competitive atmosphere. We have a good balance of players and I like our look right now."

"It's going to be very competitive. We have 24 good players, so it will be a competitive atmosphere for ice time. It's a good problem to have and, from a coaching standpoint, that's what you want to create."

Leading the Badgers' offensive ranks are seniors and assistant captains Meghan Hunter and Steph Millar, along with junior Jackie Friesen. The trio helped Wisconsin finish third among all WCHA schools in scoring offense with a 3.14 goals-per-game average.

Hunter finished second on the team in scoring in 2003 with seven goals and 19 assists for 26 points. Her 149 career points now stands a close second to former teammate Kendra Antony's school record of 159, a mark that Hunter looks sure to surpass this season.

Hudson, Wis., native Millar notched nine goals and 12 assists for 21 points in 2003, a feat tied by Friesen for fifth on the team. With just six of her points tallied on assists, Friesen led the team with 15 goals.

She also joined Hunter and junior Carla MacLeod, the 2003-04 team captain, on the Canadian U-22 national team last February, as four Badgers were selected to national teams in 2003 (former Badger Kerry Weiland was also named to the U.S. women's select team).

The duo of MacLeod and Friesen teamed up again with two of Wisconsin's new frosh—Meaghan Mikkelsen and Bobbi-Jo Slusar—on Canada's U-22 team in July for a three-game series against the U.S. U-22 team,

including UW teammate Molly Engstrom in her first national team appearance.

Senior Karen Rickard (5-9=14), junior Amy Vermeulen (7-7=14) and sophomore Nikki Burish (7-8=15) will provide added depth in the scoring lines for Wisconsin, while the 2003 team rookie of the year Sharon Cole (4-7=11), senior Stephanie Boeckmann (4-4=8), junior Leah Federman and frosh Grace Hutchins (1-6=7) all have proven they can produce on the Badger line.

Wisconsin's lone utility player, senior Kathryn Greaves (1-6=7), will again play both forward and defender this season for another UW scoring option or as a member of the Badger defense looking to maintain its dominant presence in the Conference.

A WCHA defensive player of the week for Oct. 15, 2002, junior Nicole Uliasz returns to take her place as one of Wisconsin's top-scoring defenders.

The former 2001 U.S. National Team member led all UW defenders with a +20 and finished second to 2003 senior Sis Paulson (total scoring team leader with 7-24=31) in scoring among defenders with seven goals and 16 assists for 23 points.

The Badgers finished second among WCHA schools in scoring defense with a 1.91 goals-per-game average in 2003 and juniors Engstrom and MacLeod will join Uliasz in continuing to build Wisconsin's successful defense.

Homegrown in Siren, Wis., Engstrom posted four goals and 10 assists for 14 points and was +3, while MacLeod finished the season with two goals and five assists for seven points and was +7 during the season.

Perhaps the biggest questions concerning Wisconsin women's hockey will be between

the pipes. Former goaltender Jackie MacMillan has been the Badgers' most dominant goaltender since the program's inaugural season in 1999. Her graduation opens up the net for a battle between two of Wisconsin's returning goalies and one newcomer.

Sophomores Jessica Bernal and Meghan Horras bring limited college experience to the position—Bernal played in two games as a frosh, while Horras played in three—and will face fierce competition from incoming recruit Christine Dufour.

"We've got three goaltenders and it's going to come down to who steps forward and shows that they can play consistently over the course of the season and even over the course of a game," Johnson said. "I told Jessica and Meghan that the spot is wide open. It's the first time in the program that the position has been open for people to compete for."

Prior to their time with the Badgers, California native Bernal played on the Cal Select U-19 team at the U.S. National Championship and

played club hockey for the West Valley Wolves, while Horras was named Ms. Wisconsin Hockey in 2002 and played for both Team Wisconsin and the Appleton United High School Boy's Team. A member of Team Canada's U-22 squad, Dufour played for Pomfret Academy (Conn.) and the Connecticut Polar Bears U-19 team.

"Anytime you create competition and have good people vying for a position, it's healthy. We're going to put the goalie in that gives us the best chance to win and if that changes on a game-to-game or a week-to-week basis, that's how it will be at the start."

Five forwards and two defenders will join Dufour as first-year Badgers. Versatility and size will mark the addition of Wisconsin's newest forwards—Sara Bauer, Heidi Kletzien, Lindsay Macy, Mikkelsen and Phoebe Monteleone—while Wisconsin's defensive corps will gain deft control and vision from Slusar and Kristen Witting.

The Badger schedule offers up 32 regular-season games for its fans, including trips to Maine and California, along with an increasingly competitive WCHA calendar to further test the moxie of this maturing squad.

"I'm anxious to see what this team's identity becomes," Johnson said. "The theme in the early season will be unity, togetherness and working as a team because if this team is going to be successful, they are going to have to pull for one another due to the inexperience we have at some of the positions."

"That excites me. Any time you get eight freshmen in, it's fun from our standpoint, because you like to teach the game and see people work at it and get better."

# HEAD COACH MARK JOHNSON

**W**ith just one year under his belt as Wisconsin's head coach, Mark Johnson has created a strong foundation on which the Badgers can continue to build success.

Named the 2003 WCHA Co-Coach of the Year with Minnesota-Duluth's Shannon Miller and also one of eight finalists for the American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year, Johnson guided Wisconsin to a 22-8-5 overall and 14-6-4 WCHA record last season.


The Badgers' 22 wins tied the 2001-02 team for most wins in a season and the .700 winning percentage is a UW record.

## ■ Experience

The third head coach in the program's history, Johnson joined the staff after serving as an assistant coach with the men's program from 1996-2002.

During that time, he helped the team to a WCHA regular-season title during the 1999-2000 season, as well as a WCHA Final Five championship in the 1997-98 campaign.

Prior to his time with the Badgers, Johnson coached professionally, directing the expansion Madison Monsters to a 37-30-7 mark in the 1995-96 season and earning Colonial Hockey League Coach of the Year honors.



He also led a pair of area high schools, serving as the head coach for Verona for 1994-95 and as the assistant coach for Madison Memorial for 1993-94.

Most recently, Johnson served as an assistant coach with the 2002 U.S. Men's National Team that competed in the 2002 International Ice Hockey Federation World Championship in Gothenburg, Jonkoping, and Karlstad, Sweden.

He had previously served in a similar capacity for the 2000 World Championship in St. Petersburg, Russia.

In September 2001, he served as an on-ice assistant coach at the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Orientation Camp in Colorado Springs, featuring 38 of the top American players in the National Hockey League.

## ■ Excellence

During his playing career, he helped Wisconsin to the 1977 national championship during his freshman campaign. The first Badger to ever win WCHA Rookie of the Year honors, he went on to become the school's second all-time leading scorer with 256 points on a school-record 125 goals and 131 assists in just three seasons.

The 1978-79 WCHA MVP was a two-time first team All-WCHA pick and a two-time All-American. He was also recently selected as one of the WCHA's "Top 50 Players in 50 Years."

Johnson has represented USA Hockey as a player in 13 international tournaments, with his most recent appearance as part of the U.S. National Team at the 1998 IIHF (A-Pool) World Championship Qualification Tournament in Austria. Most notably, he led the 1980

U.S. Olympic Team's gold medal-winning effort with 11 points, including two goals in the "Miracle-On-Ice" against the Soviet Union and the game-winning goal against Finland in the final contest.


The team attended the opening ceremonies of the 2002 Olympic Winter Games to light the flame and was honored by *Sports Illustrated* as giving us the 'Greatest Sports Moment of the Century.'

Additionally, USA Hockey inducted Johnson and the rest of the 1980 Olympic team into the United States Hockey Hall of Fame in 2003.

### ■ The Next Level

Following his Olympic experience, Johnson embarked on a successful 11-year NHL career. He began his pro tenure with the Pittsburgh Penguins (1980-82), before moving onto the Minnesota North Stars (1982).

He also enjoyed stints with the Hartford Whalers (1982-85), St. Louis Blues (1985) and New Jersey Devils (1985-90). Over his 669 career NHL contests, the forward

ward collected 203 goals, 305 assists and 508 points, highlighted by his 87-point season as captain of Hartford in 1983-84. He also tied an NHL All-Star Game record with three assists that season.


### ■ A Hockey Family

A 1999 inductee into the International Ice Hockey Federation Hall of Fame, Johnson is the son of legendary Wisconsin men's head coach Bob Johnson (1966-82) and brother of former men's assistant coach Peter Johnson (1987-91).

One of Wisconsin's most decorated athletes in any sport, Johnson was inducted into the State of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003 and is also a charter member of Wisconsin's National W Club Hall of Fame.

Johnson, 46, earned his bachelor of science degree in kinesiology from Wisconsin in 1994.

He resides in Verona, Wis., with his wife Leslie and his five children: Douglas, Christopher, Patrick, Mikayla and Megan.

# ASSISTANT COACHES

## Tracey Cornell

Ashton, Ontario, native Tracey Cornell begins her fifth season at Wisconsin. She has been with the program since the drop of the first puck and has done everything from recruit to co-coach the team during her tenure.

The energetic Cornell came to Madison after spending the previous year as head girl's hockey coach at Cushing Academy in

Ashburnham, Mass. Cornell led Cushing Academy to a 24-4-2 mark, the most successful season in the history of the program. Her team captured second during the regular season and advanced to the NEPSAC Championship.

Cornell's playing experiences include four years at Cornell University, as well as one year as a professional in Switzerland for the SC Reinach Lions. While at Cornell, she co-captained the hockey program her senior season earning Academic All-Ivy honors both her junior and senior years. Cornell helped the Big Red to the Ivy League hockey title during the 1995-96 season and served as assistant captain during the title run. The one-time Cornell Rookie of the Year also earned team honors as most inspirational player as a sophomore and senior.

Her stay with the SC Reinach Lions was also successful. The Lions placed second overall in the top Swiss hockey league and were crowned Zurich Cup Tournament Champions during her 1997-98 season.

Cornell earned her bachelor of science degree in marine ecology from Cornell University in 1997. In addition to her time with the hockey program, Cornell played forward for a year with the Big Red women's soccer team.

Dan Koch enters his third year with the women's hockey program. The assistant helped lead the team as co-coach during the second half of the 2001-02 season, proving his value to the Badgers.


Koch (pronounced Cook) came to Wisconsin following two seasons as an assistant coach with the women's hockey program at St. Mary's (Minn.) University

working with the forwards and goaltenders. Also a third-grade teacher at Franklin Elementary School in La Crosse, Wis., Koch helped lead the Cardinals to a Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title during the 1999-00 season and a third-place finish at the national tournament in the 2000-01 season.

Before his St. Mary's experience, Koch was the head coach of the La Crosse Logan/Central High School boys' ice hockey team from 1996-99. He coached all-conference and all-state players during his three-year stint. Koch also coached various ice hockey teams from 1986-95 at all youth levels including park and recreation leagues and travel squads. He also coached soccer in the Madison area as an assistant varsity girl's coach at Madison La Follette and as an assistant for the boys' team at Monona Grove High School from 1986-90.

Koch earned his master's degree in education, teaching and learning in 2001 from St. Mary's University after earning his bachelor of science degree in elementary education in December of 1991 from the UW. He is a 1985 Madison La Follette High School graduate.

Koch and his wife Jody, a school psychologist, have a son Connor and two foster children, Jacob and Malik.



## Program Assistant Sharon Eley




Sharon Eley is in her fifth year with the staff of the women's hockey program after working in the Wisconsin Athletic Administrative offices for a year and a half.

In her fifth year with Badger women's hockey, Laura Walluk is the team's athletic trainer.


A 1995 University of New Hampshire graduate, Walluk earned her bachelor of science degree in kinesiology and athletic training.

# WCHA WOMEN'S LEAGUE



## WCHA Women's History

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association, or WCHA, is the oldest of the Division I college hockey leagues recognized by the NCAA.

It was formed in 1959 as an outgrowth of two earlier western college associations, the Midwest Intercollegiate Hockey League and the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League.

After 10 distinguished years as the guiding force behind the success of the WCHA, Otto Breitenbach retired as commissioner at the end of the 1993-94 season. Named as his successor was Bruce McLeod, a major contributor to the league over the years, and a former Minnesota-Duluth hockey player.

The 1999-2000 season marked the first year for the WCHA-Women's League. Bemidji State, Minnesota, Minnesota-Duluth, Minnesota State, Ohio State, St. Cloud State and Wisconsin made up the charter membership.

Sara Martin was hired in June of 1999 to serve the league as the Associate Commissioner. Martin, who earned college degrees from Wisconsin and Minnesota State, served the WCHA as tournament director for the 1994, 1996 and 1998 WCHA Final Five Playoff Championships, and was tournament director for the 1997 NCAA Div. I Men's Ice Hockey Championship.

The women's league has quickly established itself as a force, sending two teams to the four-team national champi-

onship in its first season (1999-2000) and having conference runner-up Minnesota take home the national title.

Now four years later, the WCHA women's league has claimed four consecutive NCAA titles.

League-member Minnesota-Duluth won the inaugural NCAA Frozen Four Championship at Mariucci Arena in Minneapolis in 2001 and met President George W. Bush at the White House to help celebrate. The Bulldogs have gone on to repeat the performance twice more in 2002 and 2003.

At the 2003 WCHA Annual Meeting, the league voted unanimously to admit the North Dakota women's hockey team as a full-time member beginning in the 2004-05 season. The addition of UND will bring the number of the women's conference teams to eight and will mark the first expansion of the league.

North Dakota played as a Division I team in the 2002-03 season and will begin playing a full 24-game conference schedule in 2004-05 and will also be eligible for post-season competition that season.

The WCHA men's league also counts ten schools as members: Alaska Anchorage, Colorado College, Denver, Michigan Tech, Minnesota, Minnesota-Duluth, Minnesota State, North Dakota, St. Cloud State and Wisconsin.

# LOOKING BACK AT THE 2002-03 SEASON...

**N**ow four years into the program, the Wisconsin women's hockey team continues to make progress.

The Badgers finished the season 22-8-5 overall and 14-6-4 in Western Collegiate Hockey Association play. The 22 wins tied the 2001-02 team for most wins and the .700 winning percentage was a school record.

Wisconsin finished third in the WCHA during the regular season and third at the 2003 WCHA Women's Final Five, held at Ralph Engelstad Arena in Grand Forks, N.D.

## Coach of the Year

The transition to the program's third head coach in four years went smoothly as Mark Johnson took over the women's team at the start of the season.

Johnson became the first Badger coach recognized by the WCHA when he was named WCHA Co-Coach of the Year along with Minnesota-Duluth's Shannon Miller.

Johnson was also one of eight finalists for the American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year.

## They Were First...

The first senior class in Wisconsin history made its exit with the final game of the 2002-03 season. The group set the standard for all those who come after.

Three-year captain and defender Sis Paulsen, two-year assistant captain and defender Kerry Weiland, goaltender Jackie MacMillan, forward Kelly Kegley, forward Kendra Antony, forward Michelle Sikich, forward Julia Ortenzio and assistant captain and forward Kathy Devereaux made up the group.

The first five named made up the first group of frosh recruits, with MacMillan coming a year before the program started. Sikich and Devereaux transferred to Wisconsin, while Ortenzio walked onto the team.

## Record Streaks

Wisconsin rewrote its record book where winning is concerned. The Badgers won nine straight games from Jan. 31-Feb. 28, 2003, breaking the old mark of eight games set during the inaugural season.

The winning streak came during a school-record tying 10-game unbeaten string. The unbeaten streak record was set earlier in the season, ending just two games before the second streak began. Both unbeaten streaks were stopped on the second night of two-game series with NCAA Frozen Four participants.

The Badgers won at Minnesota-Duluth before having their first streak snapped on Jan. 18 by the Bulldogs. Wisconsin extended its second unbeaten streak and its nine-game winning streak with a home win over Minnesota. The Gophers ended the run the next night, March 1, 2003.

## Special Teams

A Badger strength was special teams. Wisconsin ranked second in WCHA games in both power play and penalty killing.

Wisconsin succeeded on 24 of 98 power-play chances, a 24.5 percent rate, and killed 83 of 92 short-handed situations for a 90.2 percent penalty kill success rate. Wisconsin's 20.5 percent power play in all games ranked third in the league and fifth in the nation.

Wisconsin was the second-least penalized team in league games at 11.0 penalty minutes per game, and were the least penalized team overall, averaging just 10.6 minutes per game.

## WCHA Honors

Two Badgers were selected second-team All-WCHA. Senior defenders Sis Paulsen and Kerry Weiland made up the second team defensive corps.

Paulsen, who ranked fourth among WCHA defenders in scoring, was also named to the 2003 WCHA All-Tournament Team.

Weiland becomes the first Wisconsin four-time All-WCHA pick after making the second team in 1999-00 and the first team in both 2000-01 and 2001-02.

## Brains & Brawn

Fourteen Badgers, five more than the next closest school, garnered academic all-WCHA honors: Kendra Antony, Kathy Devereaux, Jackie Friesen, Meghan Hunter, Kelly Kegley, Jackie MacMillan, Steph Millar, Julia Ortenzio, Sis Paulsen, Karen Rickard, Michelle Sikich, Nicole Uliasz, Amy Vermeulen and Kerry Weiland.

The 14 student-athletes helped the Badgers to a 3.2 grade-point average for the fall semester.

## Century Club

A fourth Badger joined the ranks of the 100-point club when defender Sis Paulsen reached the mark early in the season.

The team captain, who began the season with 99 points, assisted on a power-play goal in the UW's second game of the season to crack the 100-point barrier. She joined Kendra Antony, Meghan Hunter and Kerry Weiland in the prestigious club.

## National Teams

Four Badgers were selected to respective national teams during the season. Defender Kerry Weiland made her first appearance on a senior national team when she played for the 2002 U.S. Women's Select Team at the Four Nations Cup held Nov. 6-10 in Kitchener, Ontario. Weiland later was named to the U.S. National Team that was to play at the 2003 World Championships in Beijing, China. The

tournament was cancelled due to the outbreak of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS).

Junior Meghan Hunter and sophomores Carla MacLeod and Jackie Friesen were selected to the 2003 Canadian Under-22 National Team. The squad traveled to play in the European Air Canada Cup women's international competition February 5-8 in Salzgitter and Hannover, Germany.

## WCHA Players of the Week

Six times during the 2002-03 season, members of the Wisconsin Badgers were recognized by the WCHA as players of the week.

Sophomore defender Nicole Uliasz earned the season's first WCHA Defensive Player of the Week award to open the season.

Senior goaltender Jackie MacMillan was named WCHA Defensive Player of the Week four times, while senior defender Sis Paulsen was Wisconsin's only WCHA Offensive Player of the Week.

MacMillan was also honored as the U.S. College Hockey Online national defensive player of the week.

## Polls

Wisconsin completed the season with its highest final rankings in school history. The Badgers sat at No. 5 in the final U.S. College Hockey Online Poll and No. 6 in the USA Today/American Hockey Magazine Poll. Wisconsin's previous best final ranking was No. 7 achieved in both of the last two years.

# HISTORY OF WISCONSIN WOMEN'S HOCKEY

On April 17, 1998, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Board unanimously voted to add women's ice hockey to the intercollegiate athletic program.

The sport would be brand new to the athletic department, but it already had a long-standing history at the UW.

A women's hockey club had been on the Madison campus for over 25 years. Founded in 1973 by three women: Marianne (Anderson) Larson, Jill Steinberg and Karen Schwarz, the UW Women's Hockey Club has had hundreds of players take to the ice throughout the years.

The three founders of the club organized a women's scrimmage hour at 10:15 p.m., on Sunday nights at the new campus skating rink dubbed "The Shell."

The trio put up signs throughout campus and recruited players by word of mouth. In the spring of 1975, once they had enough "regulars", they applied for club sport status through the UW's Recreation Sports division.

During the early years, they recruited players by putting up tables during spring and fall registration. In 1976, the group scheduled its first competitive game against the University of Minnesota club team.

By 1981, the number of club members had reached such a height that the club split into two separate squads. The following year, the club became a charter member of the Minnesota Women's Hockey Association, now called the Minnesota Girls' and Women's Hockey Association.

One important source on campus provided the critical encouragement and support to the club: men's head coach Bob Johnson.

Johnson was instrumental in getting the club interviewed during radio broadcasts of the men's games. With his support, the club also arranged to play some games at the Dane County Coliseum immediately after the men's team played.

A concerted effort led to a second club expansion for the 1992-93 season. The club split into three teams after putting up posters, having a description of the team in a university recreational sports pamphlet and sitting at tables during annual sports recruiting days at the union each fall.

In 1991, prior to the expansion, peeewee girls from throughout the city of Madison were skating with boys' teams. All that changed when a new girls' team formed called the Wisconsin Challengers.

Members of the UW Club assisted in the formation of the new organization in an effort to generate more interest in hockey in young girls of Madison. The team soon formed a midget squad as well.

Interest continues to explode each season and the UW Recreation Sports division continues to sponsor three club teams.

The A team travels throughout the Midwest competing against other club pro-

grams. The current club teams - A, B, and C - continue to play even with the establishment of the varsity program. In fact, three members of the Badgers' inaugural team made the squad from the ranks of the UW Club.

The first head coach for the varsity Badgers was announced on July 9, 1998, when Julie Sasner was introduced to the Madison media and public.

A former member of the first U.S. National Team in 1990, Sasner came from Cornell University, where she had coached for five years.

The Badgers officially opened their history on October 8, 1999, when 3,892 people watched the Badgers face Minnesota-Duluth at the Kohl Center.

With Olympic gold medalists Cammi Granato, Karyn Bye and head coach Ben Smith, along with Gov. Tommy Thompson in attendance, and the game televised around the state on Wisconsin Public Television, the Badgers finally hit the ice.

The city of Madison is now fortunate to have five rinks and a wealth of enthusiasm for the sport of hockey. Attendance at Wisconsin women's games grows more every year.

The Wisconsin women attracted an average of 905 fans to each game during the 2002-03 season, ranking second in the nation behind Western Collegiate Hockey Association rival Minnesota.

The Badgers had at least 1000 fans at seven of 16 home contests, with a season-high 1,624 against Minnesota-Duluth on Oct. 25, 2002, at the Kohl Center.





# FACILITIES

## ■ The Kohl Center

For the first time in the four-year history of the women's hockey program, Wisconsin will play the majority of its home season at the state-of-the-art Kohl Center during the 2003-04 season.

The 15,237-seat arena, the second largest college-owned facility in the country, is named after U.S. Sen. Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW-Madison graduate who donated \$25 million to the project. Kohl's gift is the single largest private donation in University history.

The \$76.4 million building contains an ice surface 200 feet long by 100 feet wide. The arena is also used for men's hockey, and men's and women's basketball, as well as concerts and other special events.

Artists such as the Backstreet Boys, Shania Twain, Matchbox 20, The Dave Matthews Band, AC/DC and Elton John, among others, have graced the Kohl Center stage.

## ■ The Eagle's Nest

The UW will play one home series at the Eagle's Nest in Verona, Wis. The Badgers will play St. Cloud State, Nov. 21-22 at 7:05 p.m., in the team's only home weekend away from campus.

Also the site of the 2003 women's hockey camp, the Eagle's Nest is just a 15-minute drive from the UW campus.

## ■ The Shell

Wisconsin holds practice at the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, also known as The Shell, located adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium.

Beginning with the 2002-03 season, the team has had use of a brand new locker room built as an addition to the south end of the practice facility.

Included in the complex is a skate sharpening room, coaches' room, classroom complete with practice goal and boards, as well as dress down and locker rooms. The new area is part of the expanded Wisconsin Athletic Wall of Fame.


## ■ The McClain

The women's hockey team also makes use of the McClain Athletic Facility, just north of the Shell. The McClain houses the 15,000 square-foot Fetzer Academic Center, where student-athletes can take advantage of 40 personal computers, 11 study rooms, open area with 30 study cubicles, a 55-seat auditorium and a full-time advising staff.

The McClain Center includes a weight room, with more than 50 weight machines and 45,000 pounds of free weights, a 90-yard indoor football practice field and one of the finest sports medicine complexes in the nation.





# A BEAUTIFUL CAMPUS





Prior to being named chancellor, Wiley served as the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He was also the dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.


In his positions, Wiley has represented the institution for a variety of external constituencies. He has also been deeply involved in fundraising.

Wiley joined the Wisconsin faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. He was the co-founder of several highly successful research centers.

Wiley is married to Georgia Blanchfield and has a 19-year-old stepson, Kai Kennedy, and a 17-year-old stepdaughter, Blythe Kennedy.



### Pat Richter


Pat Richter, a former UW student-athlete, professional football player, and successful businessman, became Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

**Right:** Senior Bethany Brewster was named the Big Ten Outdoor Athlete of the Meet after winning the 1500 meters and 5000 meters.






In the last 10 years, the University of Wisconsin has hosted five NCAA championships and an NCAA men's basketball regional.






## Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

## Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

## Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

## Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

## On Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

## NCAA Compliance

As a member of the Big Ten Conference, Western Collegiate Hockey Association, and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the University of Wisconsin must abide by many rules and regulations. Below is general information on how these guidelines apply to prospective student-athletes and representative of athletics interests.

### Definitions

A prospective student-athlete is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, one becomes a prospective student-athlete if a college gives the individual (or his/her relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A prospective student-athlete is recruited at a particular university when its coach approaches the prospect (or any member of the prospect's family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at that college by any one of the following three ways:

- Providing an official visit to the university's campus;
- Having an arranged, in-person, off-campus encounter with a prospect or the prospect's family; or
- Placing more than one telephone call to a prospect or any other member of his/her family.

A representative of the UW's athletics interests ("booster") is anyone who...

- is an alumnus of the UW
- has contributed to a Badger athletic program.
- has helped arrange employment of enrolled and prospective UW student-athletes.
- has been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

### The Recruiting Process

Institutional staff members have very specific guidelines when it comes to recruiting that vary by sport. The major areas are: telephone calls, contacts, evaluations, campus visits, correspondence, and highlight films/videotapes.

In addition to general recruiting regulations, no booster can be involved in recruiting (e.g., no phone calls, letters, or in-person contacts).

### Eligibility

Prospects who intend to participate in Division I intercollegiate athletics must register with and be certified by the NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse. Please contact your high school counselor for more information on this process, especially regarding the requirements to be eligible.

### Extra Benefits

By NCAA definition, an extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional

employee or a booster to provide a student-athlete or a student-athlete's relative or friend a benefit that is not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. This is prohibited. If the benefit is demonstrated to be generally available to ALL UW STUDENTS or their relatives or friends determined on a basis unrelated to athletic ability, it is not a violation of NCAA rules.

Extra benefits are also not permissible for prospective student-athletes. They are called offers and inducements, and include any benefit such as cash, clothing, cars, improper expenses, transportation, gifts or loans to encourage you to sign a National Letter of Intent or attend an NCAA university. UW Compliance On-Line Training Program Compliance Rules and Regs is a compliance training program available on the internet. Student-athletes, coaches and designated athletic department staff are required to complete the program, while boosters are encouraged to participate. # FETZER STUDENT-ATHLETE CENTER

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center has been helping Wisconsin student-athletes to achieve their academic goals since 1997.

The 15,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all student-athletes. The center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are 11 study rooms of different shapes and sizes, including a 55-seat auditorium. A computer room houses 40 PCs while the entire center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Director David Harris supervises a staff of five advisors and three learning specialists who conduct the academic services offered to the more than 800 student-athletes. The advising staff of Tom Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt, Maryellen Rock and Nancy Gatyas, have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and grant-in-aid staff whose offices are located in the center.

## B.I.G. R.E.D. LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM

The University of Wisconsin dedicates itself to providing athletic opportunities to a wide range of students and an environment in which all student-athletes can achieve their academic and competitive goals.

The BIG RED (Building Integrity while Growing through Responsible and Educated Decisions) Life Skills Program, under the direction of Mike Moss, provides support to enable student-athletes to grow intellectually, physically, socially, emotionally and ethically.

## SPORTS MEDICINE

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Karen Bloch, Beth Cranley, Greg Ehlers, Chad Gabbard, Chuck Hart, Jan Helwig, Andy Hrodey, Mike Moll, Henry Perez-Guerra, Laura Walluk, and Ian Wood as well as graduate assistant trainers Greg Marcotte and Tracy Poro utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline program to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.


The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physician Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Lee Kaplan. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, Dr. Tom Best and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

# STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.



Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium.


The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Kohl Center weight room is equipped with five custom-built free weight power platforms and 4000 pounds of free weights. The room has nine pieces of cardiovascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.




