- (a) \$ 1,000.00 - University of Wisconsin Foundation. One-half of \$2,000 pledged by Edward Tuthill (Ph.D. Wisconsin, 1908) Emeritus Professor of History, University of Kentucky, 253 South Lime Street, Lexington, Kentucky, for the establishment of "The Edward Tuthill Scholarship Fund". A scholarship of \$250 is to be awarded each semester to a graduate student in European Medieval History in accordance with the terms of conditions of award in the donor's letter dated October 25, 1948. Recipient of the award is to be selected annually by the Department of History and is to be known as "The Edward Tuthill Scholar". Mr. Tuthill stated that this gift is given, "on the occasion of its Centennial, to the University which helped train me for my own life work". *Gift file*
- (b) 1,000.00 - Miss Mary Forbes, Oshkosh, Wisconsin, through the Scholarship Committee of the Madison Delta Gamma Association for the establishment of the "Delta Gamma Memorial Fund". This gift is presented as a tribute to the "Delta Gammas of the Class of 1891", and is to be used as a student loan fund to aid students of the University of Wisconsin who are in need of financial assistance with preference to be given to blind students. - (e) 25.00 - Mr. Merrill Chase, Chicago, Illinois, an additional contribution to the Merrill Chase Student Loan Fund.

- (e) ^ 1,500.00 - Sylvania Electric Products, Inc., Flushing, New York, for the continuation for the year 1949-50 of a graduate fellowship in the Department of Physics for further investigation of gaseous discharge, in accordance with the agreement accepted by the Regents on August 16, 1947. *Sum in gift file*

RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

I. Contracts, Leases and Agreements

1. That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign renewal contract No. W 11-183 qm-5801 with the Department of the Army covering research to be conducted in the Department of Biochemistry during the period October 1, 1948 to June 30, 1949, at an estimated cost of \$5700, to be reimbursed by the Army.

Upon motion of Regent Arveson, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendation No. 1 listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (I. Contracts, Leases and Agreements) was adopted.

II. Report of Actions Taken

1. In accordance with the authority granted by the Regents on September 27, 1947, for the Vice President of Business and Finance to sign contracts and leases not in excess of \$2500.00, the following contracts and orders have been signed:

- (a) Contract with Kenneth F. Sullivan Company, Madison, Wisconsin, for furnishing labor and material for re-roofing work on the Charmany Farm; total \$950.75
- (b) Lease with Curtis Smith, Route 4, Kenosha, Wisconsin, covering the lease of eight acres of land during the period January 1, 1949 to December 31, 1949, at an annual rental of \$25.00 per acre, for use by the College of Agriculture in conducting research on vegetable crop diseases and insects; total \$200.00.
Approved.

2. In accordance with authority granted by the Regents for the Vice President of Business and Finance to sign contracts and agreements for educational services requested by the Government, the following contracts have been signed:

- (a) Army Contract No. W-11-175-TNG-(AAV)-346 covering the enrollment of four army officers in a graduate course in electrical engineering during the 1948-49 academic year and the 1949 summer session, under which the Government will pay the equivalent of the nonresident tuition.

- (b) Army Contract No. W-11-175-TNG-(AAV)-354 covering the enrollment of one army officer in a graduate course in pharmacy during the 1948-49 academic year and the 1949 summer session, under which the Government will pay the equivalent of the nonresident tuition.
 - (c) Army Contract No. W-11-175-TNG-(AAV)-363 covering the enrollment of one army officer in a graduate course in physical therapy during the 1948-49 academic year and the 1949 summer session, under which the Government will pay the equivalent of the nonresident tuition.
- Approved.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, actions 1 and 2 listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (II. Report of Actions Taken) were approved.

The Vice President of Business and Finance reported that on October 16, 1948, the Regents authorized the advertising for bids for the construction of the Service Building at the Spooner Agricultural Experiment Station, and that bids for this work would be opened on Tuesday, December 14, 1948. Upon motion of Regent Campbell, seconded by Regent Jones, it was

VOTED, That the Executive Committee be authorized to act for the Regents in the award of contracts for the construction of the Service Building at the Spooner Agricultural Experiment Station and in the approval of the schedule of costs for this project.

Regent Werner presented the report of the Finance Committee. Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Jones, it was

VOTED, That the bequest by the late Donald A. Quandt to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin to be used to provide scholarships and equipment for the study of cancer, in memory of his mother and father, Pearl and William Quandt, be accepted by the Regents in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Donald A. Quandt, deceased; and that the Secretary or the Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign receipts in the name of the Regents for the funds received from the Administrator of the Estate of Donald A. Quandt.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was

VOTED, That \$1662.35 be transferred from unbudgeted 1-E receipts to Physical Plant Supplies and Expense and appropriated for additional rent on Picnic Point to cover 1941 taxes assessed against the property.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the President and Secretary of the Board be authorized to sign an agreement with University Houses, Inc., and the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation to provide for an increase of \$250,000.00 in the first mortgage loan for the construction of University Houses, all other arrangements to remain unchanged.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That the Division of Residence Halls be authorized to fill vacancies in the Men's Residence Halls for the academic year 1949-50 on the basis of the following quotas by classes:

Veterans to be given preference.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That approval be given to the plans for the Dairy Building and that authority be given to advertise for bids with the understanding that roads serving the Dairy Building will be constructed so as not to interfere with present buildings located between the railroad tracks and the new Dairy Building.

Regent Kleczka presented the following recommendation of the Personnel Committee and stated that President Fred would have a statement to make in regard to the recommendation, which statement should be incorporated into the minutes of this meeting:

Upon the recommendation of the President of the University, the resignation of Harry A. Stuhldreher as head football coach be accepted, effective immediately, and that Harry A. Stuhldreher be continued as Director of Intercollegiate Athletics, with rank of professor, on a full-time basis without change in salary for the fiscal year 1948-49.

(Cont.)

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Gelatt, the recommendation of the Personnel Committee was adopted.

President Fred read the following statement:

"Harry Stuhldreher has requested that he be relieved of his duties as head football coach.

The Athletic Board and the President of the University have recommended the acceptance of the resignation of Harry A. Stuhldreher as head football coach, and have further recommended that he devote full-time to his duties as Director of Intercollegiate Athletics.

The development of a soundly conceived, properly balanced, and efficiently managed program of intercollegiate athletics is a major task in the University. The recent large growth in numbers of students and the programs required to care for them have made this job even more demanding. The organization and direction of the intercollegiate athletic program at the University of Wisconsin now needs full-time leadership. Harry Stuhldreher's record, as director of athletics, during the past thirteen years has been outstanding. It indicates the effectiveness of his direction and provides reason for high confidence in the future.

The coaching of football, likewise, has become an increasingly complex and time-consuming occupation. It needs the full-time attention of specialists.

The Regents have accepted the resignation of Harry A. Stuhldreher as head football coach as submitted by the President of the University to the Regents, and have instructed the President to survey the field and bring a recommendation to the Board of Regents, at the earliest possible moment, for a successor to the position of head football coach. Final selection of the coach will be made by the Regents. Mr. Stuhldreher will continue as Director of Intercollegiate Athletics."

Regent Kleczka moved, on behalf of the Personnel Committee, that President Fred's statement be incorporated into the minutes of this meeting. The motion was seconded by Regent Jones and carried.

Regent Werner reported that a meeting of the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee was held on December 10, 1948, and that the principal items discussed were faculty salaries and faculty housing. He reported that the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee had voted to request the University Campus Planning Commission to make a study of the faculty housing problem.

The meeting adjourned at 10:35 A.M.
