

# EDITORIAL

Is there an intra-staff communication problem evident in this hospital? The CUE staff thinks there definitely is. This has been substantiated by the responses to our Issue and Answer question of the patient population.

There are many frustrating experiences when patients find themselves wasting time waiting for appointments that have been cancelled or for messages that were delayed or, at times never conveyed. Many times the patient is deprived of certain activities or privileges simply because someone failed to remember a phone call, misplaced the message or didn't bother to write it down. Frustrations mount when doctors orders affecting the patients directly are not carried out or when a doctor is on vacation and no medic communicates with this patient during his absence.

The issue can best be illustrated with some examples. On one occasion a patient was escorted to the surgical clinic, through no fault of his own, only to find that the problem had been taken care of the week before. A patient was taken for psychological testing to learn he was not scheduled for the test at that particular time. In another in-

stance a group of patients waited patiently for the Activity Therapist to arrive only to find that the activity period for the day had been cancelled. Too, a patient was erroneously admitted to a ward whereupon 6 weeks later after his doctor returned from vacation, he was allocated to the proper ward where therapy was initiated.

This lack of or indifference to communication creates innumerable duplication or triplication of effort, hinders discharges, causes unhappiness and a great deal of unnecessary frustration to the patient.

Communication break-downs causes marriages to break up, businesses to flounder and personal relationships to deteriorate. There is a general consensus that the communication system at this hospital is not bad but very bad. It is felt that the patient by necessity must be the aggressor or there is no communication at all. It is apparent that the right hand doesn't know what the left hand is doing. In other words nobody seems to know what in hell is going on. Doesn't anybody care?

The hospital presumably is patient oriented but in this vital area of intra-staff communication, is this true?

# COMMUNICATIONS BREAKDOWN

Yes, I had asked to see a specific doctor on several occasions, involving a physical problem. I waited 3 days and finally had to catch this specific doctor myself on the run. Hastily the nurse said, "Oh yes, she (the patient) had asked to see you!"

A social worker had called my daughter and I was supposed to call my daughter right back. The social worker informed the nurses, but I did not receive the message until 2 days later.

After 12 weeks at the hospital, a patient was being discharged and asked an aide to call a cab in order to catch a bus in Oshkosh. After waiting over a half hour the patient discovered that the aide had forgotten to call the cab. Despite understanding of human error, the aide did not seem to have sympathy for the plight of the patient, caused by her negligence.

In the initial orientation of patients no one explains thoroughly the method used in communications. One sits in a stupor wondering how and when to communicate. As weeks pass, they catch on that it must be done by their own initiative. This is especially trying on patients who are not extroverts.

I asked for liberty, and it was okayed immediately. However, I was not informed until two days later.

Due to lack of space in the alcoholic unit, a patient was placed in Sherman Hall. The doctor who admitted the patient then left for a trip to Europe. It wasn't until the doctor returned to the hospital over six weeks later that the patient could be released to the alcoholic unit, at which time the patient's therapy started, and which would add a minimum of six weeks to the patient's hospital stay.

A patient told nurses that she wanted to go shopping with her Mother, and that she would like to call her Mother. The doctor said okay but didn't have it charted, therefore, she wasn't able to make the call.

Yes, I believe communication is terrible! On two recent occasions I was scheduled on paper to see my doctor at 1:00 p.m. Also, at 1:00 p.m., I was scheduled to be in O. T. The O. T. therapist came to the ward to inquire as to why I wasn't present in the O.T. department.

A ward meeting had been posted on a bulletin board for 8:00 p.m. Not all patients were informed by word of mouth that the meeting had been changed to 7:00. Patients upon returning from the canteen were unnecessarily frustrated to find that the meeting had already been held, and their absence might possibly result in a black mark against their record.

I was granted a weekend pass. My case worker called the people where I was to visit. My case worker told them that I would call them and inform them that I had my weekend. However, the case worker failed to tell either I or the ward that I was to call. The day I was to leave I waited for the people to pick me up and they failed to come. When I then called them they said that they weren't aware that I had gotten a pass. This has happened on two occasions.

A patient asked an aide on duty if she could give the rest of her food to another patient. The aide said yes, and another aide came along and said no. Consequently, the whole ward was restricted canteen privileges for the weekend.

A patient was on a three-week home visit. During the time of this visit, the doctor reviewed her record and extended the home visit another ten days. The patient returned to the hospital a little early from her three week visit. Two days after her return a nurse looked at her chart and found that the doctor's order had never been checked and thus not carried out. The patient lives in Northern Wisconsin and made a long unnecessary trip.

A long distance phone call for a patient came to the switchboard at 9:00 a.m., on a Sunday morning. The patient was asked at 11:00 a.m. if she had returned the call! She had not because she had not been informed about the call. (What if the caller were left waiting for two hours at a public pay phone?)

It gripes me that there is little or no feedback. The patient contributes all the information, and the staff has the attitude that it is none of the patient's business when he asks about results.

Meetings are scheduled and cancelled without the patient being informed. If we would fail to show up for a meeting our liberty cards would be pulled.

My Doctor went on a 10 day vacation while another Doctor was assigned to take her place. I never even had the opportunity to talk to this Doctor during this 10 day period. How about that?

I feel that some patients are afraid to discuss their problems with a staff member because they're afraid they might have to stay longer.

I think that the main contributer to poor communications is a condescending attitude on the part of some of the employees. Most employees are "A-OK" as far as I'm concerned but there are always some who can alienate patients.

and that word, too is exactly what he is, hackneyed expression though it be. An elder statesman. The great team father.



# On the Sober Side

## A. A. QUIZ

Alcoholism can be cured - True or False? Many laymen and some alcoholics believe alcoholism, since it is a disease, can be cured. This is not true. Alcoholism can be arrested but never cured. Once an alcoholic always an alcoholic.

An alcoholic can stop drinking without help - True or False? In rare instances this can and has been done. In the vast majority of cases however, an alcoholic has to have help to solve his problem. The sooner he admits that he cannot do it alone the sooner he will be on the road to recovery.

One of the chief functions of A.A. is to find the problem drinker and offer to help - True or False? A.A. does not seek out the alcoholic. The alcoholic must come to A.A. Then and only then will the proven methods of A.A. be put into force.

There are many non-alcoholics in the A.A. movement - True or False? Thousands of non-alcoholic professionals and laymen have interested themselves in the A.A. movement. Their unselfish interest and dedication has saved an undetermined number of lives.

It takes years of heavy drinking to become an alcoholic - True, or False? Up until quite recently it was felt that symptoms of alcoholism began to occur at approximately 35 years of age and up. However an ever-increasing number of young people are joining the ranks of A.A. The theory that you are too young to be an alcoholic has been exploded.

An alcoholic is unable to control his desire for alcohol after the first drink - True or False? In many cases this is true, and the phenomenon is known as primary alcoholism. There is another and much larger group however, that falls into a classification known as secondary alcoholism. This group uses alcohol for its sedative action, as a means of escape and to help ease personal problems.

Alcoholics have a common personality factor that can generally be associated with alcoholism - True or

False? A recent study at Indiana University to determine what common personality trait might be identified with the alcoholic. The study proved inconclusive, and doctors were able merely to report that any type of personality - happy, sad, introvert, extrovert can become an alcoholic.
