The Kohl Center



Badger Hockey has led the nation in attendance 30 years, including 24 straight (1969-93). Since moving into the Kohl Center in 1998, Wisconsin has once again regained the position as the country's attendance leader.

College Hockey's Top Facility The Kohl Center

On Oct. 3, 1998, the UW hockey team opened play in its new home – the 15,237-seat Kohl Center. The second-largest college-owned hockey arena in the country marks its seventh year as home of Wisconsin hockey.

The facility is named after U.S. Senator Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW-Madison graduate who donated \$25 million towards the construction of the arena. Kohl's gift is the single-largest private donation in UW history.

Albert "Ab" Nicholas, a former All-Big Ten basketball player for the Badgers, and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas, pledged \$10 million toward the project. For their generosity, the facility's basketball practice gymnasium is called the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion.

New additions to the Kohl Center for the 2004–05 season include a new scoreboard and ring beam. The main Kohl Center scoreboard includes 9-by-14-foot video boards on all four sides that will provide Wisconsin fans their first opportunity to enjoy video replays. The ring beam, which runs the circumference of the arena at the first balcony level, makes Wisconsin one of a select few college venues with a ring beam, promising to create a unique and exciting game atmosphere.

The Kohl Center, which cost \$76.4 million, is also the home of the Badger men's and women's basketball teams (seats 17,142 for basketball), women's hockey, as well as concerts, guest speakers, shows and sporting events.

The Kohl Center hosted one of the 2002 NCAA Division I Regionals of the men's NCAA basketball tournament, and also set the NCAA attendance mark for women's volleyball with the 1998 NCAA Championship draw of 13,194 people.

Entertainers who have already performed at the Kohl Center include Elton John, Faith Hill and Tim McGraw, Shania Twain, Cher, The Moody Blues, Dave Matthews Band, matchbox 20, Billy Joel and the Backstreet Boys. The Dalai Lama has also made an appearance at the Kohl Center.





KOHL CENTER FUN FACTS

- There are eight locker rooms within the Kohl Center home hockey, home men's and women's basketball, visiting basketball, visiting hockey, officials and two tournament locker rooms.
- No tax dollars were used in building the Kohl Center ... \$49 million was raised from private donations and \$27 million in State bonding will be paid back in operational revenues.
- The 40,000 cubic yards of concrete used in constructing the Kohl Center could build a sidewalk from Madison to Chicago.
- · Eleven miles of coolant pipe is embedded in the hockey floor.
- It would take 1,351,990,520 hockey pucks to fill the Kohl Center.
- There are 15 pay phones, 26 restrooms and 36 luxury suites located within the Kohl Center.

The Bob Johnson Hockey Facility

The Bob Johnson Hockey Facility is one of the premier hockey training facilities in the nation.



Bob Johnson

The facility is named after legendary Wisconsin head coach Bob Johnson, who directed the Badgers to three NCAA championships during his tenure from 1966–82. Johnson also coached the 1976 U.S.

Olympic Team, as well as the NHL's Calgary Flames and

Pittsburgh Penguins. He led the Penguins to their first Stanley Cup title during the 1990–91 season.

The complex, featuring state-of-the-art amenities for Badger hockey players, includes weight room and training room areas directly

accessible from the main locker room area. Players have a private changing area equipped with personal lockers, and both the coaches and players have their own lounges.

The Bob Johnson Hockey
Facility is conveniently located
between the Alliant Energy
Center's Veterans Memorial
Coliseum and the Arena for easy
access to both ice sheets.







Items of Interest

- Just two seniors grace the UW roster— All-America goaltender Bernd Brückler and forward Pete Talafous.
- · Players accounting for 238 of the team's 327 points in 2003-04, including 87 of 123 goals scored return for the Badgers in 2004-05.
- · Twelve Badgers have been drafted by NHL teams, the most since the 1994-95 season when 10 Badgers on the roster were drafted.
- Five Badgers were drafted in the 2004 NHL Entry Draft including Kyle Klubertanz by Anaheim in the third round (74th), Jake Dowell by Chicago in the fifth round (140th), Matt Auffrey by Anaheim in the sixth round (172nd), Robbie Earl by Toronto in the sixth round (187th) and Matt Ford by Chicago in the eighth round (256th).
- · Thirteen Badgers hail from the State of Wisconsin.
- · A handful of Badgers sport new jersey numbers for the upcoming season sophomore Andy Brandt went from 8 to 21, sophomore lake Dowell has switched from 6 to 11 and senior Pete Talafous changed from 15 to 17.
- · Senior goaltender Bernd Brückler will serve as a team assistant captain, the first UW goalie since Kirk Daubenspeck was assistant captain for the 1996-97 season. Junior forward Adam Burish captains the team, while junior defenseman Tom Gilbert serves as the other assistant captain.
- Two of Wisconsin's five NCAA titles are represented on the UW coaching staff as Head Coach Mike Eaves captained the UW's 1977 title run and new assistant coach Mark Osiecki served as assistant captain during Wisconsin's 1990 national championship season.

- · Wisconsin's home facility, the Kohl Center, has undergone an upgrade since last season. A new scoreboard with video capability was installed, and a ring beam now adorns the facade of the second level.
- Wisconsin broke its own NCAA record for total attendance when 269,123 people watched hockey at the Kohl Center in 2003-04. The average of 11,701 per game gave the Badgers the nation's top attendance for the 30th time in school history, including each of the six years in the Kohl Center.
- A 20-win season would give Wisconsin 30 in school history.

Mike Eaves returns to Wisconsin for his third season as head coach. Under Eaves' direction in 2003–04, the Badgers won 20 or more games for the 29th time in school history.

Head Coach Mike Eaves



A fter a playing career that ended with the most prolific scoring numbers in Wisconsin hockey history and an NCAA title, Mike Eaves returned to his alma mater for the 2002-03 season as the fifth coach in the modern era of Badger hockey. Eaves now enters his third season directing the program and continues adding to his Badger legacy with each passing year.

In just his second season behind the bench, Eaves led his charges to one of the largest improvements in college hockey and to within one goal of an NCAA Frozen Four appearance. Included in the run was a national-best 15-game unbeaten streak, a third-place finish in the WCHA standings and national rankings as high as No. 3.

He returned to the UW after spending two seasons as the head coach of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program (NTDP). A program designed to accelerate the development of elite under-20 American hockey players, Eaves led the group to a gold medal at the 2002 IIHF World Under-18 Championship in Piestany, Slovakia, the first-ever gold medal for the United States at the event.

Eaves' coaching days began in 1985 with the Calgary Flames (assistant) and since then he has held assistant coaching positions with the NHL's Pittsburgh Penguins and Philadelphia Flyers, and head coaching posts with the Helsinki Finnish Elite League, Shattuck (Minn.) St. Mary's High School and the Hershey Bears of the American Hockey League (AHL). He also spent one season at St. Cloud State (assistant coach) and one season at UW-Eau Claire (head coach).

Eaves has also represented the U.S. in international competition both as a player and coach. He skated as a forward for Team USA at both the 1981 and 1984 Canada Cup tournaments and was a member of the 1976 and 1978 U.S. National Teams at the International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF) World Championships. As a coach, Eaves served as an assistant under Bob Johnson for Team USA at the 1991 Canada Cup and was also an assistant coach for the 1991 U.S. National Team at the IIHF World Championship in Finland.

In the Beginning

Eaves was recruited to play at Wisconsin by the legendary "Badger Bob" Johnson. He became both a standout student-athlete and one of the greatest players in Badger hockey history in his career (1974–78). A first-team All-American as a junior and senior, Eaves is still the UW's career scoring leader with 267 points (94-173) in 160 games. He helped lead the Badgers to the 1977 NCAA title by scoring 28 goals and adding 53 assists for 81 points during that championship season. He assisted on three goals in the champi-

Eaves was a three-year team captain for the Badgers, earning Wisconsin's 1978 Big Ten Conference Medal of Honor, given to the student-athlete who best demonstrates proficiency in both academics and athletics. A 1992 UW Athletic Department Hall of Fame inductee, he ranks eighth on the WCHA's all-time scoring list and was named one of the WCHA's "Top 50 Players in 50 Years" as part of the league's celebration of its 50th anniversary during the 2001–02 season.

Following college, Eaves made the jump to the NHL, playing eight seasons for the Minnesota North Stars (1978–83) and Calgary Flames (1983–86), accumulating 226 points (83-143) in 324 games. He was the North Stars' rookie of the year in 1979–80 and was the Flames' 1984–85 nominee for the NHL's Bill Masterton Award, given annually to the player who best exemplifies the qualities of perseverance, sportsmanship and dedication to the game.

USA Hockey

As head coach of the NTDP, Eaves coached the nation's elite U-20 players for two seasons (2000–02). These U-18 and U-17 teams represent USA Hockey at international events such as the World U-17 Challenge, the World U-18 Championship and the World U-20 Championship, while playing a variety of games against junior, college and international competition throughout the year.

The NTDP experienced its most successful season during Eaves' second year when the U-18 team won the gold medal at the IIHF World Championship in Slovakia. Eaves and his team clinched the gold with a 3-1 victory over Russia to end the tourney with a 7-1-0 record. Excluding the Olympics, it is the only gold medal won by a U.S. National team at an IIHF World Championship since 1933.

Over 20 of his players from the NTDP have been drafted by the NHL and over 40 are playing Division I college hockey.

Because of his success, USA Hockey once again called on the coach for the international stage. Eaves directed the U.S. National Junior Team at the 2004 International Ice Hockey Federation World Junior Championship to the country's first gold medal in the tournament.


Behind the Bench

Professional

His professional coaching career consists of stints with three different NHL teams, beginning with Calgary in 1985–86. During his final season as a player, Eaves also served as an assistant coach under Bob Johnson with the Flames. That year, the Flames finished second in the Smythe Division with a 40-31-9 record, losing to Montreal in the best-of-seven Stanley Cup finals, 4-1.

He returned to the NHL in 1988 when he joined the Philadelphia Flyer staff for two seasons, during which the Flyers made it to the conference championship in 1989 before losing to Montreal in the finals. Eaves returned to Philly in 1993–94 again as an assistant coach (to Terry Simpson).

His most recent pro coaching job was at Pittsburgh. From 1997–2000, Eaves served as an assistant under Kevin Constantine (1997–2000). The Penguins won the Northeast Division (1997–98) with a 40-24-18 record, but lost in the conference quarterfinals. The next two seasons, Pittsburgh placed third in the Atlantic Division, ending its season in the conference semifinals both years. The Penguins had records of 38-30-14 (1998–99) and 37-31-8 (1999–2000) during those two campaigns.


From the Division III ranks, Eaves moved to the Division I level the next season (1987–88) becoming an assistant to Craig Dahl at St. Cloud State. The Huskies were in their first season as a Division I college independent that year, ending the season at 11-25-1.

At the prep level, Eaves took over the program at Shattuck (Minn.) St. Mary's from 1994–96. He coached both the Midget AAA team (1994–95) and the high school (1995–96) teams while at Shattuck.

All in the Family

Hockey and coaching were two things Eaves grew up around. His father, Cecil, played hockey at the University of Denver (1956–57) and is also credited with helping to start the hockey program at Ohio State. He was the head coach at the University of Windsor (Ontario) and



is a past director of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association (CAHA).

His brother Murray lettered two years at Michigan (1978–80) before playing for the Winnipeg Jets (1980–86) and the Detroit Red Wings (1987–88). He currently is the head coach at Shattuck St. Mary's High School.

A native of Denver, Colo., Mike and his wife, Beth, are the parents of two sons —Ben and Patrick—who both boast college hockey ties to Boston College. Ben captained the BC hockey team in 2003–04, while Patrick will be a junior on the Eagle hockey squad.

Ben became the second member of the Eaves family to win a national title when Boston College won the 2001 NCAA Championship.

Eaves graduated with honors from Wisconsin in 1978 with a bachelor's degree in physical education.

Five members of the Eaves' family have played Division I college hockey. Mike (Wisconsin), his brother Murray (Michigan) and their father, Cecil (Denver), all competed in the WCHA. Mike's sons Ben and Patrick (junior) played for Boston College. Three Eaves, Mike, Cecil and Ben, have won NCAA championships.

Q&A with Coach Eaves

Why should a student-athlete come to the UW?

Everything a student-athlete would want out of their collegiate experience is here at the University of Wisconsin. From the first-class education, the faculty and staff, the incredible social experiences, top-rate facilities, a beautiful campus—this university has it all.

As a student, you are attending one of the finest institutions around. As a student-athlete, the UW is one of the top athletic programs in the nation. The campus also has so much to offer with the lakes and its natural beauty. These things are why I decided many years ago to attend Wisconsin.

Did you ever think you would someday be the head coach at your alma mater?

Not right away. When I graduated from the UW, my next step was the NHL and trying to make a living playing professional hockey, so coaching wasn't something I was thinking about at that point in my life. Once you establish yourself as a pro athlete, you want to know how good you can be and how long you can play at that level. I was able to play at that level for eight years.

But then having to retire early from playing, my education then afforded me options that I would not have had otherwise. Instead of being limited because of not having an education, I had several options. My education allowed me to get into coaching and at one point in the early 90s, I did think it would be nice to get back to Madison and coach. After a few years of coaching at various levels, you are able to understand the scope of the coaching world and what path is best for you.

With the way things unfolded the opportunity arose again, so I decided to put my name in the hat to see what happened.

What is your coaching philosophy?

That's a tough question to answer concisely. Over time, I've come to realize that your coaching philosophy can come down to how other teams talk about you. 'Man they are hard to play against. They play hard and compete. They play smart and don't hurt themselves. They play as a team.' When teams talk about you in these terms with those comments then you have something that can become a

great foundation for a successful program. That is what our philosophy is. We want to play hard, play smart and play as a team.

What are some of the characteristics you want to see out of your players?

Playing hard and having good work habits is at the base of what we want established here and what we will do right away with our young players. Once we've got that in place, we teach them what our definition of playing smart is. We put them in game situations and give each player feedback on playing smart in key situations and creating opportunities we can take advantage of.

If you have a group of players that aren't necessarily the most talented but they play as a team, you are going to be successful. If you can forecheck as a unit of five, if you can forecheck in the neutral zone as a unit of five, if you can play defensive hockey as a unit of five, you are collectively better than if you had five superstars on the ice.

What are the strengths of this staff?

Where Troy and I have been able to be and where Mark is coming from lends itself to having experience as a strength.

Another strength is our ability to be teachers. That is all our educational backgrounds, which lends itself to working with student-athletes at this level. You have to help them get to a higher level and you can do that when you have the mindset of a teacher.

Mark is new for us. As a player he was a very stalwart defensive defenseman. He was known for his shot-blocking ability and his courage to get down in front of pucks. That is one of the ways he carved his way to the National Hockey League. He'll be able to get very specific with the defensemen.

I think Troy and I are getting into a little routine here now that we are going into our third year. The roles are more comfortable. He does such a great job one-on-one with the video. I think our guys really look forward to that. It's depth with the players. It's their personal time. It's how they can get better and Troy does a great job with that.

With Bill Howard, everybody sees his work with our goaltenders, which speaks for itself. But Howie has been around the game a long time and is able to give tips to our players in all areas of the game. He has been around the WCHA for such a long time and has almost become our consultant in terms of the game.

The one guy that doesn't get enough recognition is Mike Potenza. We put such an emphasis on strength and conditioning that the people don't see all the work he does, not only during the season, but in the offseason in helping our guys. Part of our protocol is to have our guys play hard. In order to play hard, you have to be in great condition. In order to play effectively hard, you have to win the one-on-one battles and he gives us the best chance of being successful in those two areas because what he does off the ice. He does a great job for us.

What's it feel like to succeed 'Badger' Bob Johnson and Jeff Sauer?

First of all, it's an honor. These gentlemen have come in and created a rich tradition of coaching here. They were here a long time and were very successful. The tradition that has been created here is something you can draw on for strength and inspiration. But after that, it goes back to day-to-day functions and what we can control day in and day out. If we are successful in our day-to-day activities, we give ourselves the best chance of doing what these gentlemen did and have a long prosperous career and be successful.

What is your greatest moment or experience as a coach?

The under-20 world championship—any time you become a world champion, that is a special moment. We went undefeated and played six world-class games in 11 days. Whenever you win something hard, you're not going to back into it. You have to defeat good teams to get it done. We had to beat the Russians, we had to beat the Fins in the semifinal, 2-1, and then we had to defeat Canada in a gold medal game that saw us down 3-1 going into the third period. Nothing was given to us. We earned it.

It was special from two standpoints. No. 1 because almost 70 percent of the team played together on the under-18 world champions so we knew each other very well. No. 2, we had three Badgers on that team and so it was an experience we could share among ourselves and bring back to help us be better here.

Associate Head Coach Troy G. Ward



at Wisconsin and his second as associate head coach. Ward serves as the Badgers' recruiting coordinator off the ice, while dealing primarily with the defense and penalty-killing units on the ice. He has been involved with hockey at all levels — NCHA, USHL, IHL, AHL, ECHL, NHL—either as a player or coach for 24 years.

Before joining the Badgers, he was Senior Vice President and Director of Hockey Operations for the East Coast Hockey League (ECHL). In this capacity, Ward was in charge of all the league's hockey operations and officiating departments, as well as the primary liaison with the NHL, AHL and other pro leagues.

During the 2000–01 season, Ward was named the ECHL's Coach of the Year as he led the Trenton Titans to a 61-26-4 record and the Northern Conference title in his only season as head coach.


From 1997–2000, Ward was an assistant coach for the NHL's Pittsburgh Penguins. He was the team's defensive coordinator which involved working with the penalty killing unit. Ward also oversaw video coordination and off-ice improvement sessions with players. During the 1997–98 season, the team set a franchise record for penalty killing (86.7 percent) and lowest goals-against average. Among the players he coached were Jaromir Jagr and Ron Francis.

Ward's start in pro hockey came in 1995 as an assistant coach for the International Hockey League's Indianapolis Ice, which won the Eastern Conference championship in his final season (1997) with the franchise. Prior to Indianapolis, Ward was the general manager and head coach of the Dubuque Fighting Saints of the United States Hockey League (USHL), a Junior A League. He led the Saints to a 63-45-5 mark and coached 18 players that received Division I scholarships in his two seasons there.

No stranger to the WCHA, Ward got his start in Division I hockey as an assistant coach at the University of Denver from 1990–93, under head coach Frank Serratore. He was responsible for the weight training and nutrition programs while also coaching the defensemen and special teams. Ward's start in coaching came at his alma mater, UW-Eau Claire, where he served as the head coach from 1987–90 and as an assistant to Mike Eaves for the 1986–87 season.

In the offseason, Ward is very active in summer camps, including being the owner and camp director of his Hockey and Sons Skill Camp. He also directed the Pittsburgh Penguins' Hockey Camp (1997–99) and has been involved with USA Hockey's Masters Symposium and Select 16 camps. Since 1994 Ward has been a coach at the C&O High Altitude Hockey Camp in Denver, which is a conditioning camp for professional players (NHL, IHL and AHL).

Ward, 42, earned a bachelor's degree in comprehensive physical education (1985) from UW-Eau Claire and a master's degree in athletic administration from UW-Eau Claire in 1989. The native of North St. Paul, Minn. has two sons, 13-year old Taylor and nine-year old Nathan.



Assistant Coach Mark Osiecki



isconsin men's hockey head coach Mike Eaves went looking for a new assistant coach and found his man in former Badger defenseman Mark Osiecki.

Osiecki joins Wisconsin from the Green Bay Gamblers of the United States Hockey League (USHL), where he served as general manager and head coach for seven seasons. Compiling a 199-154-98 mark during his career with the Gamblers, Osiecki became known for player development, as more than 50 of his players moved on to NCAA Division I hockey playing careers. Included among that group are current Badgers Adam Burish, A.J. Degenhardt, Kyle Klubertanz and Josh Engel, as well as former Badgers John Eichelberger and Dan Boeser, USHL Coach of the Year in 1999, Osiecki's Gambler squads won four-straight USHL

Eastern Division crowns from 1999 to 2002, and captured the 2000 Clark Cup as the American junior hockey tier I national champions.

Osiecki returns to his college coaching roots in the Western Collegiate
Hockey Association where he began his career as an assistant coach with the
University of North Dakota. During the
1996–97 season with North Dakota, he
helped direct UND to the NCAA championship.

Osiecki also boasts international coaching experience, capturing silver medals as head coach for the United States Under-18 Team at the 1999 World Championships in Slovakia and as an assistant coach for the U.S. Under-18 Team at the 2000 World Championships in the Czech Republic. Beyond that, he led the United States Junior Select team to a gold medal at the 1998 Freedom Challenge in Lake Placid, N.Y.

The former Badger defenseman skated for Wisconsin from 1987–90, earning three letters and serving as one of the assistant captains for the 1990 NCAA Championship team. During the national championship season, he collected careerhighs with 38 assists and 43 points.

A Burnsville, Minn., native, Osiecki was selected in the 1987 National Hockey League Entry Draft by the Calgary Flames and enjoyed a two-year career playing with the Flames, Ottawa Senators, Winnipeg Jets and Minnesota North Stars. He also represented his country as a player, competing for the United States at the 1992 World Championships in Prague, Czech Republic.

Assistant Coach Bill Howard



Bill Howard returns to the UW hockey staff for his 31st season as a volunteer assistant coach in 2003–04. He is a veteran of all five Wisconsin NCAA championship teams and continues to be the man behind the goaltending success of Badger teams.

During the off-season, Howard is actively involved in numerous summer hockey camps and seminars, including intensive goaltending schools in Chicago, Madison, Milwaukee, Minneapolis and St. Louis. After 34 years of teaching business law at Madison Memorial High School, Howard retired in the spring of 2000 from teaching.

In addition, Howard has also served as color commentator, both on radio and television, for Badger hockey.

During his tenure at the UW, Howard has helped develop All-Americans Julian Baretta (1977), Roy Schultz (1980), Duane Derksen (1992), Kirk Daubenspeck (1997), and current All-American Bernd Brückler, plus eventual NHL standouts Mike Richter (New York Rangers), Curtis Joseph (Detroit Red Wings) and Jim Carey (Boston Bruins). Another recent standout in goal was Graham Melanson (1997-2001), who finished his career at Wisconsin with school records in wins (81), games played (140), saves (3,850) and minutes (8,179). Current Badger goaltender Bernd Brückler ranks second on the all-time UW list with a .916 career save percentage and and a 2.51 goals-against average after setting the single season mark in both categories in 2003-04.

Before joining the UW staff full-time, Howard started the high school hockey program at Madison Memorial and was the Spartans' head coach for 10 years (1967–77). His teams won two state titles and posted a 136-72-1 (.653) record, including a perfect 44-0-0 mark from 1975–77.

Howard enjoyed a distinguished career at Colorado College as a goaltender, where he played for Bob Johnson. He lettered two years for the Tigers in 1964–65 and 1965–66, and was the starting goaltender during the 1965–66 campaign. Howard, a two-sport athlete at CC, was also a member of the Tiger baseball team.





Jamie Pollard Deputy Athletic Director

Jamie Pollard was named deputy athletic director for the UW-Madison in 2003 and serves as the No. 2

administrator in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics. Pollard is responsible for the overall administration of the Badgers' 23-sport, \$60 million athletic department and represents Barry Alvarez at all national, conference and university meetings when necessary.

Prior to being name deputy athletic director, Pollard served as the division's chief financial officer and senior associate athletic director. He developed a comprehensive strategic financial plan ("Keeping Big Red in the Black") that increased the division's operating reserve to \$7 million and allowed the university to move forward on the \$107 million renovation of Camp

Randall Stadium. He also assisted with the development of the school's inaugural preferential seating program that is generating more than \$9 million annually for the athletic program and he helped negotiate a multi-year, multi-million dollar contract for media and marketing rights that is the largest collegiate contract in the country.

Pollard has been the sports administrator for the men's and women's basketball programs since 2001-02 and served as the Tournament Manager when the UW hosted the 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Midwest Regional.

In the fall of 2003, Pollard was selected by Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal as a recipient of its "Top Forty Under 40" Award. It is given annually to the 40 most influential and creative individuals in sports under the age of 40. Pollard is the first college sports administrator honored by the magazine. Pollard is the president for the Collegiate Athletic Business Managers Association (CABMA) and was chosen by his peers as the 2002 Business Manager of the Year.

Pollard is the campus chair of the Partners in Giving campaign that benefits more than 300 non-profit organizations. He led the 2003 campaign for the Athletic Department, which resulted in a 100 percent increase in participants and a 78 percent increase in contributions.

His other intercollegiate administration experience came as associate athletic director for administration at Maryland (1994–98) and associate athletic director for internal operations at St. Louis (1989–94).

In addition to his role at Wisconsin, Pollard founded Collegiate Financial Services, LLC, a private data research company that provides strategic financial planning and research services to athletic administrators and university presidents.

With a noteworthy past that now spans six decades, three overriding characteristics that have continued to define the Western Collegiate Hockey Association over the league\(^\omega\) 53 (including 2004-05) seasons are history, tradition and success.

From the Association's founding days as the Midwest Collegiate Hockey League (MCHL) from 1951-53, to the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL) from 1953-58, and ultimately on to the Western Collegiate Hockey Association in 1959, this prestigious conference has maintained a tradition of excellence that is second to none.

In fact, no collegiate conference - in any sport - can top the impressive list of national scale accomplishments of the WCHA. Since 1951, teams representing this conference have earned an amazing 34 national championships, finished as the national runner-up another 26 times and qualified for a berth in collegiate hockey's national championship round - the NCAA Men's Frozen Four - in 49 of 52 seasons overall.

And, In 2003-04, it was another banner season for the WCHA, one that brought unprecedented exposure and awards to the conference and it's member teams, student-athletes and coaches. Following are some of those highlights:

- The WCHA had at least five teams ranked among the nation's top 15 teams in the final USA Today/American Hockey Magazine weekly poll for April 13 and in 26 of 28 weeks overall.
- The 2004 Red Baron WCHA Final Five drew a conference record 82,564 fans to Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul, Minn.
- A WCHA player Minnesota Duluth's Junior Lessard earned the Hobey Baker Memorial Award as college hockey's top player for the third consecutive season and record 10th time overall.
- Wisconsin senior defenseman Dan Boeser named one of five finalists for the prestigious Hockey Humanitarian Award.
- Eight conference players earned JOFA All-American honors, including six first teamers led by Wisconsin goaltender Bernd Brückler
- Seventy-four student-athletes earned WCHA All-Academic Team honors.
- Some 215 regular season and playoff games televised in the WCHA, including all five games from the 2004 Red Baron WCHA Final Five via Fox Sports Net North and all 12 first-round WCHA playoff games.
- The league's official web site wcha.com generated a record total of 2,033,657 page views between July, 2003 and June, 2004.
- The United States Hockey Hall of Fame announced four inductees including former Badger Mark Johnson, the head coach of Badger women's hockey.

Just a few of the more than 330 past and present NHLers who have roots in the WCHA include former stars like goaltenders Tony Esposito, Eddie Mio and Glenn "Chico" Resch, defensemen Keith Magnuson, Lou Nanne and Curt Giles, and forwards Lou Angotti, Bill Masterton, Bill "Red" Hay, Red Berenson, Glenn Anderson and Mark Johnson. The current crop of WCHA stars playing in the NHL include the likes of Chris Chelios, Brett Hull, Dany Heatley, Mark Parrish, Curtis Joseph, Greg Johnson, Sean Hill, Antti Laaksonen, Jason Blake, Tyler Arnason, Andy Sutton and Bret Hedican.

In addition to its dominating presence in the annual national collegiate championship tournament and its reputation for producing outstanding professional and Olympic players, the WCHA also continues to lead the way in college hockey attendance. Member teams, who regularly play in some of the sport's finest facilities, regularly top the Division I ranks in average home attendance. In 2003-04, the conference drew a record 1,513,137, just after setting a new mark of 1,511,991 in 2002-03. The WCHA has now topped the one million mark for home attendance for 11 consecutive seasons.

Over the last decade, the WCHA has also been able to showcase it's exciting brand of hockey to an ever-increasing number of fans, thanks to such impressive new facilities as Ralph Engelstad Arena, Colorado Springs World Arena, the Kohl Center, Magness Arena, Mariucci Arena, the National Hockey Center, and the Midwest Wireless Civic Center.

As one of the premier conferences in all of collegiate athletics, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association proudly celebrates it's 53rd season in 2004-05, and past and present players, coaches, administrators, and fans can take pride in having played a part in a truly special story - one measured by history, tradition and success.





COLLEGE HOCKEY SHOWCASE

The first annual College Hockey Showcase took place at The Palace of Auburn Hills, Mich., on Nov. 26-27, 1993. The tournament was created by the schools of the Big Ten Conference — Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota, Wisconsin — to showcase some of the nation's best talent over the Thanksgiving weekend.

CCHA schools (Michigan, Michigan State) play WCHA schools (Minnesota, Wisconsin) in a round-robin format.

The Showcase was not designed to determine an individual champion, but to give fans a chance to witness some of the most competitive teams and individual talent in college hockey, while preserving Big Ten rivalries.

The first four years of the Showcase were played at neutral sites —The Palace, The Target Center, The Bradley Center, Joe Louis Arena — with each school getting a chance to host the event. After the 1996 showcase, the event was moved to campus sites, rotating among the four Showcase schools.


- that Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota and Wisconsin have combined to win 21 of the 56 NCAA championships?

Final Records

Wisconsin won 20 games for the 29th time in school history, posting a 22-13-8 overall record. The Badgers finished third in the WCHA with a 14-7-7 mark.

Marked Improvement

The Badgers jumped five places in the WCHA standings going from eighth in 2002–03 to third in 2003–04 and finished four spots ahead of the preseason coaches' poll. The rise ties for the third-best improvement among the nation's hockey conferences. Colgate and RPI, both ECAC members, are the only schools that climbed higher in league standings.

The NCAA Return

Wisconsin qualified for its 20th NCAA tournament, advancing to the East Regional final with 1-0 overtime win over Ohio State. The Badgers fell 2-1 in overtime to eventual national runner-up Maine at the Pepsi Arena in Albany, N.Y.

The NCAA appearance was the first since going 1-1 in Grand Rapids, Mich., in 2001.

Unbeaten Streaks

A host of records were rewritten in 2003–04, led by Wisconsin's nationalbest, 15-game unbeaten streak (11-0-4). The 15-game run from Oct. 24 through Dec. 27 eclipsed the 14-game streak (13-0-1) the 1981–82 Badgers produced on their way to a WCHA playoff title and NCAA runner-up finish.

In addition, the UW set a school mark with a 13-game WCHA unbeaten

streak, going 8-0-5 from Nov. 7 through Jan. 9. The 1976–77 squad went 12-0-0 during one stretch to set the previous standard.

The 1976–77 NCAA champions also went 9-0-0 to record the best road streak in school history. The 2003–04 squad went 7-0-2 on the road from Nov. 7 to Jan. 23, equalling the mark.

Getting Defensive

The Badgers defense proved the stingiest in school history as the UW finished atop the WCHA with a 2.16 goals-against per game average in all games and 2.21 goals-against per game average in WCHA contests. Prior to the season, the 2.63 goals-against per game average the team posted in 1981–82 was the standard.

Perhaps more remarkable was the UW allowing three goals or less in 38 of 43 games.

Rankings

Wisconsin returned to the national polls as the No. 11 team on Dec. 1, 2003, after over two years outside the realm of the ranked. The UW was last previously ranked 14th in the Oct. 1, 2001, USA Today/American Hockey Magazine Preseason Poll.

Before reaching the top five in the polls on Dec. 15, it had been since Oct. 30, 2000, when it was No. 2 in both polls that the UW ranked among the nation's elite. Wisconsin ranked as high as No. 3 in the country during the 2003–04 season on Dec. 29 and Jan. 5.

Memorable Moments

Oct. 10 – Wisconsin opens the season at the Maverick Stampede and goes to overtime with host Nebraska-Omaha. Senior tri-captain Dan Boeser scores 7:47 into extra play to notch his first goal in over a season, giving the Badgers a 4-3 win.

Nov. 15 – Trailing at home 3-1 to Minnesota, the Badgers make it 3-3 by the end of the second period before Adam Burish wins the game with a short-handed goal at 13:59 of the final stanza.

Nov. 29 – Freshman defenseman Jeff Likens takes advantage of an overtime power play with the game winner for a UW 2-1 win at Michigan State. The victory gives Wisconsin its first sweep of the College Hockey Showcase after the Badgers defeated Michigan in Ann Arbor the night before.

Dec. 12 and 13 – With 5:10 left in the game and the Badgers up 3-1 over Minnesota State at the Kohl Center, power to the arena is lost and play suspended to the next night. When play continues, the Badgers tack on a short-handed, empty-net goal for the 4-1 victory before taking the night cap, 3-2.

Dec. 27 – Wisconsin defeats Union 8-1 in the first round of the Badger Hockey Showdown to set a new school record with a 15-game unbeaten streak.

Feb. 6 – The Badgers fall behind No. 1 North Dakota 3-0 by the end of the first period, but rookie Robbie Earl scores in the second period to close the gap. After Andrew Joudrey scores shorthanded in the third, Earl ties the game with 1:01 left in regulation, then wins it in overtime. The highlight-reel goal makes it on ESPN's SportsCenter and gives Wisconsin its first hat trick at the Kohl Center.

Feb. 27 – Bernd Brückler makes 23 saves to record his second-consecutive shutout with a 3-0 win at Alaska Anchorage. Brückler stopped 25 shots against St. Cloud State the previous week for the first shutout.

March 26 – Senior defenseman Dan Boeser one-times Robbie Earl's rebound at 12:03 of overtime to give Wisconsin a 1-0 victory over Ohio State in the first round of the NCAA tournament, ending the first NCAA playoff game to reach the end of regulation in a 0-0 tie.

Other Highlights

Wisconsin posts unbeaten months in November (5-0-3) and February (5-0-1) ... the Badgers go the entire season without getting shut out for the first time since the 1994–95 campaign ... the Badgers play 20 games decided by one goal or less and finish 7-5-8 in those contests ... the Badgers play 14 overtime contests, the most by any UW team, and nearly finish the season with a perfect mark in extra time. Wisconsin goes 5-1-8 in overtime contests, losing only to Maine in the NCAA East Regional

World Juniors Champions

Head Coach Mike Eaves and Badger skaters Ryan Suter, Jeff Likens and Jake Dowell missed four of Wisconsin's games while at the 2004 IIHF World Junior Championships. The event ran Dec. 26, 2003 through Jan. 5, 2004 in Finland. Each were part of the U.S. national junior team and helped the United States win its first world junior championship gold medal in the 28-year history of the event.

Wisconsin went 3-1-0 without the three players and Eaves.

Attendance

Wisconsin led the nation in attendance for the sixth-straight year and 30th time overall as the Badgers averaged 11,701 fans per game. The UW sold out three consecutive Saturday night home games, welcoming 15,237 fans to the Kohl Center each time. The sell outs were three of the six since the building opened in 1998. In all, seven of Wisconsin's 23 home contests saw over 13,000 people in the stands.

Wisconsin also topped its own NCAA record as 269,123 total fans watched Badger hockey, bettering the mark of 267,375 that came to the Kohl Center for the 1998–99 season.

Consummate Humanitarian

Senior defenseman Dan Boeser made the list of five finalists for the Hockey Humanitarian Award. Given to hockey's "finest citizen," Boeser reached the honored group after getting the UW hockey program involved with UW Children's Hospital. The team made weekly visits to hospital patients to play games, share stories and brighten the days of less fortunate young people.

Former Badger Erik Raygor won the award in 1998.

The Awesome Austrian

Junior goaltender Bernd Brückler posted one of the greatest seasons in the history of Wisconsin men's hockey. Listed below are a list of some of his accomplishments.

- He was named a first-team All-American, the first UW goalie since Roy Schultz in 1980 to be named to the first team.
- He won the WCHA goaltending title and set school goaltending records with a 15-game unbeaten streak, 2.09 goals-against average and .924 save percentage.
- He was also named first-team All-WCHA, CSTV/HCA national player of the month in February, USCHO.com national player of the week during February and the WCHA Defensive Player of the Week four times.
- He was named the NCAA East Regional Most Outstanding Player.
- He tied the school record with four shutouts.
- Brückler's 2.11 goals-against average captured Wisconsin's first WCHA goaltending championship since Jim Carey's 3.09 goals-against average was tops in the league during 1993–94.
- Brückler's league-leading .928 save percentage in WCHA games tied for eighth on the all-time WCHA single-season list.
- His .924 save percentage and 2.09 goalsagainst average in all games led the WCHA and rank fifth and sixth, respectively, on the WCHA single-season list.

Scoring Breakdown

Wisconsin's freshmen class lived up to its billing as one of the top groups in the nation. The rookies led Wisconsin in scoring with 47 goals, 87 assists and 134 points. Led by Robbie Earl's 14 goals and 27 points and Ryan Suter's 16 assists, the 10 newcomers carried much of the offensive load.

Following the freshmen, the sophomores collected 42 goals and 105 points, the seniors scored 34 goals and 81 points, while the juniors contributed seven assists.

Also contributing offensively were the Badger defensemen, who recorded 103 points, the most since the team's defensive corps collected 151 points during the 1994–95 season. Senior Dan Boeser led the way with eight goals and 22 points.

Defensemen made up five of Wisconsin's top 13 scorers, while six freshmen sat among the UW's top 11 scorers.

Senior forward Rene Bourque won the UW scoring title with 16 goals and 36 points, and tied for 17th in the WCHA.



Robbie Earl led all rookies with 27 points and all Badgers with six game-winning goals in 2003–04.

Senior Salute

Rene Bourque - Led the Badgers in scoring the past two seasons and was the only player to record double-figures in goals in each of the last four seasons. Served as team tri-captain.

Dan Boeser - Led team defensemen in scoring and scored two game-winning overtime goals in 2003–04 including against Ohio State in the first round of the NCAA tournament. Served as team tri-captain.

John Eichelberger - Scored a pair of powerplay goals to account for both UW scores in a 2-2 tie with Notre Dame. He is the only Badger to do so at the Kohl Center.

Chris Julka - Voted team captain by his teammates for the international contest against Riga 2000.

Jon Krall - Defensive defenseman scored his first career goal, the game-winner, in his 96th career game.

Andy Wozniewski - Along with Bourque and Boeser, served as one of the team's tri-captains. Started Wisconsin's 15-game unbeaten streak with the overtime game-winning goal against Quinnipiac.



The Decade of the 60s



The first UW hockey team (1963-64) went 8-5-3 in its first season, with wins over Macalester, Illinois Club, Lake Forest, Carleton and Hamline that year. John Riley (below) was one of the main forces behind the return of hockey to Wisconsin.

In March of 1962 at an athletic board meeting, then–Athletic Director Ivan B. Williamson reinstated ice hockey as an intercollegiate sport at the University of Wisconsin. A year and a half later, behind co-coaches Art Thomsen and John Riley, Badger hockey made its 'second debut'.

On November 29, 1963, seven days after the tragic death of President Kennedy, the Badgers faced off against St. Mary's College of Winona, Minn. That game signaled the return of hockey to Wisconsin after a 28-year absence.

The first Badger team of the modern era was formed by posting flyers around the campus during the Fall of 1962. The flyers asked any university students wishing to play ice hockey to report to an initial organizational meeting in Agricultural Hall. Only about 15-20 students showed up and because there were no scholarships, the team was molded from kids who did not receive offers from any other schools and a lot of local kids who just wanted to play the game.

So, from those humble beginnings, co-coaches Riley and Thomsen laid the foundation for what would become one of college hockey's winningest programs.

During the first full season (1963-64), a TOTAL of 8,937 fans watched 15 games at

Kelsey's Hartmeyer Ice Arena. That number tripled just one year later as in the Badgers' second season, nearly 28,000 people came out to watch the 17-game home slate.

Said Riley, "We had great enthusiasm from those who came out to see what was going on. Although small in number, they were very dedicated, very loyal, very excitable and very vocal." These were the first of the now famous Wisconsin hockey fans.

From the start, the Badgers boasted strong goaltenders producing such names as Jim Duffy, Gary Johnson, Bob Vroman and Wayne Thomas between the pipes in the 60s. The first 20-goal scorer (season) was Ray Clegg, who led the team in scoring during the 1964–65 campaign with 27-22=49. Bert Dehate was the decade's most prolific scorer with 108 goals, 80 assists for 188 points from 1966–70. He left with UW records for career goals and points, and season goals and points, to name a

few. On defense, John Jagger became the school's first All-American when he was named to the first team following the 1969–70 season. Don Addison paced the team in defensive scoring three straight seasons (1964–67) and led the team in scoring with 12-28=40 in 1966–67.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

March 1962 – Athletic Director Ivan B. Williamson announces the return of hockey as an intercollegiate sport after the sport was dropped in 1935.

November 29, 1963 – In the first game of the modern era, the Badgers lose a 13-6 shootout to St. Mary's (Winona, Minn.). The game was played in front of 695 fans at Hartmeyer Ice Arena.

The first modern-era goal came off the stick of Tom French (Ann Arbor, Mich.) on a penalty shot.

December 6, 1963 – A rebound goal by Chan Young (Madison, Wis.) gives the UW its first win in the modern era. In overtime, the Badgers defeated Macalester, 3-2.

December 11, 1964 – The UW takes a major step in the future of the program, scheduling eight games against teams from the WCHA. but the Badgers lose all eight.

February 22, 1966 – The UW breaks a 13-game winless streak versus WCHA teams, when it posts a 5-4 overtime win over the Minnesota Gophers.

April 1, 1966 – Following the retirement of John Riley, the UW hires Bob Johnson as its ninth coach in the history of the program.

March 1968 – Sophomore center Bert DeHate (St. Paul, Minn.) became the first Badger to win the national scoring title. He tallied 47-30=77, including a school-record seven hat tricks.

March 30, 1969 – Wisconsin joins the WCHA, becoming the ninth member of the most prestigious league in Division I college hockey.

November 14-15, 1969 – The first-ever WCHA series was played against the Fighting Sioux of North Dakota. The Badgers upset UND, sweeping the series 8-4 and 7-4.

March 1970 – Wisconsin makes its first NCAA tournament appearance, finishing third. Defenseman John Jagger (Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario) is the first UW All-American.

HSTORY

The Decade of the 70s

The decade of the 70s established the University of Wisconsin hockey program as one of the nation's elite. After winning the WCHA playoff championship in its first season as a WCHA member (1969–70) and also making its first NCAA tourney appearance that year, Wisconsin entered the next decade with confidence and determination to take the program to the next level.

It didn't take long for the Badgers to make that step and return to the NCAA championship. In March of 1972, the UW lost to Boston University, but defeated Denver to place third at the NCAA tournament. It was the second championship appearance in three years for a Badger team. Then came the 1972–73 campaign—the 10th anniversary of the UW hockey program in the modern era. That year proved to be the best yet for a Wisconsin squad as the Badgers finished 29-9-2 and gave themselves the best anniversary present available in the college hockey world—an NCAA championship. It would be the first of three for Bob Johnson as the UW's mentor.

Just four years later, arguably the best college hockey team assembled, notched the first 30-win season in the school's existence ending the year 37-7-1. That team produced four first-team All-Americans in forwards Mike Eaves and Mark Johnson, defenseman Craig Norwich



and goaltender Julian Baretta and Wisconsin's second NCAA title. The Badgers came from behind in both semi-final games to defeat New Hampshire and Michigan in overtime in two of the greatest comebacks in UW history. Both games were tied late in regulation by the UW and then won in overtime.

Wisconsin made another NCAA championship appearance in '77-78 (the fourth of the decade), finishing fourth after losing to Boston University and Bowling Green.

The UW watched two of its team members take part in the 'Miracle on Ice' during the 1980 Lake Placid Olympics. Mark Johnson and Bob Suter were both members of the United States' goalmedal winning team. Johnson led the team in scoring with 5-6=11.

The Badger hockey program had earned the respect of the college hockey world with the accomplishments and success during the 70s.

Wisconsin made four NCAA appearances, won two NCAA championships, four WCHA playoff titles and one WCHA regular-season crown. Six 20-plus win seasons, including a 30-win campaign, were recorded. Individually, six players earned nine first-team All-America honors, while five players (and one coach) were Olympians during the decade of the 70s. Steve Alley, Bob Lundeen, John Taft and head coach Bob Johnson were members of the 1976 U.S. Olympic team, while Johnson and Suter played on the 1980 U.S. team.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

March 1972 – The Badgers make a second appearance in three years at the NCAA championships, finishing third.

March 16, 1973 – Dean Talafous scores with five seconds left in regulation to tie the game, then scores the game-winning goal with 33 seconds in left overtime to cap a stunning comeback 6-5 victory over Cornell. The win advances the Badgers to the finals, where they defeat defending NCAA champion Denver for their first NCAA title.

February 19, 1977 – Wisconsin captures its first-ever MacNaughton Cup with a 6-4 win over Minnesota-Duluth at the Dane County Coliseum.

March 25, 1977 – The Badgers make it to college hockey's final four for the third time in school history. In semi-final action, Les Grauer ties the game and Mike Eaves get the game-winner to give the UW a 4-3 overtime win over New Hampshire.

March 26, 1977 – The best season in UW history is culminated when Steve Alley's goal at 0:23 into overtime gives Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Michigan for the school's second NCAA title in five seasons.

The Badgers finish the season at 37-7-1, becoming the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season. Bob Johnson is named national coach of the year, while his son, Mark, is named the freshman of the year.

March 25, 1978 – Wisconsin fans take Providence, R.I., by storm for the 1978 NCAA Championship and are proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans," by the city.

Mike Eaves ends his UW career as the school's alltime scoring leader, while he and Mark Johnson earn first-team All-America honors.

March 1979 – The Badgers play before 21 sellout crowds, averaging 8,654 (just eight short of a sellout) fans a game at the Dane County Coliseum.

Mark Johnson, the collegiate player of the year, closes out his UW career as the top goal scorer (125) in school history.

The Decade of the 80s

isconsin opened the 80s with three straight NCAA championship appearances (1980-81, 1981-82 and 1982-83) and two national titles (1981 and 1983). With three NCAA championships in seven years, Badger hockey had become the most successful collegiate hockey program in the nation.

Those three teams produced some of the best athletes to play the game. Consider that five members of those teams went on to distinguished NHL careers, including Bruce Driver (15 seasons/1,030 games), Pat Flatley (14/850), Brian Mullen (11/1,205), Dave Maley (9/512) and Chris Chelios, who marked his 20th season in the NHL in 2001-02 as a member of the Stanley Cup-winning Detroit Red Wings. Chelios, who has been named the NHL's best defenseman on three separate occasions, has played in 1,617 career NHL games.

In addition, four players – Flatley, Driver, John Newberry and Theran Welsh – were named first-team All-Americans. Welsh remains the Badgers' all-time leading defensive scorer (24-194=228) and is one of only four players in school history to reach the 200-point plateau.

Wisconsin won 20-or-more games every season in the decade of the 80s, including two 30-win campaigns. And, just as the UW entered the 80s, winning a national title, that is how it ended the 80s. The 1989-90 squad won the school's fifth NCAA title and posted the second-best record in school history (36-9-1).

The list of players that came out of the Badger hockey program during this decade is second to none. John Byce, Tony Granato, Sean Hill, Curtis Joseph, Scott Mellanby, Paul Ranheim, Barry Richter, Mike Richter, Gary Shuchuk, Gary Suter and Chris Tancill are just a few of the top players that came out of the 80s.

The Badgers became just the fourth school to win three or more titles in the same decade. Denver (60s) and Boston University (70s) won three and Michigan five (50s) championships in its respective decade.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

March 27, 1981 – For the sixth time in school history, the Badgers return to the NCAA tournament. After advancing past Clarkson in quarterfinal action a week earlier, the Badgers defeat Northern Michigan to earn the right to play for the national title.

March 28, 1981 – With a 6-3 win over arch-rival Minnesota, the Badgers grab the school's third NCAA title. The UW defeats the No. 1 teams in ECAC (Clarkson), the CCHA (Northern Michigan) and the WCHA (Minnesota) in its championship run.

March 27, 1982 – The Badgers make a second consecutive appearance in the NCAA title game, but lose to North Dakota, finishing second.

June 1, 1982 – Bob Johnson resigns after 15 years at Wisconsin. He led the program to three national titles, seven NCAA appearances and the highest attendance in the country.

July 8, 1982 – Jeff Sauer becomes the fourth coach (10th all time) in the modern era of Badger hockey.

March 5, 1983 – Wisconsin defeats North Dakota, 6-5 in triple overtime, to advance to the WCHA playoff championship. Chris Chelios ties the game with just 12 seconds left in regulation and Paul Houck wins it with a shorthanded goal in the third overtime. To date, it was the longest game in school history.

March 12-13, 1983 – With a sweep of the Gophers at Williams Arena, the Badgers earn the league playoff championship and the No. 1 seed in the West.

March 26, 1983 – For the third straight year, Wisconsin plays for the national title and wins the championship with a 6-2 victory over Harvard.

January 7, 1984 – Wisconsin becomes the only American collegiate team to defeat the 1984 U.S. Olympic squad (4-2) on its preparation tour.

November 23, 1985 – Wisconsin records the program's 500th modern-era victory with a 6-2 win over North Dakota at the Coliseum.

December 30, 1987 – The Badgers claim the Great Lakes Invitational tournament with wins over Michigan and Michigan State in front of 19,482 at Joe Louis Arena.

March 6-7, 1988 – A win over North Dakota (2-1) and Minnesota (3-2) at the St. Paul Civic Center nets the first-ever WCHA Final Four Playoff Championship.

December 28-29, 1989 – Wisconsin hosts its inaugural Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee, Wis. The UW defeats Notre Dame (9-3) and Boston College (6-5) to capture the Pettit Cup.

February 16, 1990 – The Badgers play their 1,000th game since the resumption of the program in 1963. A 6-3 ν .ctory over Minnesota.

March 24, 1990 – The UW completes its sweep of Maine in the NCAA quarterfinals at the Dane County Coliseum. The Badgers advance to Detroit with a 4-3 overtime win.

March 30, 1990 – In front of 8,000 Badger fans in Joe Louis Arena, the Cardinal and White defeat Boston College 2-1 to advance to the 1990 NCAA Championship game.

April 1, 1990 – Head coach Jeff Sauer guides his Badger team to a second NCAA title, with a 7-3 victory over Colgate. It is the school's fifth national title as the UW's 36-9-1 mark is the second-best in UW history.


The Decade of the 90s

The Badgers entered the 1990s as the defending NCAA champions, coming off a decade which saw a Wisconsin team play for the national title four times. Trying to match that feat would be a challenge.

The 1991-92 team did its part, becoming the lowest seeded team (sixth) in NCAA playoff history to advance to the championship game (The Badgers lost to Lake Superior State, 5-3).

The following year, the 1992-93 squad came within inches of making it to Milwaukee and the 1993 NCAA Championships, but dropped a heart-breaking 4-3 decision to Michigan in overtime. Wisconsin managed NCAA berths in the next two years, but did not earn a trip to the NCAA's Frozen Four, despite additional NCAA bids in 1997-98 and 1999-2000.

The 1999-2000 squad boasted two of the most talented forwards that have played for the Badgers in Steve Reinprecht and Dany Heatley. Both helped lead the UW to the 2000 WCHA regular-season Championship and the MacNaughton Cup. It was the third time in school history a UW team had won the league title and the first since 1990.

Reinprecht earned first-team All-America honors, the first Badger forward since Gary Shuchuk (1990) to receive that distinction. He also finished his senior season as the runner-up (the highest finish ever for a Badger) for the Hobey Baker award, given to the nation's top player. Heatley, a second-team All-American as a freshman, was named a first-team All-American (2001), giving Wisconsin its first back-to-back All-America first teamers since Mike Eaves and Mark Johnson (1978 and 1979).

Three UW defensemen were named All-Americans – Barry Richter (1993), Brian Rafalski (1995) and Jeff Dessner (2000). In goal, Duane Derksen (1992) and Kirk Daubenspeck (1997) were second-team All-Americans.

Wisconsin made the 12-team NCAA tourney seven of 10 years in the 90s, averaging over 23 wins a season. The decade ended with the '99-00 team posting the third-best mark in school history, 31-9-1.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

April 2-4, 1992 – Wisconsin defeats Michigan, 4-2, to move into the national championship game against Lake Superior State. The Badgers lose 5-3, but become the lowest-seeded team to ever advance to a national title contest.

March 26-27, 1993 – The Badgers receive a sixth consecutive bid to the NCAA tournament. After a 3-1 win over Miami University, the UW drops a heart-breaking 4-3 decision to Michigan in overtime, missing the chance to appear in its third Frozen Four in four seasons.

March 25-26, 1994 – In its seventh straight NCAA appearance, the Badgers handle Western Michigan (6-3), but lose to top-ranked Boston University, 4-1.

March 17-18, 1995 – Wisconsin recorded wins over Denver and league champion Colorado College to claim the 1995 WCHA Playoff Championship, the school's 10th playoff title. The championship earns the Badgers an automatic NCAA berth, the eighth straight for the UW.

March 8, 1997 – Wisconsin and Colorado College make college hockey history playing in the longest game on record – 5 hours and 24 minutes. The first-round WCHA playoff game lasts until the 9:30 mark of the fourth overtime as the Tigers win the game, 1-0.

Badger netminder Kirk Daubenspeck sets a league and school record with 75 saves.

January 4, 1998 – Head coach Jeff Sauer becomes the WCHA's winningest coach when the UW defeats Denver 7-3. The victory is Sauer's 556th as a league coach and surpasses the legendary John MacInnes.

March 14, 1998 – With a 6-2 win over Alaska-Anchorage, the Badgers play their last regular-season game in the Dane County Coliseum. It had served as the home to Badger hockey for over 30 years.

March 20-21, 1998 – The Badgers take the 1998 WCHA Playoff Championship, with 5-2 and 3-2 wins over Colorado College and North Dakota, respectively. The win also gives Bucky an automatic spot in the 12-team NCAA tourney.

October 3, 1998 – Wisconsin opens the Kohl Center in the College Hockey Hall of Fame game vs. Notre Dame. Despite a 3-2 loss to the Irish, a record 13,398 fans turn out to see the Badgers' debut in their new home.

February 25, 2000 – For only the third time in school history, a Badger team wins the coveted MacNaughton Cup. The WCHA regular-season league championship is clinched with a 4-2 win over the Minnesota Golden Gophers at Mariucci Arena.

A New Century Begins – 2000

the 21st century as it had its previous three decades—with a 20-win season and a berth in the NCAA tournament. It was the 16th 20- or 30-win campaign for head coach Jeff Sauer and the 12th NCAA appearance for the Badgers under Sauer.

The Badger fans were also treated to a second year of watching Dany Heatley play as he opted to return for a second season (2000-01) with the Badgers instead of turning pro. Heatley, one of the most talented and gifted players to ever wear the Cardinal and White, was named the NHL's Rookie of the Year following the 2001-02 season. Drafted No. 2 overall in the 2000 NHL Entry Draft by the Atlanta Thrashers, he led all league rookies in scoring in 2001-02 before picking up NHL All-Star Game MVP honors in 2002-03.

Two seasons into the fifth decade of Badger hockey, the program said goodbye to the Jeff Sauer era as former Badger Mike Eaves became the fourth coach in the modern era of UW hockey. Sauer announced his retirement from coaching on January 9, 2002, after 31 years coaching in the WCHA and 20 seasons behind the Badger bench. He is the winningest coach in league and school history and the fourth-winningest coach all time.

The Eaves Era began on March 19, 2002, when he was hired to replace Sauer. After 26 years, Eaves still remains the school's all-time scoring leader with 94-173=267 in 160 games during his four-year career as a Badger. He led the team in scoring during his freshman, sophomore and senior seasons and in his junior year, was the top-scoring Badger forward (28-53=81) on the 1977 NCAA Championship squad.

By Eaves' second season, he already made a mark, leading his team to a record-setting season that culminated in the squad reaching the 2004 NCAA East Regional Final.

Junior goaltender Bernd Brückler posted one of the greatest seasons in UW history and became the first goalie since Roy Schultz in 1980 to be named a first-team All-American.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

June 24, 2000 – Dany Heatley, taken second overall in the 2000 NHL Entry Draft, becomes the highest player to be drafted in Badger history.

January 9, 2002 – Jeff Sauer announces he is retiring as the head coach of the Badgers after 20 years behind the UW bench and 31 years as a head coach in the WCHA.

March 19, 2002 – Mike Eaves is announced as the Badgers' fifth head coach in the modern era at a press conference in the Kohl Center.

October 19, 2002 – The Badger hockey program sees its 1,000,000th hockey fan come through the turnstiles at the Kohl Center when the Badgers defeat Alabama-Huntsville. After five years calling the Kohl Center home, Wisconsin has drawn a total of 1,192,099 fans for an average of 11,687 per game (102 home dates).





THE BROADMOOR TROPHY

Since 1985, teams winning the WCHA playoff championship have been awarded the Broadmoor Trophy, which was first presented to the conference in 1981 by the world-renowned Broadmoor Hotel and Resort in Colorado Springs, Colo. The Broadmoor hosted the NCAA Ice Hockey Championship 11 times between 1948 and 1969.

For the first three seasons (1981-84) of its partnership with the WCHA (due to the departure of league member and MacNaughton Cup custodian Michigan Tech to the CCHA), the trophy was presented to the Association's regular-season champion. When the Huskies returned to the WCHA for the 1984-85 season, the Broadmoor Trophy became and has since been the symbol of the league's post-season tournament championship.

Sweet Sixteen For The Showdown

Wisconsin hockey found the perfect way to ring in 2005 as the Badger Hockey Showdown returns to the Kohl Center for the second time after 14 years at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee. Running since the inaugural event in December of 1989, this year's version takes place New Year's Eve and New Year's Day in the top college sports town in America.

The brainchild of former Badger head coach Jeff Sauer, the Showdown has featured defending NCAA champions, Hobey Baker winners and finalists and numerous future NHL stars. Praised by coaches, players and fans as one of the best showcases of college hockey talent in the nation, the tourney has become one of the most successful in college hockey history.

Since 1989, over 390,000 fans have witnessed the December spectacle in Milwaukee and Madison, averaging over 26,000 fans per year and over 13,000 spectators a day.

Wisconsin has enjoyed much success at the Showdown, winning eight of the 15 championships. The Badgers have defeated hockey powers Boston College (1989), North Dakota (1990), Maine (1991), Northern Michigan (1993, 1997 and 2002), Bowling Green State (1994) and Boston University (2000) to win titles. Hockey East members Boston University (1992 and 1995) and New Hampshire (1996 and 2001) have each won the Showdown twice, while Bowling Green State was the first CCHA team to win the Showdown in 1998. At the 1999 event, North Dakota became the first WCHA team other than the Badgers to win the Pettit Cup. Wisconsin enters the 2004 event looking to recapture the title after falling to Ferris State in the final of the 2003 Showdown.

Showdown 2004

The Badger Hockey Showdown makes its second appearance in Madison after 14 years at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee.

The Ferris State Bulldogs left the Kohl Center in Dec. 2003 as champions of the 15th annual Badger Hockey Showdown and the Bulldogs return in 2004 as the second school other than host Wisconsin to defend a title. Making their first appearance last year, the Bulldogs cooled off the red-hot Badgers in the 2003 title contest to claim the tournament victory. FSU rode the pads of tournament most valuable player Mike Brown to a 4-2 win after knocking off UMass Lowell in the semifinals. The win snapped Wisconsin's school-record 15-game unbeaten streak.

The Bulldogs open with Clarkson, which came within a game of an ECAC postseason championship and NCAA berth last season. The Golden Knights make their first appearance at the Badger Hockey Showdown.

Yale, Wisconsin's semifinal opponent, competes in the Showdown for the third time. The Bulldogs skated against the UW in the first round of both the 1991 and 1998 Showdowns, dropping a 6-1 contest in 1991 and taking a 4-2 victory in 1998. Yale finished second with a 4-1 championship game loss to Bowling Green in the 1998 title game.








All-Americans

Did You Know?

Of the eight forwards who have earned first-team All-America accolades at Wisconsin, only two — Mark Johnson and Paul Ranheim — were born in the United States. Mike Eaves, John Newberry, Patrick Flatley, Gary Shuchuk, Steve Reinprecht and Dany Heatley all hail from Canada.

Bernd Brückler (2004) became the first Badger goaltending All-American since Roy Schultz (1980). Prior to Brückler, other potential Badger All-Americans left school early to sign NHL contracts — Mike Richter (New York Rangers), Curtis Joseph (Detroit Red Wings) and Jim Carey (Washington Capitals).

The eight first-team All-America forwards scored 626-758=1,384 in their Badger careers in 854 games. That averages out to 1.6 points a game between the group.

Five individuals have earned All-America status twice as a Badger: Mike Eaves, Mark Johnson, Tony Granato, Craig Norwich and Dany Heatley.

The first five UW All-Americans were defensemen.

Since 1970, Wisconsin is one of only two teams in the WCHA to have four All-Americans in one year. Following the 1987-88 season, Paul Ranheim and Paul Stanton (first team) and Steve Tuttle and Dean Anderson (second team) were all voted All-America.

Hobey Baker Award Finalists

Begun in 1981, the Hobey Baker Memorial Award was established to recognized college hockey's premier individual player. Ten players are selected each year as finalists for the award. Wisconsin has had six finalists for the award.





The Hat Trick

There have been 183 hat tricks in UW history, including 155 three-goal, 25 four-goal and three five-goal 'tricks'. Listed below are the most recent players to record a three-, four- or five-goal game.

Three goals

Robbie Earl scored the most recent Badger hat trick against North Dakota at the Kohl Center on Feb. 6, 2004.

Four goals

Blaine Moore was the last player to score four goals in a game. On March 13, 1993, Moore scored four goals in a 10-3 win over Colorado College in the first round of the WCHA playoffs at the Dane County Coliseum.

Five goals

Third-year Badger women's hockey coach Mark Johnson is one of only three players in UW history to score five goals in one game. On Jan. 27, 1978, Johnson hit the back of the net five times in a 10-2 win over Michigan Tech in Madison. (Bert DeHate, 2/24/67 and Mike Meeker, 10/29/77 previously accomplished the feat.)

Natural hat trick

Only seven players have notched a natural hat trick. The most-recent Badger to accomplish a pure hat trick Dany Heatley at Alaska Anchorage on Feb. 19, 2000. He scored the first three goals in a 5-0 win by the Badgers.



- 3. Television and radio stations originating a live broadcast.
- 4. Television and radio stations covering for nightly news.
- All other requests will be evaluated on a space-available basis, with preferences given to those who regularly cover Wisconsin hockey.

Note: Spouses, dates, children and other non-workers are not allowed in any of the media areas.

Photographers

Requests should be submitted on your company's letterhead to the UW Athletic Communications Office and are granted on a priority first-come, first-served basis. Photographers are free to shoot from most locations in the Kohl Center but are reminded to be considerate of patrons. Credentials must be prominently displayed at all times.

Strobes are available for use by photographers and will be granted on a first-come, first-served basis. Cost per event is \$200.

Radio Originations

Radio stations wishing to broadcast Badger hockey games should contact the UW Athletic Communications Office at least one week in advance to place their credential requests. Radio talent work from the top row of the press area in section 208 of the Kohl Center.

Credential Pick Up

Upon receipt of applications, appropriate credentials are either mailed, made available at the Athletic Communications Office or left with the parking attendant at the entrance to Lot 91 off of Bedford Street on gamedays. A map showing parking locations is on page 157.

Phone Lines

All requests for installation of phone lines should be made to Rex Owens at (608) 265-4705. Cost per line per event is \$100 (\$140 for an unrestricted analog line or an ISDN line). Broadcast locations are assigned by the UW Athletic Communications Department based on involvement with the co-op line arrangement. If you are not part of the WCHA co-op agreement, you must make your phone line requests (especially if you need ISDN lines) at least one week in advance of the game(s).

There are two standard phone lines as well as ISDN lines for visiting radios which are part of the co-op line arrangement. Numbers for those lines are (608) 257-3416/4824 (standard lines) and (608) 250-2552/2634 (ISDN).

There are also courtesy phones made available by the UW Athletic Communications Office in the press area and in the media room located on the ice level of the Kohl Center.

Media Workroom

The Kohl Center features a large media workroom that contains the following:

- post-game interview area
- numerous working locations from which media can file stories
- · platform for video cameras
- · copy machine
- · pre-game dining area
- photo darkroom
- men's and women's restrooms

Game programs, line charts, game notes and media guides are available in the workroom.

Media may store personal belongings in the workroom from the time they arrive at the Kohl Center until after the game.

The workroom is located at the northeast corner of the arena at ice level. To access the workroom from outside the arena, enter through the media gate and proceed down the stairs on your right.

Practice

The Wisconsin hockey team has three different practice locations — the Kohl Center, the Dane County Arena and occasionally the Dane County Coliseum. Please call the UW Athletic Communications Office for site and specific times of practices.

Many times the Badgers conduct split practices and most players only participate in one of those sessions. If you need to interview a specific player, please call ahead to make sure he will be available.

Typical practice times are from 3:00-5:15, Monday-Wednesday. Thursday practices (during weeks of home games) normally run from 3:15-5:00. Practice times are subject to change.

Media attending practices should be aware that the Badger locker room and lounge area is closed.

Scouting Tickets

Per the Western Collegiate Hockey Association's policy, professional hockey scouts must purchase tickets through the UW Ticket Office at 1-800-GO-BADGERS or (608) 262-1440.

Interviewing Coach Eaves

Head coach Mike Eaves will be available for interviews after practice sessions, Monday-Thursday.

Eaves also holds a weekly media conference throughout the season. These sessions begin at 1 p.m. and will be held in the media room in the Kohl Center. Those not able to attend may watch the news conference live at uwbadgers.com.

On the road, Eaves is available at the Badgers' hotel or following practice sessions.

Those media wishing to conduct a phone interview with Coach Eaves should call the hockey office directly at (608) 262-3932. It is easiest to reach Eaves by phone in the mornings. Mondays through Wednesdays.

Player Interviews

Badger players are available for interviews AFTER practices (except on game days). Practices are generally held between 3-6 p.m. regardless of the site.

All player interviews should be arranged through the UW Athletic Communications Office. Please contact Paul Capobianco (608-263-1983) prior to the start of practice each day to secure interviews.

It is the policy of the UW Athletic Communications Office not to give out home telephone numbers of student-athletes. For out-of-town media members, requests for collect-call telephone interviews with players may be made through Capobianco.

Madison Area Map




Kohl Center Area Map

Directions To The Kohl Center

From the Dane County Airport

Exit airport via International Lane to Packers Avenue (Hwy. 113). Turn left on Packers Avenue, which changes to Pennsylvania Avenue – Johnson Street – Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue into the campus until you reach Frances Street. Turn left onto Frances Street and proceed two blocks to Dayton Street. The Kohl Center will now be in view.

From West I-90 / 94 (from Minneapolis)

Take I-90 / 94 to Highway 151 South (East Washington Avenue). Continue on East Washington Avenue to the State Capitol Building. Turn right onto Butler Street, proceed to Gorham Street and turn left. Continue on Gorham Street, which becomes University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue into the campus until you reach Frances Street. Turn left onto Frances Street and proceed two blocks to Dayton Street. The Kohl Center will now be in view.

From South and I-90 (from Chicago)

Take I-90 to the Madison beltline (Highway 12/18). West on the beltline to Park Street (Hwy. 151). Exit right (north). Take Park Street to Dayton Street. Turn right onto Dayton Street, then approximately three blocks to the Kohl Center, which will be on the right.

From East and I-94 (from Milwaukee)

Take I-94 to Highway 30 West. Take Highway 30 to its end at Highway 113 South. Turn left onto 113 South, which becomes Packers/ Pennsylvania Avenue. Continue on Packers/Pennsylvania Avenue, which changes to Johnson Street – Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue into the campus until you reach Frances Street. Turn left onto Frances Street and proceed two blocks to Dayton Street. The Kohl Center will now be in view.

Paul Braun, Wisconsin's television voice for 30 years, once again calls the action for the Badgers on Fox Sports Net. A veteran of four of Wisconsin's five NCAA hockey championships as a broadcaster, Braun helped start the statewide tape-delayed telecast of Badger hockey in 1973–74. He has called the game for both radio and television hockey broadcasts as well as being the play-by-play announcer for WHA-TV for delayed Wisconsin football and basketball telecasts.

Former Badger Tom Sagissor returns to the booth for his third season as an analyst for Fox Sports. Sagissor, who had 79 points in 162 career games with the Badgers as a forward, was part of the UW's 1990 NCAA championship team. Brian Posick begins his third year as the radio play-by-play announcer for the UW hockey team after spending seven years as the voice of Badger women's basketball. In his 14th year with the radio station, Posick serves as WIBA's sports director. The Madison sports veteran also called Badger hockey games on WHA-TV's delayed hockey broadcasts for two years prior to his current broadcasting duties with WIBA.

Like on both Fox Sports and WHA-TV, a former Badger will analyze 2003–04

Badger action. Rob Andringa, a four-year Badger letterwinner and former team co-captain, will sit beside Posick for his second season. A 1990 NCAA champion with Wisconsin, Andringa tallied 104 points in a WCHA-record 179 games played as a defenseman. He spent the previous seven seasons as color commentator for the Badgers' delayed television broadcast on Wisconsin Public Television.



Wisconsin Public Television is in its fourth decade of Badger hockey coverage. WPT airs UW's home games on a delayed basis on it's seven-station network and on Milwaukee Public Television. WPT also produces live broadcasts for UPN-14 in Madison.

In addition to its on-ice coverage, WHA-TV created the Jim Santulli 7th Man Award in 1980. It is voted on by the viewers and presented to a UW hockey player at the annual banquet.

This season, WPT's on-air team features second-year announcers Aaron Sims and former UW winger Ron Vincent. Sims is a veteran radio guy and all around hockey fan. Vincent was part of the 1981 NCAA championship team and is still sixth on the Badgers' career scoring charts.



Chancellor John D. Wiley

Chancellor John D. Wiley has worked to amplify the Wisconsin Idea and build on the research and teaching strengths that have made the University of Wisconsin so rich in accomplishment and tradition.


Since being named as the UW-Madison's 27th chancellor on Jan. 1, 2001, Wiley has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning.

Wiley has presided over unprecedented growth on the west side of campus, which is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers.

He also has mapped an east side redevelopment that will create a vibrant arts-and-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and help to build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW-Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.



Athletic Director Barry Alvarez

Barry Alvarez began his head football coaching duties at Wisconsin in 1990, and in April of 2004 began a dual role when he assumed the responsibility of Director of Athletics.

Alvarez has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He has guided Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998–99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (99-67-4 record).

His 7-2 (.777) record in bowl games with the Badgers is among the best in college footbhall history. The 1993 national coach of the year, he is a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and was a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three grown children: daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer); and son Chad. Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, and Grace Delzer.



NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS













In the last 11 years, the University of Wisconsin has hosted five NCAA championships and an NCAA men's basketball regional.

The Badgers have played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sellout in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.


The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament came to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers played host to a regional in the Kohl Center.

Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

WISCONSIN ATHLETICS MISSION STATEMENT



In all of its activities, the Division insists on integrity, ethical conduct and accountability.

Badgers in the Community

The Madison community is extremely supportive of the University of Wisconsin athletic teams and its many student-athletes. In return for that support, many student-athletes take time out of their busy schedules to show their appreciation and involvement in the city of Madison and Dane County through their community service efforts.

Student-athletes have assisted in a variety of service projects including the AIDS Support Network, Big Brothers and Big Sisters, Habitat for Humanity, Hammer with a Heart, Special Olympics, United Way, Very Special Arts, visiting children in local hospitals with the Amanda the Panda program, and volunteering at local schools in the Bookin' It with Bucky program.

The athletic department also donates a number of tickets and memorabilia to local charities for fund-raising purposes.



NCAA Compliance

As a member of the Big Ten Conference, Western Collegiate Hockey Association, and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the University of Wisconsin must abide by many rules and regulations. Below is general information on how these guidelines apply to prospective student-athletes and representative of athletics interests.

Definitions

A prospective student-athlete is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, one becomes a prospective student-athlete if a college gives the individual (or his/her relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A prospective student-athlete is recruited at a particular university when its coach approaches the prospect (or any member of the prospect's family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at that college by any one of the following three ways:

- Providing an official visit to the university's campus;
- Having an arranged, in-person, offcampus encounter with a prospect or the prospect's family; or
- Placing more than one telephone call to a prospect or any other member of his/her family.

A representative of the UW's athletics interests ("booster") is anyone who . . .

- is an alumnus of the UW
- has contributed to a Badger athletic program
- has helped arrange employment of enrolled and prospective UW student-athletes
- has been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

The Recruiting Process

Institutional staff members have very specific recruiting guidelines that vary by sport. The major areas are: telephone calls, contacts, evaluations, campus visits, correspondence, and highlight films/videotapes.

In addition to general recruiting regulations, no booster can be involved in recruiting (e.g., no phone calls, letters, or inperson contacts).

Eligibility

Prospects who intend to participate in Division I intercollegiate athletics must register with and be certified by the NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse. Please contact your high school counselor for more information on this process, especially regarding the requirements to be eligible.

Extra Benefits

By NCAA definition, an extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional

employee or a booster to provide a studentathlete or a student-athlete's relative or friend a benefit that is not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. This is prohibited. If the benefit is demonstrated to be generally available to ALL UW STUDENTS or their relatives or friends determined on a basis unrelated to athletic ability, it is not a violation of NCAA rules.

Extra benefits are also not permissible for prospective student-athletes. They are called offers and inducements, and include any benefit such as cash, clothing, cars, improper expenses, transportation, gifts or loans to encourage you to sign a National Letter of Intent or attend an NCAA university. UW Compliance On-Line Training Program Compliance Rules and Regs is a compliance training program available on the Internet. Student-athletes, coaches and designated athletic department staff are required to complete the program, while boosters are encouraged to participate. Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center has been helping Wisconsin student-athletes to achieve their academic goals since 1997.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-theart facility serves the needs of all studentathletes. The center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are eight study rooms of different shapes and sizes, including a 55-seat auditorium. A state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, is networked to allow access to email, the libary system's electronic catalog and the web while the entire center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Associate Athletic Director David Harris supervises a staff of five advisors, four learning specialists and a tutor coordinator who conduct the academic services offered to the more than 700 studentathletes. The advising staff of Tom Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutorial coordinator Jill Hadfield work along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt (assistant director), Dan Ott, Maryellen Rock and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. The staff, including program assistant Nancy Kreklow, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. Study groups, tutors and a variety of academic and career planning are available throughout the year.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists whose offices are located in the center. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play.





The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Services Center, a state-of-the-art facility located in the lower level of the McClain Center, opened in 1997. The \$2.1 million center is one of the best in the nation and includes eight study rooms, a computer room, and a 55-seat auditorium.

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Karen Bloch, Beth Cranley, Greg Ehlers, Chuck Hart, Jan Helwig, Andy Hrodey, Mike Moll, Henry Perez-Guerra, Kristen Walker, Laura Walluk, and Ian Wood as well as graduate assistant trainers Holli Schaible and Nicole Gehrich utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physician Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Lee Kaplan. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, Dr. Tom Best and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Strength & Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann along with assistants Brian Bott, Ben Herbert, Scott Hettenbach, Bryan Miller, Mike Potenza and Jim Snider work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Kohl Center weight room is equipped with five custom-built free weight power platforms and 4,000 pounds of free weights. The room has nine pieces of cardiovascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.










Wisconsin Sports Facilities



Top: Camp Randall Stadium is the home of the football Badgers and has a seating capacity of nearly 80,000. The stadium is in the midst of a \$107 million renovation that includes a new office building, video scoreboards, suites and club seating as well as other improved fan amenities.



The Natatorium contains an eightlane, 25-yard pool equipped with an automatic timing system and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter boards. The Southeast Recreational Facility (shown above) features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads.

Madison: A Great College Town


A progressive, cosmopolitan city of more than 200,000 people, Madison possesses both small town charm and an urban sophistication usually found in much larger cities.



Whatever your preference for recreation or relaxation, you'll find plenty to do in Madison and encounter a diverse group of individuals who all call this place home.


