The "chain letter" started on its way by Mary Morton, helped to cheer many a lonesome hour, and each one tried to write a cheerful letter to cheer the others. Frank Don Levy and Janie Wright had most pain to endure, but even they in the midst of suffering asked for others. Something, too, must stand for the self-control shown by those who came back to school at once, and facing the empty seats, took up the daily work, and planned with loving thought for those at home. This was one of the hardest lessons of all, and honor to those who mastered it. The other classes had a part here—lost lessons were to be made-up, work to be written from dictation, books to be carried, everywhere loving service needed, and all willing to do it.

Then there was the rejoicing when, from day to day, or after long weeks, one who had been absent would come back to us. The day Janie Wright was hauled to school on her sled, and the day Frank walked into the room during the literary program! Only those who suffered with us could know our joy! These shall be the rosy sunset lights.

But the greatest and best lesson of all shall be found in the motto for our window. Though when we first met as a school after our loss, our lips could hardly frame the words, write them now so they stand out clearly:

Lumbering in Oconto County



The Log from the time it is Murdered,
till it is Burried.



During the winter months the men go into the woods and murder the trees; making them into logs. Then in the spring of the year the murdered trees, (logs) are floated down the rivers to the saw mills. When the logs reach the mill, the "bull" chain pulls them up into the mill, to the bumpers. The bumpers then put the logs on the carriage by bumping them, by means of an instrument called the nigger. The carriage gives all logs, that are not afraid of the saw, a free ride.

The men that do the planning for the butchering of the logs get the highest salaries, ("Yes, they ought to be hanged.")

Some logs are not cut into boards, but are cut into square timbers, for "tooth picks". The two inch boards are carried to the "snorter" to be purified. The one inch boards are brought to the executer—a machine which blows the knots out of the boards. The knots are made into corks; and the holes in the boards are sold to bakers, who use them in doughnuts. Bugs and ants found in rotten boards are sold and sent to the bug hatcheries.

The poorest pine is better than the best hemlock because it has such a fine assortment of slivers. Some of the slabs that are cut from the logs go down the shoot-the-shoots and are hauled away.

Bark that isn't used for making paper, is sent to Arabia for chewing gum. Some of the grease that runs over and is spoilt, is sent to Greece to be made into hair oil. The American girls use that kind. Mill odors are boxed up and sent to the perfumery, to be made into snuff.

The engines are heated by saw dust which is crosspiled by three men. It is then left to dry; after that it is ready for use. After the sawdust is burned the smoke goes up through the smoke stack, where four men are employed shoveling it into the air.

From the saw mill the boards are taken over to the planing mill by the mill street cars, which run on tracks and are pulled by animals known as horses. The planing mill is the place where the "slivers" are shaved off the boards. In other words it is a kind of barber shop for lumber. The boards are (loaded) unloaded from the street cars by kids called men.

At the planing mill the rough boards are planed into male and female boards, (that is, made to match). This is done by the boards going thru' a sliver kidnapper, which deprives the boards of their slivers. From there the boards go thru' the juice absorber, where the juice is taken out. This juice is sent away and manufactured into "tobacco juice." Later the boards go up a kind of a hill, on the top of which men are standing, waiting to slide down the boards to (see) find out if there are any more slivers in the boards.

The slivers are crosspiled until dried, and are then sold for "breakfast food". Sometimes many kids are seen about the mill. Well these kids are waiting for a chance to slide down the boards so they can patch their pantaloons with slivers.

After the lumber is dry it is sold. Some of it is used in building houses, etc., and then is the time when the male and female boards are matched.
