



Excerpts Reprinted from *Money Magazine*, July 1996

"Madison, Wis., is not the best place to live, it's the perfect place to live," insists Donna Shalala, former UW Chancellor who became President Clinton's Secretary for Health and Human Services.

We second the sentiment. This year, Madison (and the rest of Dane County) earns the No. 1 position among the 300 biggest U.S. metropolitan areas in our 1996 Best Places to Live in America ranking.

The 390,300 residents of Dane County, 80 miles west of Milwaukee in south-central Wisconsin, have a vibrant economy with plentiful jobs, superb health care, and a range of cultural activities usually associated with cities twice as big. This mid-metro area also offers up a low crime rate and palpable friendliness you might assume are available only in say, Andy Griffith's Mayberry.

So what makes us so mad about Madison? Start with a peppy economy. Madison's absurdly low 1.5% unemployment rate is the lowest of all 300 places we ranked.

Mad City, as locals call it, is also Fun City, especially if you like boats and bikes. The Mendota and Monona lakes are separated by a half-mile wide isthmus that serves as downtown Madison. Add in three other large lakes, and Dane County can satisfy any type of boating preference.

Cyclers have more than 150 miles of bike trails and routes to pedal. In winter, cross country skiers glide through more than 100 miles of trails. For cerebral outings, Madison has five museums including the little-hands-on Madison Children's Museum.

Saturdays in the fall are reserved for rooting on UW's revered Badger football team. Another popular May through October ritual is the farmer's market (on the Capitol Square).

Around the corner you can catch an earful at the Madison Civic Center where the Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra and Madison Symphony perform, and Pulitzer prize-winning plays are staged.

HEAD COACH JANE ALBRIGHT-DIETERLE



Jane Albright-Dieterle completed her second year with the University of Wisconsin women's basketball program with back-to-back 20-win seasons and third-place Big Ten finishes.

The 1996 team posted the best record in school history at 21-8, and received its second consecutive NCAA tournament bid and second round appearance. It was Albright-Dieterle's seventh 20-win season in the past eight years, and her sixth NCAA tournament in seven years (at Wisconsin and Northern Illinois). She was named the Women's Basketball Coaches Association District IV Coach of the Year, and was voted *Madison Magazine's* Woman of the Year a second straight year.

Under Coach "A", the Badgers continued the success of her first year which brought Wisconsin just its second winning season in 11 years. The 1995 Badgers were 20-9, and

went further than any team in school history winning their first NCAA tournament game before losing in the second round to fifth-ranked Texas Tech at the 1995 subregional in Lubbock.

She was named the 1995 Big Ten Coach of the Year by her peers when Wisconsin placed third in the Big Ten Conference with an 11-5 record, improving from ninth place in 1994. She achieved her 200th win during that season, and was an Associated Press and WBCA Coach of the Year finalist. Her 12-year career record now stands at 229-127 (.643 percent).

Winning and attending the NCAA tournament is the rule rather than the exception for Albright-Dieterle, who left Northern Illinois in 1994 with a decade of accomplishments to her credit. The all-time winningest basketball coach at NIU, she held a 188-110 (.631) mark, and was 140-48 (.744) her last six years, which included five 20-win seasons and four NCAA tournament appearances.

Her last two teams at NIU finished with 24-6 records, and were Mid-Continent regular-season or tournament champions. Both teams attended the NCAA tournament before losing in first-round action. She was honored in 1994 by the Illinois Basketball Coaches Association with her third "Coach of the Year" title in the previous four years.



A four-time conference coach of the year in the Big Ten and both the North Star and Mid-Continent Conferences, Albright-Dieterle began her coaching career in 1981 under one of the game's best in Pat Head Summitt at Tennessee. While a graduate assistant under Summitt, the Volunteers were NCAA Final Four participants in 1982, and NCAA quarter-finalists in 1983.

In 1983, she joined the University of Cincinnati coaching staff as an assistant coach

and recruiting coordinator. A year later she assumed the head coaching position at Northern Illinois where she established a program of national recognition.

Albright-Dieterle has coached four players who have earned six Kodak District IV all-America honors, two Olympic Festival athletes, and two USA team participants in Wisconsin's Barb Franke and NIU player E.C. Hill, a Basketball Writers' Association all-American. She earned Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) District IV "Coach of the Year" honors in 1996, 1995 and 1990.

Active in USA Basketball, she was the head coach of the 1996 USA R. Williams Jones Cup team which won the gold medal in Taipei, Taiwan, with a perfect 9-0 mark. In 1993, she was the assistant coach for Team USA which earned a bronze medal at the World University Games with a 6-2 record.



Coach A's popularity and BadgerBall have become the rage in Wisconsin with record attendance at games and at summer camps. Nearly 1,400 young athletes attended the BadgerBall Summer Hoops camp in 1996.

Jane Albright-Dieterle has brought home the gold as a USA Basketball head coach. Her 1996 R. William Jones Cup team won the gold medal in Taiwan with a 9-0 record. And, as the head coach of the South team at the 1991 U.S. Olympic Festival, her team also brought home the gold.

Albright-Dieterle helped direct the 1992 USA Junior National team to a 4-1 record and silver medal performance in the Pan American Confederation World Championship in Mexico, and qualifying the United States women for the 1993 Junior World Championship. A year earlier, she was the head coach of the gold medal winning 1991 U.S. Olympic Festival South squad.

The Graham, N.C., native graduated cum laude in health and physical education from Appalachian State University in 1977, where she was a letterwinner in both basketball and volleyball. She taught high school for four years in Spartanburg, S.C., prior to deciding to pursue her coaching career at Tennessee. Albright-Dieterle earned a master of science degree in physical education with emphasis in sports psychology from Tennessee in 1983.



Sue Semrau

Sue Semrau begins her third year at Wisconsin and her sixth year as the first assistant coach and recruiting coordinator working with Badger Head Coach, Jane Albright-Dieterle. Semrau joined Albright-Dieterle at Northern Illinois in 1991, and contributed to NIU's three straight NCAA tournament appearances. She has continued that success at Wisconsin with the 1995 Wisconsin recruiting class ranking eighth in the country by the Blue Star Index. She has also been a major contributor in the Badgers' two straight NCAA appearances, first-ever, back-to-back 20-win seasons, and best record in program history at 21-8 in 1995-96.

Prior to her appointment at NIU, she was the head basketball coach at Occidental College in Los Angeles for four years. She compiled a 51-47 record at the Division III institution while concurrently serving as the assistant athletic director.

At Occidental, Semrau also coached two seasons of soccer while assuming her regular administrative responsibilities for recruiting, scheduling, fundraising and promotions. She served on the NCAA regional selection com-

mittee and chaired the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference for women's basketball.

Before coaching at Occidental, Semrau worked as the public relations and promotions director for the L.A. Heat professional soccer team from 1986-87, and served as the public relations director for the Seattle Storm soccer team the previous year. She was the assistant basketball coach at Santa Monica High School in 1986-87.

As a player, Semrau graduated from Shorecrest High School in Seattle, Wash., while earning all-conference honors as a guard her senior year. She attended the University of Puget Sound two years, earning Freshman of the Year honors. In 1984, Semrau transferred to the University of California-San Diego where she ranks 13th in all-time scoring, and fourth in all-time assists in just two years. She graduated with a bachelor's degree in communications from the University of California-San Diego in 1985, and earned her master's degree in athletic administration from the University of Southern California in 1988.

"My staff is tremendous. They inspire me daily to become the best coach I can be. They hold me accountable, and help to create the positive atmosphere in our program. Together we share the same vision of excellence for our student-athletes, and are committed to helping them reach their individual potential as students, people and athletes."

Jane Albright-Dieterle

Sue Semrau and Jane Albright-Dieterle had an audience with the legendary John Wooden last year at Wooden's home in Encino, Calif. Wooden accumulated a 620-147 record and 10 national championships while coaching at UCLA for 27 years (career record was 885-203). The trio discussed all aspects of basketball from defensive philosophies to dealing with pressure to uniform styles. Of the session Coach A said, "The wisdom he gave us was like the first time he ever talked to anybody, but he must have been asked those things thousand of times."


Dawn Bryant Crim

Dawn Bryant Crim returns to coaching in her first year at Wisconsin, but has Big Ten Conference ties as the former graduate assistant coach at Penn State University from 1992-94. She also served as the recruiting coordinator at the University of Kentucky from 1994-95, before returning to Penn State as an athletic development assistant working with special fund raising activities and major capital development projects such as funding the Bryce Jordan Center.

A Philadelphia native and 1985 class valedictorian at Martin Luther King High School, Crim played her collegiate basketball at the University of Virginia graduating in rhetoric and communication studies in 1989. Her degree also included special emphasis course work in public speaking and marketing. While a four-year letterwinner at Virginia, she consistently won the team's leadership and rebounding awards, and served as the team captain her last two years.

She continued her basketball career playing professionally from 1989-90 in Germany where her team won the German Cup Championship. While living in Munich, Crim studied and spoke German, and coordinated promotional campaigns with Mercedes and Puma to increase sponsorship, revenues and attendance. Upon her return to the States, she served as the territory sales manager for Coca-Cola USA in Newport News, VA, and as a sports marketing intern for the Philadelphia Phillies.

Crim earned her Master of Education degree in student personnel services from Penn State University in 1994, where her emphasis was multicultural programming and student development. Her association with the Penn State development office began in 1995 where she helped with the funding of 'Rene's List', a \$100,000 project named for PSU women's basketball coach Rene Portland and designed to provide media support for women's athletics. Crim also served as the radio color analyst for Lady Lion basketball one year.




Angelia Y. Johnson

Angelia Y. (Angie) Johnson continues in her third year as an assistant coach with the University of Wisconsin women's basketball program. Johnson works closely with the Hoop Troop BadgerBall Booster group, the Jane's Gems kids club, and she served as the BadgerBall Girls Hoops Camp Co-Director this past summer. In addition she is the academic liaison, oversees pre-season conditioning, and coordinates the athletes' training table.

Prior to coming to Wisconsin in 1992, she was the assistant basketball coach at the Paul G. Blazer High School in her hometown of Ashland, Ky., from 1991-94. She was also the head coach for the George M. Verity Mid-

dle School one year where her seventh and eighth grade teams combined for a 35-5 record, and coached the Crabbe Elementary school grade school girls.

Johnson was a scholarship player at the University of Louisville from 1987-91. A 5-11 center, she still ranks among the top 10 in career records at Louisville in rebounds and games played with 621 caroms in 120 games played. She led her team as a junior in rebounding with 7.1 per game, and in free throw accuracy hitting .750 percent. A biology major, she was honored as the Ed Kallay Senior Award winner in 1991, and was a Woodford R. Porter Scholar, 1987-91.



Melissa A. Bruner, Administrative Assistant

Melissa A. Bruner begins her second year at Wisconsin as an administrative assistant to the Badger basketball program.

The Ohio native received her business administration and accounting degree at Coe College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and earned her master's degree in physical education with a concentration in athletic administration from Ohio University in June of 1995. While pursuing her studies at Coe, Bruner was a multi-sport letterwinner and earned high distinction for her academic pursuits as a member of Mortar Board and Phi Kappa Phi honor society.

She lettered in softball four years, and basketball, tennis, and volleyball two years. She earned academic all-conference in each sport,

earning recognition for her athletic and academic achievements, and was a national GTE Academic all-American her senior year. She also served as a residence hall supervisor and was active in several student activities committees.

Bruner served as a graduate assistant and teaching associate at Ohio University providing the athletic director with various student academic services and assisting in compliance issues.

In her position at Wisconsin, Bruner assists Jane Albright-Dieterle in public relations scheduling, team travel arrangements, budget preparation, serves as camp co-director, schedules practice facilities, and assists with all administrative matters regarding Wisconsin Women's Basketball.

BadgerBall burst on the scene in 1994, setting attendance records and bringing Wisconsin into national limelight with back-to-back 20-win seasons and two NCAA appearances.

In 1995-96, under the direction of second-year head coach Jane-Albright-Dieterle, Wisconsin posted a program-best 21-8 record including its second-straight NCAA tournament win, before losing in the sub-regional finals to Vanderbilt. It was just the third NCAA tourney bid in school history.

"I definitely think the guards set the tempo. They dictate whether or not you are going to have an inside game. Both Keisha and Katie have proven to be extremely unselfish by passing the ball and by getting it inside. I think it's a great one-two punch to have two such experienced guards in the backcourt, especially the year after you lose your all-time leading scorer."

In conference action, Wisconsin was third in the conference for the second straight year with a school-best 12-4 record. It was just the fourth time a UW women's basketball team finished third or better in the conference since 1974. The Badgers led the Big Ten in attendance and ranked fourth in the nation with 7,884 per game.

With the return of four starters, Wisconsin looks to continue its rise nationally and in the Big Ten. The Badgers achieved a program-high ranking of eighth in the Associated Press poll last year, and finished the year ranked 18th in the AP, and 20th in the USA Today polls.

Despite the graduation of three seniors including forward Barb Franke, Wisconsin's all-time leading scorer with 1,994 points, the Badgers would like to take advantage of the winning momentum demonstrated the past two years by consecutive program-best records of 20-9 and 21-8.

■ Four Starters Return

Among the four starters returning are speedy point guard Keisha Anderson, a two-time, second-team all-Big Ten selection. The 5-7 Anderson averaged 12.7 points while also setting the season conference and UW steals records last year with 124 (4.3 per game). She also set the UW assists record with 195 (5.3 per game), and is expected to top the UW career charts in each category by the completion of her senior season. Her name is whispered in pre-season all-America lists with good reason as she is often acclaimed to be the best point guard in the Big Ten this season.

Her backcourt peer is 6-1 senior Katie Voigt, Wisconsin's top returning scorer. UW's premier three-point shooter, Voigt averaged a career-best 14.4 points per game. As the Badgers' all-time leader in free throws, Voigt missed just eight last year shooting .887 percent (63-71). Named all-Big Ten honorable mention in 1996, Voigt has the height and ability to see the floor and appears destined to have her best year at Wisconsin this season.

Junior 6-2 power forward Ann Klapperich also had a stellar 1995-96 season averaging 13 points and a 5.5 rebounds. A two-year starter and the top returning rebounder, she is aggressive on the boards, but also possesses a gentle shooting touch. She tied Barb Franke for best field goal percentage as a sophomore hitting .528 percent including the first three-point goals of her career (4-8). She ranks fourth in career free throw shooting with 161-214 for .752 percent.

Sophomore 6-0 swing player Tanisha Boston made her starting debut last season averaging 5.0 points and 3.7 rebounds. After a year in the system, Boston is expected to be a major contributor on defense and offense where her speed and agility will be highly valued.

■ Top Returnees

Senior Karie Cattanach started 25 of 29 games last season averaging 3.6 points. The 5-10 swing player is Wisconsin's second three-point threat after Voigt, ranking third in career shooting with 69 of 192 field goals for .351 percent.

Junior forwards Jennah (Burkholder) Hartwig and Jenny Rhodes both averaged 11 minutes per game last season. Hartwig returned after a year off to average 2.9 points and 2.1 rebounds in 29 games. While learning a new position facing the basket, Hartwig showed a defensive prowess that doesn't show up in the stats. One of the best athletes on the team, Hartwig runs the floor

extremely well and has a nose for rebounding. Rhodes averaged 2.0 points and 2.4 rebounds in 27 games.

Wisconsin sophomore Amy Wiersma spent the year in tutelage behind Franke, and became educated in the college system. Returning from anterior cruciate surgery on her knee in 1995, Wiersma played sparingly in all 29 games, averaging 3.1 points and 2.7 rebounds. Wisconsin's only true center, the 6-5 sophomore is a projected starter after a year of improving her strength and conditioning while finding out what college ball is all about.

■ Newcomers Bolster Roster

Wisconsin welcomes three quality players in freshmen guards Dee Dee Pate of Milwaukee (WI) Washington and Kelley Paulus of LaCrosse (WI) Central, and center Missy Konieczny of Portage (WI), all of whom are projected to see plenty of playing time.

Pate is a 5-5 point guard very much in the mold of Keisha Anderson. A two-time all-state first-teamer, she averaged 10 points, 6 assists and 5 steals per game as a senior. Pate was ranked No. 64 in the nation and No. 1 in the state by the *Blue Star Index*. She's also a two-time honorable mention all-America by *Street and Smith*. Other recruiting services listed her as the third or fourth best point guard in the nation. In 1996, she led her team to an unprecedented third-straight WIAA Division I state title and a 25-2 record (75-5 past three years).

Paulus, a 5-11 shooting guard, is a two-time honorable mention *Street and Smith* all-American. As a senior she averaged 26.7 points, 9.2 rebounds, 4.5 steals and 3.6 assists per game while shooting 52 percent from the floor and 71 percent from the line. A two-time, first-team all-state selection in both basketball and softball and 1996 Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association Player of the Year, Paulus led LaCrosse Central to a record of 61-5 before losing in the state regionals as a senior. Her team was runner-up in the state tournament two years (1994, 1995) to Milwaukee Washington.

Konieczny, a 6-2 post player, was considered the top center in the state. She averaged 19.2 points, 12.4 rebounds and nearly four blocks per game while shooting 68 percent from the floor. Konieczny finished her career with 1,726 points and 1,078 rebounds. She earned second team AP all-state honors and was an honorable mention player on the *Milwaukee Journal-Sentinel's* all-state team. She led her team to a 22-3 record before bowing out in the 1996 WIAA Division 2 semi-finals.



Wisconsin earned its second, consecutive bid to the 1996 NCAA Championship and had record-setting crowds while having its best record in school history at 21-8.

After two consecutive NCAA bids and two third-place conference finishes, what do you see your team accomplishing in year three?

COACH A: We want to build on the foundation that we've laid the last couple of years. There are definitely areas we can improve and hopefully the end result will be a better team than we have been in the past.

What's the difference between this ball club and last year's team?

COACH A: Hopefully, we will be more consistent and not have as many highs and lows. Realistically, we think we can compete outside the Big Ten with the Tennessee's and Georgia's. We are a little tougher mentally by playing those teams. We've had more experiences, good and bad, that have made us tougher. Experience gives you a lot more wisdom. The past mistakes we've made as a unit hopefully won't happen now or at least as often.

We've seen the big picture clearer for two years. The first year we were just happy to compete. Last year, the success came fast. We did not do a good job of handling being the No. 8 team in the country (AP Feb. 5). Now we need to consider our expectations and say it's okay to have high expectations, and not be distracted by all the hoopla of getting national attention. We've had sellouts. When we have another one, it will be another day at the office, and that's how it needs to be.

Backcourt experience is critical ... How key is the play of Keisha Anderson and Katie Voigt?

COACH A: Katie and Keisha bring a lot of competence to the team. They have had three very successful seasons, but in different ways. They know it's their last shot at getting what they exactly want individually, and as a team. They are both Wisconsin kids. They've been excited and inspired by what's happened the last couple of years in their home state, but they want to take it to another level. I think they will pay the price to do that.

We definitely have experience going for us with Keisha and Katie in the backcourt. One thing we shouldn't have to worry about is handling the ball and teams pressing us. It should open up some good opportunity to let some of the younger people play and get some experience. So the following year, when we do graduate those two great play-

ers, we still will return some experience there.

I definitely think that guards dictate tempo. They dictate whether or not you are going to have an inside game. Both of them have proven to be extremely unselfish by passing the ball and getting it inside. Keisha is often doing all the little defensive things that she doesn't get a lot of credit for. It's a great one-two punch to have two such experienced guards in the backcourt, especially the year after you lose your all-time leading scorer.

What are going to be the keys to success this season in regard to the other starters. How key is the development of Tanisha Boston and Amy Wiersma?

COACH A: I think the timing is right for Ann Klapperich to go to another level of who she wants to be on the court, in practice, and off the court. She has established herself as a favorite and someone who is maybe the most intense player to play the game that people have seen on this team. Last year she was able to capitalize when people were double or triple teaming Barb. She'll be the person inside now that people will try to stop. She wants that challenge and welcomes it. I have a lot of confidence that she will be able to take her game to another level.

The freshmen got a taste of the Big Ten and the toughness of it, physically and mentally. They now know what you have to do to compete at that level. I think they are working extremely hard this summer to become stronger physically and more skilled physically. I think their biggest shock was the physical strength and conditioning you had to have to compete at a high level in the Big Ten. You can't make that up in just a couple of months. You need a longer period of time. I've seen them grow over the course of their freshman year, particularly in the spring and this summer. I'm very optimistic that they're putting what they've learned to use.

All-time leading scorer, Barb Franke, was a big part of this program for many years. What is the post-Franke era going to be like?

COACH A: One of the good things about someone like Barb is that she was a great picture as to what we want our athletes to be like. She was a great example and role-model for them. There were a lot of situations where they saw how Barb reacted in them. That she was positive to the media, to the public, on the practice floor, and on the game floor. The team could see her work ethic and those type of things. A picture like that, it's like the old cliche, a picture is worth a thousand words, and now they will get to

try to paint their own picture based on what they have in their mind.

Do you see BadgerBall changing or evolving in the post-Barb Franke era and with the new personnel?

I always want to see it get better. I think we have to keep putting a better product on the floor—sharpen it up. We want it to get better. We will have some new looks offensively. I am ready to branch out and try some different things. We have a very big team which gives us some versatility that we've never

had. I need to be challenged to be able to come up with something that will fit that more. Rebounding was a problem last year. We need to emphasize that from the very start. It was a thorn in our side last year. Hopefully, we will have some people step up and think that is important and do it, not just talk about it.

Along with more depth this season, what are the other team strengths?

COACH A: We will definitely be stronger and quicker. They've been on our weight program even longer now. We will be able to push them more in conditioning this fall. Their weight has really tapered off and gotten to where we really want them. Physical conditioning is something that they've all bought into. The other thing is they've learned how to be intense and have fun, and that you can do both at the same time. You just don't have to be all fun or be so ultra serious. You can do both at the same time. We want them to do both. We don't just want to compete.


You have some talented newcomers. Do you see the recruits contributing right away?

COACH A: We are very optimistic about all three of them. At the same time, I was very humbled last year in my anticipation of how long it took the freshmen to really catch on to what Big Ten play was. So, I don't know that I realistically can say how quickly they will help us at the level we want to play.

Kelly Paulus is extremely talented. She has a pull-up jump shot. That's some-

thing that all of the teams that beat us had—someone who could just pull-up and hit a jumper with somebody guarding them. She is from a great high school program. She's had a lot of positive experiences in athletics, not just basketball. She is a great softball and volleyball player, and has been successful in all the different areas of her life. She brings to us an attitude of high expectations, and we really appreciate that.

Dee Dee is the same thing. Three state championships in a row—the high expectations that she will have of herself. She has a great attitude about backing Keisha up, and I think you may sometimes see them on the court at the same time. She will add a lot of things to us, and we're excited about that.

Missy Konieczny is a big body who's very, very strong. Her height and strength are going to be a real huge asset to us this year.

Talk about the addition of Georgia and Tennessee to the schedule, and that Wisconsin is playing for the first time in the Big Ten-SEC Challenge. What does that say about the program?

COACH A: It just says that we want to compete with the best programs in the country. We are not scared to go out and try to do that. That's really what I want them to have—the opportunity to compete against the top programs in the country; compete against

two teams that were in the NCAA Final Four national championship game. We already know about the great teams in the Big Ten that will give us tests. It is our responsibility to bring the best basketball in the country to Madison—to acknowledge that there is life outside of our conference. It was very obvious to me by the way our town reacted to Tennessee coming here that they were disappointed that we couldn't beat them, but they were more encouraged that we tried.

Talk about Wisconsin's experience at the conference tournament.

COACH A: It hasn't been good. It has been very frustrating, but it's been necessary for our growth. Both times we were able to regroup, and come back and have two great rounds in the NCAA tournament. It has been very disappointing in different ways. Not nearly as disappointing last year, because I don't think we exactly fell on our face. But, something we need to prove we can do for ourselves, more so than for anybody else—to prove to ourselves we can compete in the conference tournament. We have competed against those teams all year. There is not a team in the Big Ten that we have not beaten in the last two years. That was something that was important to establish—to erase past memories of a lack of success against some programs.

Is Wisconsin a Sweet-16 team?

COACH A: We have to see how fast leadership roles are filled. We have to be better at scoring at some positions. We have to play 5-on-5 not 5-on-3 or 5-on-4. If things go well for us, it certainly could be the best team we have ever put on the floor. But they are going to have to answer some question marks, and understand that people will have questions about them. When the going was tough, we went to Barb Franke last year. Now, when the going is tough, who is going to step up? I think it will be a combination of people, and I am very confident that someone will do that.

How do you feel about your career at Wisconsin thus far?

COACH A: Wisconsin has proven to be a very magical state for women's basketball. You go back to the attendance rankings. The three schools that are above us have a very long and rich history of women's basketball, 10 or 15 years of success. What we don't want to be is the bright fire that goes out quickly. We want to establish ourselves as the bright fire that gets brighter and brighter. We want to keep a check on ourselves—know that we still have to outwork everybody—keep things in perspective, but I really think Wisconsin is kind of like the Land of Oz in its own little way in what we've been able to do.

Wisconsin began the season with an 18-2 record and achieved a school record high of eighth in the national AP poll. The Badgers were ranked in the pre-season at 22nd, and were ranked nationally all season for the first time.

Despite losing five of its last seven games to close the regular season, two to top-10 opponents Iowa and Tennessee, the Badgers had good fortune as part of the most successful campaign in school history.

The Badgers won two games by one point, beat Purdue in double-overtime, and beat then-No. 10 Penn State for the first time ever by 18 points. Wisconsin proved to be an efficient scoring machine in rolling over opponents by an average margin of 12 points. The loss to then-No. 6 Tennessee on Feb. 8 stopped a school record 10-game winning streak.

Of Wisconsin's eight losses, three were on the road to unranked teams—Indiana, Michigan State, and to Ohio State at the Big Ten tourney. The remaining five losses were to top-10 teams No. 9 Texas Tech, 69-77, No. 4 and eventual 1996 national champion Tennessee, twice to No. 7 Iowa, 48-68 and 63-67, and to 12th-ranked Vandy in the NCAA tourney. Wisconsin was 3-5 against nationally-ranked teams, and 7-7 against 1996 NCAA qualifiers.


In Big Ten tournament play, the third-seeded Badgers lost to Ohio State, 72-58 in the quarterfinals, the second straight year Wisconsin bowed out of the tournament early.

Senior center Barb Franke earned all-Big Ten first-team honors by a vote of the media and coaches' panels. She was just the third Badger to earn first-team honors. Franke was a second-team pick the last two years, and was Big Ten Freshman of the Year in 1992. Teammate Keisha Anderson was named second-team all-Big Ten for the second-straight year, and Katie Voigt earned honorable mention honors by the media panel.

Jane Albright-Dieterle was voted WBCA District IV Coach of the Year by her peers for the second-straight year.

Wisconsin's had its best season in school history at 21-8, gained its second consecutive 20-win season, and finished third in the conference for the second-straight year with a 12-4 record.

The Badgers received an at-large bid and were the No. 6 seed in the Mideast Regional for their second-straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament. Wisconsin beat the Pac-10 third-place team, Oregon, 74-60, before losing, 82-96, in the second round to the subregional host and 12th-ranked Vanderbilt, the No. 3 seed in the Mideast.






Theresa Huff, who played at Wisconsin from 1979-83, is the only woman player to have her jersey retired. Although only 5-11, the lithe center/forward became the school's all-time leading scorer and rebounder completing her career with 1,879 points and 1,201 rebounds.

Robin Threatt broke her 11 year-old scoring record with 1,901 points in 1993, and Barb Franke surpassed both Huff and Threatt completing her career with 1,994 points in 1996. But very few individuals will ever reach Huff's rebounding mark. Michele Kozelka ranks second in career rebounding with 916.

A Milwaukee native, Huff's career spanned the transition period from the AIAW to the NCAA governance. She led Wisconsin to its first post-season appearance reaching the quarterfinals of the AIAW National Championship, and she was a member of the first official Big Ten Conference team in 1981-82.

She ranks first in career field goals made and attempted, and is tied with her sister Janet, and Faith Johnson for most career games played with 118.

Huff distinguished herself as Wisconsin's first professional woman basketball player and was also the first American chosen to play in Spain in 1983-84.

The University of Wisconsin benefits from the interest and media exposure associated with the Big Ten Conference, one of the premier athletic conferences in the nation. Big Ten women's athletics programs take pride in leading the nation in basketball and volleyball attendance and in receiving more network and cable television exposure than any conference in the nation.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete. The conference celebrated its centennial anniversary during the 1995-96 season.

The women's athletic programs became affiliated with the Conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held since 1972. Penn State became the 11th university to join the conference in 1991.

As a Big Ten school, Wisconsin women athletes compete in conference championships in basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.



The Big Ten Conference began its conference tournament that decides the automatic qualifier for the NCAA Championship in 1995. Penn State was the winner of the initial tournament in a 68-63 decision over Ohio State, and successfully defended its title last year with a 71-69 thriller over Purdue.

The league title is based on the final regular season conference standings. All teams play a total of 16 games. Schools play six teams twice, and four teams once.

The 1997 Big Ten Conference tournament will be held on Friday-Monday, Feb. 28-March 3, at Hinkle Field House on the Butler University campus in Indianapolis, Ind. The tournament is a four-day single elimination playoff with all 11 teams participating. The top five seeds (as determined by conference standings) receive a first-round bye. The other six teams play each other in the first round, with the winners participating in the quarterfinals on Saturday. The semifinals are on Sunday, and the championship final is broadcast nationally on Monday night.

The conference champion has earned an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament since 1981. Nine different Big Ten schools have represented the conference in the past three NCAA Championships with Ohio State and Iowa advancing to the Final Four in 1993, and Purdue qualifying for the NCAA semifinals in 1994. A record six teams received bids for the NCAA tournament in 1996.

In addition to its athletic success, the Big Ten Conference has led the nation in basketball attendance for four consecutive years. Five schools finished in the top 12 in attendance, and overall the league averaged a national record 3,639 spectators per game. Wisconsin led the Big Ten and ranked fourth nationally with 7,884 spectators per game.

Wisconsin's new "BASKETBALL FIRST" multipurpose athletic center will be state-of-the-art and will have a capacity of up to 16,500 seats. With the facility, the University will be able to host many NCAA events, including the 1998 Div. I Women's Volleyball Championship. The center, located in the 600 block of West Dayton, will house offices, dressing and athlete lounge areas, an auxiliary practice facility, and is scheduled to open in Jan. of 1998.

The Kohl Center will be a happy home for the record-setting UW Women's Basketball team. BadgerBall burst on the scene in 1994, setting attendance records and bringing Wisconsin into national limelight with back-to-back 20-win seasons and two NCAA appearances. Under the direction of head coach Jane-Albright-Dieterle, Wisconsin posted a program-best 21-8 record in 1996, including its second-straight NCAA tournament win.

In conference action, the Badgers led the Big Ten in attendance in 1996, and ranked fourth in the nation with 7,884 per game. Wisconsin placed third in the conference with a 12-4 record last season, and is projected to be among those vying for the conference championship in 1997. At the current pace of success established by the women hoopsters, The Kohl Center could very well be the home of the first Wisconsin women's basketball championship team.

SITE OF THE NCAA WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL CHAMPIONSHIP IN 1998: In addition to basketball, Wisconsin has established itself as the attendance record-holder for the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship, which will return to Madison and the Kohl Center in 1998. The 1993 NCAA Volleyball Championship held in the UW Field House attracted the greatest number of spectators to the tournament final with 11,155. Combined with the 9,930 at the semifinals, the Wisconsin venue set the NCAA record with 21,085 fans.

The 1998 NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship returns December 17 and 19. It will be the first major NCAA event held in the new Kohl Center and with the increase in spectator seating and viewing and fan com-

fort, Wisconsin's all-time attendance record is expected to be reset in a grand manner.

SPACIOUS LOCKER ROOMS: The Kohl Center will be the new site for the UW men's and women's basketball and eventually hockey locker rooms. Four other locker rooms (for visitors or multiple teams during WIAA tournaments) also will be in the arena.

The 2,200 square-foot, state-of-the-art locker areas are being designed with the needs of student-athletes in mind including consideration for team organizational meetings, an athletes' social area, and study car-

rels. The athletes will have a lounge area with sound system, video room, computers available in the study room, and, of course, a spacious dressing and shower area complete with multiple outlets and lighted mirrors.

PROJECTED OPENING: January of 1998 for men's and women's basketball.

■ Construction Facts & Figures

PRIME BENEFACATORS: The building will be named for U.S. Sen. Herb Kohl (D-Wisconsin), a 1956 graduate of the UW-Madison, who donated \$25 million to the project. Kohl's gift is the single largest private donation in University history. Kohl earned his Bachelor of Science degree in American Institutions from Wisconsin-Madison.

Former all-Big Ten basketball player Albert "Ab" Nicholas and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas, pledged \$10 million toward the project. For their generosity the facility's practice gymnasium will be named the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion and Plaza. Nicholas received his B.S. and M.B.A. degrees from the UW-Madison.

Another financial boost to the project came in the form of a \$2.5 million gift from the Kellner family -- Jack F. and his sons, Ted and Jack W. -- of Milwaukee. All three Kellners received degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

EVENTS TO BE STAGED: Wisconsin men's and women's basketball, UW-Madison commencements, WIAA state high school tournaments (boys' and girls' basketball and

wrestling), musical concerts, summer sports camps and clinics, and special events. The building is being designed to accommodate Wisconsin hockey at a future date. The year for the hockey team's move to the Kohl Center has not yet been determined.

CAPACITY: The Kohl Center will seat 16,500 for basketball. That figure includes 7,500 seats in the lower seating bowl and 4,500 in each of the two balconies. The unique design of the Kohl Center (with two overhanging balconies) guarantees that all fans will be close to the playing floor with excellent site lines. The facility is expected to seat approximately 11,000 for hockey, and 15,000 for concerts.

BUILDING SIZE AND DIMENSIONS: The Kohl Center will encompass 450,000 gross square feet rising 90 feet above the ground; the building includes two full-service concourses, the main concourse ceiling soars to 23 feet; 40,000-cubic yards of cast-in-place concrete—enough to build a sidewalk stretching from Madison to Chicago—and more than 1,200 tons of structural roof steel that enclose the main arena; from the maple arena floor to the rafters is 90 feet and the 40,000-square feet of glass in the Kohl Center is enough for 166 homes.

COST OF CONSTRUCTION:

\$72 million with \$45 million coming from private gifts and \$27 million in state program revenue bonds, which will be repaid with proceeds from operation of Kohl Center by the Athletic Department. There will be no taxpayer or university funding involved in the construction or operation of the Kohl Center.

LOADING DOCK: The Kohl Center will offer a 30,000-square foot loading dock. There is enough space to house four semi-trucks for large events in the building. The facility is designed to allow a semi-truck to drive onto the floor for unloading.

ARCHITECTURAL DESIGNERS: H.O.K. of Kansas City and Venture Architects of Milwaukee. H.O.K. worked on Camden Yards (Baltimore), Coors Field (Denver), United Center (Chicago) and Anaheim Arena (Anaheim). Venture Architects was involved with the Bradley Center (Milwaukee).

Amenities & Services

LUXURY SUITES: There will be 36 suites (28 in the lower concourse and eight in the upper concourse) in the Kohl Center. Each suite holds 12 individuals.

RECEPTION ROOMS: Located on the first concourse inside the front door will be a

reception room capable of hosting pre-game, in-game and post-game gatherings. The room has a capacity of 200 people and can be divided into three smaller rooms. Full food and beverage service is available. These reception rooms may be rented by an organization or the public on a per-game basis. Fans will have a full-view of the court from these rooms.

RETAIL STORE: A full-service retail store will be on-site at the Kohl Center. It will be open during normal business hours plus offer extended hours on game days. Several portable retail vending locations will be located throughout the arena.

AUXILIARY GYM: The Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion will house three full-size basketball courts to be used for practice sessions when the Kohl Center is booked for other events. Pre-game booster club functions will be scheduled in the gym.

SUPPORT STAFF AREAS: Many of the Athletic Department's support staffs will have auxiliary areas in the Kohl Center. They include sports medicine, equipment & laundry, and strength and conditioning.

TICKET OFFICE: The Athletic Department Ticket Office will move its operation into the Kohl Center. The "Will-Call" window along with a ticket purchase window will be located in an indoor lobby. An additional seven ticket purchase windows on the exterior of the Kohl Center will handle walk-up sales.


FAN AMENITIES: A state-of-the-art sound system will be implemented in the Kohl Center and TV monitors (capable of showing replays) will be wired to the luxury suites and above concessions stands throughout the building. The Field House scoreboard will be moved into the Kohl Center.

HANDICAPPED SEATING: The Kohl Center will be fully accessible to disabled fans restricted to wheelchairs. Seating will exist for 150 handicapped fans along with their companions. The locations are divided between court level, and the first and second concourses. Disabled parking locations are convenient to the building. The facility will have fully accessible TDD phones, doorways, restrooms and concession stand counters for handicapped patrons. A public access elevator will be available for all fans to use. Services for the hearing impaired are available.

MEDIA ACCOMMODATIONS: A full-service media workroom/interview room will be behind the stands on the court level. Each working location will have a monitor to display current stats/TV replays along with phone and computer line capabilities. A video room for TV workers and a computer room for photographers will also be located adjacent to the workroom.




The Badger team has its first foreign tour in 1995 playing a four-game schedule while traveling to Paris, France, Antwerp, Belgium and London, England.



the top 10 in the nation. Among those ranked include sociology, business, German, chemical engineering, geography, ecology, genetics, statistics, molecular biology and biochemistry, French, Spanish, political science, industrial engineering, computer science, chemistry, mathematics, and history.

UW-Madison faculty or alumni have been awarded 13 Nobel Prizes and 21 Pulitzer Prizes. There are 44 faculty members who are winners of Presidential Young Investigator awards, nine winners of the National Medal of Science, and four Searles scholars. Forty-six professors are members of the National Academy of Sciences, 14 are members of the National Academy of Engineering, three in the

National Academy of Education and 48 are fellows in the American Physical Society.

UW-Madison is one of the nation's first land-grant colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life sciences. The founders of the university developed the "Wisconsin Idea" as making "the beneficent influence of the university available to every home in the state."

UW-Madison is the largest institution in the University of Wisconsin System. It has the only public law and medical schools in the state as well as the only school of veterinary medicine.

A Scenic Campus

One of the most picturesque college campuses in the country, UW-Madison lies along the beautiful shores of Lake Mendota.

One mile from the capitol, traveling down historic State Street, the city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum have enhanced UW-Madison's reputation for scenic beauty. The city of Madison is frequently listed among the top five best places to live in the nation.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill, which features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, is one of the University's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall, the first building on campus; the Carillon Tower in front of the Social Science building; the Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain; and Picnic Point, a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus.

A favorite area for UW students to congregate is the Memorial Union and its lake-side terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and breezes from Lake Mendota.

The Student Body

More than 40,000 students populate the 900-acre UW campus, including more than 11,500 graduate and professional students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from approximately 119 foreign countries. UW-Madison ranks third in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students and faculty. In the fall of 1995, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted more than nine percent of the student body.

The Community

Located in southern Wisconsin, Madison is the home of the University of Wisconsin and the state capital.


With a diverse population of 200,814, Madison offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town. It is a family and, action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports, and recreational activities.

"A list of first-rate academic programs at Madison would be as complete as a college catalog elsewhere. There are 70 programs considered in the top 10 nationally.

"All in all, UW-Madison is a nonstop festival that students sum up as 'diverse, intellectual, fashionable, and moderately hedonistic,' ... the university remains, in the words of an administrator, 'one of life's great gold mines, for those willing to dig.'

Madison was named the best place to live in America for 1996 by *Money* magazine. The July 1995 issue of *Outside* magazine called Madison a "Dream Town". The magazine also rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country. *U.S. News and World Report* named it one of the country's 10 Hottest Cities. Madison was also featured on the front page of the Life section of *USA Today* on July 12, 1995.



WHERE WISCONSIN RANKS

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top 10 lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

The 1996 *Fiske Guide to Colleges*, the best-selling guide to colleges, gives the UW-Madison its highest academic ranking. In fact, UW-Madison is one of only eight public institutions in the country to receive the five-star rating. In 1995, *U.S. News & World Report* listed UW-Madison as tied for third for academic reputation among public universities and 17th among all universities.

One recent survey rated 49 undergraduate programs at the UW-Madison among the top 10 in the nation. Academic, financial, and other rankings are summarized below to offer a flavor of the quality at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.



Funding and Support

► **Federal Grants:** UW-Madison ranked ninth nationally in 1993, receiving 1.2 percent of the federal budget for university research support.

► **Research and Development Funds:** UW-Madison ranked third in the country for research and development expenditures in 1994, with \$372 million, according to the National Science Foundation.

► **Tuition:** Over the last 10 years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW-Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW-Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition, behind the University of Iowa, and the third-lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.

► **Private Support:** UW-Madison ranked fifth in the nation, and first among public institutions in 1995-96 by receiving nearly \$176 million in private support.

► **Alumni:** UW-Madison's independently financed alumni group is the No. 1 ranked group in the Midwest and the second largest in the U.S.

Degrees

► **Graduates:** Standard & Poor's 1994 survey lists the University of Wisconsin as one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in undergraduate degrees.

► **Doctoral Degrees:** UW-Madison is a national leader in number of doctoral degrees awards ranking third in 1995. Between the school's founding and 1993, the University of Wisconsin-Madison awarded 29,628 Ph.D.s.

Departmental Academic Rankings

► **Liberal Arts:** In its ranking of graduate programs in the liberal arts in 1995, *U.S. News & World Report* listed UW-Madison's sociology department as tops in the country. The magazine also ranked education fifth, social work seventh, psychology and political science ninth, and history and public administration tenth.


► **Education:** The School of Education is the nation's best according to a survey by the University of Illinois released in 1994. The UW's educational administration and elementary education rank second.

► **College of Agricultural and Life Sciences:** In 1993, the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences was ranked one of the top 10 agricultural schools in the country according to *Farm Futures* magazine.

► **Science Programs:** According to *U.S. News and World Report*'s annual graduate school ratings, published in March 1995, six UW-Madison science programs ranked in the top 10: computer science, eighth; biology, ninth; chemistry, 10th; and nursing, 10th.


► **Libraries:** The UW-Madison has the 13th largest university library collection in the United States, with more than 5.5 million books in 45 locations across campus.

► **Business:** The School of Business's undergraduate program ranks seventh in the nation according to *U.S. News & World Report* (1995). The MBA program ranks in the top five percent, the real estate program ranks third and the school's risk management insurance program ranks fourth.



■ UW-Madison Sets the Pace

- with the oldest Scandinavian studies (1875), psychology (1888), agricultural economics (1909), genetics (1910) and wildlife management (1939) departments in the United States
- in establishing the nation's first magnetic observatory (1876)
- in discovering Vitamins A (1913) and B (1916)
- with the oldest radio station in the nation—WHA—which began broadcasting in 1917
- as the Memorial Union became the first public university union to serve beer in 1933

- in finding that the anti-estrogen drug tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer from recurring in certain women who have had cancer previously
- as UW Hospital and Clinics develop the nation's first Mobile Critical Care Unit, which duplicates facilities of a hospital intensive care unit and laboratories

- as UW-Madison researchers describe the atomic structure of a common cold virus
- with the establishment of the Center for Dairy Research, the nation's first such center to be established at a university (1986)
- in organ preservation breakthroughs. In 1987, Dr. Folkert Belzer used a cold storage preservation solution to preserve dog livers up to 36 hours and dog pancreases up to 72 hours. Clinical use of this new solution decreases the need for emergency transplantation, increases the number of livers and pancreases available to people who need



- transplants, and improves organ sharing among transplant centers
- in improved world map projection developed by professor Arthur H. Robinson.
- with the development of the world's first genetically altered trees
- in Hector F. DeLuca, discoverer of a "super vitamin-D" compound, and continuing techniques for synthesizing the compound





■ David Ward


Chancellor David Ward is actively positioning the University of Wisconsin for continued excellence in the next century.

Ward insists that the university must be sensitive to societal changes relevant to higher education, and envisions the university as a stronger partner with public schools, businesses, industry, its alumni and friends.

"We have a tradition of excellence upon which to build and much to preserve, but I believe it is time for the university to start doing some things differently—not just doing the same things better," said Ward.

■ Pat Richter


Pat Richter, the guiding force behind University of Wisconsin Athletics, is no stranger to the sports or business worlds.

Richter has the essential experience as a student, athlete and administrator. He is committed to excellence in the classroom as well as on the playing field. Richter is committed to Wisconsin, and to providing UW student-athletes with an experience they will cherish the rest of their lives.



■ Al Fish

Al Fish begins his eighth year as the administrative officer for the division overseeing facility planning, event management, personnel, sports medicine, strength and conditioning, technical services, and equipment. He also serves as liaison to the Athletic Board, and to campus and state governments.

Fish is currently coordinating the planning for the Kohl Center, a multi-use sports facility scheduled to open in January 1998.

In 1989, Fish came to the division after three years as the Director of Policy and Budget for the Department of DHSS. He worked previously as a liaison for Governor Tony Earl to the State Assembly, a budget analyst for the State Budget Office and a program evaluator for the Legislative Audit Bureau.

A 1973 graduate of Luther College where he was a four-year letterwinner in golf, Fish is married to Susan Goodwin. They have three children: Cassie (16), Molly (10) and Nick (8).



■ Cheryl Marra

Cheryl Marra begins her seventh year as an associate athletic director at Wisconsin. Marra oversees the men's and women's programs of basketball, golf, soccer, tennis, swimming and diving, and women's volleyball. She also serves the primary women's athletic administrator to the Big Ten and the NCAA.



■ Nancy Seifert


A member of the Wisconsin Athletic Department staff since 1992, Nancy Seifert serves as the chief financial officer.

■ Vince Sweeney



As a member of the prestigious Big Ten Conference, Wisconsin offers its student-athletes the best in education, athletic opportunities, coaching and on-field competition at the NCAA Division I level.

With a number of sports begun more than 100 years ago, men's teams compete in basketball, cross country, football, golf, ice hockey, rowing, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis, track and field, and wrestling.

Established July 1, 1974, the 11-sport women's athletic program offers basketball, cross country, golf, lightweight rowing, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 20 NCAA Division I programs for the past three years. In 1995-96, Wisconsin finished 15th in the Sears/National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors Cup competition, which recognizes the best Division I college sports program in the nation.



The Wisconsin men's and women's track teams won the 1996 Big Ten Conference Outdoor track and field championships. It was only the fifth time in league history that men's and women's teams from the same university have won outdoor titles.



The Wisconsin men's soccer team won the 1995 NCAA title defeating Duke in the championship game.

Sixteen of Wisconsin's 20 sports qualified as teams or individuals for their respective national championships. The men's soccer team won the 1995 NCAA Championship while Badger athletes won five individual NCAA titles. Teams qualifying for post-season tournaments as teams or individuals were men's and women's basketball, men's and

Wisconsin finished second in the 1995-96 Big Ten Conference composite rankings. The Badgers crowned seven Big Ten champions with the men's and women's




Academic & Student Services

Academic excellence is emphasized at Wisconsin. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record behind many Badger athletes is the advising system available to the student-athletes.

Director **Alan Zussman** supervises a staff of six advisors which conduct the program offered to the nearly 700 UW student-athletes. The advising staff of **Mary Weaver, Craig Hudson, Christine Sayler, Doug Tiedt, Mary Moroder, Andrew Berns, and Jerry Darda** have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all University departments.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes may receive academic honors in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar athletes with Academic all-Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board names Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.


Academic Learning Center

Beginning in 1996-97, Wisconsin student-athletes will have the added advantage of a new academic learning center.

Located on the lower level of the McClain Athletic Center, the Academic Learning Center features a 50-person study hall, a large computer lab, 11 study rooms, two open study

areas and offices for the academic services and grant-in-aid staff.

The over 16,000 square feet center is scheduled to open by the beginning of the second semester of the 1996-97 academic year.



The new Student Academic Services center in the lower level of the McClain Athletic Facility is scheduled for completion in January of 1997. The project includes study and tutorial areas for student-athletes as well as a computer lab for 45 people.



Scholarships

UW-Madison is proud to offer to its prospective student-athletes one of the most comprehensive athletic scholarship programs in the nation. As a Division I member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), scholarships are awarded to athletes on a one-year renewable basis if scholastic and athletic commitment are maintained.

Scholarships are available in all varsity sports with the exception of rowing, which does not grant scholarships. Full scholarships include the cost of room and board in addition to tuition and fees. The selection of scholarship recipients is based on athletic ability and projected academic success at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.


Strength & Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete.

Weight training areas in the McClain Center and Camp Randall Stadium feature free weights and stereo music in spacious, carpeted rooms. Four full-time and two part-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes. Head strength and conditioning coach **John**

Dettmann along with assistant coaches **Chris Doyle, Steve Myrland, Stieg Theander, Scott Hettenbach** and **Christine Heinrich** work with the individual sport coaches to develop programs specific for that sport.

The UW also offers a sports nutrition program to assist athletes in meeting their nutritional demands and body composition goals.

Sports Medicine

The goal of the sports medicine staff is to provide all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is conducted by a staff of eight full-time and three graduate assistant N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. Under the direction of head athletic trainer **Dennis Helwig**, the sports medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members **Chuck Hart, Jan Helwig, Mike Johnson, Barb Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Heidi Stettler**, and **Andy Winterstein** utilize functional measures, provide dietary analysis, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

The sports medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with

the UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director **Dr. Ben Graf** is responsible for all services provided to our student-athletes.

Orthopedic care is directed by team physician **Dr. John Orwin** while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, **Dr. Greg Landry**.

In addition to the main headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in the Stadium, Coliseum, Natatorium, and UW Field House. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Sports Information

Directing the communications for the 20 sports in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics is the responsibility of the University of Wisconsin Men's and Women's Sports Information Offices.

These offices utilize a variety of communications systems to provide student-athletes the opportunity to be recognized for their athletic endeavors.

The offices provide and maintain many resources such as records, fact sheets, photographic files, statistics, media guides and event programs in meeting the information requests of the media, coaches, administrators, opponents and the general public.

The director's of women's and men's sports information, **Tamara J. Flarup** and **Steve Malchow**, and their respective offices, maintain close contact with local, regional and national media as well as the athlete's hometown media in providing information. These offices prepare news releases, design sports brochures and media guides, provide event coverage for all Wisconsin intercollegiate sports, and provide post-event results for print and electronic media. Besides the SI directors, members of the women's staff include associate director **Diane K. Nordstrom** and intern **Heidi Pearce**. The men's office includes associate director **Justin Doherty**, assistant director **Julie Kluge** and intern **Dan Meyer**, as well as a number of student assistants.



Athletes at the University of Wisconsin benefit from outstanding sports facilities. From practice and competitive areas to athletic and weight training, Wisconsin offers modern and well-equipped facilities for its athletes.

The Wisconsin Field House, which seats 11,500, is the practice and competitive facility for the Badger basketball and volleyball teams. The Field House features four locker rooms, an athletic training area and state-of-the art scoreboard, sound and lighting systems.

The Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center or Shell, located next to Camp Randall Stadium, is a multi-purpose facility. A newly resurfaced 200-meter Martin rubber track surrounds four basketball/volleyball courts that double as throwing and jumping areas for indoor track meets. With a seating capacity of 2,500, the Shell is the site of a numerous track meets.

One of the most versatile buildings is the McClain Athletic Facility. Over 76,000 square feet of artificial turf offers the ideal indoor practice facility for football, soccer and track. The lower level features the headquarters of the Badgers Sports Medicine staff and a fully equipped weight room. Locker rooms for football, and men's and women's track are also located on the lower level.

The Wisconsin tennis teams have the competitive advantage of playing year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States—the Nielsen Tennis Stadium. The stadium features 18 tennis courts (12

indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, one squash doubles court, and seats 1,500 spectators. The stadium is named for Arthur C. Nielsen, founder of the Nielsen television rating system. Nielsen captained the Wisconsin men's tennis team from 1916 to 1918 while a student in electrical engineering.

The Wisconsin track teams practice and compete at the Dan McClimon Memorial

Track, located at the west end of campus. Named for the former UW men's coach, the track features a newly resurfaced 400-meter Martin rubber track.

An Olympic size, natural grass soccer field inside the track is the competition home of the soccer teams. The track and soccer facility, which is fully lighted, was completed during the fall of 1993. Building permanent seating with locker rooms and a media facility is scheduled to begin in the near future.

The swimming and diving teams have the luxury of two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium and Southeast Recreational Facility. The "Nat" contains an eight-lane, 25-yard racing pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' separate diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The SERF facility features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.

Situated between five lakes, Madison is the perfect location for a rowing program. The Badger crews

are headquartered in the boat house, situated on Lake Mendota. The boat house provides the Badger crews with an indoor rowing tank during the winter season. During the warm months, crews can often be seen on any one of the Madison lakes.


With the opening of University Ridge in 1991, UW golfers now have the opportunity to compete on one of the finest facilities in the Midwest. The par 72, 18-hole course was designed by Robert Trent Jones Jr. The facility also features a 15,000 square foot practice green and 5,000 square foot chipping green.

The UW Softball Complex, located on the west end of campus, features an NCAA-regulation, natural grass field with a centerfield distance of 225 feet, and left and right field foul line distances of 200 feet.

The Southeast Recreational Facility (SERF) is one of two pools used by the swimming and diving teams

University Ridge, the University of Wisconsin-Madison golf course, opened in 1991. Located on a 585-acre tract, the undulating course includes deep woods, hills, a natural pond and prairie.



Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped handlers before a sideline hero recaptured the animal. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot be retired to the Madison zoo.

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was commissioned to mold a paper-mache badger head. Gymnast and cheerleader, Bill Sagal, of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A pep rally contest was held to determine the mascot's name. The rally committee opted for its own name: Buckingham U. Badger. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from "On, Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW to "buck right through that line."

On Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in

1951. The song was an instant hit at the Wisconsin campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Varsity

The traditional arm waving that comes at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He had originally gotten the idea from University of Pennsylvania students who waved their caps after a losing game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give the fans something to listen to on their way out of the stadium, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience participation.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've



said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karmen for Budweiser beer commercials. Copyrighted by Sandlee Publishing Corporation in 1970, the song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. We had, just by accident, this beer commercial in the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 come-from-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a touchdown. I played it again, and Wisconsin scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud.'"

Badger Nickname

The sports program's nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of animals in the region, but rather an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.
