



omen's collegiate basketball attendance has risen every year over the past 20 years and Wisconsin is one of the reasons. UW has ranked among the top-20 schools in attendance nationally since 1995.

The 1997-98 Badgers set cumulative and conference-only games attendance marks with a record average of 12,474 in eight Big Ten games. UW set its first five-figure average for all games with 10,455 fans per game also in 1998.

But numbers are one thing, experiencing a loud, vibrant crowd is another. Once inside the Kohl Center, you'll be happy to see how close the crowd is to the court. Emulating the tight feeling of the former playing facility, the UW Field House, the architects kept the seats close and the balconies cantilevered so the sound is reflected back onto the court.

Courtside seats are reserved for season ticket holders, those dedicated fans who are long-time Badger fans, The end zones are a popular place for families to get up-close-and-personal with the players and Bucky Badger.

Once the Badgers take the court and the band starts playing, the crowd enthusiasm builds. Introductions are made in a darkened arena with the spotlight focused on the Badgers at center court. When the lights come on, it's game time!

At halftime, many people don't even leave their seats. The game day promotions are exceptional, whether it's musical chairs, trike races, a gymnastics troop, the hilarious 'Battle of the Mascots' or the Red Panda, there's plenty of entertainment to keep everyone involved.

Once the UW team returns to the court, the crowd is ready for another win and the Badgers don't disappoint. After a win, the team throws "Victory Balls" to the fans and remains on the court as the team lines up for the singing of "Varsity," being joined by a celebratory crowd.






everal Badgers have went on to play basketball professionally Pafter leaving the University of Wisconsin, including four in the WNBA.


In 2008, Jolene Anderson was drafted in the first round of the WNBA draft by the Connecticut Sun. She played in 24 games, starting seven. Anderson, UW's all-time leading scorer, averaged 4.0 points and 2.4 rebounds per game for the Sun.

Other former Badgers in the WNBA include Keisha Anderson (1999-2002), Tamara Moore (2002-06) and Robin Threatt (1999-2000).

Anderson and Barb Franke played in the now defunct ABL while nine other former Badgers have played overseas. Recent UW alums include Jordan Wilson, who played in Spain from 2002-06, and Emily Ashbaugh, who played in Germany from 2000-04.

Wisconsin in the Postseason

Badgers have made 11 post-séason appearances

The Badger women have qualified for 11 national post-season tournaments in the 33-year history of the program.

In 1999, 2000, 2007 and 2008, the Badgers were invited to the Women's National Invitational Tournament (WNIT). UW won the WNIT in 2000 and was the runner-up in 2007 and 1999.


Wisconsin attended its sixth NCAA tournament in 2002. UW has a 2-6 overall record in NCAA tournament play.

Prime Time Players

Badgers attract national attention

he University of Wisconsin's reputation as the major athletic program in the state also attracts a lot of media attention. Madison is home to four television stations, 18 radio stations, two daily newspapers and two student newspapers. In addition, media from around the state, including the Milwaukee area, also cover the Badgers on a regular basis.

As part of the Big Ten Conference television package, the Badgers will make eight national appearances on the Big Ten Network. During recent seasons, Wisconsin has also appeared on ESPN, ESPN2 and CBS.

Wisconsin also enjoys tremendous radio and television coverage across the state. Wisconsin Public Television typically broadcasts Badger Women's Basketball on its statewide network while all of the UW's home and away games can be heard on Madison radio or online via Yahoo!Sports broadcasts.

In addition, Wisconsin offers one of the most comprehensive Web sites in college sports. All non-televised games are live video streamed and are archived on the site for later viewing. The site also offers live stats of all home games as well as video features, player profiles and a






The Badger Family



owhere else will you find a university that offers such a unique combination of academic, athletic and social opportunities than the University of Wisconsin.


Academically, Wisconsin ranks as one of the top learning institutions in the country. The university offers nine undergraduate schools with more than 130 majors and 4,300 courses. In 2008, Wisconsin was ranked as the seventh-best public university in the country, according to the annual rankings released by U.S. News & World Report. The UW has 70 academic programs that rank among the top 10 nationally, according to Fiske Guide to Colleges.

Athletically, the Badgers 23-sport program is one of the nation's best. Wisconsin consistently ranks among the top universities in the annual Directors Cup standings, which measures the overall national success of men's and women's sports.

The UW typically ranks among the nation's attendance leaders for football, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's hockey, and volleyball. All sports at Wisconsin are fully funded, including the full complement of scholarships allowed by the NCAA. Each program also has generous travel and equipment budgets, featuring Adidas clothing and shoes. In addition, the university offers a recreational sports program that features 35 club teams and 30 intramural sports.

Socially, Wisconsin has students from every county in Wisconsin, all 50 states and more than 100 countries. There are more than 760 student organizations and clubs, and more than 1,500 performing arts events each year.


The UW campus is also one of the most beautiful in the country, located along the shores of Lake Mendota. The city of Madison is regularly recognized as one of the best places to live in the country and in 2003 was named the "Best College Sports Town" by Sports Illustrated on Campus.







Great Competition

The Badgers Face Some of the Nation's Toughest Teams

Besides a grueling Big Ten Conference schedule that often includes some the top teams in the country, Wisconsin faces a number of highly ranked teams during the non-conference season and in tournament play. This year, Wisconsin has a strong non-conference schedule, facing WNIT champion Marquette as well as Big 12 power and 2005 NCAA Champion Baylor.

The Badgers have also had to play in hostile road environments. During its run to the 2006-07 WNIT championship, the team played in front of the Wyoming home crowd in Laramie. Wisconsin will also travel to Green Bay, Wis., this year to face the 2008 Horizon League champions on its home court.

In the past five years, Wisconsin has played a total of 27 games against ranked opponents. Many of those ranked teams come straight from the Big Ten, teams the Badgers sometimes meet twice a season.





Since its opening in 1998, the Kohl Center has become the winning home for the UW basketball and hockey programs. From the great competition areas for the teams to the comfortable spectator accommodations, the Kohl Center has become a venerable venue from which the Badgers have derived considerable competitive advantage.

Great Seats

The unique design of the Kohl Center, with two overhanging balconies, guarantees that all fans are close to the playing floor with excellent site lines. At center court, you can look up at three ascending, cheering spectator areas, an awesome and intimidating sight for opponents.

Scoreboard

The main Kohl Center scoreboard includes 9-by-14 video boards on all four sides. The video screens provide Wisconsin fans with their first opportunity to enjoy video replays.

Ring Beam

A ring beam, which runs the circumference of the arena at the first balcony level, was one of the first for a collegiate facility.

State of the Art Sound System

A state-of-the-art sound system has been implemented in the Kohl Center and TV monitors (capable of showing replays) are wired to the suites and above concessions stands throughout the building.



Nicholas Johnson Pavilion

Badgers practice facility offers three courts

The Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion and Plaza is the Badgers' practice facility. Attached to the west side of the Kohl Center, the pavilion features three full-size basketball courts that are used for practice sessions when the Kohl Center is booked for other events. Pre-game booster club functions are also scheduled in the practice gym.

Basketball Locker Room

The Badgers home away from home

The Kohl Center includes lockers for UW men's and women's basketball and hockey teams. Four other locker rooms are also available for multiple teams attending events such as the WIAA state tournaments, also held here.

The 2,200-square-foot, state-of-the-art locker areas have been designed with the needs of student-athletes in mind, including team organizational meetings, an athletes' social area and study carrels. The athletes have a lounge area with sound system, video room and a spacious dressing and shower area complete with lighted mirrors.

A large back-lit W (opposite page center) is the focal point as you enter the 2,200-square-foot Badger women's basketball locker room. The space is comprised of five areas including a lounge and adjacent study area, locker room, team meeting room, and a coaches lounge and locker room. The area is a home away from home for student-athletes and has the latest in sound, television and video equipment.







Basketball Offices

The UW women's basketball offices are located on the second floor of the Kohl Center in a suite with the men's basketball and men's hockey offices.

The offices offer an excellent view of campus west and are conveniently located so that players can drop in at any time to meet with the coaches or to watch game tape.

The assistant coaches and head coach meet as a staff almost daily to discuss players, strategies, travel and the myriad of other details involved with operating a Division I basketball program.

The assistant coaches have duties involving budgets, scheduling, team travel, recruiting, community service and scouting. Some are liaisons with support services such as sports medicine, strength and conditioning or equipment.

The office features a large reception area that includes photos of athletes in action and beautiful scenes of Madison and the campus. The basketball offices are the base of operations for the staff, offering a central locale for the coaches to break down film and construct game plans.

Together with the director of basketball operations and head coach Lisa Stone, the staff forms the directional center of the UW women's program.



Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 13 full-time and three graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Fulltime athletic trainers Tricia DeSouza, Bill Gierach, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jesse Donnenwerth, Mike Moll, Clark Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Ashley Parr, Jen Pepoy, Holli Schaible and Kristy Walker as well as graduate assistant athletic trainers Ryan Dean, Lindsey Otte and Gretchen Wagnitz, utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Katie DiPiazza, RD, provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physicians Dr. John Orwin, Dr. Lee Kaplan and Dr. Geoffrey Baer. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.


Strength and Conditioning

he Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the court. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann along with assistants Brian Bott, Ben Herbert, Scott Hettenbach, Stephanie Housh, Jim Snider and Ray Eady work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium.

The recently completed Kohl Center weight room is equipped with eight custom-built free weight power platforms and 9,000 pounds of free weights. The room has 16 pieces of cardiovascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

Office of Academic Services

The Office of Academic Services, which is located in the Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center and the satellite Kohl Fetzer Center, provide for the academic needs of more than 750 student-athletes at the University of Wisconsin. The state-of-the-art centers, named after Wade and Beverly Fetzer, are home to the academic advising, learning support, life skills and career development staffs.

The original Fetzer Center is a 15,000-square-foot facility. The center is fully wireless and features a large open study area that is surrounded by nine small to mid-sized classrooms, a 55-seat auditorium, staff offices, a computer lab and a canteen area. The open study area has 30 individual carrels as well as several study tables. The state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, allows student-athletes to work on assignments, access online library or course materials and check their email. The computer lab also has several checkout laptop computers for student-athletes who are traveling for competitions and other team-related activities.

The Kohl Fetzer Center was opened in October of 2006 to serve the needs of the student-athletes who practice and compete on the southeast end of the campus. The 5,000-square foot KFC, as it is fondly called, features five classrooms, an

open study area and a computer lab. An academic advisor and a learning specialist are available full time for the teams that use the KFC.

The two academic centers feature a staff of seven advisors, three learning specialists, a life skills coordinator, tutor coordinator and a career development coordinator. The staff monitors academic eligibility and progress while providing study groups for selected courses and access to tutors. The office also hosts a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the year.

Under the direction of assistant athletic director Doug Tiedt, the advising staff of Chris Butler, Jill Hadfield, Kelli Richards, David Sedor, assistant director Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutor coordinator David Mattison work along with learning specialists Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe and Denise Kalscheur to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. Richards also coordinates the career development

of the student-athletes. Bridget Warren, the director of inclusion and life skills programming, overseas events in diversity and inclusion, community development and community outreach.

The staff, including program assistants Nancy Kreklow

and Laurel Holgerson, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play by honoring more than 200 student-athletes with a 3.5 or better grade point average.



Athletic Excellence


➤ The student-athlete advisory committee (SAAC) works with the CHAMPS program to make sure all of the student-athletes' needs and concerns are being addressed.

2007-08 CHAMPS Cup

The CHAMPS Cup is an all-sport competition, rewarding teams who exemplify all aspects of the student-athlete.

Student-athletes earn points for their teams in six categories: academic achievement, athletic achievement, personal enhancement, community outreach, Badger pride and SAAC participation. The mission of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) is to provide a link of communication between UW–Madison student athletes and athletic department administration and to provide a support system for student-athletes to discuss various issues specific to the rigors of student-athlete life. We also strive to enhance the total student athlete experience by promoting opportunity, protecting student athlete welfare and fostering a positive student athlete image. SAAC is made up of two representatives from each team. They meet monthly to discuss NCAA issues as well as plan student-athlete socials and community outreach events.



Feeding the Badgers

The Kellner Club is one of the latest additions to the Kohl Center and another area that benefits Wisconsin's student-athletes. Teams that practice at the Kohl Center, including the women's basketball team, utilize the Kellner Club for post-practice meals.

The Kellner Club was opened in 2005–06 as a place that donors could have dinner prior to Kohl Center events. The Kohl Center teams began using the area for their meals during the summer of 2006.

The Kellner Club is located on the second level of the Kohl Center, on the north end. The north side of the room is completely covered with windows looking out onto Dayton Street and downtown Madison, including the Capitol. The room has seating capacity for 132 people.

Quality food and service is provided by the department of athletics' food and beverage staff. The staff has a full working kitchen in the Kohl Center in which the meals are prepared.

Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.




Student Life







University & Athletic Administration




Chancellor Carolyn (Biddy) Martin

Chancellor Carolyn "Biddy" Martin began serving as the University of Wisconsin's chief of staff in September 2008.

As provost of Cornell University from 2000-08, Martin acted as the president's first deputy officer and reported to the president as the chief educational officer and chief operating officer of the university. She was responsible for overseeing all academic programs, with the exception of those programs reporting to the provost for medical affairs in New York City.

Martin received her Ph.D. in German Literature in 1985 from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. That same year, she joined the Cornell University's faculty full-time as an assistant professor of German studies and women's studies. In 1991, she was promoted to associate professor in the Department of German Studies with a joint appointment in the Women's Studies Program. She served as chair of the Department of German Studies from 1994-97, and in 1997 was promoted to full professor in the department. In 1996, she was appointed senior associate dean in the College of Arts and Sciences. Martin was appointed Cornell University's Provost effective July 1, 2000.

Martin is a distinguished scholar of German Studies and author of numerous articles and two books—one on a literary and cultural figure in the Freud circle, Lou Andreas-Salome, and the other on gender theory.



Athletic Director Barry Alvarez

Barry Alvarez is in his fifth year as Director of Athletics.

Under Alvarez's leadership, Wisconsin has won 10 national titles, including five NCAA championships, and 19 conference regular-season or tournament crowns. The Badgers have also had record-setting season academically, with UW student-athletes recording a record-high grade point average in the fall of 2006. The UW has prospered in its facilities with the renovation of Camp Randall Stadium, additions to the Kohl Center and a new facilities master plan.

Alvarez was appointed in the spring of 2008 as one of the chairs of the NCAA's Football Academic Enhancement Group.

From 1990-2005, Alvarez guided the UW football team to a 118-73-4 record, making him the winningest football coach in school history. He piloted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles. Alvarez was the 1993 national coach of the year and a two-time Big Ten coach of the year.

He received his undergraduate and master's degrees from Nebraska, where he played linebacker. Alvarez received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three children, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson), Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer), and Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, Grace and Jackson Delzer, and Scarlett and Barry John Thomas Alvarez.





Head Coach Lisa Stone



Wisconsin native from nearby Oregon, Lisa Stone began her career with the Badger program in April, 2003. She came to Wisconsin from Drake University where she served as head coach three years, taking the Bulldogs to the 2002 NCAA Sweet 16.

A proven winner in four different programs, Stone's 23-year career collegiate record of 447-196 (.695) ranks among the top 30 in overall winning percentage among active Division I coaches.

Stone's Badgers have put together two-straight winning seasons and received back-to-back post-season bids for the first time since 2002. The 2006-07 team set a program record 23 wins (23-13) and posted a 4-1 record as the runner-up WNIT champions, losing at Wyoming, 72-56, in the championship.

The 2007-08 team was 16-14, losing in the second round of the WNIT tournament. The Badgers 9-9 Big Ten Conference mark was the most league wins since going 12-4 in 2001.

Stone faced a major refurbishing project when she took over at UW. She had the first losing season of her career in 2003-04, as she took a team that finished 7-21 in 2003, to a 10-17 record in 2004. Armed with five new recruits, an insatiable energy and the desire to succeed, her second season with the Badgers showed a team that improved by leaps and bounds. The Badgers had more wins and better statistics across the board while finishing with a 12-16 mark, including their first win at the Big Ten tournament since 2002.

The 2005-06 team suffered through an injury-laden season to an 11-18 record and a ninth-place Big Ten finish. but in 2006-07, the Badgers improved to a tie for fifth in the conference (7-9) and posted the first winning season since 2002.

Just as important to Stone as a winning record is having studentathletes who are accomplished in the classroom. Stone's 2006-07 Badger team had the third best fall grade point average of all 23 Badger teams with a GPA of 3.239. Her 2007-08 team had a cumulative GPA of just below 3.00 and seven upper classmen were named Academic All-Big Ten. Sixteen individuals have garnered 30 Academic All-Big Ten honors during her five-year tenure at Wisconsin.

While at Drake University, her 2001 team ranked sixth nationally and her 2002 team ranked 15th nationally in the Women's Basketball Coaches Association's Academic Top 25.

Stone's basketball record at Drake was also successful, posting a 64-27 (.703) record in three years. With a 25-8 record, her 2002 team had the best record and the highest national ranking (20th) at the school in 20 years. Drake was 23-7 in Stone's first season before bowing out in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

She was recognized for her coaching success in 2002 with an invitation to join Team USA as an assistant coach



Stone was inducted into the UW-Eau Claire Athletics Hall of Fame in 2006. Stone coached the Blugolds to a 277-59 (.824) record over 12 seasons. Her record ranks No. 1 all-time for women's basketball coaches in the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.



to Marsha Sharp of Texas Tech. Team USA won the gold medal at the 2002 World Championships for Young Women Qualifying Tournament in Ribeirao Preto, Brazil.

Prior to Drake, Stone built one of the top NCAA Division III programs in the nation at UW–Eau Claire. The two-time national coach of the year and five-time Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WIAC) coach of the year, took a program that had only one winning season in its history, and guided 11 teams to 20-win seasons and 11 appearances in the NCAA Division



The Stone family is a close-knit group and they can be found on many UW road trips accompanying coach Lisa Stone. Her family includes husband Ed, daughter Allison and son Tyler.

III tournament. She compiled a 277-59 (.824) record in her 12 seasons, which ranks second all-time for most wins in the league's history.

In each of Stone's last nine seasons at UW-Eau Claire, the Blugolds won at least 22 games and never lost more than six. UW-Eau Claire completed its best season in 1999–2000, winning its first 28 games before falling in the Divi-

sion III NCAA Sweet 16 to the eventual national champion.

Stone began her coaching career at Cornell College (Mount Vernon, Iowa), where she had a 34-32 record in three years as head coach from 1985–88. At 23, she was the youngest four-year college coach in the nation when she led the Rams to three consecutive Southern Division titles in the Midwest Conference.

As a player, Stone (then Anderson) earned four letters each in tennis, basketball and track during her high school career. She led the Oregon Panthers to the Wisconsin state basketball tournament in 1979 and 1980, earning first-team all-state honors as a senior and second-team recognition as a junior.

She played her collegiate ball at the University of Iowa from 1980–84, where she earned her bachelor's degree in physical education in 1984. She added a master's degree in athletic administration from Iowa in 1986.


At Iowa, Stone played for one of the country's outstanding coaches in C. Vivian Stringer. She was a four-year standout at point guard, scoring 1,129 points, which ranks 19th in Iowa history. She also ranks eighth in assists (322) and tied for ninth in steals (177). Three times Stone served as Iowa's captain and twice was the Hawkeyes' MVP. She won the 1984 Big Ten Medal of Honor, recognizing her as one of the top scholar-athletes in the conference.


Stone and her husband Ed, a certified public accountant, are the parents of Allison (16) and Tyler (13).






Assistant Coach Ty Margenthaler

y Margenthaler became an assistant at Wisconsin in July, 2006, after six years with the women's basketball program at Bradley University. He is responsible for recruiting and is the post coach for the Badgers.

In 2008, Margenthaler aided Lin Zastrow to a spot on the Big Ten All-Freshman team.

At Bradley, Margenthaler developed a pair of Braves centers into Missouri Valley All-Conference players. Dena Williams (2002) and Ashley Chel-



leen (2003) both earned spots on the Valley's All-Freshman squad. Williams earned first-team All-Missouri Valley honor, leading the team in scoring, rebounding and blocked shots. Williams later signed a contract to play professionally in Europe. Margenthaler also served as the camp coordinator and assisted with scouting duties for the Braves.

With both a father and brother in coaching, Margenthaler grew up around basketball. His father Jack spent 15 years at Western Illinois and recently retired from coaching after sitting at the end of the SIU-Edwardsville bench for 11 seasons. Ty's brother, Matt, was a member of the South Dakota State coaching staff for six seasons and is entering his seventh year as head coach at Minnesota State University, Mankato.

Margenthaler's playing experience includes two years at Indian Hills Community College (1992–94) before joining his father at SIU-Edwardsville for his final two collegiate seasons, where he averaged more than 10 points per game and started every contest. He earned his degree in physical education/kinesiology from SIU-Edwardsville in 1997.

A native of Macomb, Ill., where he earned all-state basket-ball honors as a senior, Margenthaler coached for two years at SIU-Edwardsville, where he helped lead the Cougars to a 19-9 record and the NCAA Division II Tournament in 1998-99. He served as a high school coach at Roxana (Ill.) High School from 1997-99, earning *Alton Telegraph* Coach of the Year honors after leading his team to the South Central Conference title and regional championship.

Margenthaler and his wife, Julie, have two children, Brice (8) and Nate (5).





Assistant Coach Kathi Bennett

familiar name in Wisconsin basketball, Kathi Bennett joined the Badger women's basketball program as an assistant coach on May 1, 2008. Bennett, who is the daughter of former UW men's coach Dick Bennett and the sister of former UW assistant coach Tony Bennett, now the head coach at Washington State, has many coaching ties to the state and to the Big Ten Conference.

Bennett battled against UW head coach Lisa Stone (who was then



Bennett's seven-year ledger at UW-Oshkosh included a 94-17 Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletics Conference (WIAC) coaching record, five WIAC titles, 17 All-WIAC first-team selections and two NCAA Division III All-America selections. In 1996, Bennett was recognized as the Coach of the Year in NCAA Division III by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA).

She moved to NCAA Division I, first taking the head job at the University of Evansville and later at Indiana University, where her team won the Big Ten Tournament title in 2002. Her record at Evansville was 51-61, but she was 42-18 in her last two years. She finished with a 72-74 record in five years at Indiana. Her 2002 Indiana team was the lowest-seeded team (No. 5) to win the Big Ten tournament, upending top-seeded Purdue, 55-41, and second-seeded and regular season champion Penn State, 75-72, en route to the Big Ten crown and an NCAA tournament bid.

During her tenure, the Hoosiers knocked off two top-10 teams, three top-15 teams and six top-25 teams. Bennett became the first coach in school history to defeat at least one

nationally-ranked opponent in each of her first three seasons. Her 17-year career coaching mark was 296-177 for a 62.8 winning percentage.

While at Indiana, Bennett also participated in two international coaching tours. She led the 2004 Big Ten Foreign Tour team to a perfect 4-0 record in Australia and she served as assistant coach for the 2003 Pan American Games team that won a silver medal.

After leaving Indiana, Bennett worked as an orthopedic sales representative for Zimmer Thomson and as a national Nike sales representative for Impact Sports.

Bennett graduated from Stevens Point Area Senior High and played collegiate ball at UW-Stevens Point and later UW-Green Bay, where she earned an undergraduate degree in exercise science in 1986.

ties (o - TEECE) Epps, an assistant at Cleveland State for the past four years. joined the Badger program in May, 2008. Epps has seven years of coaching experience in both the Horizon League and the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WIAC), where he spent three years as an assistant men's coach at his alma mater, UW-Stout.

Epps brings a tremendous basketball background and recruiting contacts to Wisconsin where he is responsible



for recruiting, scouting and player development, primarily with the guards. As the top assistant to CSU head coach and former UW assistant Kate Peterson Abiad, he assisted in leading Cleveland State to its best season in 24 years. In 2008, the Vikings won their first Horizon League tournament title and received their first NCAA bid, losing to the eventual NCAA runner-up, Stanford.

Cleveland State's 19 wins were the second most in school history and the 19-14 record was the fifth-best turnaround in Division I in the nation last year. Epps helped coach first team all-conference performer Kailey Klein and the Horizon League defensive player of the year in Dominique Butler. Klein scored a school season record 654 points and was named the Horizon League Tournament MVP.

A native of Highland Park, Mich., Epps joined Peterson-Abiad in 2004-05. His duties included working with the guards and helping with overall player development, while assisting with recruiting. Epps also served as the strength and conditioning liaison, organized the community service activities and provided opponent scouts and game strategies. While at CSU, he assisted in signing four McDonald's All-America




A former Drake University standout player, Schmitz also was a student assistant for Stone at her alma mater in 2002–03.

Badger Academic Honors

Wisconsin Tops Big Ten Academic Honors

Wisconsin has had the most Academic All-Big Ten honorees of any conference women's basketball team. With 89 athletes, the Badgers have numbered more than 13.4 percent of all 663 honors over the past 22 years since the conference academic team honors program began in 1986–87.






Huff's Number Is Retired

Theresa Huff, who played at Wisconsin from 1979–83, is the only UW women's basketball player to have her jersey retired. The 5-11 forward became the school's all-time leading scorer and rebounder, completing her career with 1,879 points and 1,201 rebounds.

A Milwaukee native, Huff's career spanned the transition period from AIAW to NCAA governance. She led Wisconsin to its first post-season appearance, reaching the quarterfinals of the 1982 AIAW National Championship. She was a member of the first official Big Ten Conference team in 1981–82. Huff distinguished herself as Wisconsin's first women's professional basketball player and was also the first female American chosen to play professionally in Spain in 1983-84. She was inducted into the University of Wisconsin Athletics Hall of Fame in 1998.

Huff's scoring record has been broken three times (Robin Threatt, 1,901 points in 1993; Barb Franke, 1,994 points in 1996; and Jolene Anderson, 2,217 points in 2008), but no one has ever reached Huff's incredible 1,201 rebounding mark.



Looking Back at Last Season

• The Badgers (16-14, 9-9) concluded their season, falling to Villanova 60-54 in the second round of the WNIT Tournament at the UW Field House.

It was the second-straight WNIT bid for Wisconsin and the fourth in school history. The Badgers lost 72-56 at Wyoming in the championship final in 2007.

- At 9-9, the Badgers finished with their most Big Ten Conference wins since a 12-4 mark in 2001. Wisconsin was 4-5 in Big Ten road games, two wins more than the previous year's record, and the most conference road wins since a 5-3 record in 2000–01.
- Jolene Anderson became UW's first Big Ten Player of the Year as voted by the media. She earned her second-straight Big Ten scoring title, totaling 353 points for a 19.6 points per game average in conference-only games.

She was also named the 2008 Frances Pomeroy Naismith National Player

of the Year (for players 5-8 and under) and a 2008 WBCA/State Farm regional All-American.

- The Badgers won eight of their last 11 Big Ten games. Wisconsin had some tough luck with close games in the season's early going and was 4-5 in games decided by six points or less and 0-3 in overtime games.
- Jolene Anderson finished her career as the UW's leading scorer for men and women. She totaled 2,312 points, which ranked her fourth in Big Ten career scoring. She led UW in scoring, rebounding, assists and steals as a senior.

Anderson had a career-high 42 points vs. Iowa on Jan. 13, to surpass the UW women's career scoring record. She surpassed Barb Franke, who scored 1,994 points from 1991-96.

With 2,312 career points, Anderson also eclipsed the men's scoring record of 2,217 points to become Wisconsin's all-time leading scorer for men and women.

She was UW's first and the Big Ten's 12th 2,000-point scorer. Anderson had her double-figure scoring streak stopped at 39, the second longest in school history, with six points vs. Purdue on Dec. 28.

- Rae Lin D'Alie ranked eighth in the Big Ten for assists, averaging 3.57 per game. In 2006–07, she was just the third freshman in Big Ten history to lead the conference with 80 assists (5.0/game) in conference-only games. D'Alie also ranked first in the Big Ten in all games with 4.58 per game in 2007.
- Alyssa Karel was effective when she shot the 3-pointer, hitting 17-of-31 for 54.8 percent on the season. In the final three games of the season, she averaged double figures and hit 7-of-9 3-pointers (78 percent). Earlier in 2007-08, Karel hit 8-of-11 field goals, including 3-of-4 3-pointers for a career-high 19 points in 18 minutes vs. Michigan State on Jan. 2.

Wisconsin ranked 15th in national attendance in 2007-08, it's 14th-straight year in the top 20. The Badgers averaged more than 6,000 fans per game.

By the Numbers

2,312 Jolene Anderson became the first woman in UW history and just the 12th player in the Big Ten to surpass 2,000 points. The UW's all-time leading scorer concluded her career with 2,312 points, which ranks fourth among the conference's all-time scoring leaders.

Anderson is Wisconsin's all-time leading scorer for both men and women, surpassing Alando Tucker in her 118th career game on Feb. 20, 2008. Tucker set the UW men's record of 2,217 points in 2007 in his 134th career game.

1,500 Janese Banks became UW's 10th 1.500-point scorer in her 116th career game vs. Iowa on March 2. Banks finished her career ranking 10th in scoring with 1,512 points.

100 The Badgers earned their 100th win at the Kohl Center when they beat Penn State 79-52 on Jan. 24. UW is 103-54 since the Kohl Center opened 10 years ago in January, 1998.

42 The second most points scored in a single game by a Badger when Jolene Anderson had 42 vs. Iowa, Jan. 13, 2008. Anderson also has the third most points when she fired for 37 in the season opener at Cleveland State 11/9/07.

39 Jolene Anderson's double-figure scoring streak of 39, second longest in school history, was stopped at Purdue with six points on 12/28/07. Her previous streak was 35. The school record is 45 by LaTonya Sims, 1997-2000.

15 The Badgers ranked 15th in national attendance, averaging 6,078 fans per game. UW has ranked among the top 20 in women's basketball attendance in the nation for the 14th-straight seasons.

Freshman Lin Zastrow blossomed in her first season in the Cardinal and White. She collected a career-high 18 points and 10 rebounds, recording her first career double-double in the win at Penn State on Feb. 3. The 6-4 forward had a breakout game at Ohio State on Jan. 20 with 15 points. Zastrow was named to the 2008 Big Ten All-Freshman team.

The Badgers' cumulative GPA was 2.987 and seven players received Academic All-Big Ten honors. Earning recognition were Janese Banks, legal studies: Annie Crangle, pre-journalism; Rae Lin D'Alie, psychology; Teah Gant, industrial engineering; Caitlin Gibson, elementary education; Brittany Heins, biology; and Sarah Ingison, business.

UW outrebounded all but six opponents during the 2007-08 season. The Badgers had a season-high 58 boards vs. Ole Miss, to put UW first in the league averaging 39.1 caroms per game. UW was also No. 1 in offensive rebounds, averaging 16.17 per game.

Wisconsin averaged a school-record low of 15.97 turnovers per game, which ranked fourth in the Big Ten. The Badgers recorded a single-game schoolrecord with only five turnovers vs. Penn State on Jan. 24,

In Big Ten-only games, UW also set an all-time record low with 15.22 turnovers per game. That resets the 2006-07 season's school record for fewest turnovers, averaging 17.17.

Wisconsin enjoyed its first top-25 ranking in five years on Nov. 13, appearing at 25th in the Associated Press poll for the first time since Feb. 11, 2002. UW dropped out of the poll a week later with a loss at Marquette.

Wisconsin had two winning streaks of five games a piece during the 2007-08 season. These streaks were one shy of tying the best consecutive win record under Coach Stone, which was established with six-straight wins to open the 2006-07 season.

New faces, same expectations

he Badgers are ready to put the past behind them. That means the team is saying goodbye to UW's all-time scoring leader, Jolene Anderson and the three other seniors, including two starters. Wisconsin is looking beyond a 16-14 record from 2007-08 and ready to move forward. The Badgers are ready for the 2008-09 season with several new faces but the expectations are the same—to win.

"Our goal is a Big Ten championship and to advance into the NCAA tournament," says head coach Lisa Stone, who begins her sixth year at Wisconsin. "This team strives to improve daily."

A new season brings new faces with four new freshmen, a transfer and two new assistant coaches. There are also new opponents on tap for 2008–09, including eight games against 2008 NCAA tournament teams, seven games vs. opponents that were ranked or received votes in the final 2008 Associated Press poll and 13 games against teams that competed in the 2008 WNIT.

With two consecutive post-season appearances, the Badgers welcome back eight letter winners, but must fill in the blanks for three starters that departed,

who also happen to be the three leading scorers from 2007–08.

"Our seniors provided a solid foundation for building our program," Stone said of her graduates. "The contributions they provided last season will be filled in with a more balanced and unified front this season, both offensively and defensively. We're looking forward to seeing new players step up as we work towards our goals."

Junior Rae Lin D'Alie returns to lead the Badgers in the backcourt while sophomore Tara Steinbauer is another returning starter at the forward/center position.

During the 2007–08 season, D'Alie, who has started all 66 games in her Badger careeer, averaged 5.7 points and 3.6 assists per game. A 16-game starter as a true freshman, Steinbauer contributed 5.1 points per game and had a team-best field goal percentage at 54.7.

Sophomore Lin Zastrow and junior Mariah Dunham are two other players to watch during the 2008–09 season. Zastrow, a 6-4 guard/forward, was named by the coaches to the 2008 Big Ten All-Freshman team and put up some big numbers last season. She came off the bench for the Badgers and averaged 5.5 points per game but had six double-figure games, including

a career-high 18 points against Penn State. Zastrow also hit the glass for Wisconsin and had the third-best rebounding average on the team with 4.4 per game.


Dunham is looking for a breakout season. The 6-1 forward put up 4.4 points and 2.6 rebounds per game off the bench last year. She has a taste of what its like to start for the Badgers as she started 14 games her freshman season and seven last year.

Other returnees include the team's lone senior Caitlin Gibson, junior guards Teah Gant and Sarah Ingison, and sophomore guard Alyssa Karel.

The Badgers will also welcome Alana Trotter into the rotation. Trotter is a transfer from Ohio University and after sitting out last season, will see playing time for the Cardinal and White this year.

Four freshmen and one junior transfer will also try to make a name for themselves this season. The Badger freshmen are Jade Davis, a 5-9 guard from Lone Tree, Colo., Jamie Russell, a 5-7 guard from Rock Falls, Ill., Ashley Thomas, a 6-2 forward from Wilmette, Ill., and Anya Covington, a 6-2 forward from Edwardsville, Ill.

All four have an extensive list of accolades to their name. Davis averaged



Junior Teah Gant started seven games as a sophomore, averaging 3.7 points and 1.9 rebounds per game.

10.0 points, 2.7 rebounds, 2.8 steals and 4.4 assists per game as a senior. She was a 2008 McDonald's All-American nominee and named honorable mention all-state.

Russell put up 22.3 points, 6.9 rebounds, 6.4 steals and 4.4 assists as a senior. She was also a McDonald's All-American nominee and was named first-team all-conference all four years in high school.

Thomas was a rebounding machine in high school and totaled 614 career rebounds, 182 of which came her senior season. She is also quick and stole the ball 211 times while in high school.

Covington will also be a presence on the boards as she left Edwardsville High School as the school rebounding record with 929 career boards. She also scored more than 1,000 points (1,243), including 452 her senior year.

"I'm very excited about our freshmen," Stone said. "They have worked extremely hard this summer and it will be fun for our coaching staff and Badger fans to watch them grow throughout the season."

The Badgers also add Emily Neal, a 5-9 guard from Colorado State to their roster. Neal, who can score from beyond the 3-point arc, will redshirt this season but should help the UW out on the scout team.

In order to reach the team's goal of an NCAA tournament berth, the Badgers have to work their way through a tough schedule. Wisconsin officially opens the 2008-09 season on the road against South Dakota on Nov. 17. Wisconsin's home opener will be Nov. 20 against Lisa Stone's former team, Drake.

Before the Badgers get to the Big Ten Conference season, they face tough tests against 2008 WNIT opponent Villanova, Central Florida and national powerhouse, Baylor, at the Paradise Jam in St. Thomas, Virgin Islands.

The Badgers host UW-Milwaukee before Virginia Tech comes to town for the Big Ten/ACC Challenge. Wisconsin heads to intra-state rival Green Bay before closing out the non-conference season at home against 2008 WNIT Champion Marquette.

The Big Ten is always tough and Stone believes that the conference is better than ever. The Badgers open the conference slate Dec. 22 at home against Iowa, who received votes in the final Associated Press poll and was an NCAA tournament team in 2008. Wisconsin will face every team twice except for Minnesota and Northwestern. UW



Big Ten Basketball

The Big Ten began its conference basketball tournament to decide the automatic qualifier for the NCAA championship in 1995. During that time, Big Ten teams have won one NCAA championship and competed in five Final Fours.

The league title is based on the final regular season conference standings. All teams play 18 games. Schools play eight teams twice and two teams once.

The 2009 Big Ten Conference tournament is set for March 5-8 at Conseco Fieldhouse in Indianapolis. The tournament is a four-day single elimination playoff with all 11 teams participating. The top-five seeds, determined by regular-season standings, receive a first-round bye. The other six teams play each other in the first round, with the winners participating in the quarterfinal round on Friday. The winner will receive the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA tournament.


