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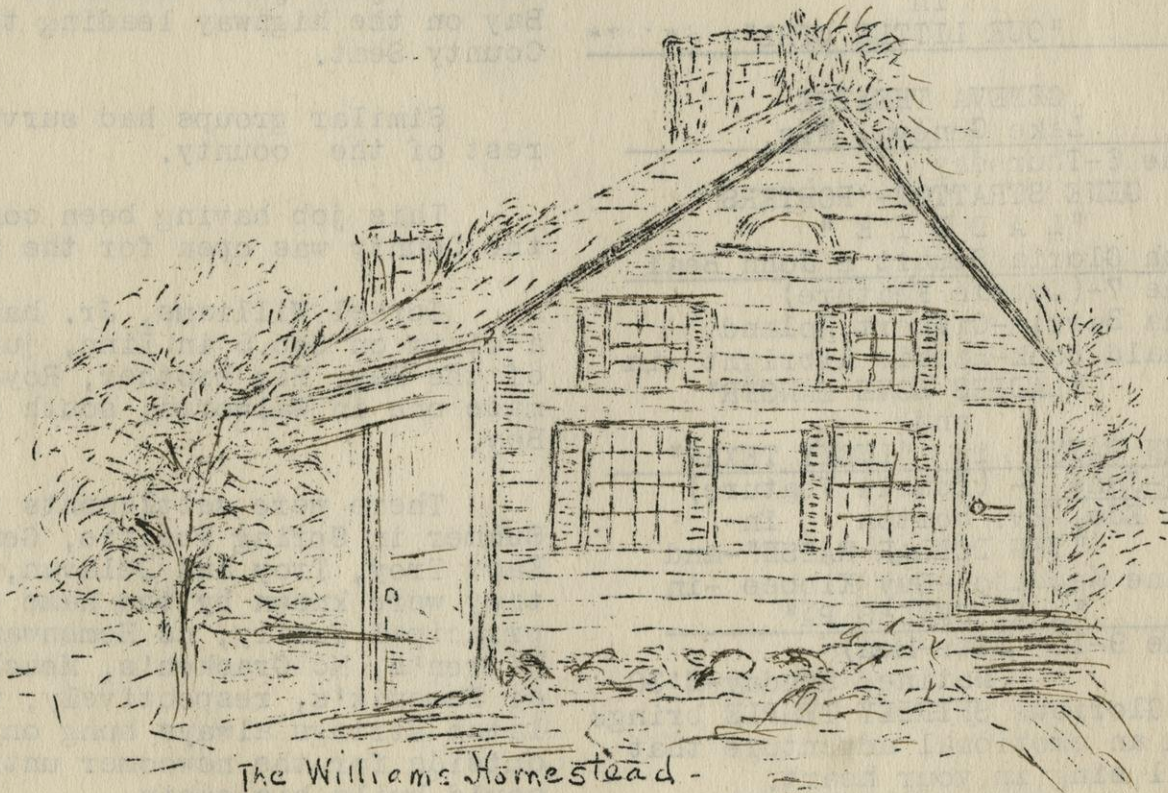

HISTORY OF WALWORTH COUNTY  
( Instalment No. 4 )

Next year Walworth County will celebrate the One Hundredth Anniversary of the First Settlement in its borders. In last issue of Bay Leaves mention was made that the survey had been made by John Brink and John Hodgson, who had taken the contract to survey the Township lines. They came through what is now Williams Bay in the fall of 1835. In January of 1836 another contract was let for the surveying of the section lines. This job was completed on July 20, 1836, and was the work of Sylvester Sibley, Deputy Surveyor; John Newman and Samuel Hubble, Chainmen; and Christopher Bate, Marker. This group surveyed Walworth, Delavan, Linn and Geneva Townships, all of which adjoin just North of Williams Bay on the highway leading to the County Seat.

Similar groups had surveyed the rest of the county.

This job having been completed the County was open for the newcomers

Israel Williams, Jr. had made a claim on Sec. 6 in Linn, just East of the Bay. His brother, Royal had made one in Walworth, south of the Bay.

There were settlements that Summer in Spring Prairie, Geneva, East Troy, Troy and Delavan, though they were known by the name of the principal family, as Hemenway's, Warren's, Mc Cracken's, Meacham's, or Phoenix's, respectively, whose latch strings always hung on the outside for the newcomer until he could build his cabin.

By the end of 1836 there were some two hundred in the county, including the men, women and children, with thirty one families and thirty single men.

Among the single men was Palmer Gardner, who was the first settler in Spring Prairie and Col. Samuel F. Phoenix of Delavan who with his brother had come to the new country to



found a community pledged to temperance, sobriety and religion and "where should a poor despised colored man chance to set his foot, he might do it in safety."

By the Summer of 1837 there was a constant stream of new settlers which taxed the capacity of the crude cabins of those who had come earlier.

In July, 1837 Israel Williams and his wife and the rest of the family came first, to build a cabin across the Lake in Linn and later to move over to join with the son Royal in the building of the cabin, part of which is now a part of the Williams homestead here in the Bay.

In 1840 when the land came into the market, Israel Williams, Sr. purchased the claims of his sons. He lived in the homestead until his death in 1846. The children's grandmother, Hannah L. Joy, had passed away in 1839. Mrs. Williams lived until 1852. Two sons, Austin and Moses died of typhoid fever in 1844.

The first marriage in the town was that of Hannah Williams, a daughter of Israel to Robert Russell, with the bride's father performing the ceremony as a Justice of Peace.

That Israel was well thought of in his community is attested to by the fact that he was one of the first Justices in the County, ranking with men like Perez Merrick, Spring Prairie, believed to have been the first; Thomas Mc Kaig, Geneva, who with Squire Williams tried the first criminal case in the county; Gaylord Graves of East Troy; Daniel Salisbury, Spring Prairie; Hollis Latham, Elkhorn; Solomon Thomas, Darien; Squire Searles, Sharon; Jasper Griggs, Delavan; Perkins S. Childs, Richmond; Christopher Douglass, Walworth.

What these dispensers of justice lacked in legal lore, they possessed in good judgment, sterling common sense and their impartial decisions.

Postmaster M.T. Lenney advise us that free postal delivery is now assured for the summer months in Williams Bay; that while the service will be a little late in getting into operation this year, (perhaps not until July 1) he will arrange to have the service started by June 15 in future seasons.

The postoffice inspectors, E.T. Kelly and J.W. Blair, have been here for several days looking over the situation and making up their report to the postal Department.

The requirements of the Department for the installation of Village delivery include sidewalks, street lights, street signs, cross walks, house numbers and mail receptacles; and that at least fifty per cent of the lots within the proposed delivery limits be improved. They find that while the streets are all well lighted and provided with street signs at all intersections, none of the other requirements have been met. Out of approximately 1057 building lots within the Village, but 510 are improved, and with the exception of certain sections on Geneva, Congress and Walworth Sts., there are no walks and in few instances are there any paths.

A street numbering plan has not yet been adopted, although it is understood that a plan is being worked out by the Village Board. With the assistance of his friend E.J. Geiger, Sports Editor of the Chicago Evening American, Mr. Lenney assures us that free delivery will go into effect by July 1st. As this will be a new venture in the Village, there are many things which should be understood by the residents.

There will be three Mail Carriers who will make one delivery per day (no delivery on Sunday or on July 4th and Labor Day) The Carriers will leave the post office between 8:30 and 9 o'clock. There will be two pickups; one in



## CECIL COATES ELECTROCUTED
