Imperial Hotel

Wright's design for the Imperial Hotel replaced a 30-year-old Victorian-style structure. On the day that Wright's building opened, Tokyo was hit by a particularly devastating earthquake. Wright's building was mostly unscathed, and became a landmark for international visitors to Tokyo. 45 years later it was demolished to make way for the high-rise reincarnation of the hotel that stands today.
